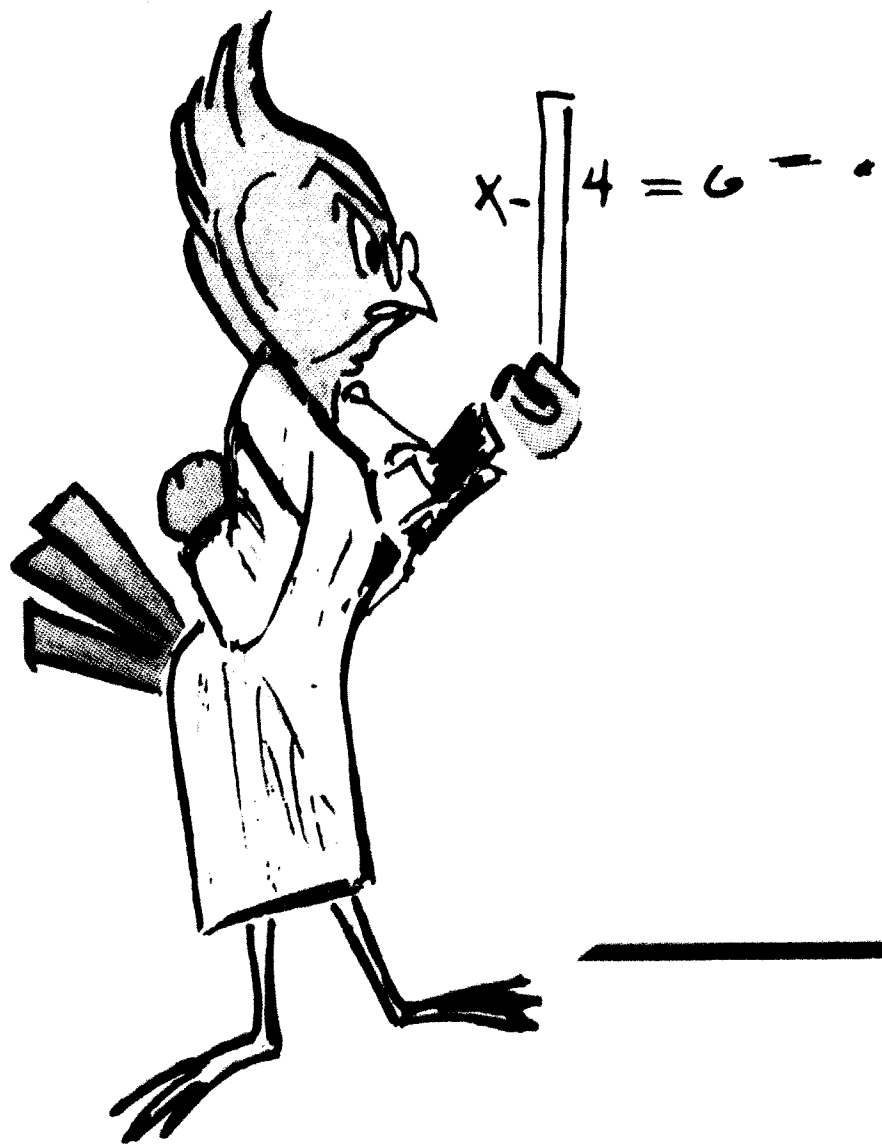
Foreword

If the students of William Jewell College realized the responsibility that our vice presidents assume to facilitate all resources for the students benefit, a great deal of thanks would be in order.

