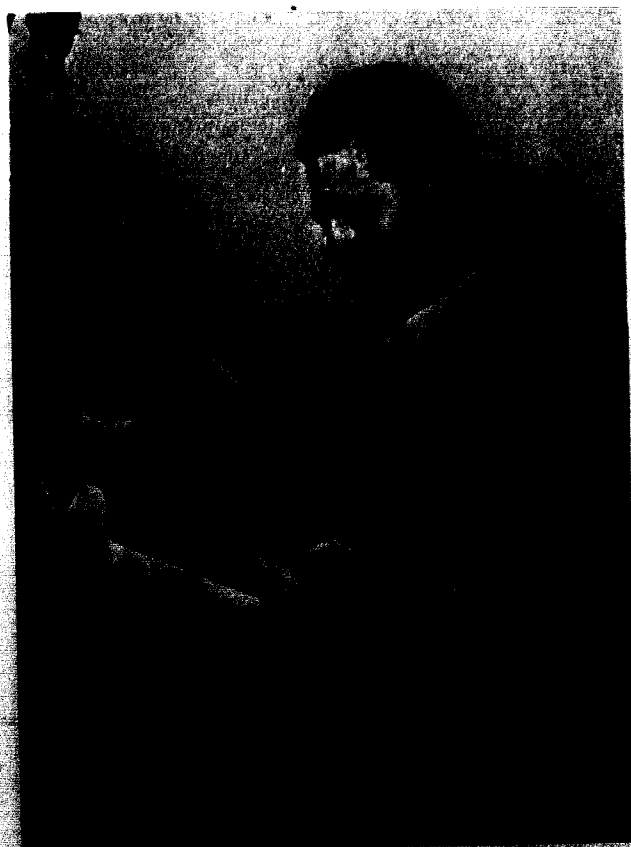
LIBRARY STAFF

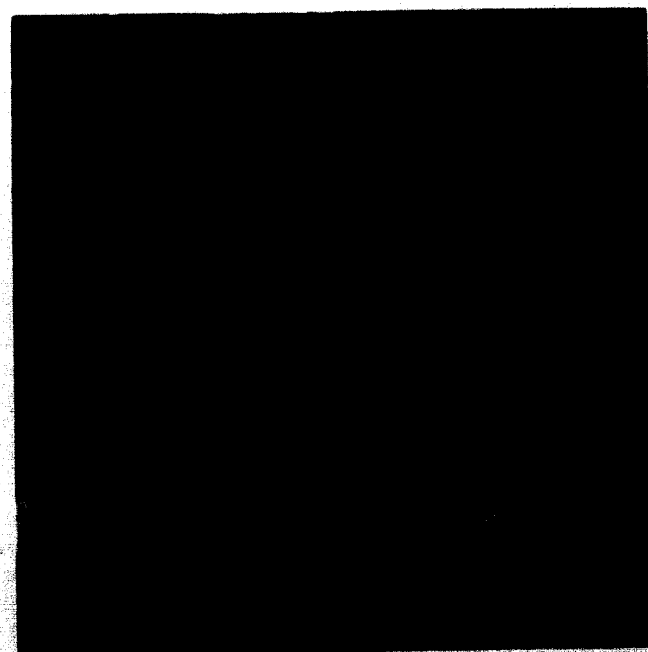

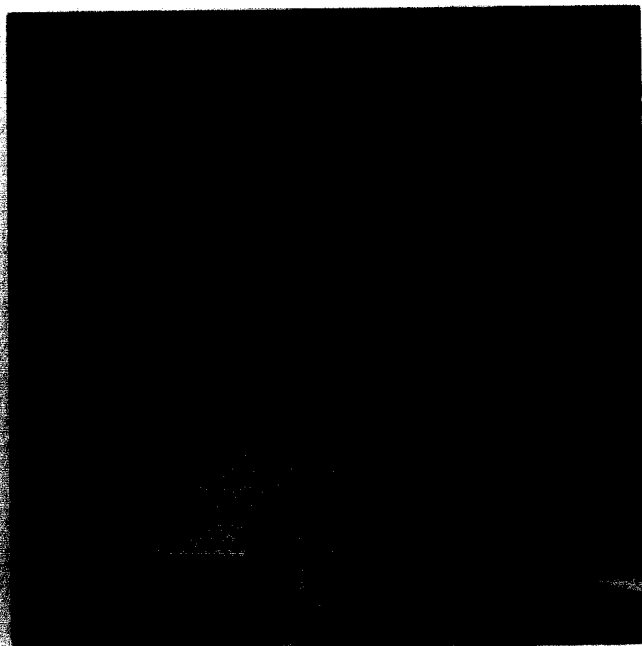

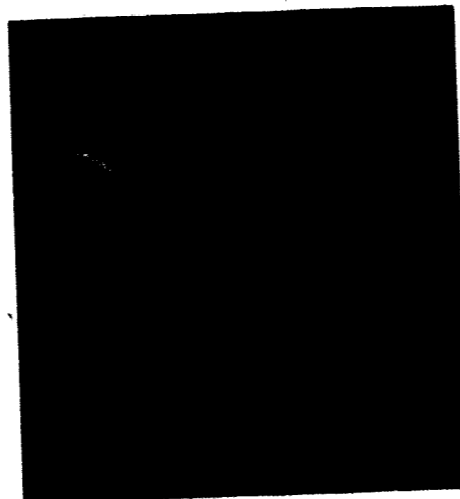

November 10, 1966 at 9:00 A.M. found all Jewell students attending the Twenty-third Annual Achievement Day. The purpose of this special day was to recognize five individuals who have achieved in their individual fields of endeavor. This year the panel, moderated by Dr. Georgia B. Bowman, discussed the topic, "How Morals Have Changed Since My Graduation." After brief comments on the subject by each of the five achievers, the panel was open for questions.

At 11 o'clock, followed by a processional of the faculty and trustees, citations were awarded to the five achievers. Mr. Mark O. Hatfield, former Governor and now Senator from Oregon to the United States Senate, was the main speaker at the Achievement Day. After speaking about the need for personal involvement in government, in Christ, and in life in general, the Honorable Mr. Hatfield was presented with an honorary Doctor of Laws Degree.

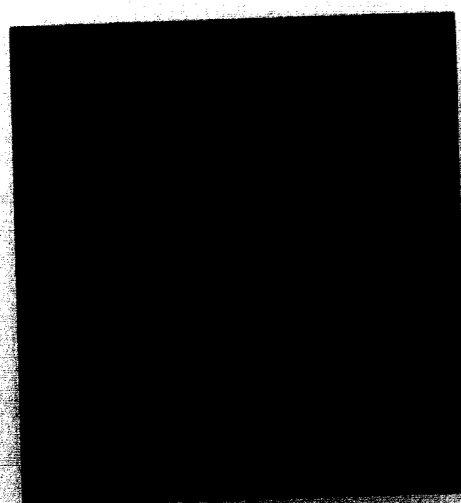

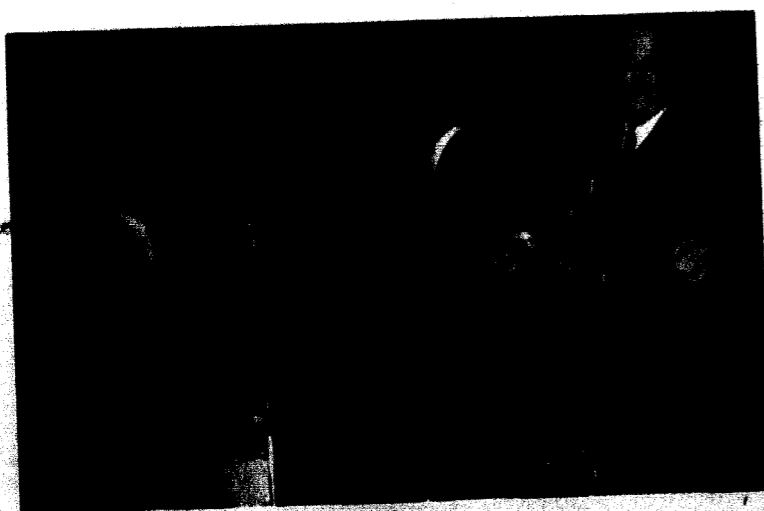

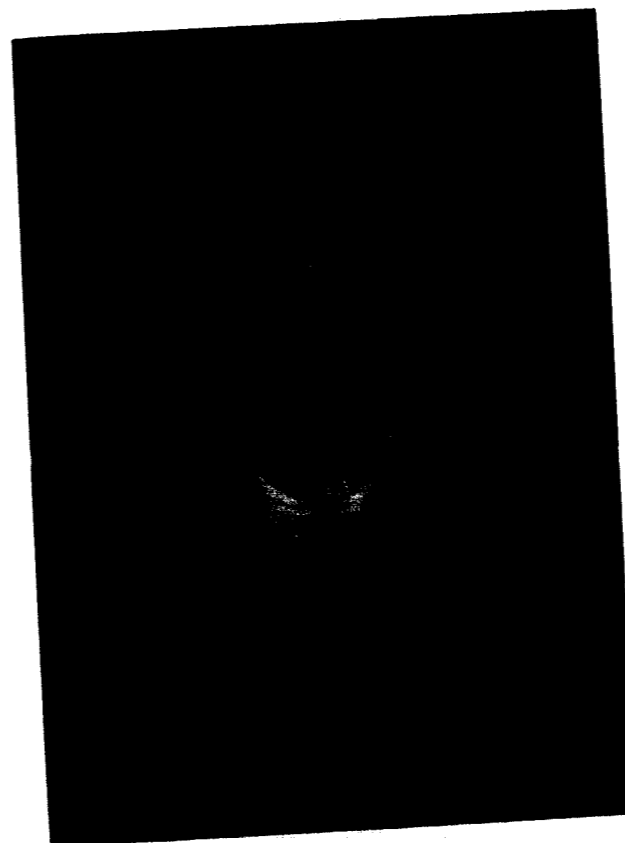

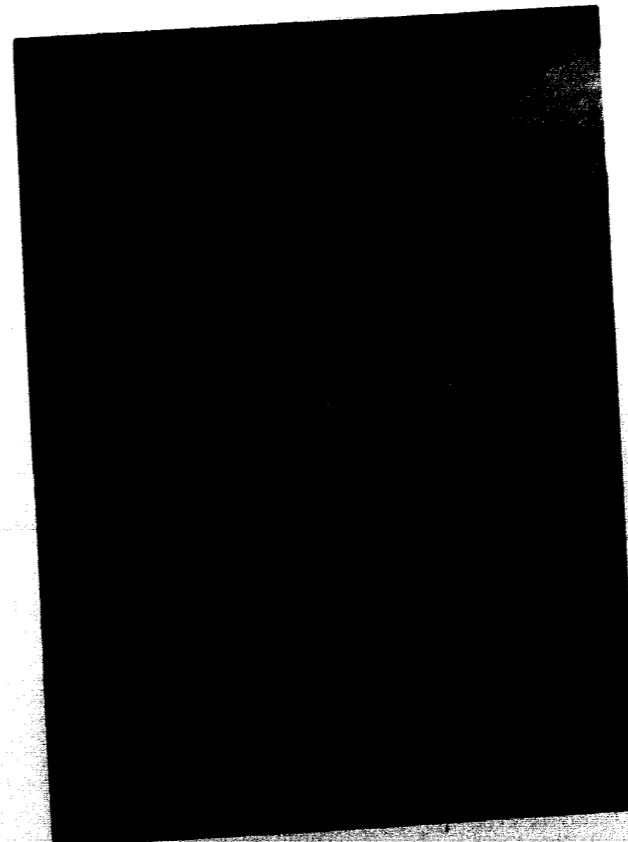
A group of Experimental Plays directed by dramatics students were held later in the spring, followed by a melodrama, *Love Rides the Rails*, on May 10-13.

IS members happily string colored lights on the tree in front of Jewell Hall at Christmas time.

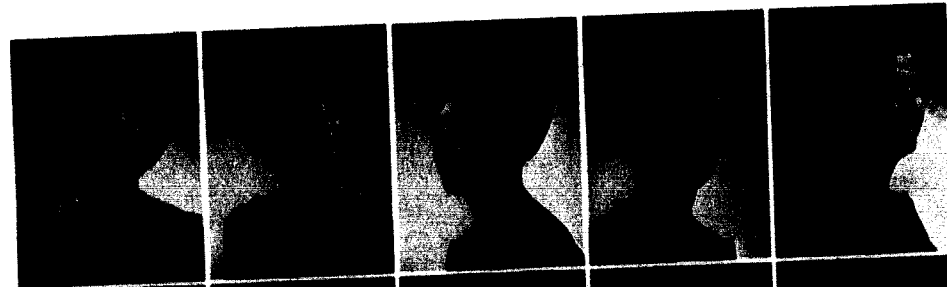

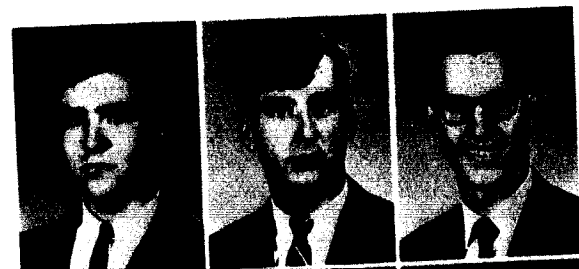


The Kappa Alpha house with its colonial style architecture exemplifies the Southern traditions of KA.

