Dr. J. P. Fruit, to whom this 1930 Tatler is dedicated, is at the head of this department. Dr. Fruit has written several books, chief among these being, "The Obsession of Edgar Allen Poe," for which the University of Virginia conferred upon him the Poe memorial medal in recognition of his excellent work. He has also published "The Mind and Art of Poe's Poetry;" "Hawthorne's 'Immitigable;'" "Correlatives of Thought;" and "Man's Funny Bone." He was educated at Bethel College, Russellville, Ky., graduating with the A. B. degree in 1878, and receiving the A. M. degree in 1881, when he became professor of English there. He attended the University of Leipzig in 1894, receiving the degree of Ph. D. in 1895 from that institution. In the line of literary activities, he has likewise edited two publications, Coleridge's "Ancient Mariner," and Milton's "Lycidas." Further, he is considered an outstanding student of Poe and his poetry. It is largely due to him that the department of English is of such value, for he has ever in mind, and emphasizes, the cultural and perennial values of English literature.

Professor P. Caspar Harvey has been professor of English Composition in William Jewell since 1920. For the six years previous to coming to the faculty here, he was head of the Department of English at the Kansas State Teachers College at Hays. He was graduated from William Jewell in 1910 and received his A. M. in 1911. During his first nine years at William Jewell he was coach of forensics and in that time coached 188 intercollegiate debates. During this time he took William Jewell debate teams and orators into 24 states and brought to the local campus teams from 24 states. In October 1928 the Macmillan Company of New York brought out his college textbook in English composition which is now used in many colleges throughout the United States. Professor Harvey has coached two national championships, one in extempore speaking in 1928, and in oratory in 1929.

### French and German

Dr. Constantine Bila is at the head of this department. Dr. Bila received his A. B. degree from the University of Chicago in 1917, and A. M. and Ph. D. from the University of Paris, the Ph. D. being awarded in 1925. He has traveled extensively in Europe, and has also done much study at European schools, having spent the summer studying at the University of Berlin, in 1929. Dr. Bila came to William Jewell in 1928 inaugurating a rather different plan of teaching foreign languages, which in two years has worked out very well.

Clarence Chrisman is instructor in French and Spanish. Mr. Chrisman was graduated from William Jewell in 1927 with the A. B. degree, and began as an instructor here in 1928. He spent the year of '29 in European Universities, attending a branch of the University of Liverpool in Santander, Spain, the Centro de Estudios Historicos of Madrid, and L'Institut Britannique, of Paris.

### Spanish Department

Professor A. G. Byrns is head of the Spanish department. He received his B. S. degree from Purdue University and his A. M. from Kansas University in 1920. He has had thirteen years of foreign residence and has had considerable teaching experience.

### Mathematics and Physics

Mathematics is the science by which all rigorous thinking is symbolized, and is the inevitable disciplinary element in the curriculum. Mathematics gives one a clear idea of demonstration and accustoms him to form long trains of thought and reasoning methodically connected and sustained by the final certainty of the result. Its logic is particularly of the deductive rather than the inductive type, for its arguments are from axioms and principles and not from collected facts.

Professor B. E. Denton who is head of this department has the degree of A. M. from George Peabody College. He came to William Jewell as professor of mathematics in 1928.

Professor J. E. Davis is head of the physics department. Professor Davis is a graduate of William Jewell having obtained his A. B. in 1907. He is now working on his Ph. D. degree in physics. He is also the business manager of the college.

The purpose of the physics department is to acquaint the students with the underlying laws of physical force that control the world in which we live.

Charles Burke was graduated from W. J. C. in 1928, and in the fall of that year became instructor in mathematics, graphics, and physics. He is at present working on his Master's degree and lacks six semester hours to complete his work for that degree.

## Ancient Languages

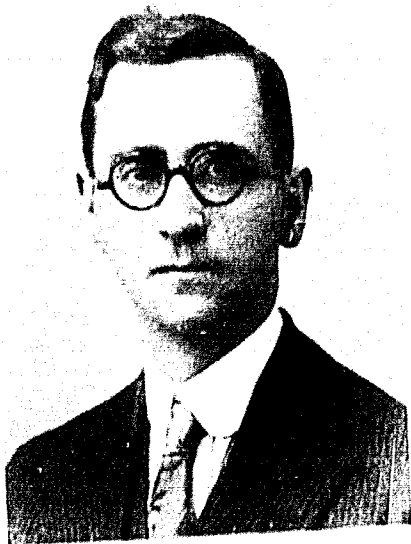


ALLEN J. MOON, LL. D.

