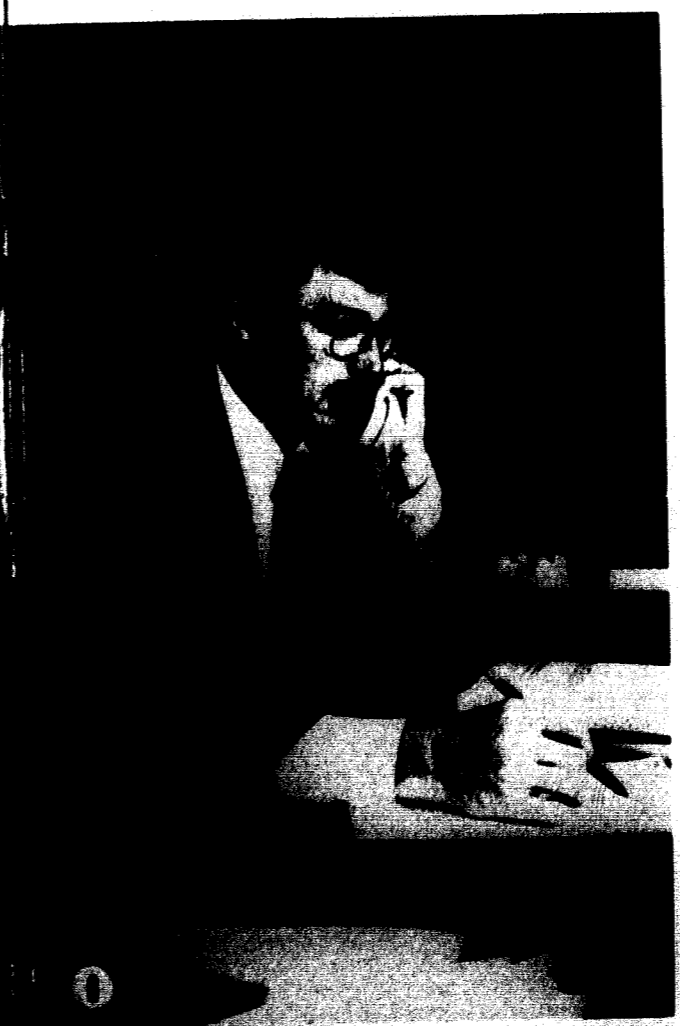
A new part of the Decade of Excellence program began this year with the kickoff of a five-year \$10 million campaign. The first phase of the program is the construction of a \$3.6 million dollar physical education building, hopefully to be completed by late 1979. The second phase involves the \$1.75 million conversion of Brown gymnasium into the art, theater, psychology, and mathematics departments. Phase three of the campaign will involve the renovation of Marston Hall at \$1.65 million. The remainder of the \$10 million will serve as operational funds for the college.

Earnest T. Lindsay, trustee for the college and president of the regional farm cooperative for Farmland Industries was appointed as general campaign chairman.

Due to his increasing necessity to be away from the college to solicit financial support for this campaign, President Field made several changes in the administration of the college. Dr. Bruce R. Thomson, formerly the vice-president for administration will take the position of executive vice-president, where he will direct all business and financial affairs of the college. Dr. Daniel M. Lambert was promoted to the position of assistant to the president, while Ms. Johnnie Human, formerly dean of women, will replace him as dean of student affairs. Lastly, Gary Phelps was promoted to senior associate dean of students.

# Business Administration & Economics

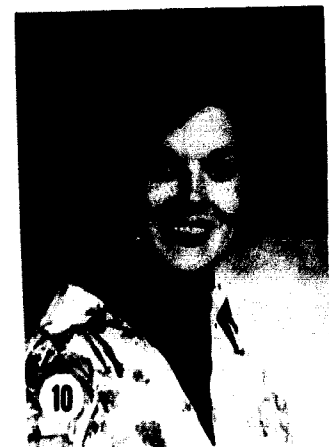

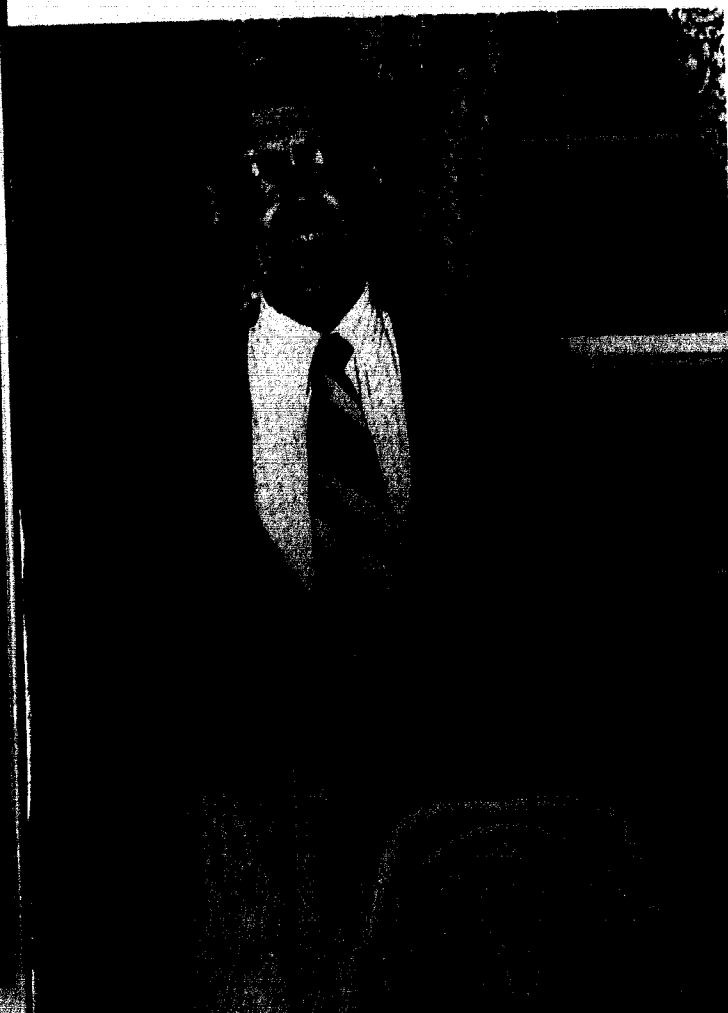
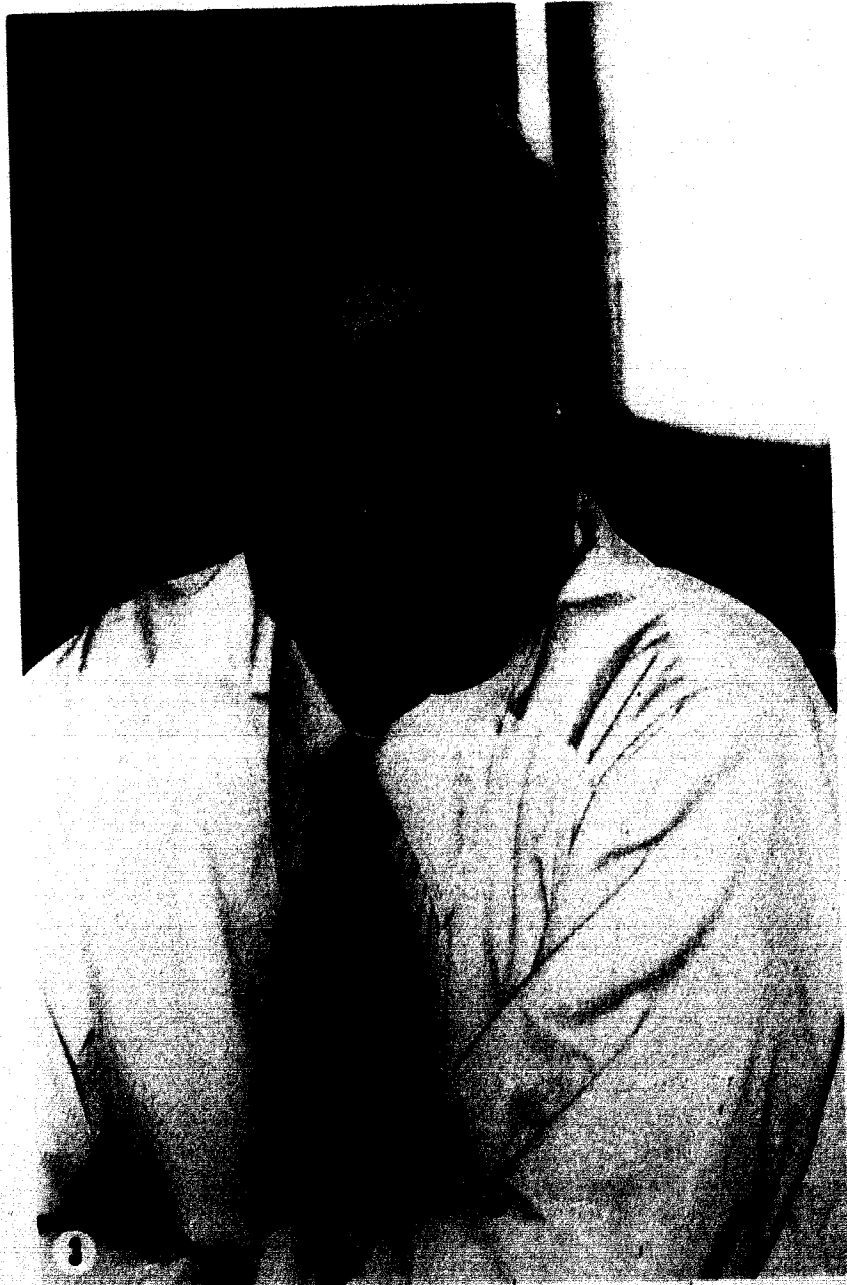
The history department surveys political, social, economic, and religious history of man from his beginning to the present.

# Math

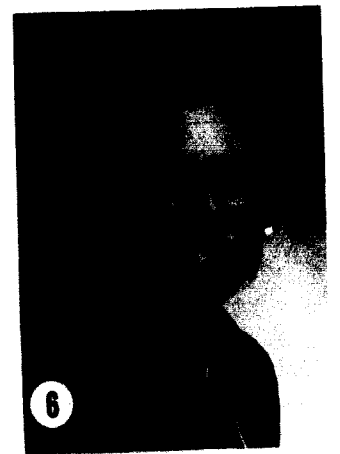

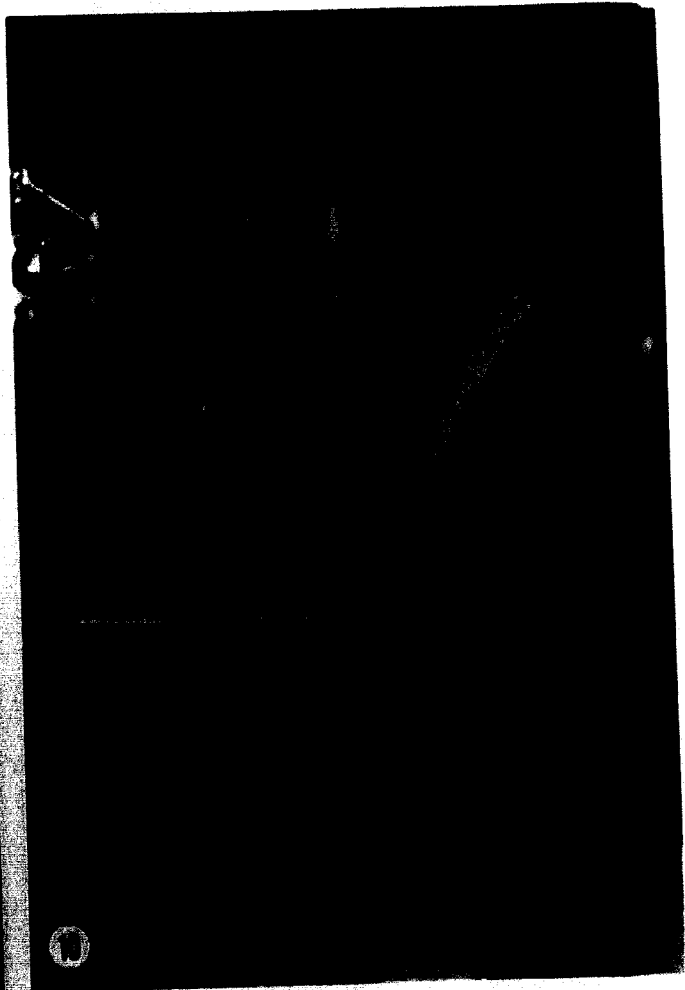
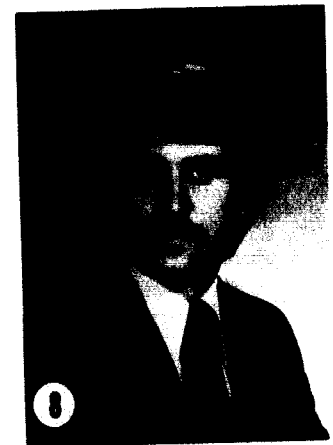
# Music

The music department not only serves the students; it serves many churches in the area as well as the community.