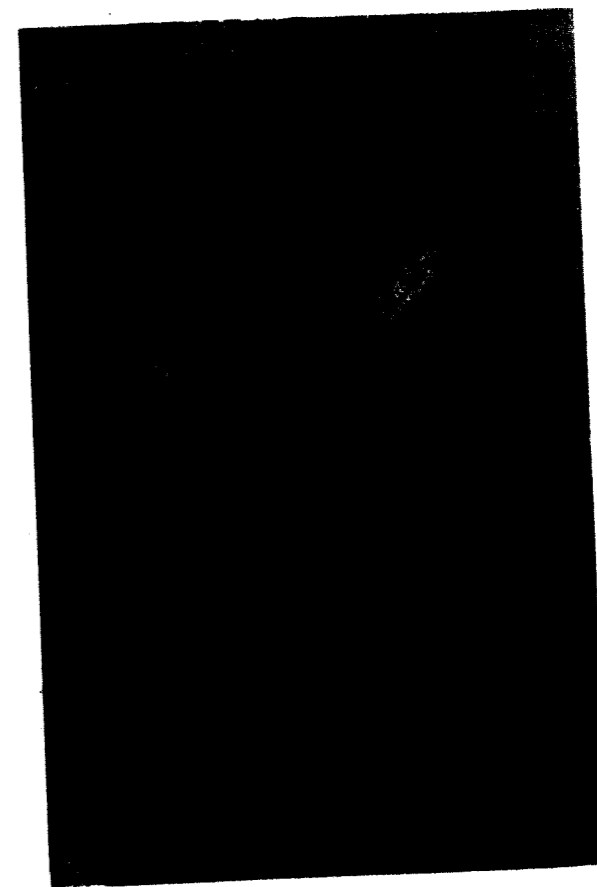

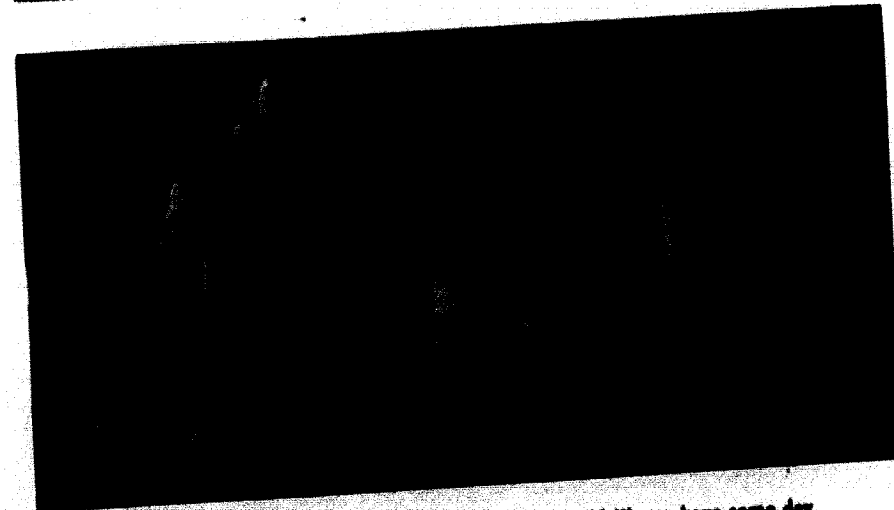

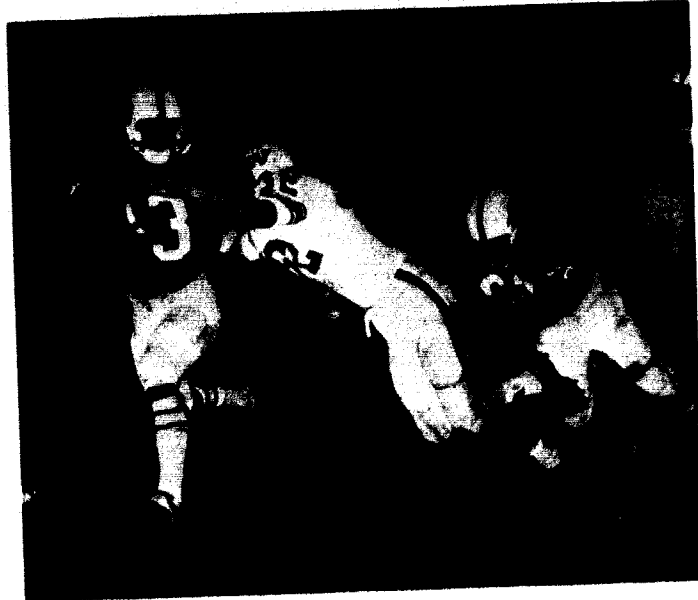

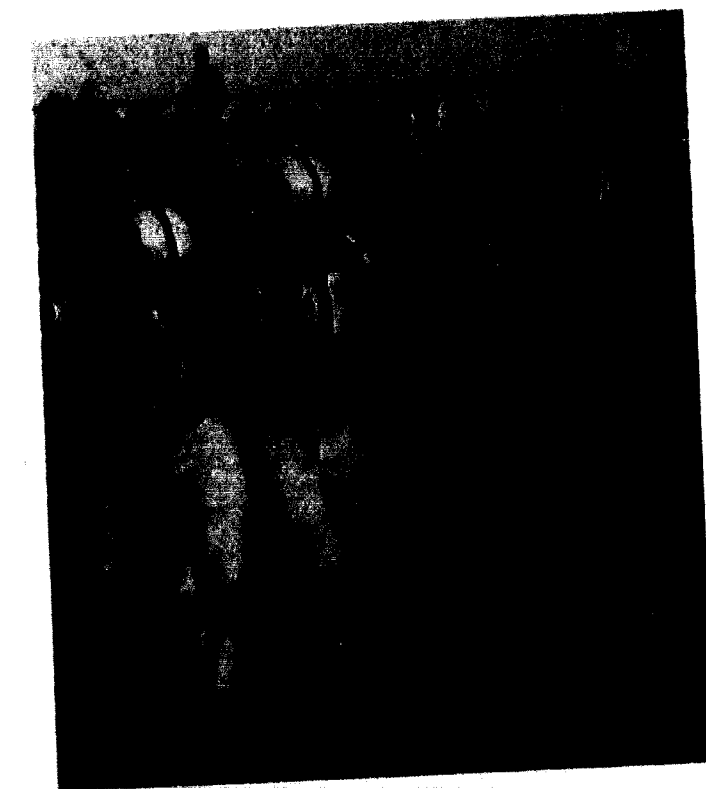

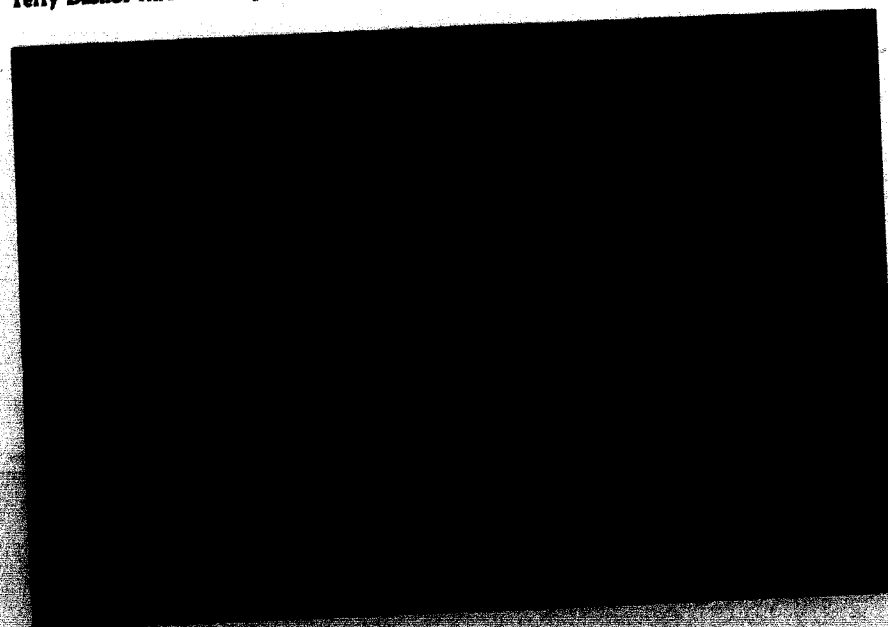

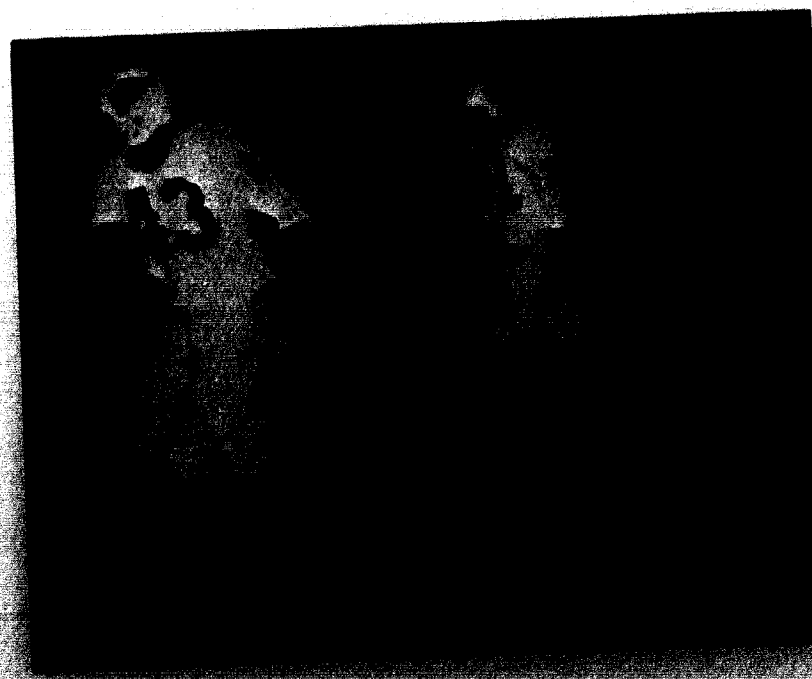

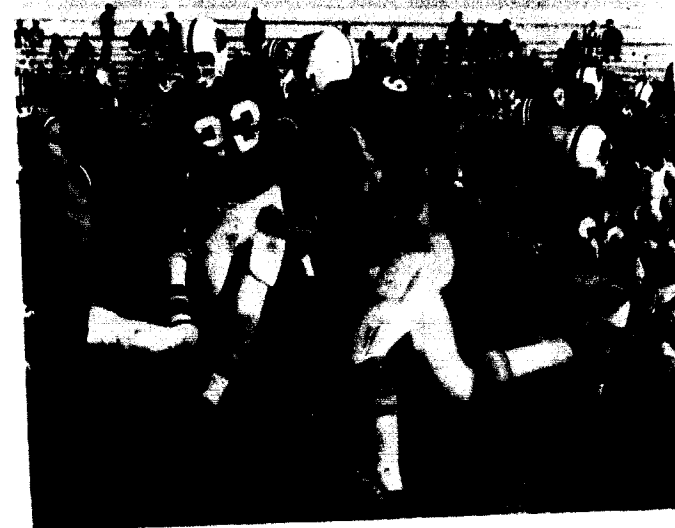

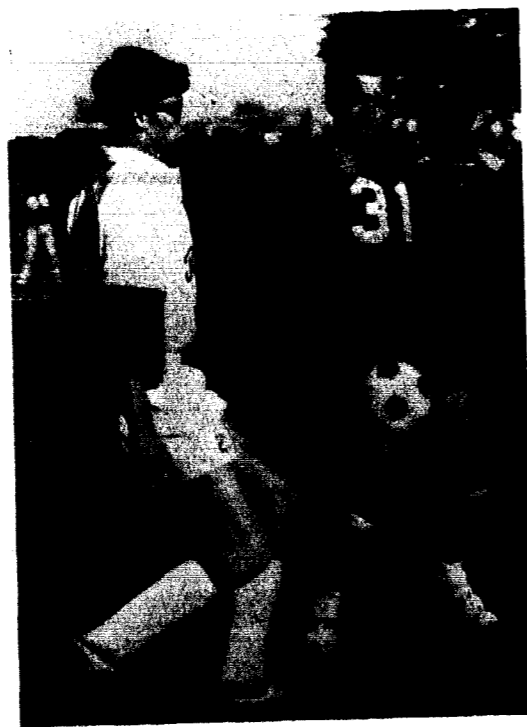

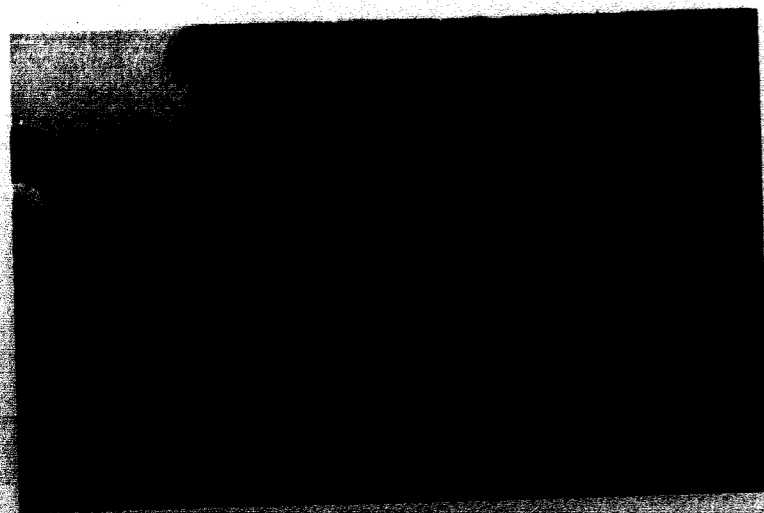

A brighter future is anticipated by Jewell soccer fans since this season's team will return intact next year. With a year of experience and full league membership, added incentive will insure an exciting season.

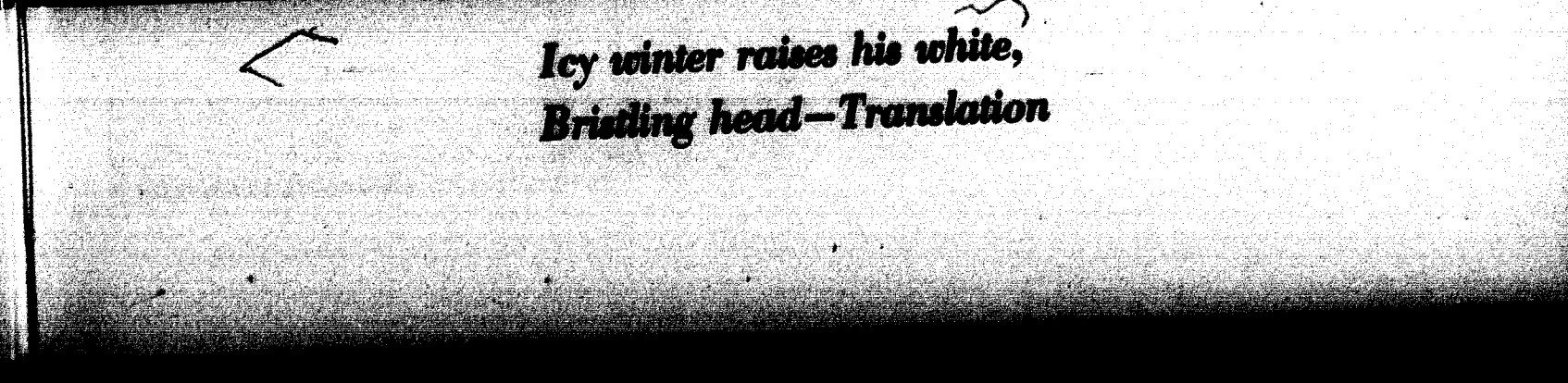
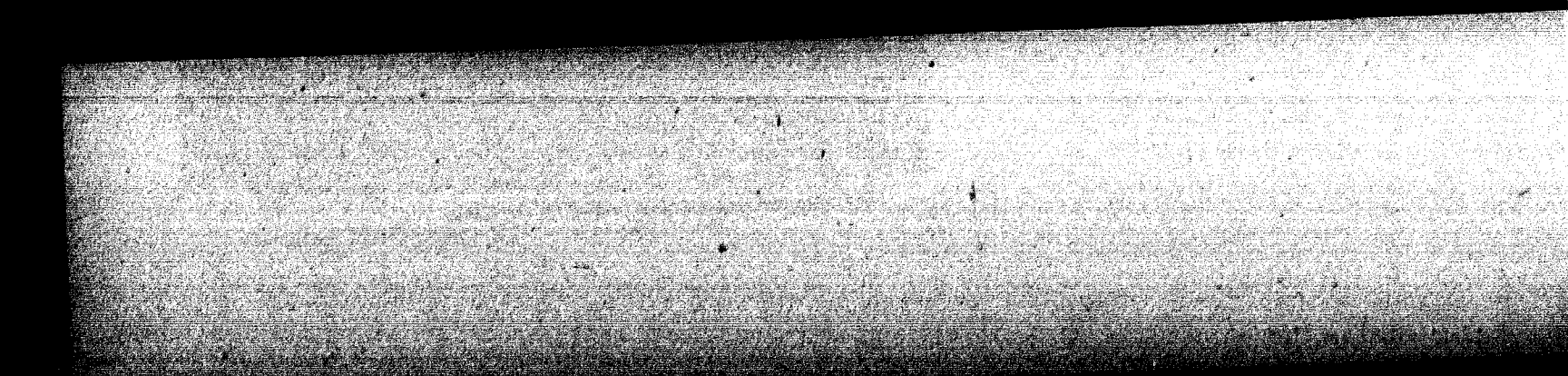