The department of Ancient Languages takes in the study of Latin and Greek. Professor Allen J. Moon, who is head of the department of Latin, came to William Jewell College in 1925. His degrees include A. B. received in 1897, and LL. D. awarded in 1912, both from Howard College, Birmingham, Ala., and A. M. from the University of Virginia, obtained in 1902. Professor Moon is also Registrar and Acting Dean of the College. Before coming to William Jewell he taught in Howard College, Simmons College, Abilene, Tex., and for five years taught in McMaster University of Toronto, Canada. The study of Latin is very important to a knowledge of the Romance languages, and is almost as essential to a good understanding of English grammar and composition. In the sciences a clear and definite comprehension of Latin and Greek is also a valuable asset, especially in Biology.

Professor Frederick M. Derwacter is at the head of the Greek department. This is Dr. Derwacter's second year at William Jewell College, having come here as professor of Greek in 1928. He has the degree of Ph. D. from Chicago University, obtained in 1928; he has the other degrees of A. B., from Denison University, and B. D. and S. T. M. from the Newton Theological Institution, where he later taught Greek for two years. Professor Derwacter attended Harvard during the year 1913-14, and following that spent five years in Japan as a missionary. He is a member of Phi Beta Kappa.

The Greek department is composed mainly of students studying for the ministry, as this subject is quite essential to biblical study and knowledge, and to graduate work in Theology.

## Chemistry Department

Chemistry deals with the substances we find around us and the aim of the first course is to give interest and acquaintance with the more common materials, elements and compounds. After this descriptive work is learned, and the student has made his acquaintance with substances, he is in a position to take up identification and analysis.

As many take only one year of Chemistry during their college course, the more technical matters and theories wait for those who propose to take Chemistry as a major or minor course. The course of the second year will determine the student's aptness or fitness to prepare for graduate schools or medical schools.

Professor George F. Weida (the head of the department) has the B. S. degree from the University of Kansas and the Ph. D. degree from Johns Hopkins University. His teaching experience includes a seventeen year term at Kenyon College, Gambier, Ohio.

Professor Frank G. Edson is associate professor of Chemistry. He graduated from William Jewell College in 1924. Since that time he has had five years of experience and study. He received the M. A. degree from the University of Colorado, and has completed the work for the Ph. D. degree with the exception of the thesis.

Students who are encouraged or fitted to take Advanced Chemistry receive advice and assistance in the selection of minor courses to accompany the Chemistry major; especially as to French and German reading, and training in Mathematics, all of which are quite essential to the equipment of the chemist. This is Professor Edson's first year at William Jewell College and we sincerely hope that he has had a very enjoyable one.

We take this opportunity to welcome Professor Edson back to the "Old Hill" again.

## Department of Education

Professor J. B. Sullivan, who is head of the department, received his A. B. degree from Mercer University, and his A. M. from Columbia University. He has completed all his work for the Ph. D. degree except the thesis at George Washington University.

Dr. Robert W. Frederick obtained the degree of Ph. B. from Denison University in 1921, and the degree of A. M. from Yale University in 1924. In 1926 he received the Ph. D. degree from New York University.

Most of the work in the education department is of practical nature, courses being given in methods, the technique of teaching and subjects dealing with extra-curricular activities, administration, and direction of high school work.

In the psychology department three courses are offered: general psychology, applied psychology and educational psychology. In the near future it is planned to equip a laboratory which will enable the department to give courses in experimental psychology.

The work of the Department of Education has been planned with two main purposes in view; first to give those students who intend to become teachers a thorough preparation for the teaching profession, and second to give those students who plan to do advanced study and graduate work in either education or psychology, a good basis and foundation. Along with these two main purposes the department has the following objectives:

First, to prepare teachers for secondary schools.

Second, to prepare administrators for positions in public schools.

Third, to give students not preparing to teach an insight into the place, purposes, and problems of education in American civilization.

Fourth, during summer session, to give training to elementary school teachers as well as to secondary school teachers.

