Dr. Walter Pope Binns has been president of William Jewell College for eleven years. During this time the faculty members and students have come to admire and respect his gracious manners and intellectual Chapel talks, which are always inspirational to the college student.

Since his inauguration as the ninth president of William Jewell College, November 11, 1943, Dr. Binns has been largely responsible for the improvements in buildings and administration. His views expressed in conferences are always well thought out and clearly presented.

DR. BINNS' MESSAGE

"Man's right to knowledge and the free use thereof" is the subject chosen by Columbia University for the celebration of her two hundredth anniversary. The minister of Riverside Church chose as the text for his Anniversary sermon Moffatt's translation of Proverbs 1:7— "Reverence for the Eternal is the first thing in knowledge."

The two ideas are basic in the educational philosophy of William Jewell College, (1) The unfettered search for truth and the freedom to teach the truth as one finds it (2) The conviction that the knowledge of God is the foundation of all truth and that obedience to God is the first duty of man. This is the beginning of the Christian College.

Rich is the experience of students and faculty united in this fellowship of learning and growing. The goal is to know, to be, to achieve, to serve — and to find joy in the process. Many and varied are the activities and agencies — classes, tests, examinations, lectures, operas, plays, debates, parties, fraternities, sororities, learned societies, athletics, choirs, bands, Achievement Day, Tatler Revue, orientation, Commencement, Homecoming Day, Religious Focus Week, choosing the team captains, crowning the queens, electing the editors and class officers, talking it all over in the "bull sessions."

Board Supports School

The Board of Trustees of William Jewell College is an outstanding group of professional and industrial leaders from all over the country. These men advise the college on financial matters, and administrative matters, and formulate the policy of the college.

The trustees attend the Achievement Day ceremonies and Commencement in a body. This is about the only time that most of the students see the college trustees, but they function 365 days a year.

The present Board of Trustees has twenty-one members and one trustee emeritus, John B. Wornall. President of the Board is Mr. William P. Browning, Jr., and Mr. Charles F. Curry is vice-president.

DR. H. I. HESTER

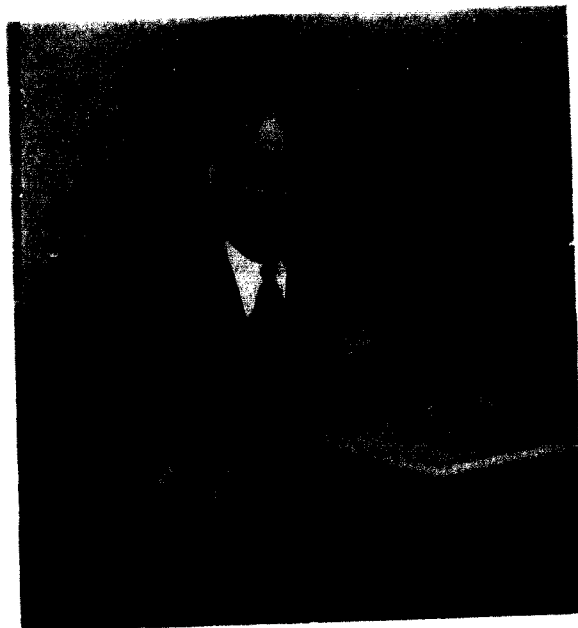
Dr. H. I. Hester came here in 1926 and from that time on he has been head of the Department of Religion. In 1943, he became vice-president in charge of the administration of academic affairs. In this long term Dr. Hester has served under three presidents and was interim president for one year.

Besides being closely connected with the Southern Baptist Convention, Dr. Hester is personally associated with alumni of Jewell who are in places of responsibility in the American Baptist Convention.

After receiving his Bachelor of Arts degree at Wake Forest College in 1918, Dr. Hester went on to the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary, receiving the degrees of Master of Theology in 1921 and Doctor of Theology in 1923. He holds a Doctor of Divinity degree from Wake Forest College.

Vice-Presidents

Mr. Minetry Jones holds the position of vice-president in charge of Business Administration. Living in St. Joseph, Mr. Jones serves as deacon of the First Baptist Church there and has long been a leader and supporter of the Southern Baptist Convention.

The future plans of the college are among his many duties of vice-president as well as conducting the current business affairs in their financial transactions.

Mr. Jones came to work for the college in June, 1938. Previous to that he was a member of the Board of Trustees, from 1932 to 1938, when he resigned to join the administrative staff. For many years he was in business with the Jones Hat Company of St. Joseph, Mo.

Deans

Miss Catherine Bates shows her interest in the student affairs of the college by her active participation in faculty committees that are in charge of the various activities. Some of these committees are Admissions, Dormitories, Freshman Initiation, Fraternities and Sororities, Religious Activities and Student Activities.

As Dean of Women, Miss Bates is now successfully finishing her sixth year. This is a difficult position to fill well, for from her office come the rules, regulations and hours by which the girls living on campus must abide.

Besides being known for her southern charm, Miss Bates is also known for the fairness and justice with which she makes decisions concerning the girls and their problems.

After completing her undergraduate work at Agnes Scott College in Georgia, Catherine Bates went to the Women's Missionary Union Training school at Louisville, Ky. Since then she has done further graduate work in student personnel at the Teacher's College of Columbia University.

DR. FRANK G. EDSON, *Dean of the College*



Dr. Frank G. Edson is now completing his fourth year as Dean of the College. He holds this position as well as that of head of the Department of Chemistry and professor of chemistry. His duties he has done well in his 25 years on the William Jewell faculty.

Dr. Edson is a charter member of the Midwest Research Institute Branch of the Scientific Research Society of America. Also he is a member and faculty sponsor of Theta Chi Delta, national chemistry fraternity.

His aptitudes and abilities in many fields have ranked Dr. Edson among the best educators in the nation. An example of this is the planning of a large chemical plant in Pittsburg, Kans., in the early war years.

The degrees which Dr. Edson holds are: A.B. from William Jewell College, 1925; A.M. in 1929 and Ph.D. in 1933 from the University of Colorado. He has done further graduate study at the University of Wisconsin and the University of Minnesota.

Deans

Mr. F. W. Holzapfel, whose official title is Dean of Students, Director of Admissions, and Director of Guidance and Placement, came to work for the college in 1948 as Director of Student Personnel. In the spring of 1951 he was given the present title of Dean of Students.

In addition to his many other duties, Mr. Holzapfel is in charge of the college testing program which includes the tests given to new students and transfer students.

In spite of his many activities, Dean Holzapfel is always ready and willing to help any student who may have some difficulty in school. He takes a personal interest in knowing students and the phases of campus life that affect them.

Mr. Holzapfel did his undergraduate work at Westmar College, graduating in 1926, and he received his Master of Science Degree from Iowa State College in 1937. Since then he has done further graduate work at the University of Southern California.

DR. ALLEN J. MOON, *Dean Emeritus*



Dr. Allen J. Moon, who came to the college in 1925, has been on the faculty longer than any other man except P. Caspar Harvey. In the many years that Dr. Moon has been at William Jewell, he has served in an administrative capacity as well as that of head of the Department of Ancient Languages and professor of Latin and Greek. Previous to his resignation in 1945 as Dean of the College, he had served in this capacity 14 years. Dr. Moon is now Dean Emeritus and is also professor of Latin.

Dr. Moon shows his interest in the student life of the college by giving his sage advice to the matters of the Curriculum Committee and as faculty advisor for the Interfraternity Council.

After receiving his A.B. degree from Howard College, Dr. Moon also received his A.M. and LL.D. degrees from the same school. He held a fellowship in Greek at the University of Chicago and has done further graduate study at the University of Virginia and the University of Chicago.

