





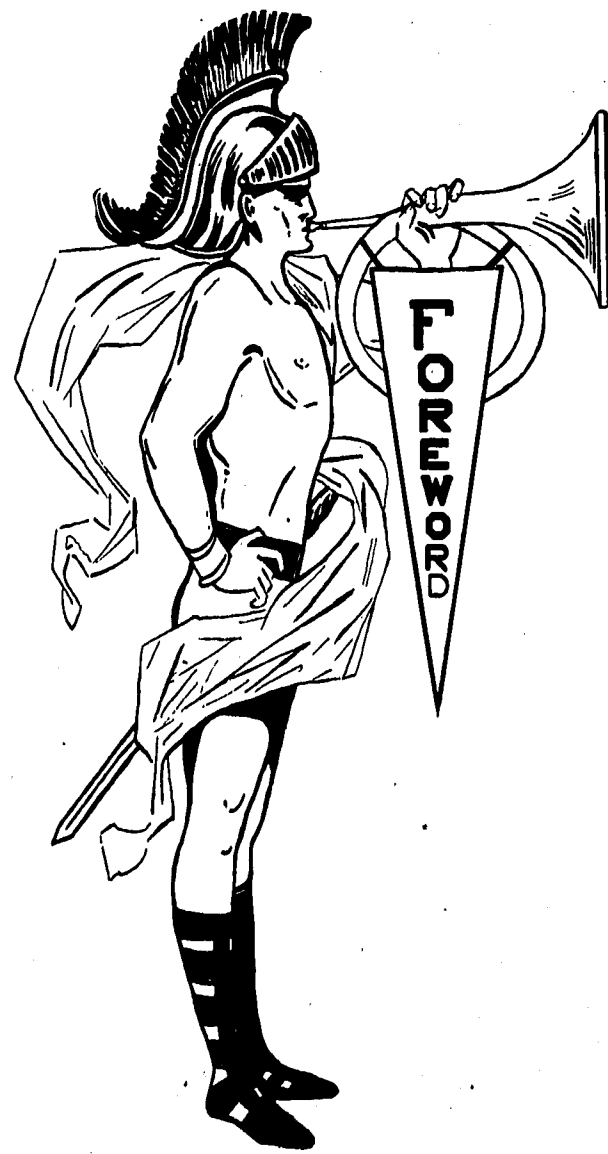

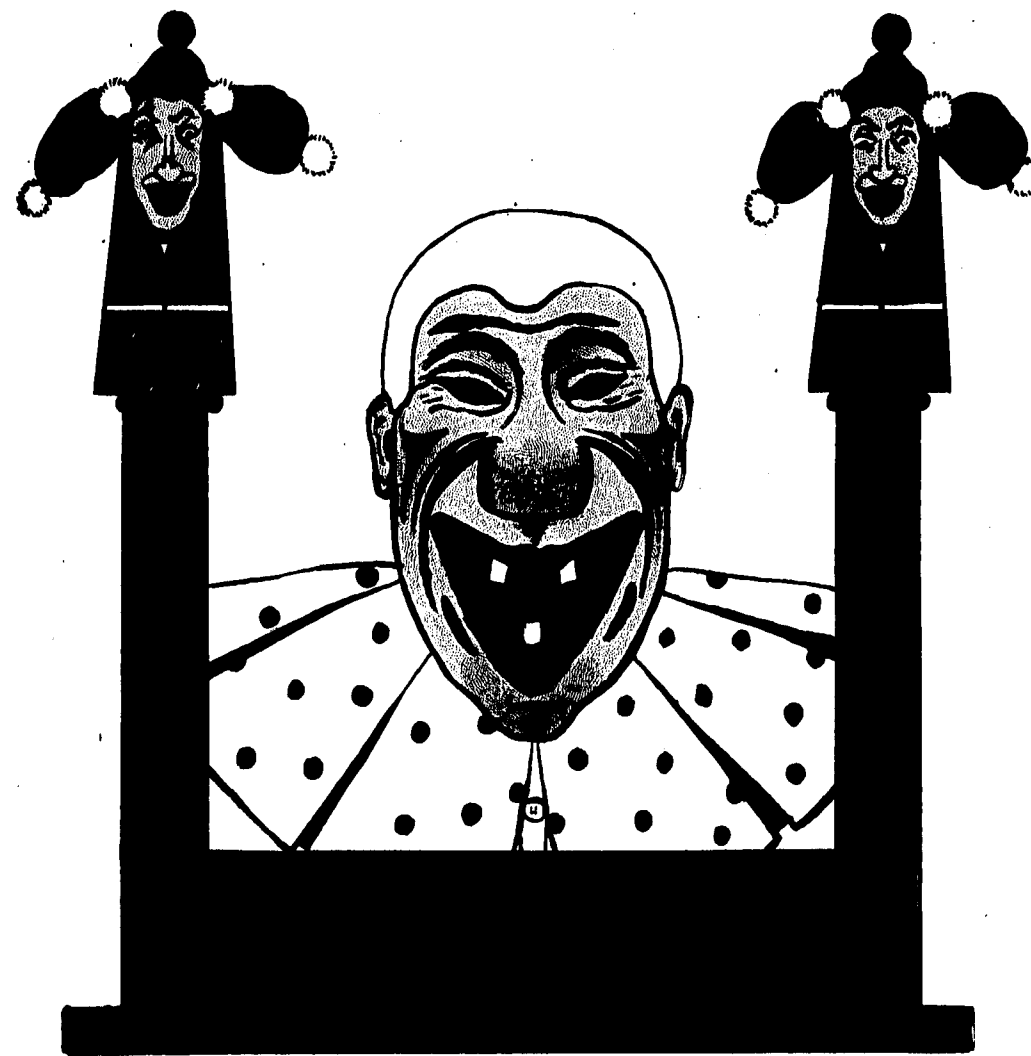

EDICATION