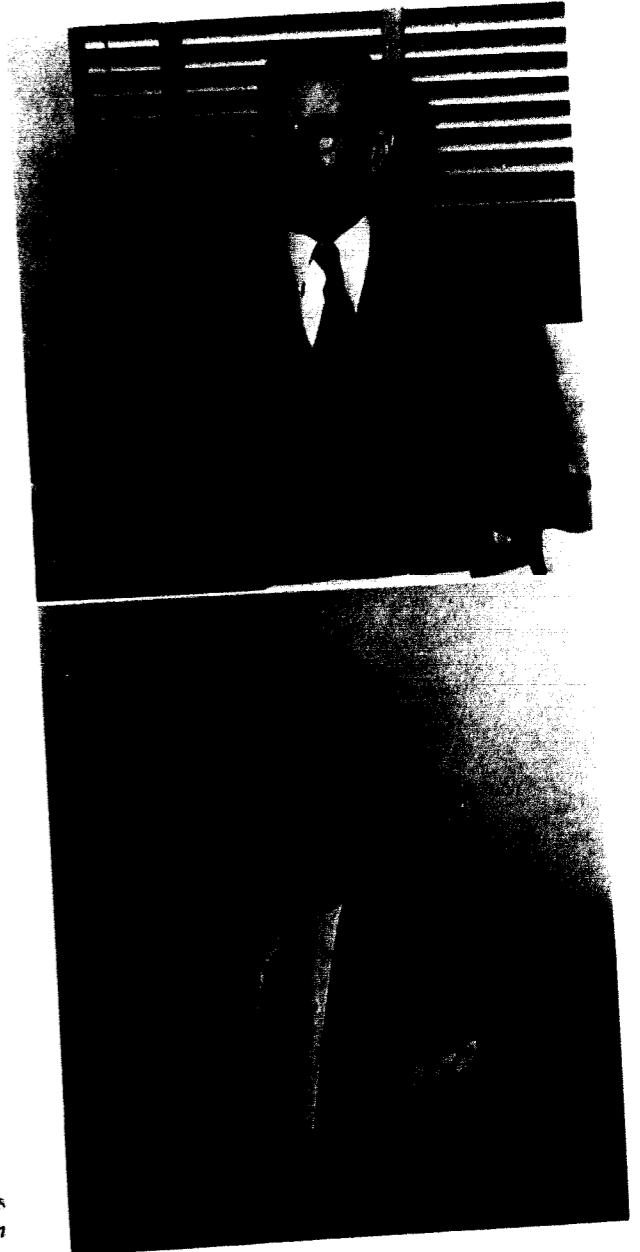

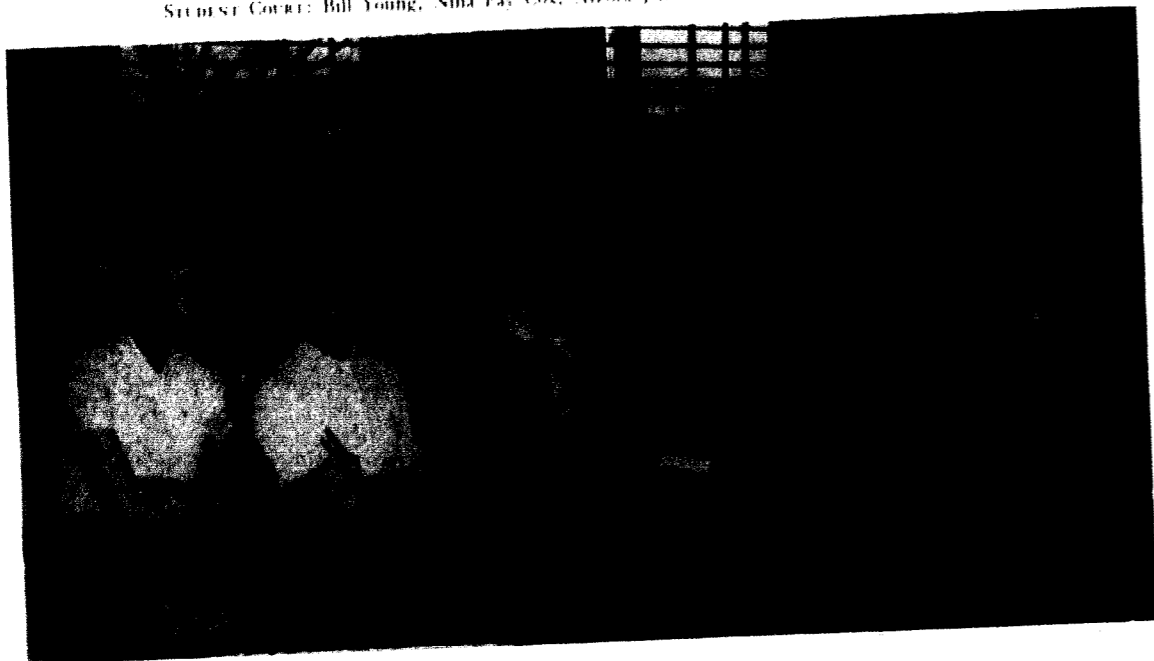
Administrative Committee

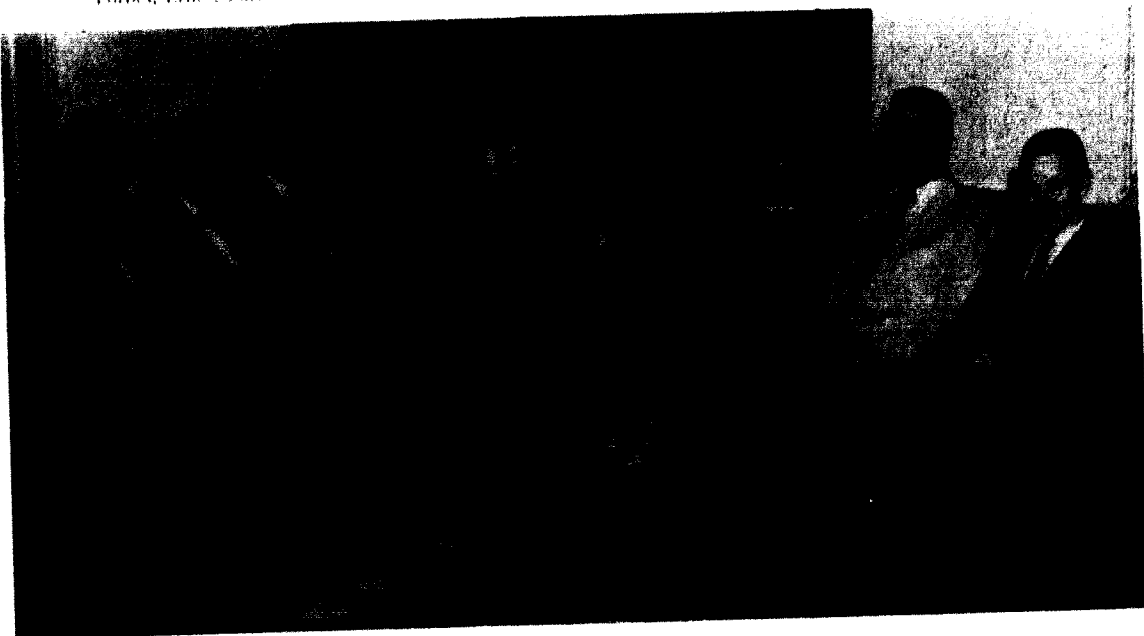

Promoting sorority activities and cooperation is the purpose of Senior Panhellenic. The members of the Council are from the three national sororities on campus.

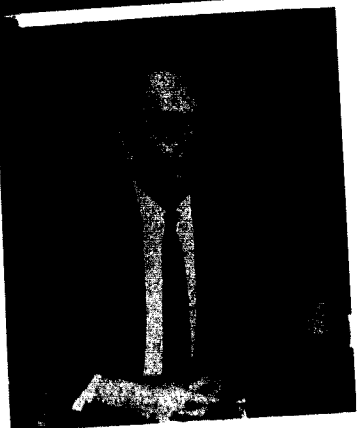
Planning a Panhellenic Workshop and ironing out problems of the New Dormitory have kept this group busy.

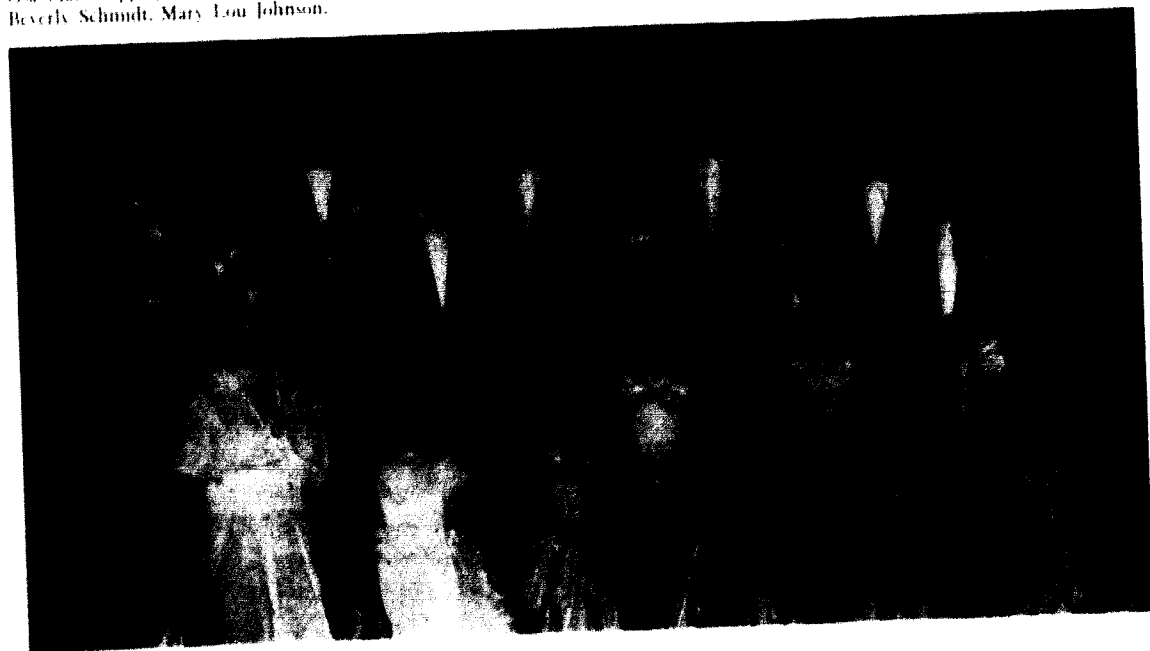

quiem was given for the Easter Vespers.