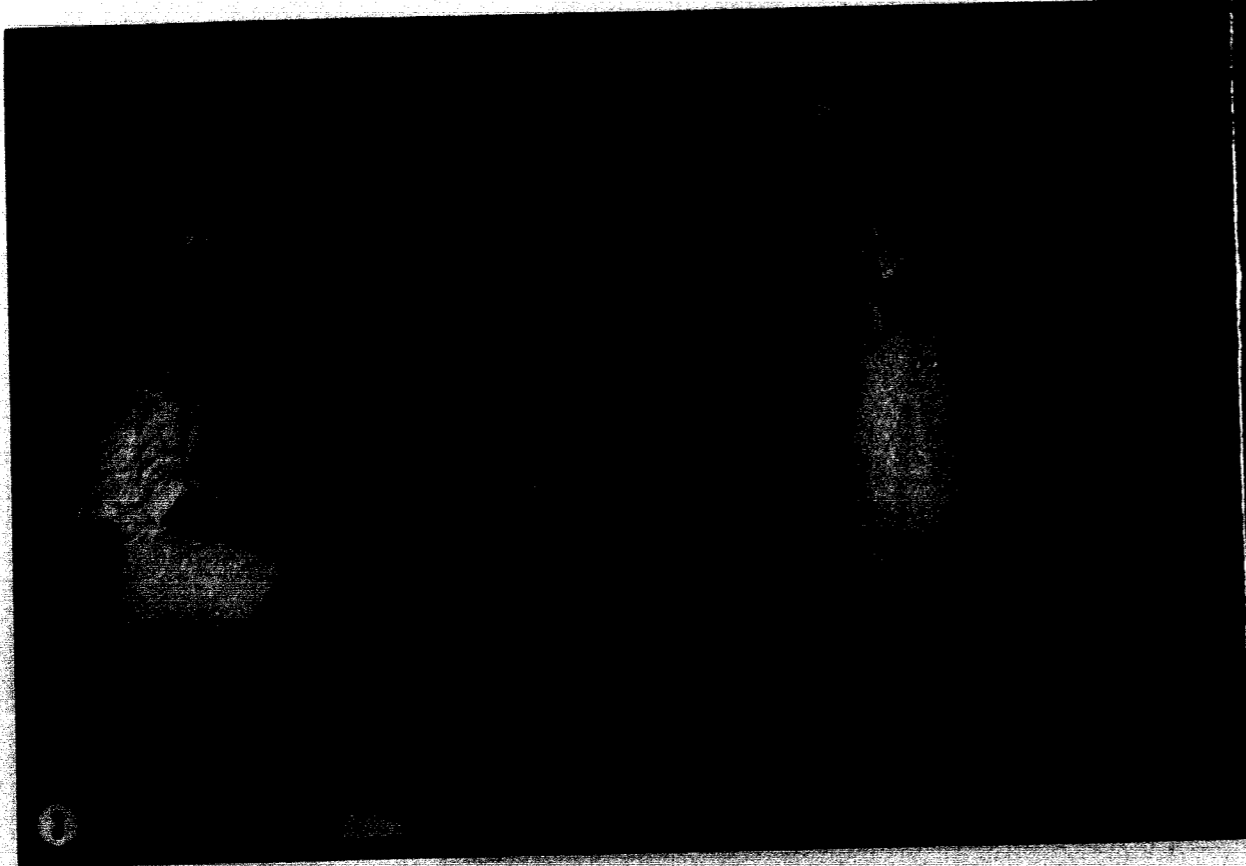
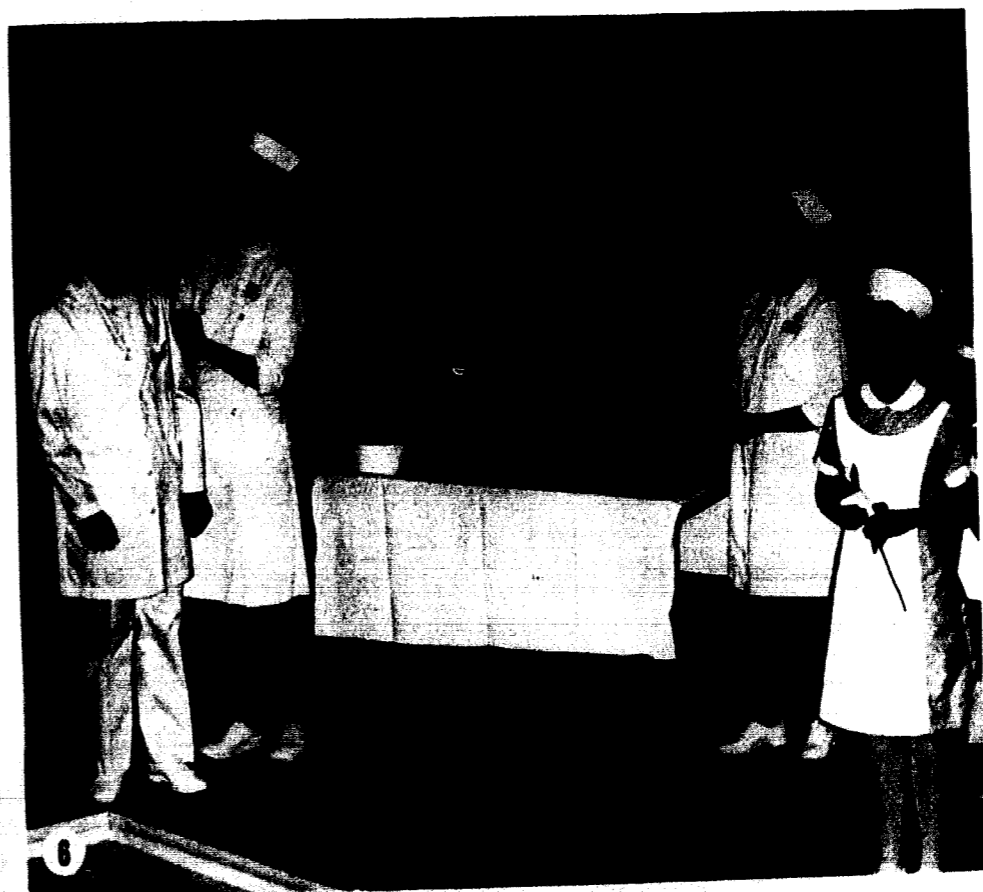
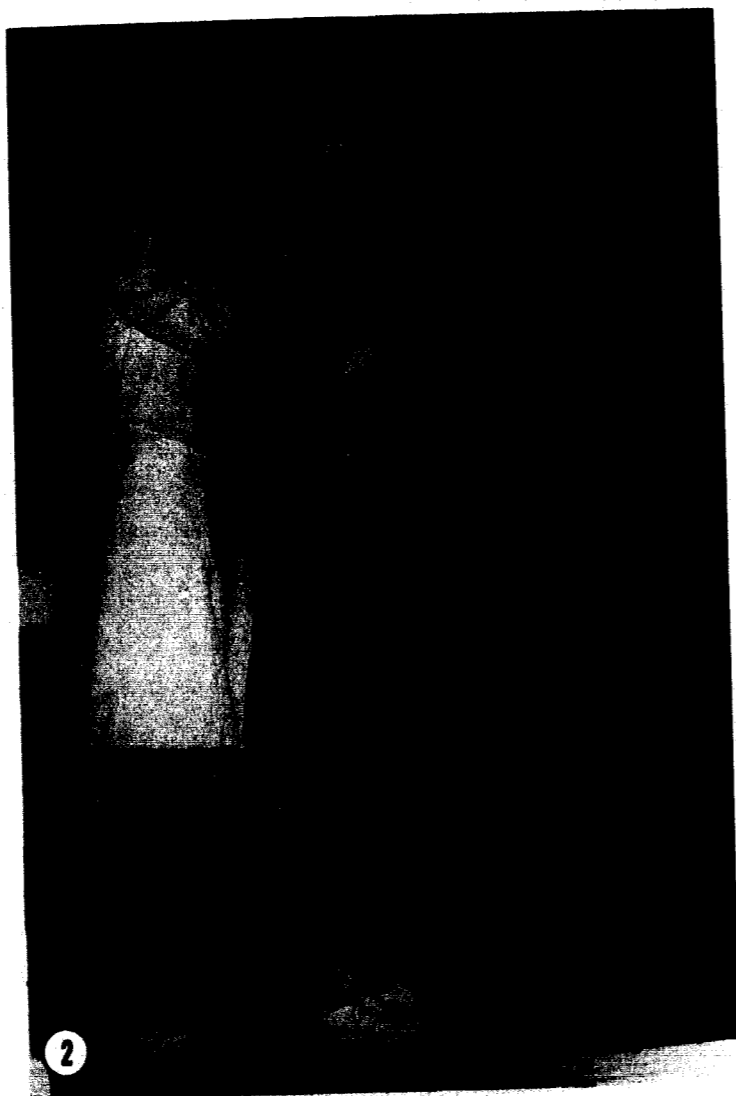
Boasting over thirty percent of the student enrollment, the department maintains the largest chapter in the Southern Baptist Music Conference.

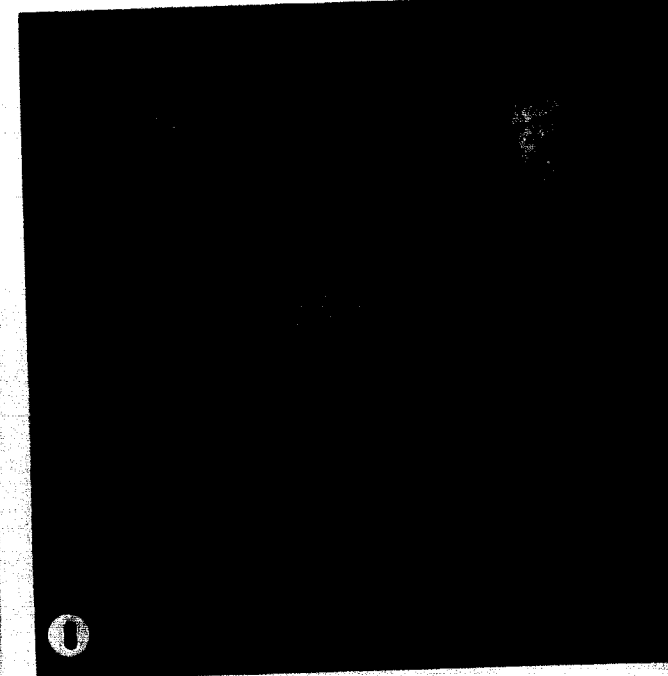
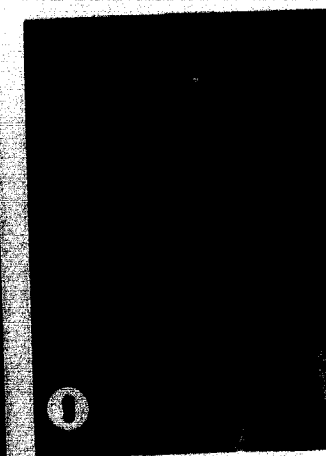
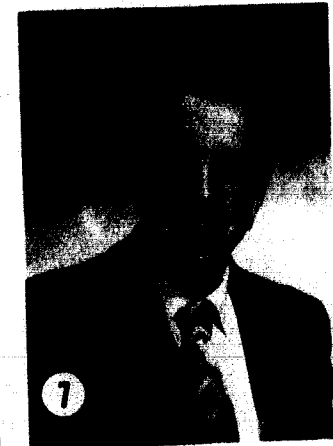


# Physics

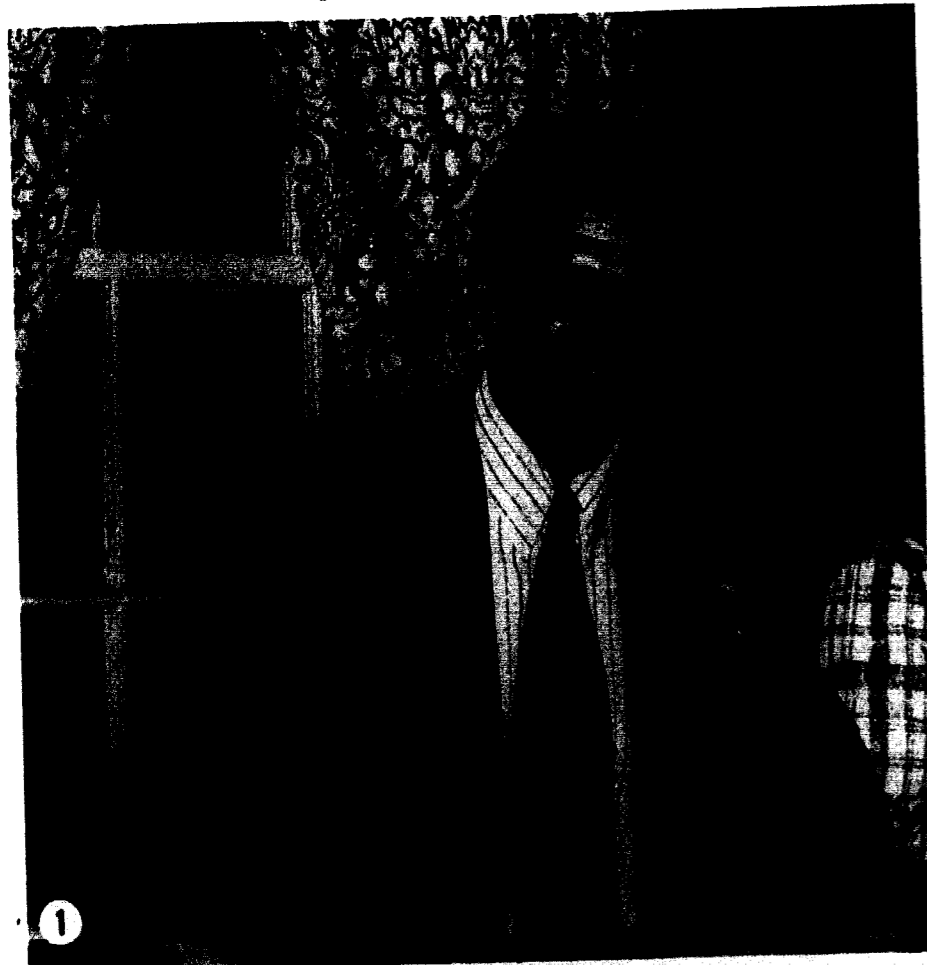
The highlight of the physics department occurred when department chairman, Dr. Wallace A. Hilton, received the highest honor that can be given a professor of physics, the Oersted Medal.

The American Association of Physics Teachers (AAPT) first awarded the Oersted Medal to give similar recognition to physics teachers as the Nobel Prize does to researchers of physics.

Dr. Hilton has published over 150 articles, reports, and manuals and has served the community in many ways in both physics and science. He has been a Science Fair judge for over 20 years, on the National Council of Sigma Pi Sigma for more than 12 years, on the AAPT council, and served as president of the Missouri Academy of Science. In 1929 he received the first Missouri Science Teacher's Award.

The psychology department aims to aid students in their everyday relationships with people through the study of man's behavior patterns. These studies provide majors with the background for graduate studies and careers.

