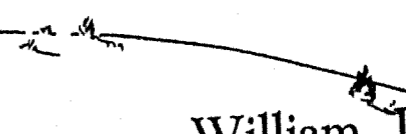

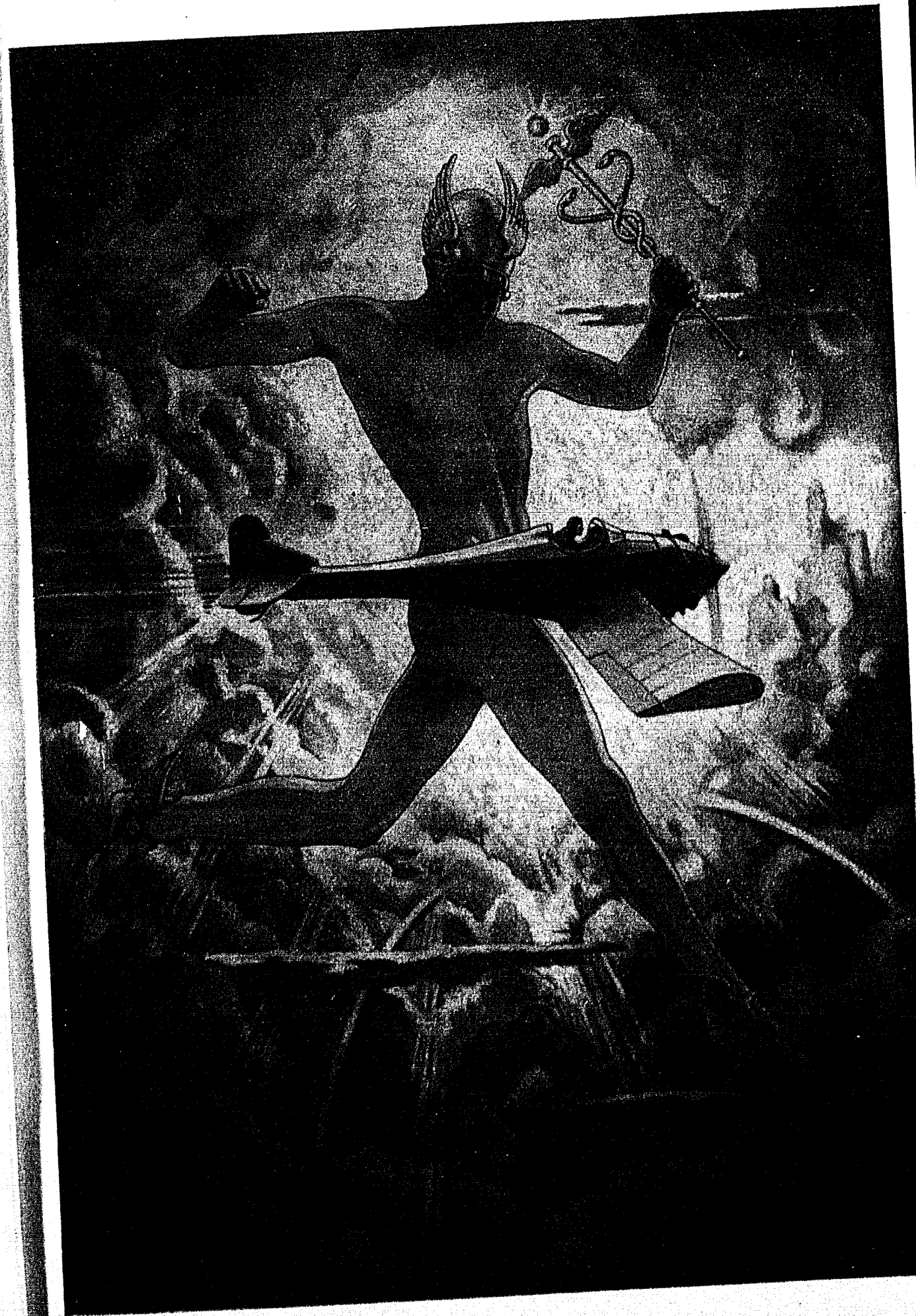
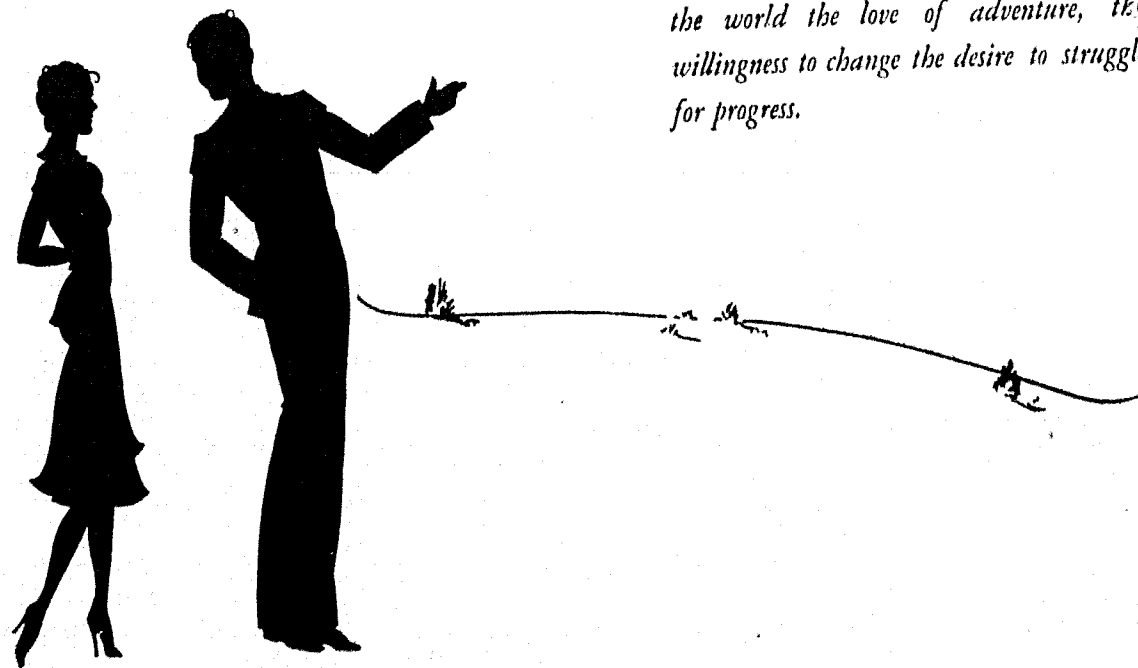
## TO THE STUDENT AND READERS