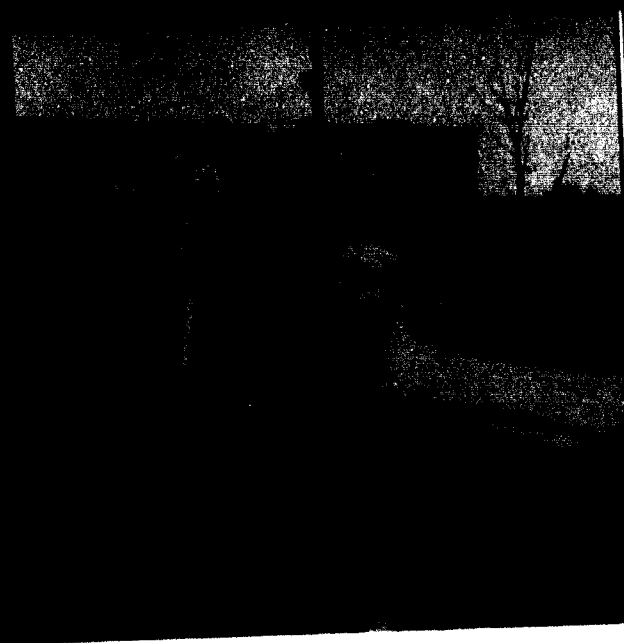

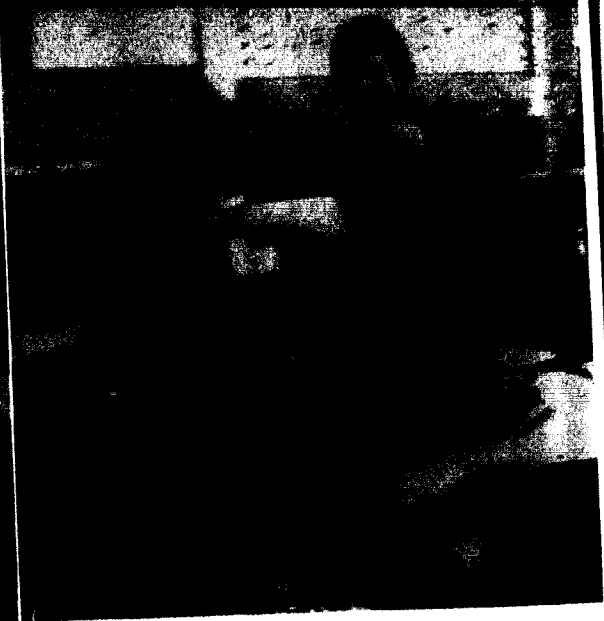

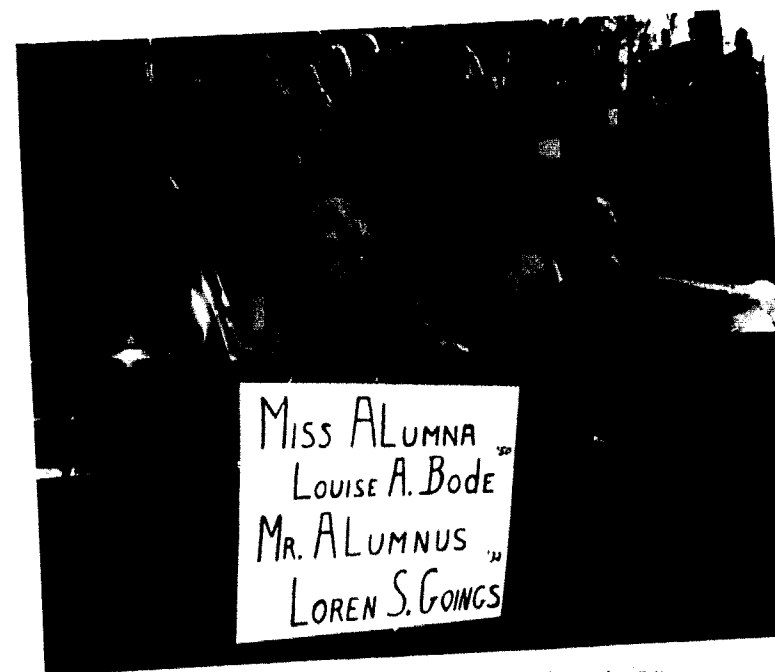

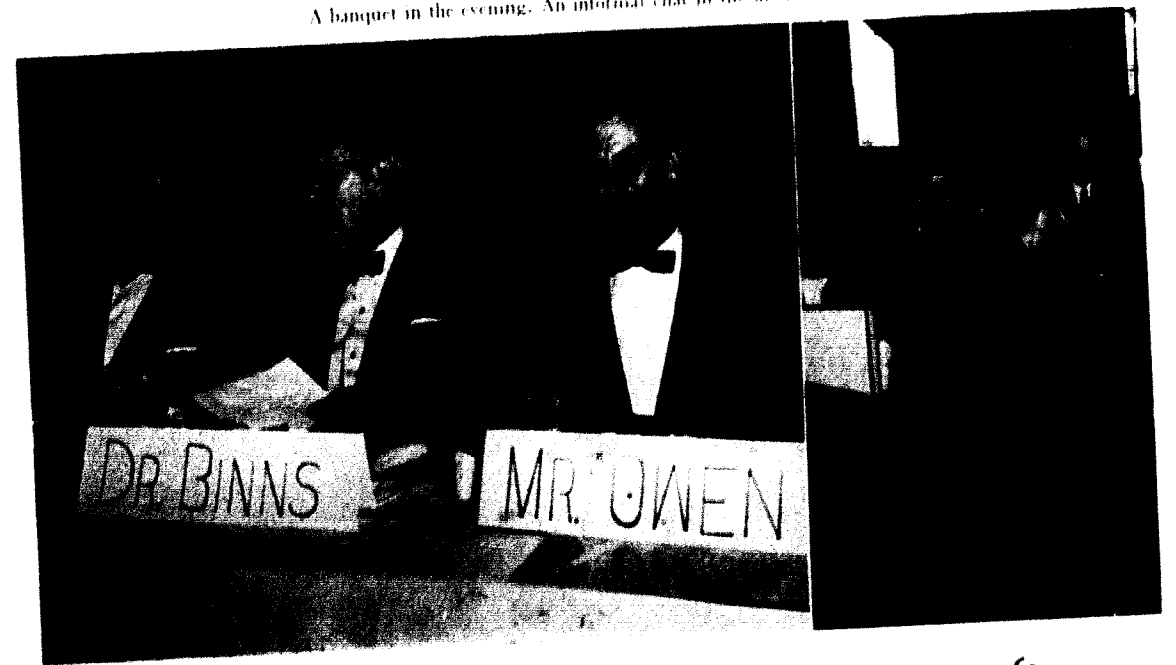
Achievement Day

at the evening banquet.