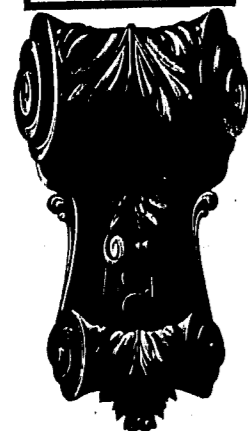

A PARTING SONG

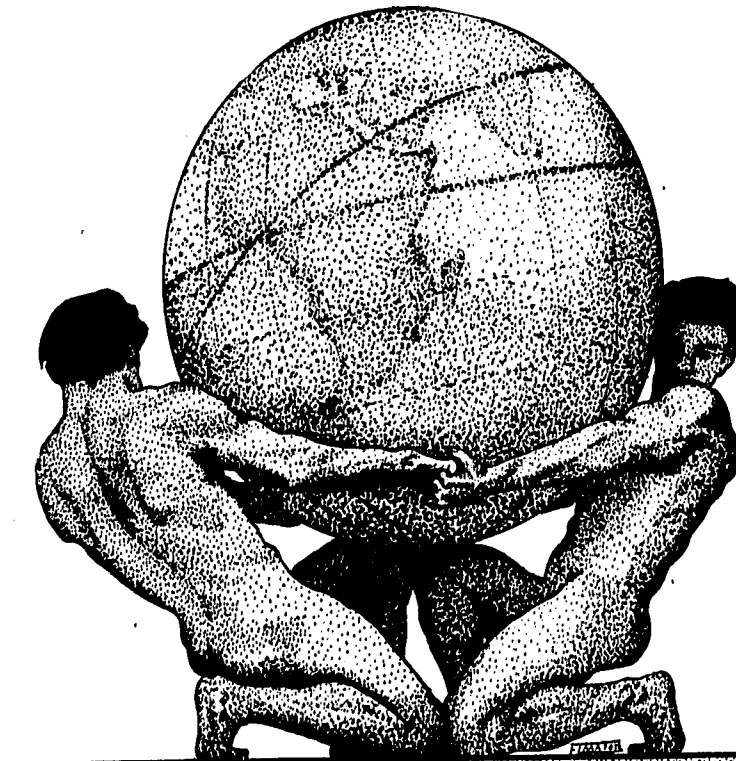

Far down on our parting ways.