## Student Senate

The Student Senate is composed of seven members, including the president of the student body. There are two representatives each from the Senior and Junior classes, and one each from the Sophomore and Freshman classes. They are elected at the annual spring election.

The purpose of the Student Senate is, primarily, to direct student elections, but it also acts as a "go-between" in student activities that are brought before the faculty and it takes care of all matters brought before the student body. This year, among other things, the Student Senate took charge of the proposition submitted by the Press for the management of the Student and presented it before the student body. They tried to encourage some student to take over the management of the Student, but without success.

Last year the Student Senate changed their plan of electing their president and had the student body vote on the two candidates submitted by the senate. At the spring election of last year a still better plan was installed, whereby the student body elected a man to be President of the Student body and also to act as president of the senate. At this election Scott Conway was elected for the school year 1931-32 to have the honor of being the first president of the student body to be elected by popular vote.

### Debate

Ladies and gentlemen (for that is the way all good debate speeches begin): The subject for discussion this year was the Pi Kappa Delta question, "Resolved, that Congress should enact legislation providing for the centralized control of industry." Now to those who like tales of adventure, the unfolding of the story of the debate season will present a narrative of interest, both intellectual and physical.

The first contest came November 17, when Laurence Cleland and Arthur Roy Kincaid represented William Jewell College against Messrs. John A. Boyd-Carpenter and John Foot of Oxford University, England. The British vice-consul from Kansas City (Reginald Davidson) arrived early to do the honors of the occasion; Professors Harvey and Ewing waited nervously (and uncomfortably) in evening clothes. Gano Chapel was packed with an interested, expectant crowd—and the train was late. The hosts were perturbed, but the audience was good-natured, and at last the strangers arrived and the discussion proceeded. The proposition that night was "Resolved, that American civilization is a greater danger to the world than that of Russia." With their keen wit and fascinating diction the Englishmen would charm the audience into believing that America and the world are doomed, while the Jewellites, by more or less lucid, straightforward argumentation would rewin their hearers to faith in America's grandeur and supremacy.