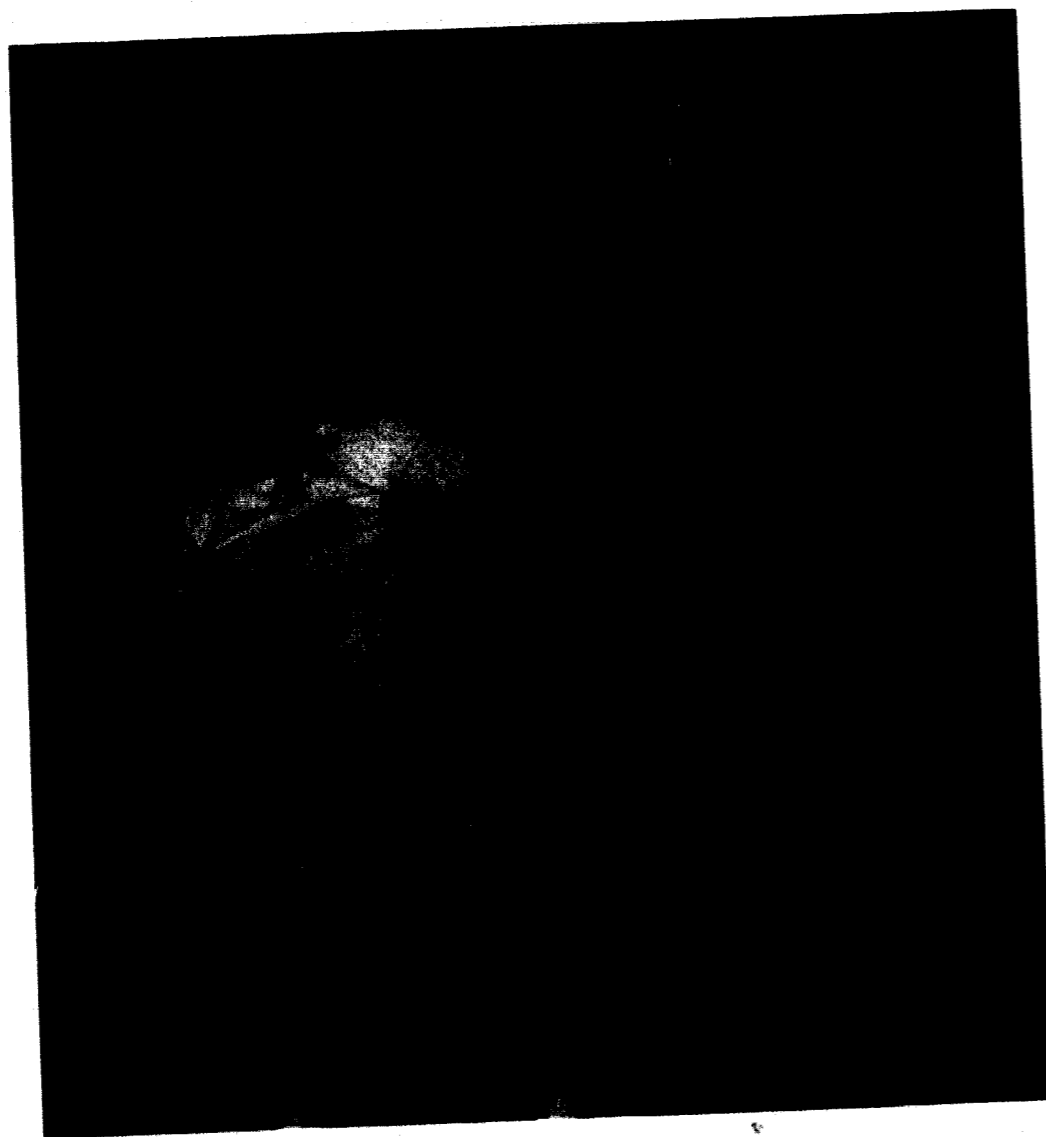

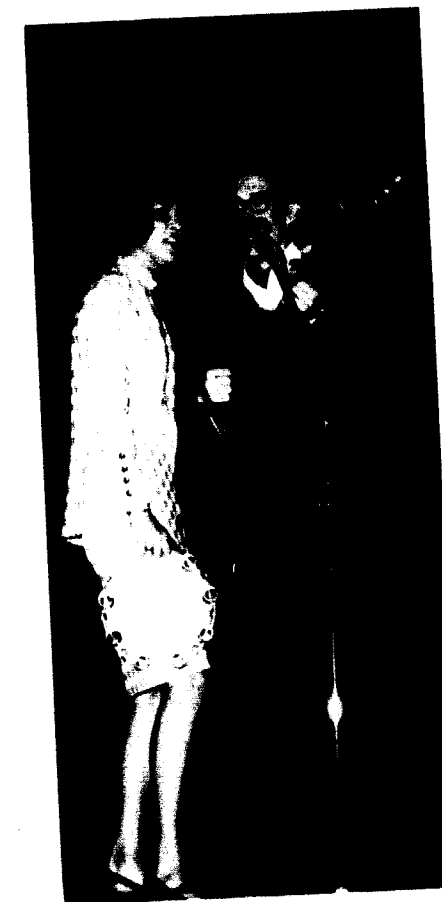

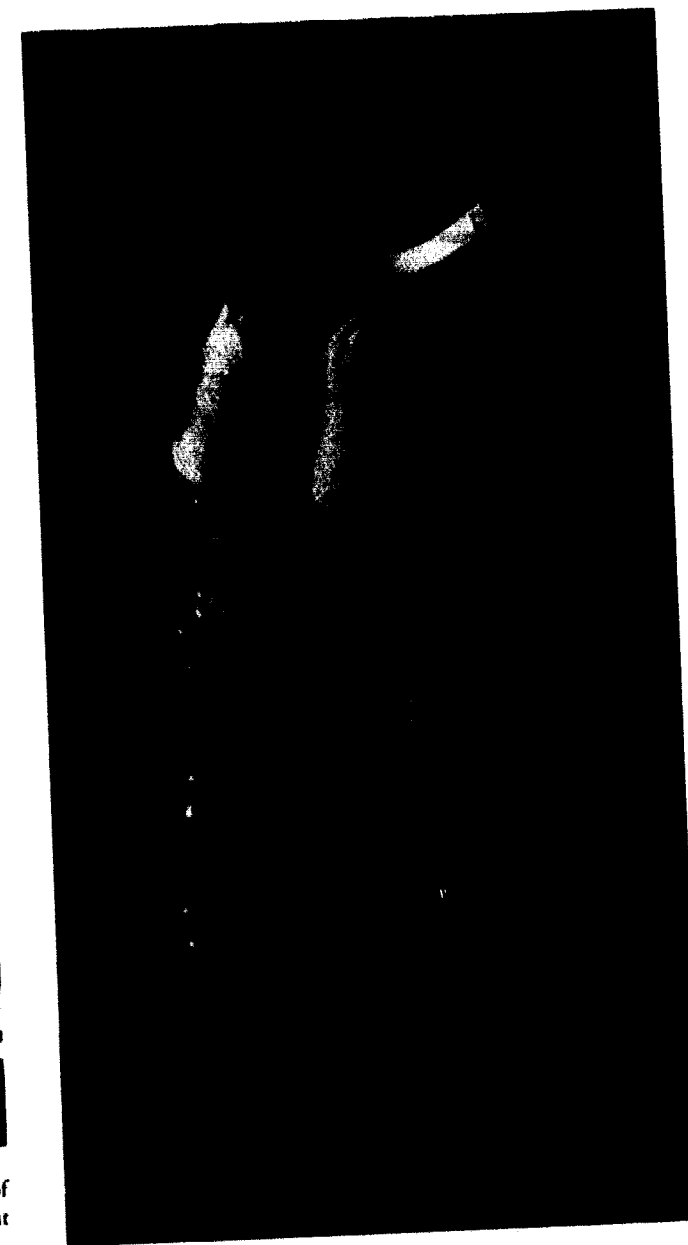

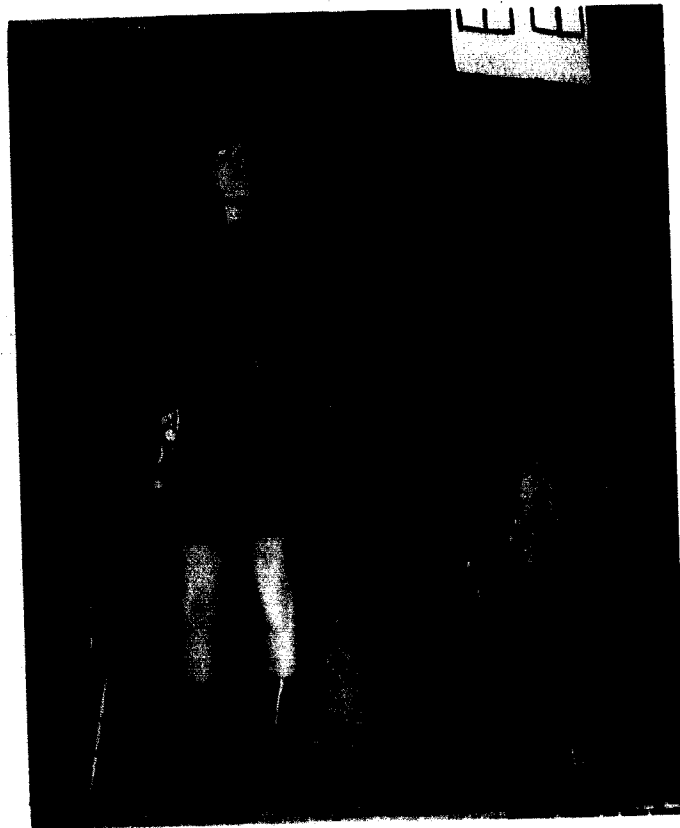

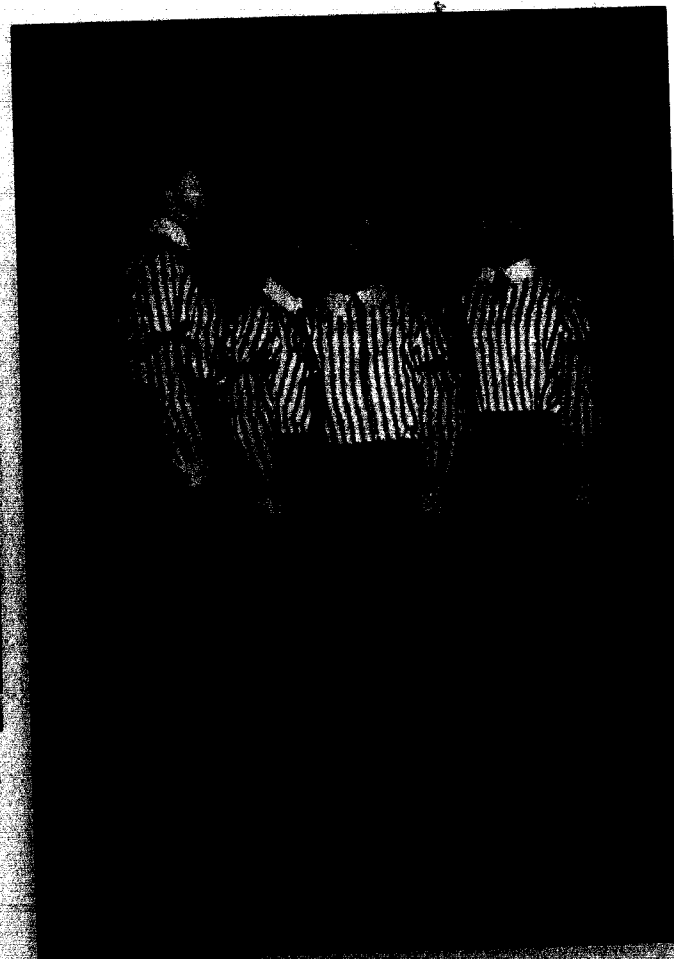

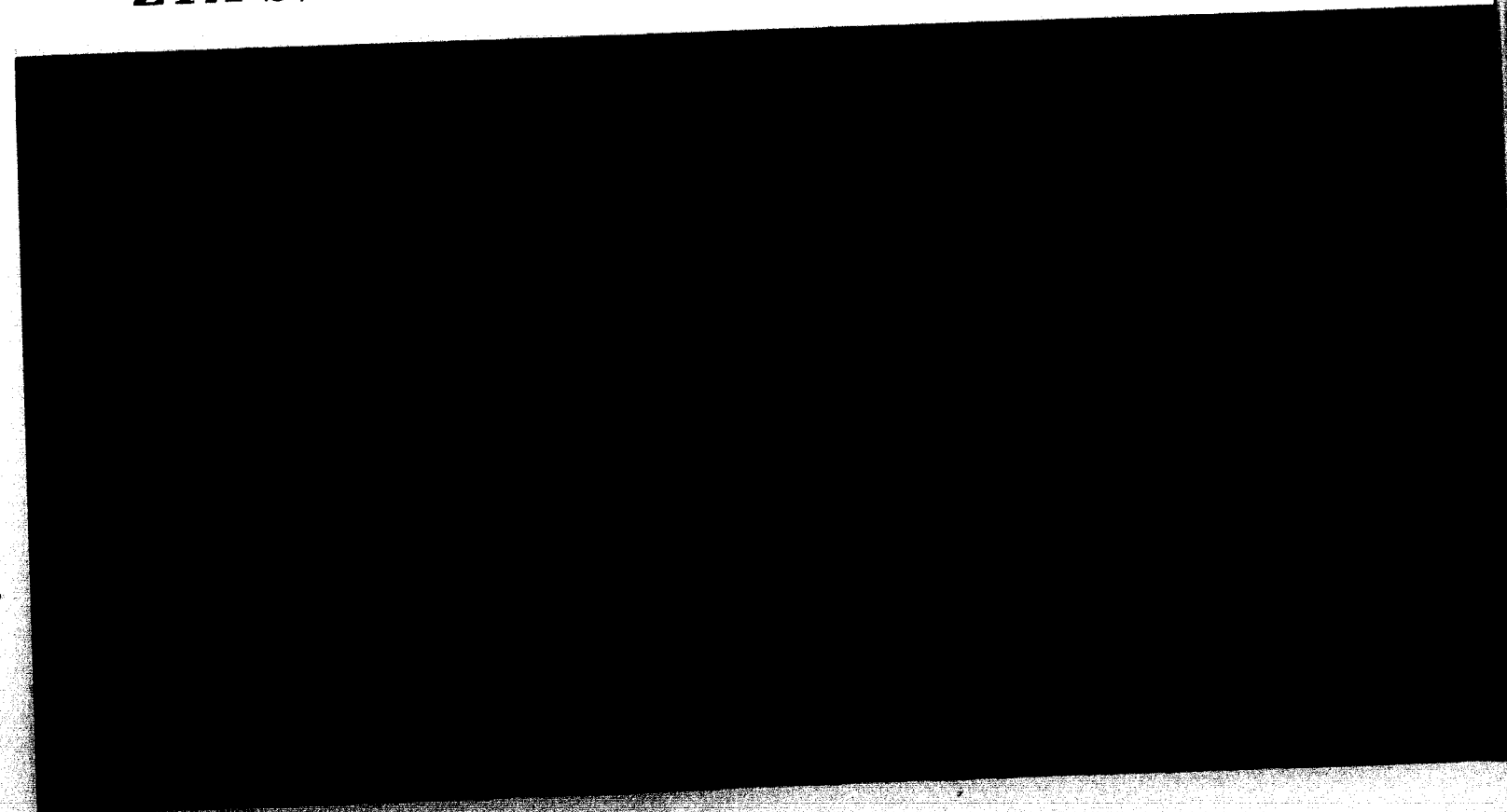