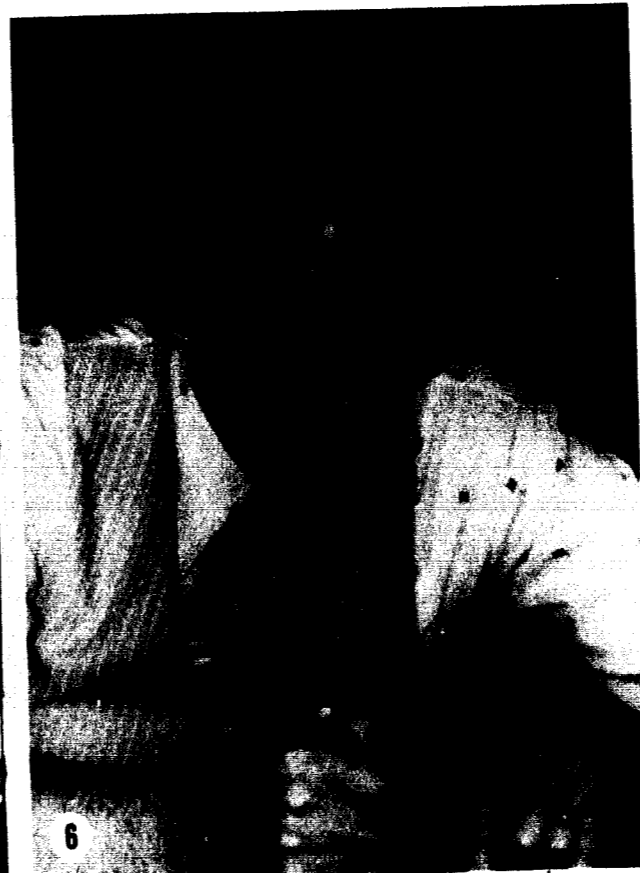
# Religion

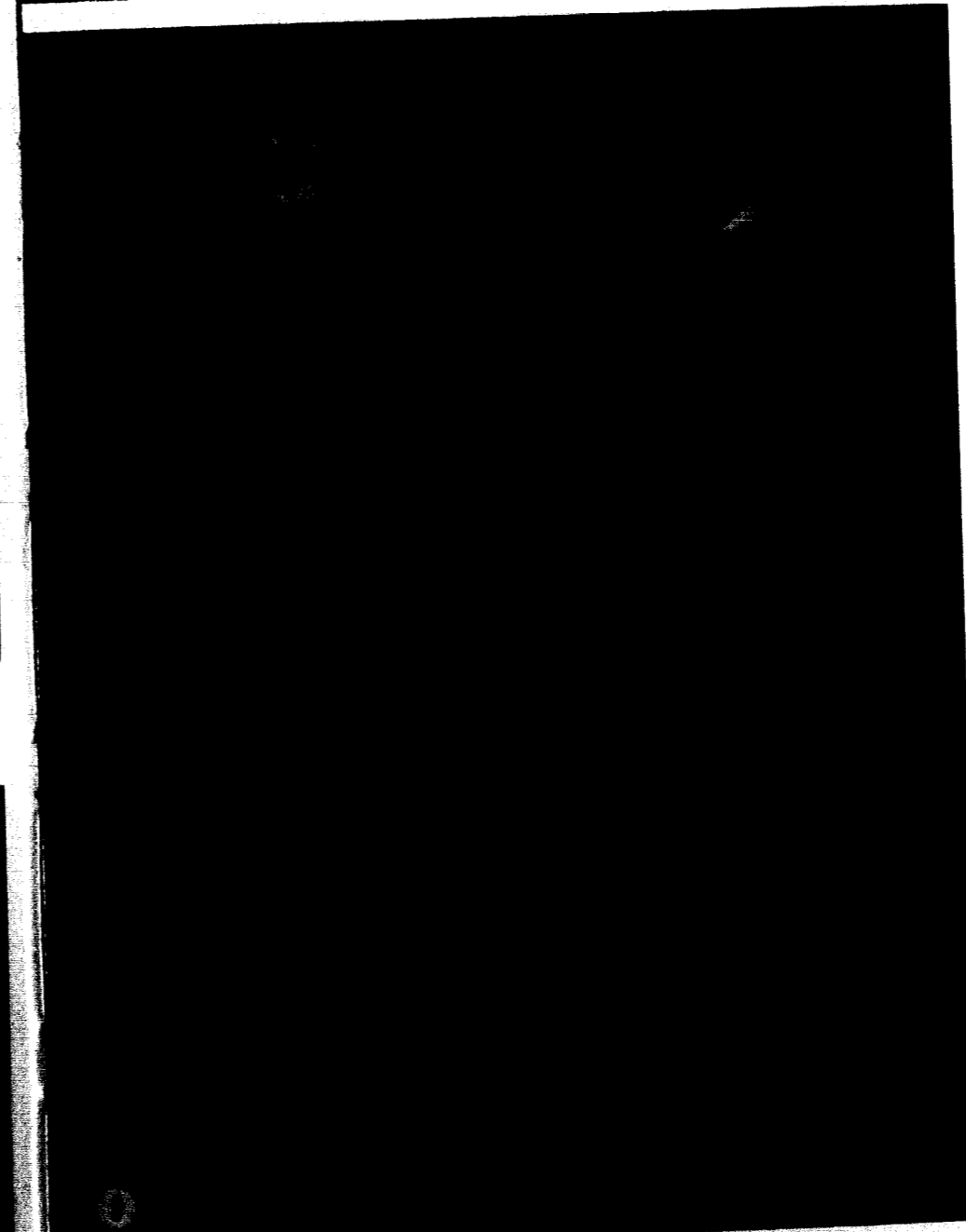
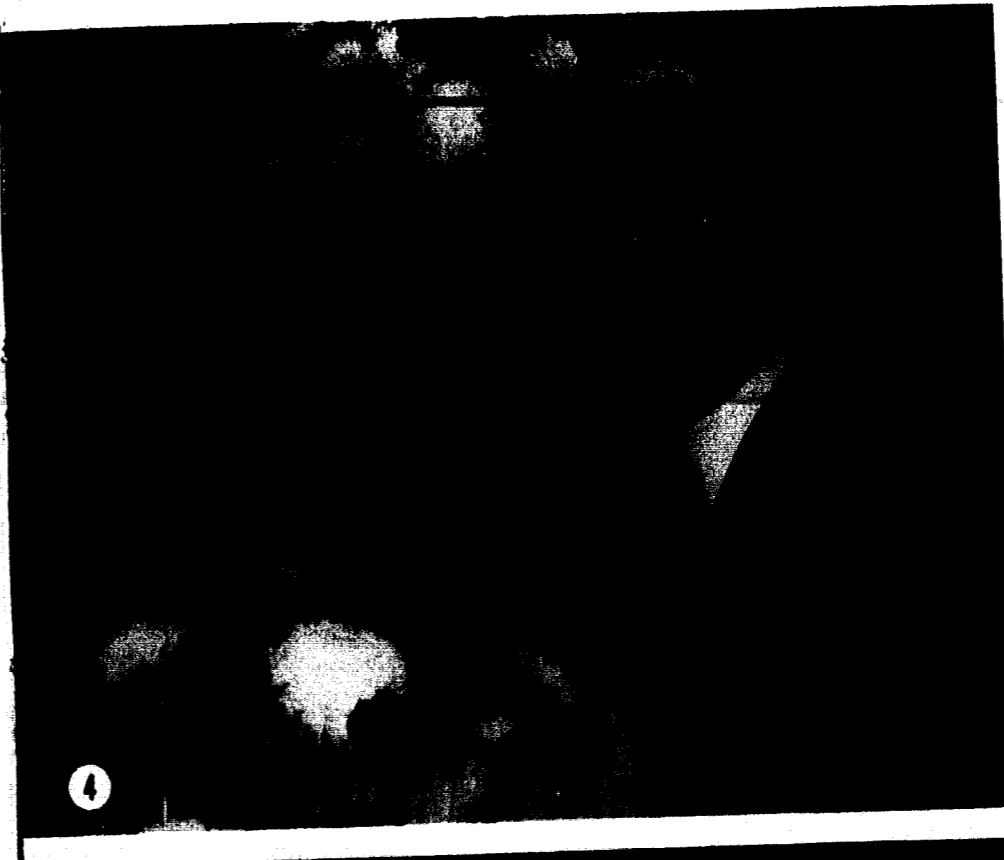
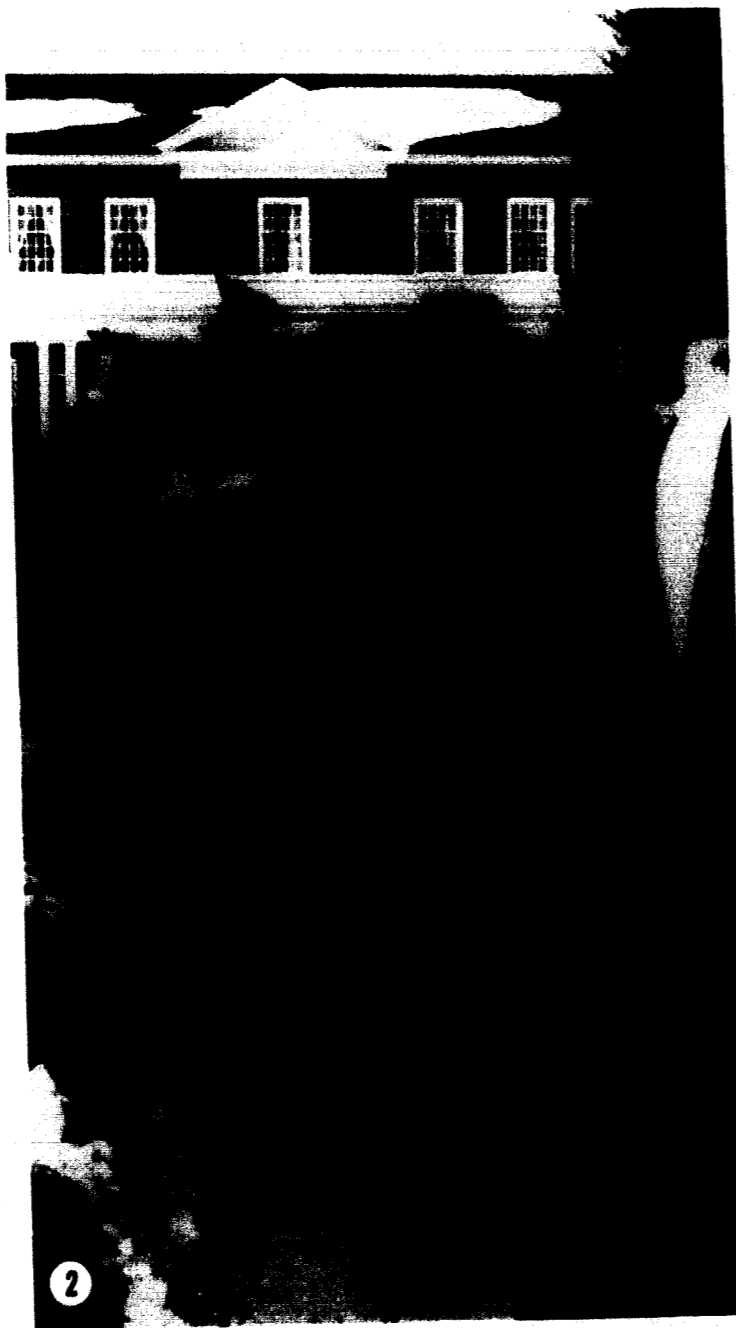
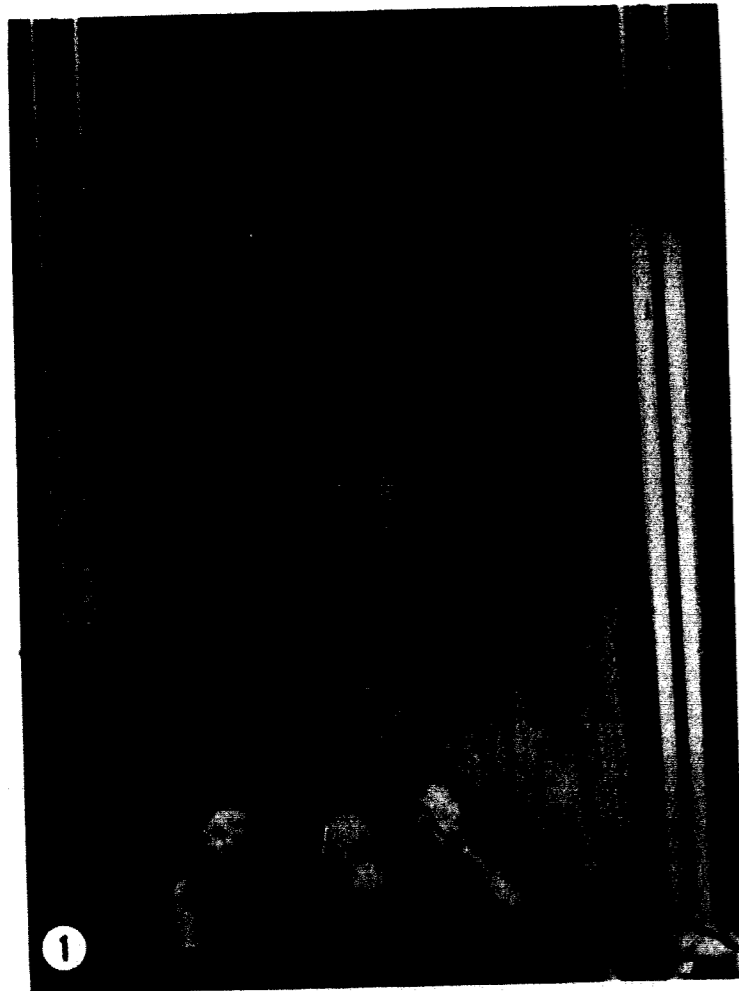