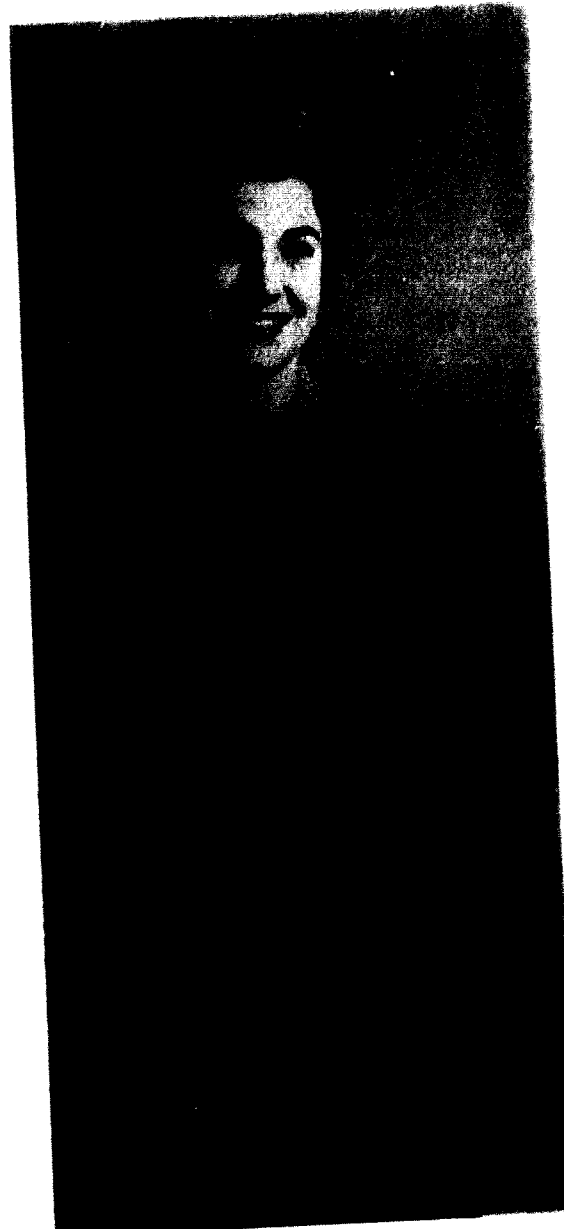

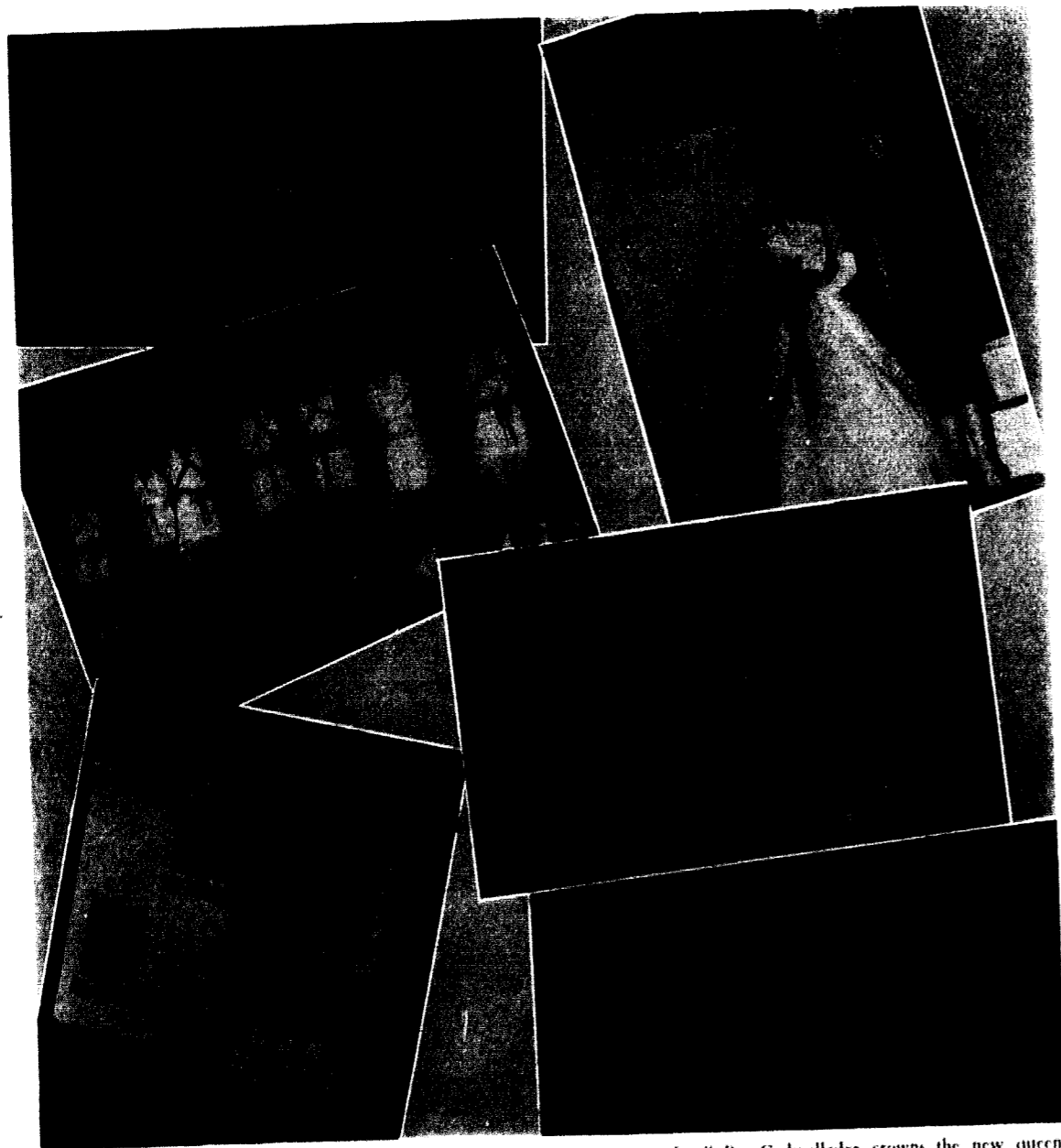

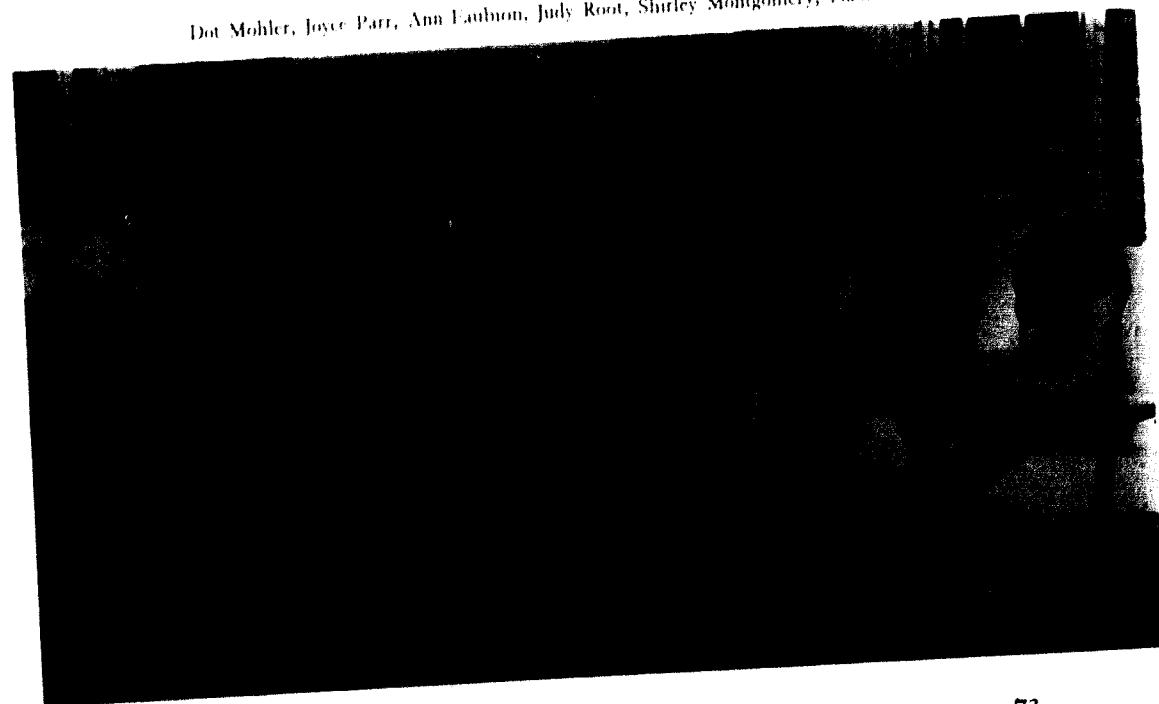

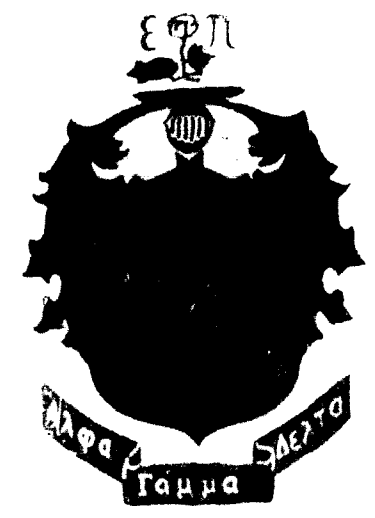
More sorority activities included the beautiful fall formal, "Snowflake Fantasy," pinning serenades, the traditional spaghetti supper by the pledges for