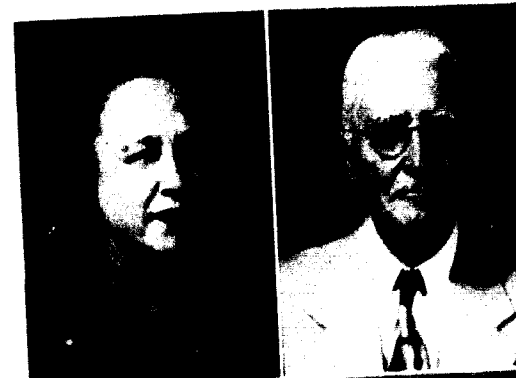

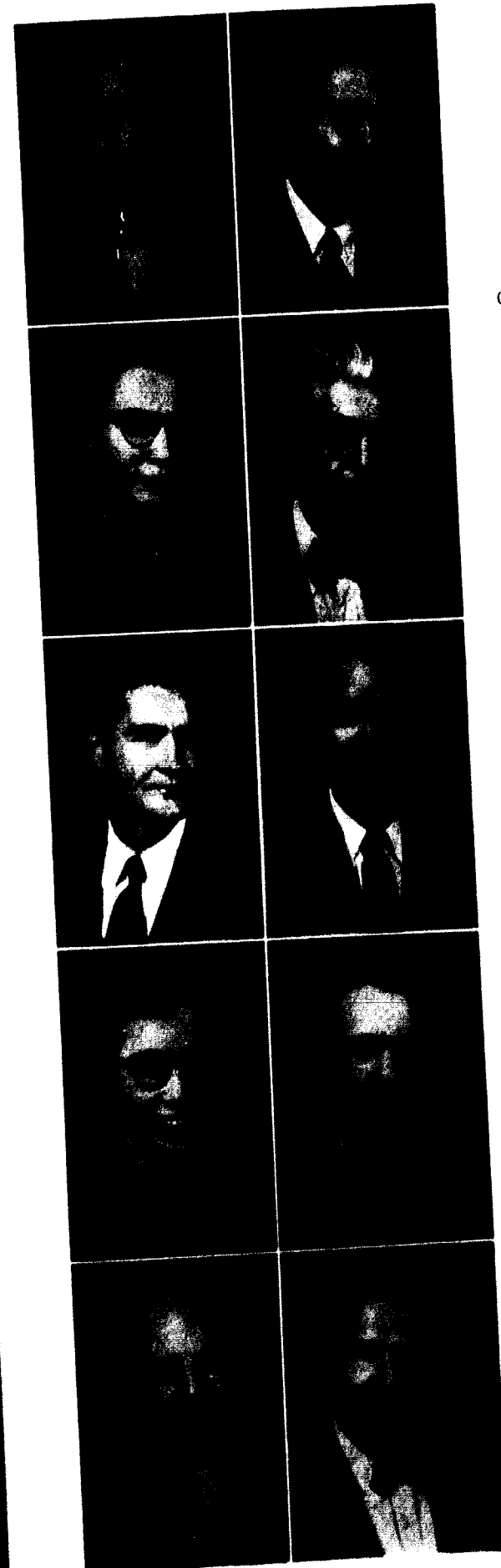

Cardinal Football Team Wins M. C. A. U. Championship in 1953

The William Jewell Cardinals' football team finished the '53-'54 season with a record of nine wins and one loss, but won the Missouri College Athletic Union title with four wins and no losses.

In the final small college statistics released by the NCAA at the conclusion of the season, William Jewell ranked sixth in total offense with an average of 387 yards per game and finished fifth in rushing offense with an average of 392 yards per game.

Al Ericson, sophomore from Fort Dodge, Ia., carried the ball 48 times and gained 585 yards to finish 68th in the nation. Four other backs, Bob Nield, senior from Danville, Ill., Dick Burns, sophomore from Kansas City, Bob Unverferth, sophomore from Oakwood, Ill., and Don Jackson, sophomore from Kansas City, all gained over 400 yards during the season.

The Cardinals also finished 26th in the nation in rushing defense, holding their opponents to an average of 98.2 yards on the ground per game. In punting, Fred Merrell was 19th in the nation with a 37 yd. average for 37 punts.

William Jewell scored heavily on the MCAU all conference team. Laural Holbick, senior from Oakwood, Ill., Coy Brown, senior from Independence, Bob Nield, senior from Danville, Ill., and Dan Golden, senior also from Danville, Ill., were listed on the MCAU all-conference first team.

On the second team were: Fred Merrell, junior and Dick Burns, sophomore from Kansas City. Al Ericson, sophomore from Fort Dodge, Ia., Jerry Hampton, senior from Cameron, and Don Bowen, junior from Kansas City were on the honorable mention list.

Coach Norris A. "Pat" Patterson, assisted by coach James "Jim" Nelson, has coached the football teams to 35 wins, 5 losses, and 1 tie. This is the fourth season for both coaches and their second MCAU championship team.

The Cardinals won their first title during the 1950 season, but were nosed out in '51 and '52 by the Missouri Valley Vikings. This year, however, William Jewell edged out the Vikings 16-14 with a field goal kicked by Al Ericson in the final six seconds of play.

Norris A. Patterson, director of athletics and head football and baseball coach at William Jewell College, received his A.B. from Missouri Valley College in 1939 and his M.A. from Kansas City University in 1952.

After five years in the Navy, "Pat" became head coach at Excelsior Springs high school where he remained for three years. The following year he held a similar position at Danville, Ill. During that time his teams won thirty-six and lost three games. In 1950 Patterson tutored the Cardinals to their first M.C.I.U. championship since 1938.

Our most popular director of athletics hails from Odessa, Mo., where he attended high school and played football under a brother Cecil who is now football mentor at Southeast high school in Kansas City.

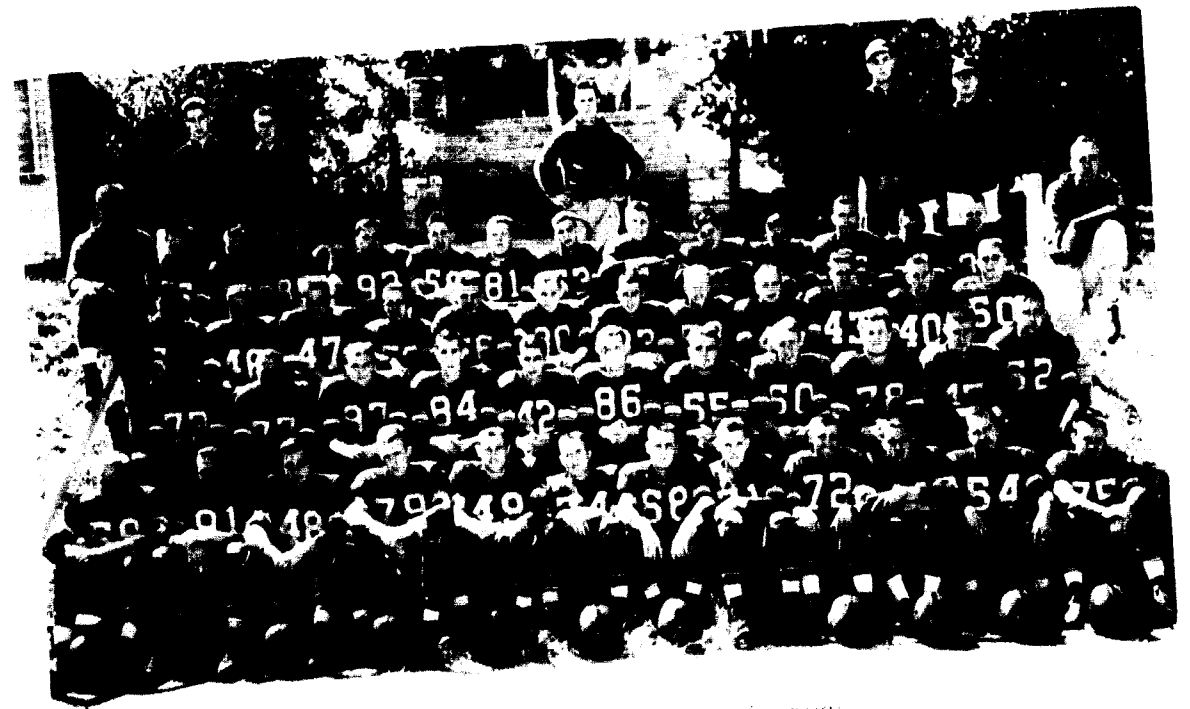
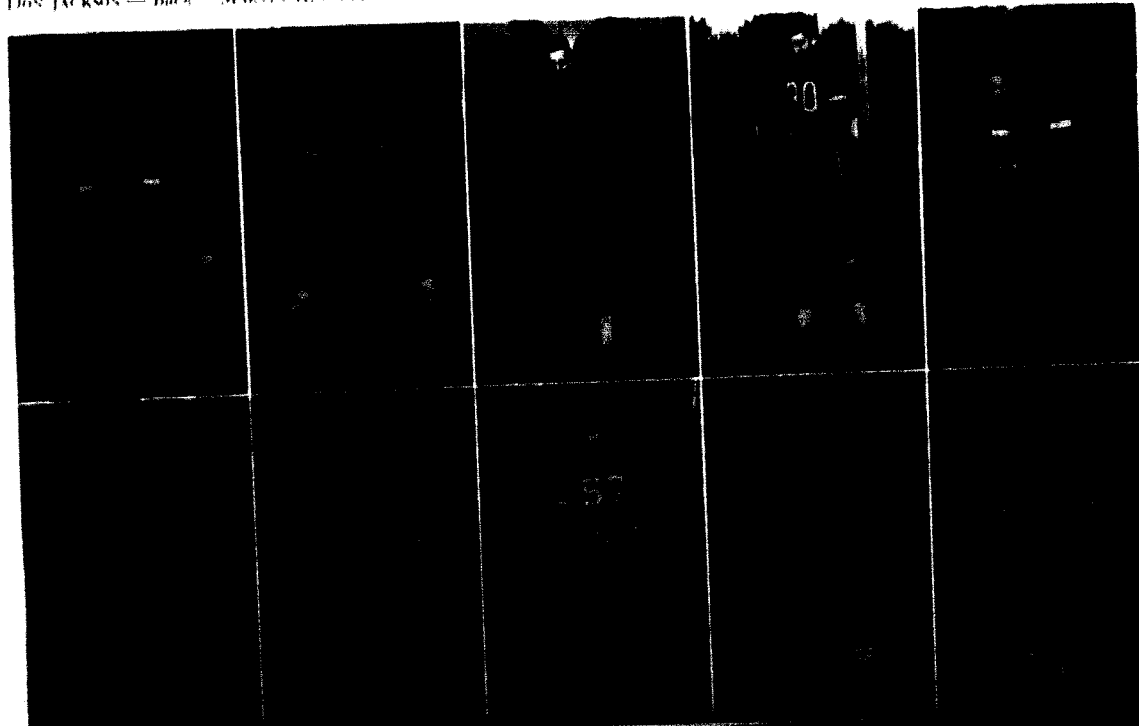
William Jewell College can certainly be proud of the time our coaches have spent in training their teams to so many victories.