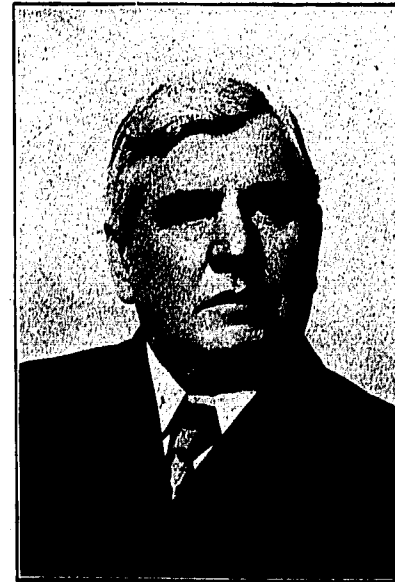
A song to keep our courage up,

Before we must say, good night.



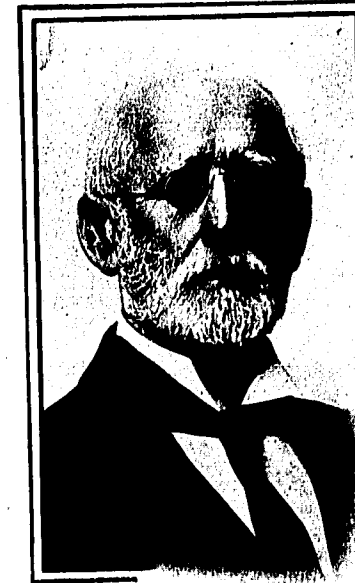

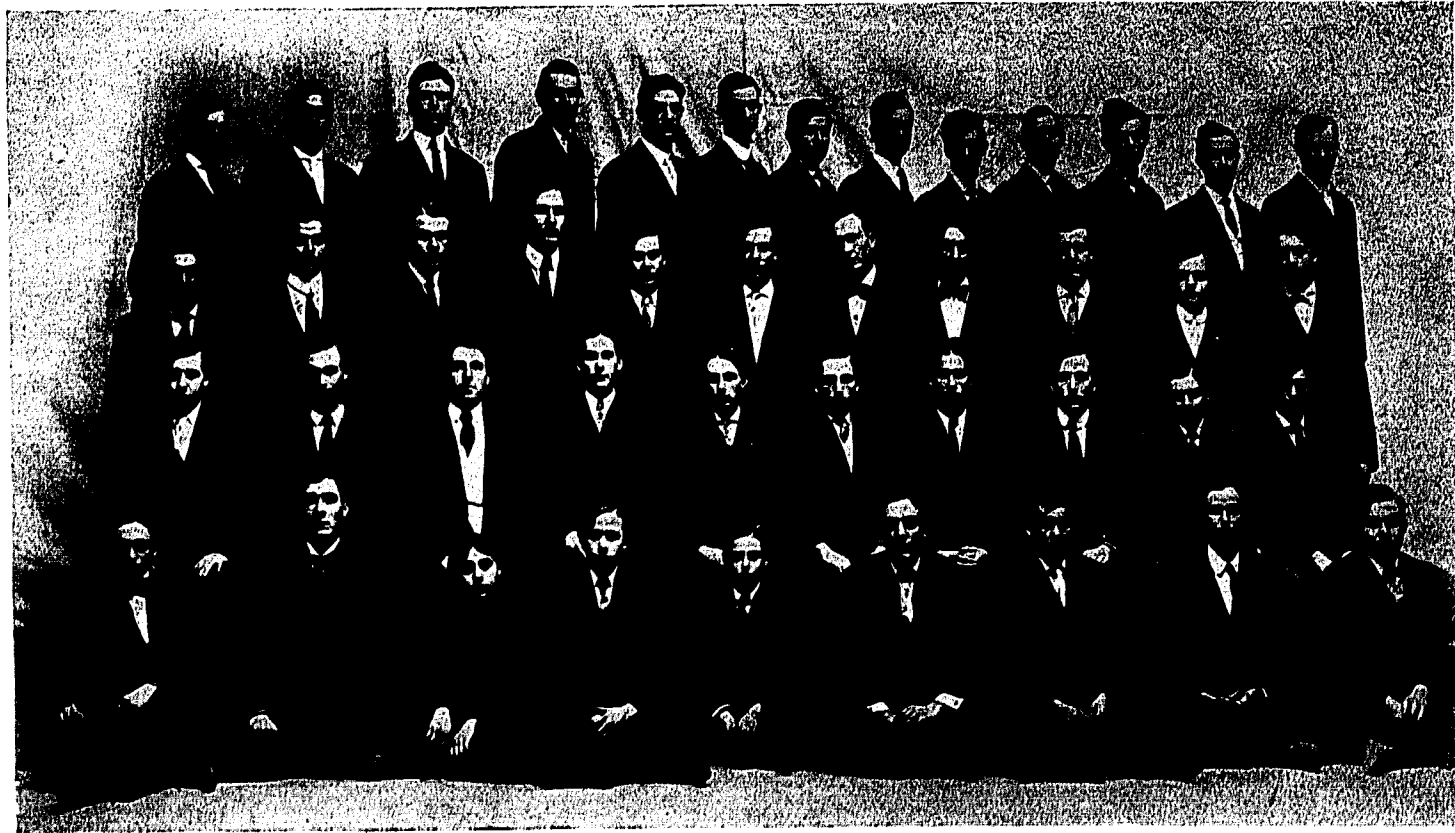

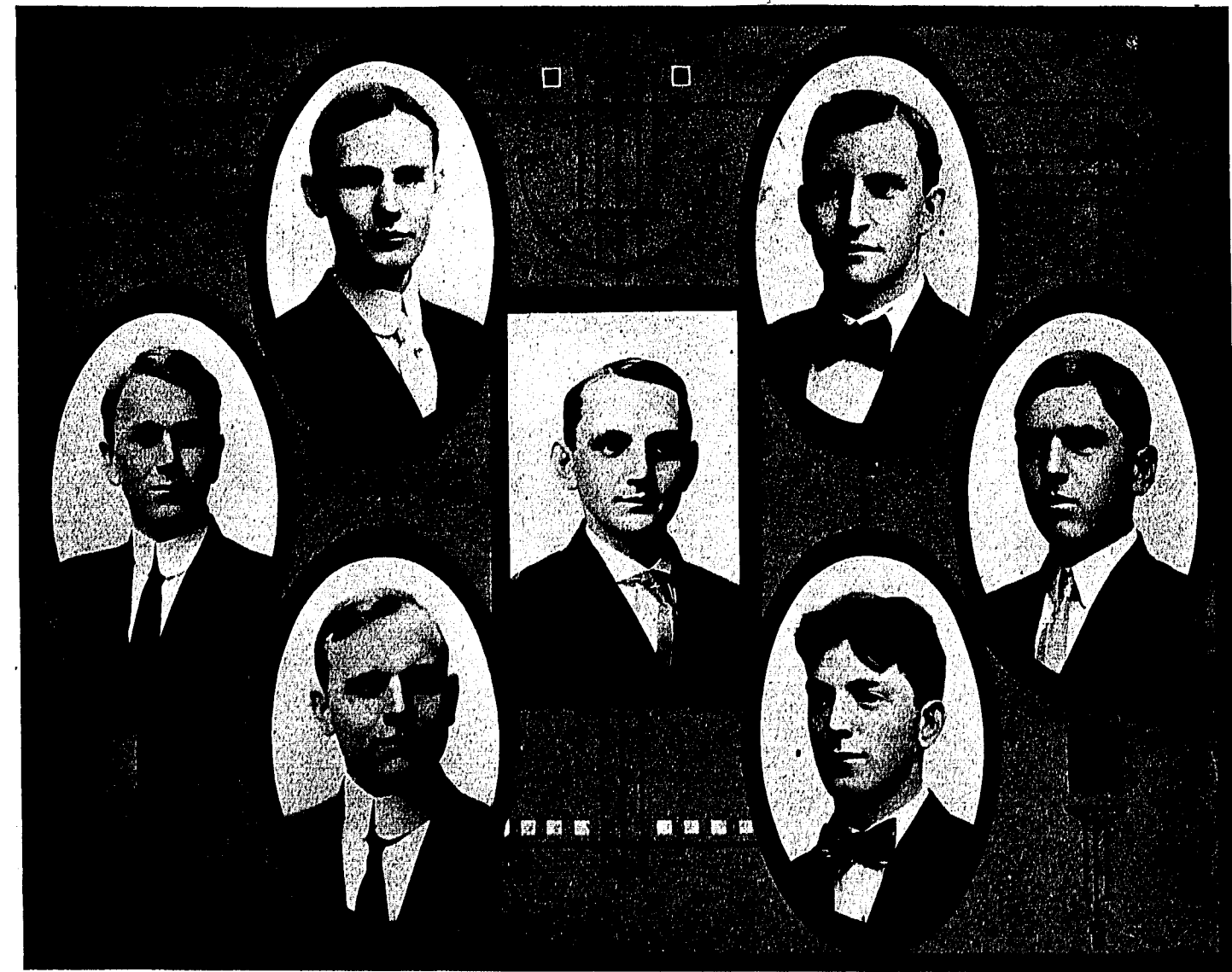