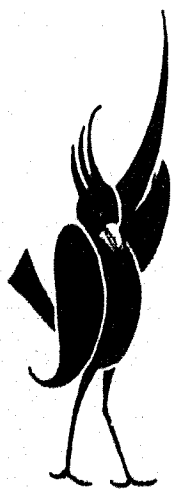
After Christmas a squad of twelve men and eight women began to struggle faithfully to obtain a knowledge of industrial conditions today, and some comprehension of modern economics, in order to discuss intelligently the broad and deep Pi Kappa Delta subject of government control of industry. The library tables groaned under the weight of many reference books and bound volumes, and one can well say that those of the girl's squad living in Melrose Hall literally burned the midnight oil (for the electric lights are turned off there at 11:00 p. m.).

In the course of the year various members of the squad met representatives from colleges in twelve states, the most distant ones being California, Washington State, and Mississippi. Of the season's thirty-six debates, the last ten were held at the national Pi Kappa Delta Tournament at Tulsa, Oklahoma, from March 28 to April 1. The one unfortunate thing about this tournament was that the whole squad could not attend it. All, however, did their share in contributing a good quantity of facts and ideas for the use of the boys who went. Arthur Roy Kincaid and Millard Berquist, both seniors, were chosen to represent the college, in recognition of the outstanding debate and scholastic work they have done. Kincaid has debated for William Jewell four years; he was captain of the men's squad this season, and he possesses a diamond key of Pi Kappa Delta, which is indicative of his high standing in forensics. Berquist is an outstanding student of economics and sociology and although this was his first year in debate, he is an experienced and polished speaker.

Mr. Ewing, debate coach, was chairman of the men's debate at the tournament. Of the 102 entries, 98 men's teams actually competed, and he arranged the schedule of these teams. He watched Berquist and Kincaid go on round after round, calmly sweeping aside all their opponents (and we know how nonchalant they both can be). In the eleventh and final round, before a critical audience of nearly a thousand persons, the boys met the debaters from the University of Redlands, at Redlands, California. This, like Jewell, is a Baptist school, and its team was coached by one of the founders of Pi Kappa Delta, so we can proudly say that this team won the national championship. The debate, broadcast over station KVOO, Tulsa, was interesting and hard-fought on every point. The decision placing Jewell second thus gave the college a silver loving-cup, the two debaters gold medals, Mr. Berquist, a diamond key of Pi Kappa Delta, and Mr. Ewing and all the Jewellites a tremendous amount of pride and happiness.

By carrying William Jewell higher in national debate tournament than it has ever gone before, Berquist and Kincaid closed successfully their own college debating careers and this year's debating activities.

Ditzen wins! This message from Professor Ewing at midnight, April 29, from Evanston, Illinois, heralded the fact that a William Jewell orator had won the coveted first place in the final contest of the Interstate Oratorical Contest of thirteen states. This is the first time William Jewell has won first place in the Interstate Contest, although H. T. Beaver won second in 1913. The theme of Ditzen's oration, "Sweetmeats on Gilded Trays," was government corruption and the apathy of American citizens. William Jewell has represented Missouri in this Interstate Contest eleven times. In the forty-six years of the Missouri Association, William Jewell has entered thirty-two times. The 1932 Interstate Contest took place at Northwestern University. The states comprising the association are: Ohio, Indiana, Illinois, Kentucky, Minnesota, Missouri, Nebraska, South Dakota, North Dakota, Pennsylvania, Michigan, Wisconsin, and West Virginia.