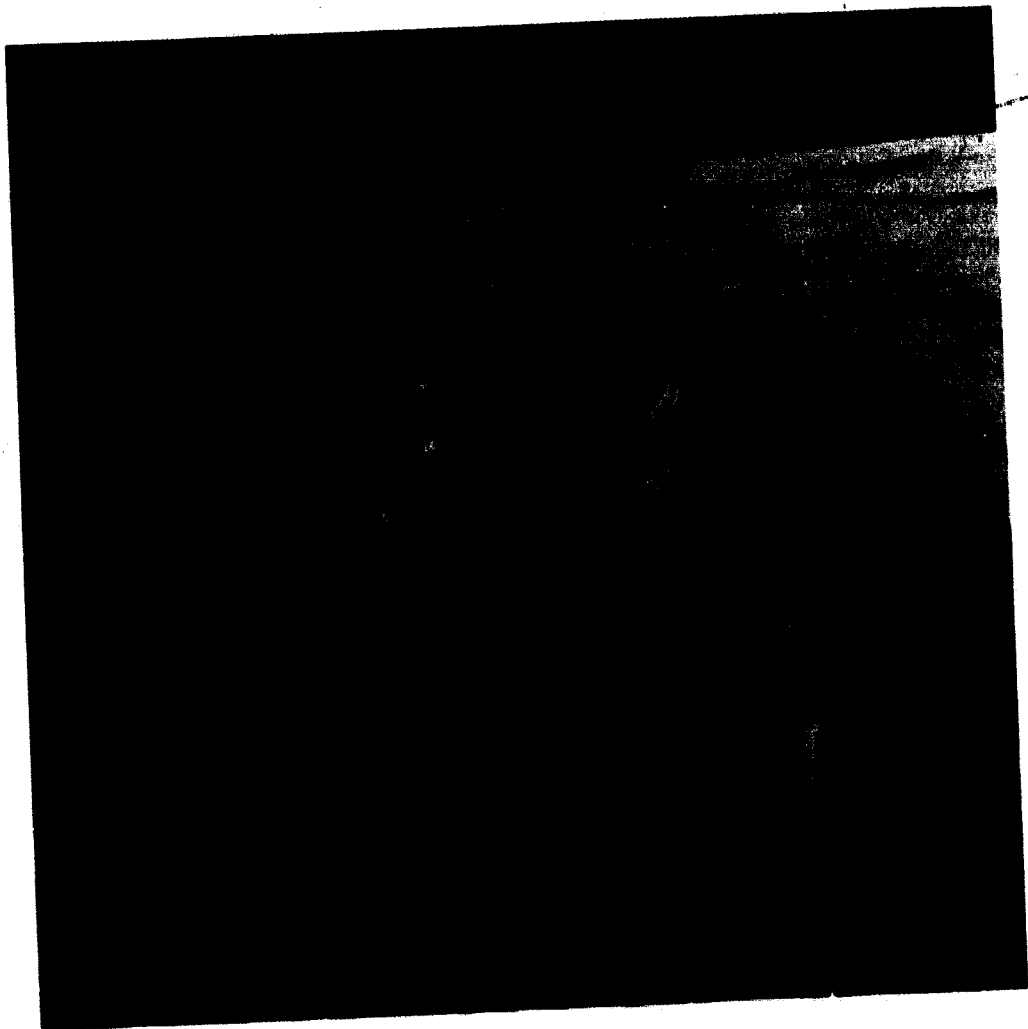

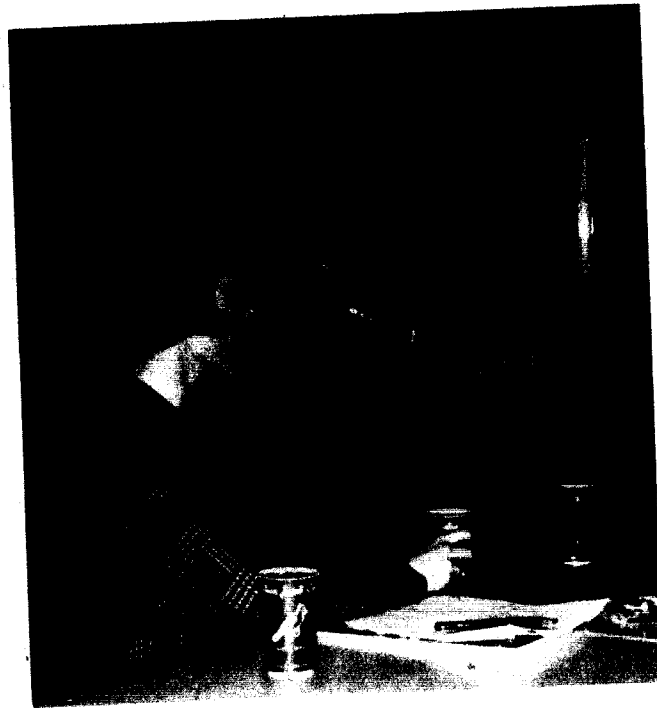

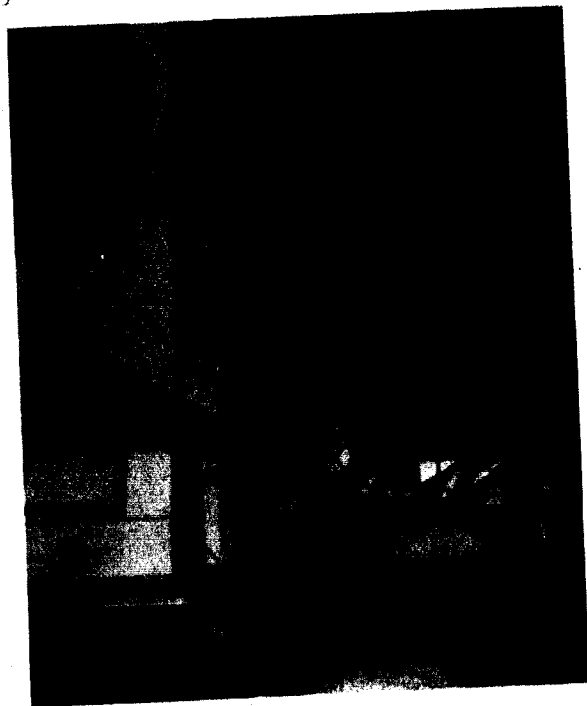

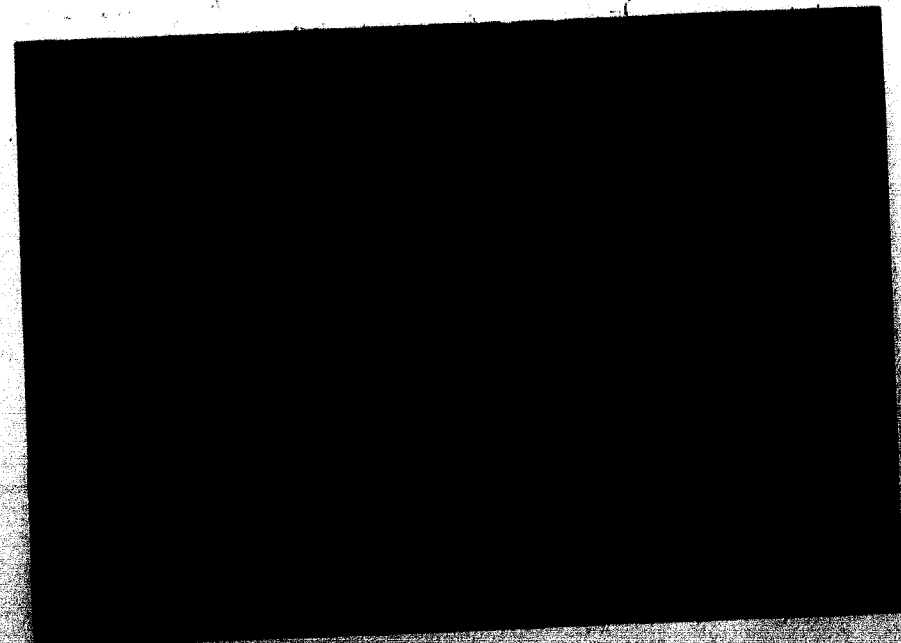

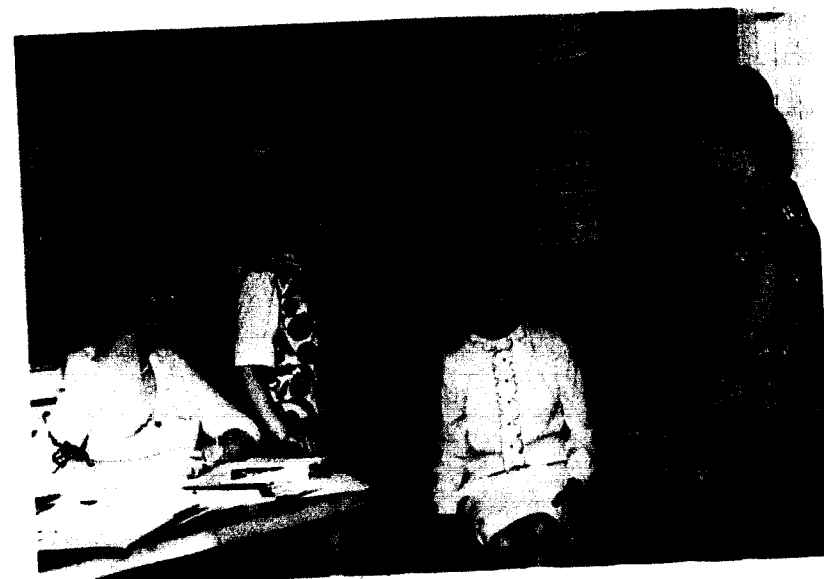

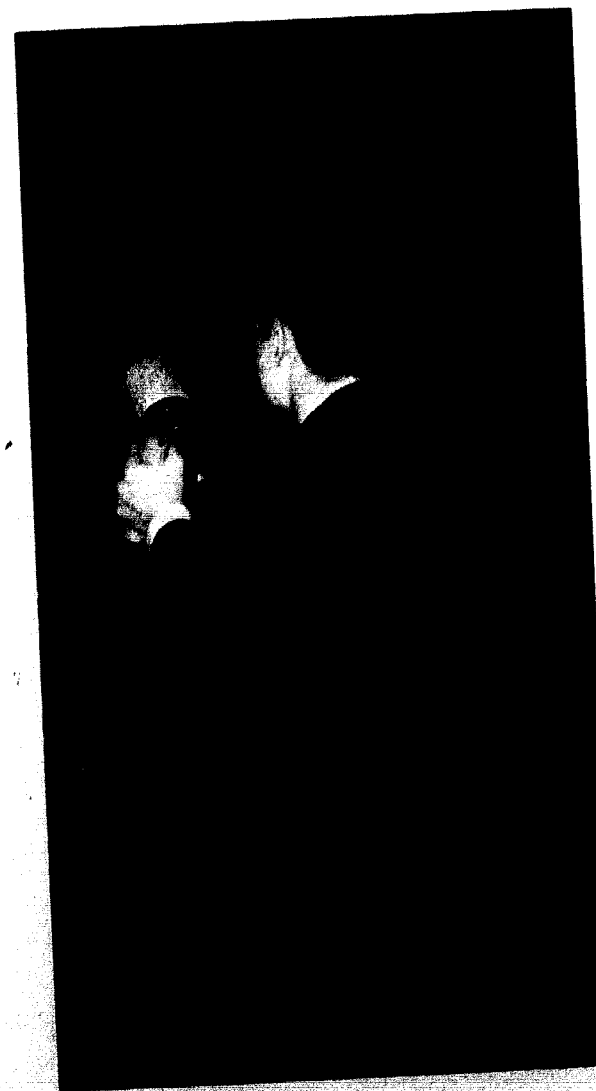

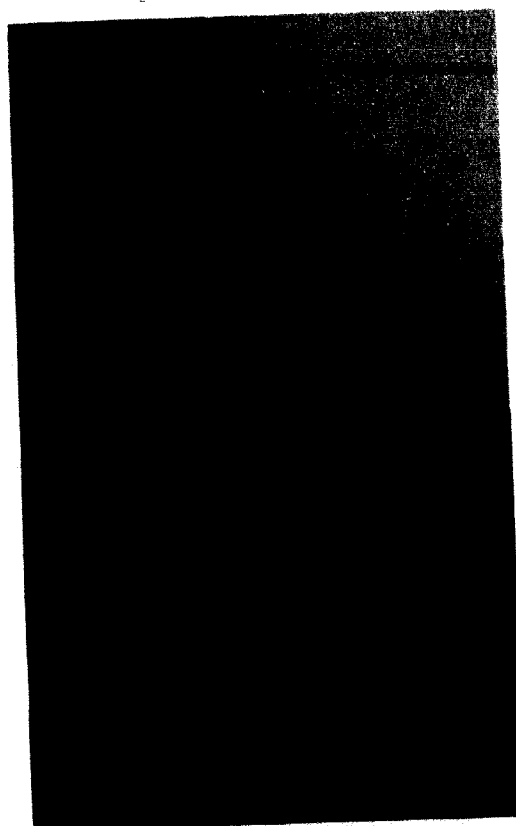