## History Department

The familiar statement, "History repeats itself," shows one of the chief justifications for its study. It is this knowledge of the past actions, events, and ideas of society which is the background of our own current history which makes this study so important. A careful student of History will avoid the evil of becoming a careless victim of the present; for an evaluation of current movements should not be attempted without a correct analysis of the past. To develop this understanding and this attitude is the purpose of the department of History.

This year we welcome back on the "Hill" a former student as the head of the History department. W. Holt Smith was graduated from William Jewell College in 1919. In 1921 he graduated with the B. D. degree from the Rochester Theological Seminary, winning a graduate scholarship, which he took at Rochester, obtaining the degree

of Th. M. In 1925 he received the Ph. D. degree from the University of Chicago. He has published "The Influence of Bishop Butler's 'Analogy' upon American Apologetic Thinking."

Professor Ulma R. Pugh is the other professor in this department. Professor Pugh graduated from Baylor University in 1922, with the degree of A. B. and obtained the A. M. degree from Baylor in 1925. In 1926 he attended the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary, receiving the degree of Th. M. During the year of 1926-1927 he was professor of History at the Southwest Baptist College, at Bolivar, Mo., and since that time he has completed sixteen majors of Ph. D. work in the State University of Iowa. This is Professor Pugh's first year at William Jewell. Besides assisting Dr. Smith in the History department, Professor Pugh has assisted Dr. Howd in the department of Economics.

### Social Science Department

It is the point of view of this department that in the complex world in which we live some knowledge of social science is necessary for the development of a well-rounded and efficient personality.

This department is not at present equipped to furnish any great amount of professional training, but is trying to lay the foundation so solidly that on it may be builded a professional training in other schools as well as furnishing that general basis of culture which is essential to all those who are to live as efficient citizens in this modern age. Beginning with the year 1930-31 the department is offering a choice of three different majors, one in Economics, one in Sociology, or one in Economics and Sociology combined.

Professor Cloice R. Howd is head of the department, coming to William Jewell in 1928, from teaching in the University of Montana. Dr. Howd

has the degree of Ph. D. obtained in 1923 from the University of California. His other degrees include A. B., B. D., and S. T. M.

### Bible Department

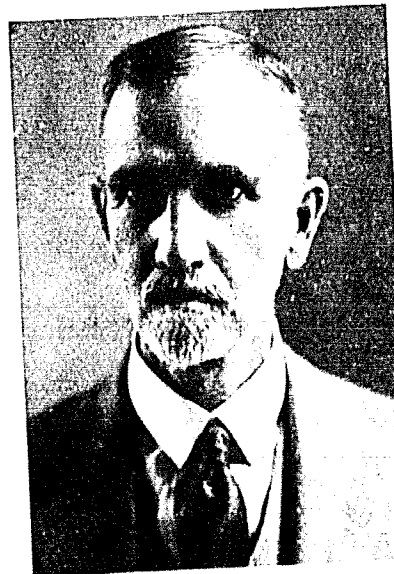
The Bible department, although mostly composed of students studying for the ministry is not meant expressly for them, but is intended for the whole of the student body. It is the purpose of the department to present a working knowledge of the Bible based on research and the best of scholarship, along with a historical background of the Bible. Dr. H. I. Hester, who is head of this department, has the degrees of A. B., Th. M., and Th. D. The first is from Wake Forest College, and the two latter are from the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary. Dr. Hester has taught in Furman University, and Wake Forest College, coming to William Jewell in 1926 as head of the department of Bible. He has had two publications, "The Old Testament in the Light of Twentieth Century Archeological Research," and "Notes on Biblical Geography and Antiquities."

### Biology Department

A knowledge of the laws of life is necessary to an efficient personality. This department intends to acquaint the student with these laws through a study of living things. It is possible to take four years work in this department, which is more than enough for a major, and more than the requirement for entrance to medical schools. Although the bulk of the students in this department are taking pre-medical courses, the work is not planned primarily for them, but for the whole of the student body. The equipment of this department is excellent, so that it would be able to handle efficiently a large number of students. It is planned to incorporate into the department next year a course in Genetics, which will not be a laboratory course, and will be open to all upperclassmen.

The museum which is maintained largely by the Biology department, is likewise well equipped and is continually being added to, and hence be-

coming more and more interesting and valuable.