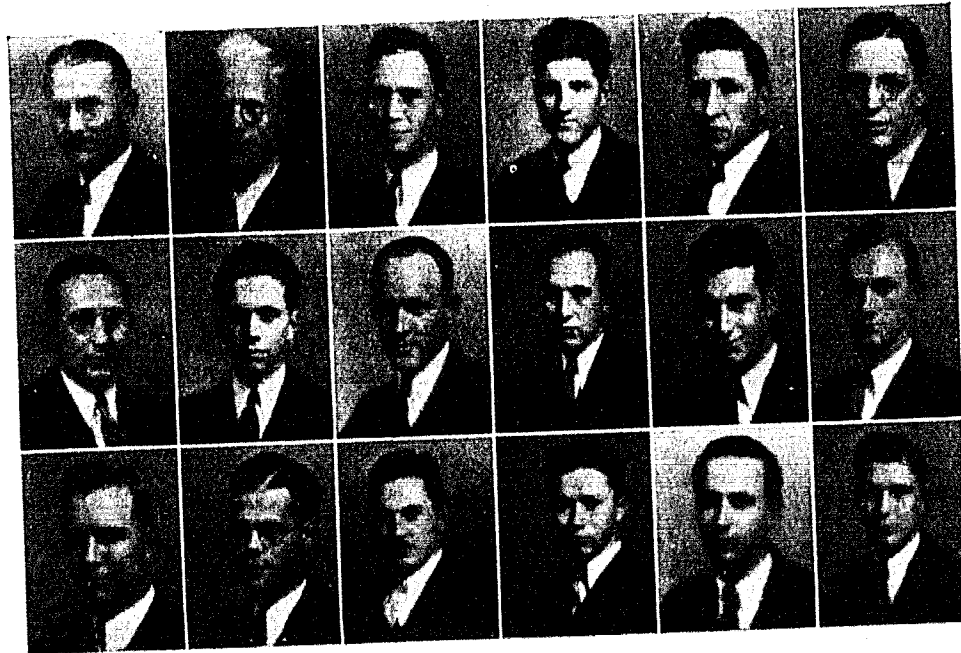

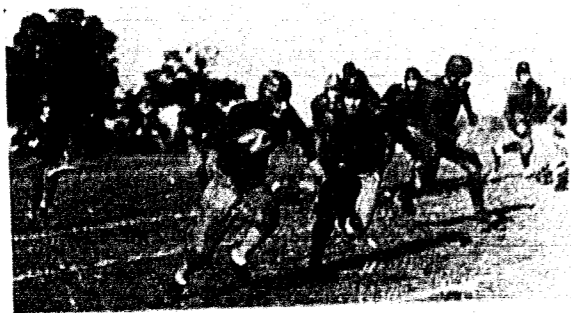

## 1931 Season

The 1931 track season was a successful one for Jewell. We had a dual meet with Missouri Valley which we won and one with Central which we lost. We were in a triangle meet with Missouri Valley and Tarkio, winning second place. Also we entered a team in the state meet and one in the Kansas Relays.

The team was composed of Captain Clyde Demmel, who went through a splendid season and to whom Jewell owes its highest regard, Grant, Baber, Pratt, Duncan, Crose, Hutchison, Ramirez, and Lee. The mile relay team was composed of Demmel, Baber, Pratt, and Duncan. This team came within 1.2 seconds of breaking the state record for this distance. Hutchison won the two mile run in both dual meets but was beaten in the state meet. Grant and Demmel were both four threat men, the former participating in the pole-vault, low and high hurdles, and the broad jump; the latter participated in the 100 yard dash, the 220 yard dash, the 440 yard run, and the relays. Crose participated in the pole-vault and weights events. Ramirez was a good man for both the one and two mile runs. Lee heaved the shot-put and threw the discus. Duncan ran in the 440 and in the relays. Pratt ran in the half mile run and in the relays. Baber was the season's five-threat man, being entered in the 100 and 220 yard dashes, the 440 yard run, the relays, and the hurdling events.

Our relay team won over both Rolla and Westminster, both of these schools having crack relay teams. To sum up our track season in a few words, we are all proud of our team and feel certain that they gave all they could to make Jewell proud of them and to carry the Cardinal across the finish line in first place.

Demmel is entered in the 100 yard dash and the 440 yard run. Baber also runs the 100 yard dash.

