Editorial note: oftentimes the financial phase of the *Tatler* is overshadowed by the glamour and excitement of the final *Tatler* Day. The 1937 *Tatler* owes, to a great extent, whatever success it might achieve, to the efficient and capable business managership of Lynn Solomon—to him, then, the editor extends a toast.

● WILLIAM JEWELL PRESS ●

Office—of the William Jewell Press, owned by William Jewell College and operated as a self-supporting commercial plant, paying all its salaries and expenses, contains a history of its evolution from a small bindery begun by a Jewell professor eighteen years ago to the present large and modern printing and photo-engraving plant, George C. Beamer, superintendent of production since his graduation in 1929, last year succeeded Harvey J. Ray, manager since 1921 and largely responsible for the Press's advancement in the commercial field.

Composition—of the pages before they are placed in the bed of the giant press is entirely in the hands of students. More than 100 student have been graduated from the college as a result of their earnings in the Press, several hundred

more having worked for shorter periods of time. During the past eighteen years more than \$54,000 has been paid to students. This year at graduation three efficient and experienced printers will be lost, Raleigh King, Stanley Monroe, Howard Rhodes.

Engraving—plant of the Press is a new addition to the already modern equipment. A Leica camera, supplementing the photo-engraving equipment, makes possible commercial photography.

Press—work of the William Jewell Press includes all college printing, printing of *The Tattler*, which won All-American rating in 1925 and each year since that it was entered, several other college and high school annuals, and various types of commercial printing.

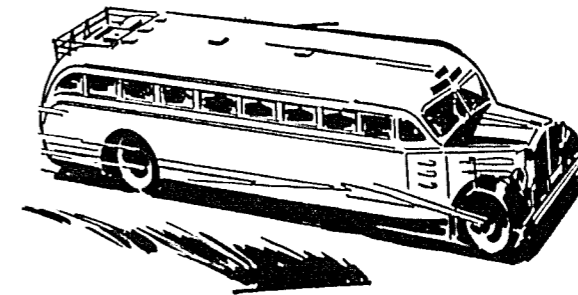

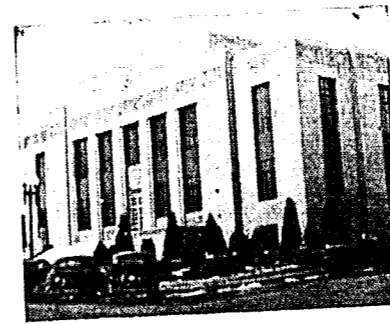