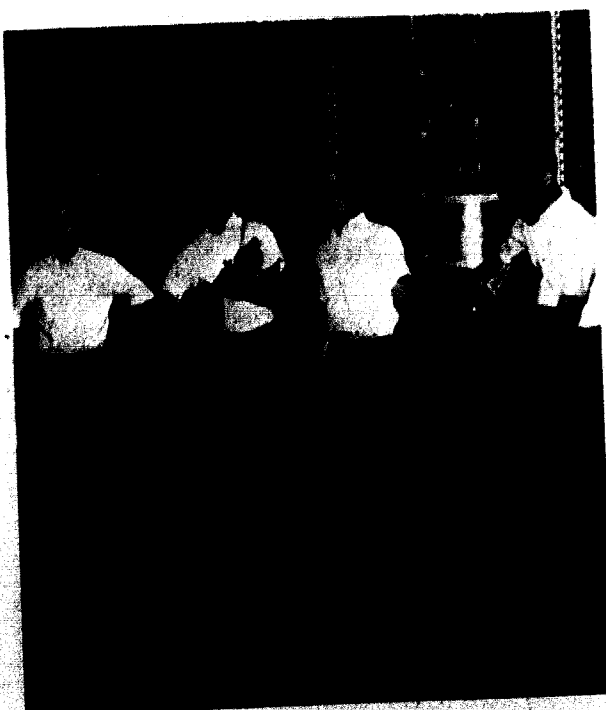
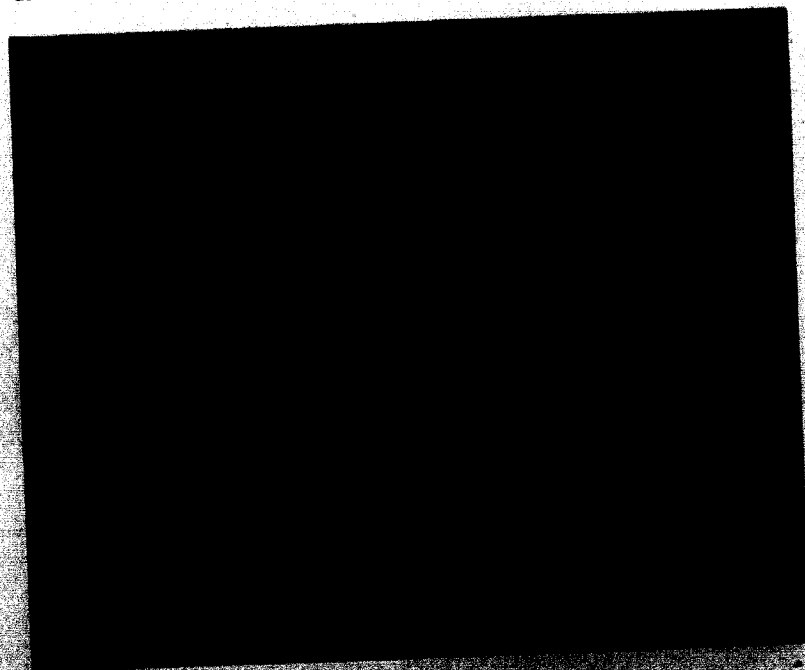
CUA

sor. The membership consists of men and women who are preparing for a life of Christian service and met twice a month to hear outstanding speakers from Christian professions.