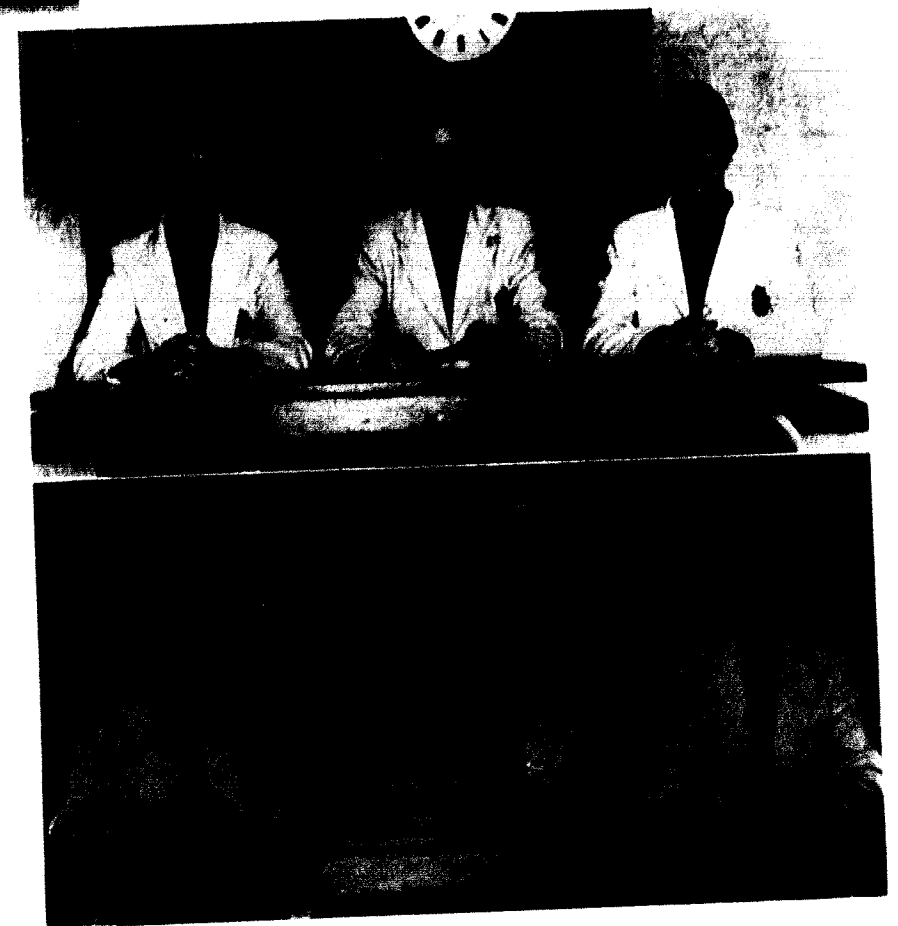

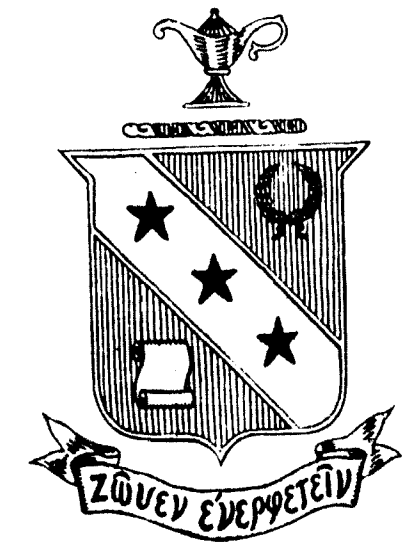

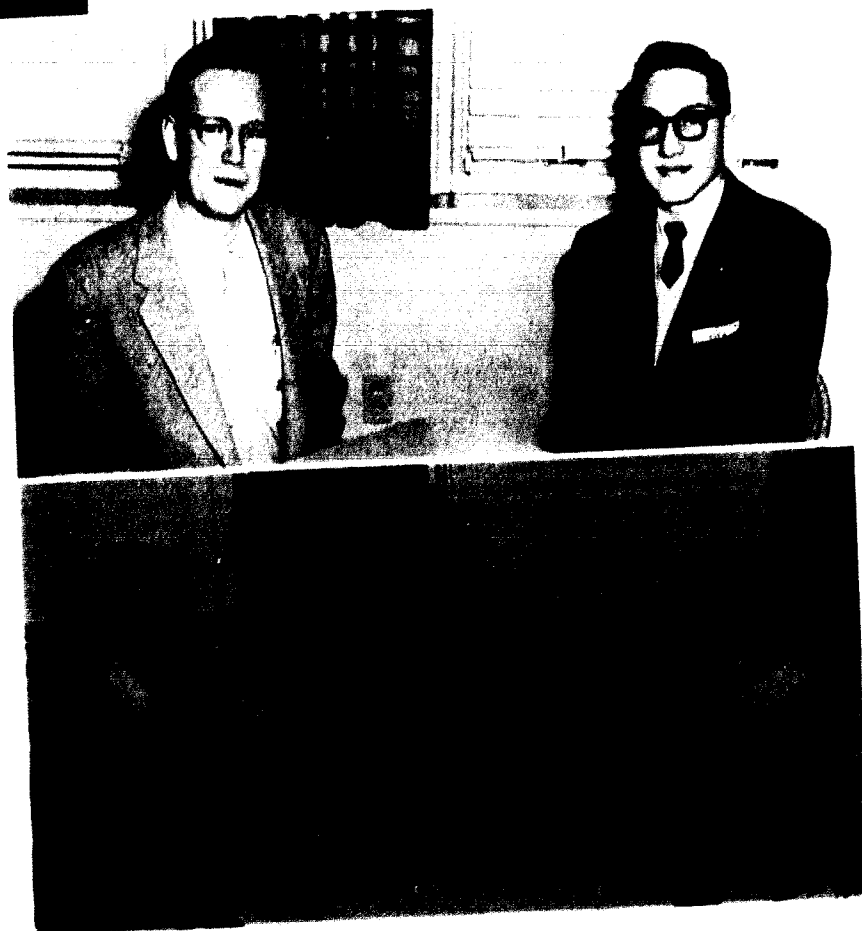
Independent Students' Association

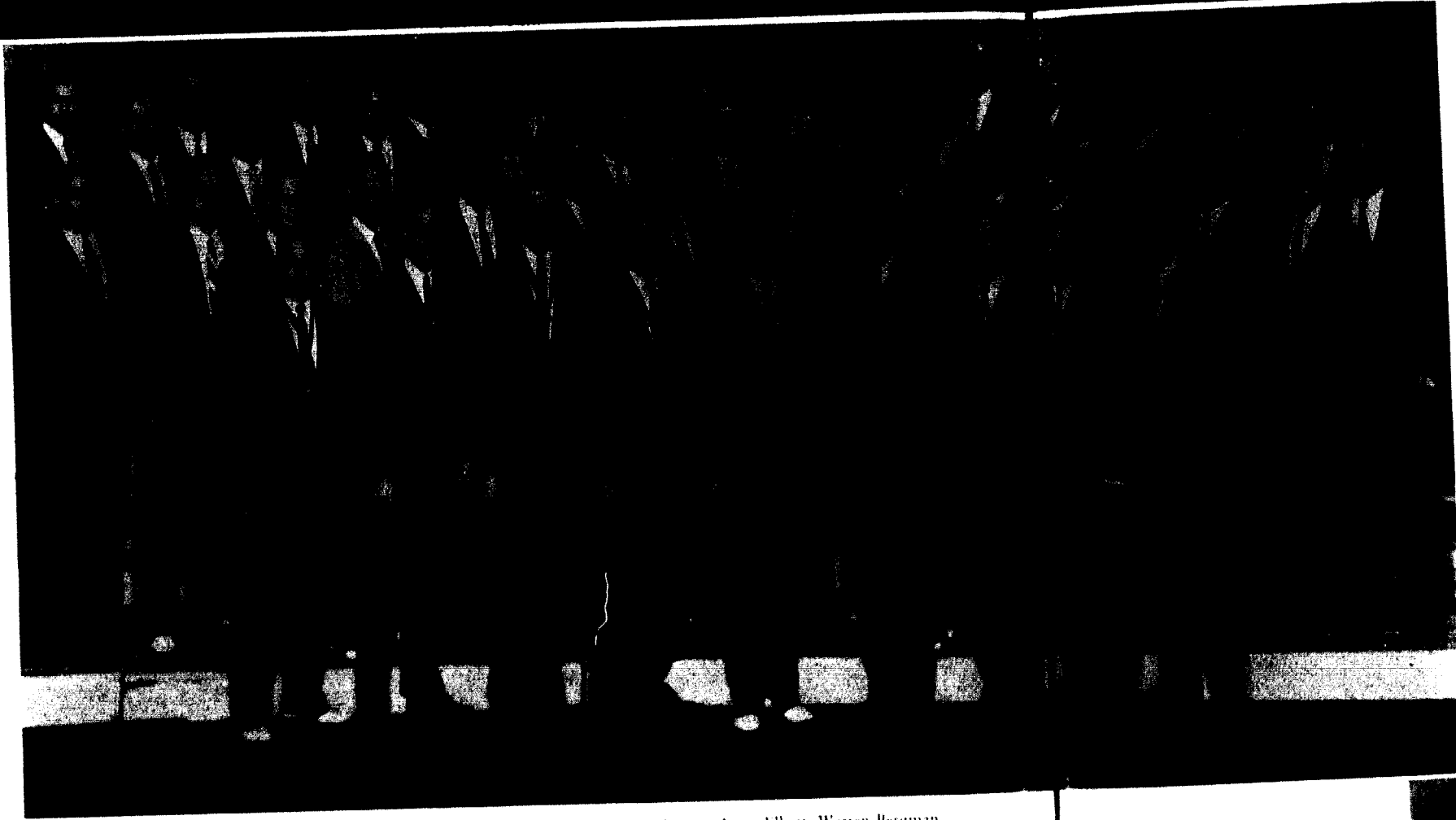

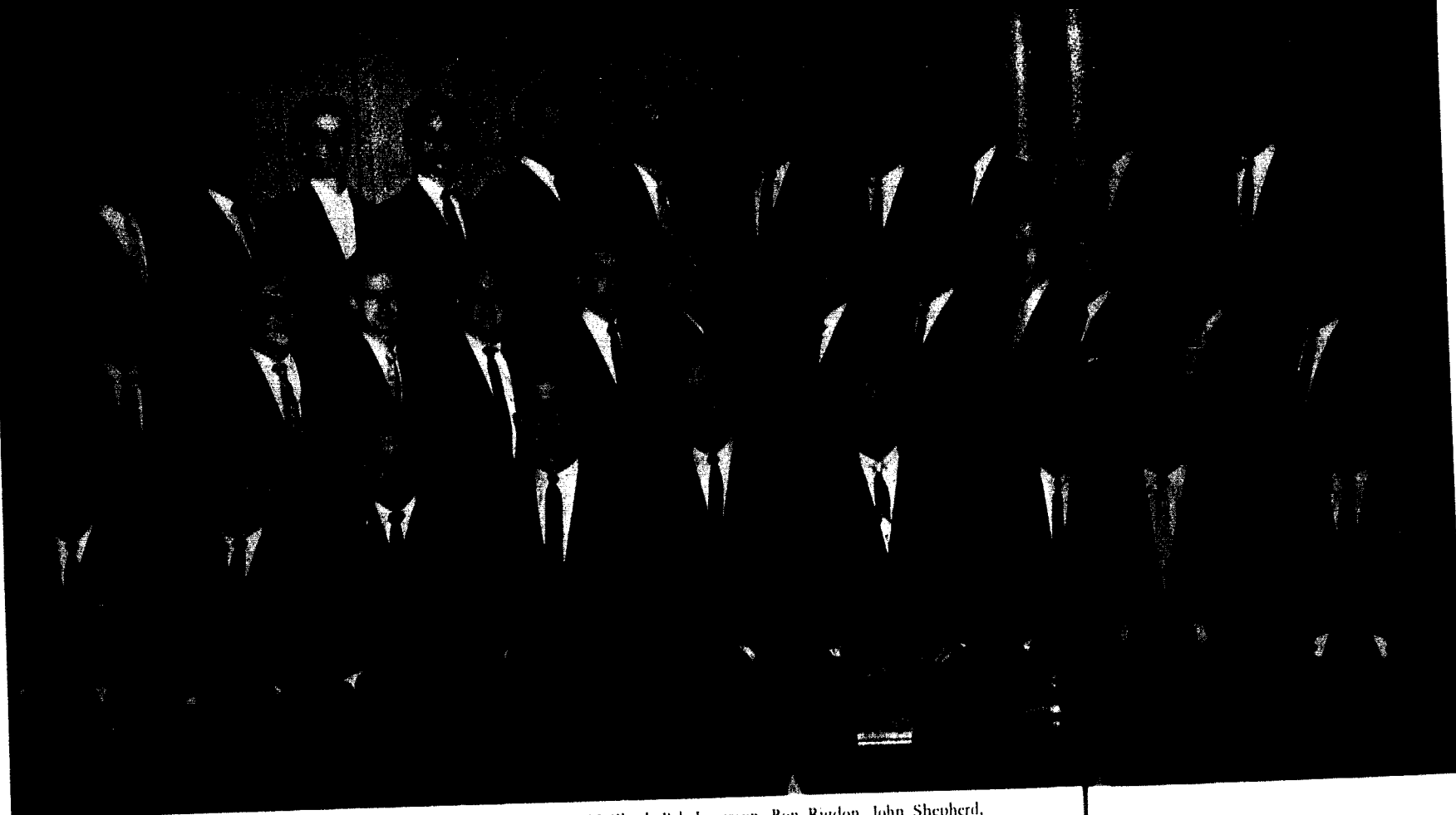