Dr. C. J. Elmore, who heads the Biology department has the degree of Ph. D., received from the University of Nebraska in 1915. From the same institution he has obtained also the degrees of A. B., in 1895, and A. M. He came to William Jewell in 1923, from Westminster College at Fulton, Missouri. Since coming here he has written extensively on biological subjects and has put out a manual of spring and summer flowering plants, which is used in the course in Botany.

Miss Eleanor Burton, who graduated from William Jewell in 1929 is assistant to Dr. Elmore. She has done graduate work on the degree of Master of Science at the University of Chicago during the past summer. She teaches the courses in bacteriology and advanced botany, as well as the girls division of freshman biology.

Courses are offered in Music Appreciation for which regular college credit is given, as well as for participation in Glee Club and band work. Private instruction in voice, piano, and violin is also provided by the department.

Professor David Grosch is head of the Music Department, having come to William Jewell in 1928. He has studied with several famous teachers, including Samuel DeLange of Stuttgart and Adolph Schulze of Berlin, John Petrie Dun of Edinburgh, and Herman Devries of Chicago.

Before coming to William Jewell, Professor Grosch has been instructor in the Bush Conservatory, the Chicago Musical College, and was dean of the Conservatory of Music at Baker University.

## Athletic Department

William Jewell College now has one of the most complete and most convenient gymnasiums in the State, if not in the Middle West. The gymnasium is designed to build up physical education, and that, in a few words, is the program of the physical education department. No one can doubt the importance of physical education and regular exercise to the student, not only during his student life but also in later life. Hence it is the plan of the physical education department to make every student so proficient at some game that he or she will want to continue that game all of his or her life. Thus it becomes the major task of this department to interest the students to go to the gymnasium and take advantage of this opportunity.

R. E. Bowles is Director of Athletics and head of the department of physical education. He was graduated from William Jewell in 1912 and immediately became coach here. He has the A. B. degree and has also done graduate work in the field of physical education at the University of Wisconsin. "Dad" is now teaching several courses in physical education as well as the course in Hygiene and Sanitation.

W. N. "Bill" Collins, who has the degree of B. S. from the University of Missouri, is coach of the varsity athletic teams. Coach Collins has also done graduate work in coaching at Illinois University and at Bemiji, Minnesota, during the summers. He came to William Jewell in 1927, having been coach at Liberty High School and Missouri Wesleyan College previously.

Miss Helen Ennis, assistant in physical education, has charge of the instruction in physical education for girls. Miss Ennis is very capable and efficient in gymnasium work, as the progress of her classes in this work proves. This is Miss Ennis' first year in William Jewell, both as a student and instructor.

Physical education is now a required course in the freshman and sophomore years, and three hours will be necessary for graduation.

### Debate

W. Prewitt Ewing entered William Jewell College in the fall of 1923 and was graduated in 1927. He was business manager of the William Jewell Student in 1925, and held the same position on the Tatler staff of 1926. He was for four years a member of the varsity debate squad, being the first debater in the history of William Jewell College to achieve this distinction. Upon being graduated from the college Mr. Ewing became a member of the faculty of William Chrisman High School, of Independence, Missouri, where he taught English and was coach of debate. In this position he coached the champion high school debate team of Missouri of 1929, the team later going to Little Rock, Arkansas, where it defeated the state champions of Arkansas, Tennessee, and Texas. This is his first year as instructor in English and coach of Debate at his Alma Mater.

### Dramatics

Miss Ethel Marie Henderson is head of the dramatics department, and also instructor in English. Miss Henderson was graduated from Wellesley College, Wellesley, Mass., in 1927 with the degree of A. B. While at Wellesley she was president of the dramatic club and produced and directed several plays. She was an honor student and a member of Phi Beta Kappa. Upon graduation she became assistant to Professor Harvey in William Jewell College and the next year was assistant to Dr. Fruit and gave very valuable aid to Professor Harvey in the preparation of the current edition of his Practice Handbook in English Composition.