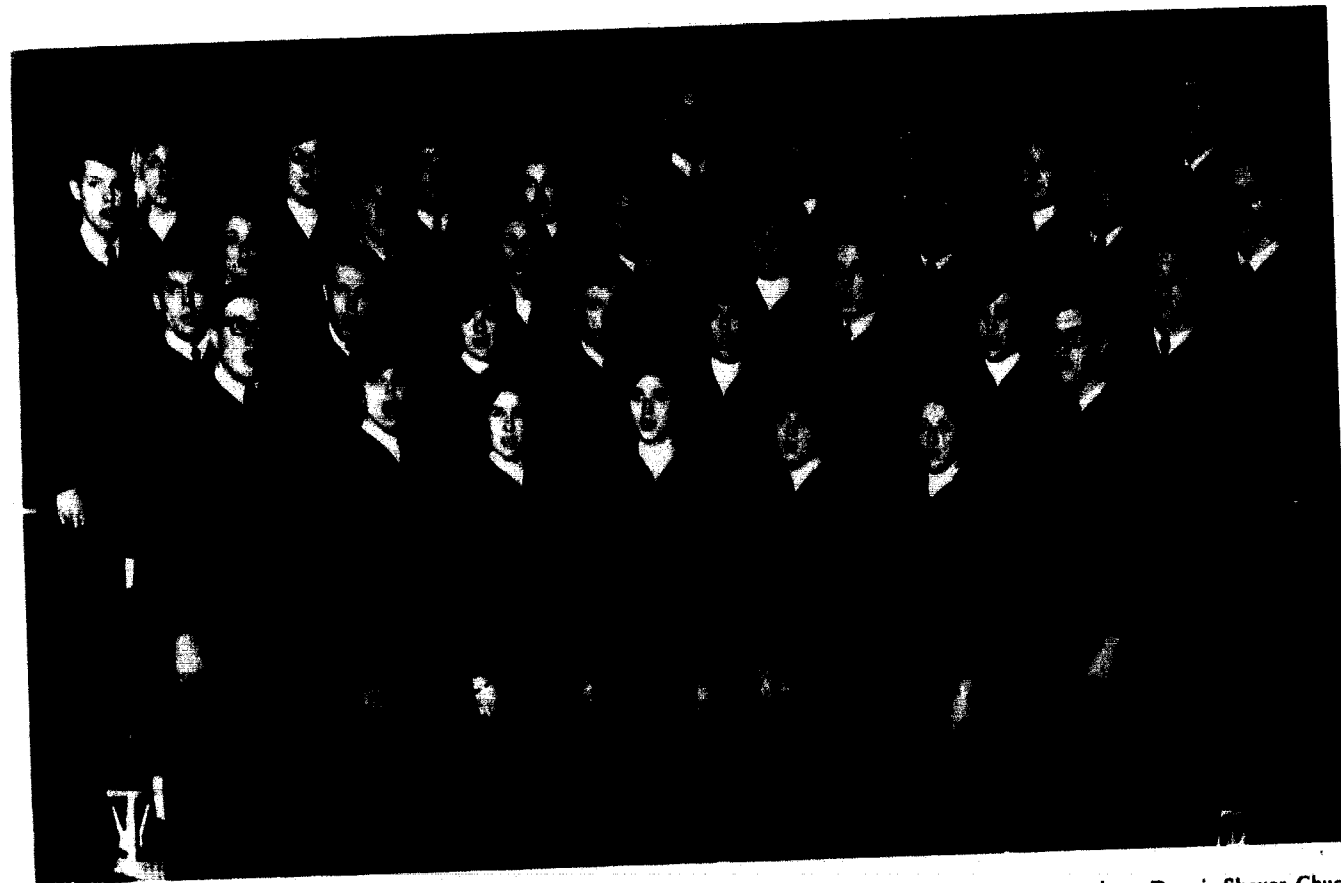

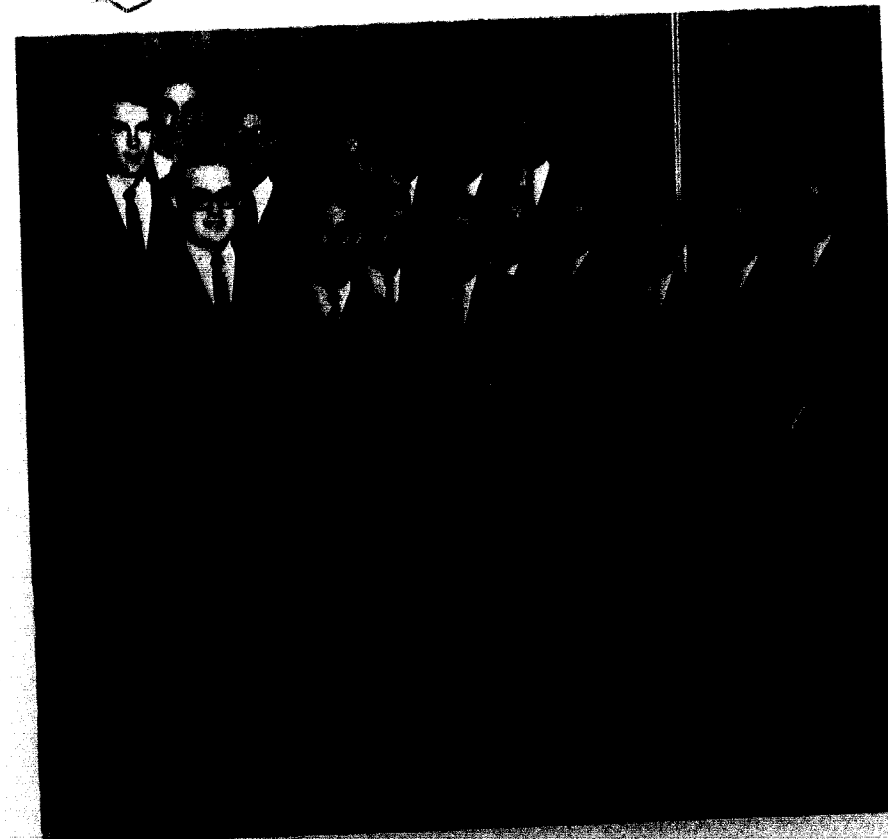

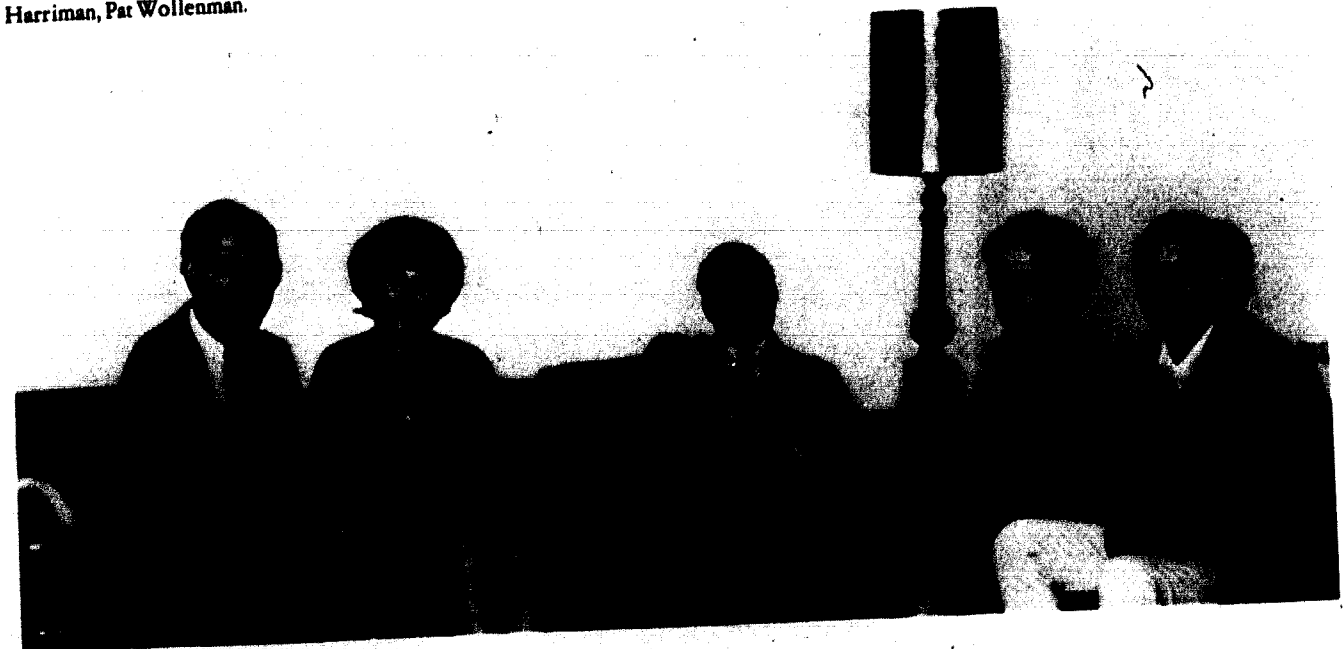

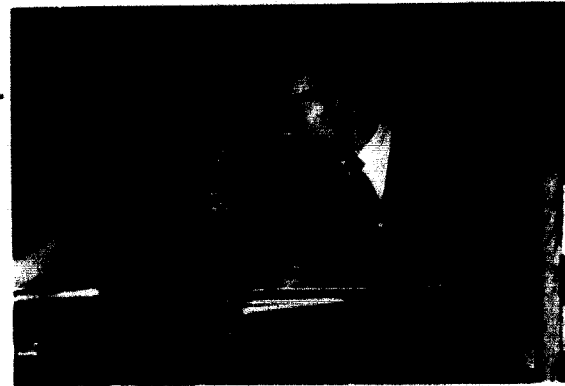
ALPHA PSI OMEGA

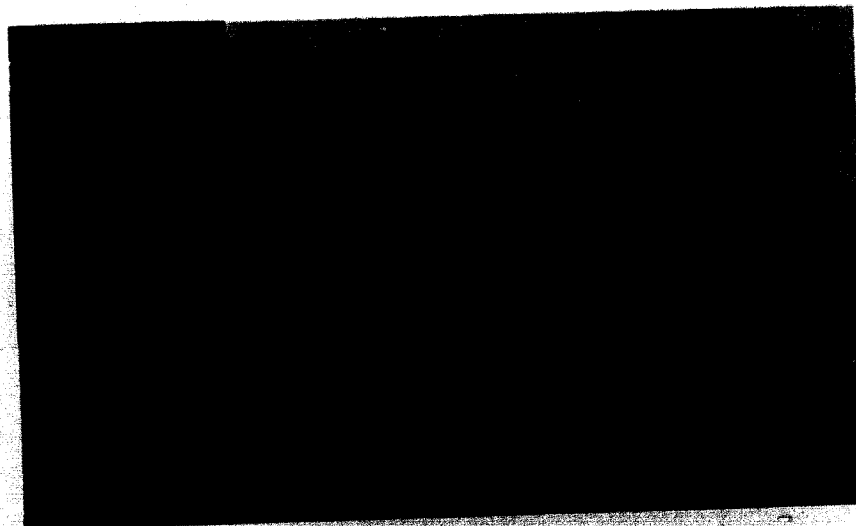


SIGMA PI SIGMA

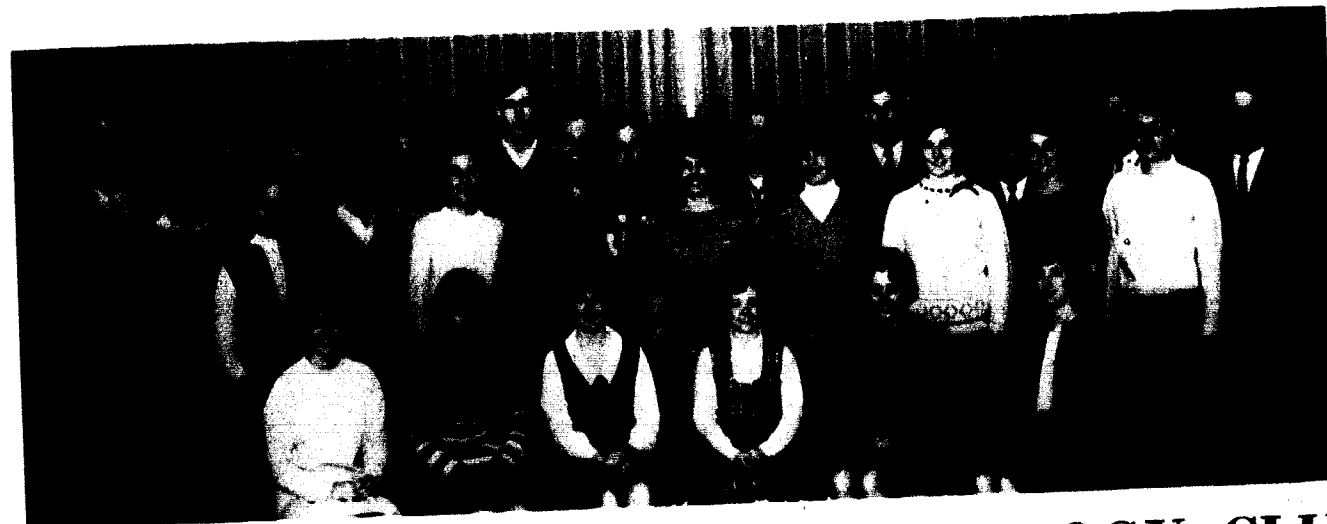

