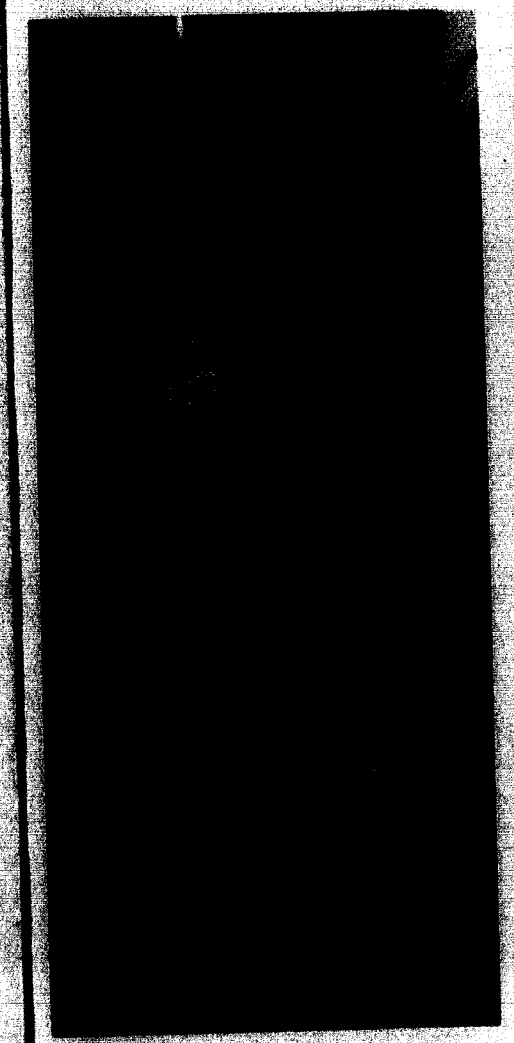
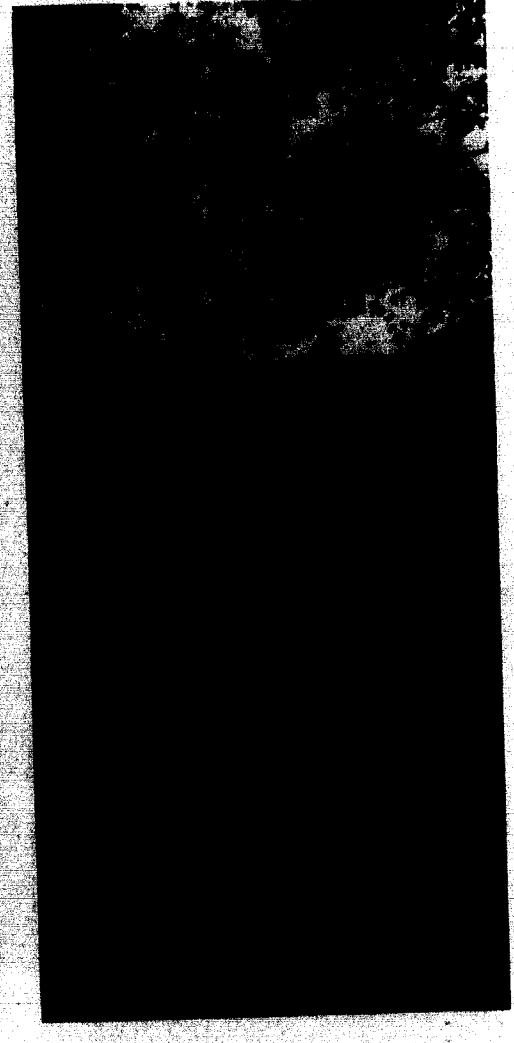


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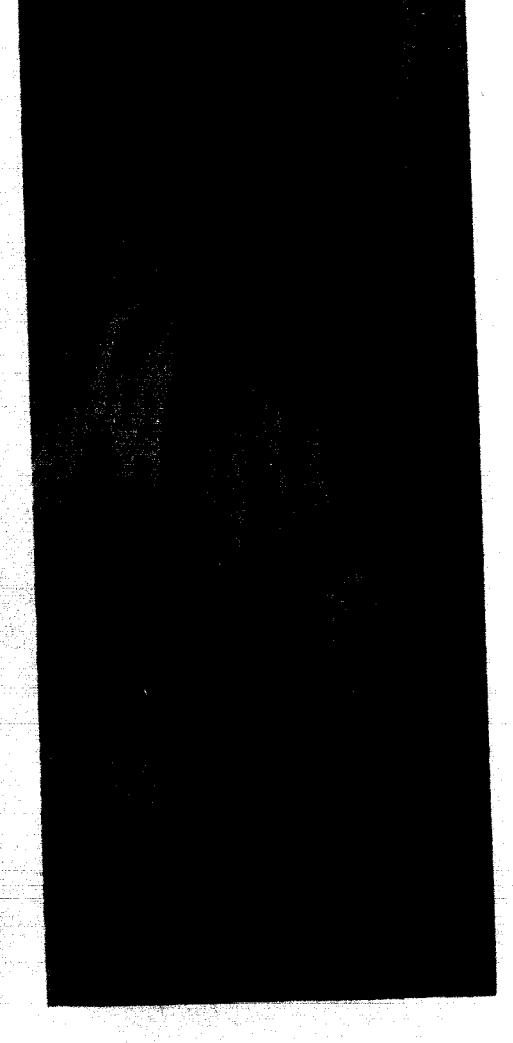

Jewell Hall, the oldest building on campus, symbolizes continuing awareness that makes William Jewell part of an ever expanding world.

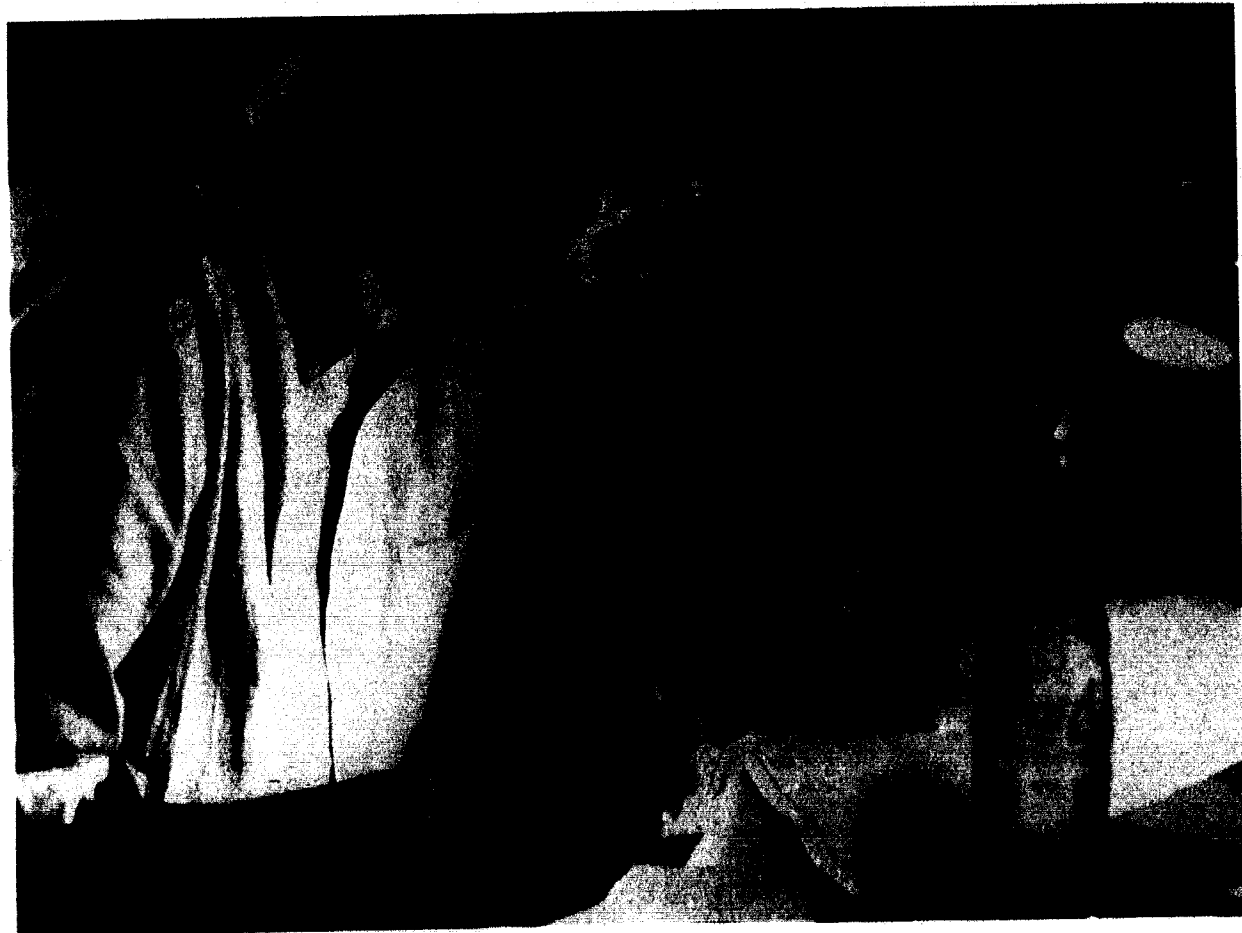

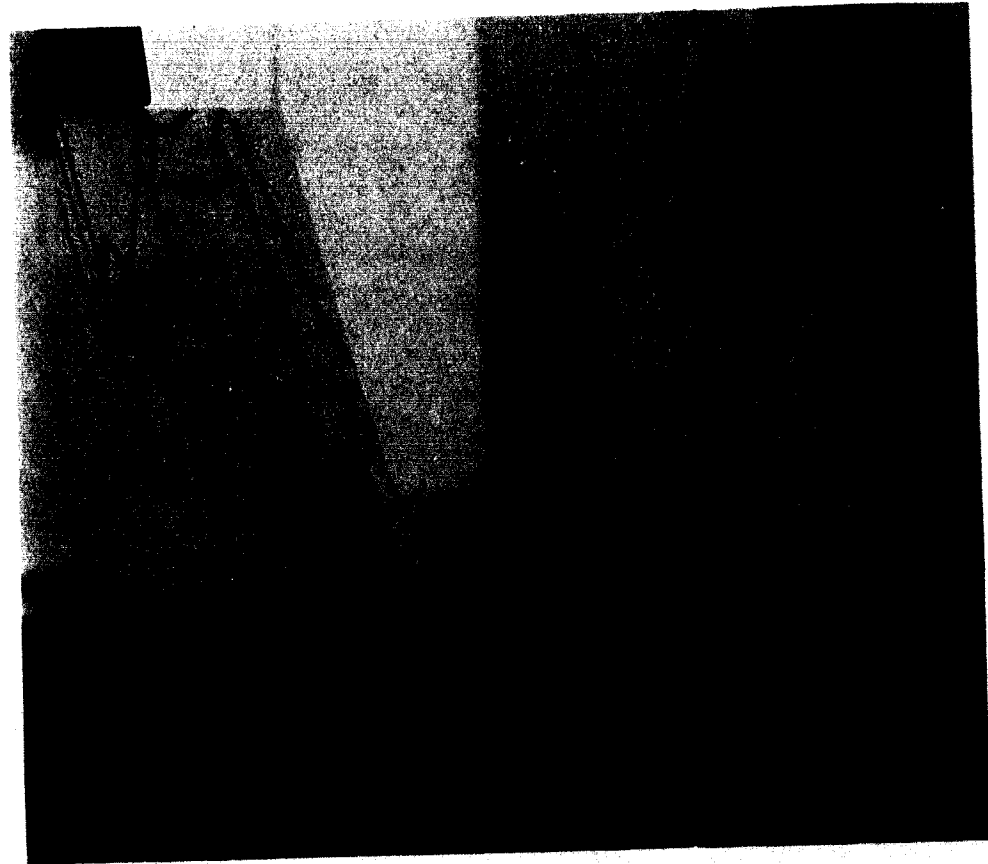

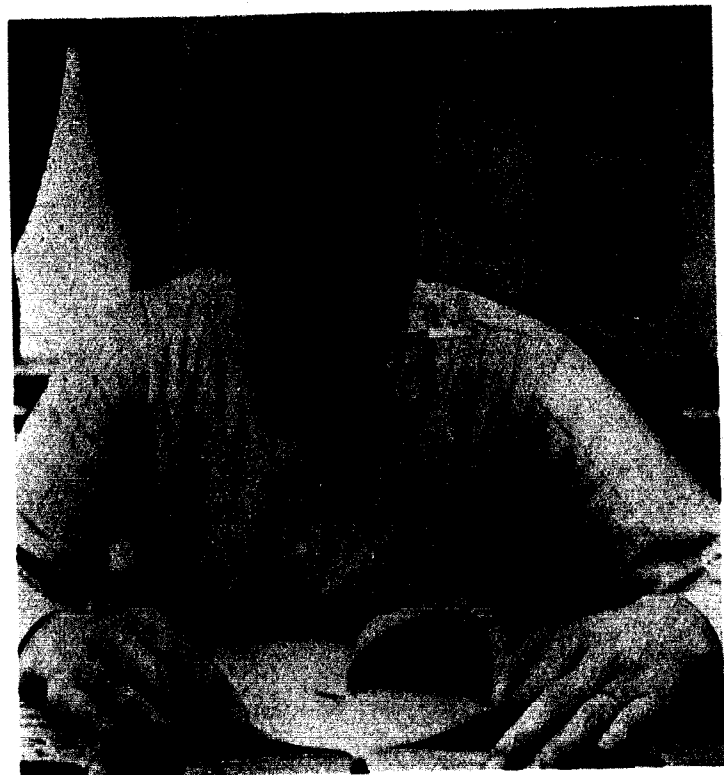

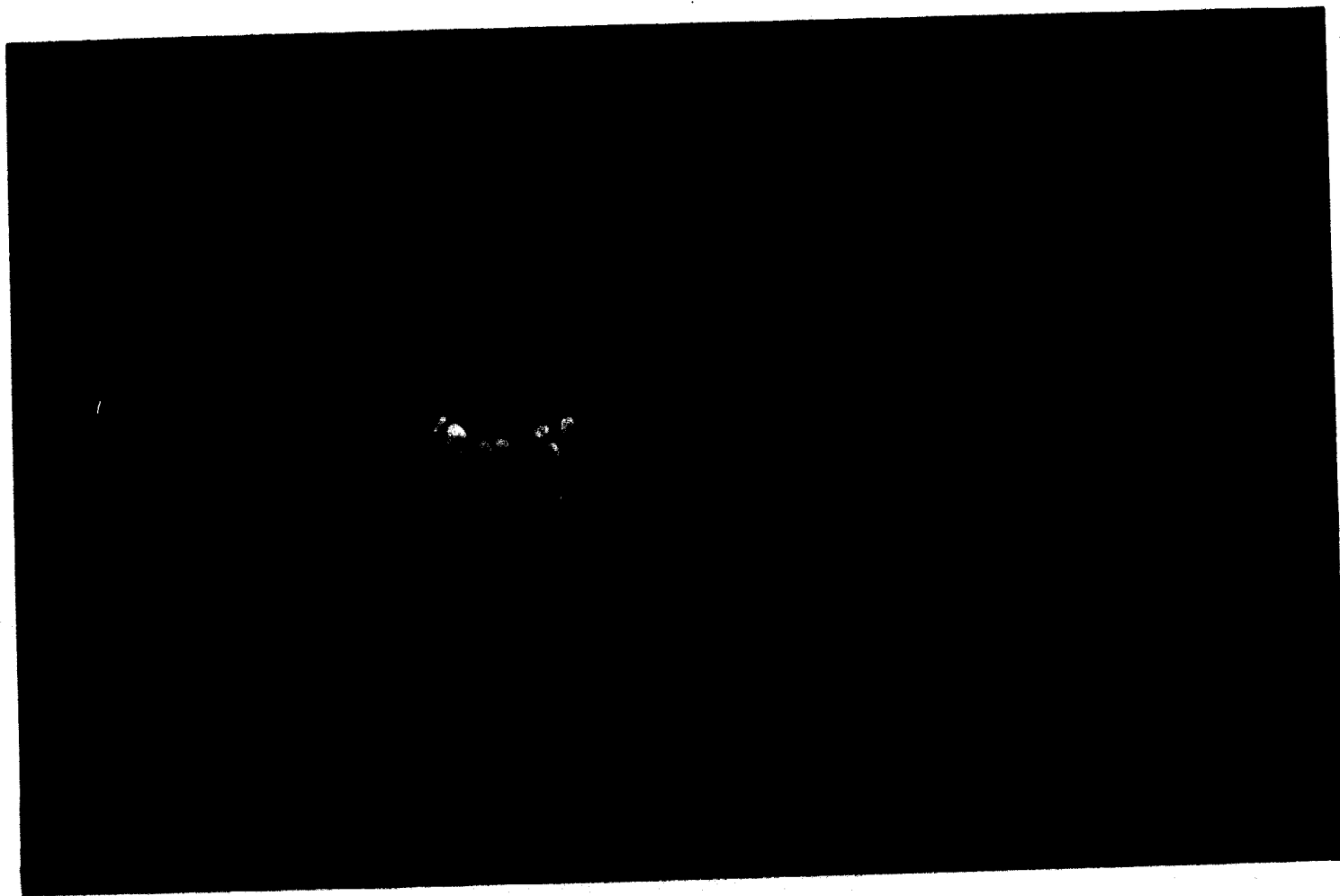

Following her address, citations of

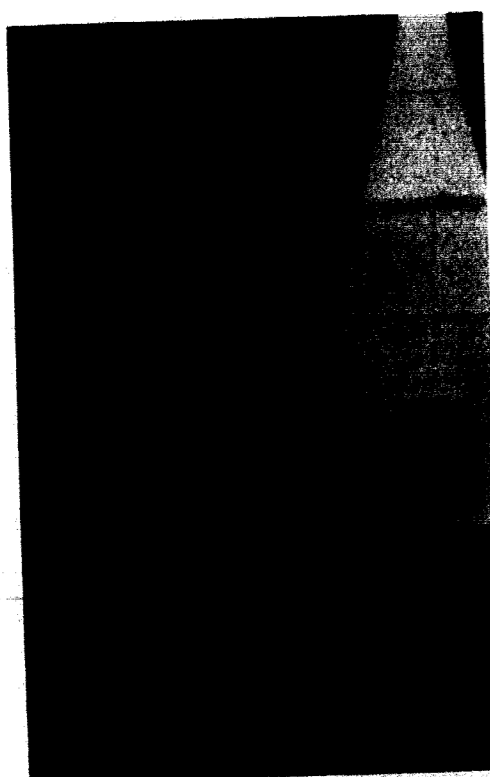

Students were given the opportunity to meet and talk personally with the alumni at a mixer in the afternoon.

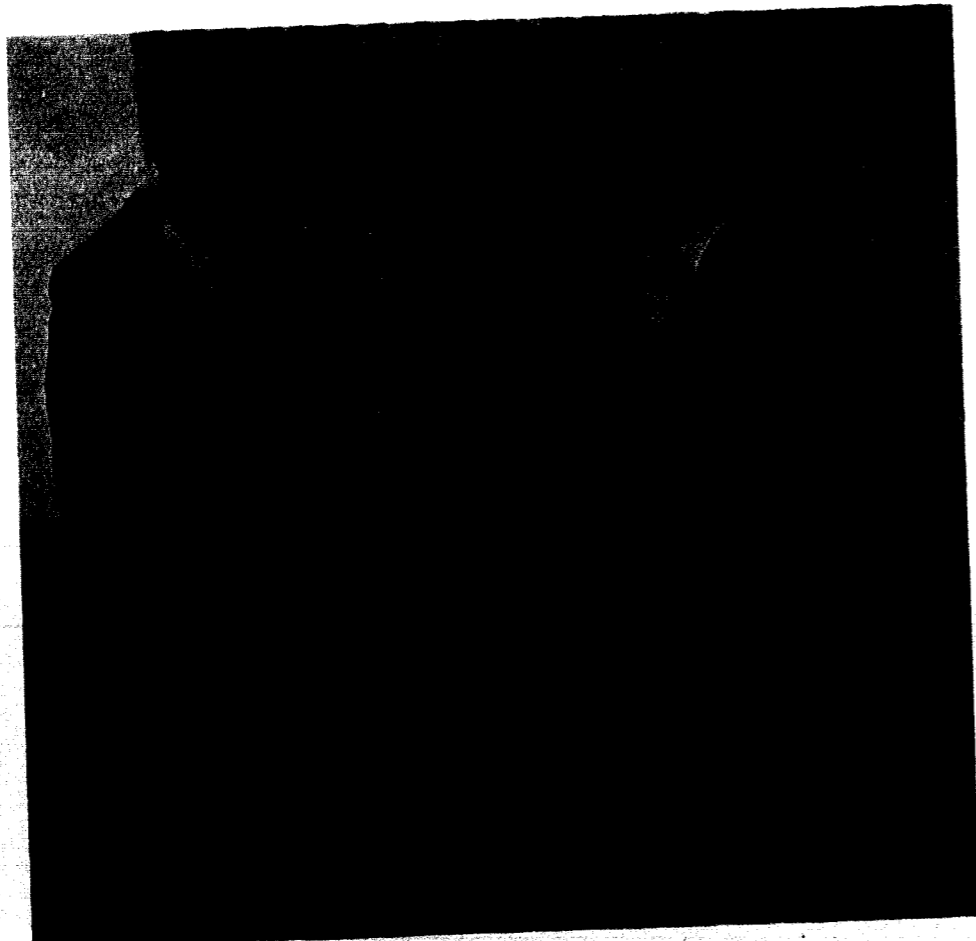
In the evening, a dinner was held at the Hotel Muehlebach in Kansas City. In conclusion to a busy day, Madame Pandit gave a final address.