## Lectureship

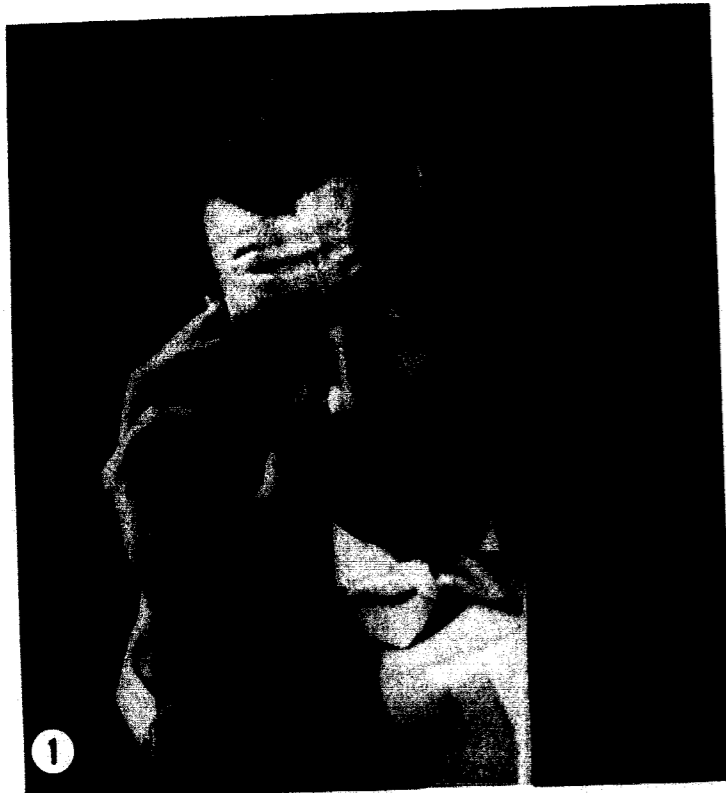


## Reynolds Speaks at Achievement Day

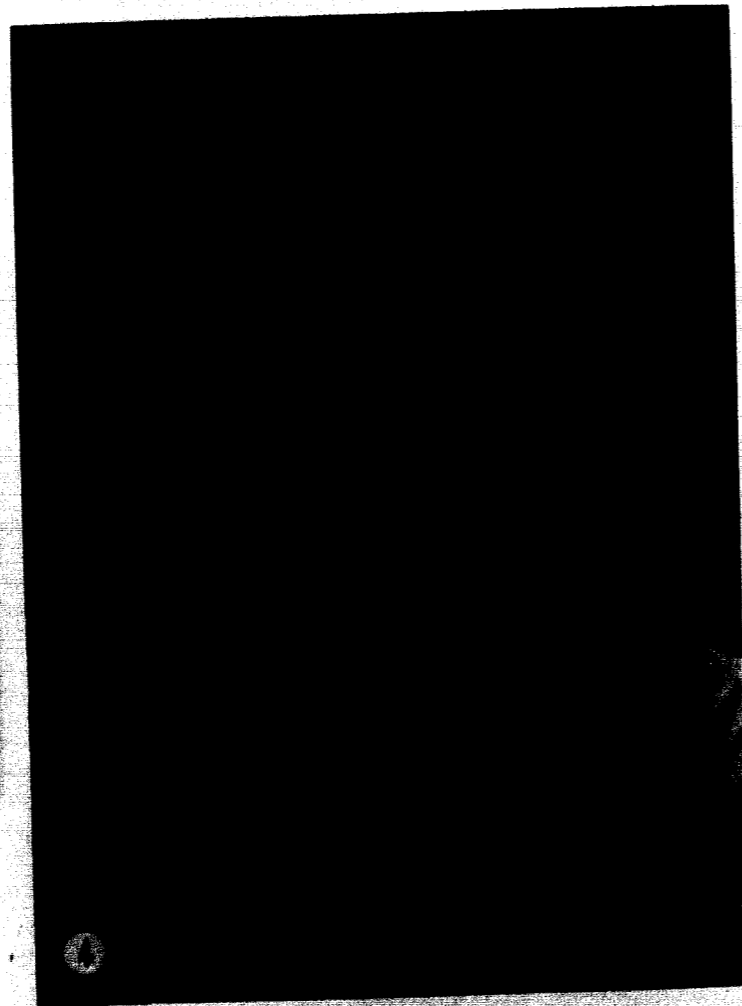
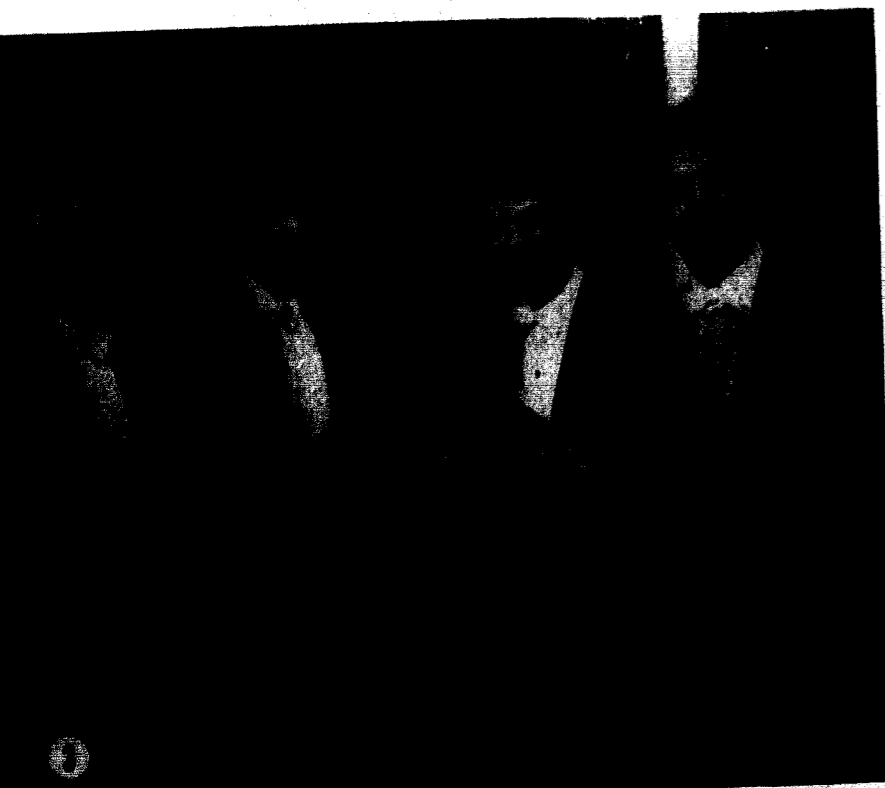
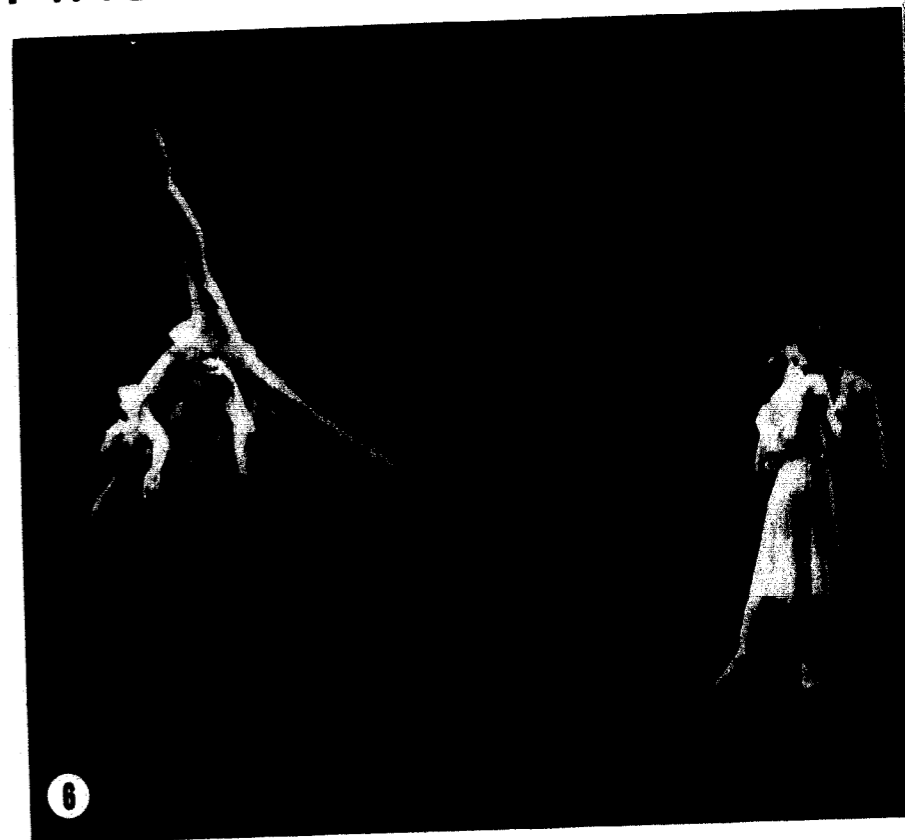

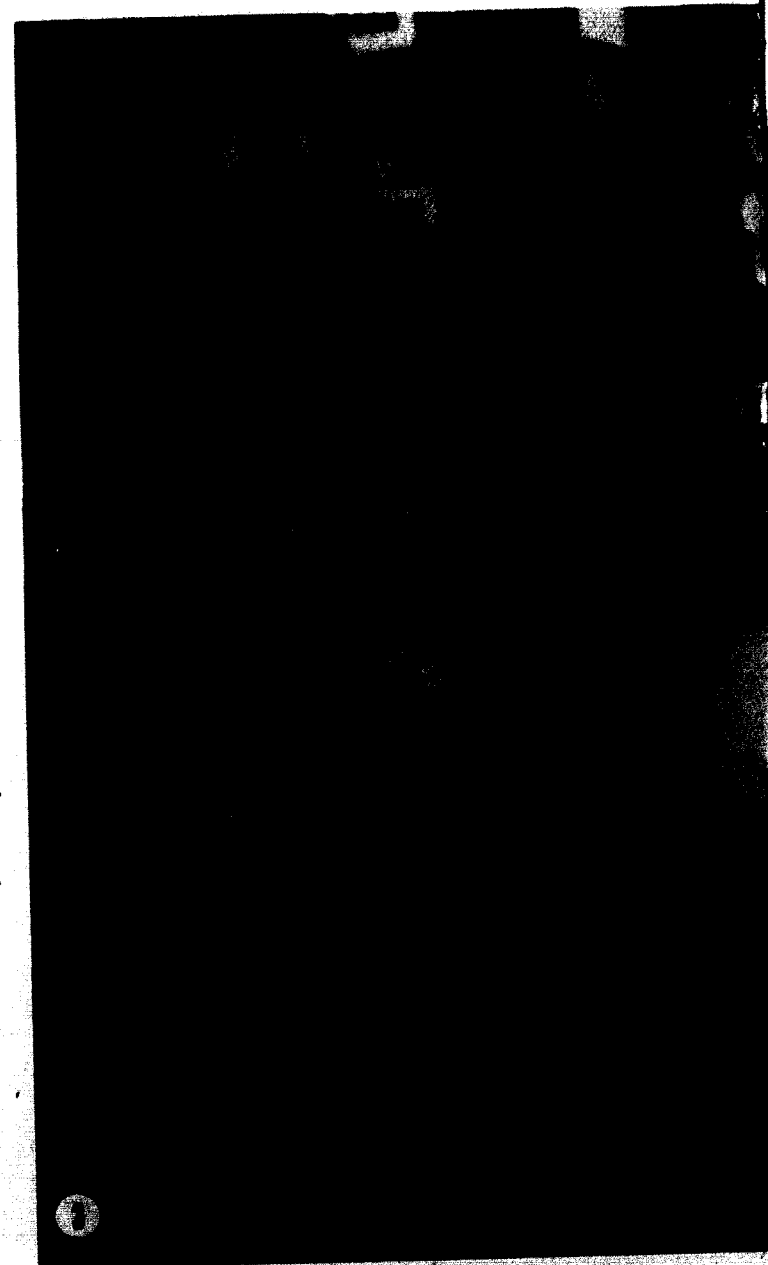
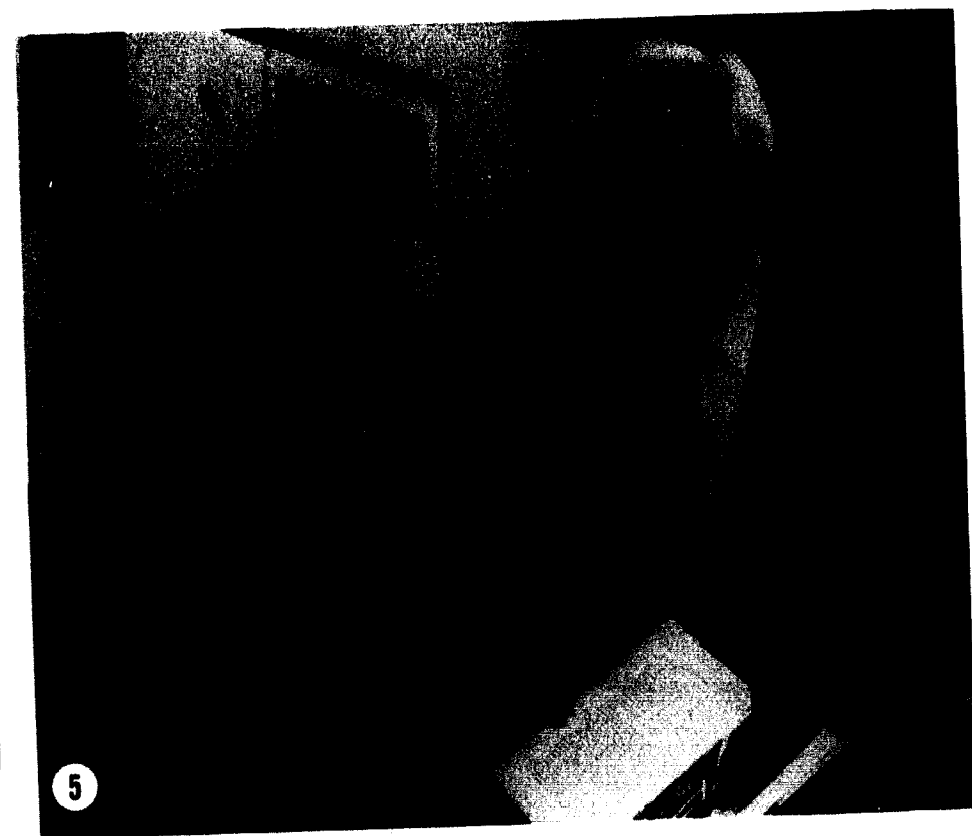
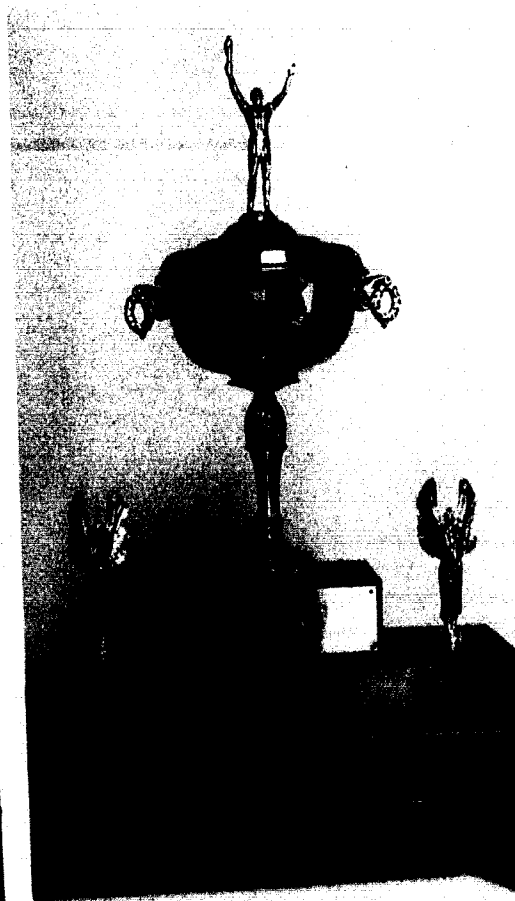