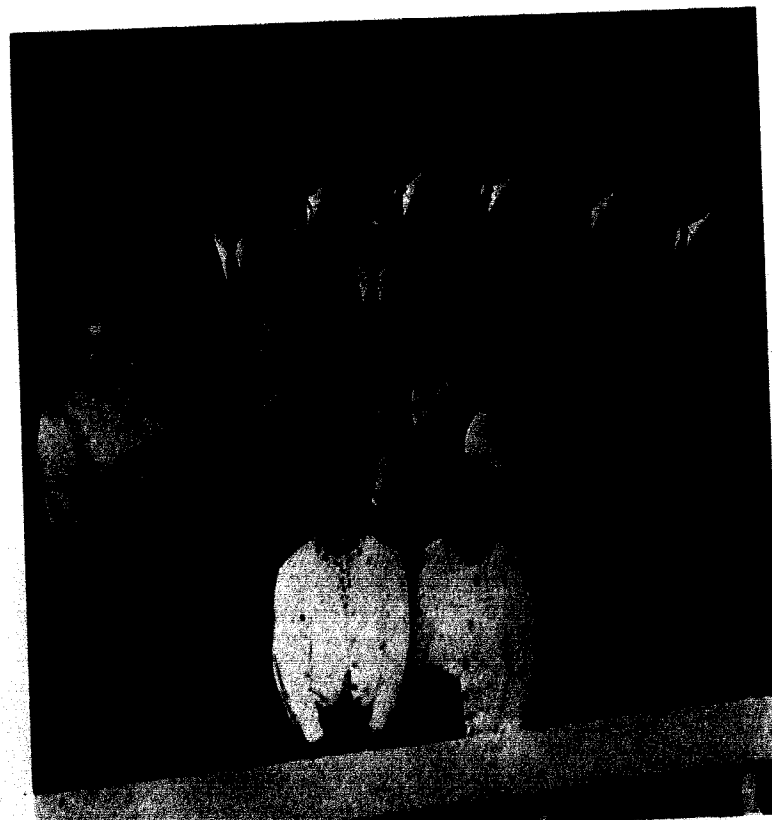

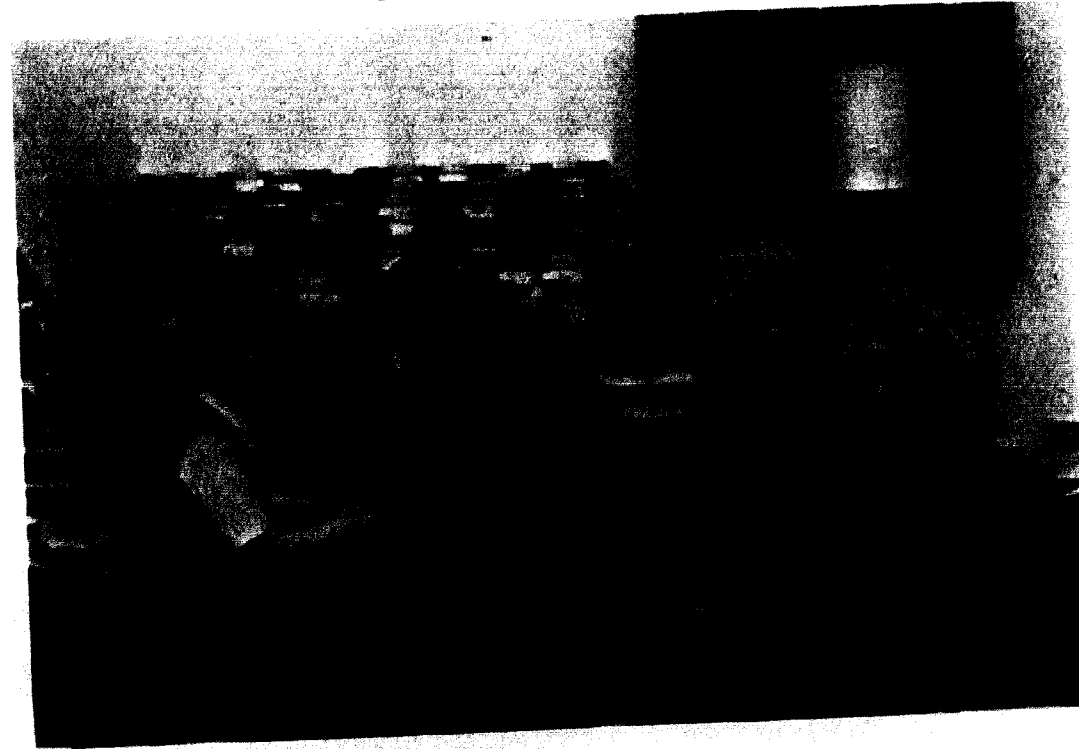
JUDICIARY COUNCIL

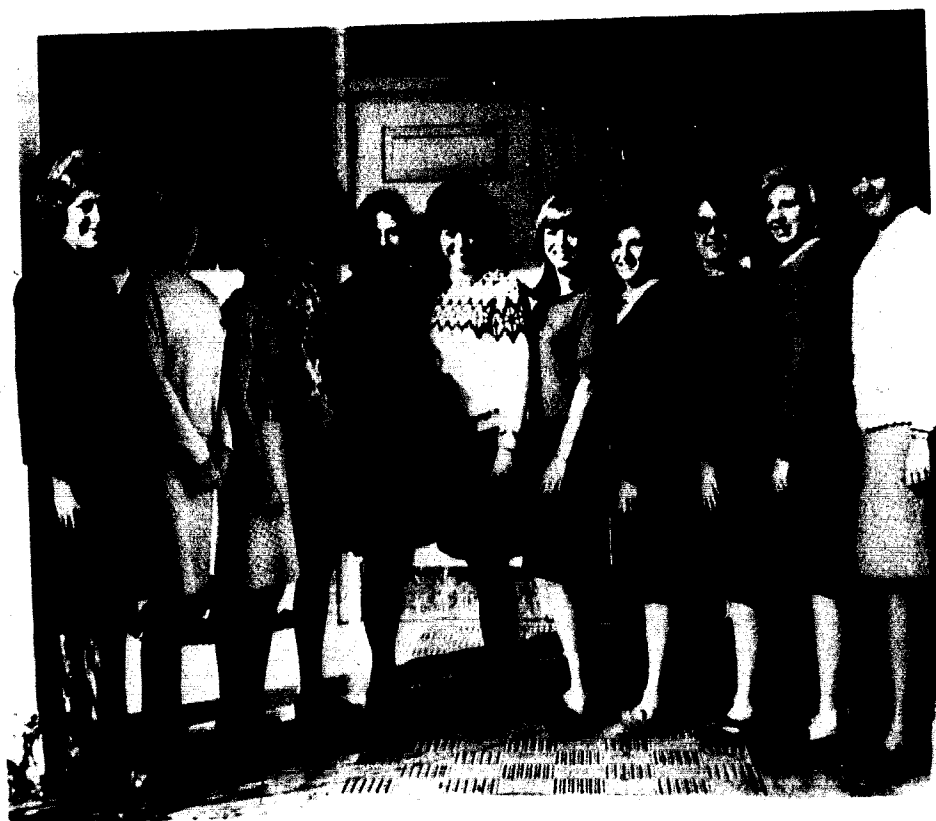



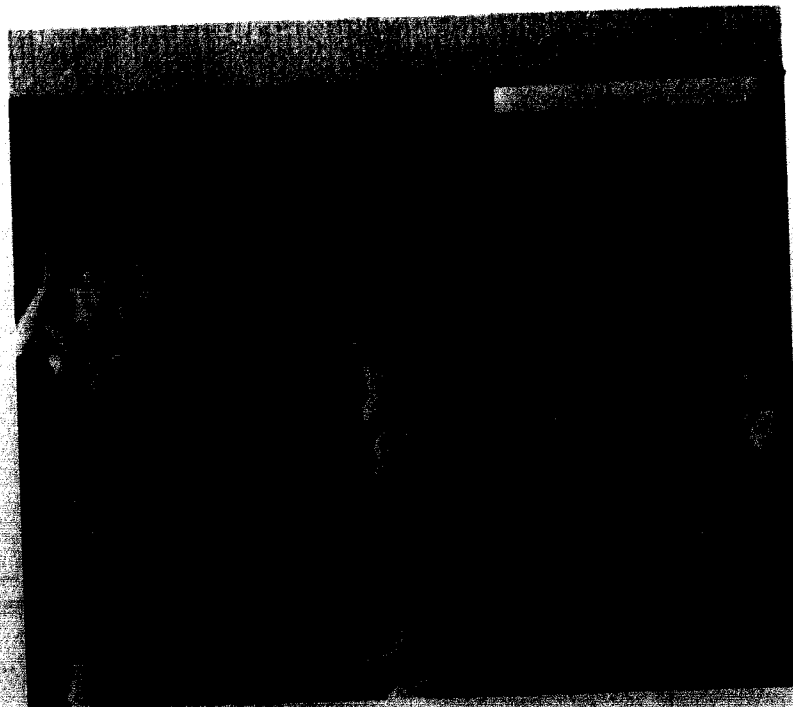

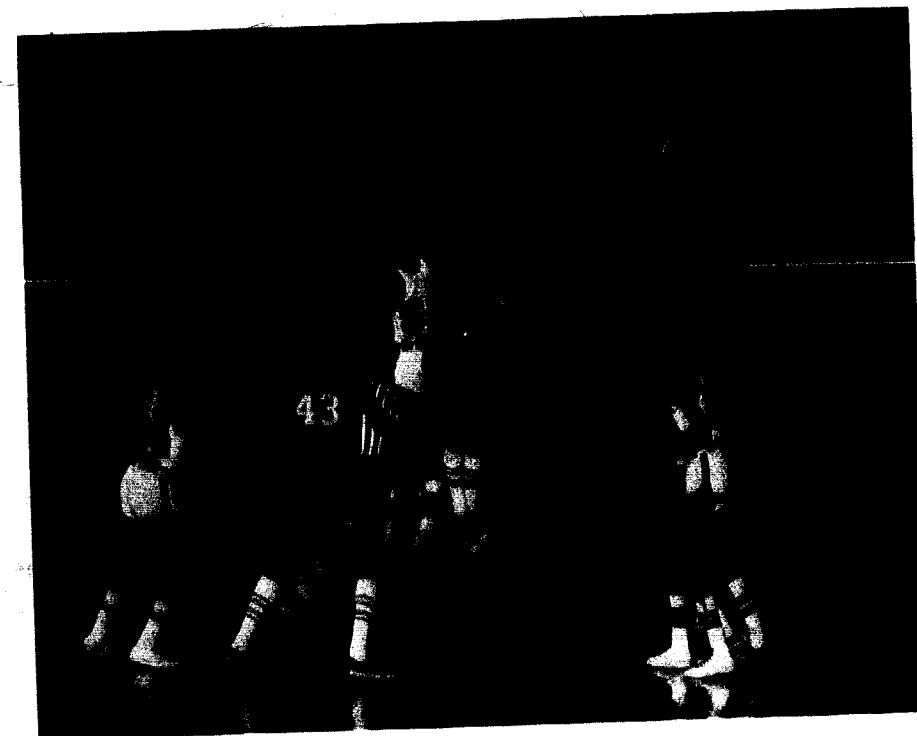


BIG D. Mike Davis adds another rebound to his credit on the way to a season total of 134.