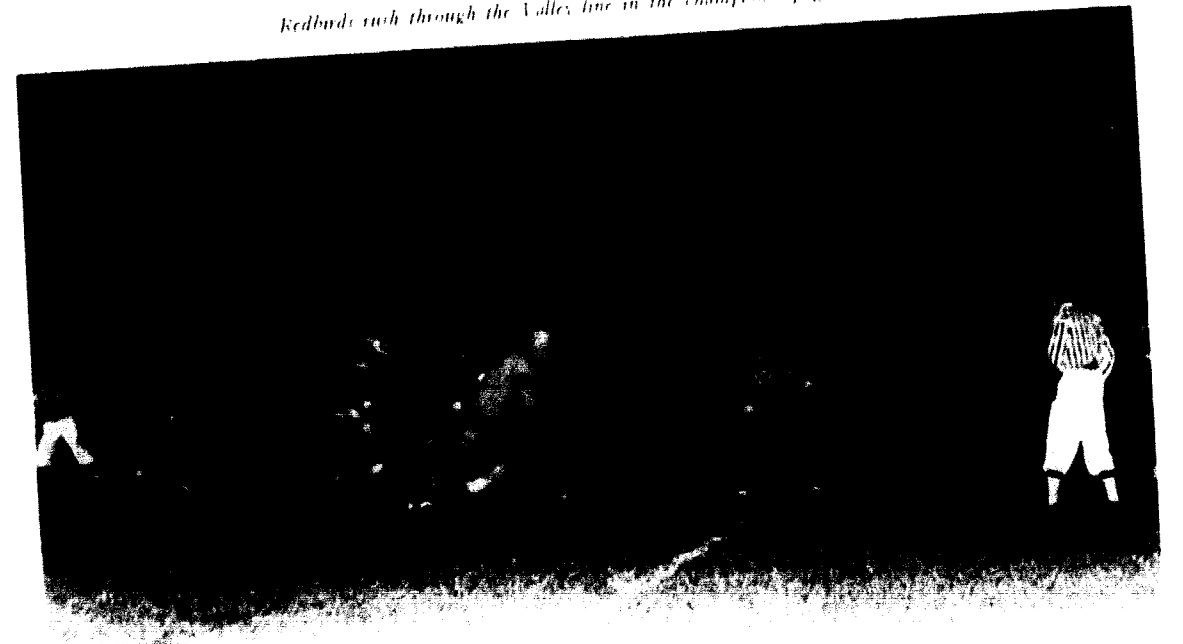

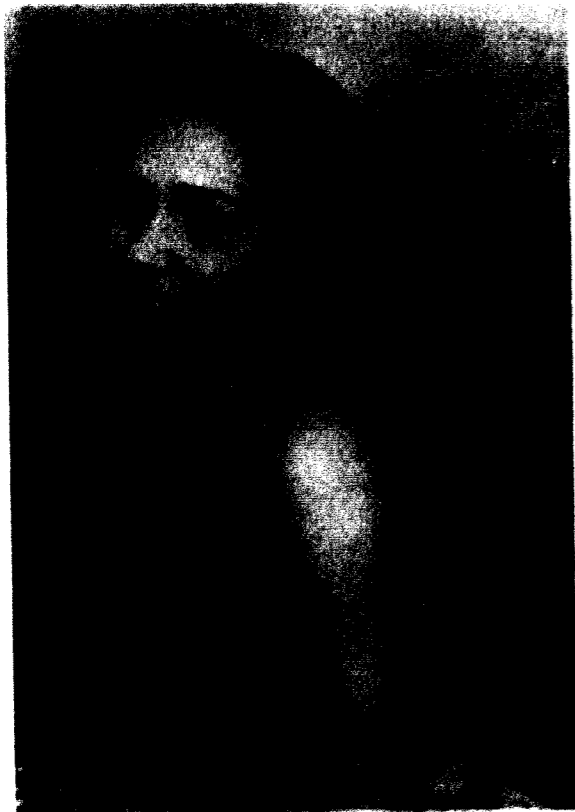

Redbirds rush through the Valley line in the championship game.



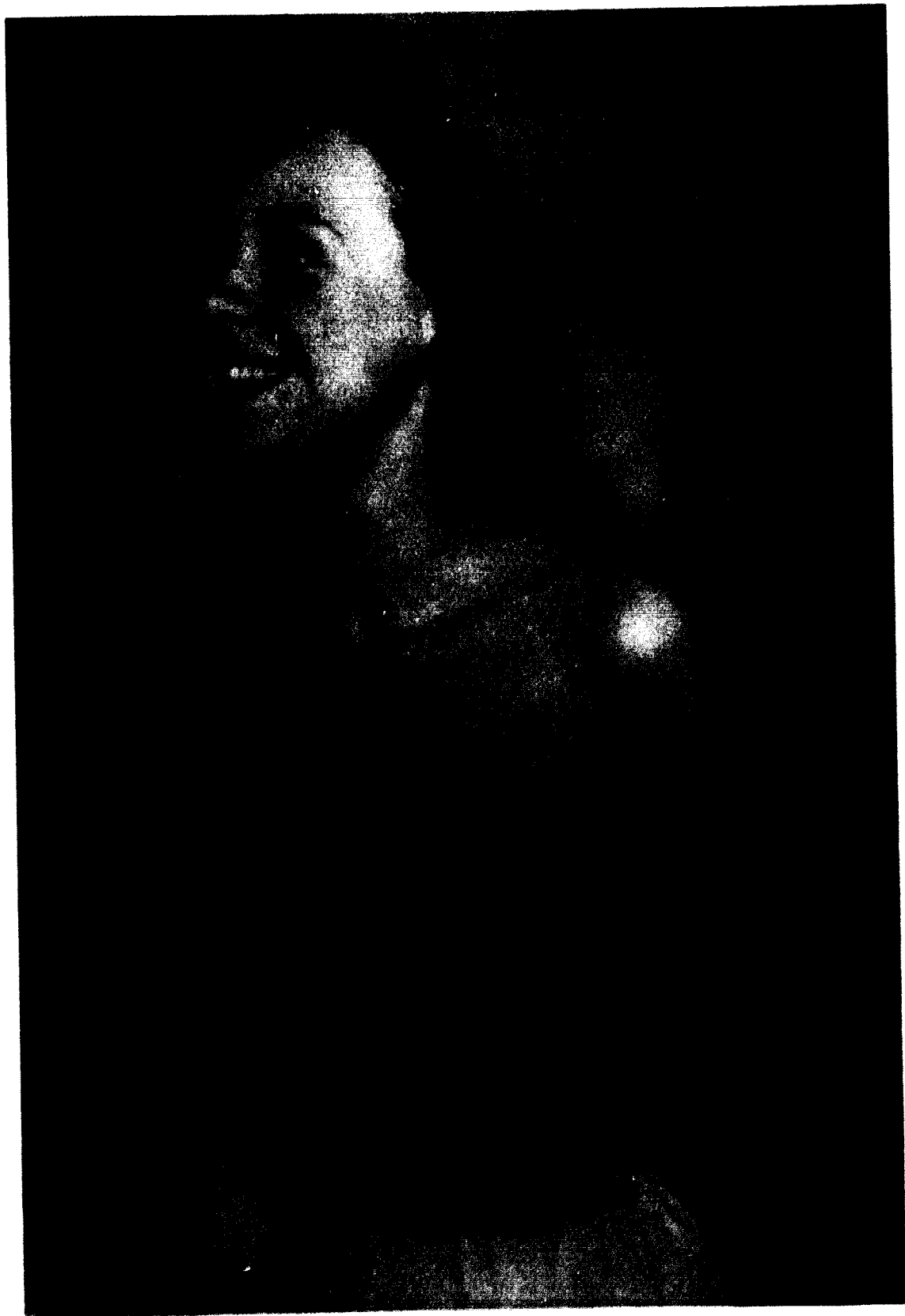

B. S. U. Meets Spiritual Needs

The work of the Baptist Student Union was given a boost this year with the coming of Miss Betsy Morgan who serves as director of Religious Activities and assistant Dean of Women. Miss Morgan, better known to the students as Betsy, did her undergraduate work at Meredith College in Raleigh, N.C., and her graduate work at the Women's Missionary Training School at Louisville, Ky. Betsy comes well prepared for her work, as she has served one year as a Dean of Women at a junior college and as an instructor in psychology.

This year the BSU has been very active in mission projects. These have included work at Brady Home for children, Hilltop home for Girls and McCune Home for Boys, in addition to work with the old folks' homes in the surrounding area. Work was also planned in connection with the Negro Baptist Church and the Pleasant Valley Church.

This year two work weeks were conducted, one in the fall and one in the spring. The proceeds of these work weeks go to the 1953-1954 Summer Mission Fund.

BSU activities include morning watch, noonday devotions, a "Howdy" party in the fall honoring new students, a BSU chapel which introduces the work of this group to the students, Thanksgiving vespers, Student Night at Christmas, a hamburger fry for the new students second semester, fellowship hours and discussion groups after church, caroling at Christmas, a banquet in the spring, and an exchange party

with the Kansas City BSU group. The group was well represented at the State Convention of the BSU and the Spring Retreat at the Lake of the Ozarks.