## Fine Arts

## Homecoming: Quad Games to Queens

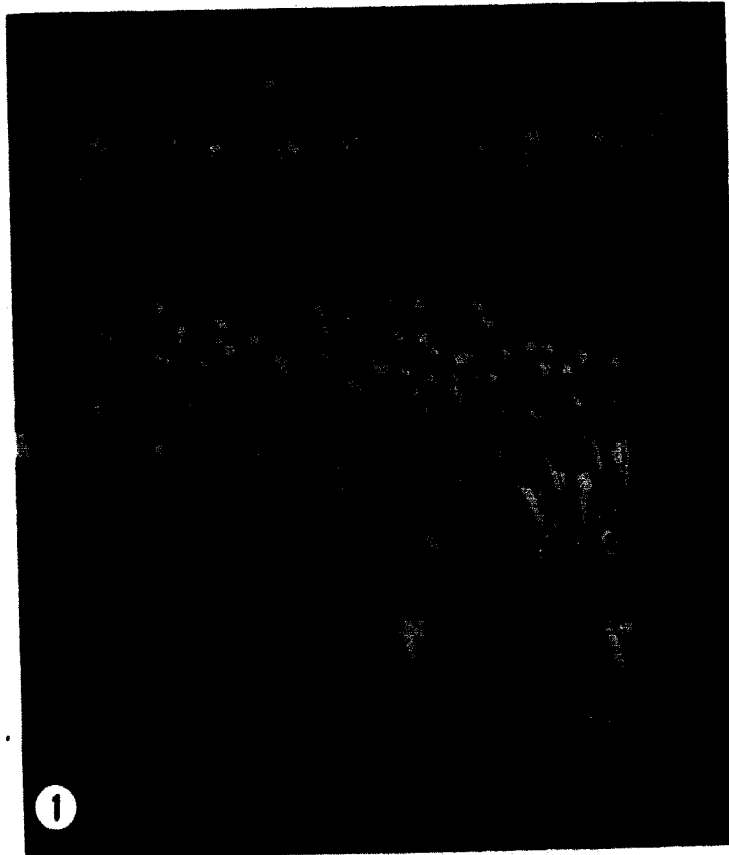

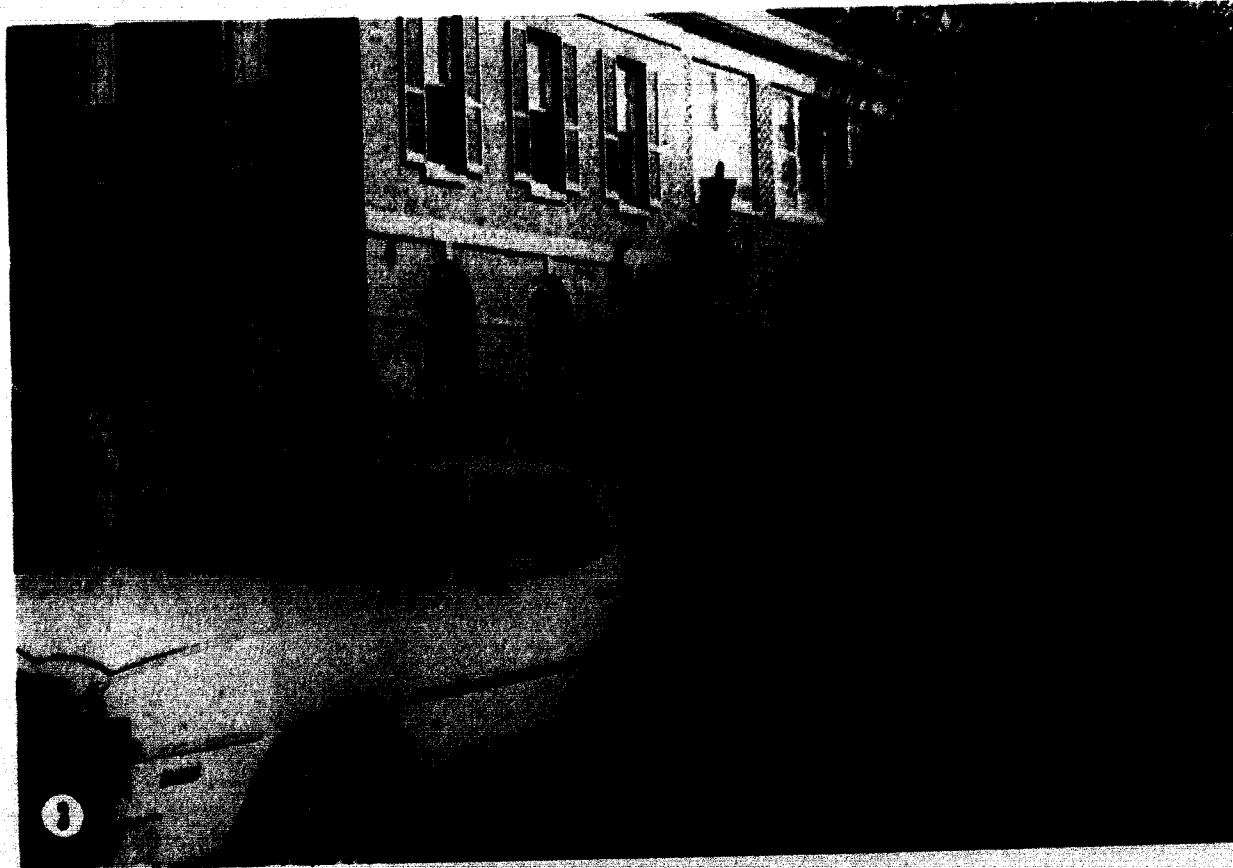

# THE MOUSETRAP

"Let's run it again!" This became a commonplace remark as members of the Players worked to perfect the blocking, lines, and complicated technical aspects of **THE MOUSETRAP**, by Agatha Christie. This year marked a step up for the Drama Department as they performed for the first time in many years on the stage of Gano, rather than that of Browning Theater. The move to Gano required many hours of work on the set as the stage was larger and the set more extensive than those in the past. The work was well worth the effort, however, because very few people in the audience were aware that the set consisted of plywood panelling rather than oak, a cardboard and styrofoam fireplace rather than marble and brick, and a jute and nylon net window rather than leaded glass. Both in acting and in design, the cast and crew, under the direction of Jan Glover and Howard Jones, were able to transform the stage into the Great Hall of an English country manor. This transformation, along with the surprise ending contrived by Christie, allowed for one of Jewell's most successful and well-received dramatic presentations in years.

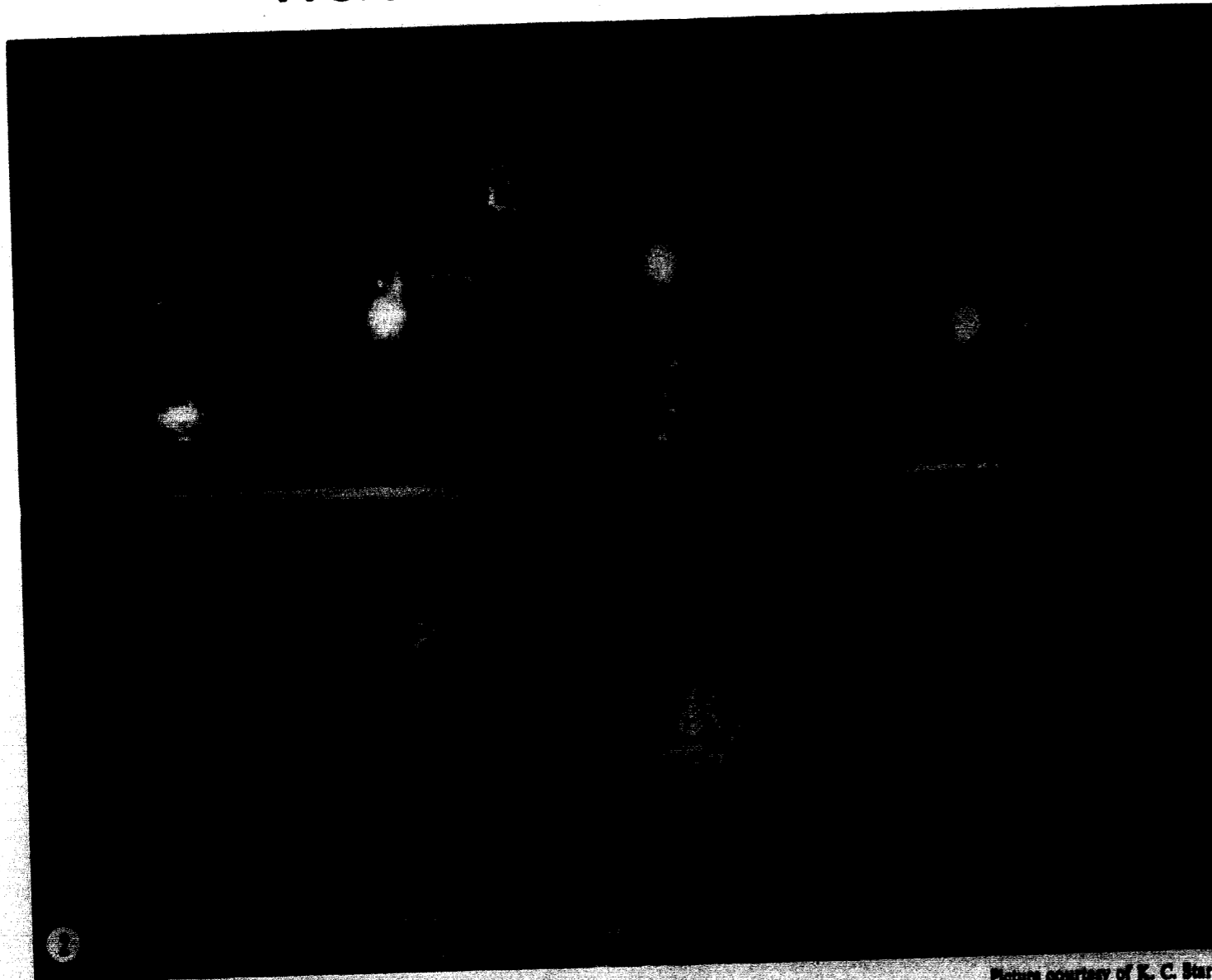
Whether effected directly or indirectly, few Kansas City residents will forget the flood that caused damage, destruction, and irreparable heartache during the second week of September.

The National Weather Service issued flash flood warnings, but these warnings foretold little of what was to occur. Shortly after midnight Monday, September 12th, the torrents of rain began, and with the exception of a false calm around noon Monday, continued until 2:30 a.m. Tuesday.

Destruction caused by the flash floods was ghastly; damage was estimated by a fed-

eral aid official to total \$50 million to private property and \$12 million to public property. Water-logged cars became wedged in trees, street signs and street lights were knocked down by floating cars, trees and bushes were uprooted, bridges and fences were demolished, blocks of pavement and concrete were torn apart, and an estimated 50 percent of the basements in the Kansas City area flooded.

Among the areas hardest was the Country Club Plaza. Adding to the tremendous damage caused by the flooding waters was a massive explosion and fire that demolished nearly an entire block.

Devastation, however, was not the major loss; the lives of 25 people were taken. Acts of heroism became commonplace as policemen, firemen, and volunteers battled the waters in numerous rescue attempts. Literally hundreds of people were stranded in cars, buildings, streets, and trees. Due to a shortage of boats, policemen and firemen asked those who owned boats to volunteer them for use in these rescue attempts.

Complications, however, did not end with the heavy rain. A near continuous light rain greatly hindered clean-up efforts. As the area was declared a federal disaster, most of those whose homes, cars, and businesses had suffered damage were given help.

Months later some of the effects of the flood were still noticeable. Yet, even when all the visible evidence is gone, the flood of September will not be forgotten.