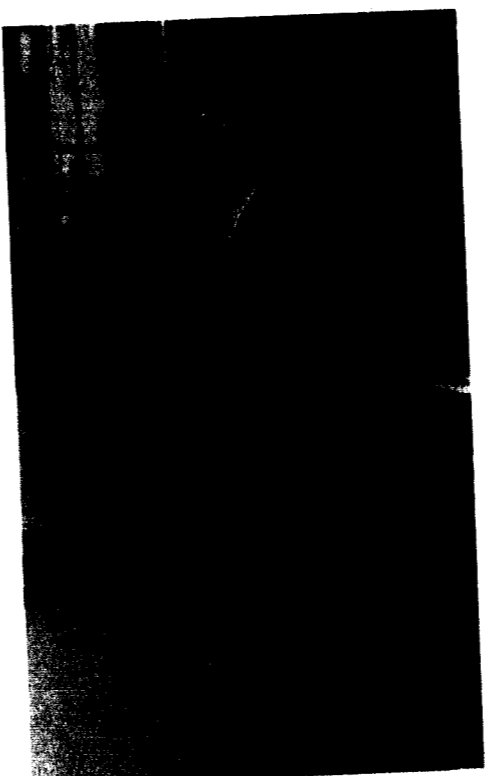

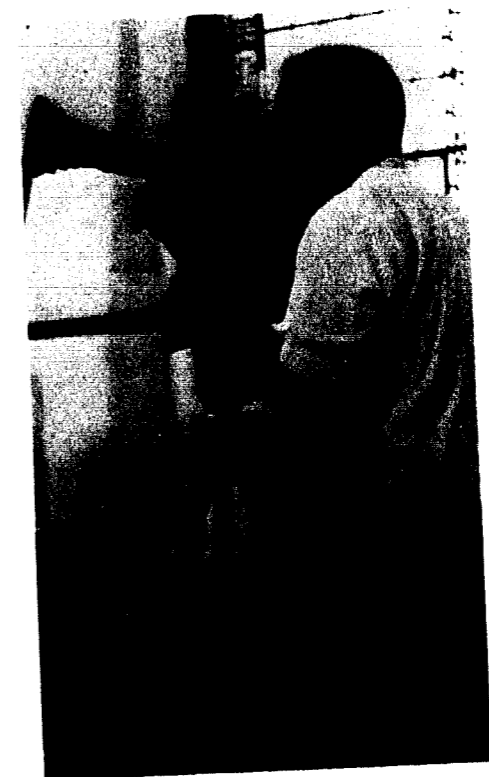

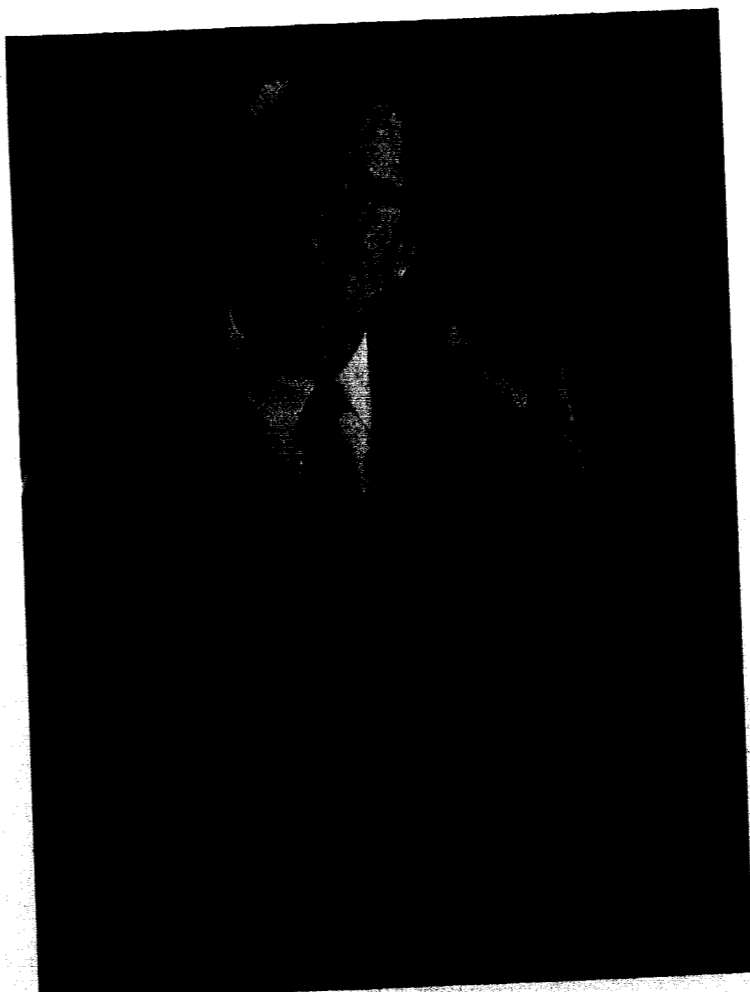

## Responsibility for World Citizenship Guided Chapel

Liberal arts institutions often feel that they can isolate themselves from the real world, contriving an artificial one for their purposes. There are others that try to stimulate their students to responsible world citizenship through inquiry and action. This is the philosophy that guided the chapel events during the 1968-69 academic year.

During the campaigns of 1968, the first semester chapel convocations followed the theme "Political Action and Liberal Arts." Speakers for the three political parties included Congressman William Hull, Jr., Missouri Democrat; Senator Frank Carlson, Republican from Kansas; and Mr. John Sutherland of the American Independent Party.

On election day, November 5, Dr. Tex Sample, Assistant Professor of Sociology of Religion, at St. Paul School of Theology in Kansas City showed that religion and politics can be mixed.

Other speakers confronted the campus with governmental and social responsibilities. Mr. Kenneth Worley, an AFL-CIO lecturer, defended the labor movement in his speech, "Labor: The Right to Strike."

State Department lecturers Mrs. Charlotte Moton Hubbard and Mr. Curtis Kamman explained the role of the United States in Southeast Asia. From the works and discussions with the poets of the Watts Writers Workshop, students encountered an awareness of poverty conditions in the United States.



"Religious Faith—Revolutionary or Reactionary" was the title of a four day lecture series by Dr. Carlyle Marney, director of Interpreter's House at Lake Janaluska, North Carolina.

This film was an American entry in the film festivals of Cannes and Vienna.

Other films shown this year included Ingmar Bergman's *Wild Strawberries*, a series of works by French directors, and *When Comedy Was King*.

Saturday evening Homecoming closed with the contemporary sounds of The Happenings.

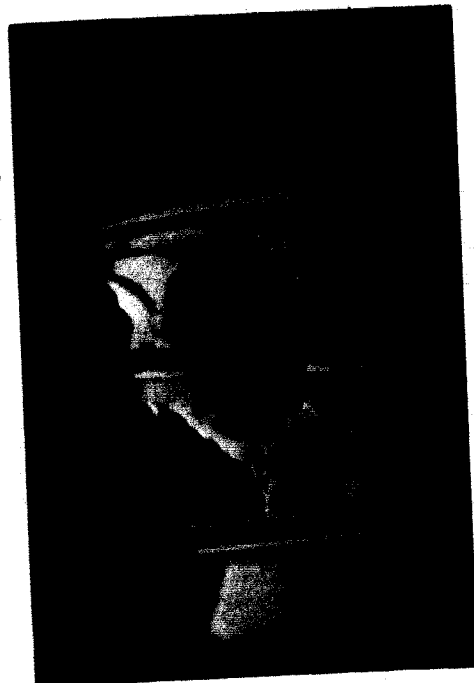

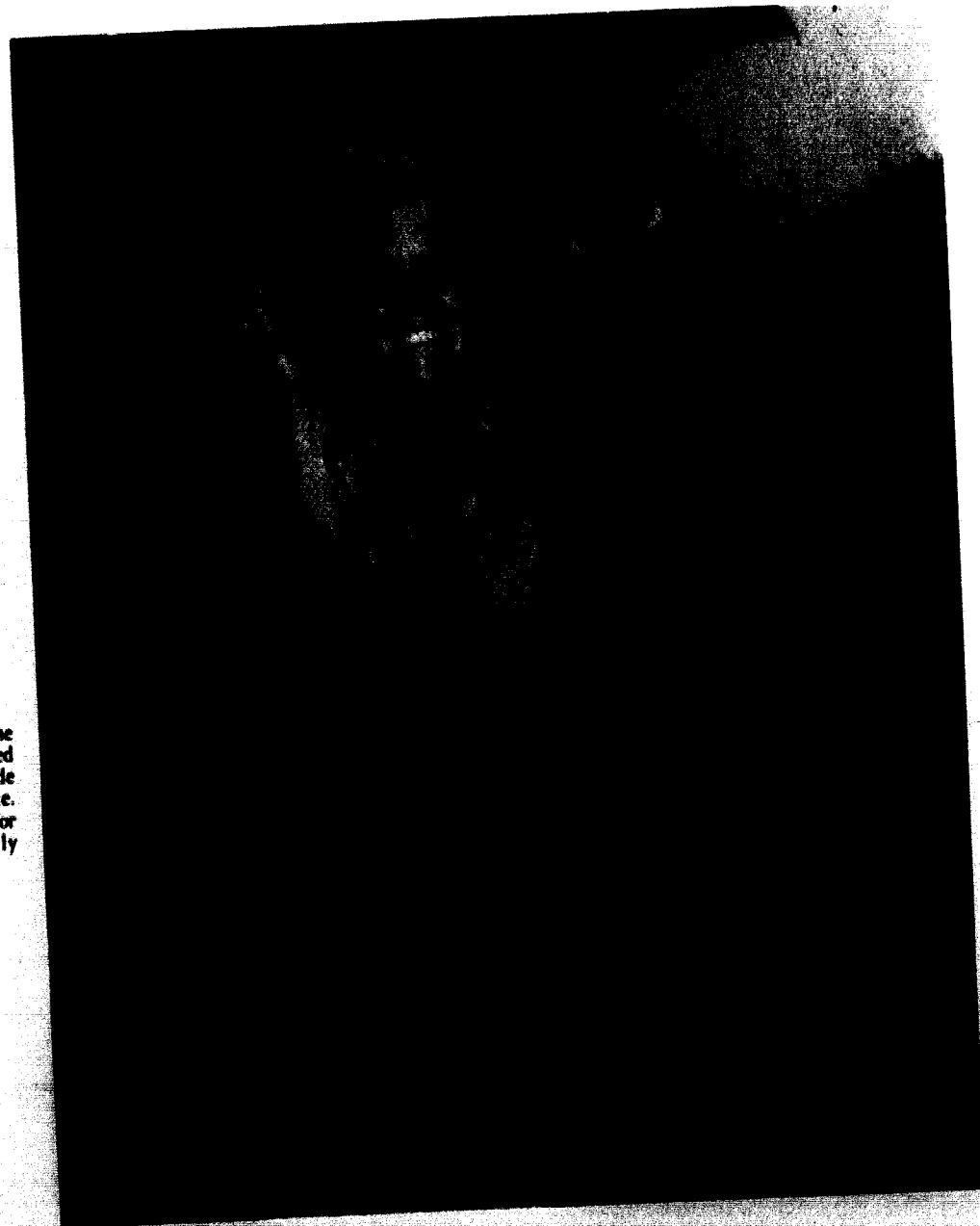

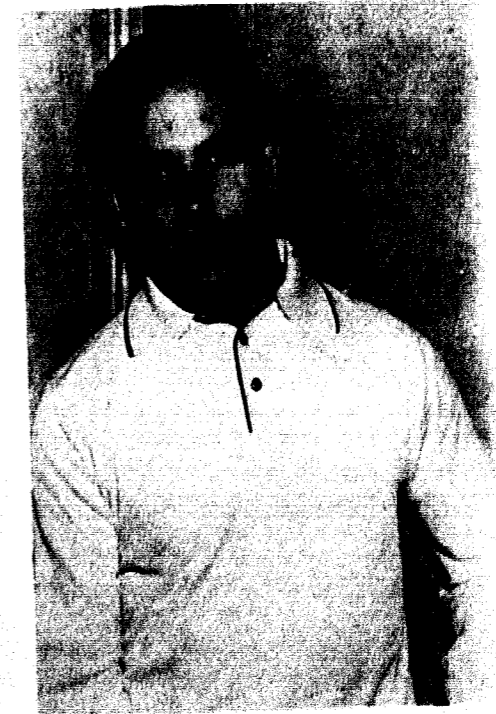

While competing for possession of Nome, Alaska, the ADPI's and SNs won second place with their *The First Cold War* or... *Hello Folly*.

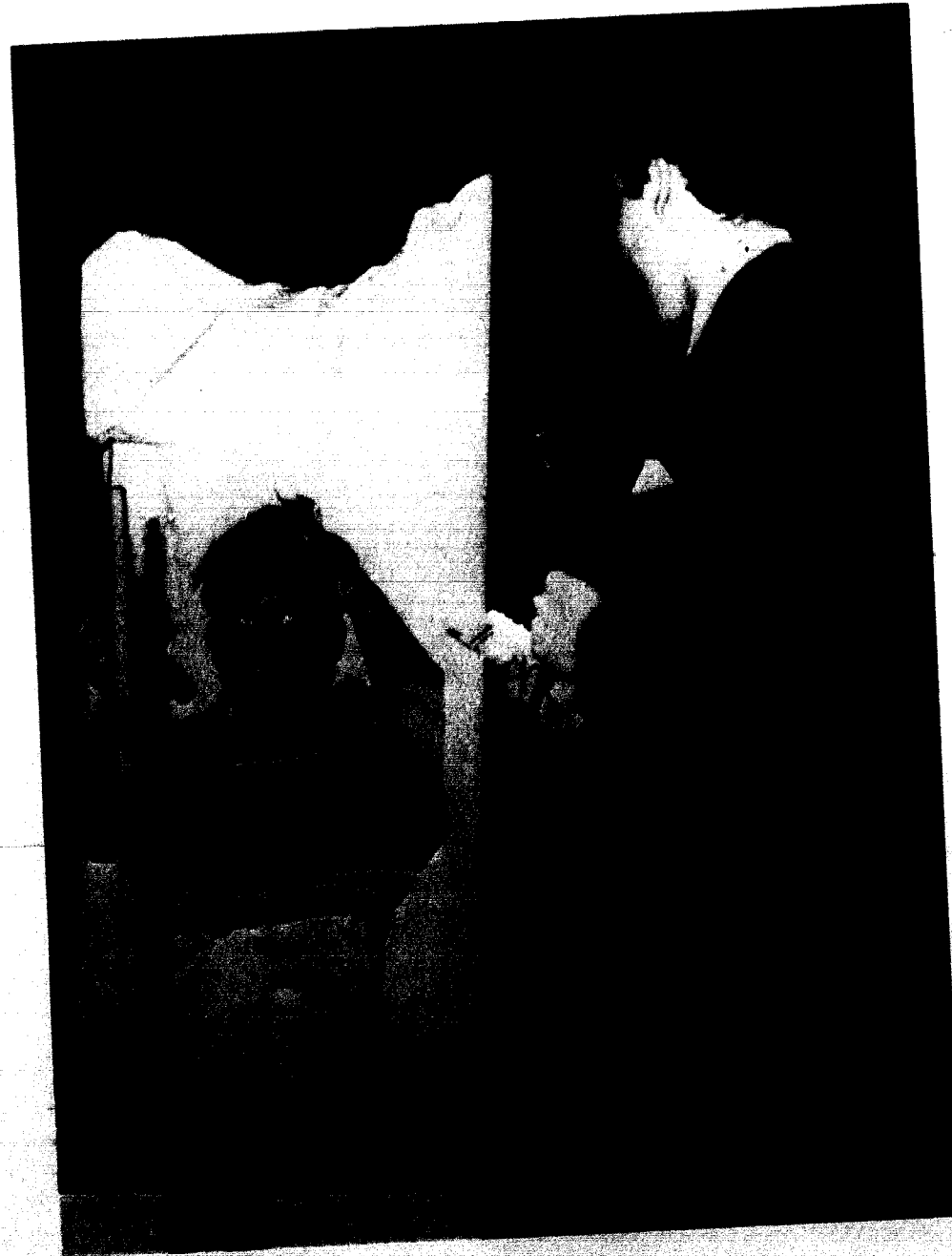

Joining hands in the *Age of Aquarius* brought the ZTA-LCA skit to a dramatic close.