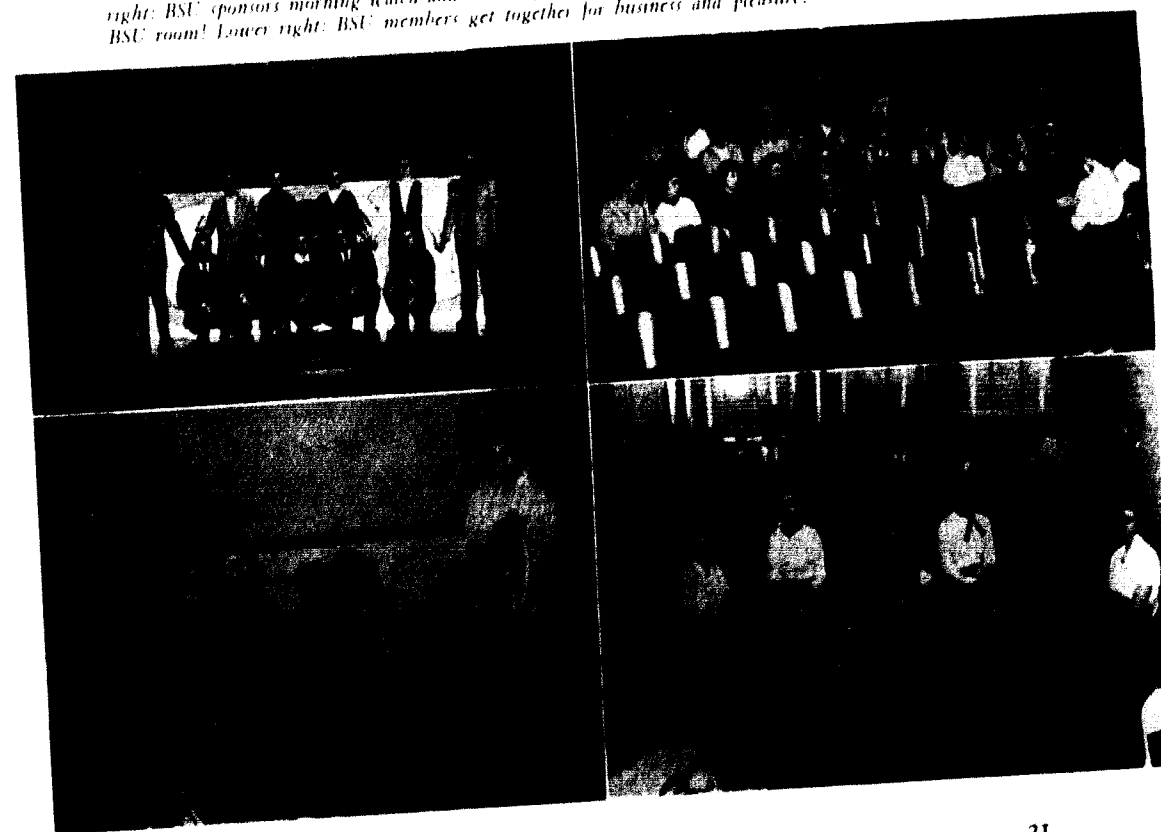
The Freshman council took over for a month in the spring. Les Ridenhouer was their president. The executive council met every Monday and the Greater Council met at least once a month. The Greater Council was made up of representatives of all unit organizations, the executive council and all committee members. The unit organizations are the Baptist Sunday School, Training Union and Forum, the Ministerial Association, Epsilon Omega Pi, and the Young Women's Auxiliary.

Achievement Day Honors Alumni

The tenth annual Achievement Day took place on Nov. 12, for the tenth straight time in glorious autumn weather.

The morning opened with five forums at 9 o'clock. The entire student body attended these discussion groups, whose chairmen were Dr. David Grosch, Prof. Paul D. Brinkley, Miss Olive Thomas, Dr. Frank Edson, and Dr. George Wolfskill.

The academic procession formed at Jewell Hall, led by the college band, and with its multicolored hoods and traditional caps and gowns, entered the chapel.

The chapel choir sang "And the Glory of the Lord," from *The Messiah*. Suzanne Wolf, senior from Lathrop, sang the "Alleluia" of Mozart.

President W. P. Binns read the "Citations for Achievement" of the five distinguished alumni called back to the Campus to bring messages of inspiration to the present student body and to be honored. These alumni awarded citations were: George Raymond Cuthbertson, '31; Sterling Lee Williams, '13; George Howerton, '26; Mrs. Eleanor Burton Harding, '29; and Max Webster Morgan, '39.

Immediately after each citation was presented, the honoree read a 400-word response to the large group which crowded Gano Chapel.

Judge William B. Waters, '37, presented Senator Stuart Symington of Missouri for the honorary degree of doctor of laws.

The senator then addressed the student body, stressing an open mind as an attribute of achievement. He mentioned four of his personal friends who are illustrations of the value of an open mind: Dr. Robert A. Millikan, who was the first Achievement Day speaker 10 years ago; Congressman Clarence Cannon, '04, who was awarded a citation in 1945; President Eisenhower, and Bernard M. Baruch, elder statesman.

The annual dinner climaxing Achievement Day was in the Grand Ballroom of the Hotel Muehlebach in Kansas City at 7:00 that night. Dr. Binns was toastmaster and the music was furnished by five students of the college. Senator Symington was the speaker for the evening. The title of his address was "The Air Age—Our Future and Our Faith."

Basketball Team Scores High in '54



Jim Nelson, head basketball, track, and assistant football coach at William Jewell College, was graduated in 1948 from Missouri Valley College.

While attending Missouri Valley, Jim was twice selected as guard on the Little All-American football squad. He also displayed outstanding talents on the basketball court. Jim served two years in the Marines and played for his base team at Granville, O.

Coach Nelson has made a splendid record for himself at William Jewell. He has coached his squads to a conference victory and has never finished less than third in any campaign.

William Jewell College can certainly be proud of their coaches and the many hours spent teaching fundamentals and timing to their squads. Their work paid off and the Cardinals won more than just the games.

The William Jewell basketball team, coached by Jim Nelson, finished third in the MCAU Conference this season with six conference games won and six lost. This is the best record Jewell has had in several years and the outlook for next year is even more promising as only one letterman will be graduated.

The final record of the season stands at 17 victories and 13 losses. The national ratings placed Jewell 28 in the nation with a free throw percentage of 67 per cent a game.

During Christmas vacation Coach Nelson and ten of his squad members took a 2000 mile trip through Southern Missouri, Tennessee, Kentucky, Indiana, Illinois and won four straight games and lost only one, the first.

Laural Hobick, 1953-54 captain, from Fithian, Ill., is the only letterman to leave the squad. Hobick is a four year letterman in all sports and was co-captain of the 1953 MCAU championship football team. His major is physical education.

Charlie Bobbitt will be the 1954-55 captain. Bobbitt, who is from Sullivan, finished 19 in the national free-throw division with an 81 per cent average. He is a three-year letterman and plays guard. Not only is he the shortest member on the squad, but one of the fastest.

Fred Potter, a junior, hails from Independence. He plays forward position and is a three-year letterman. Fred is also a baseball letterman and is a physical education major.

Art Root, a sophomore, also claims Independence as his home town. Art, the tallest man on the team, plays center position. He is an economics major and an art minor.

Art Chambers, who played forward, lives in Liberty. He is a junior and a two-year letterman. Art highjumps in track. He is also a physical education major.

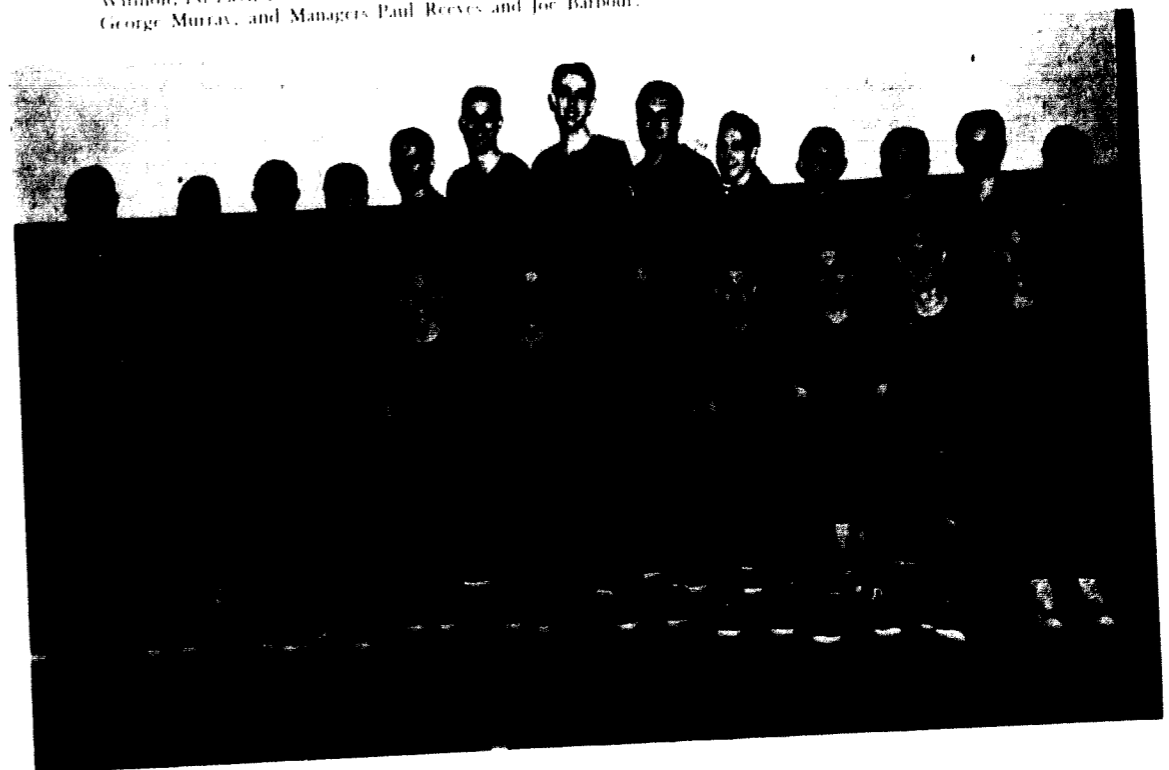

The lettermen besides Mason and Ranney were: Jim Bonuchi and his brother Vic Bonuchi, from St. Louis.