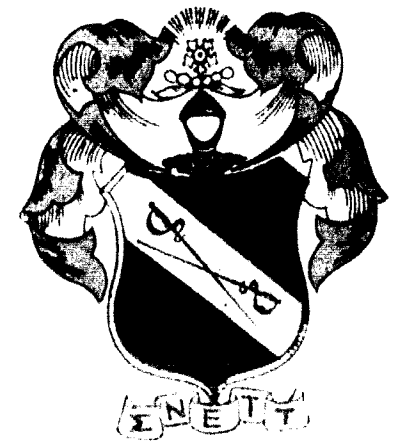
usual, and we're sure everyone will remember it for the years to come.

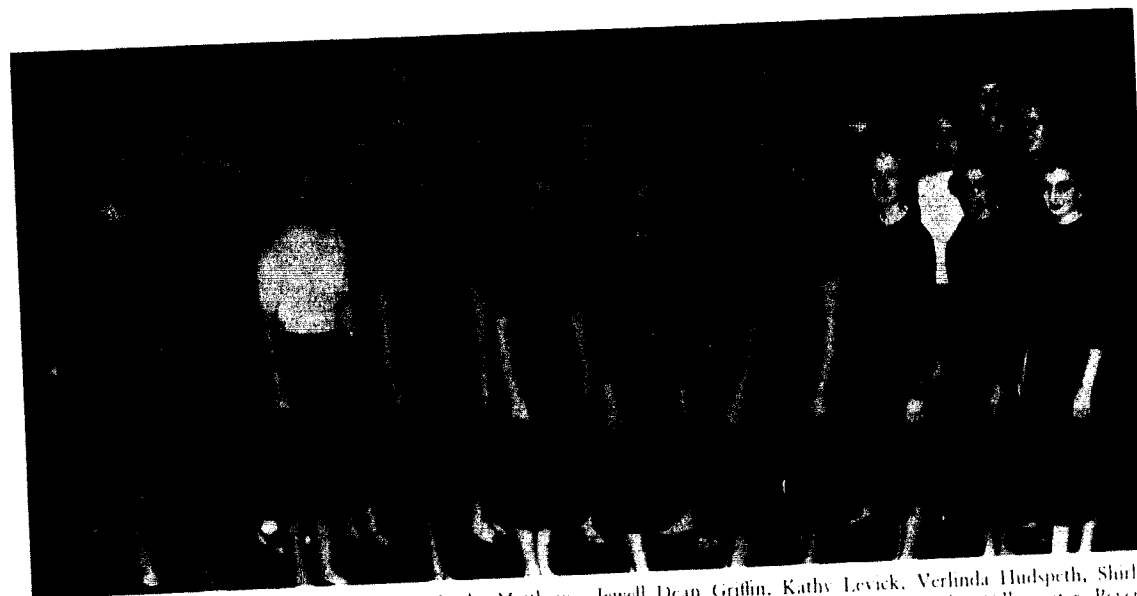
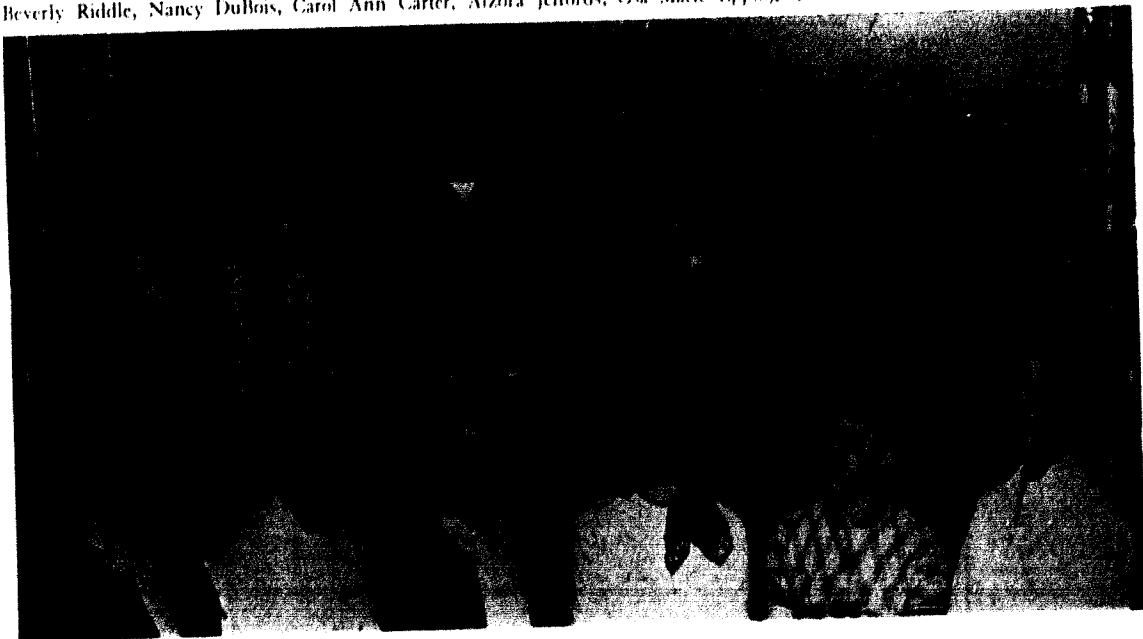
Baptist Student Movement