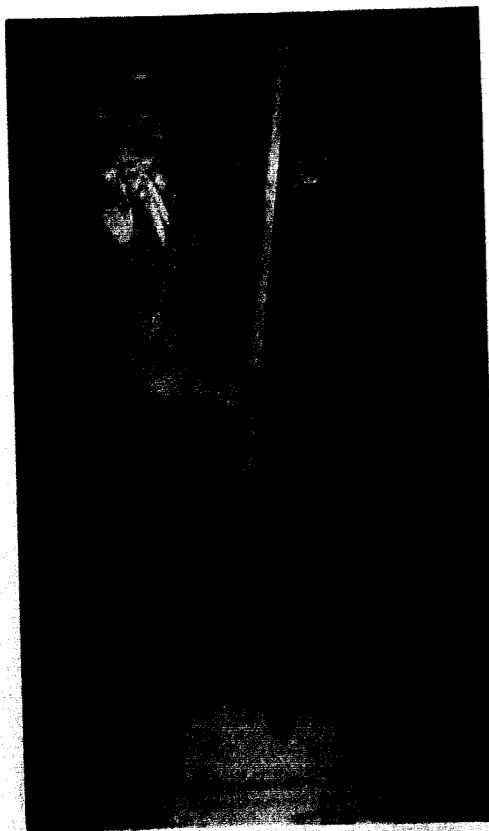

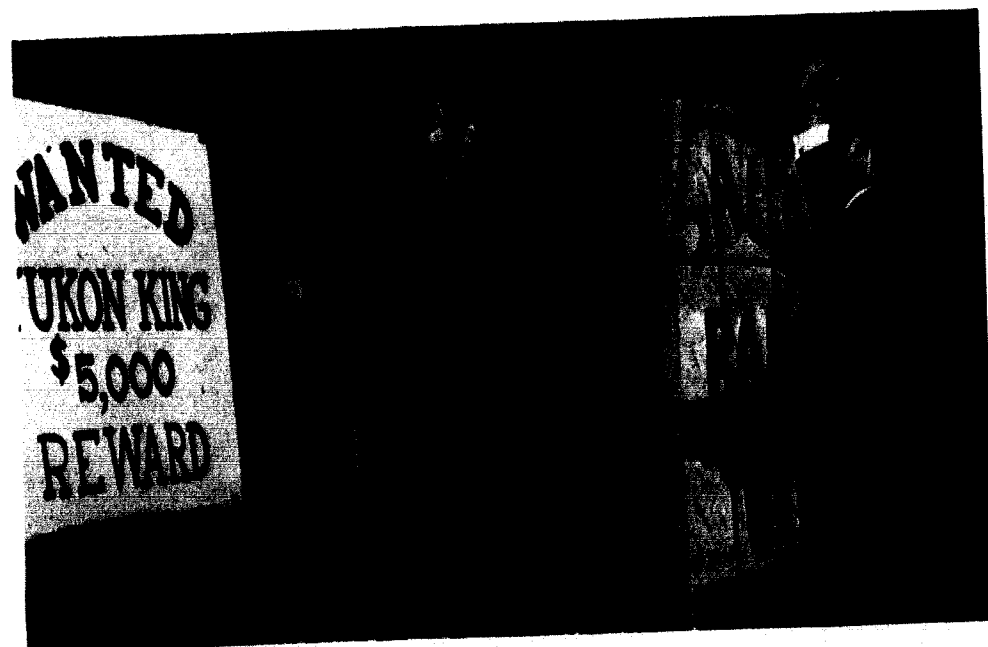

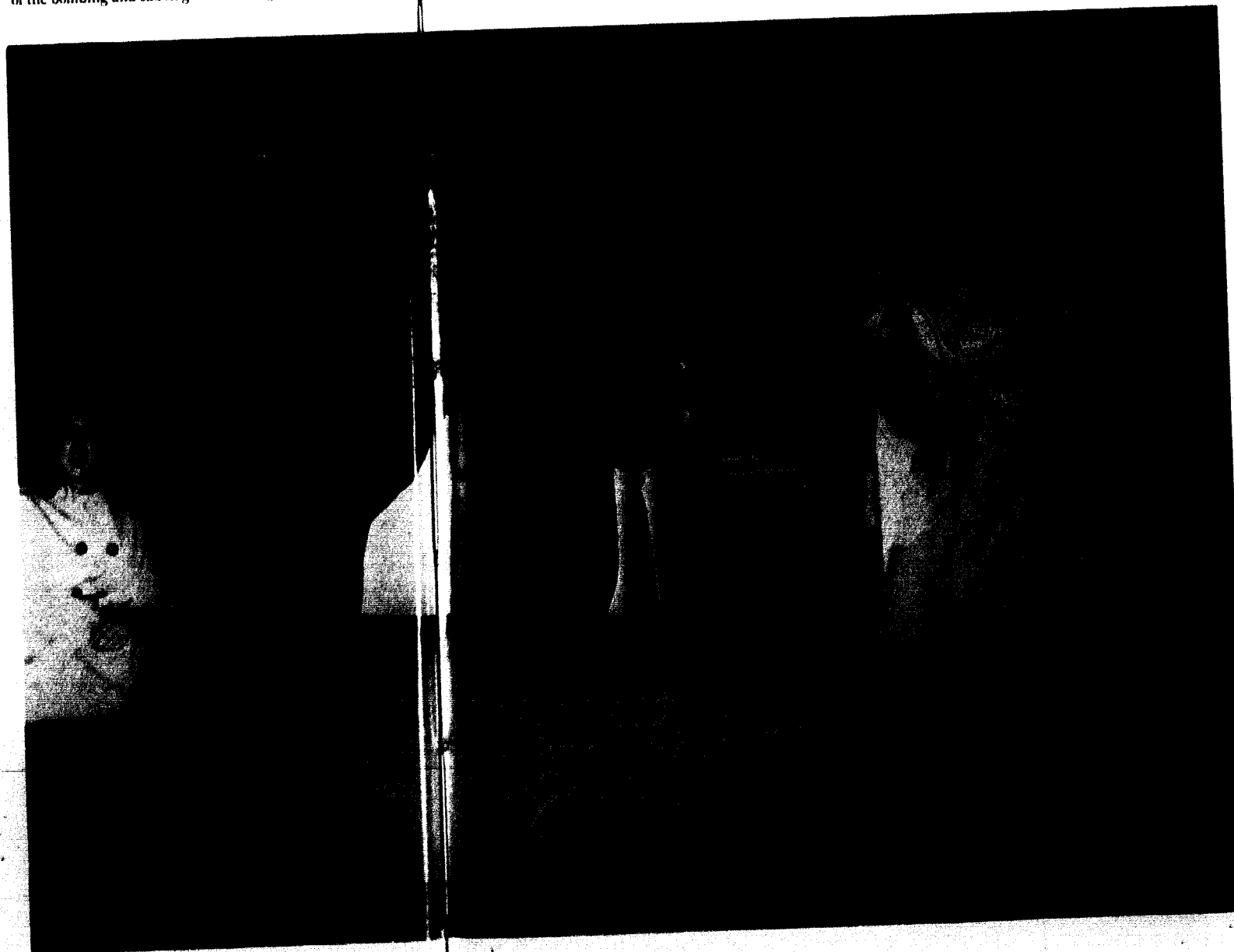

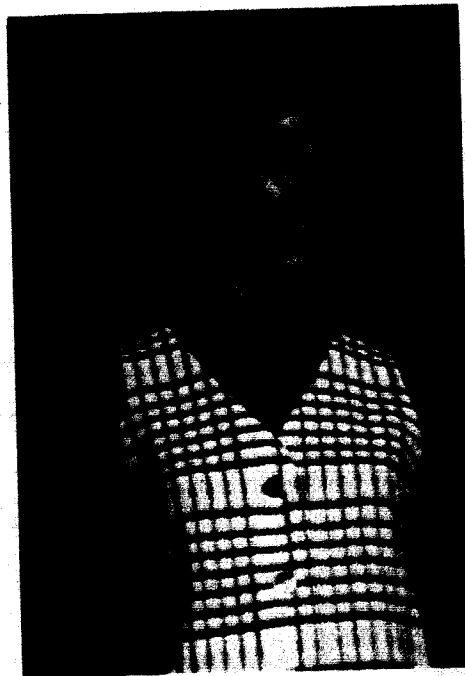
## Mom Prevented Marriage

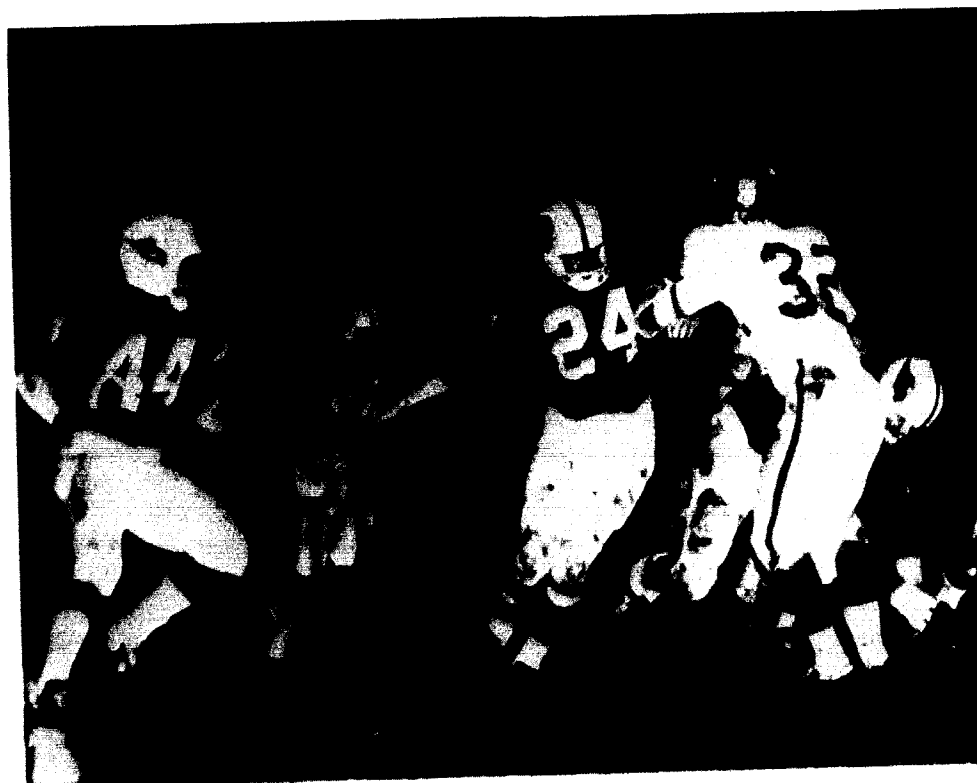

# Cards Won M.C.A.U. Championship

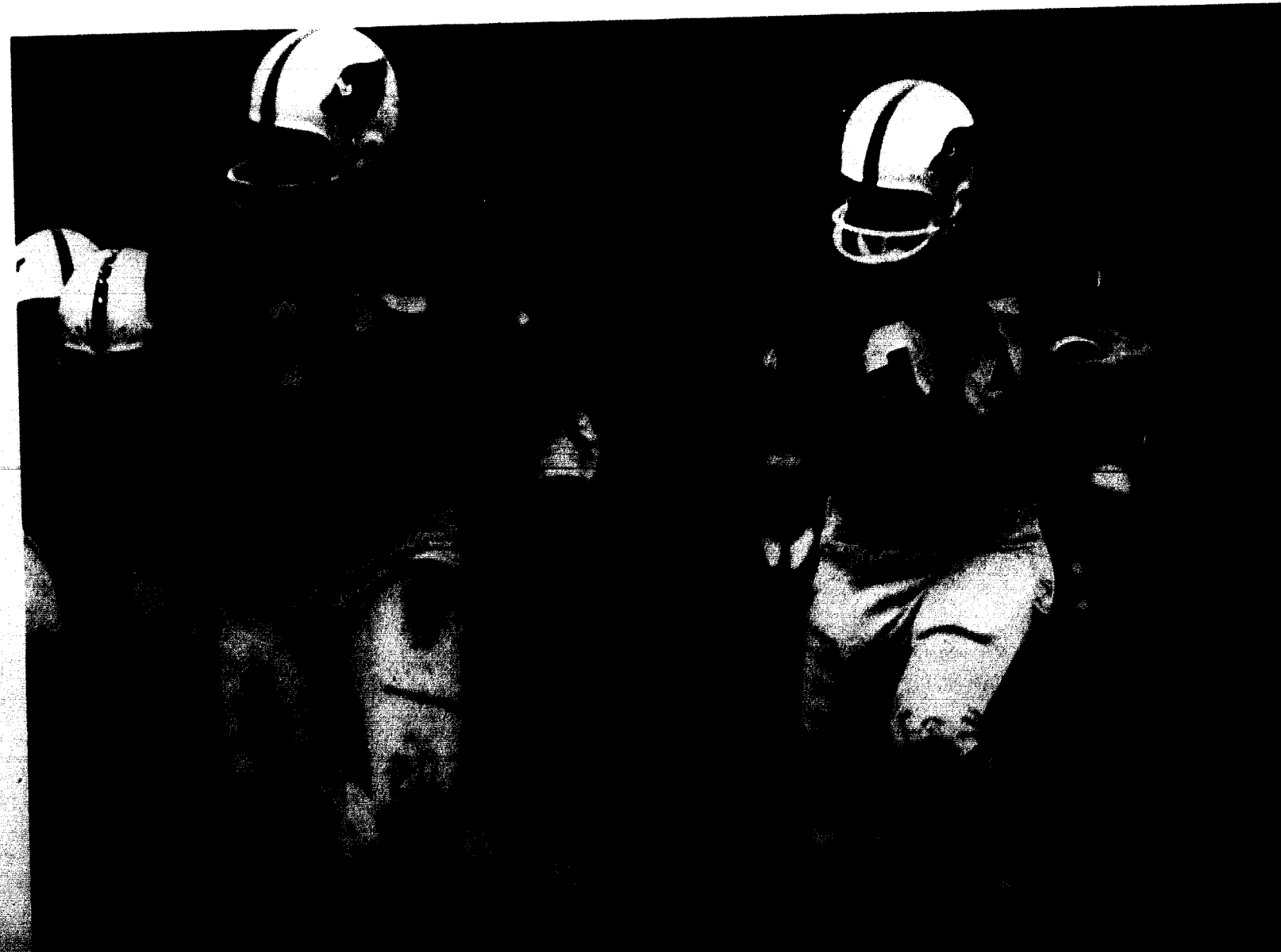


Sophomore halfback Tracy Woods searches downfield for running room during the Cardinals 28-7 victory over Simpson College.

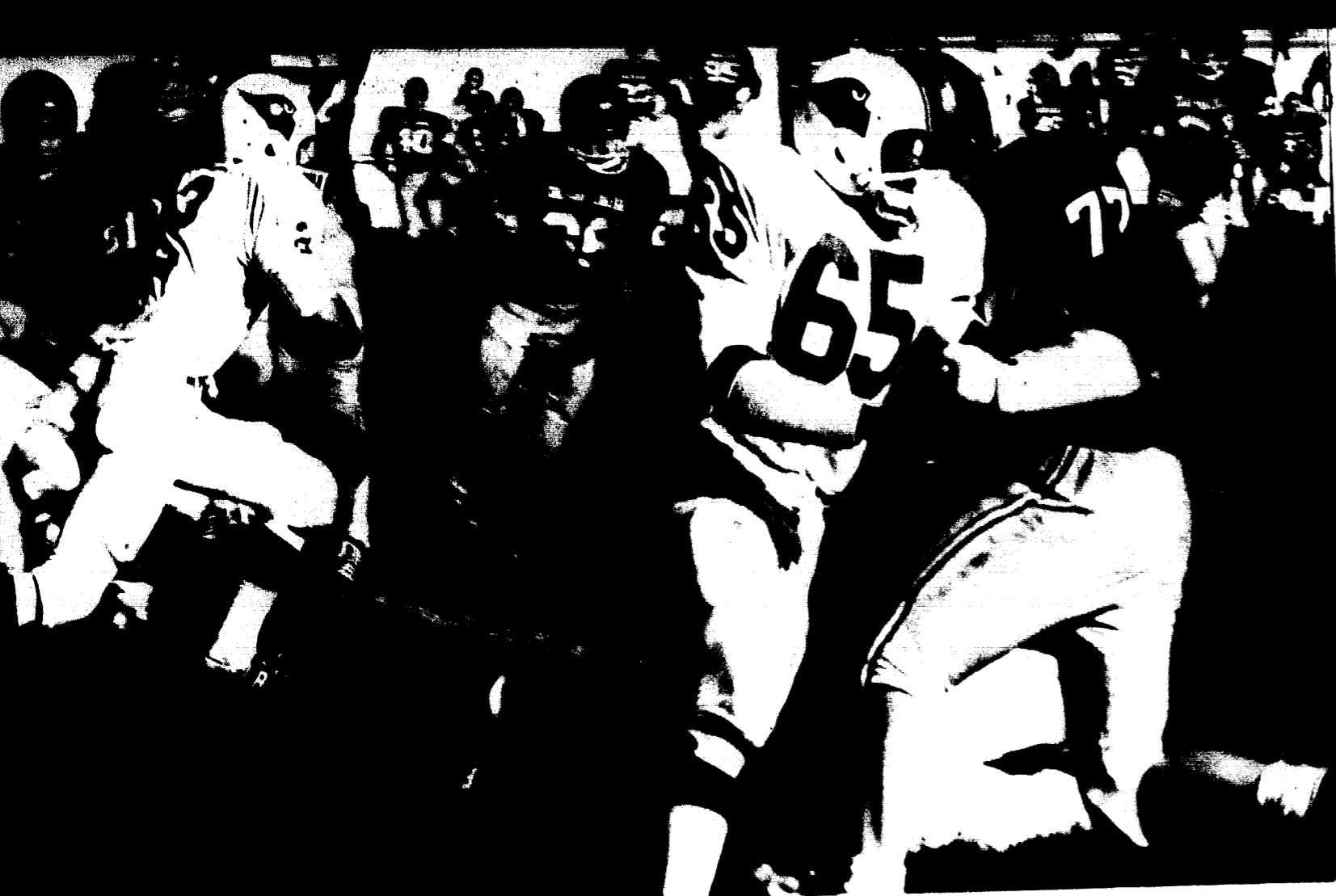

Jewell's speed and aggressiveness supplemented by a rugged conditioning program under first year mentor James Nelson compensated for the size advantage of the Cards' opponents.

Opening the season with a 43-13 victory over Hastings College, the Cards rolled to a spotless record of five wins by mid-season. Travelling to Texas to battle the always tough Austin College Kangaroos, the injury-riddled gridders lost 48-10. The loss also snapped the Cardinals' 17-game winning streak.

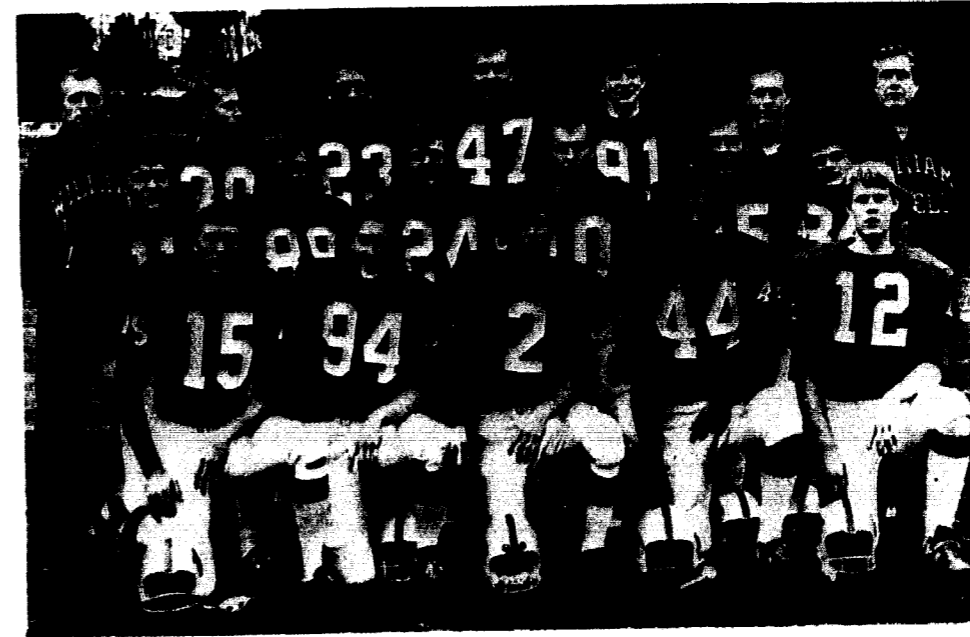

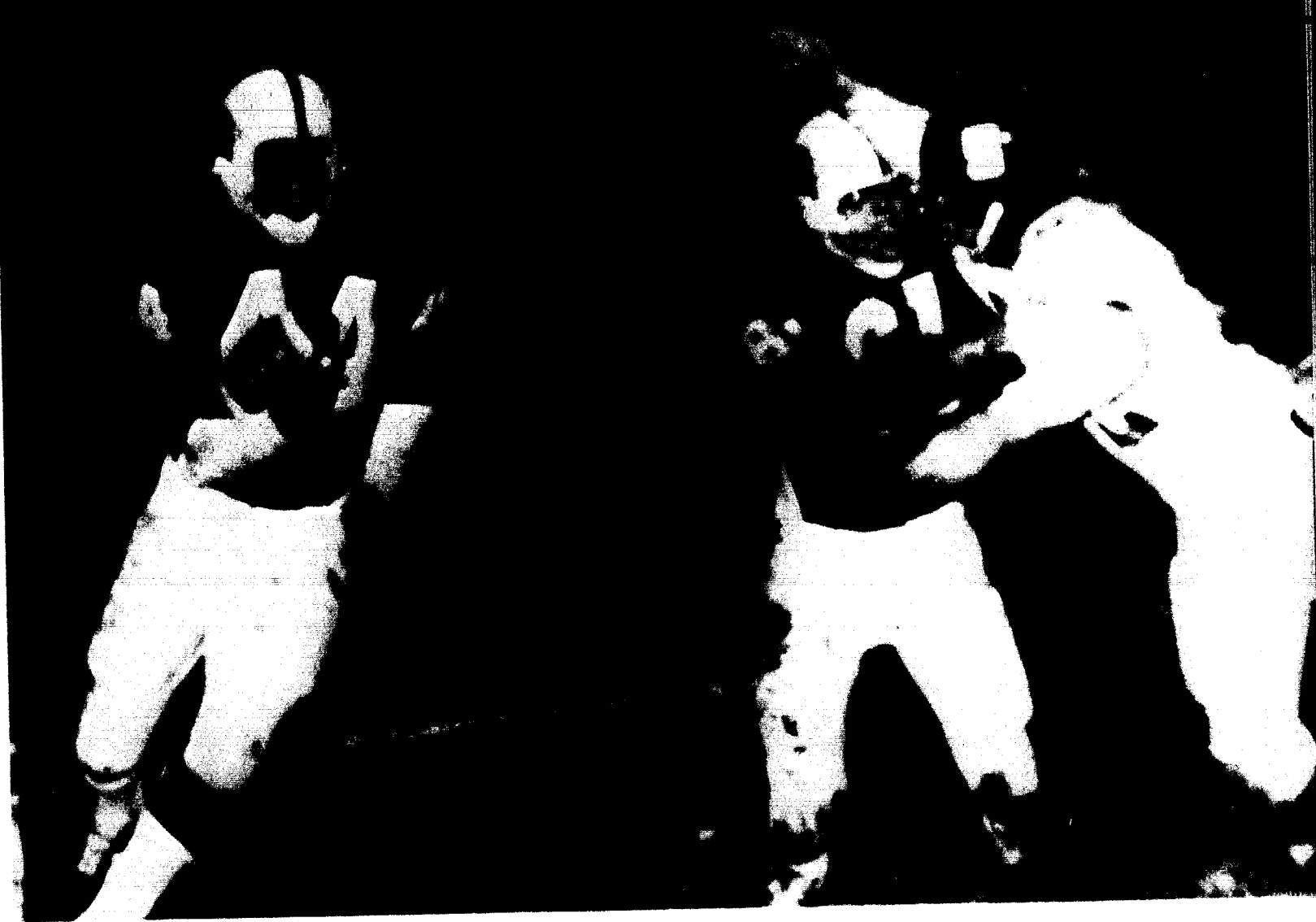

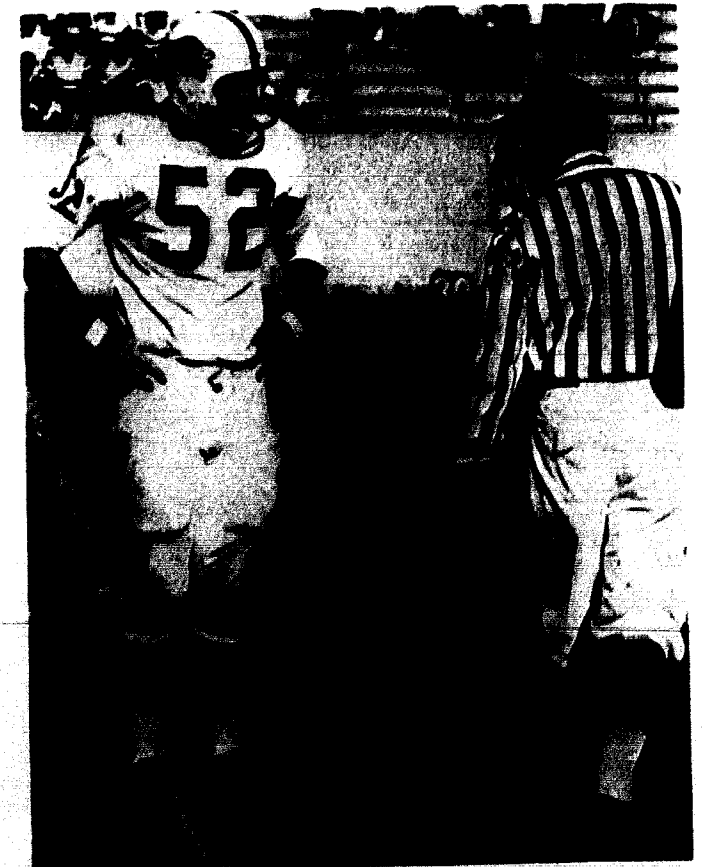

Led by two-time All-American Tom Sponcil, the roundballers managed a strong season finish culminating in a 7-7 conference record.