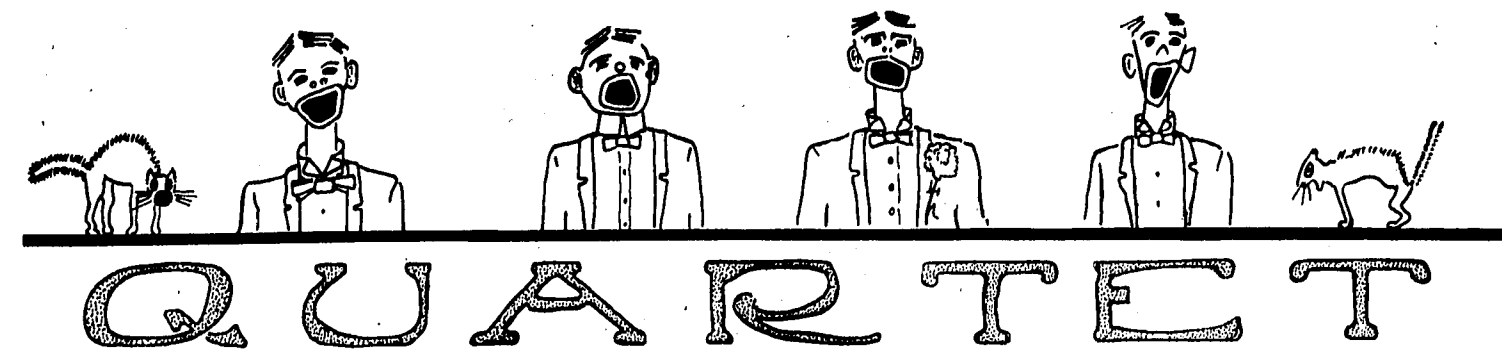
Each department has had definite results during the past year. Two hundred men have been engaged