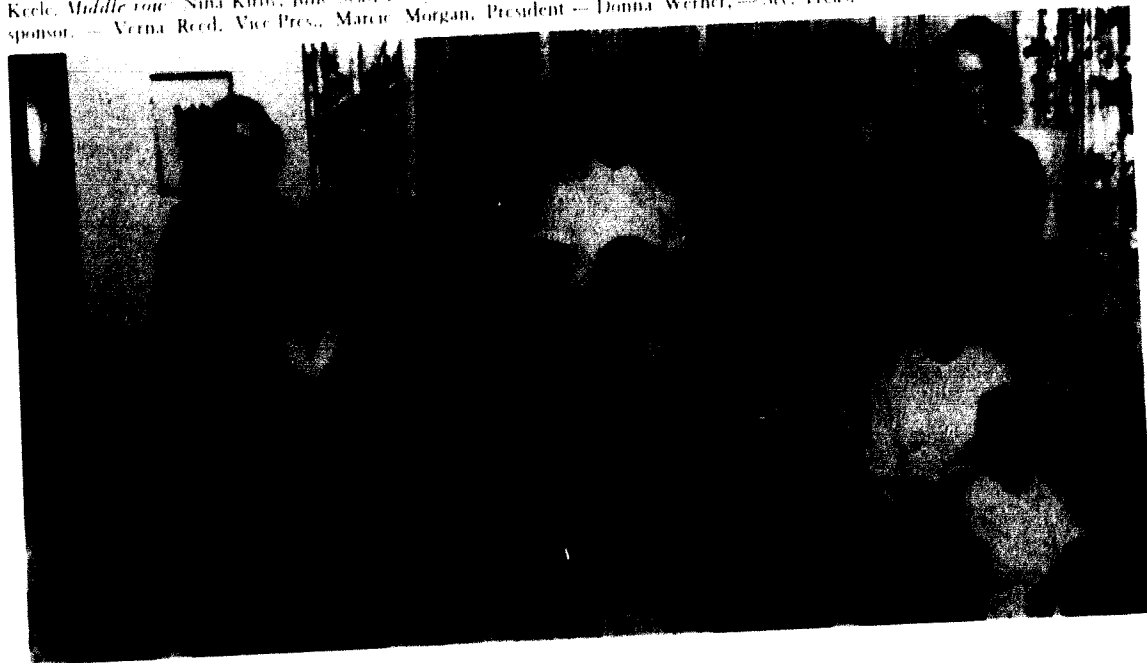
Epsilon Omega Pi

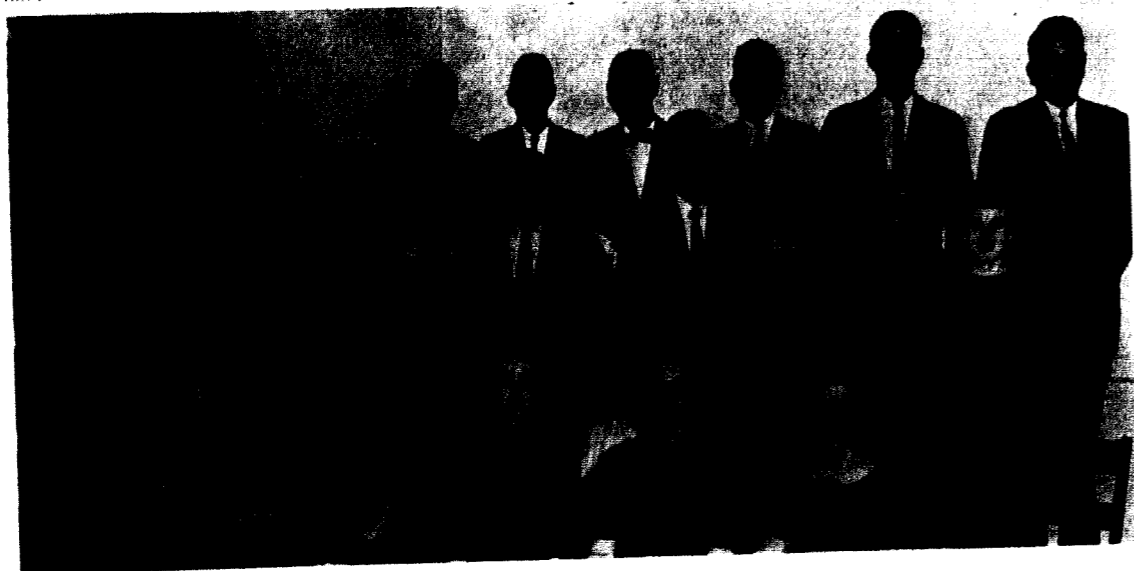

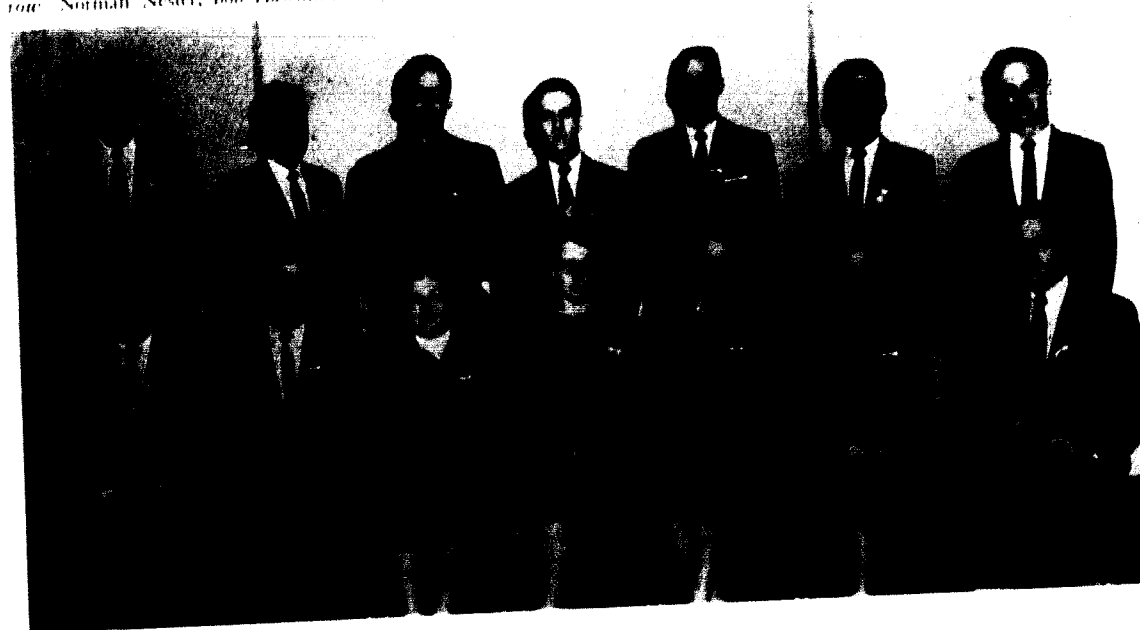

Phi Sigma Iota

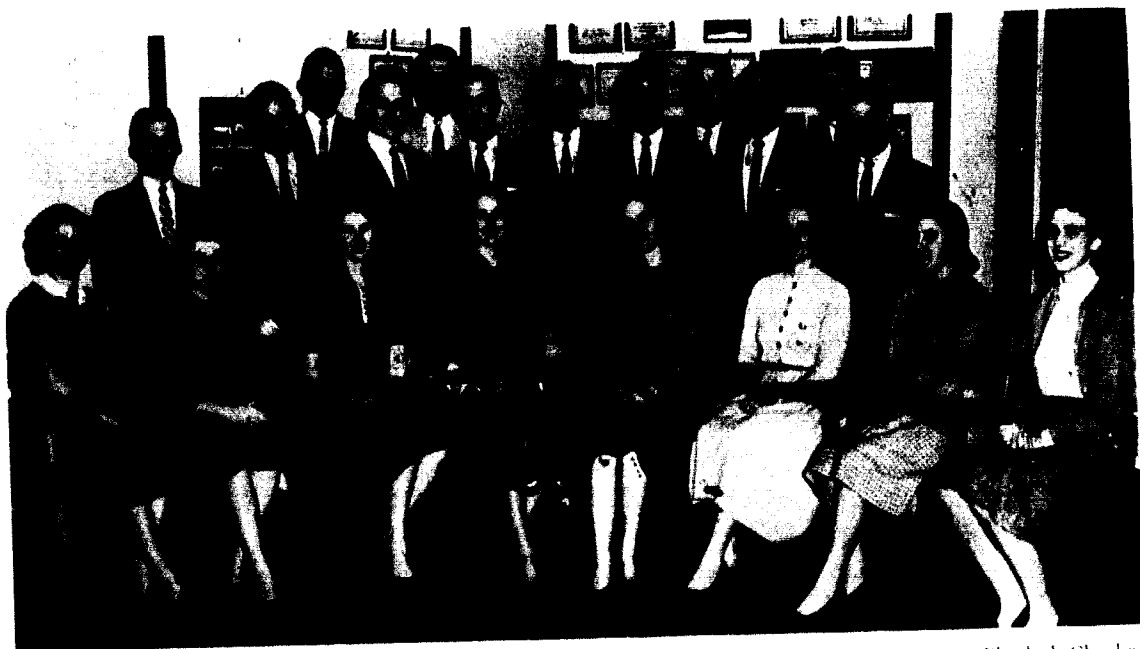

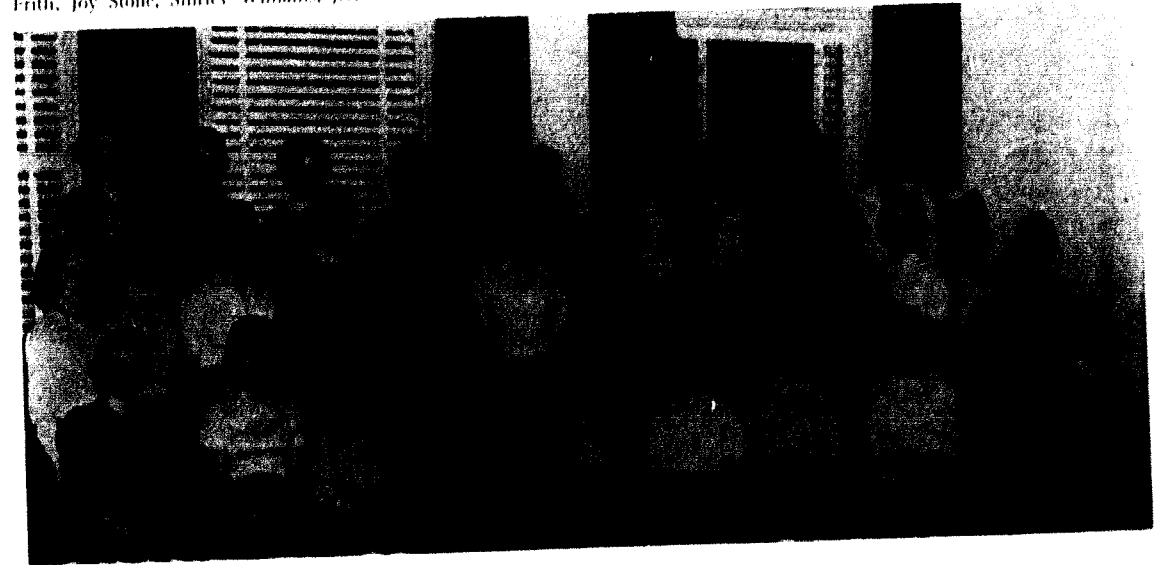
Woman's Athletic Ass'n