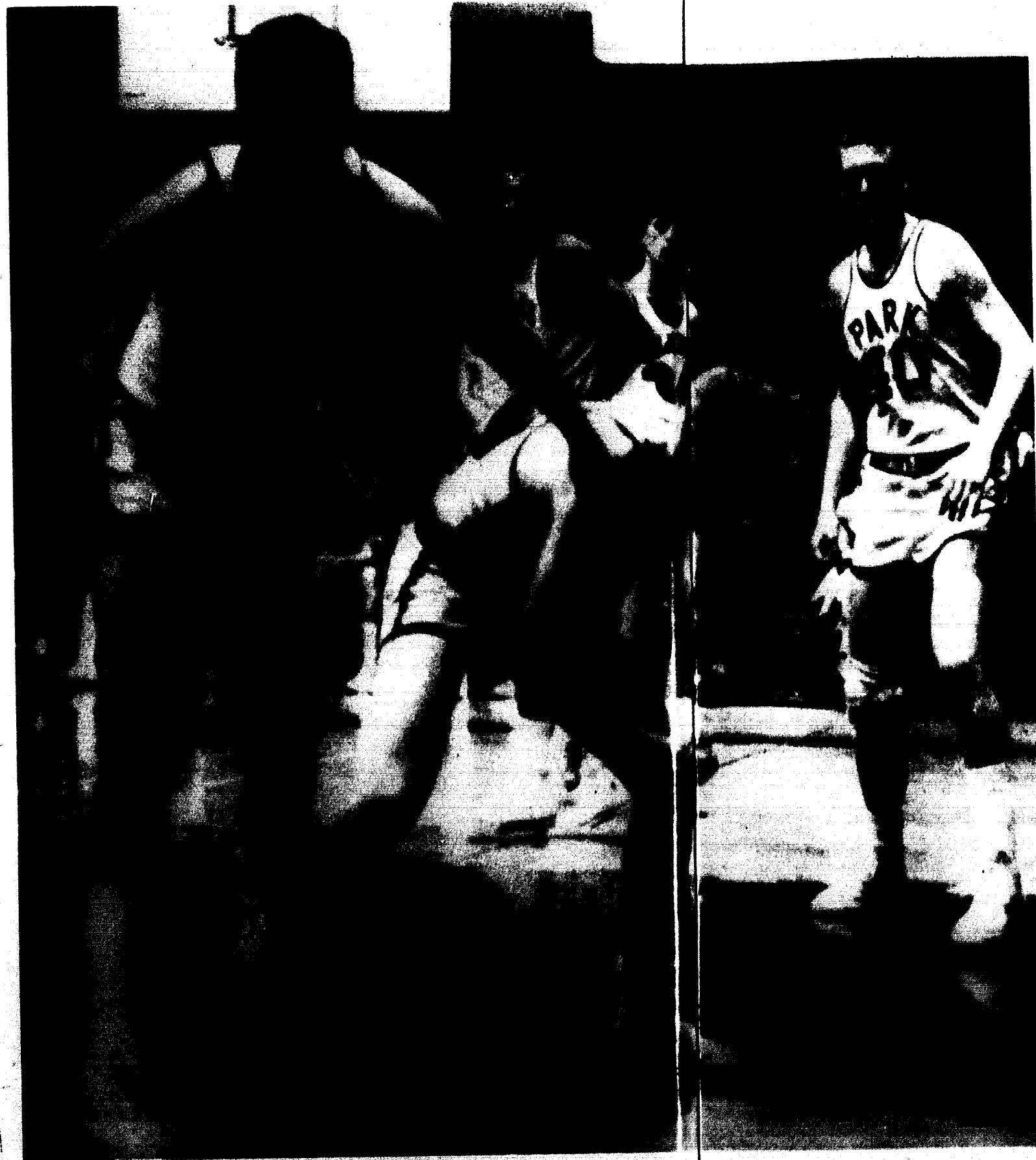

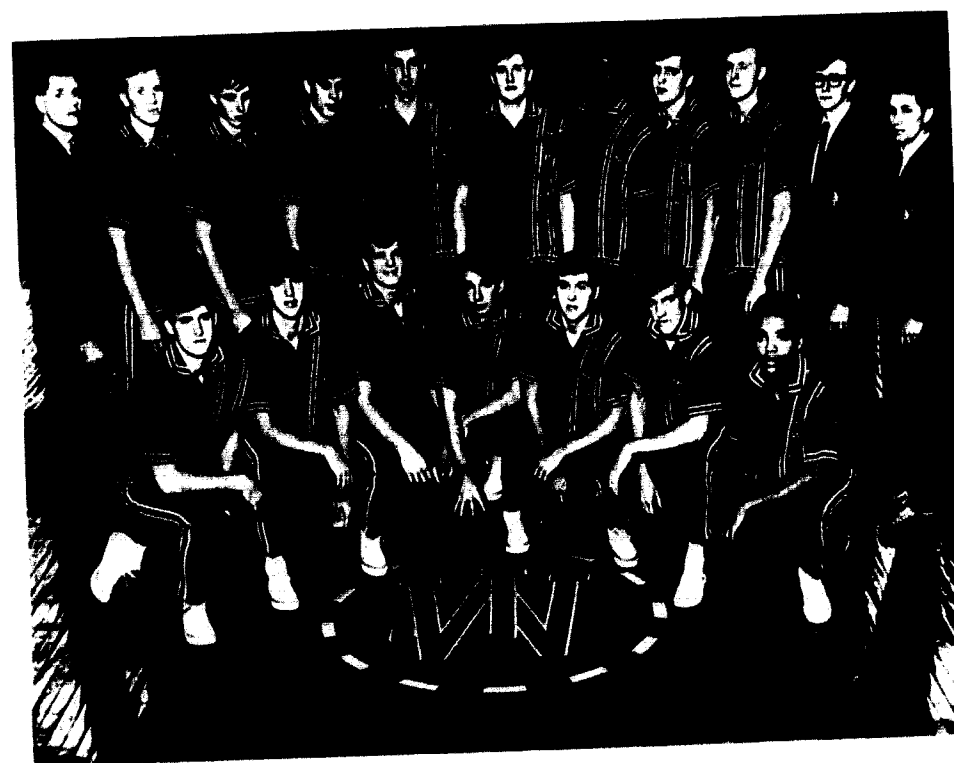

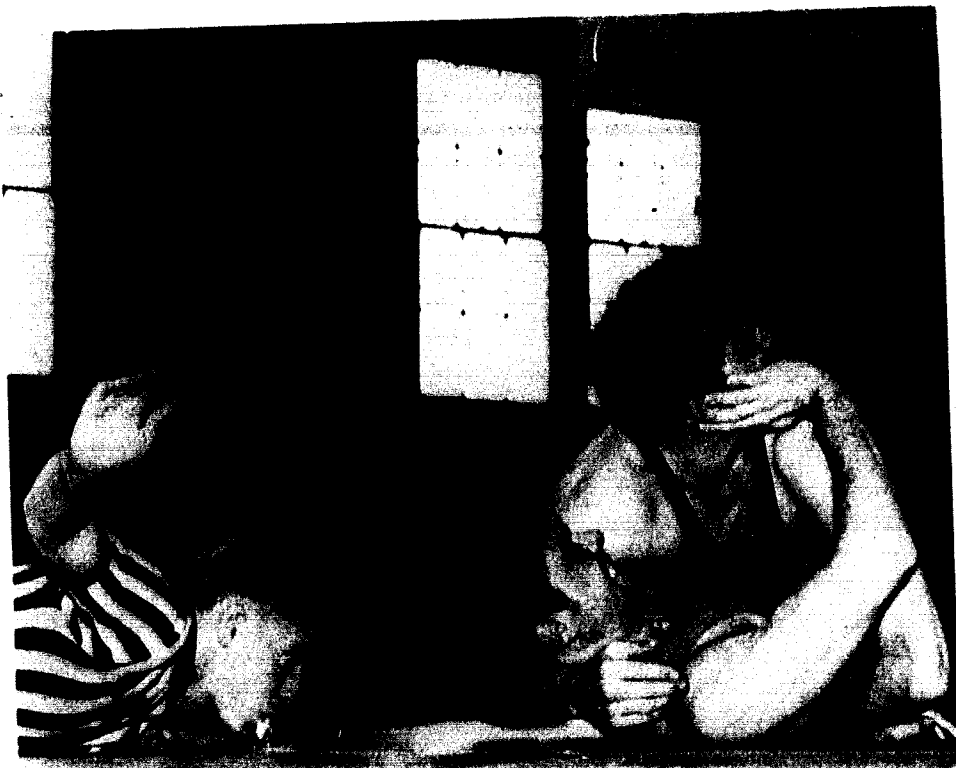
# Team Won MCAU Title

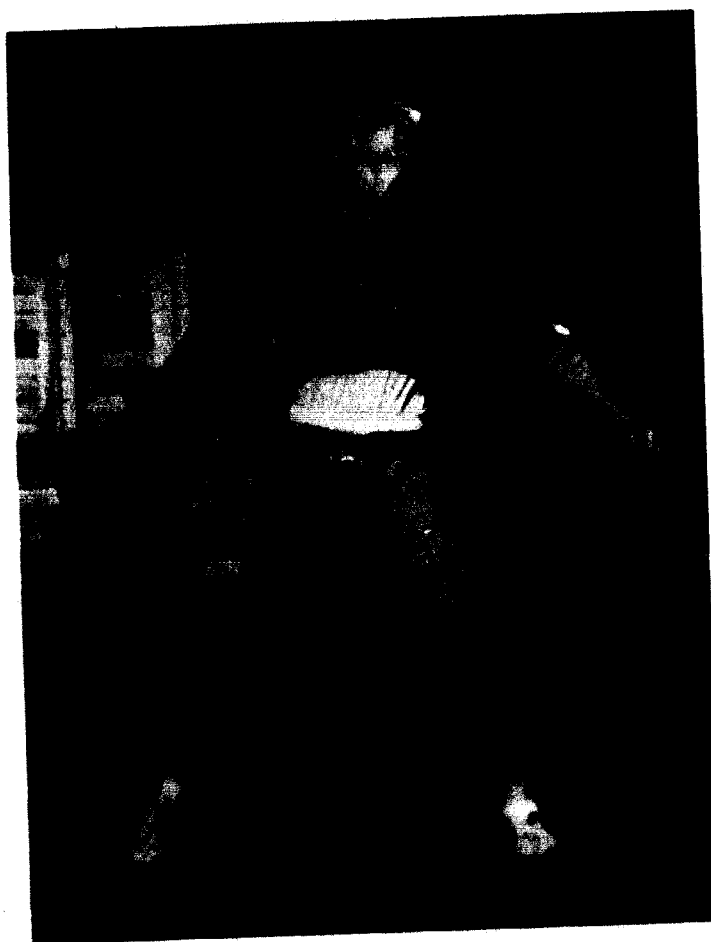

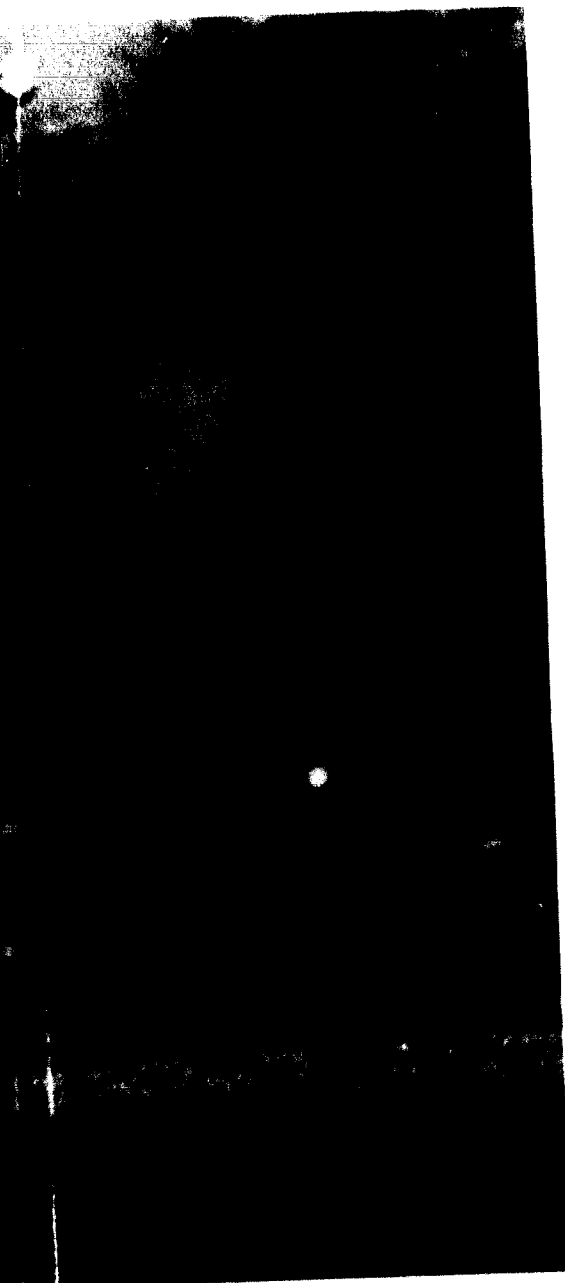

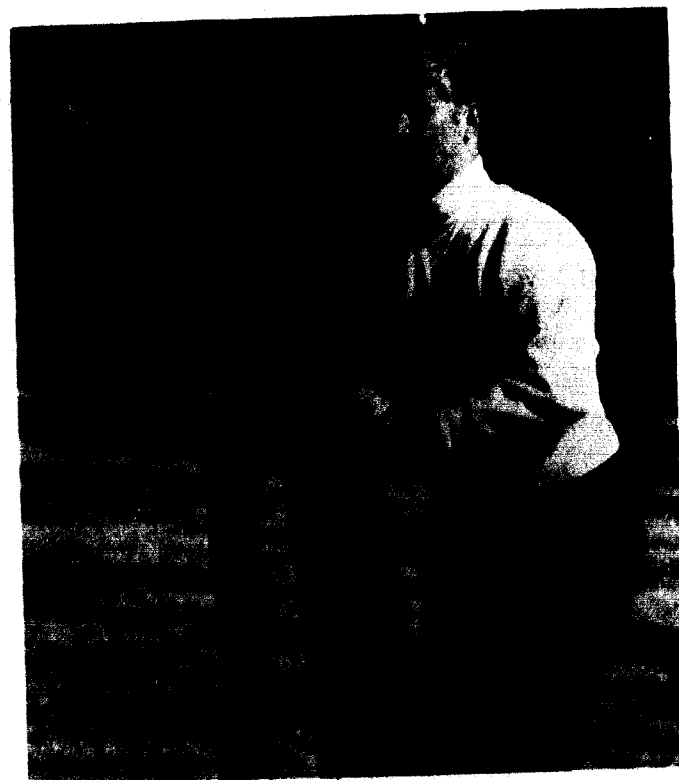

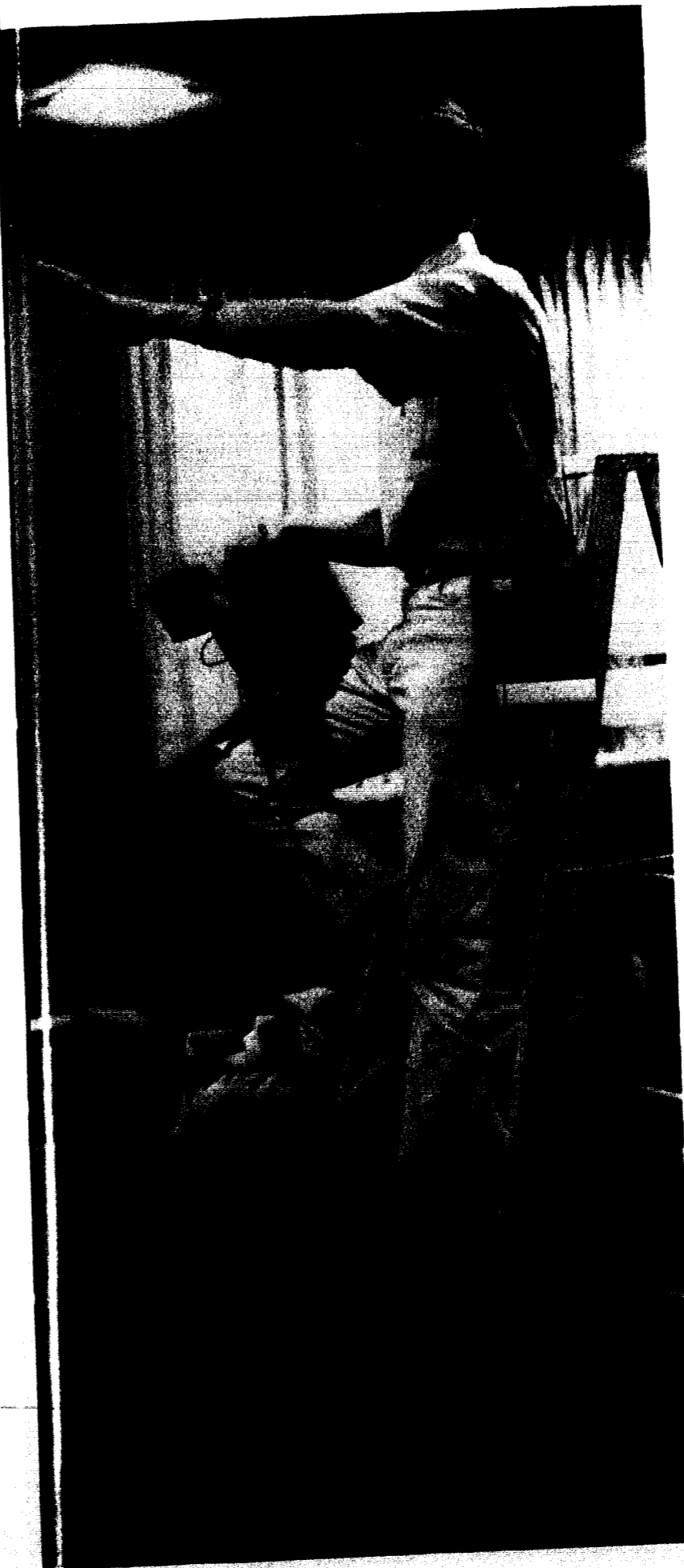

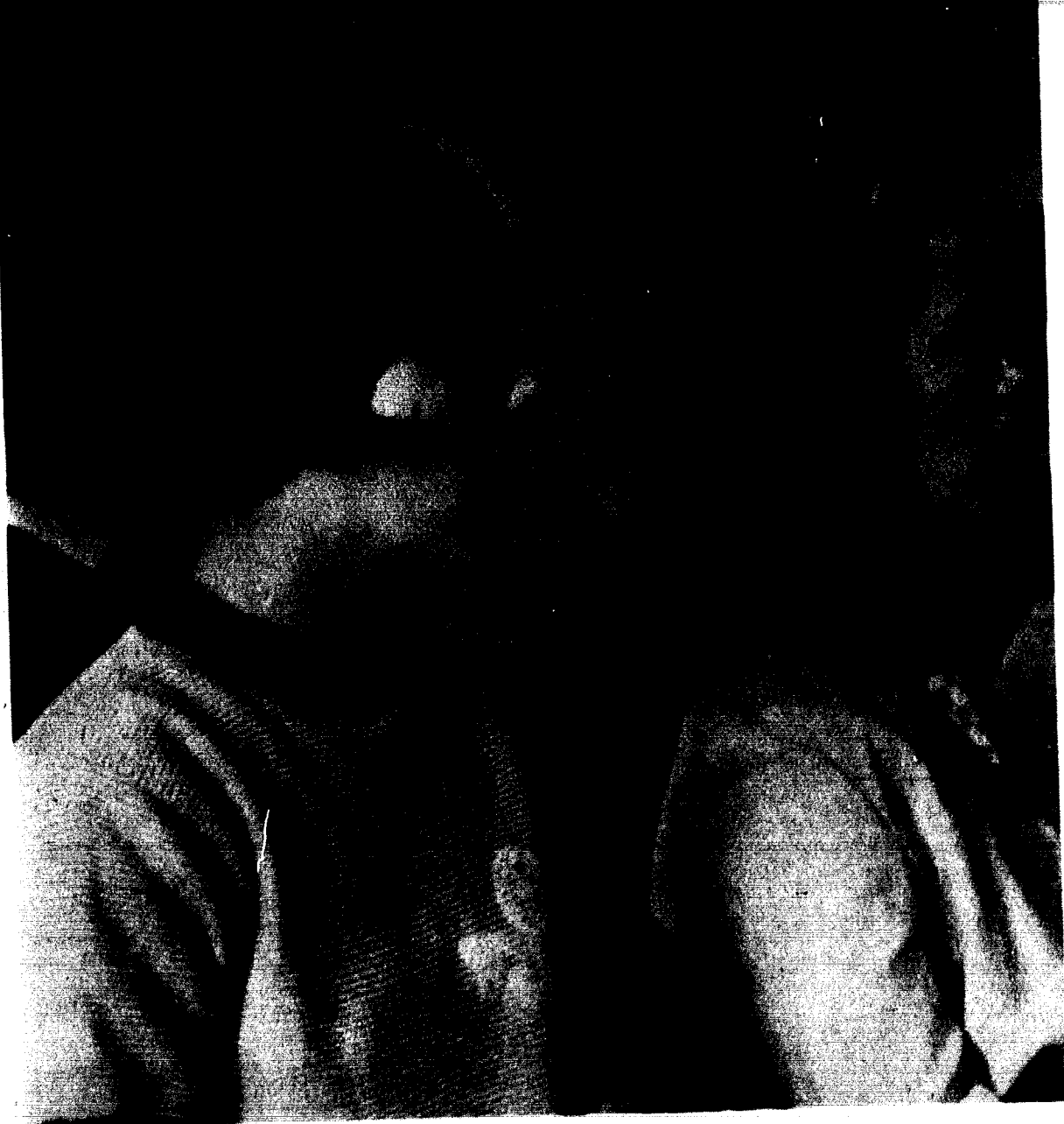

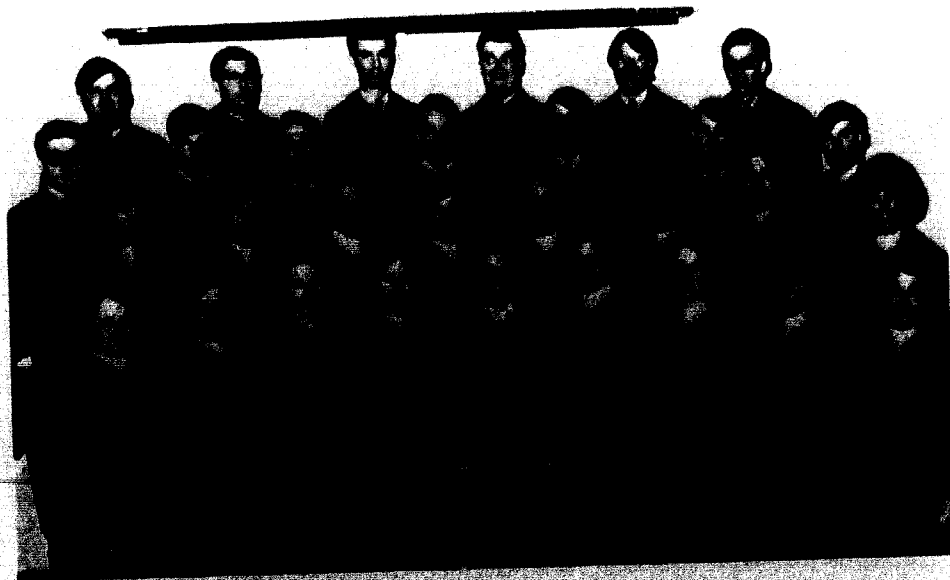

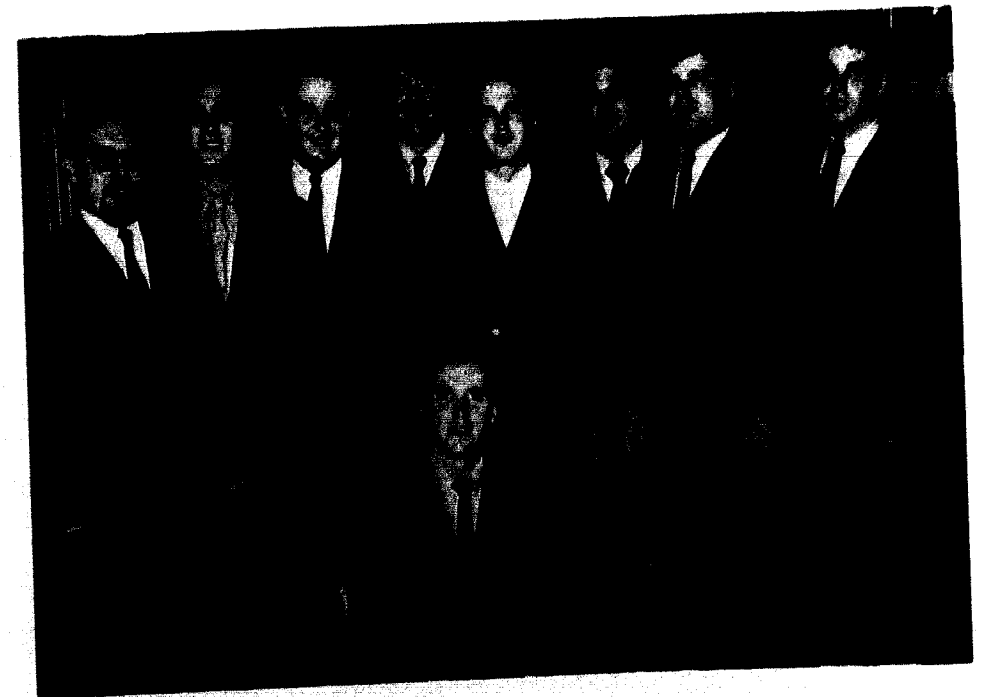
## Sigma Alpha Iota Presley Sent to Chicago

## Chapel Choir Nigh Hosted Tour Group

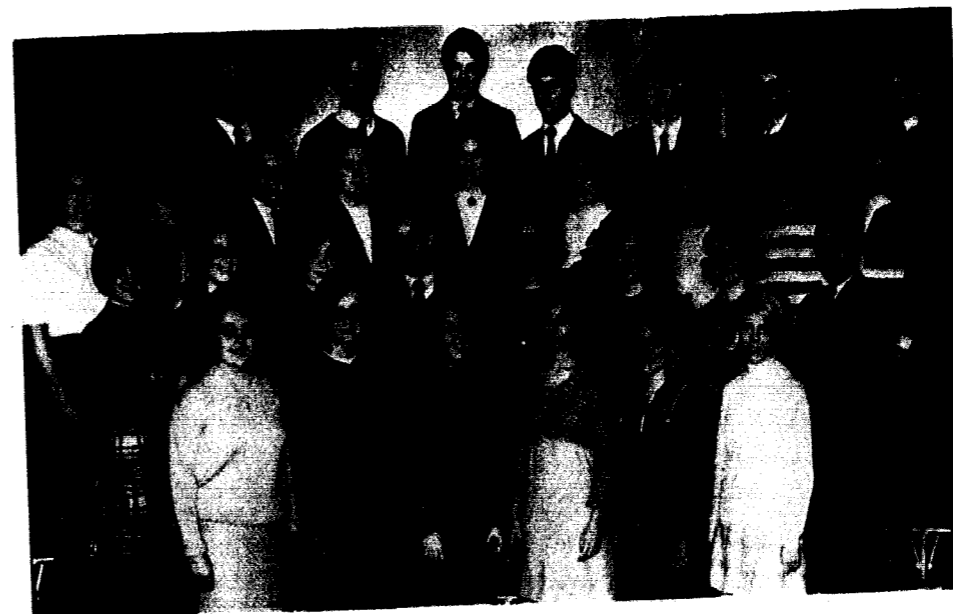

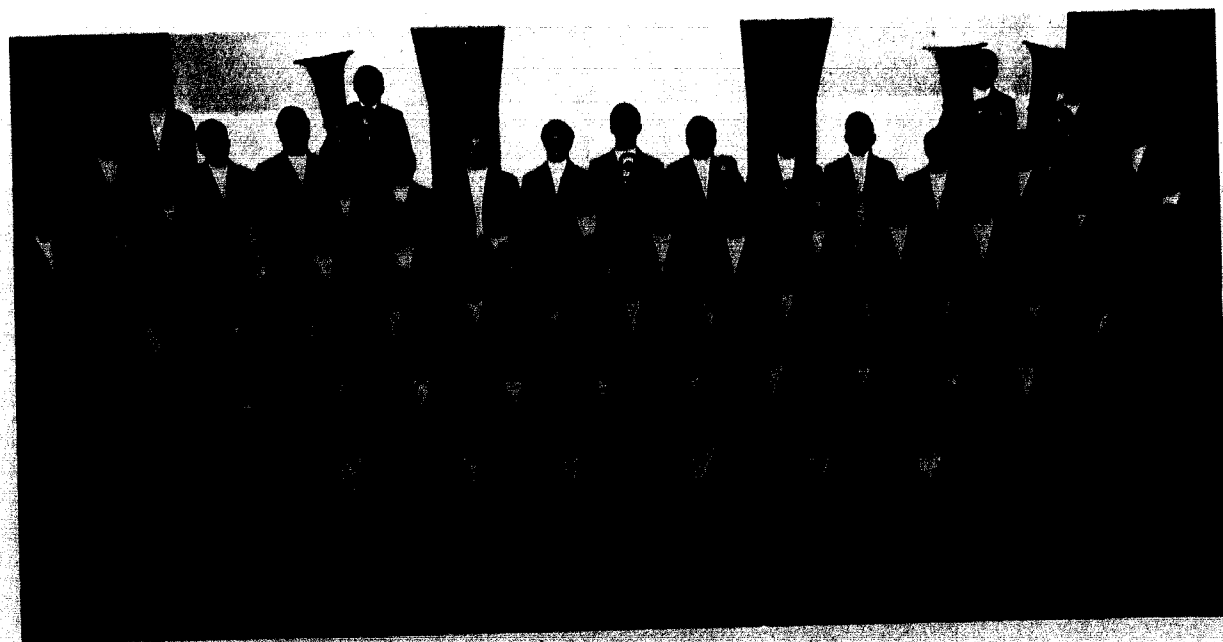
# Instrumental Music Band Activities Expanded Under Posey