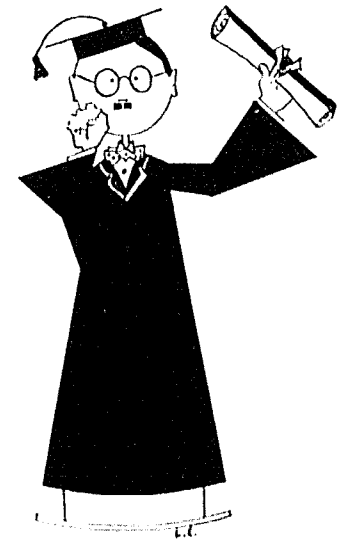

Jewell Wins National Championship

The William Jewell orator for 1929, Lex King Souter, became the national champion orator of the United States by winning first place in the Fifth National Intercollegiate Oratorical Contest on the Constitution, in the national finals, held in Bovard auditorium of the University of Southern California, Los Angeles, June 20. He was awarded a prize of \$1500.

Souter became Missouri state champion April 25, competing at the University of Missouri and winning the unanimous decision of five judges. He became the champion of the Midwestern Zone contest, May 18, competing against the state champions of eleven states and winning four first places out of five judges. In the national finals at Los Angeles he was given six first places out of seven judges.

There were five hundred forty two colleges and universities participating in the contest. Among them were Harvard, Yale, Brown, Dartmouth, Amherst, Northwestern, Columbia, Cornell, Colgate, Fordham, New York University, etc.

On September 24, 1929, Senator Harry B. Hawes made a short speech about Souter's achievement in the United States Senate and received unanimous consent to print the oration in the Congressional Record. Senator Hawes then had five thousand copies of his own speech and Souter's oration printed as a government document for free distribution through the mails.

Souter was coached in the local, state, zone, and national final contests by Professor P. Caspar Harvey, who accompanied him to the Los Angeles contest.

## National Oratorical Headquarters

On the

### William Jewell Campus

After five years management from Washington, D. C., the national headquarters of the National Intercollegiate Oratorical Contest on the Constitution was transferred to the campus of William Jewell College and Prof. P. Caspar Harvey appointed the national director of the contest by the Better America Federation of California which inaugurated and conducted this competition.

The appointment was made January 7, 1930. Professor Harvey immediately began to organize the 1930 contest and to promote the interest in this year's elimination contests. Lieutenant Colonel Leroy F. Smith of the Los Angeles office spent the entire day on the William Jewell campus, January 28, going over the plans with Professor Harvey.

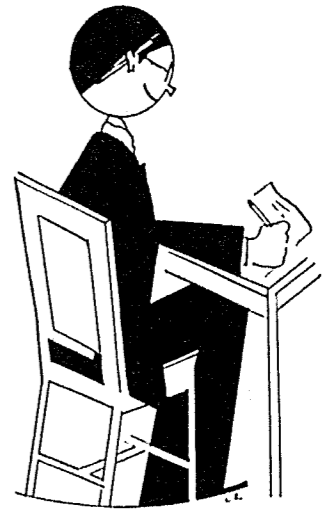
Professor Harvey made many changes in the rules and regulations of the 1930 competition. He abolished the ten-minute time limit for a word limit of fifteen hundred words. He changed all the subjects heretofore used and listed fourteen new ones. He reallocated the \$5000 in prizes so that the lowest national finalist prize will be \$400 this year, but the first prize remains at \$1500. Professor Harvey will appoint the state managers and choose the places to hold the state contests. Later he will select the seven zone directors.

Professor Harvey's office became the scene of much activity and thousands of letters were mailed from the campus. He is being assisted in conducting the contest by Elsie Englund, William Owsley, Charles Hoffmann, Virginia Dee Sharp, Marian Shaver, Thelma Moore, Inez Lewis, and Blanche V. Tarrants.

The card index of the colleges and universities lists nine hundred and two schools as eligible to compete in the 1930 contest. Northwestern University was the first school to enter the contest this year.

In the five previous contests the schools to win the national championships have been: Northwestern University, Fordham University, North Carolina State College, University of Oklahoma, and William Jewell College.

The William Jewell Student is the only official student publication that is recognized on the Hill. There are thirty-two issues of the paper during the school year, one each Wednesday with the exception of the examination weeks. The Student is a four page, five column paper.

News of the college, society notes, campus opinions, humorous and feature articles make up the body of the paper. The news gathered reflects the active life of the college in all of its phases, likewise presenting directions to the thought of the general student body in respect to college life, its aims, problems, and manners. This news is carried on by the staff, chosen by the editor at the beginning of the year and also aided by those enrolled in English 18, who are given special assignments. The editors of the Student are elected by the student body semi-annually. In this way they serve as associate editor for half a year before assuming the full responsibility of the editorship. The business manager is elected by the student body at the close of each year and serves for the entire year. An extensive exchange service is maintained with high school and college papers.