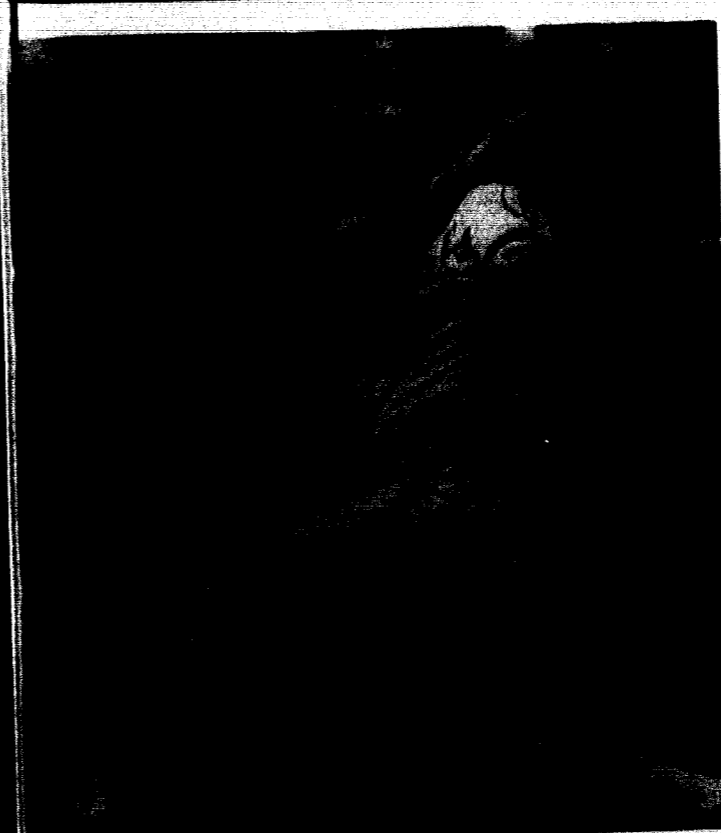
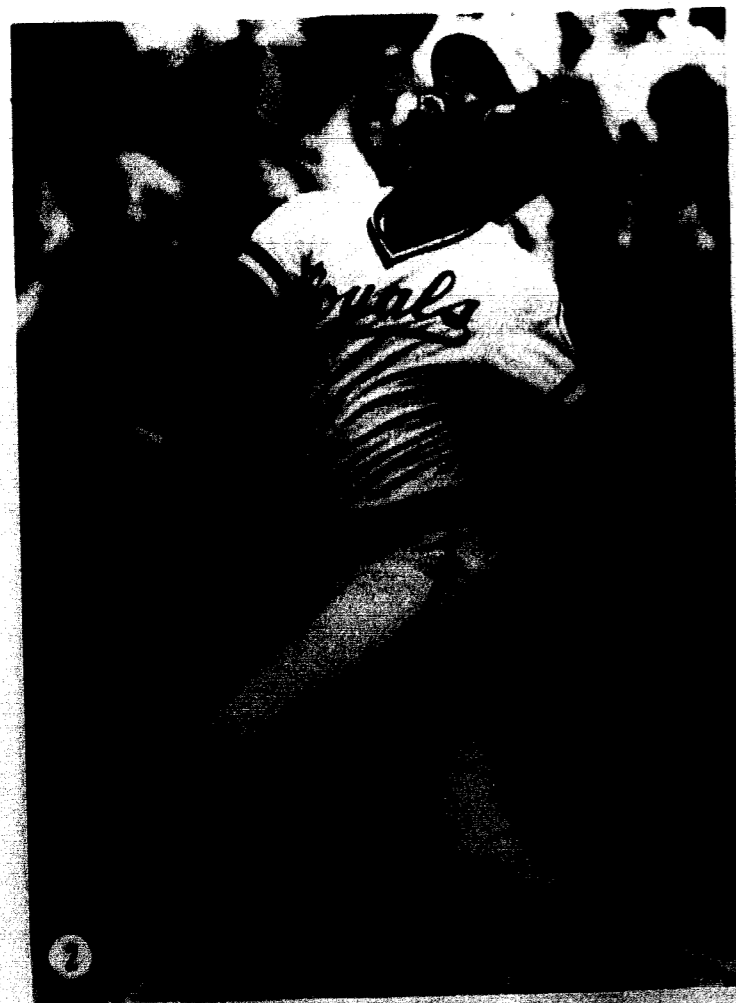
# ROYALMANIA