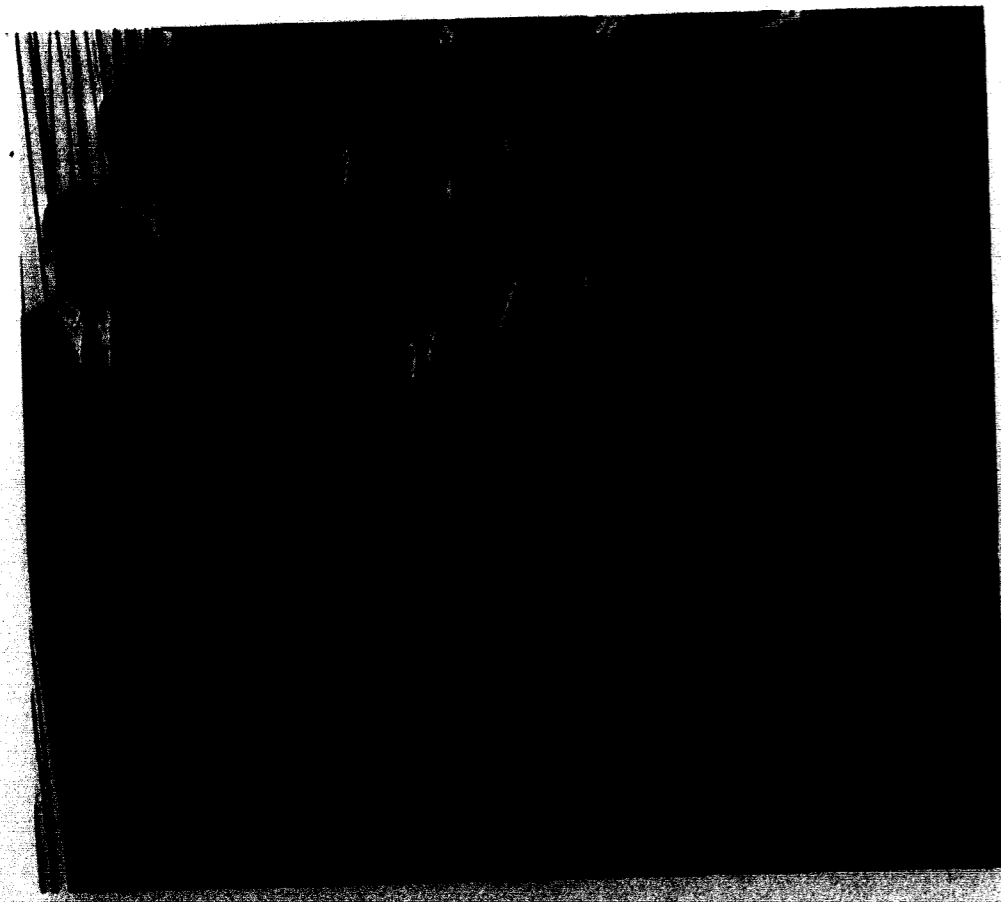

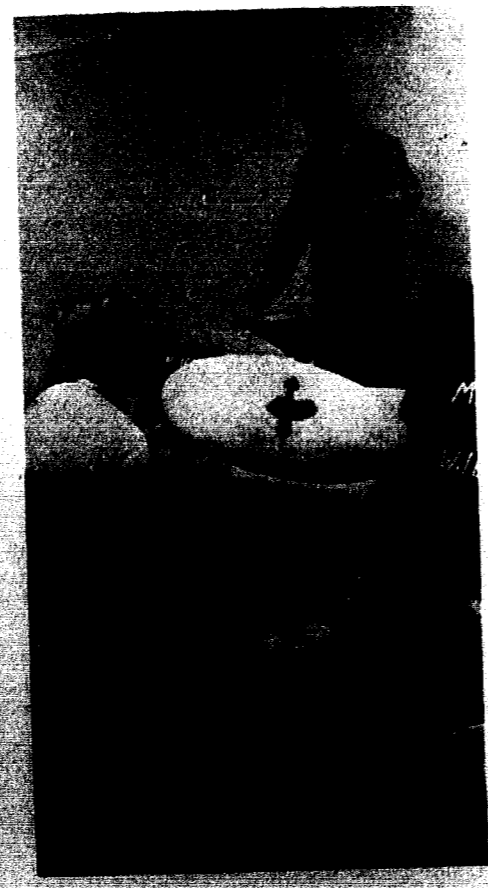

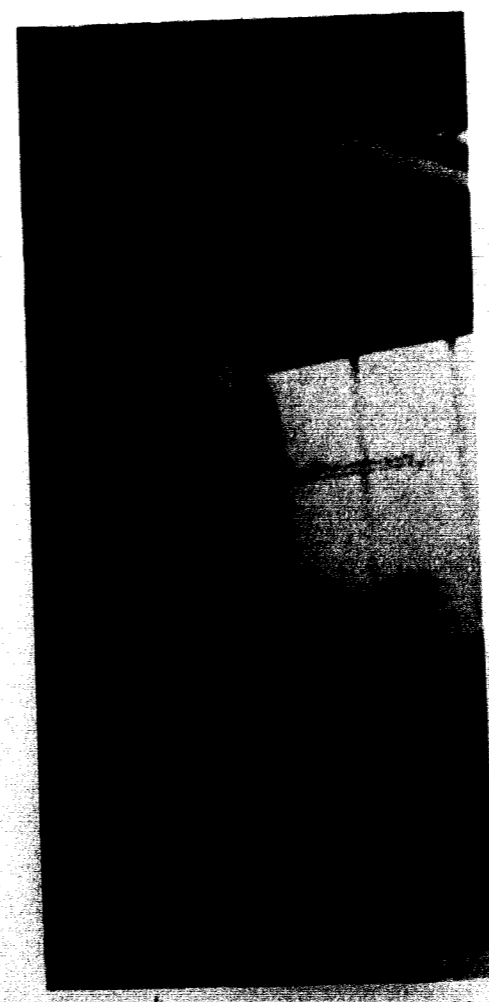

## Baptist Student Union Willis Told of Haight-Ashbury

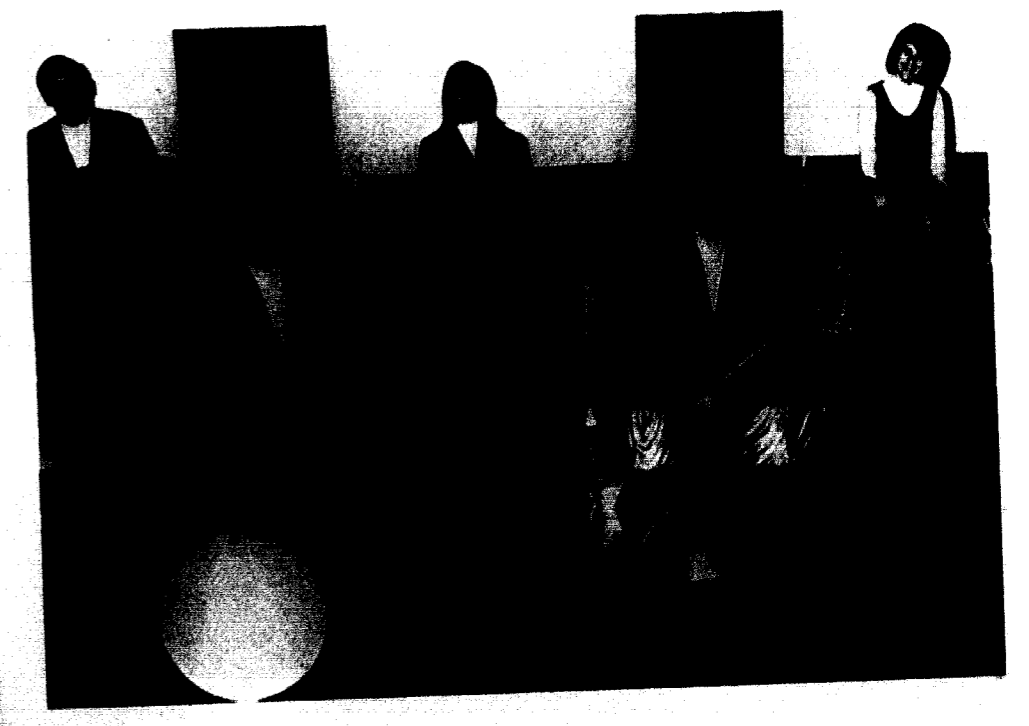

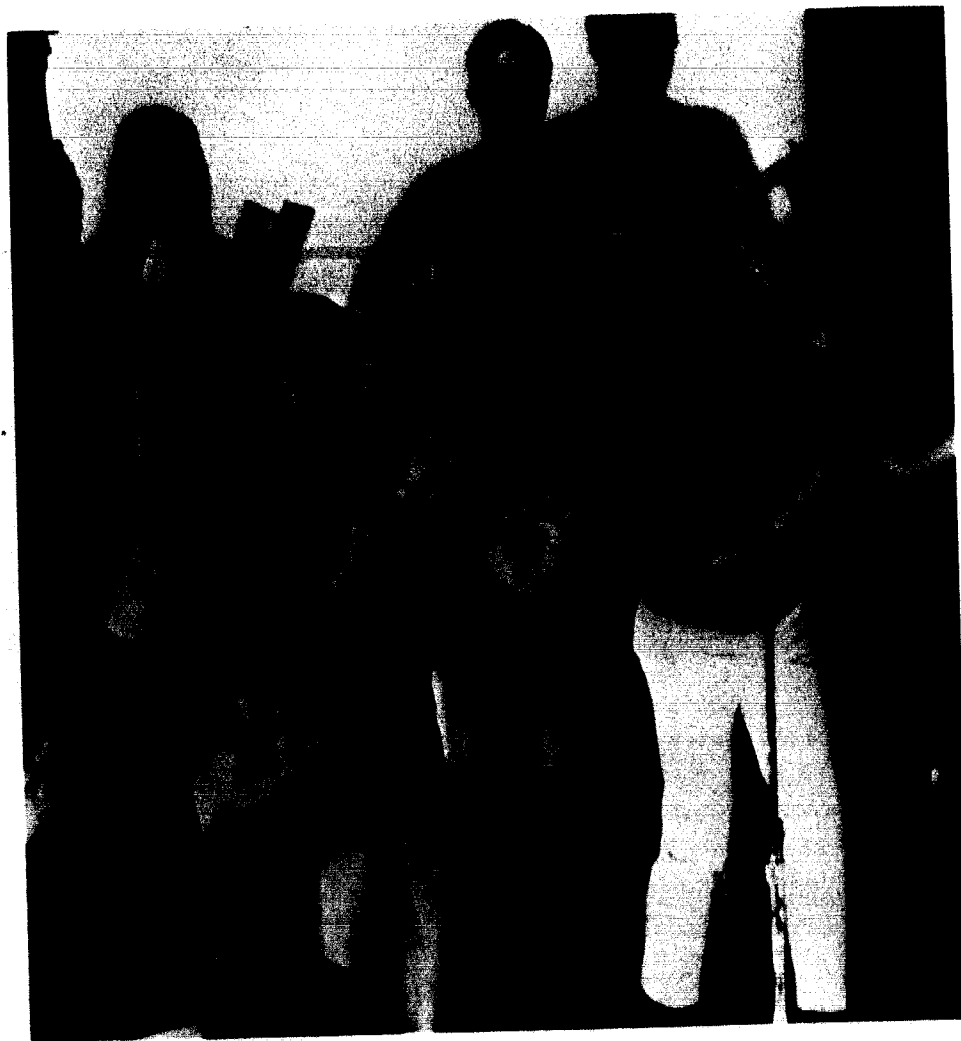

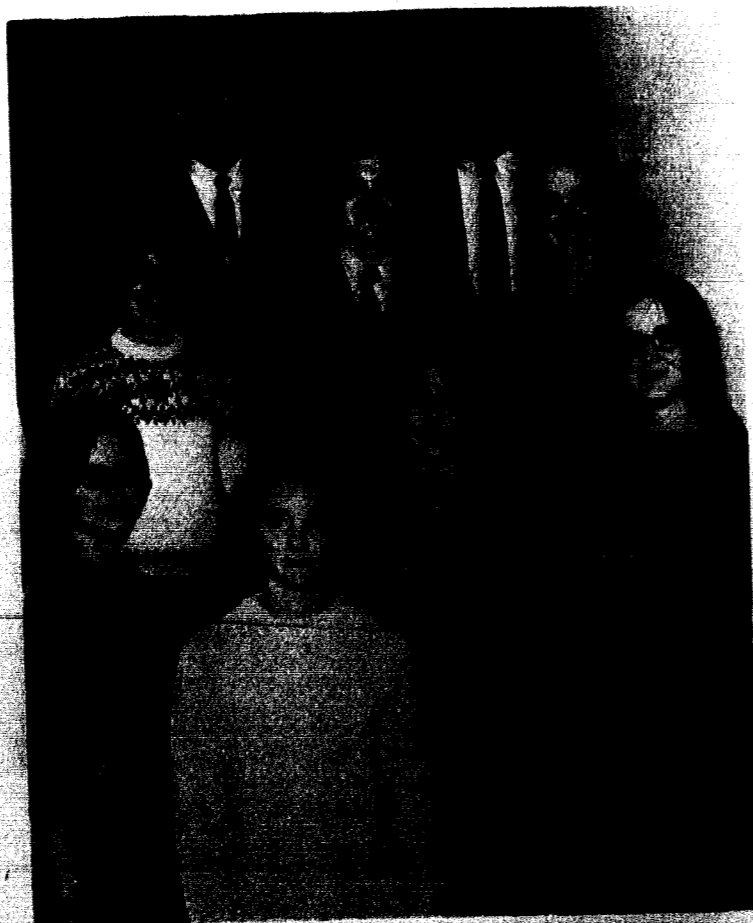

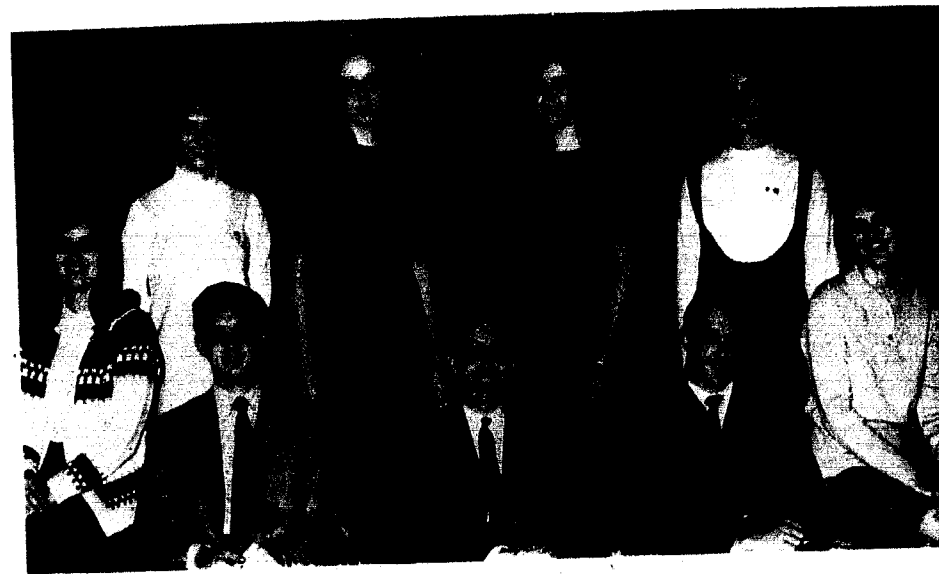