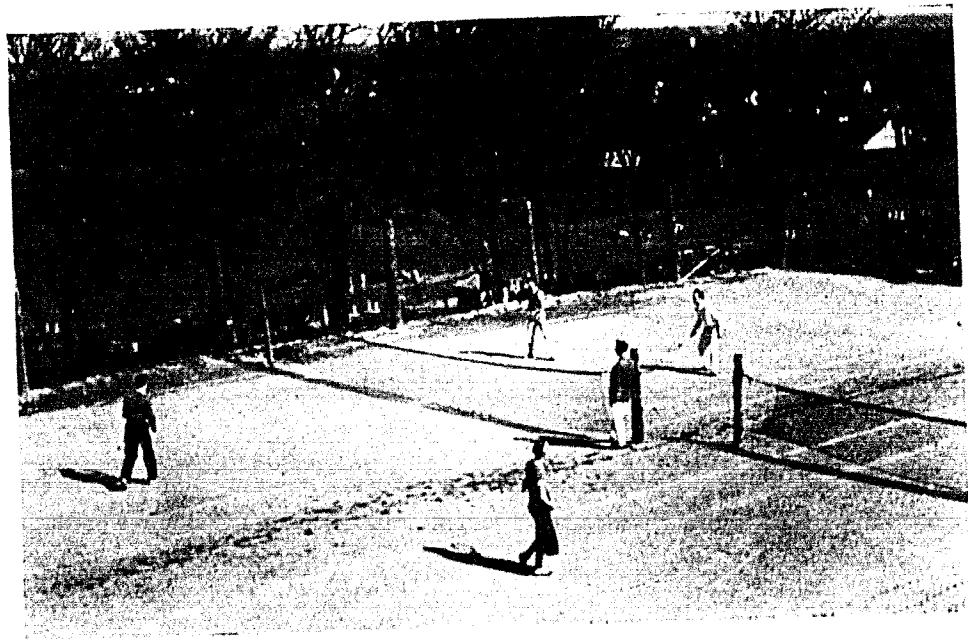

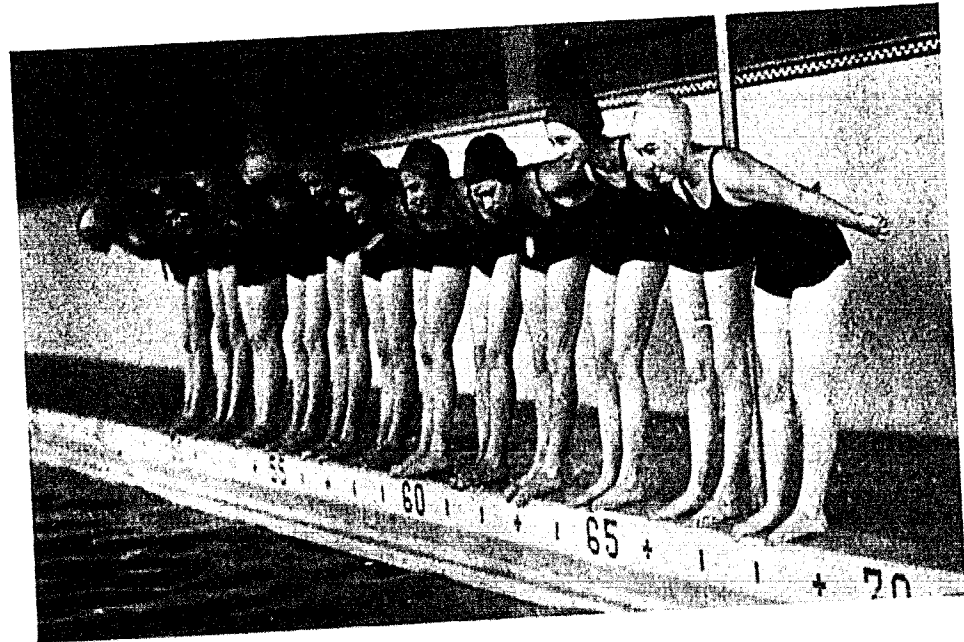

The 1931 tennis team was composed of Chapman, Albright, Kincaid, Blythe, Bronson, and Frace.

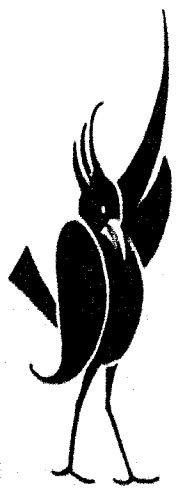
