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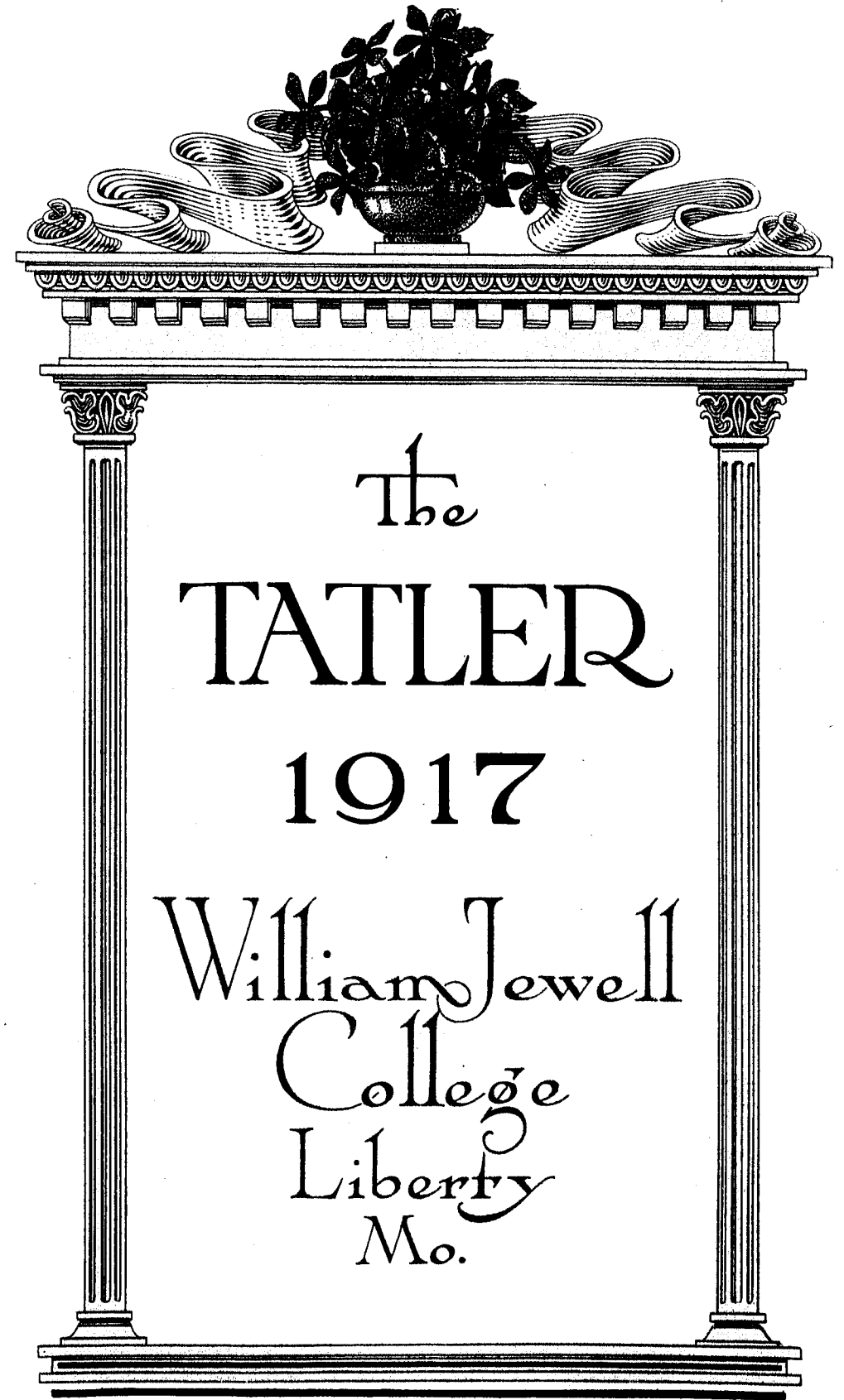