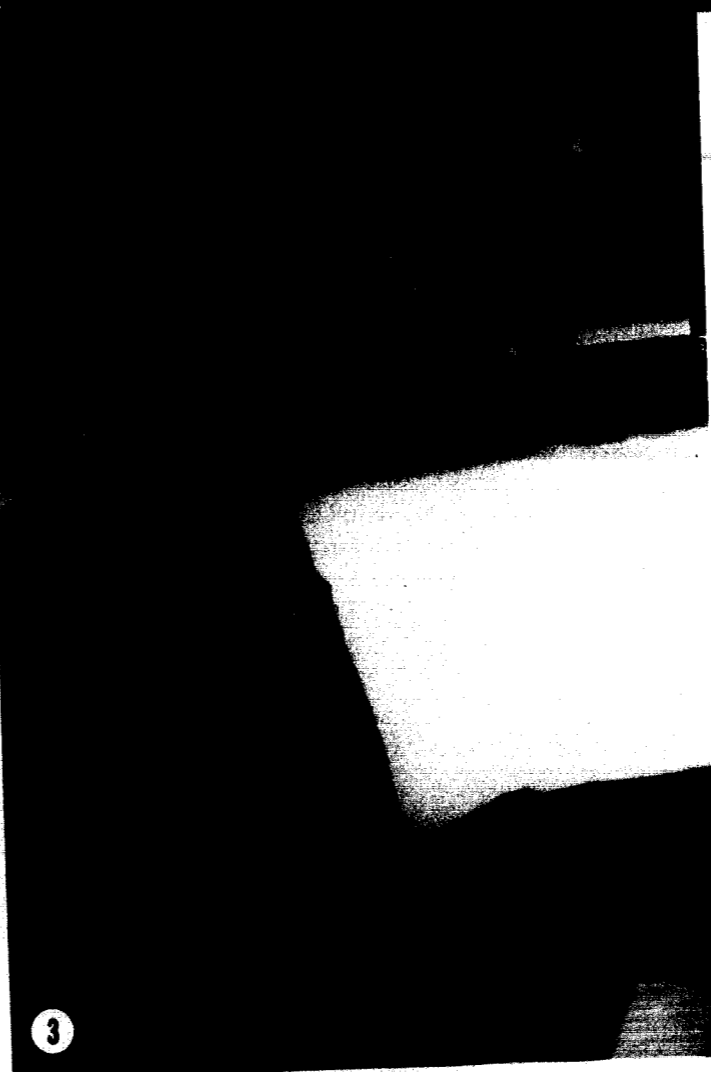


## BSA Plans Black History Week

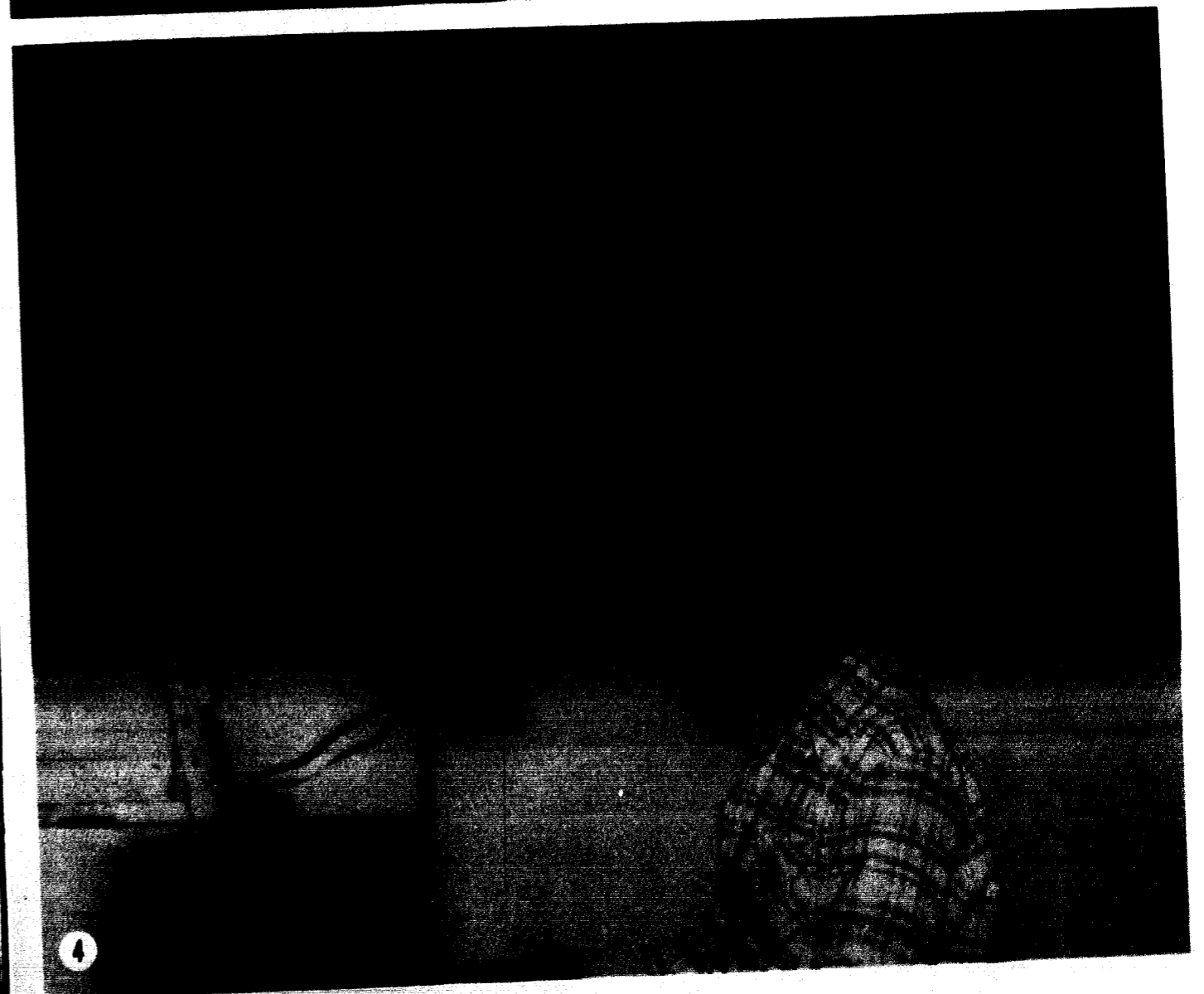

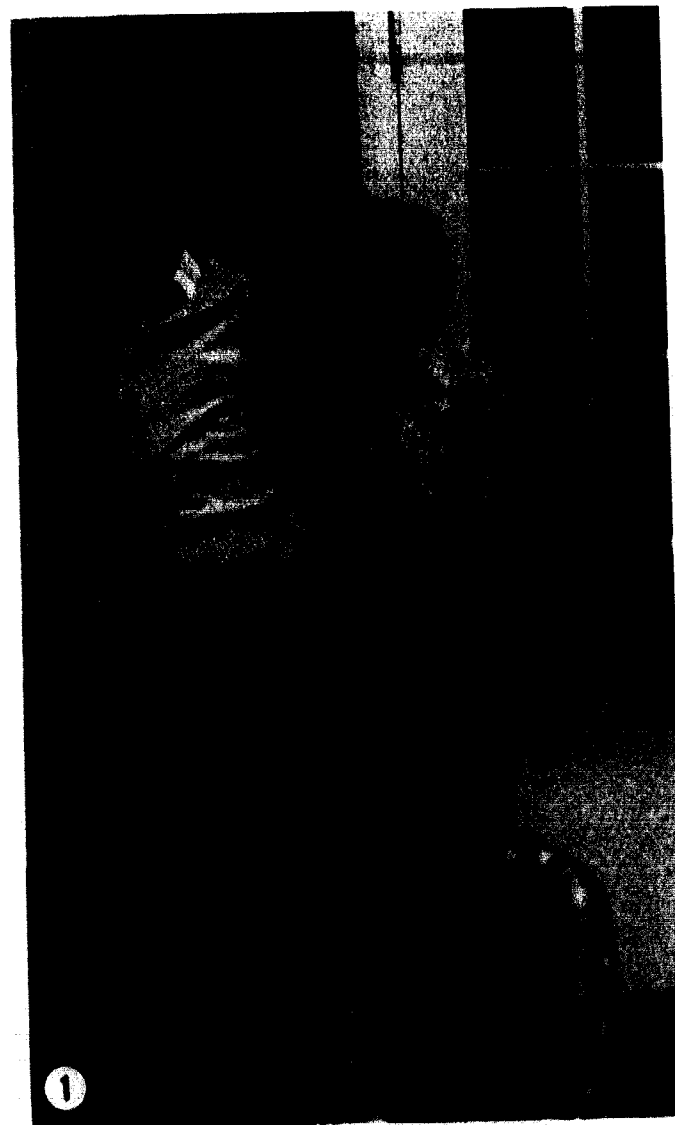
## Christian Student Union

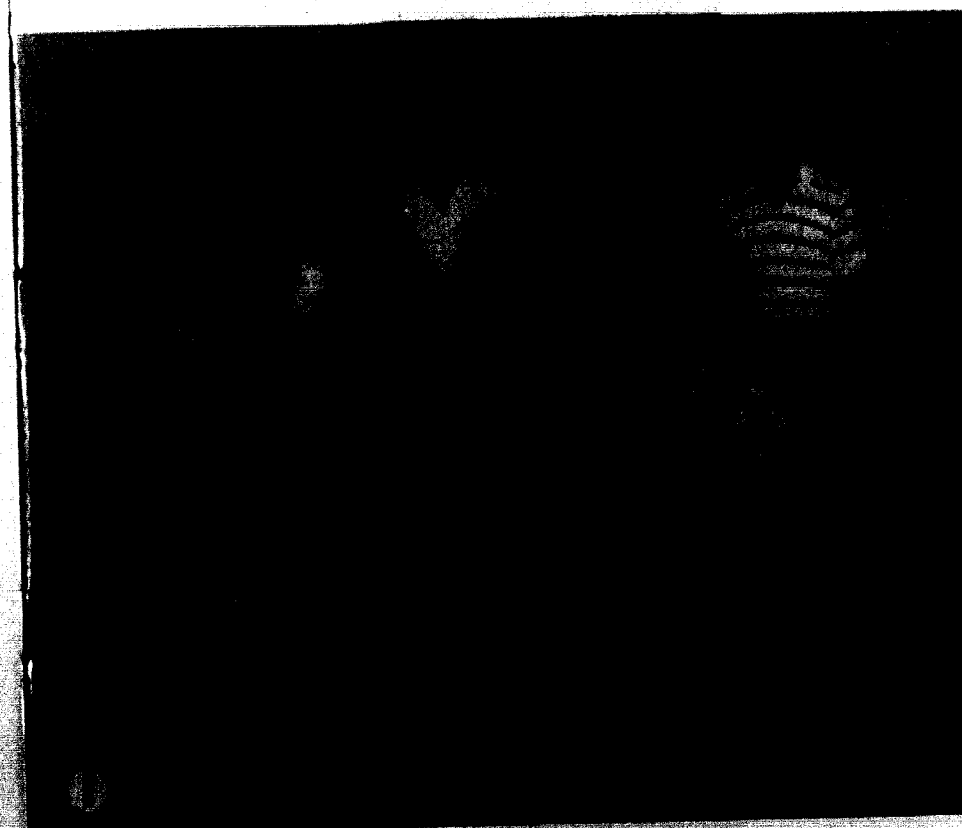
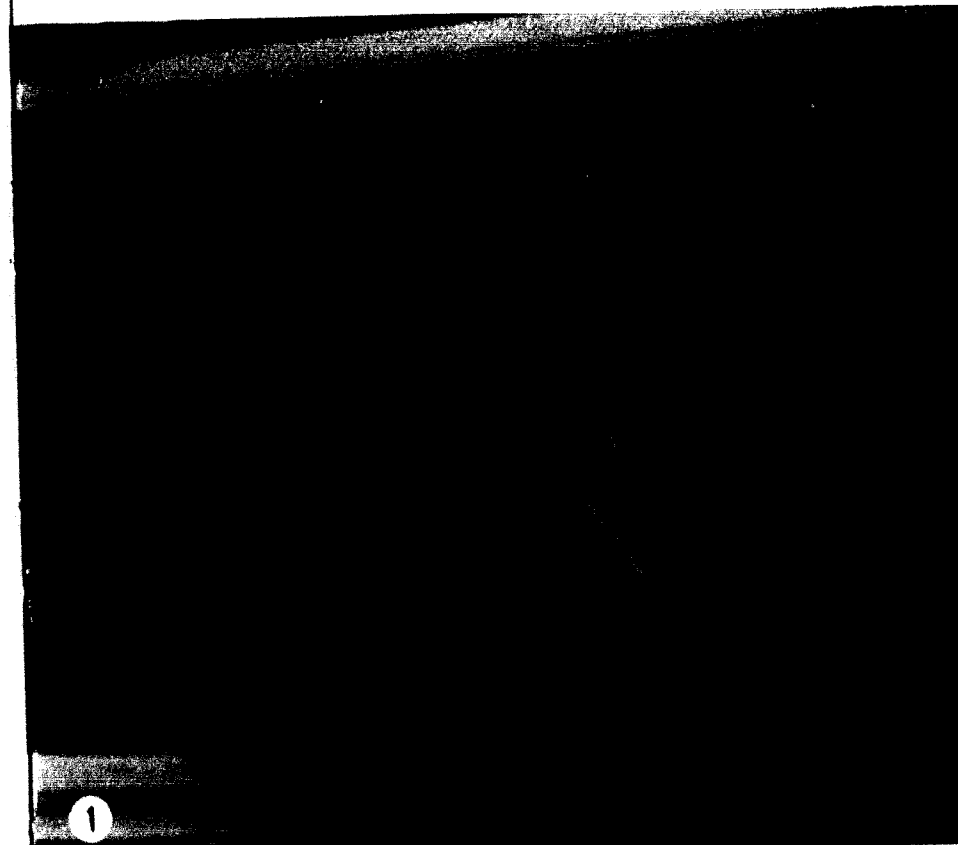

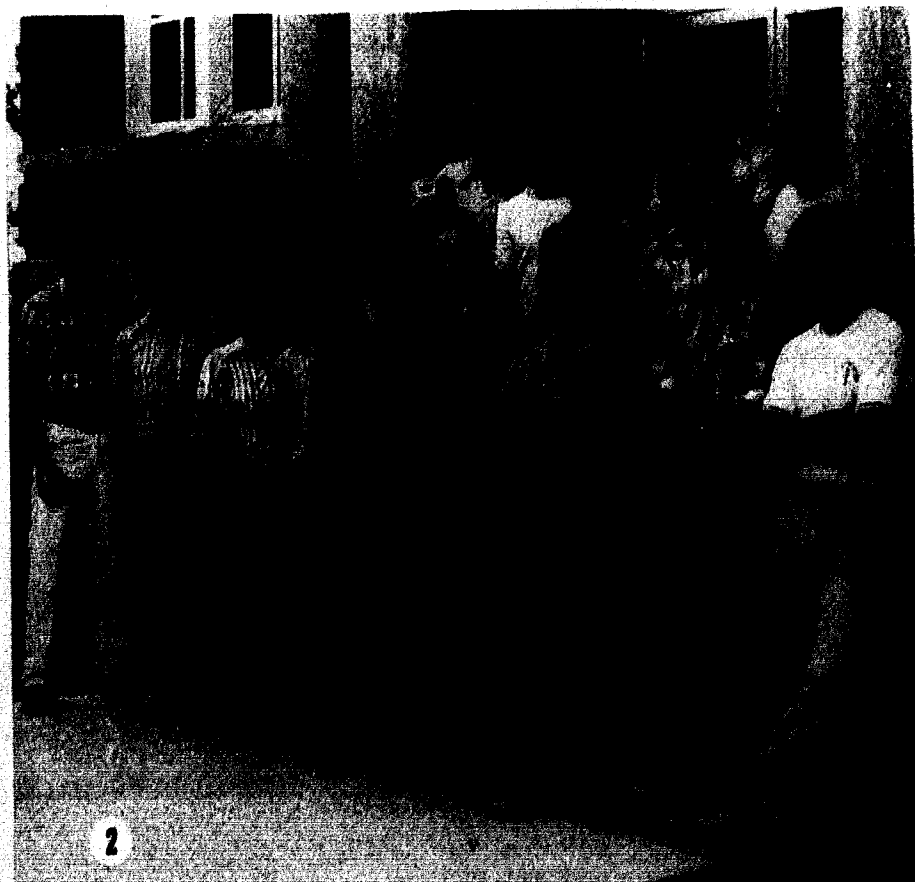

# Institute for Social Research

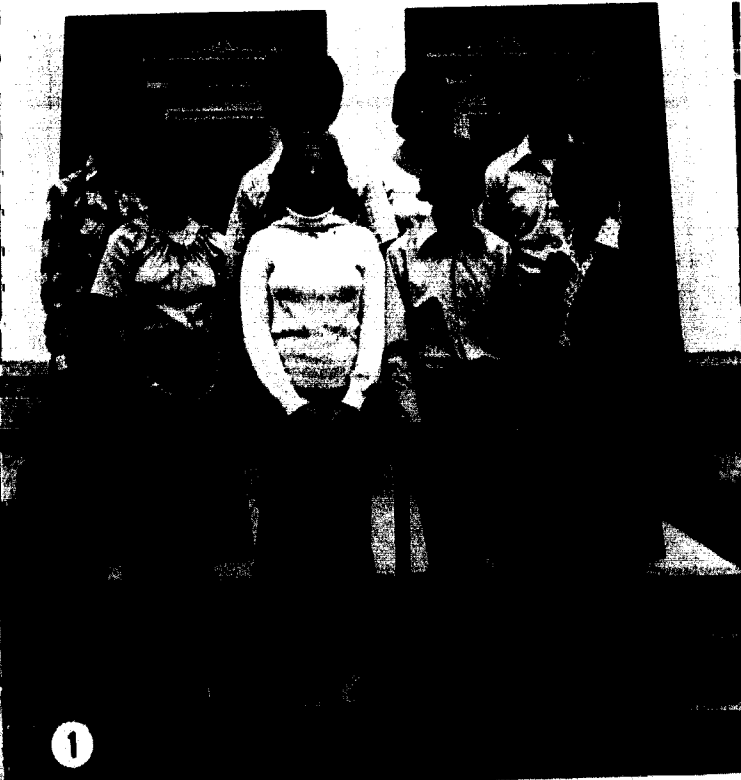
The Institute for Social Research (ISR) provided the means to measure public opinion scientifically. This year's activities included surveys conducted for the City of Kansas City, the City of Liberty and the Mid-America Regional Council. The ISR also conducted a Graduate Education Survey for Jewell to determine whether there is sufficient demand among teachers in a four-county area to warrant establishment of a graduate program in education at the college. In addition to these, the ISR did two surveys on its own initiative involving referenda votes and local elections: a two-county (Clay-Platte) survey on referendum to repeal the Blue Law and a local election survey for North Kansas City.

More than 100 students have worked with the ISR in various capacities during each of the nearly four years of operation. Field work, Winterim credit, self-designed projects and employment are at least four ways students may participate. Fall 1978 marks the first year students may have the option of declaring Social Research as a major.

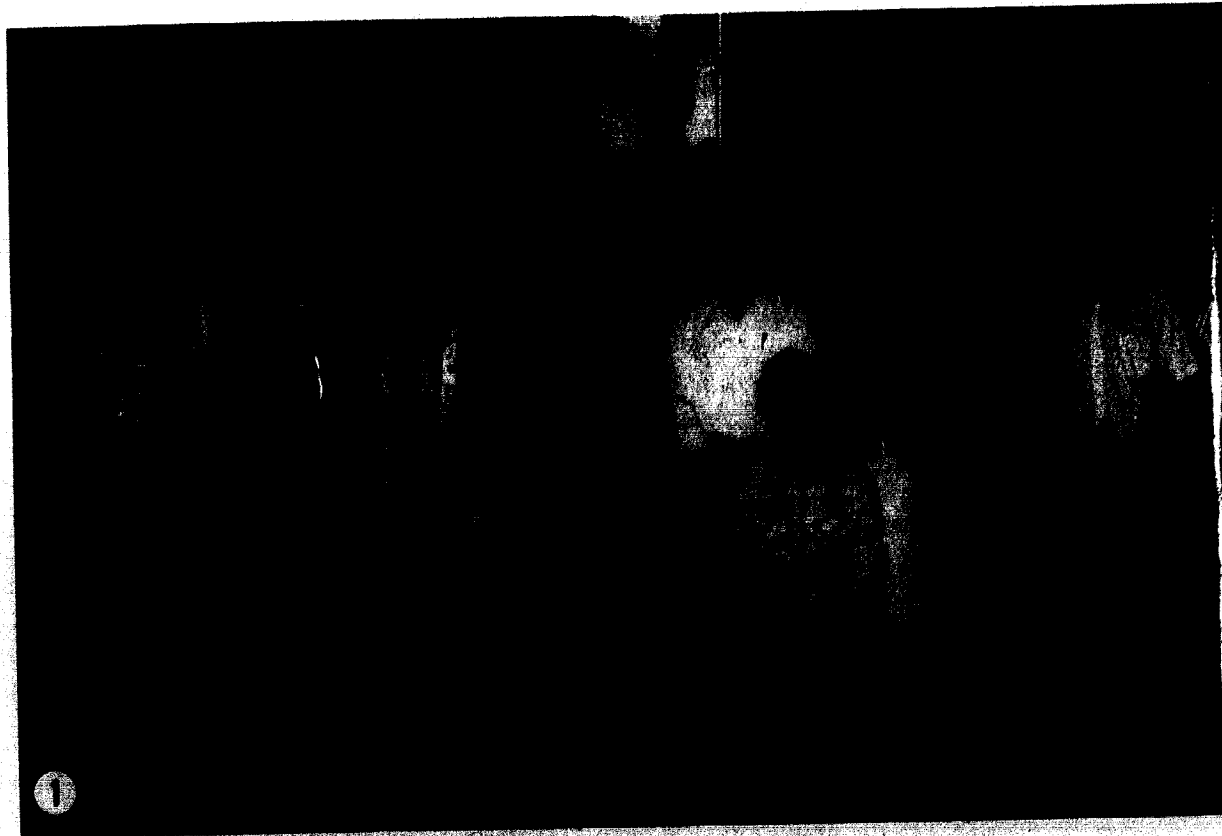

All in all, NASA enjoyed an extremely successful and productive year. Led by the NASA Board, the non-affils made numerous accomplishments in campus activities.