Financing of the Student is carried on in three different ways. An appropriation is given by the Board of Trustees amounting to two hundred dollars, two dollars is taken from the student activity fee of each student, and third, an income is afforded in advertising space sold. Financial reward to the staff is afforded only in proportion to the surplus their efforts make possible.

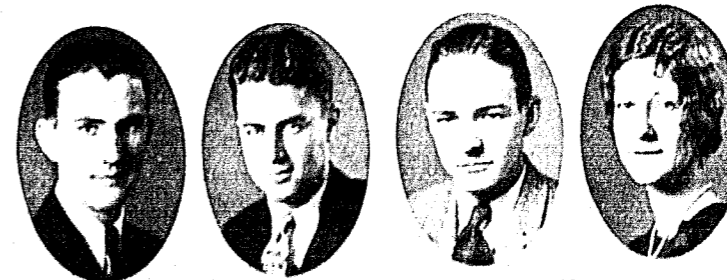

The business staff had charge of all monetary matters connected with the publishing of the book and the budget.

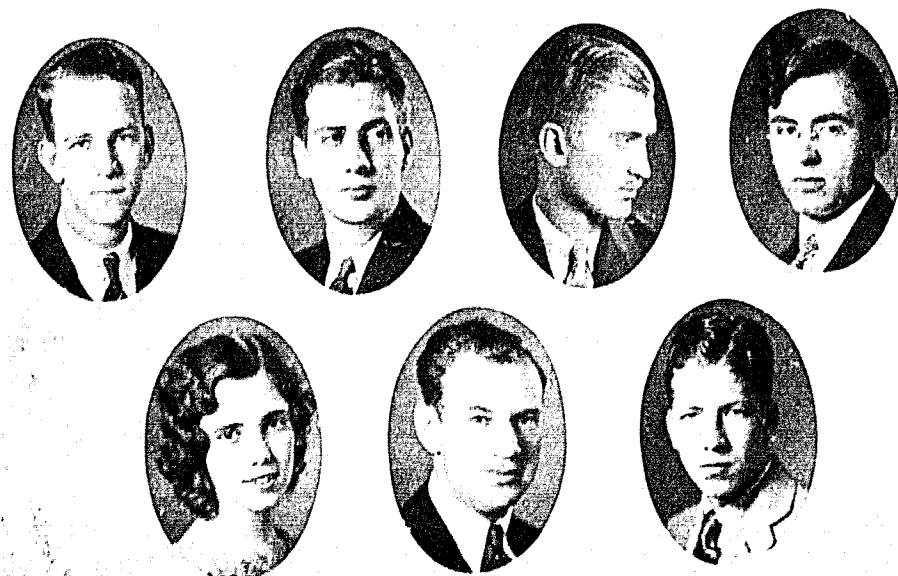

Inaugurating a new policy, a tournament was held this year to determine the champions. Jewell with her fine new gym secured the event.