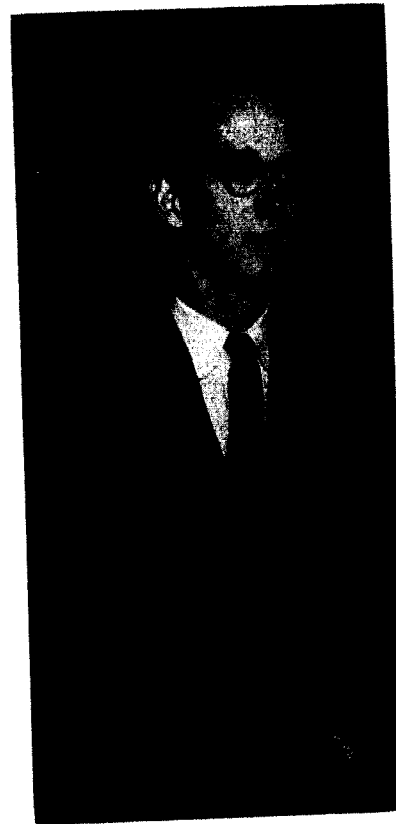
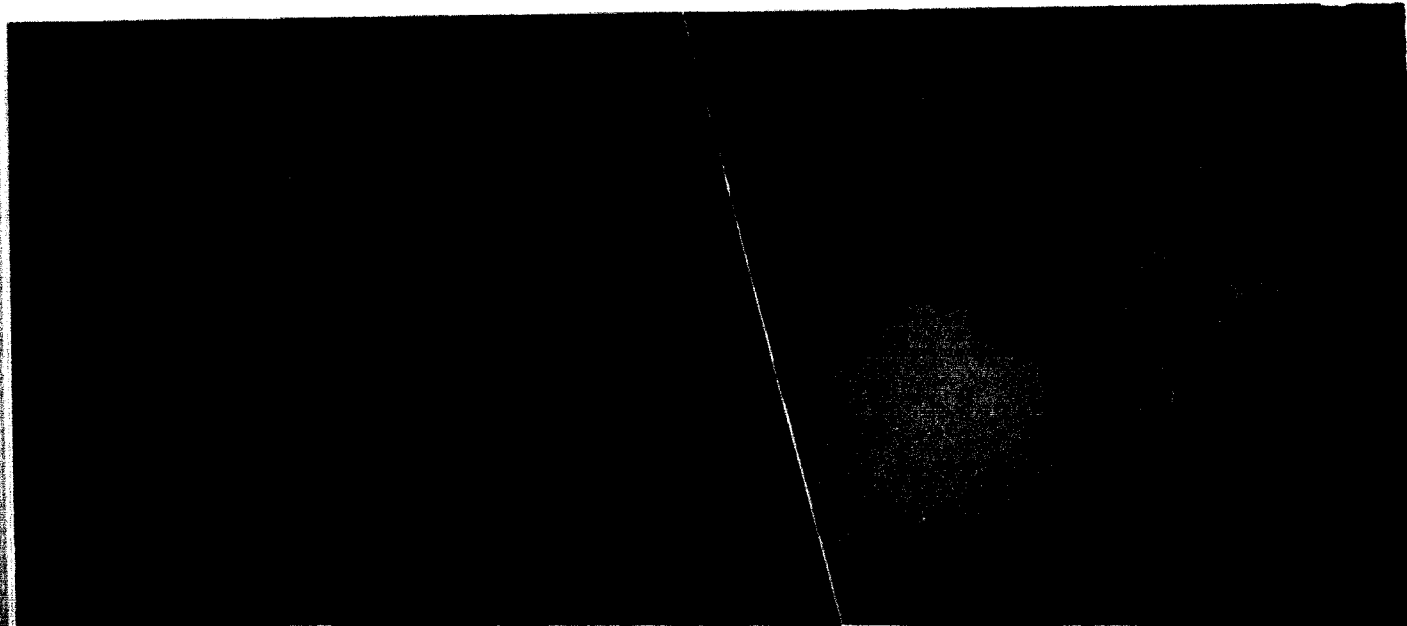

Colonel Alexander Doniphan

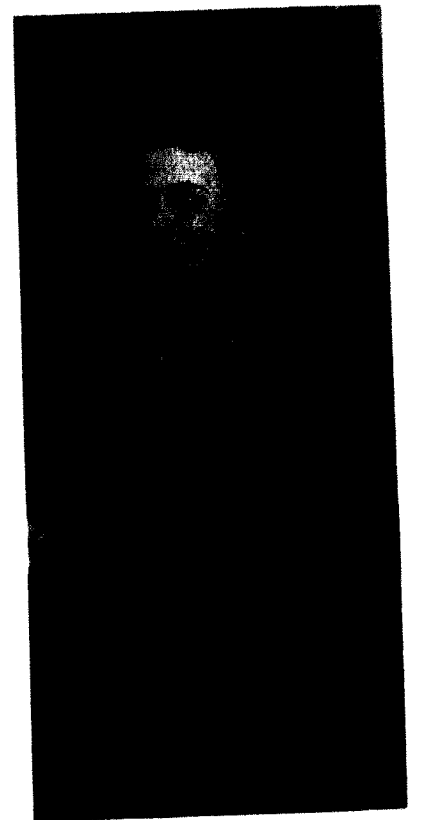

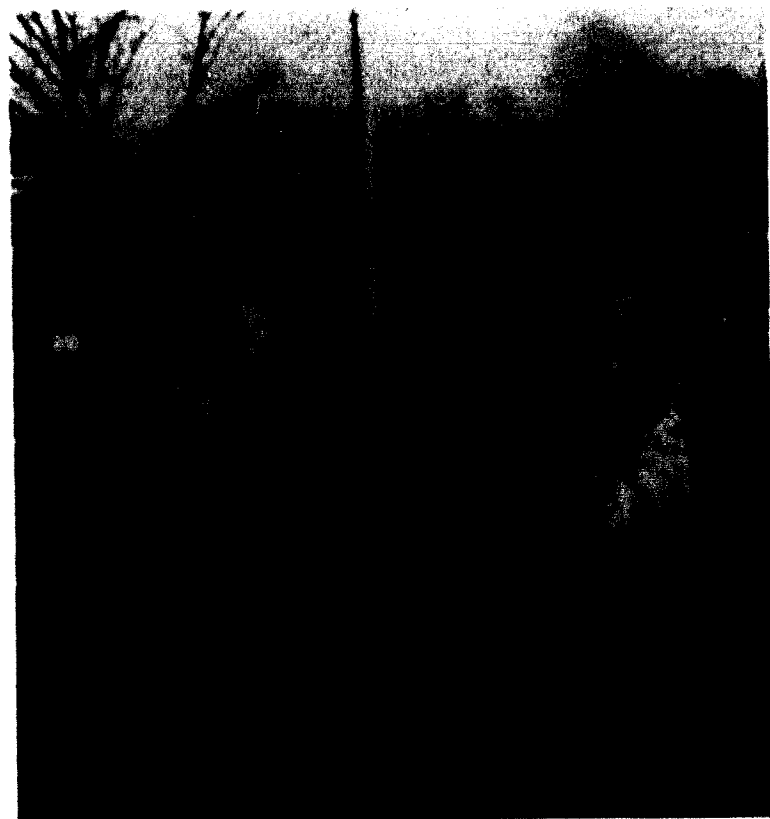




Bob Hawkins carrying the ball for Jewell.

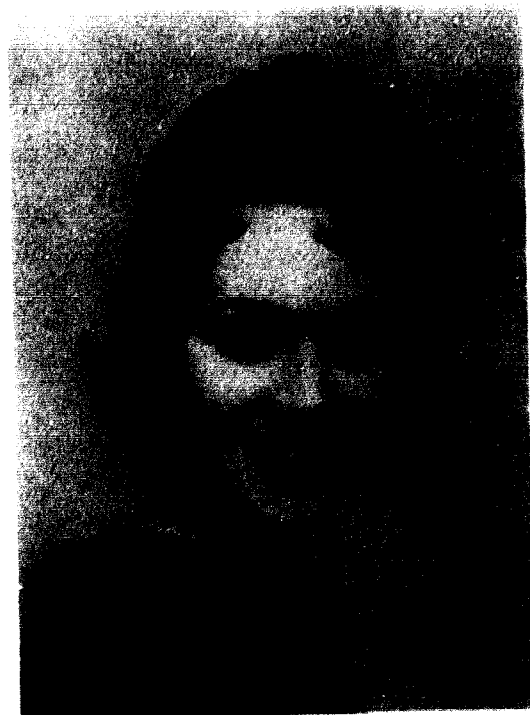