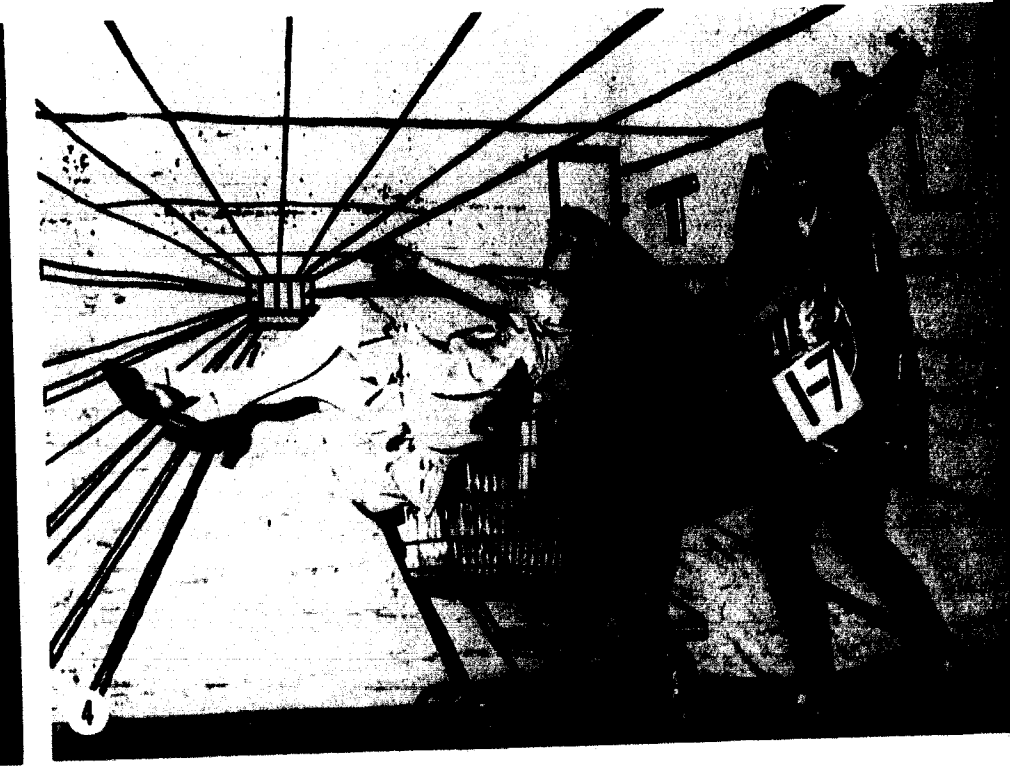

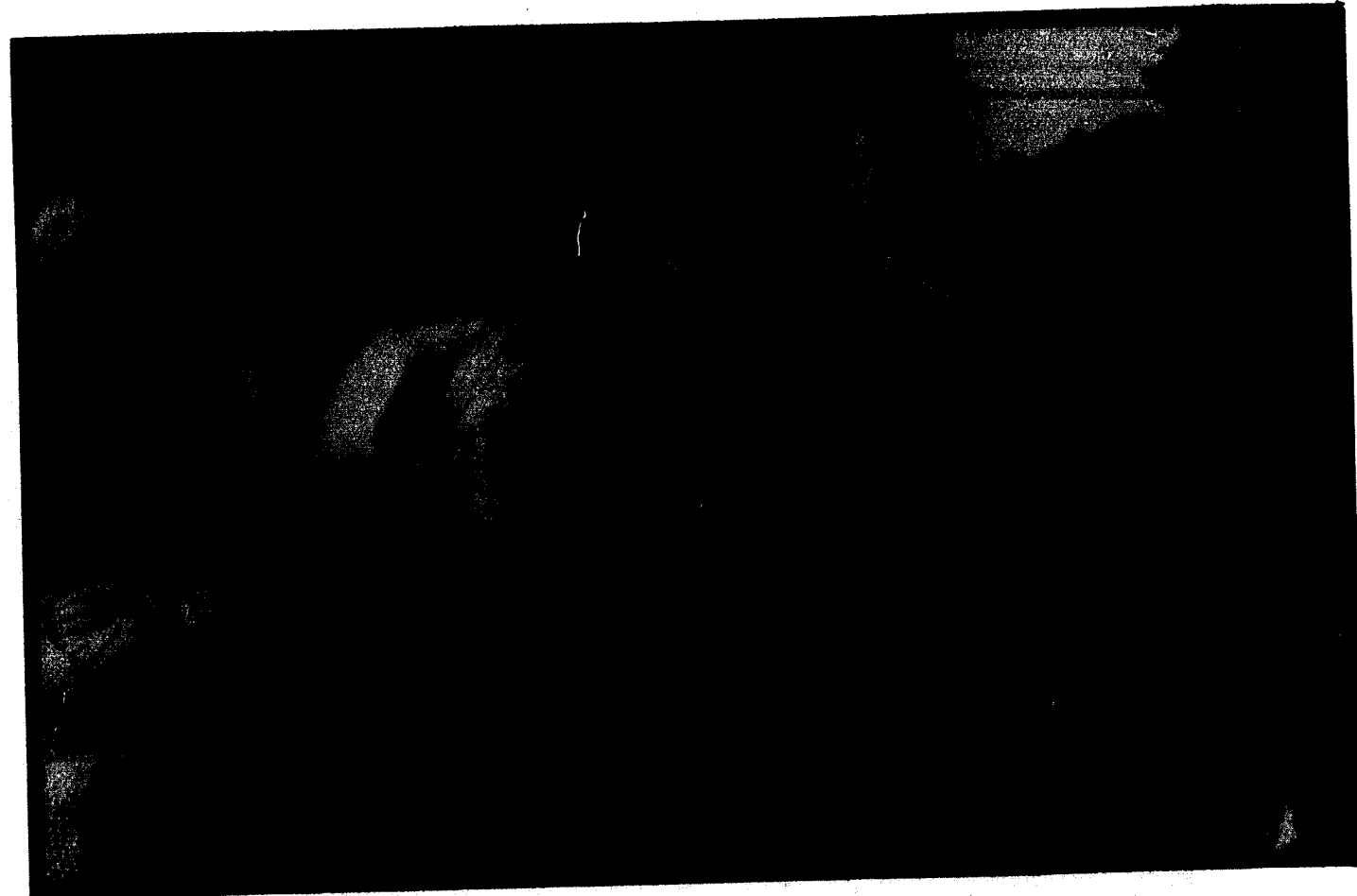

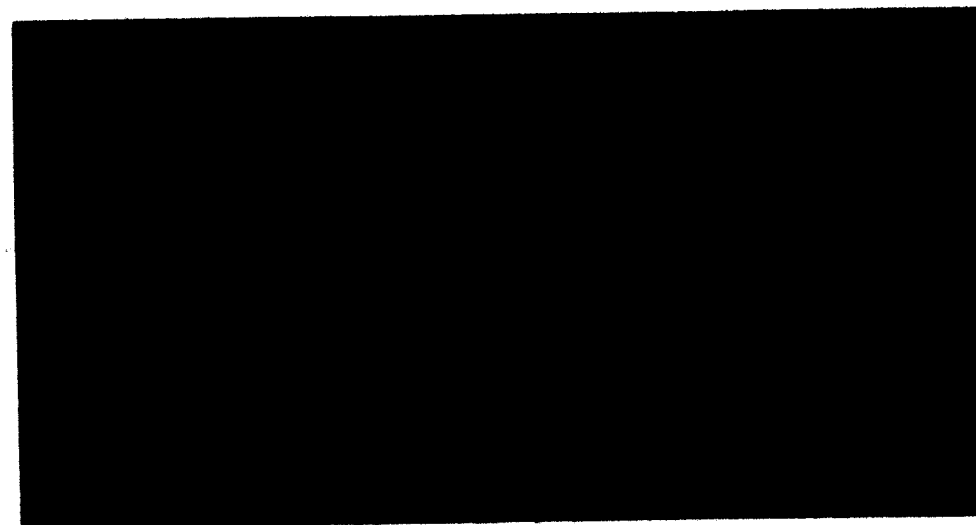
The Sigma Nus started off a great year by receiving second place on their Homecoming float, working with the Delta Zetas.

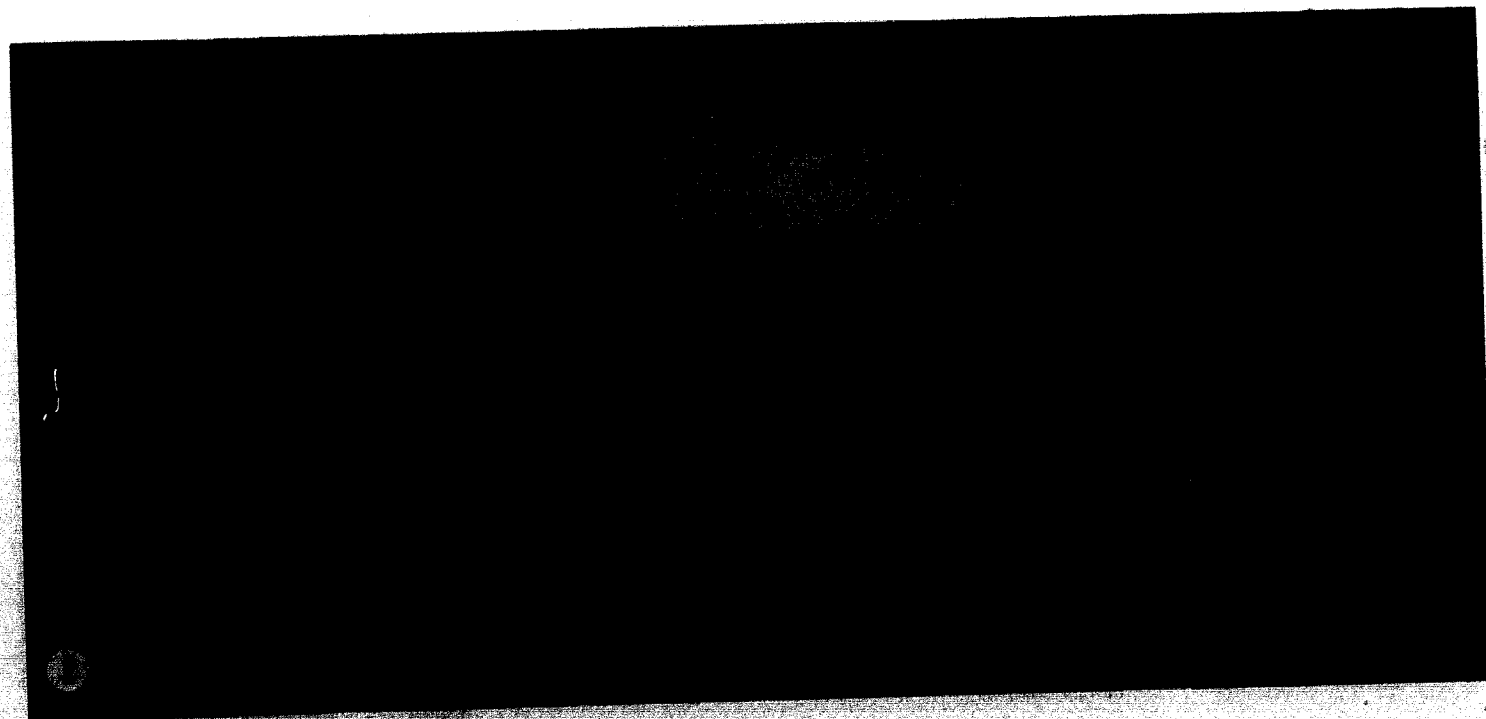

## More Legends of Jewell Hall

Every Jewell student has at one time heard the stories of Jewell Hall, the stories about Jewell when it served as a stable and as headquarters and hospital for Civil War troops. Yet, there are even more stories about Jewell Hall, and because of these stories it has been nominated for the National Register of Historic Places by both the state of Missouri and Dr. Cuthbertson, chairman of the history department.

Jewell Hall was nominated for the National Register because of its history in the growth of the college and because of its unique design and stalwartness.

At one time Jewell Hall was all there existed of Wm. Jewell College. The basement served as the library and later as the chapel, the 3rd floor served as the debate department, and the attic, equipped with one bas-

ketball goal, served as the gymnasium.

Built only miles from Indian camps, Jewell Hall was the farthest building West and was considered the Harvard or Athens of the West. Today it is the oldest college building still in use West of the Mississippi.

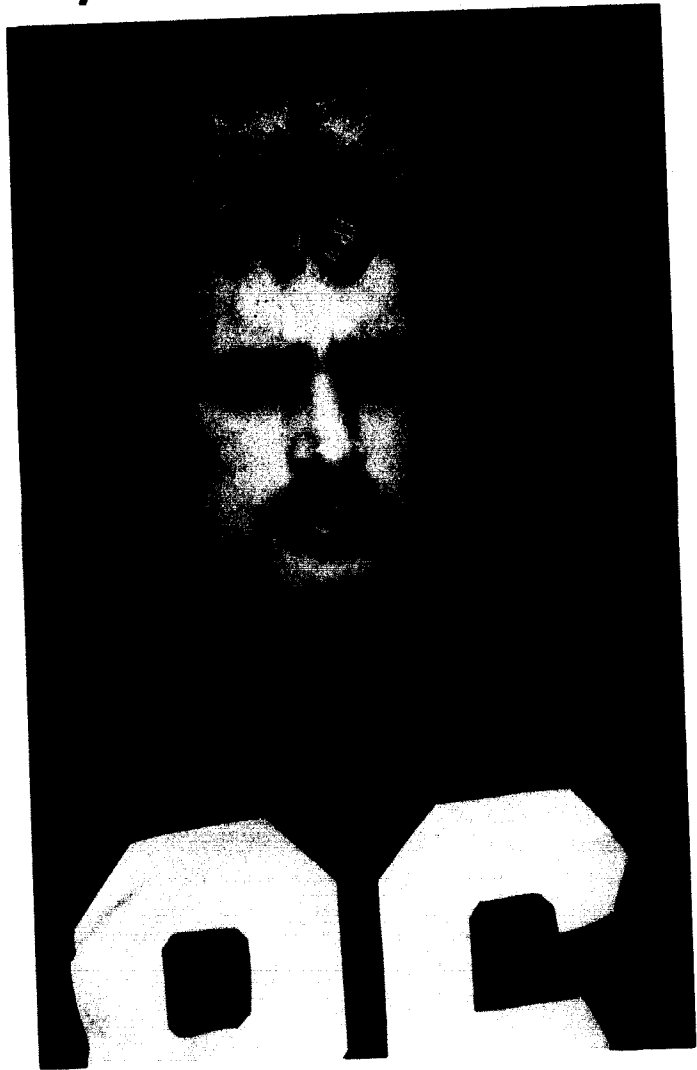
Jewell Hall is unique also in its construction. Modeled after the courthouse designed by Thomas Jefferson in Williamsburg, Virginia, it is basically colonial in style. The ornate lentils that cover every window and door and appear to be carved wood are cast iron. These kinds of lentils were very unusual in this part of the country when Jewell was built because they had to be imported from several hundred miles away. A cupola which sat on the center of the roof was removed somewhere between 1897-1903.

Shutters which were used to keep the wind and rain out were removed. Electricity was first installed in 1898 and the chimneys which burned wood and coal for heat were removed. Between 1946-48 when the building was redone many other changes were made. Part of the pediments, the wooden ornaments on the lower edge of the roof, were removed. Because of their value they were made into lecturns for teachers which are still in use in the Hall today.

Through the care of numerous people throughout the years of its existence, Jewell Hall has remained a building of great durability and usefulness. The changes that have been made have served only to make Jewell Hall more sturdy, serviceable, and statuesque.