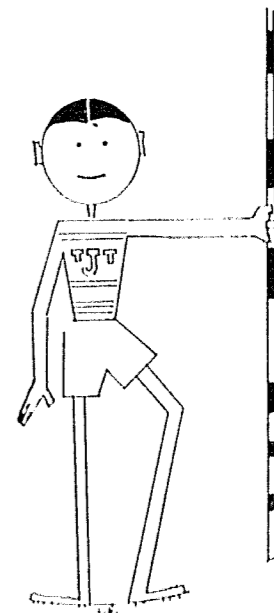

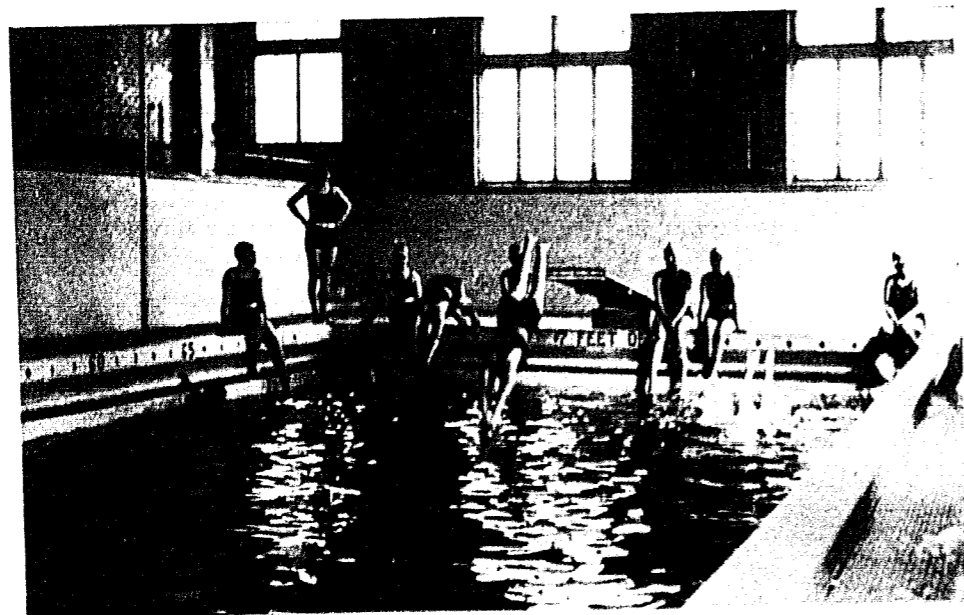
A new department of physical education was inaugurated at William Jewell College this year. The department is called physical education for women, and is now required for all women students during their freshman and sophomore years.

