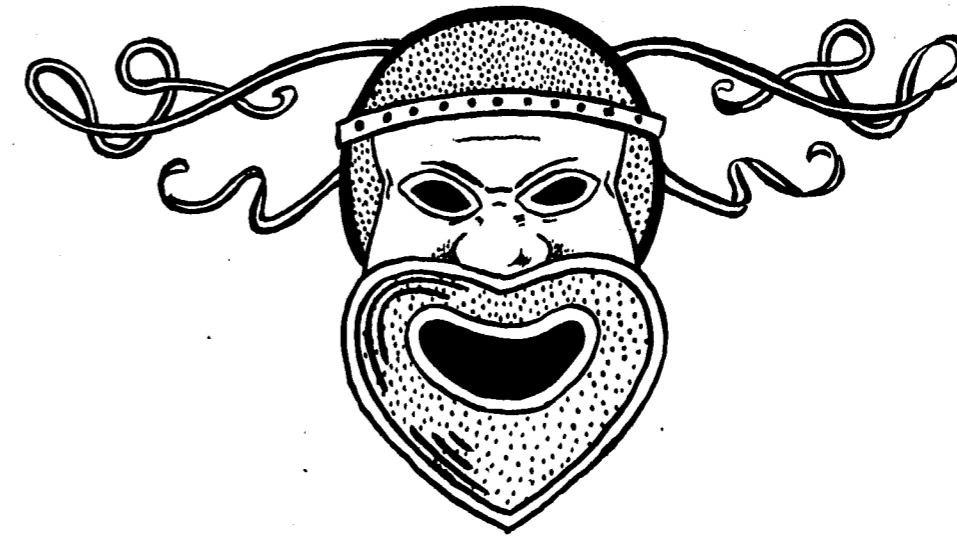
¶ And as to basket ball; well, of course, we won—and the score was 27 to "23"—for what Freshmen class ever had its full team on the first squad before?

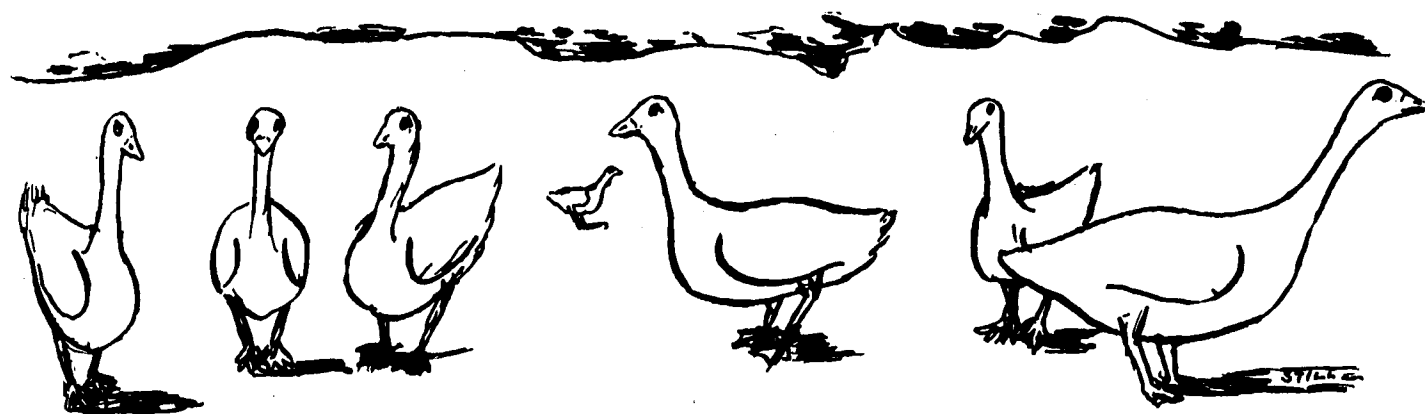

Did fall upon their little knees and cuss.

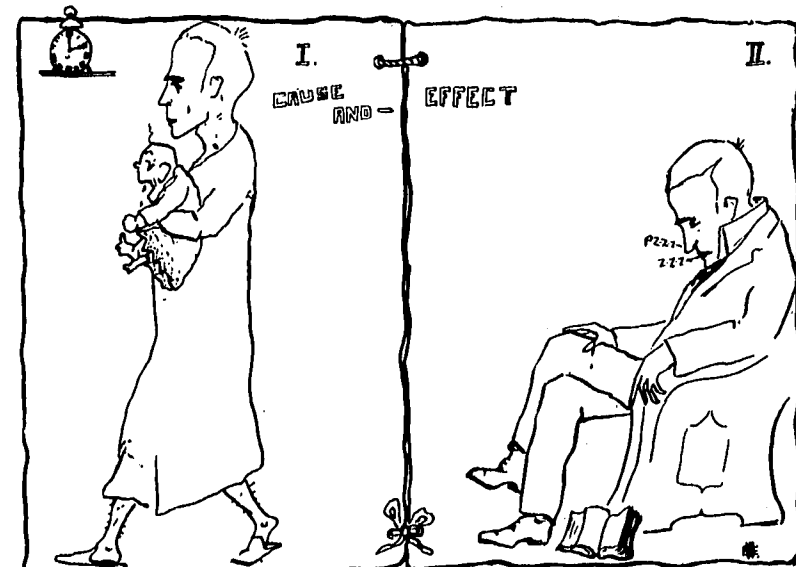
Here flew in through the window a Peterodactylus,