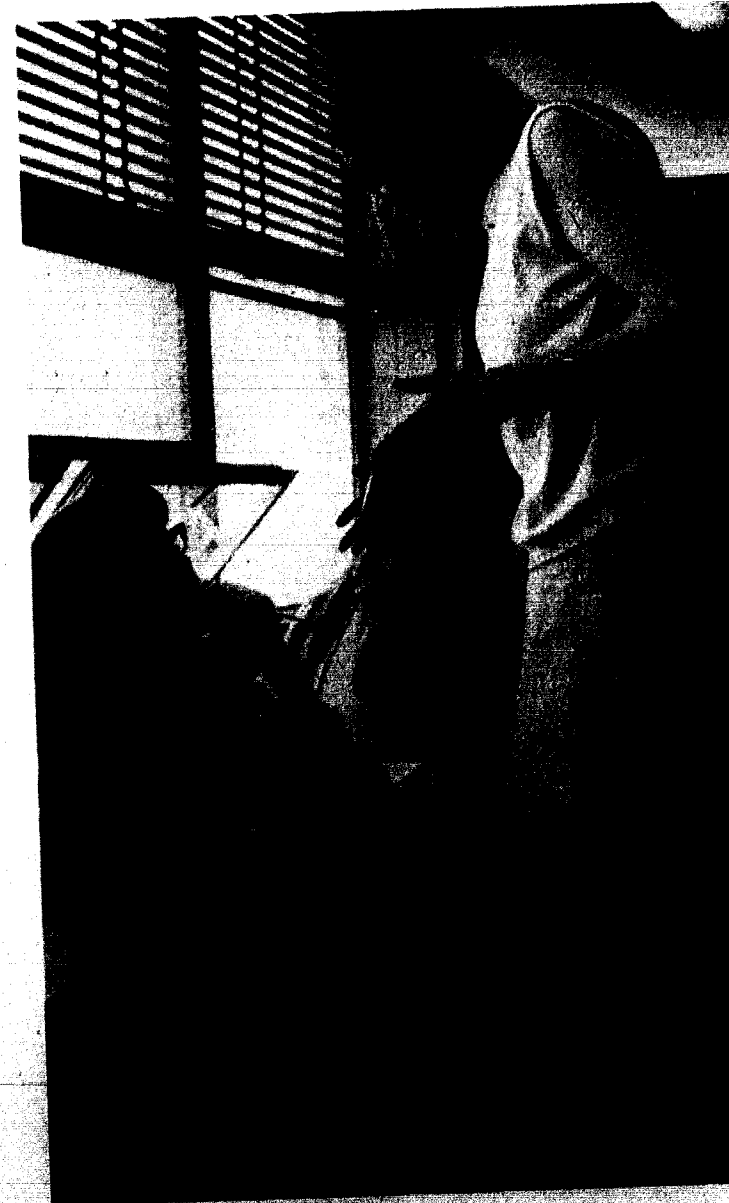

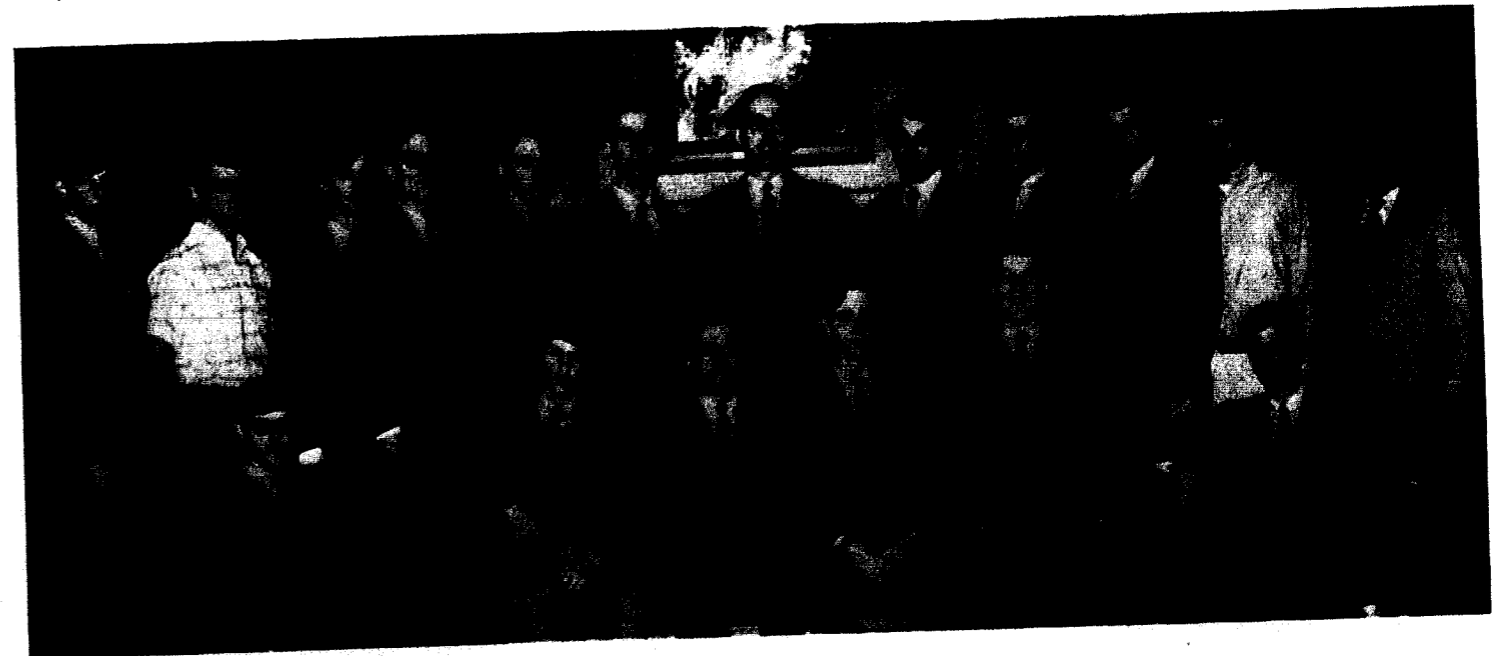

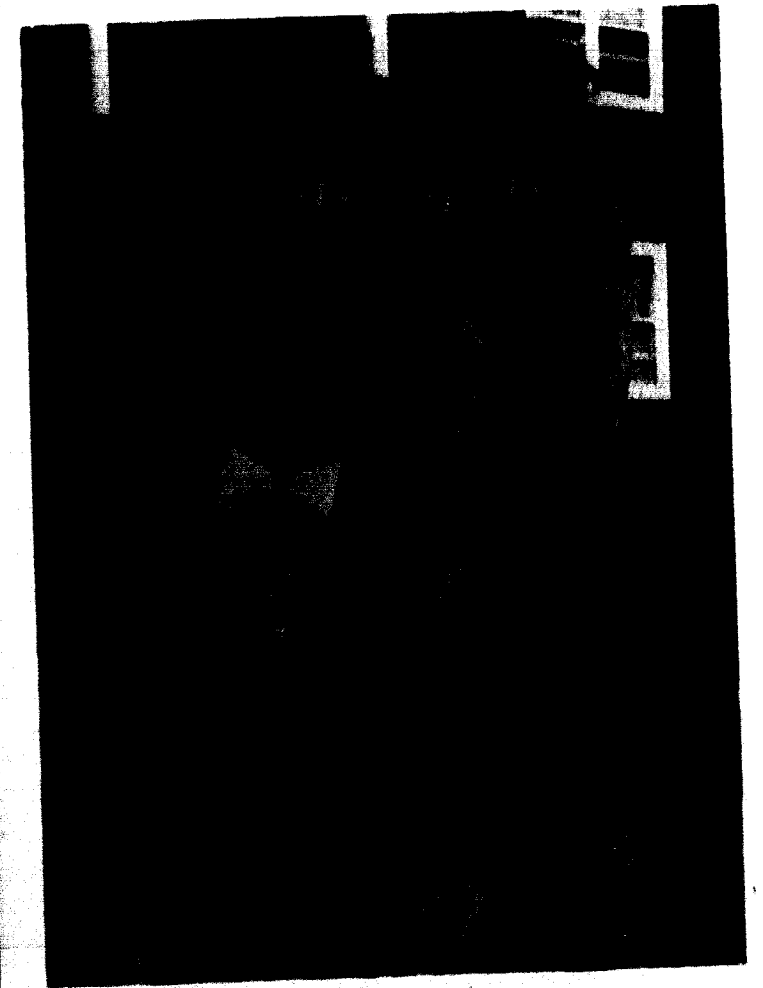
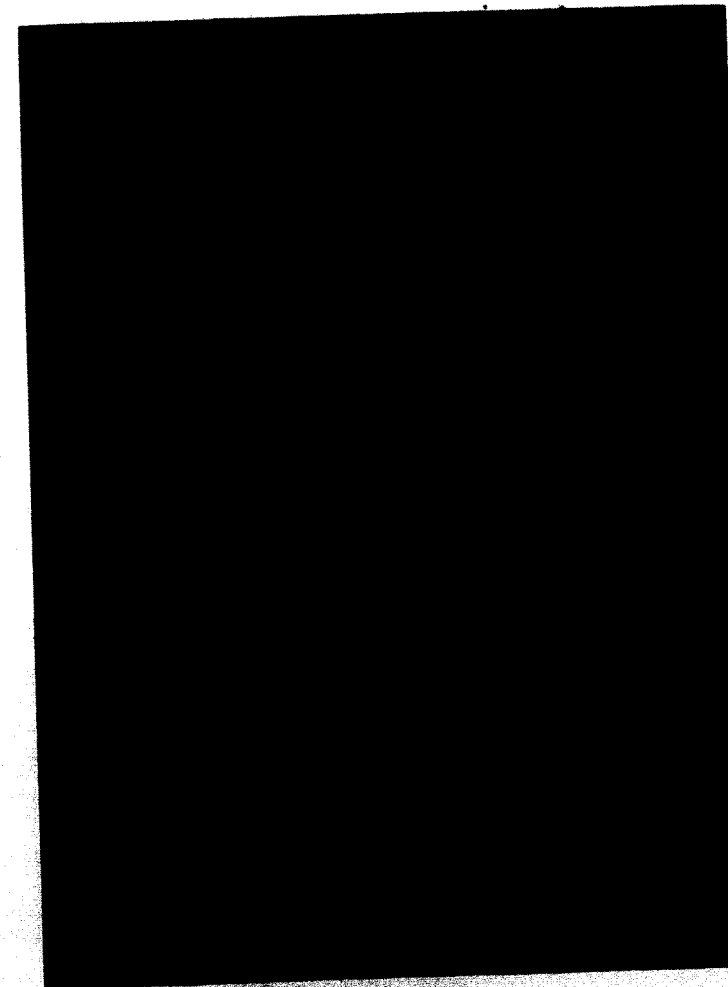
## Alpha Gamma Delta Girls Pledges Eighteen

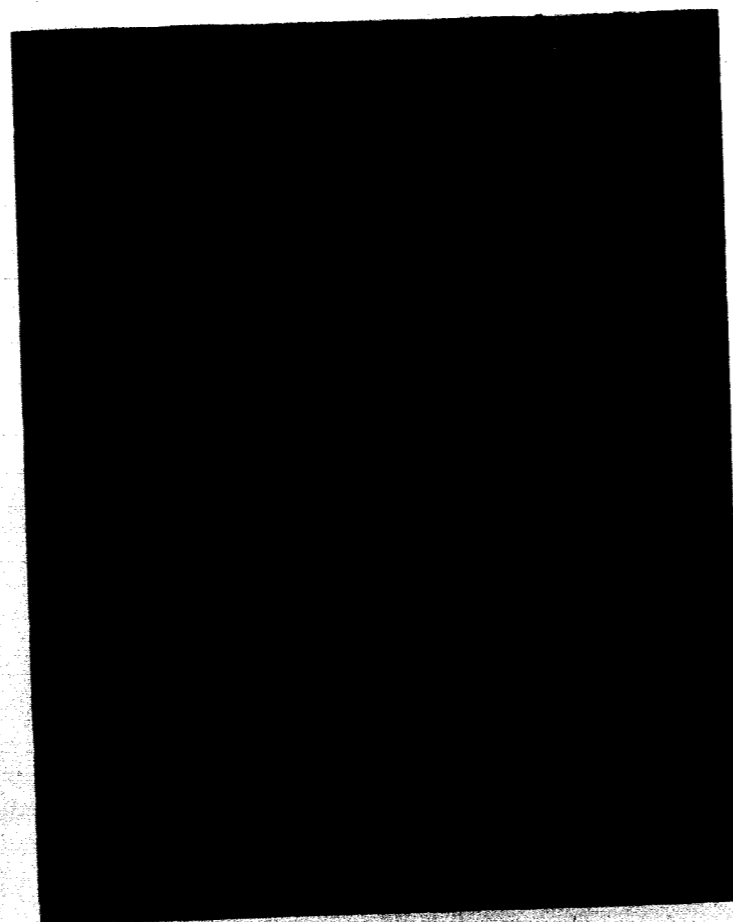
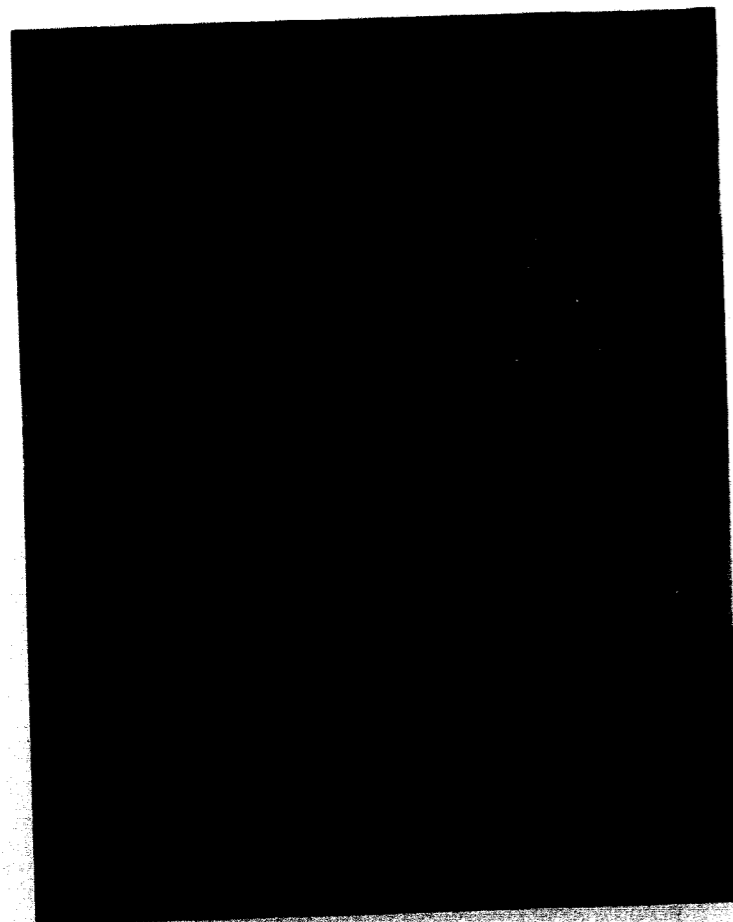
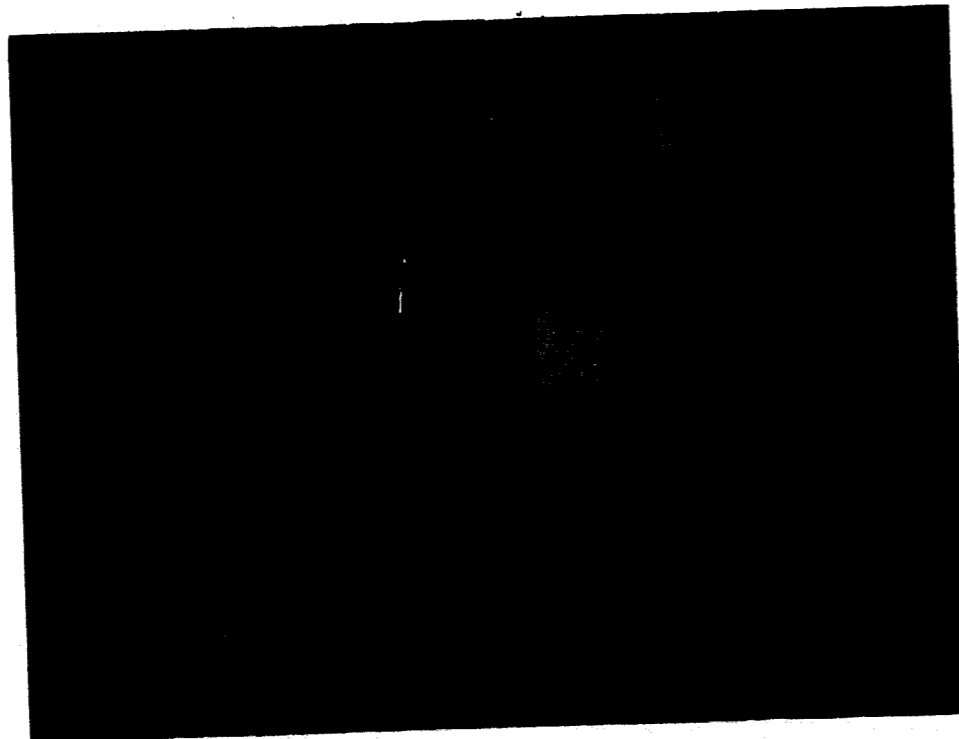
# Lambda Chi Alpha Epsilon Nu Won Trophy