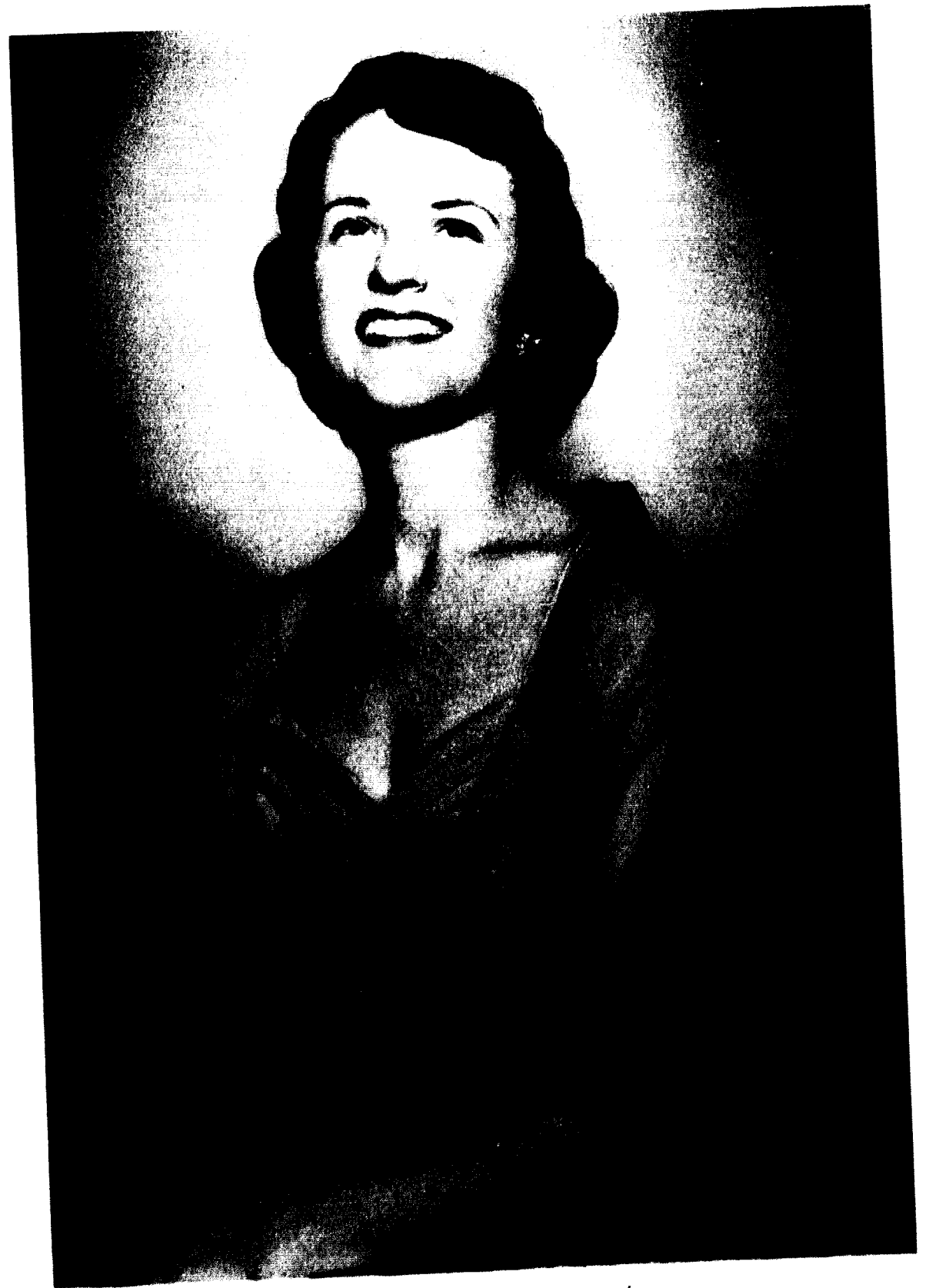

Pi Kappa Delta Members Win Speech Awards

Pi Kappa Delta, national forensics fraternity, is the hub of intramural and intercollegiate speech activities.

Opening event of the season was the Intramural Speech Festival, won by Sigma Nu, with Lambda Chi Alpha and Independent Society second and third. Individual event winners were George DeHaven, oratory; Diane Betts, extemporaneous speaking; George Neth, after dinner speaking; Judy Hall, original poetry.

Next came debate tournaments. With a large squad and lots of enthusiasm, the seven teams piled up a series of impressive wins. In the C.I.C. Tournament at Washburn University, the Midwest Tournament at Kirksville, and William Jewell's own Blizzard Tournament, Abbott and Byrne were undefeated. At the University of Arkansas, Dehaven and Neth went to the semi-finals in the junior division; Gaul and Finley lost a 2-1 decision in the eighth and final round, senior division; won four out of five at the Missouri state tournament. Parr and Smith went through three tournaments with all wins: a triangle meet at Ottawa University, the Blizzard and the state tournaments; then won four out of six against senior women's teams at the four-state Province Tournament. Dehaven and Ramsey won four out of four in a beginners' meet at K-State—all in all, winning teams in every tournament.

A major event was the Blizzard Tournament in January, held on the campus and conducted with the assistance of more than 50 students from speech classes.

Another high point was March 25-27, when William Jewell in general and PKD in particular were hosts to the Missouri Division of the National Forensic League. Some 130 high school students spent three days on the campus in speech contests.

Final and biggest tournaments came at the end of the season: University of Nebraska (three superiors to Jewell entries), the state meet at Warrensburg, where six Jewell orators all won high awards including the state championship for both men and women; and early in April, the four-state Provincial Pi Kappa Delta tournament in Illinois. Here the squad piled up four Superiors (firsts) and four Excellents (seconds).

Those who ate steak dinners as a reward for the top ratings were Ed Gaul and Judy Taylor, men's and women's oratory; Dick Byrne, poetry reading; and Mary Jo Smith, women's extemporaneous speaking. The excellents went to Clarence Finley for men's extemp, Dick Byrne for discussion, and both the men's and women's debate teams.

One of the highest honors received by the squad in many years occurred when William Jewell students qualified to represent Missouri in both men's and women's oratory at the Interstate Oratorical Contest at Northwestern University in April. They competed against state winners from thirteen states. Judy Taylor's oration was entitled "Attie Case" and dealt with cerebral palsy. Ed Gaul, speaking on "What Trace in This Sea?" a plea for students to build their lives on sound ideals, won fourth place.

The members of Pi Kappa Delta strive to attain higher degrees each year. Beginners are given the degree of fraternity, while the highest possible student rank is that of special distinction. Both Clarence Finley and Ed Gaul hold this degree.

The chapter's capable president has been Ed Gaul, a three-year debater. Vice-president Shirlee Osborne, secretary Paul Epps, and treasurer Dick Byrne helped pilot the crew through its many activities.