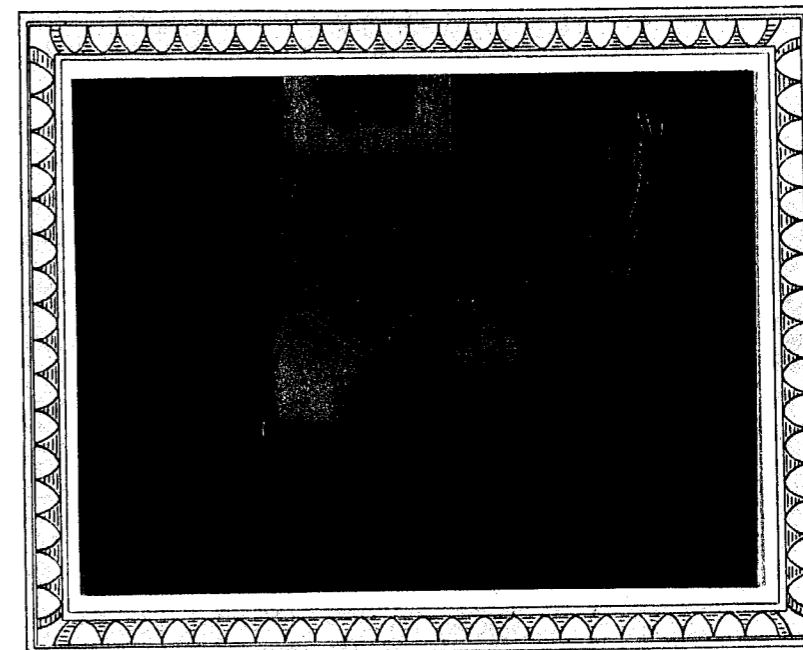

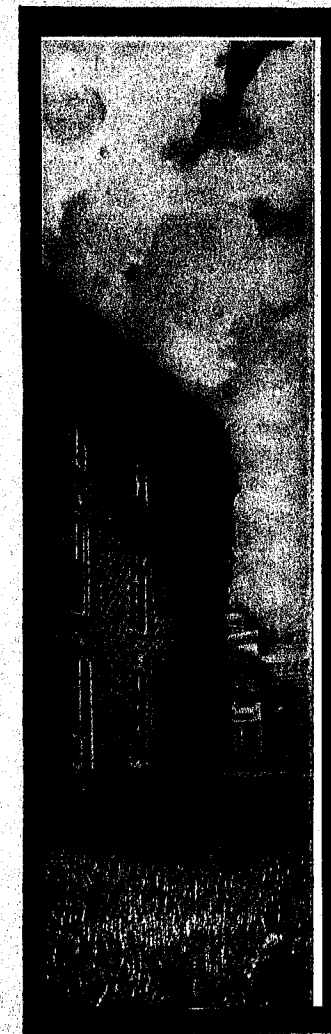
FOREWORD

Ere our sunset of life shall close.