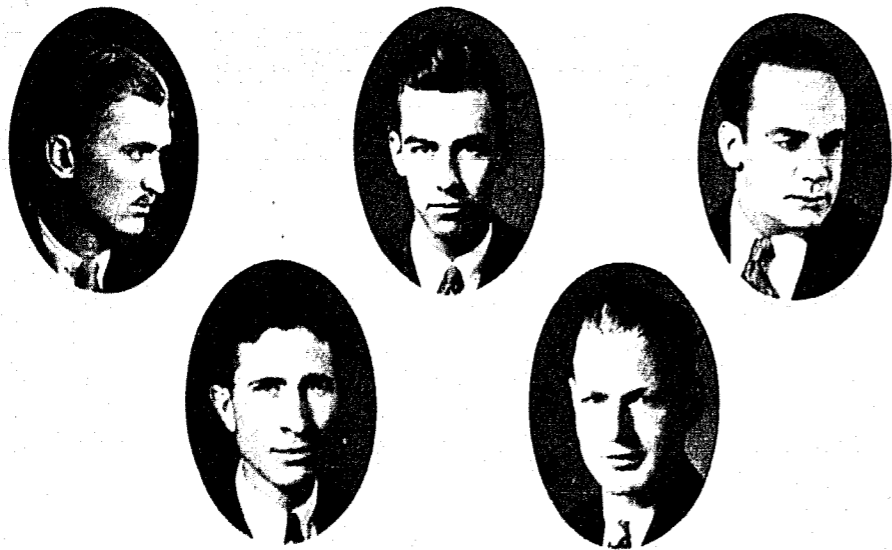
## Aeons

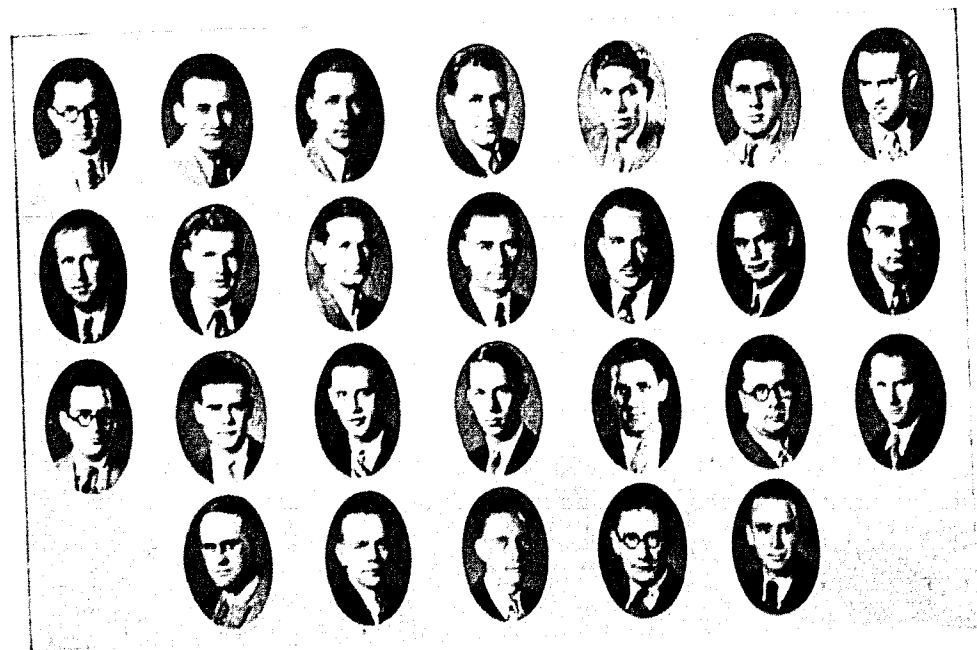

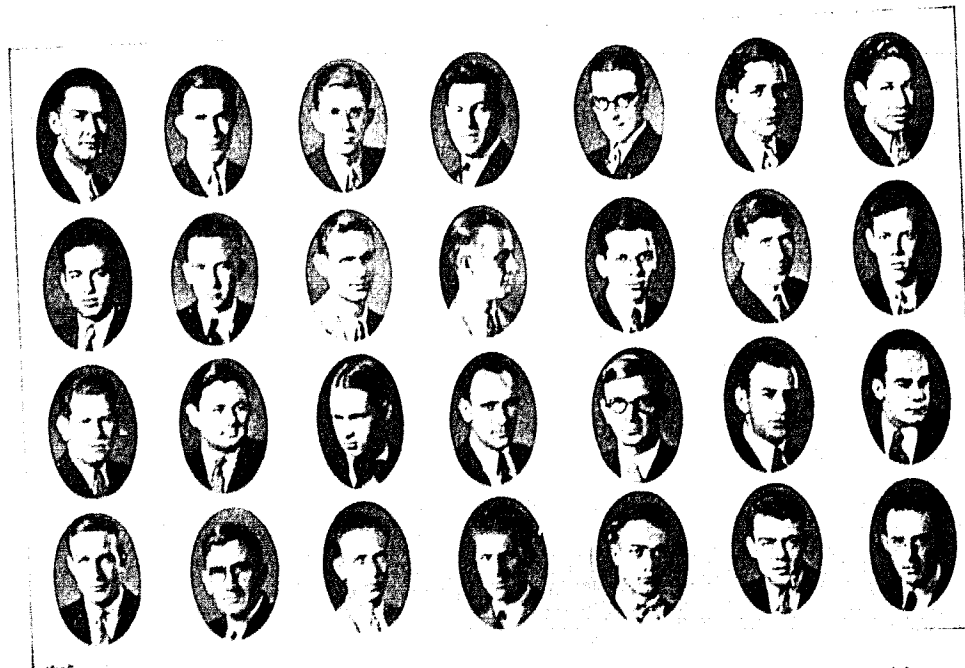

### Student Volunteer Band

The Student Volunteer Movement for Foreign Missions whose motto is "THE EVANGELIZATION OF THE WORLD IN THIS GENERATION" originated from an international conference of Christian college students held at Mount Hermon, Mass., in 1886 at the invitation of the late D. L. Moody. Of the 250 delegates, 100 signed this declaration: "It is my purpose, if God permit, to become a Christian Missionary abroad." In 1888 in a student conference at Northfield, an organization was deemed necessary, and a committee previously selected effected the organization in December 1888. The purpose is to create missionary interest among Christian students, to qualify them for Christian work, and to lay responsibility on the Christians of the home land.

For about 20 years the Student Volunteer Band of W. J. C. has been active. Some of the missionaries who have gone out under its influence are: Frank Connelly, pres. of the group in '12 and '13, now in China; Tota Fujii, '15 now in his native country, Japan; and David P. Appleby, president of the group '20-'21 and '21-'22, who died in Brazil in the spring of 1925 and whose picture now hangs in Philomathic Hall. The present signed members are Howard Brumley, Muriel Holtz, Laneita Long, and Wm. B. Roark, though membership is open to all seriously considering definite Christian work.






A prominent feature of the haberdashery of the well-dressed man will be, from all present indications, a pair of eyes delicately tinged with varying shades of red.