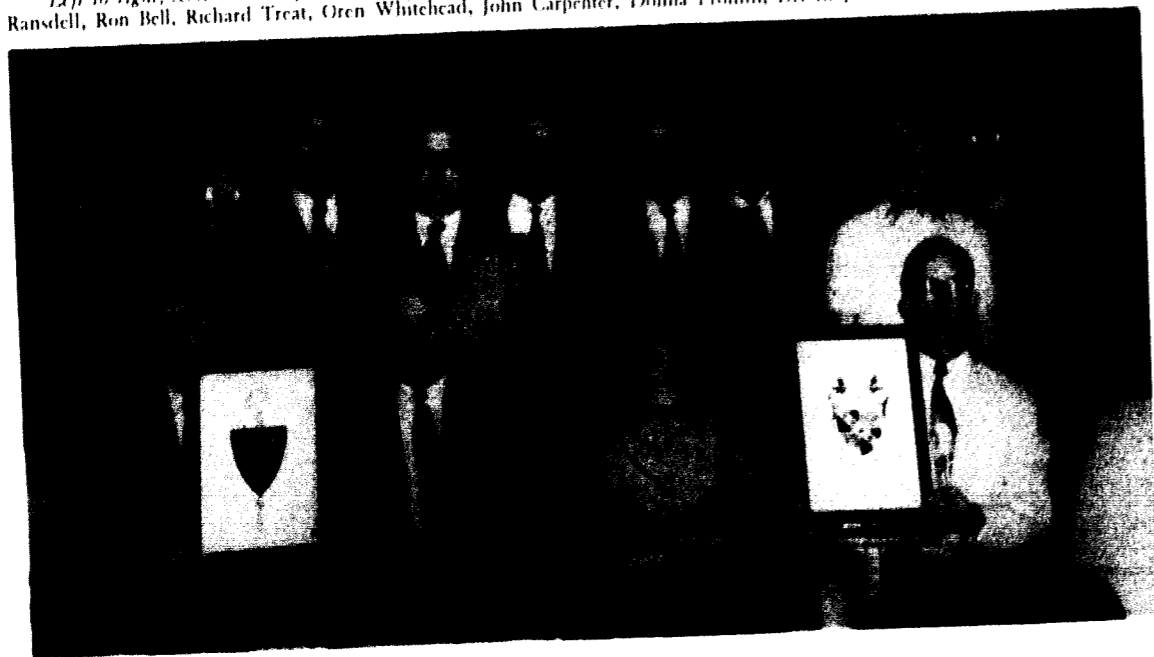

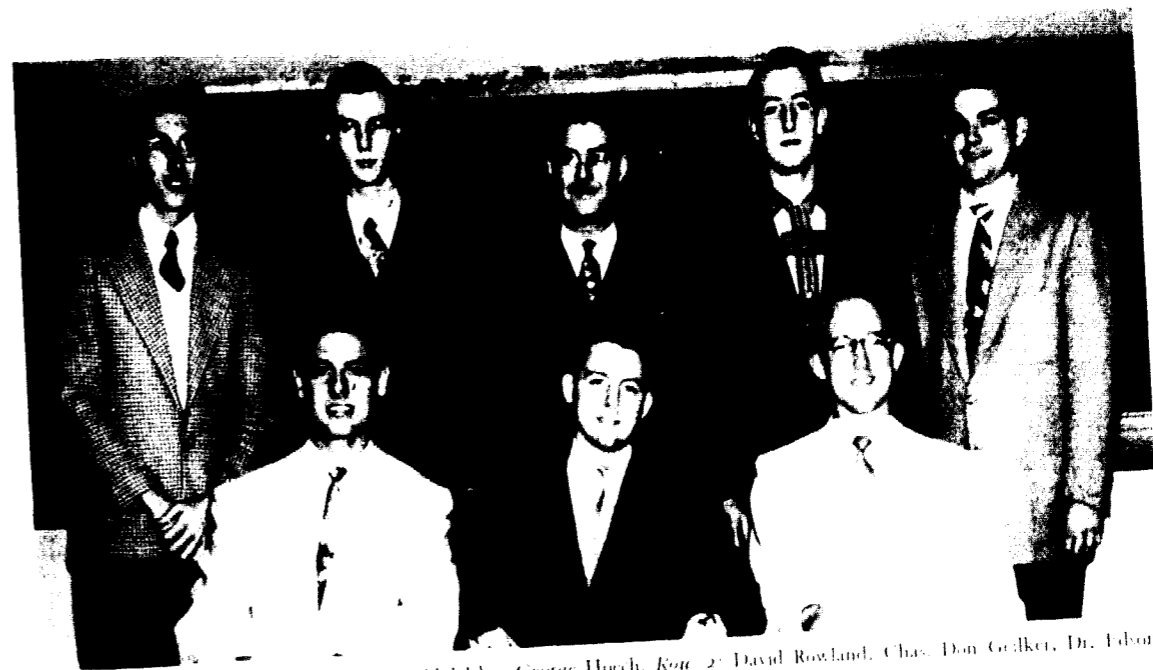

A supervisory faculty committee is composed of Minety Jones, Wilbur Bruner, T. F. Isley and L. O. Jones.

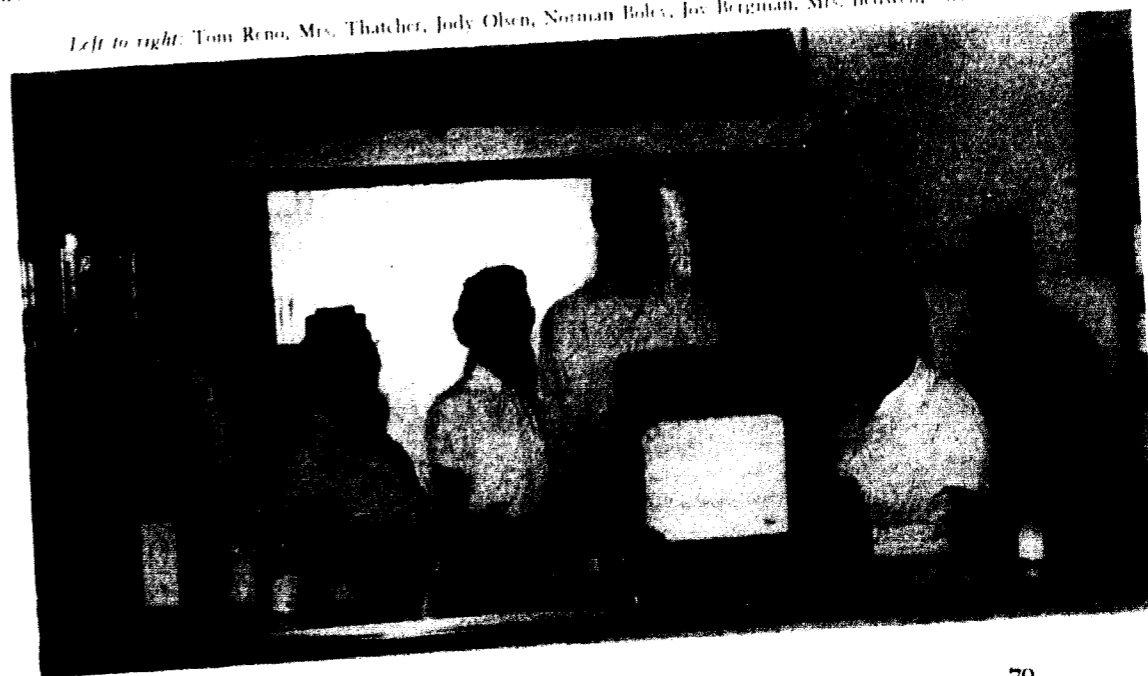
The Co-op is the campus supply station. It serves as a convenient back pathway to the Hub.

"M.C.A.U. champions" seems to be the byword for the Cardinal teams in '54, and the Jewell tennis team kept up the record by winning top honors in the conference.