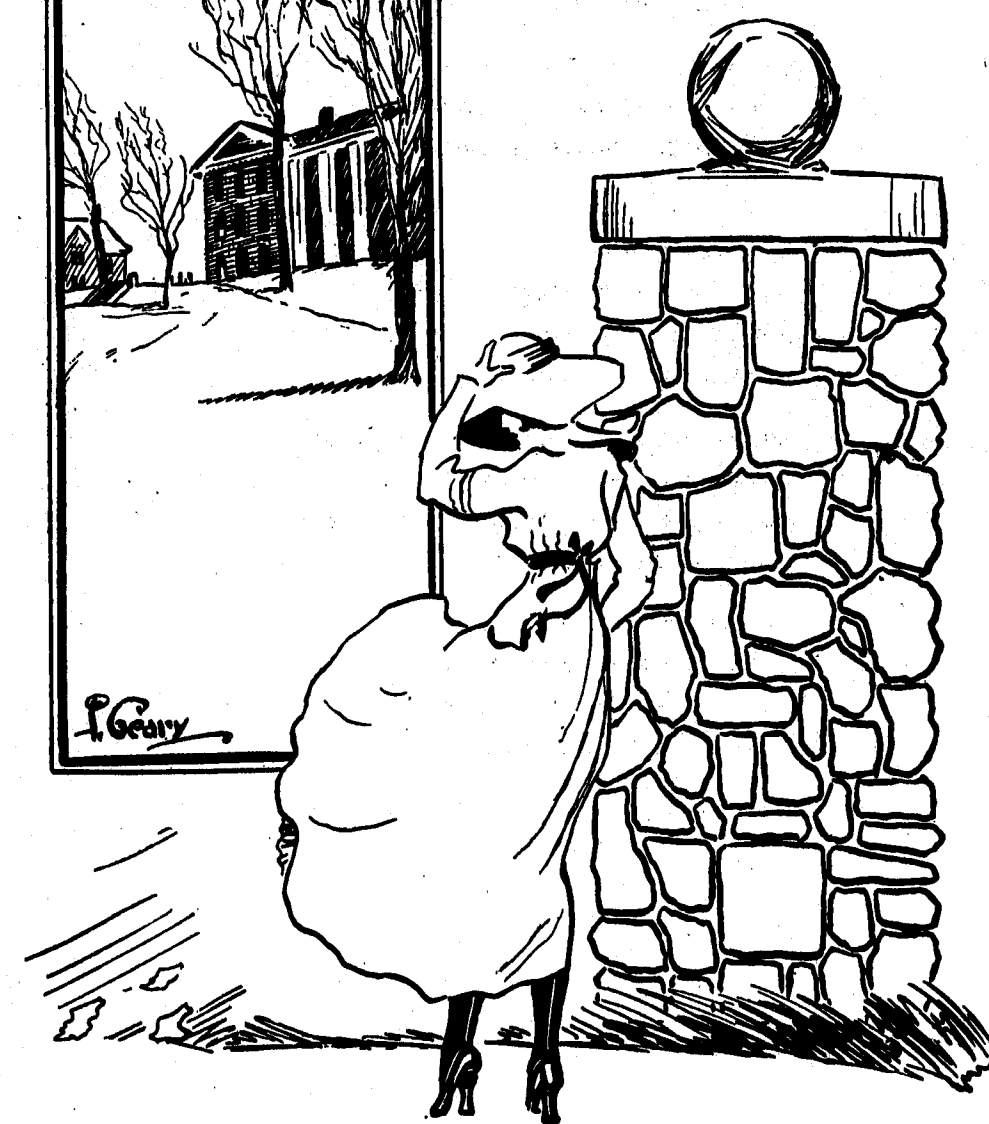

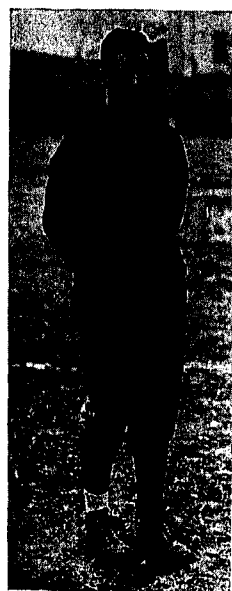
"DAD" BOWLES

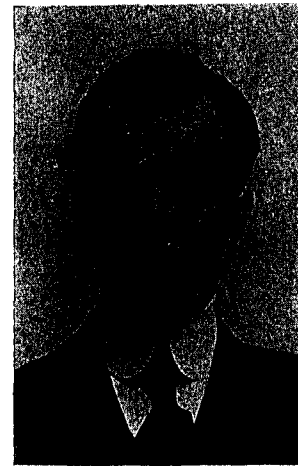
Prospects for 1917 are fine, as Davis, Evans, and Wolfe are still in school and there should be some good new men among the Freshmen.

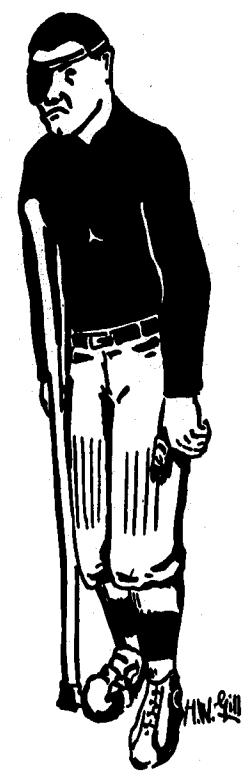
TUESDAY, 26—Captain Hardin and his "Boys from the Border" return from the South. All Jewell, all Liberty and two brass bands meet them at the train.

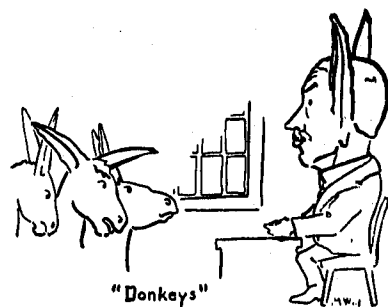
THURSDAY, 5—Glen Harle takes up a subscription fund among the Freshmen to feed the pet squirrels on the campus through the winter.

TUESDAY, 31—Prof. Richmond's banner day. He pulls fifteen jokes in his Mineralogy class.

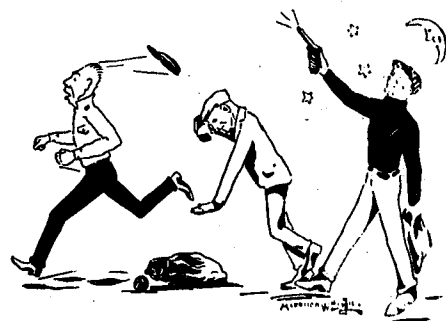
NOVEMBER

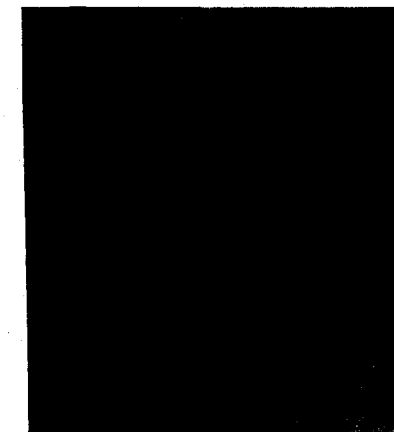

SUNDAY, 25—Rochester misses Sunday School for the first time in his college life.

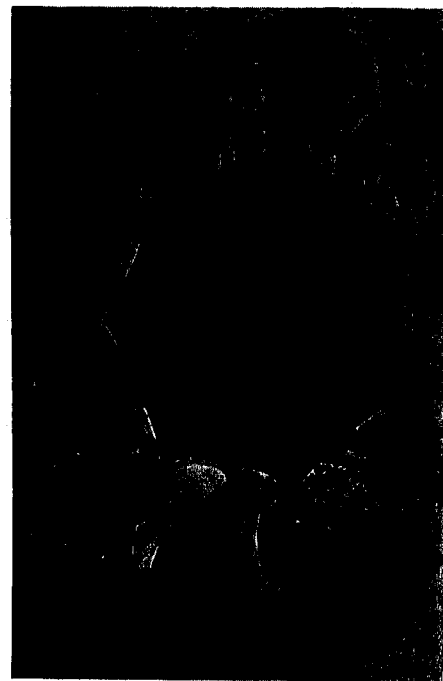