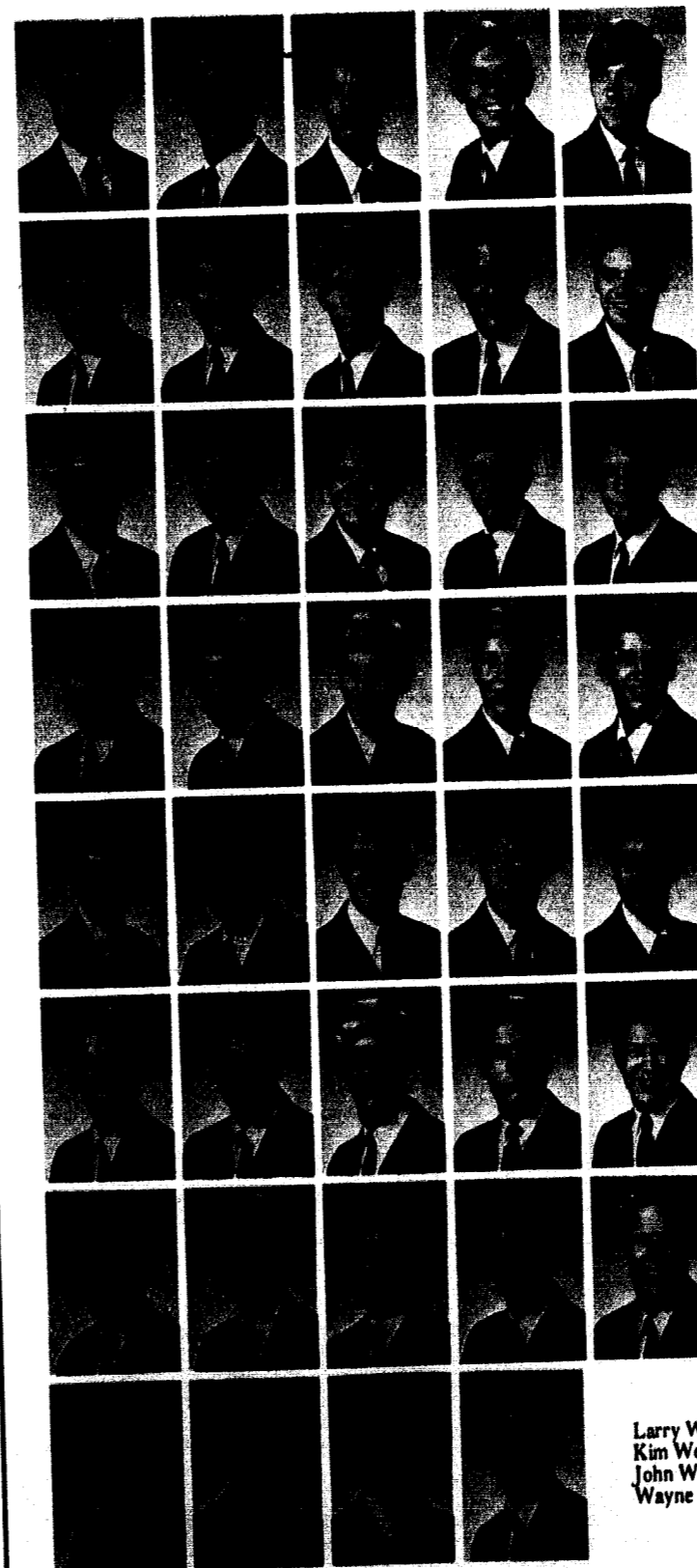

## Phi Gamma Delta 26 Swelled Roll

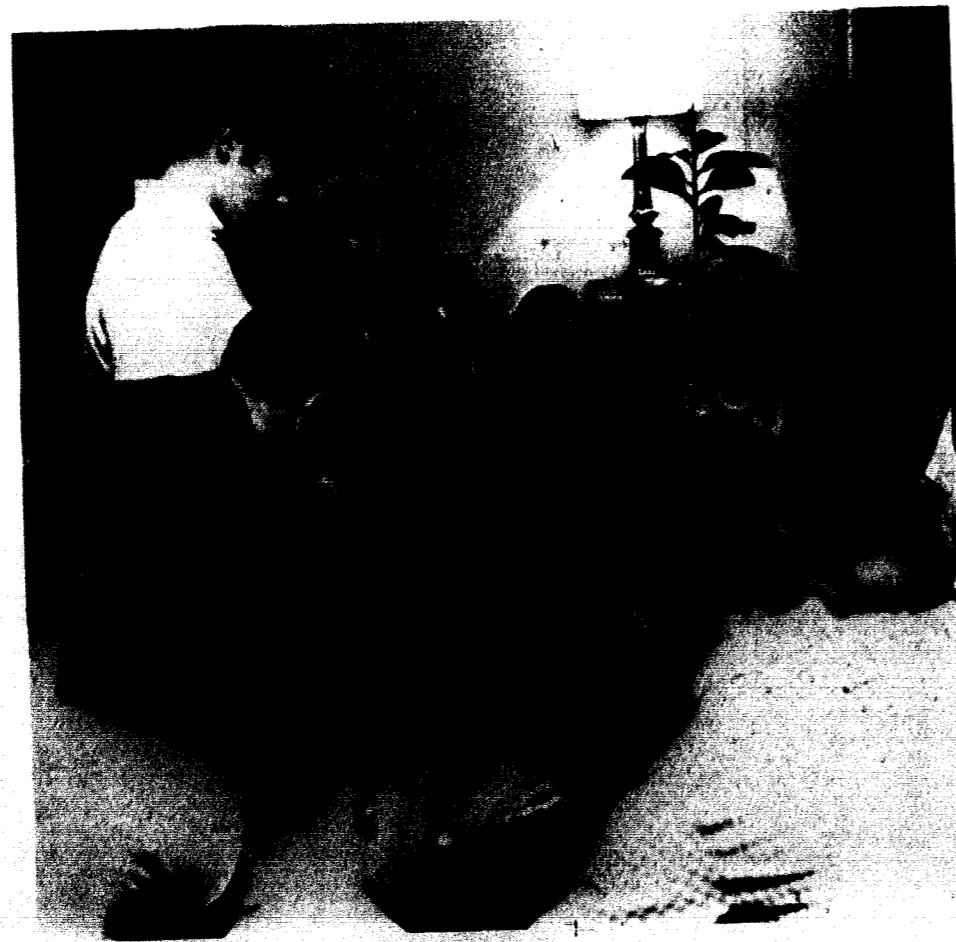

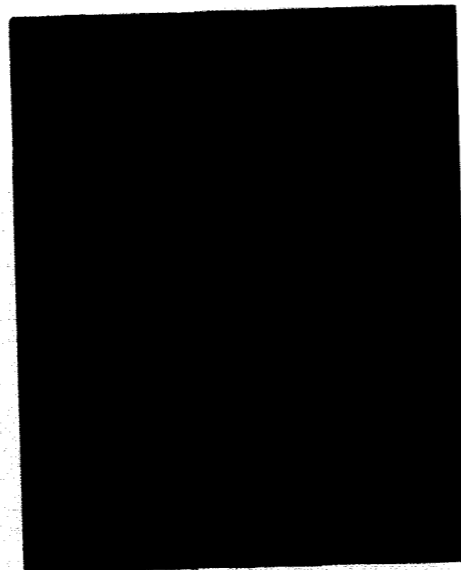
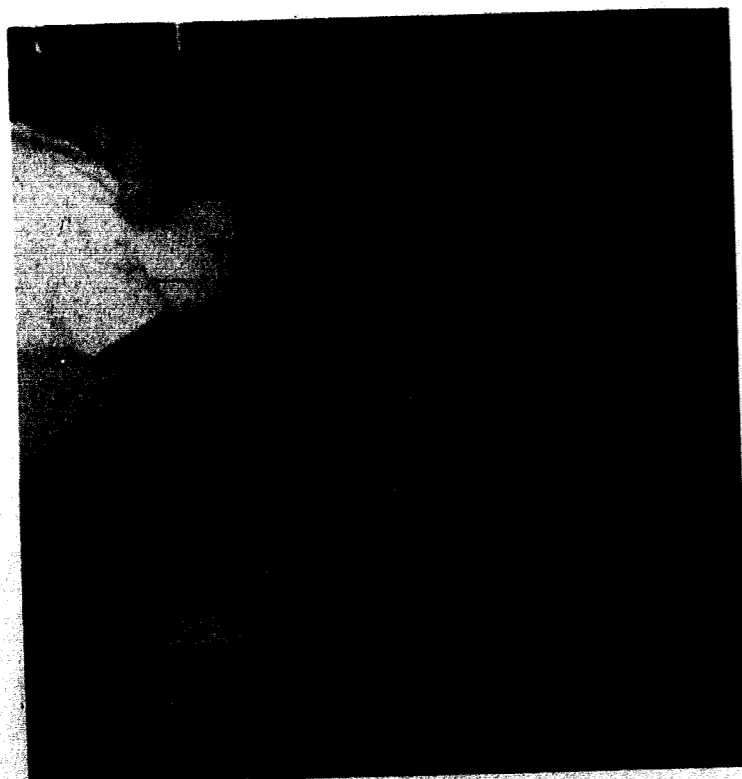
# Sigma Nu Snakes Welcomed Mom Judy

# Deans Guided Students

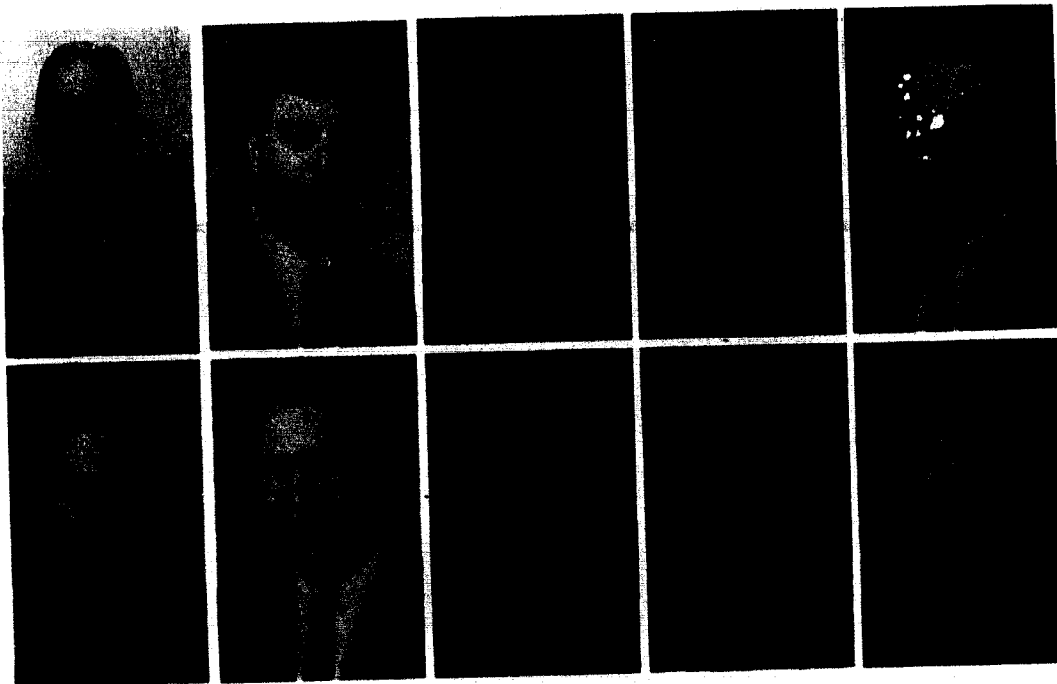

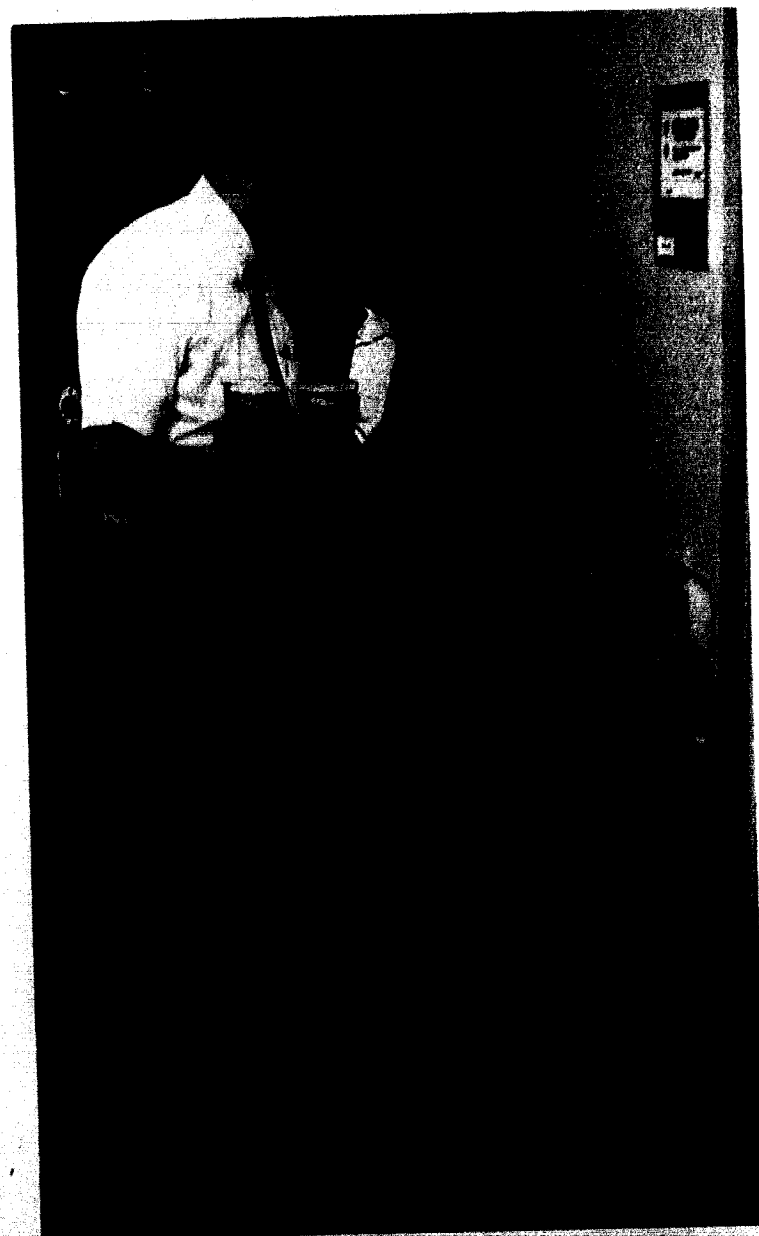

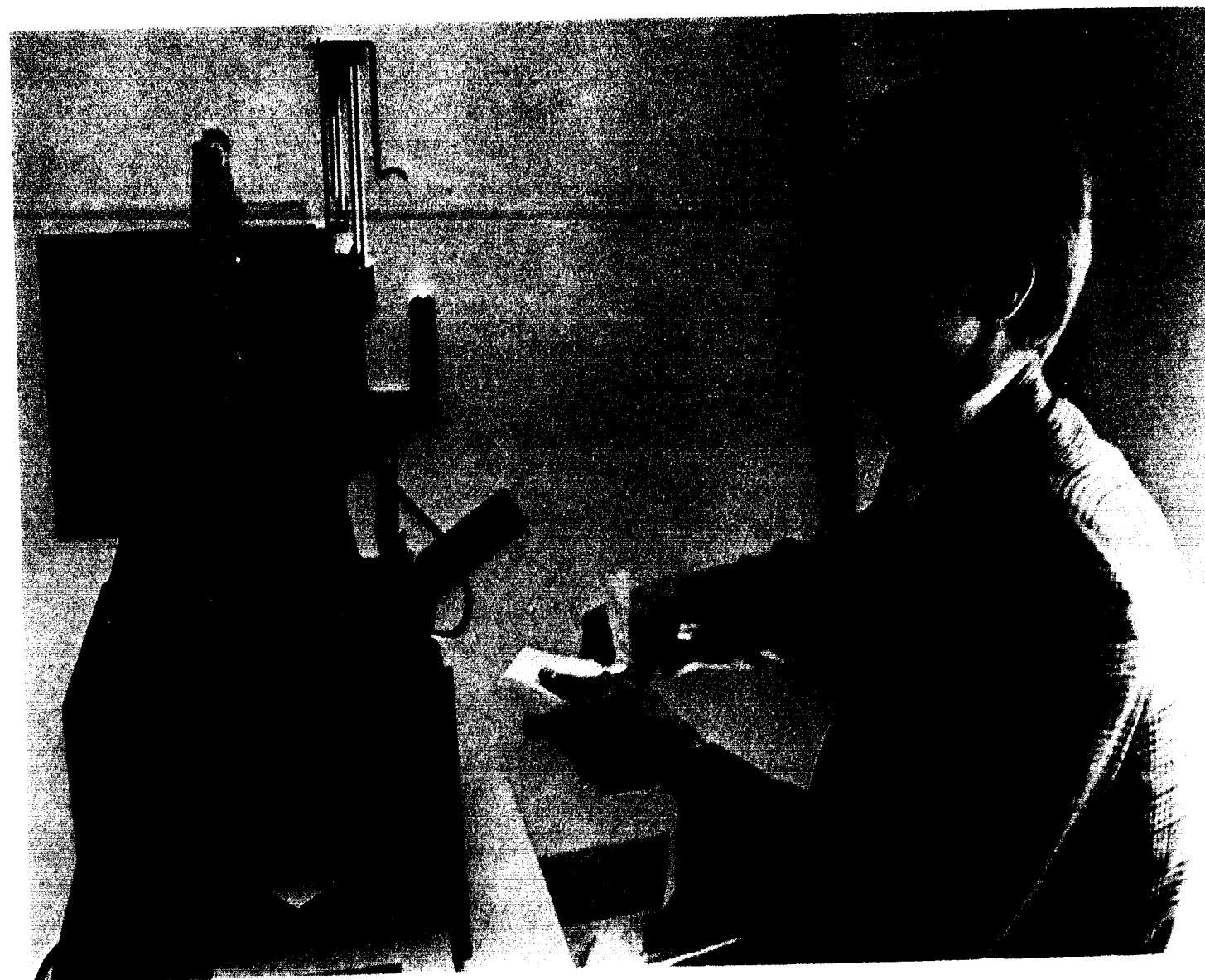
Recruiting students, keeping the alumni informed about the school, and offering guidance and counseling services were the main jobs performed by the Administrative Offices.

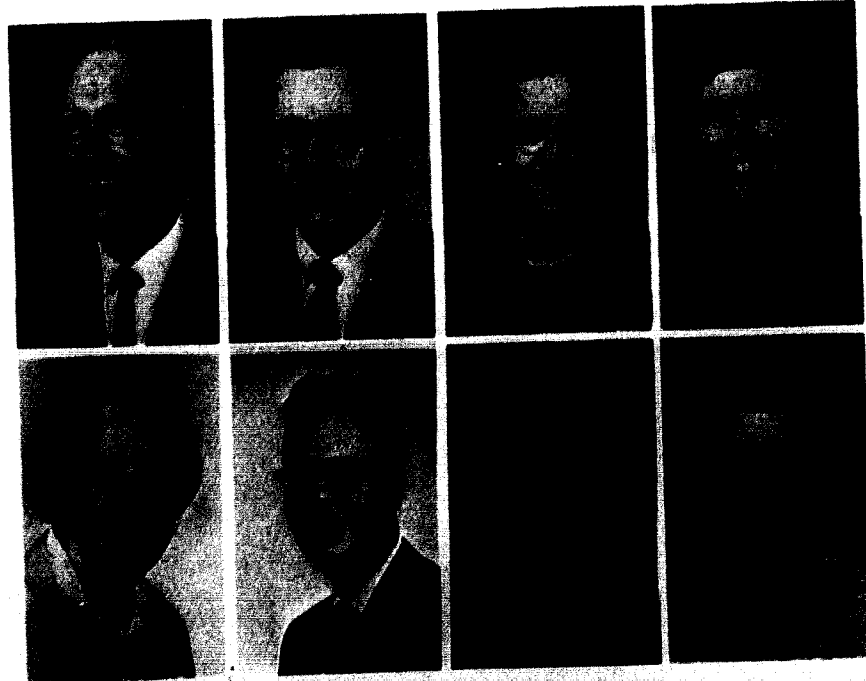
# Connor Named Head

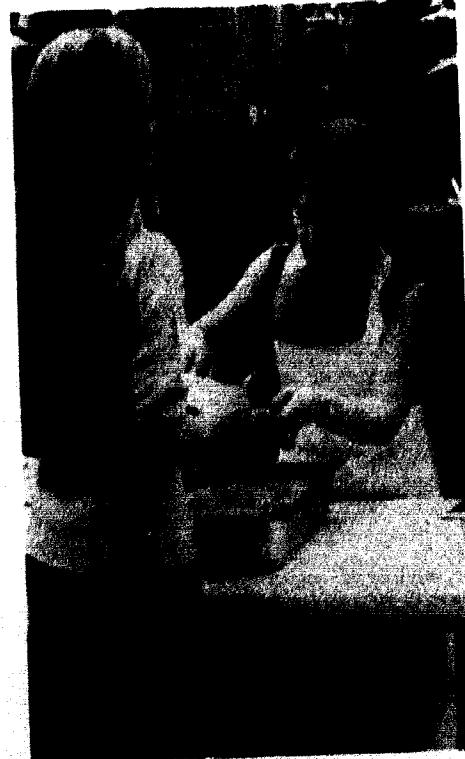

Sociology students focused attention throughout the year on the inner-city with planned field trips to disorganized sections of a neighboring metropolis, including the areas of racial disturbance.