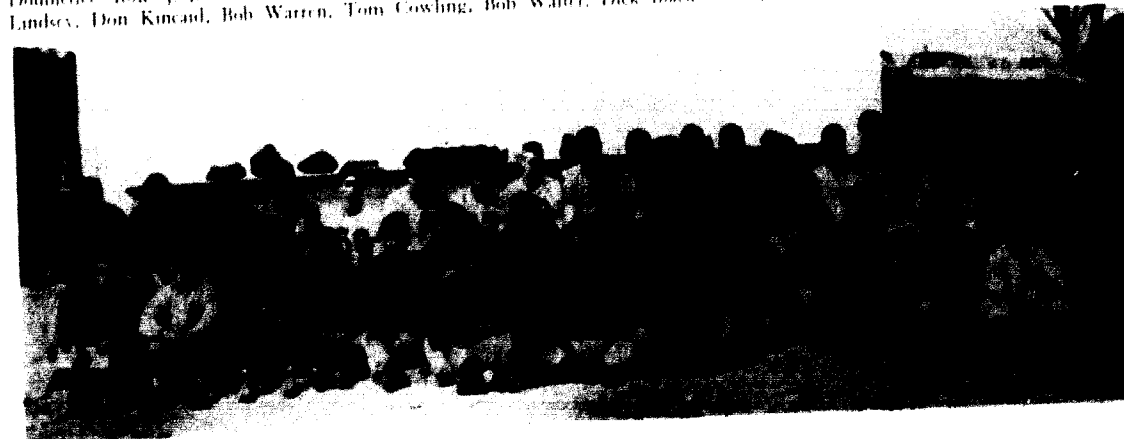

"J" Club Supports Men's Athletic Program

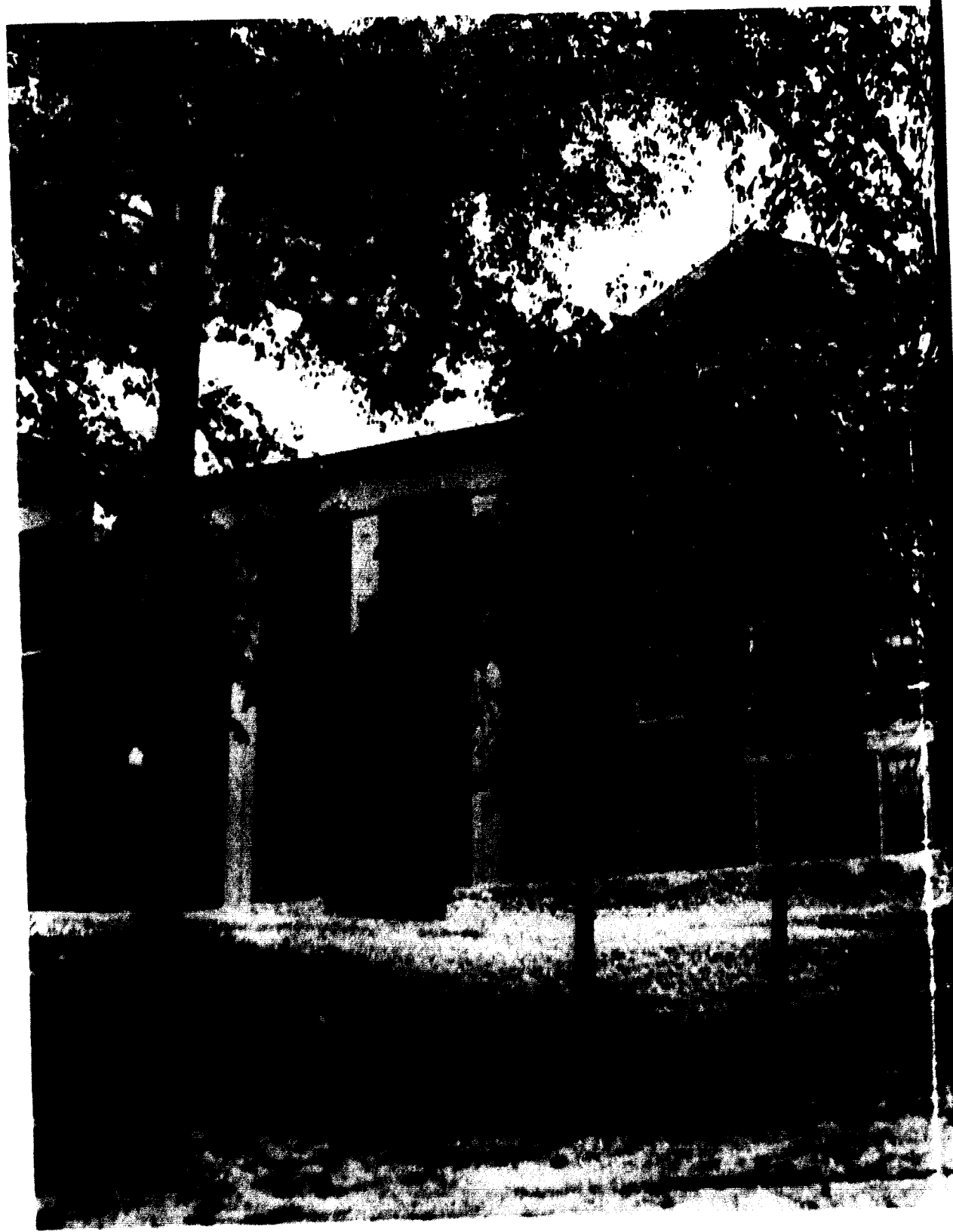

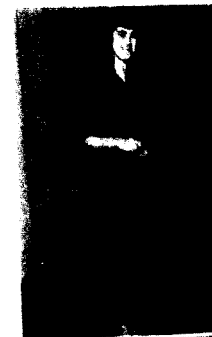
Panaegis

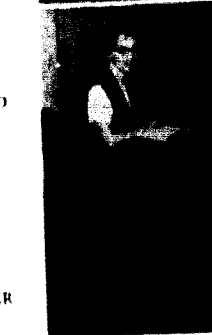

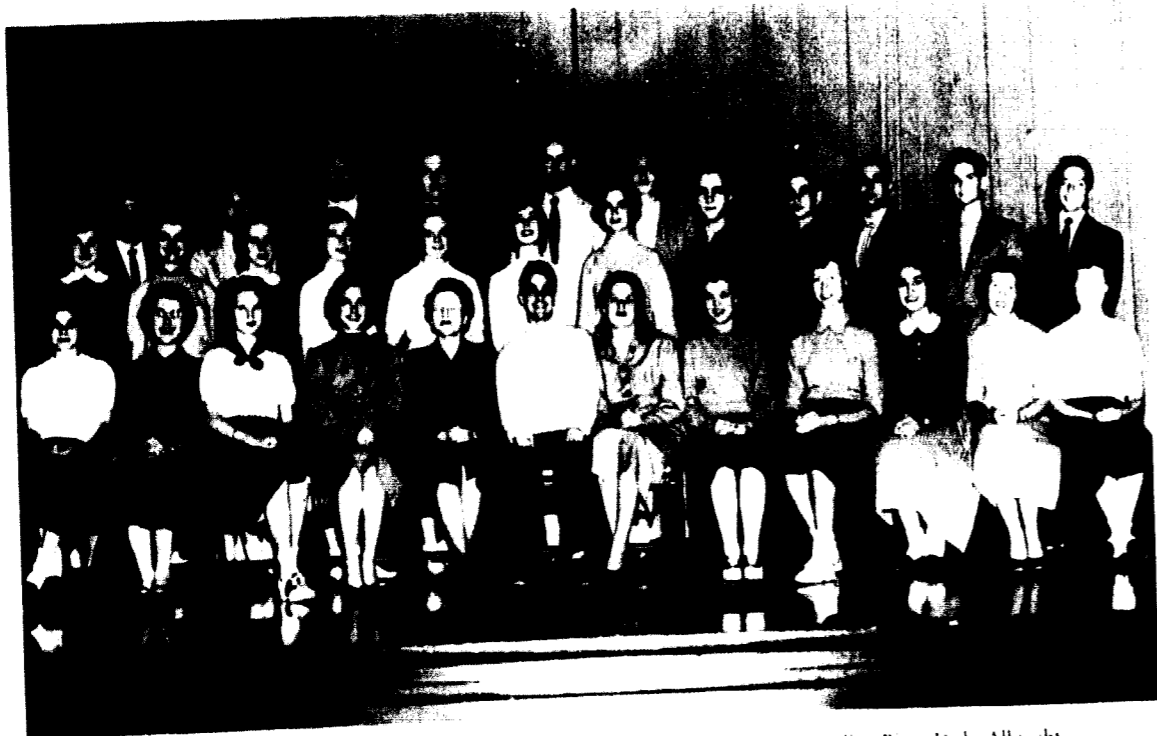

H. I. Hester Ministerial Association Forms A New Organization

On April 30, 1953, the male ministerial students of William Jewell College organized in accordance with provisions of a formal constitution and adopted the name of the H. I. Hester Ministerial Association, in recognition of Dr. Hester and his twenty-six years of personal interest, leadership, and invaluable counsel to students preparing for Christian service.

At present, the organization conducts its activities with the assistance and guidance of the Rev. Paul D. Brinkley, Director of the Practical Training Program in the Department of Religion. Regular meetings were held each Wednesday afternoon at 3:00 p.m. in room 104, Jewell Hall.

Programs were arranged to include topics of vital interest to the present and future ministries of members. Officers for the second semester 1953-54 were: Robert W. 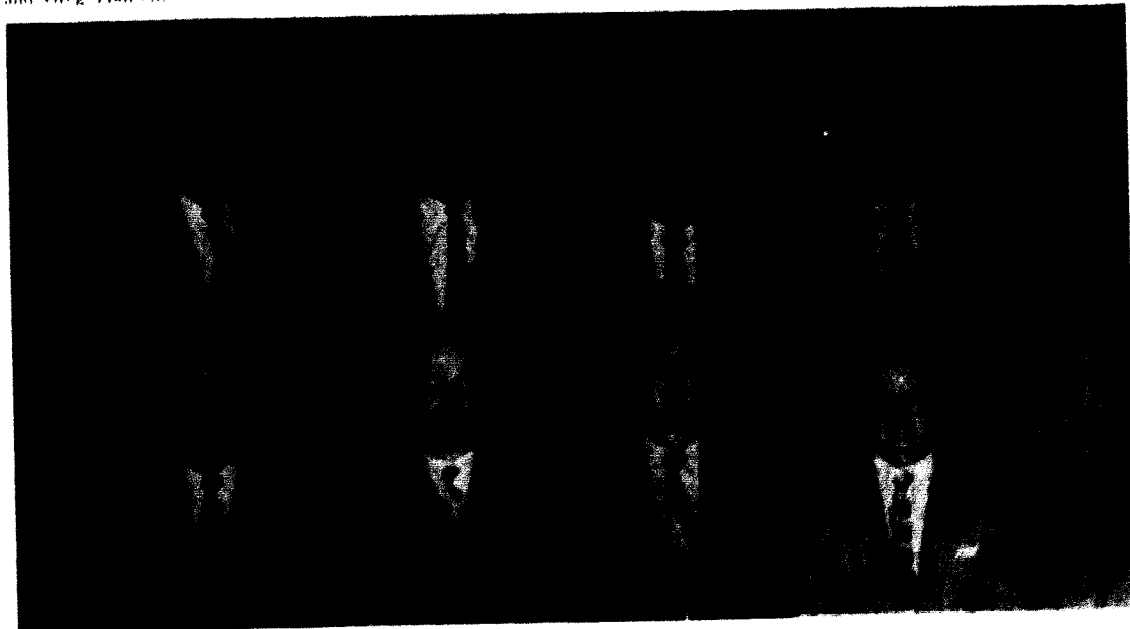

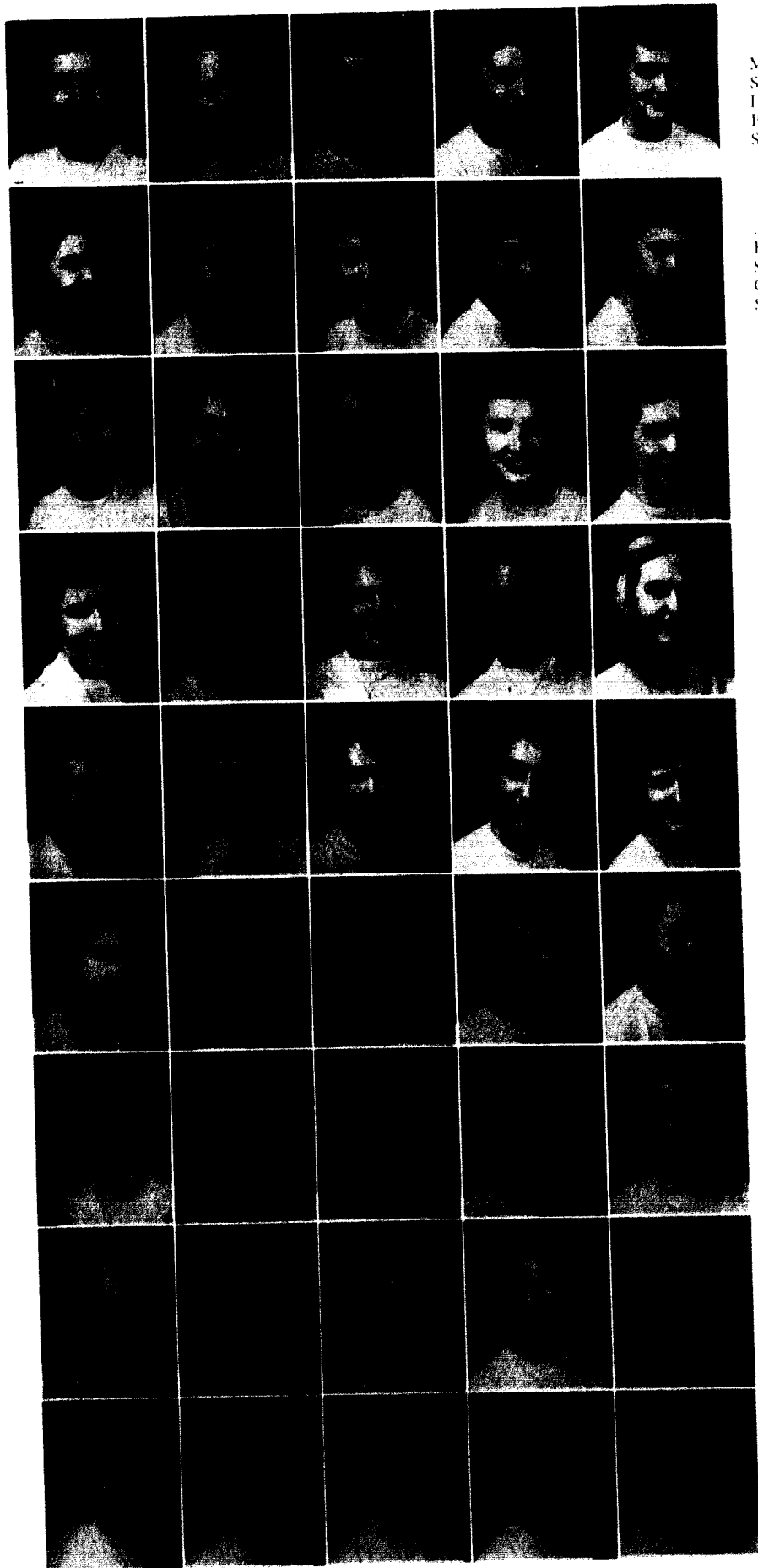
Junior Panhellenic Council

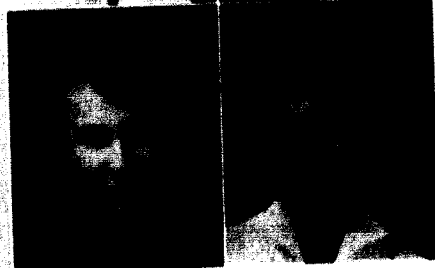

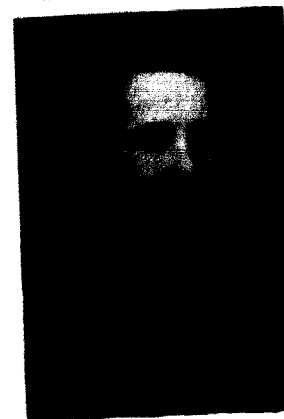

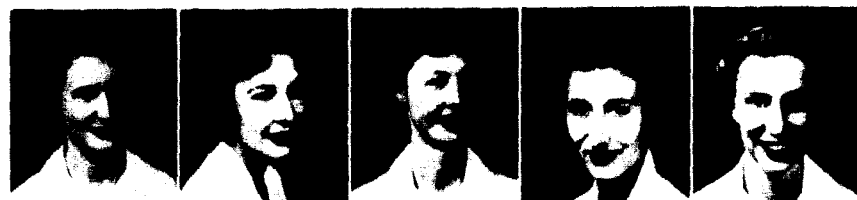
Activities in sports were numerous this year. Alpha Gamma Delta won the intramural volleyball championship, and participated in all other intramural sports activities with high honors.

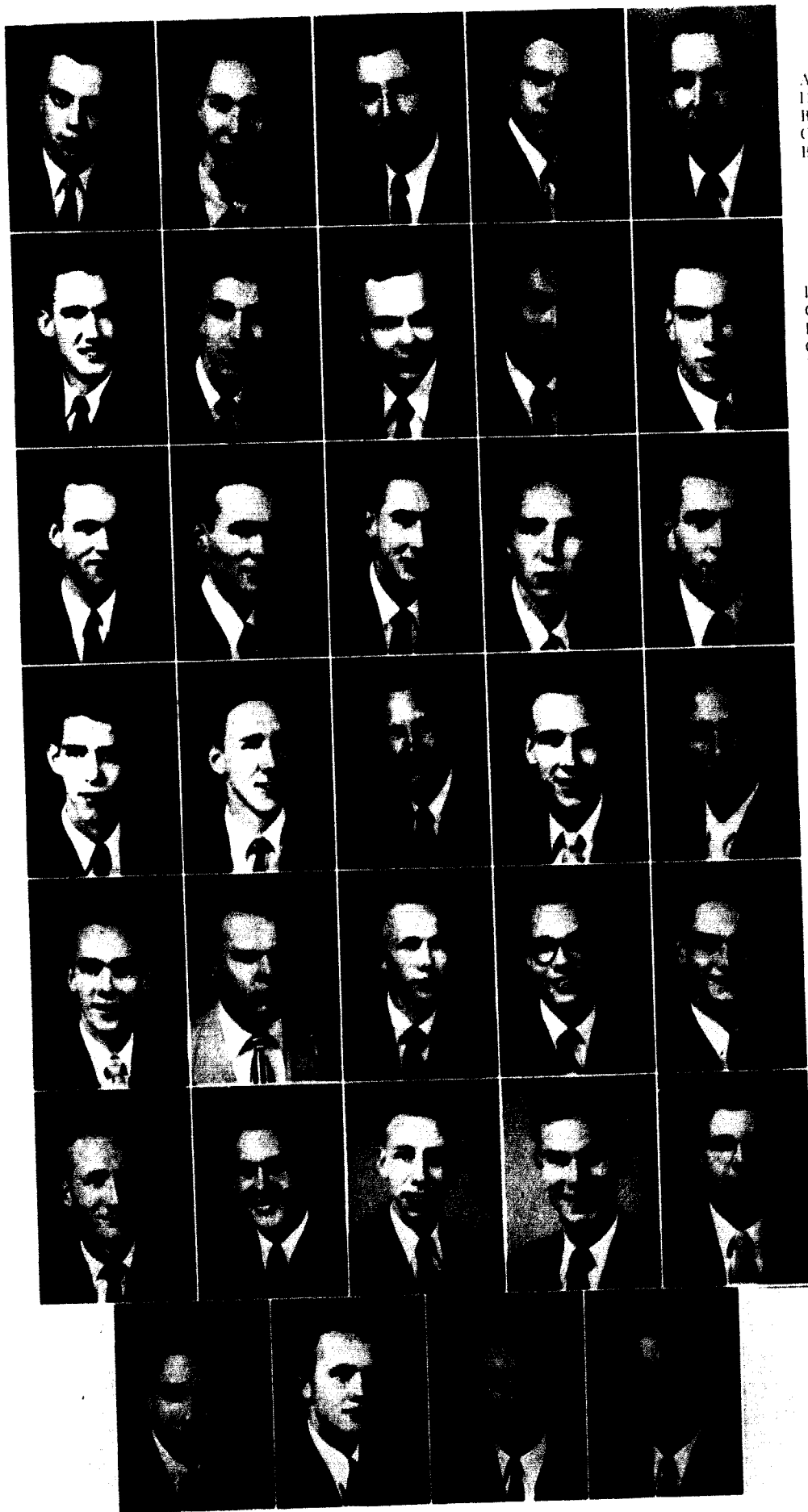
This year during Achievement Day, two of our alums, George Howerton and George Raymond Cuthbertson, were honored for their achievement in the field of music and chemistry.