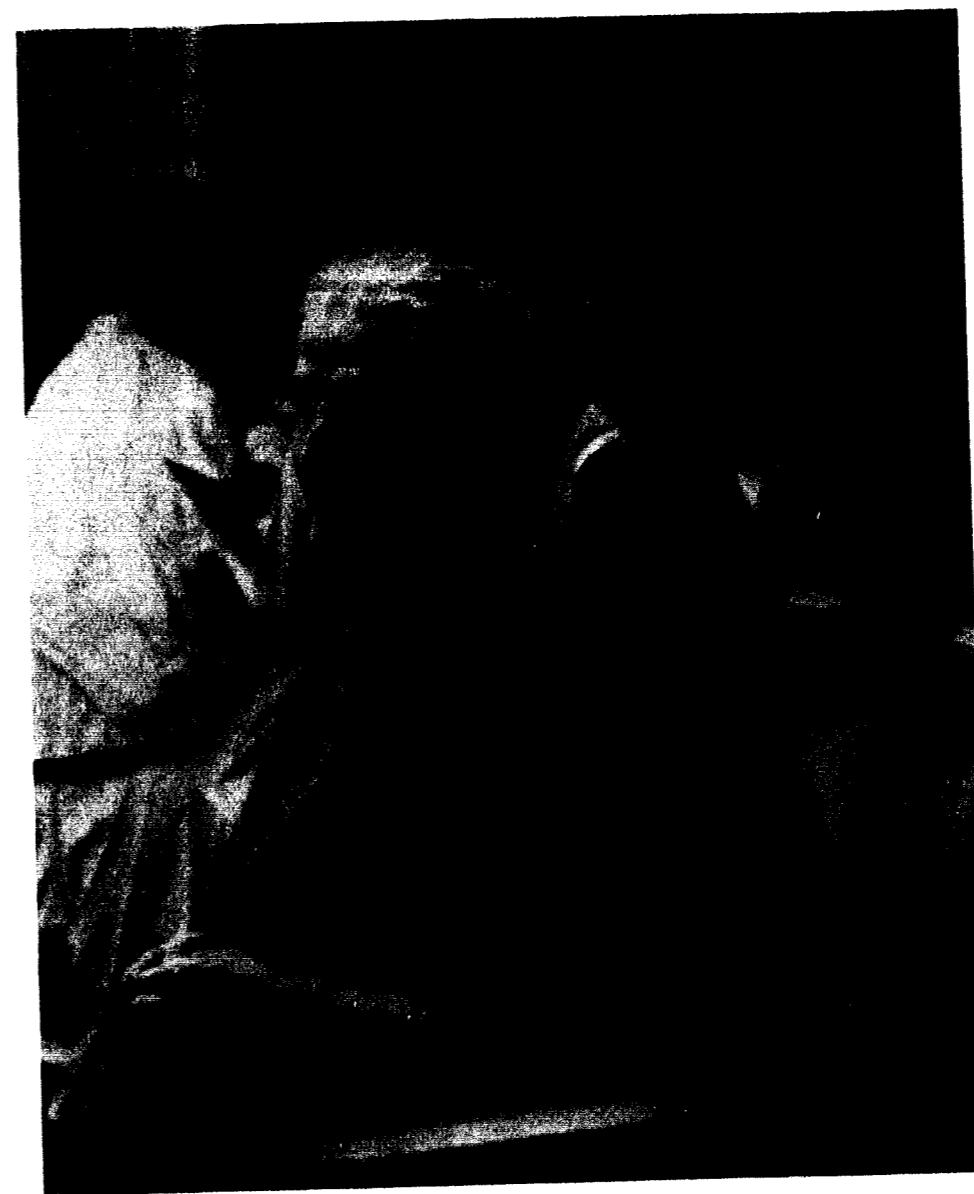
Interest in problems of ethnic and racial groups gave rise to the planning of seminars at Fellowship House in Kansas City. Students participated in voluntary activities in such institutions as McCune Home for Boys, St. Joseph Hospital No. 2, and Leavenworth Federal Penitentiary. Students in the class on population conducted a three-day fast to understand the effects of hunger.

To emphasize the scientific aspects of psychology, a three-hour comparative psychology course was set up which made a comparison of animals and humans. Other classes of the Psychology Department included counseling and personal adjustment seminars, combining the academic and personal development of a group. The two-hour sessions of encounter were designed to encourage self-awareness and personal growth through group techniques.

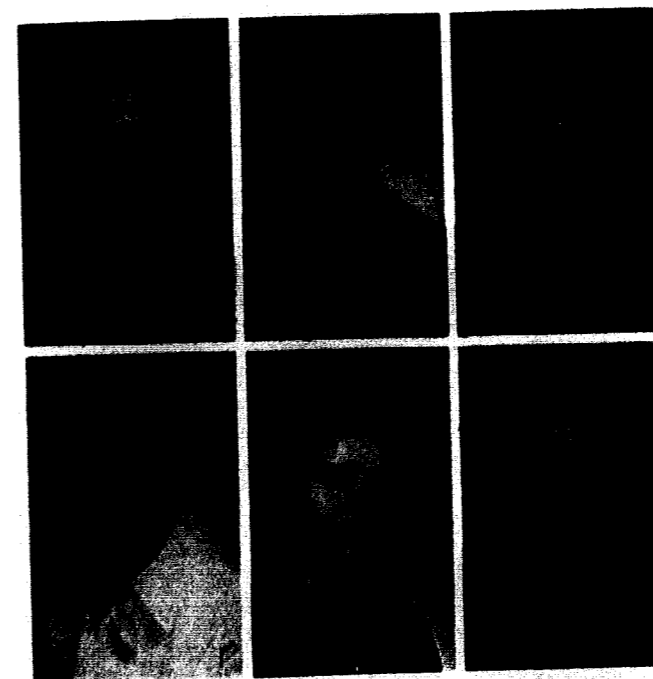
# Mitchell Returned to Department

# Wagenknecht Assumed Post

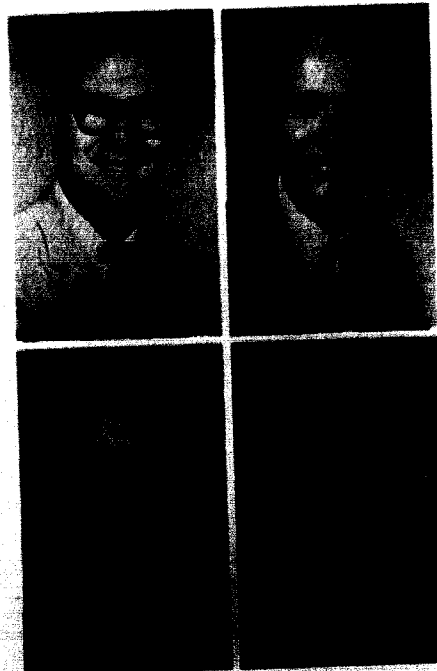

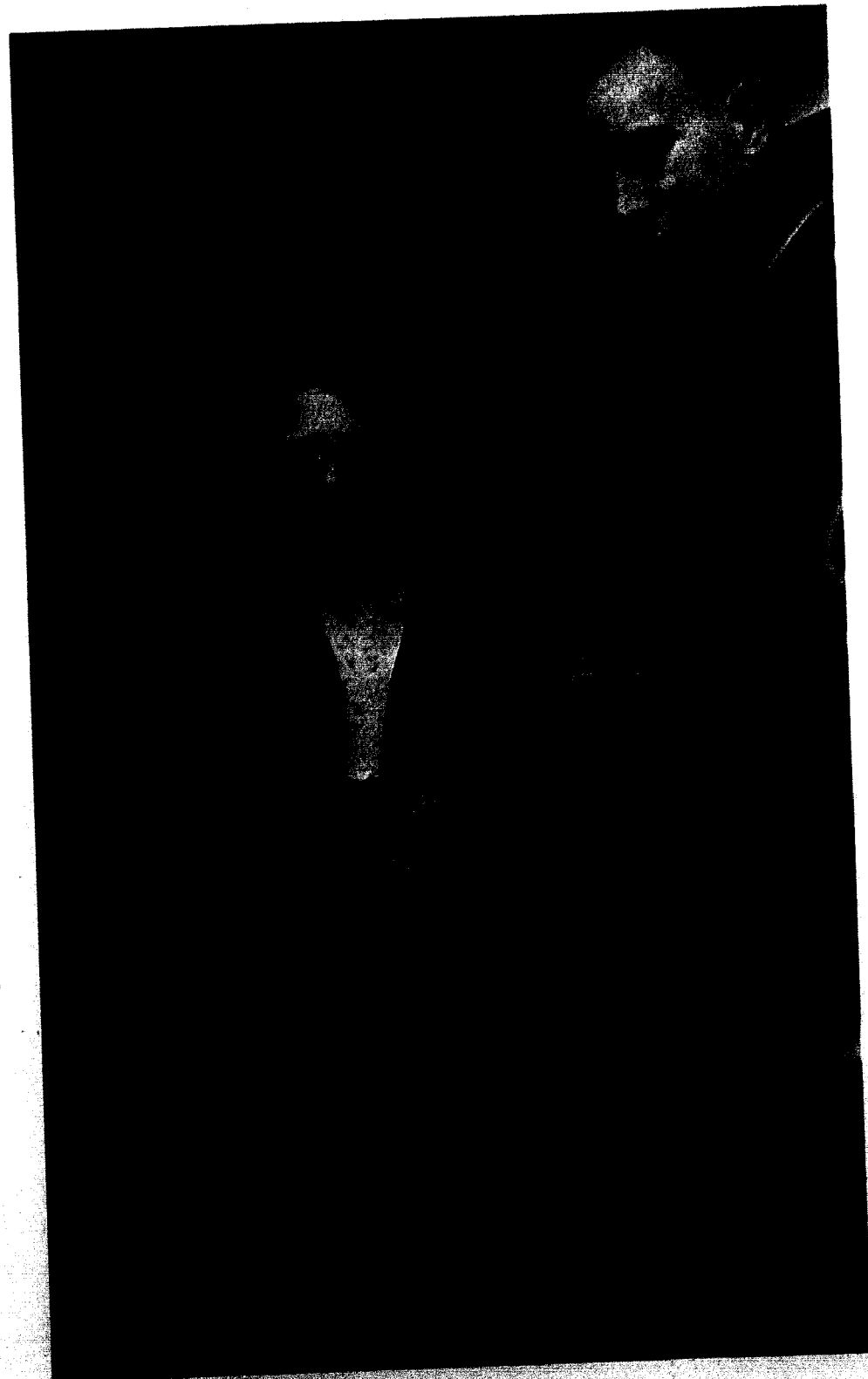

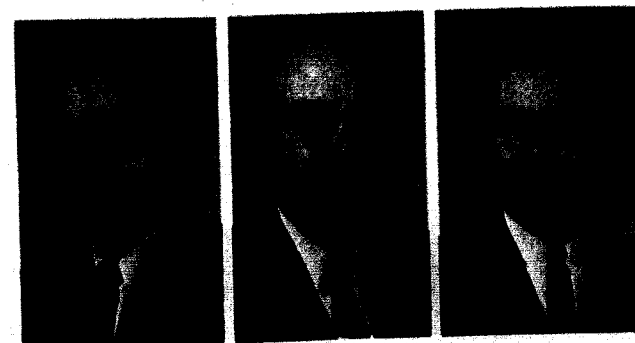

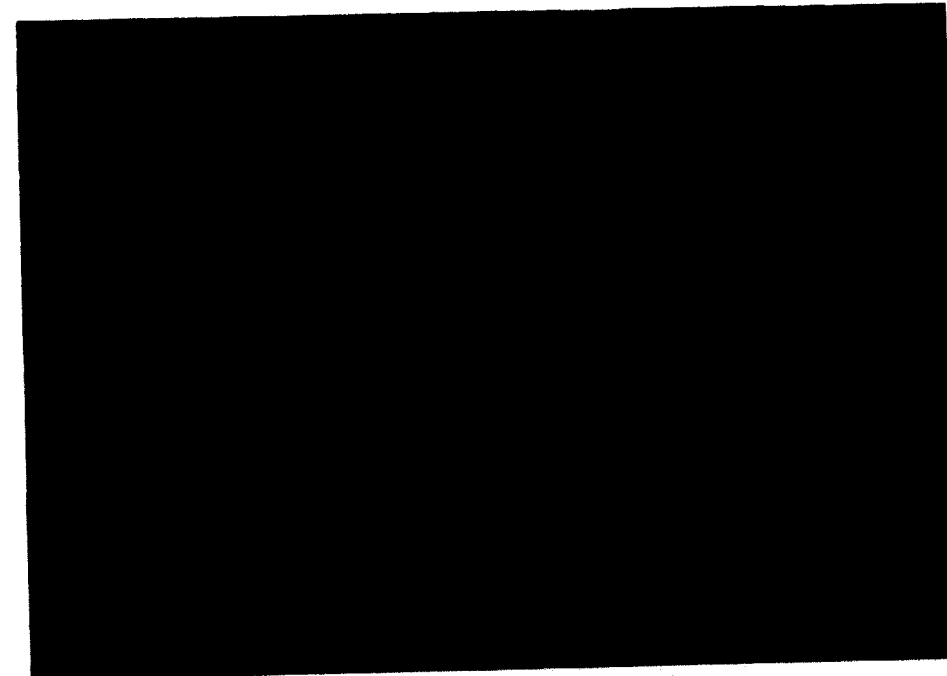

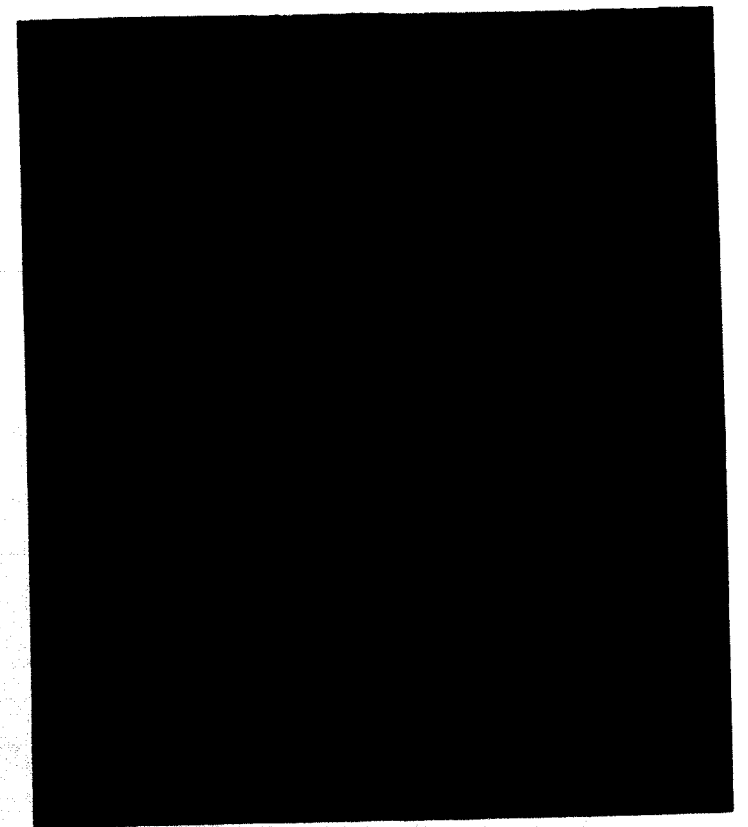

By now the class has become an integral part of school affairs and can look forward to the three years ahead.

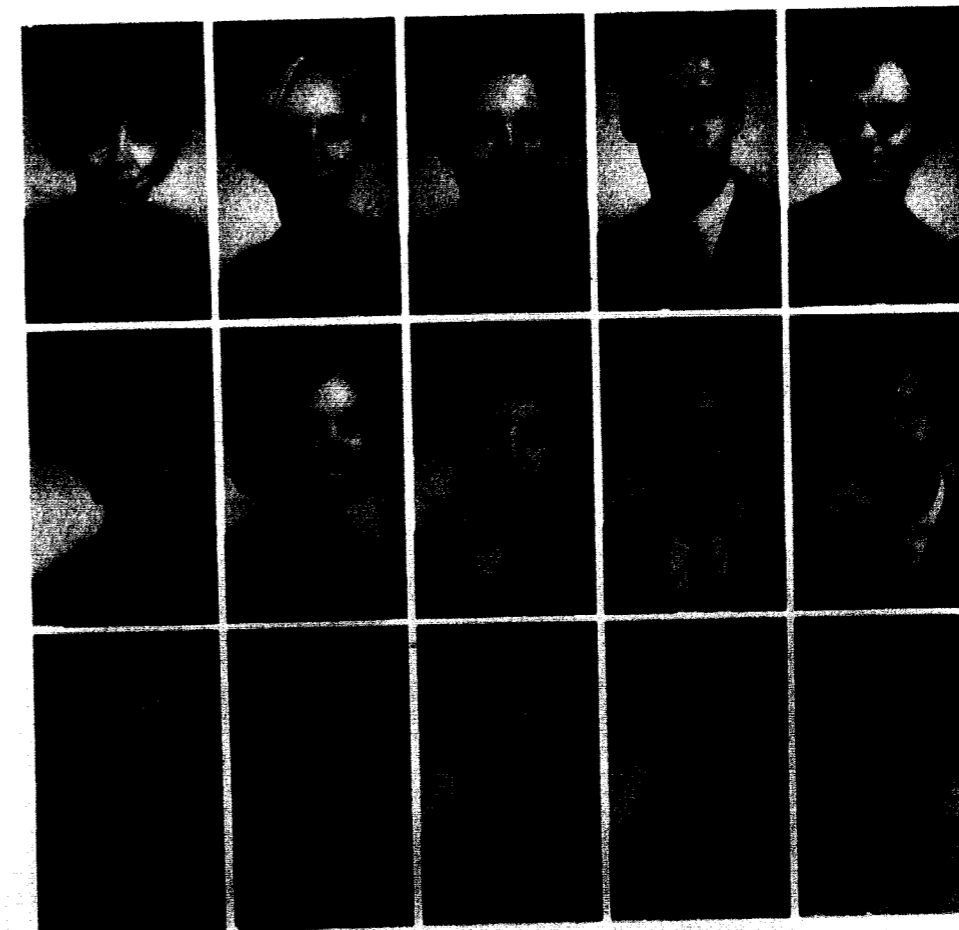

As each senior received his diploma he could look backward to four years of college experiences and forward to the world beyond.

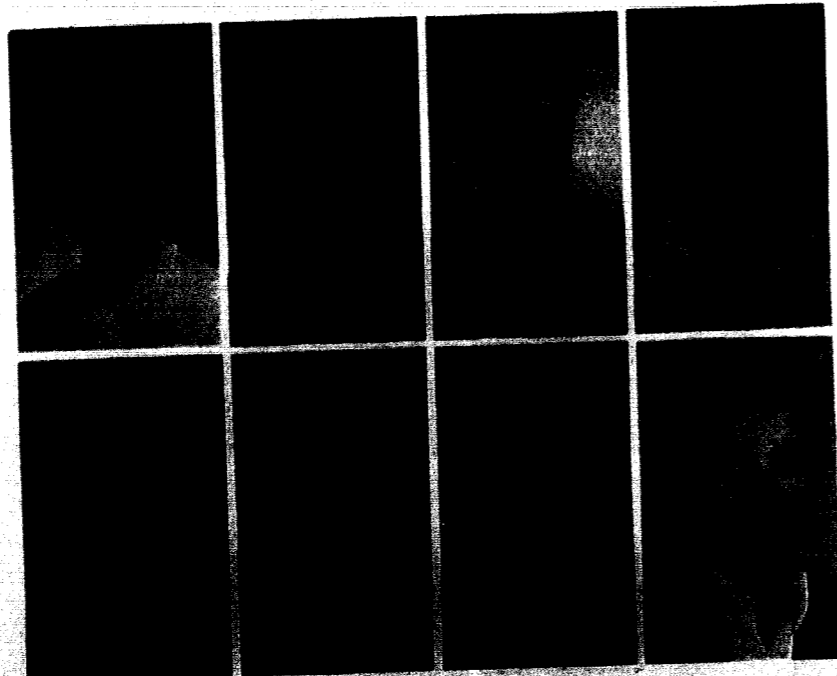