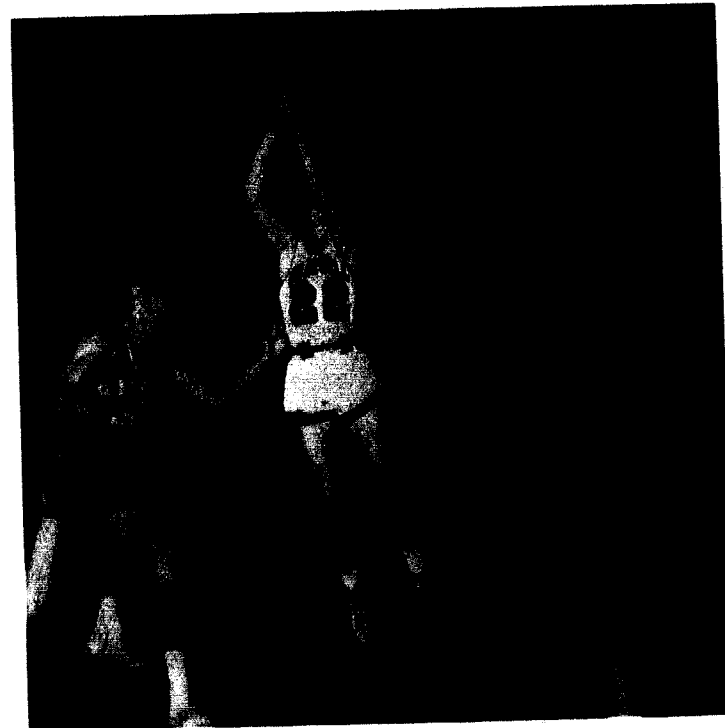
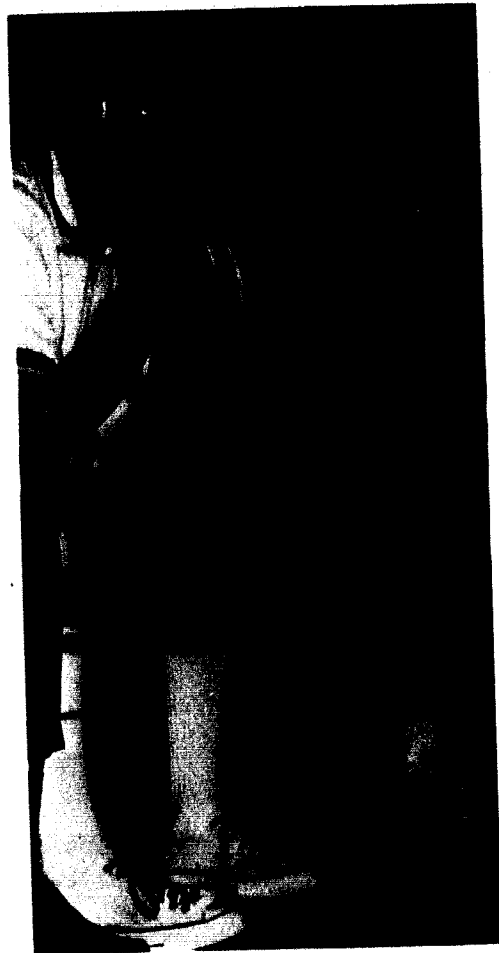


Center Don Maddox seems to have the edge over the Drury man as play starts against the defending MCAU Champs from Springfield, Mo.

Tenacious defense characterized the Cardinal's strategy as demonstrated here by freshman Tom Dunn.

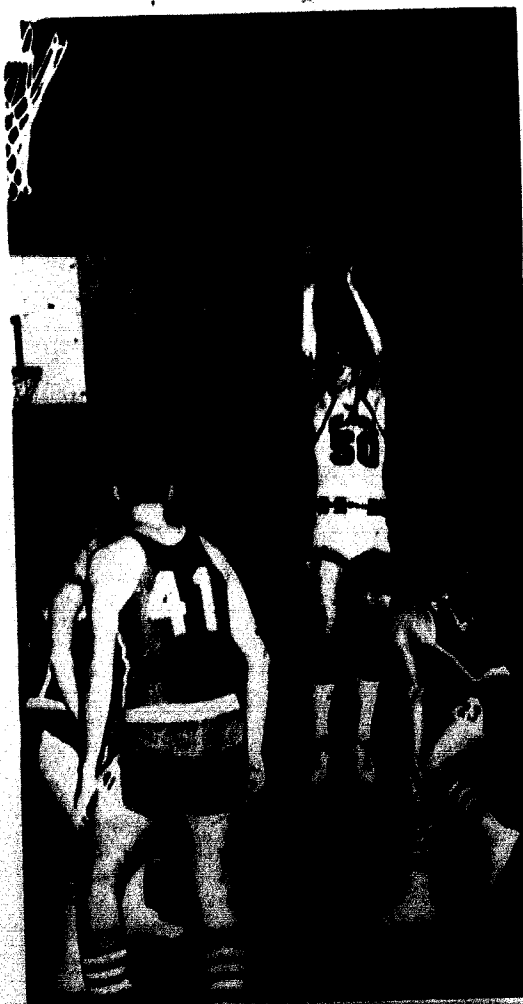


Larry Holley goes up with a ten foot jumper against St. Benedicts.

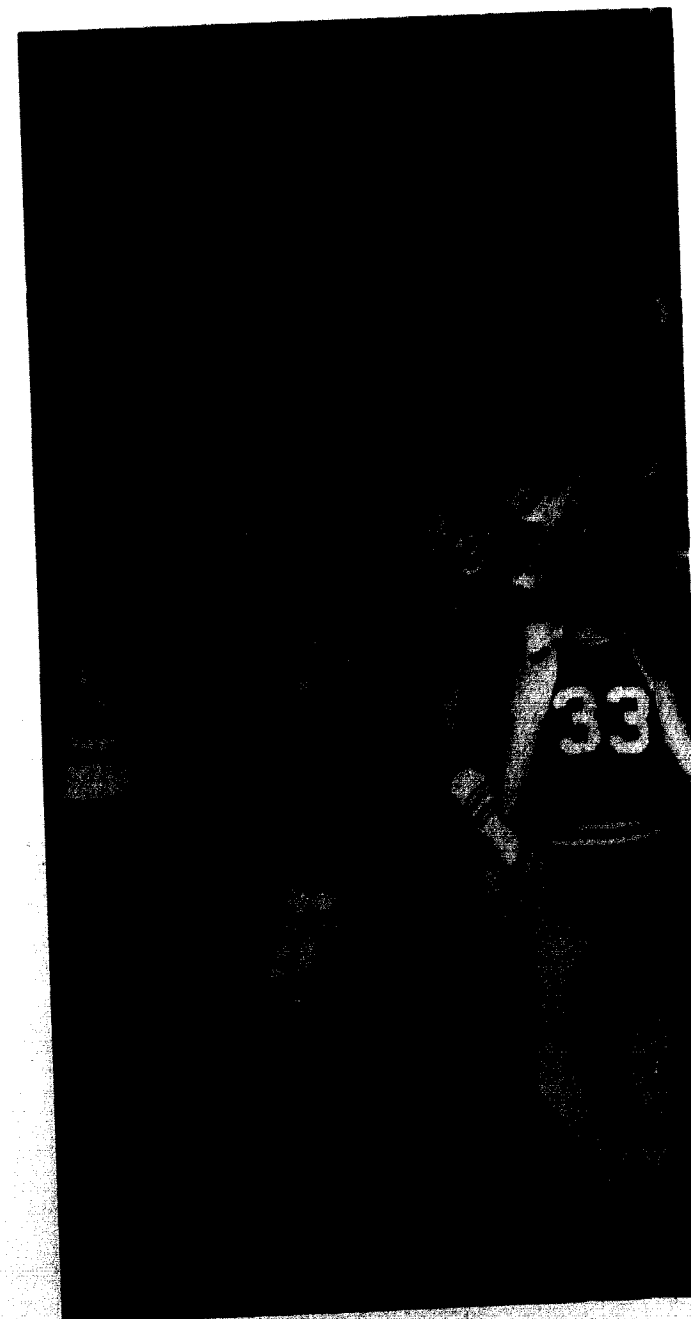

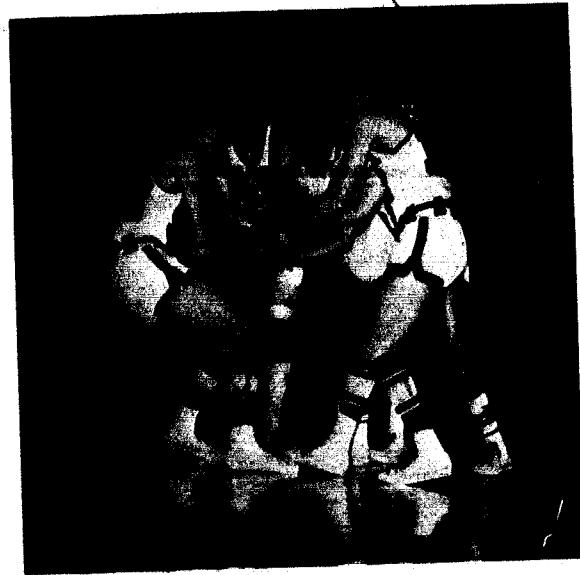

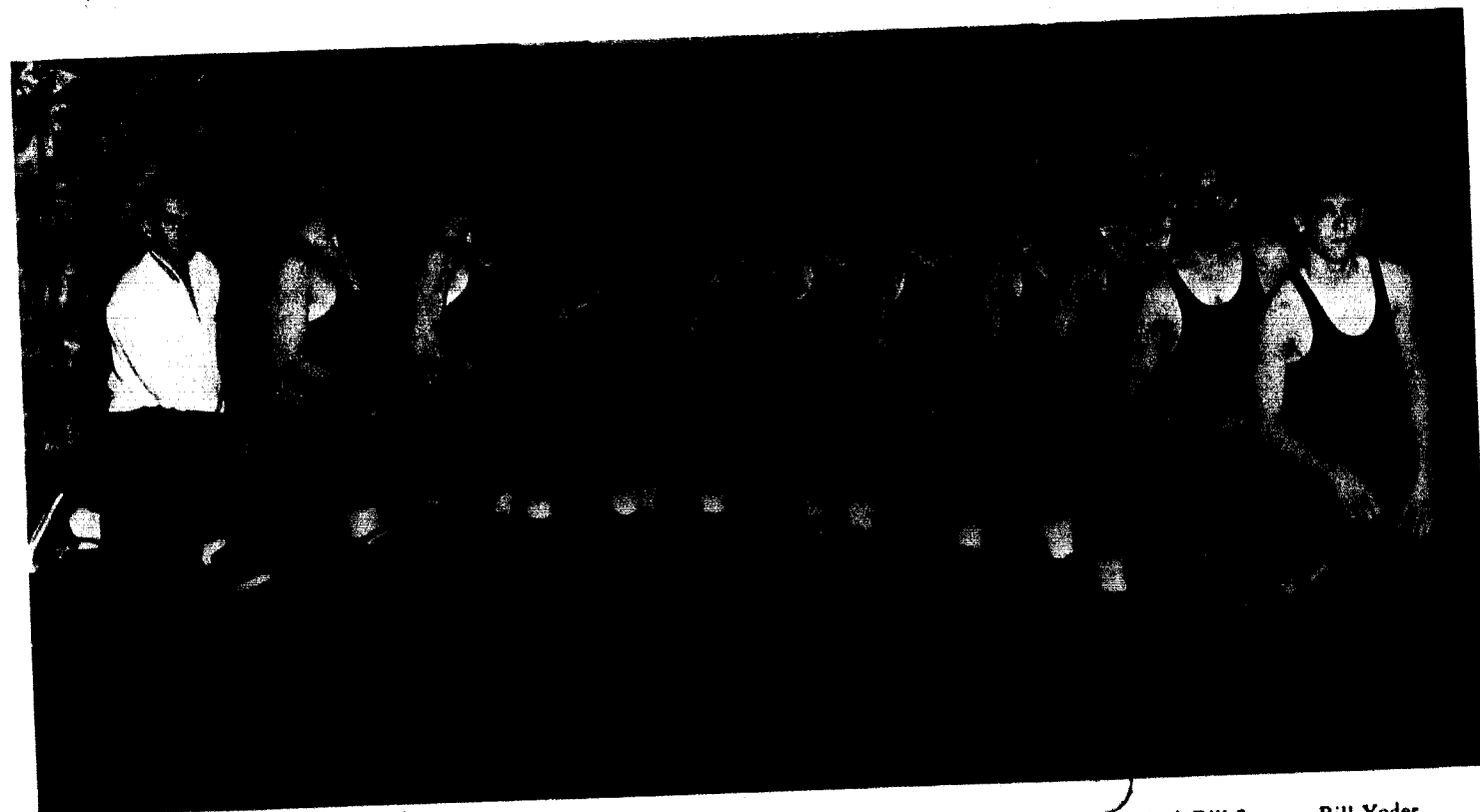

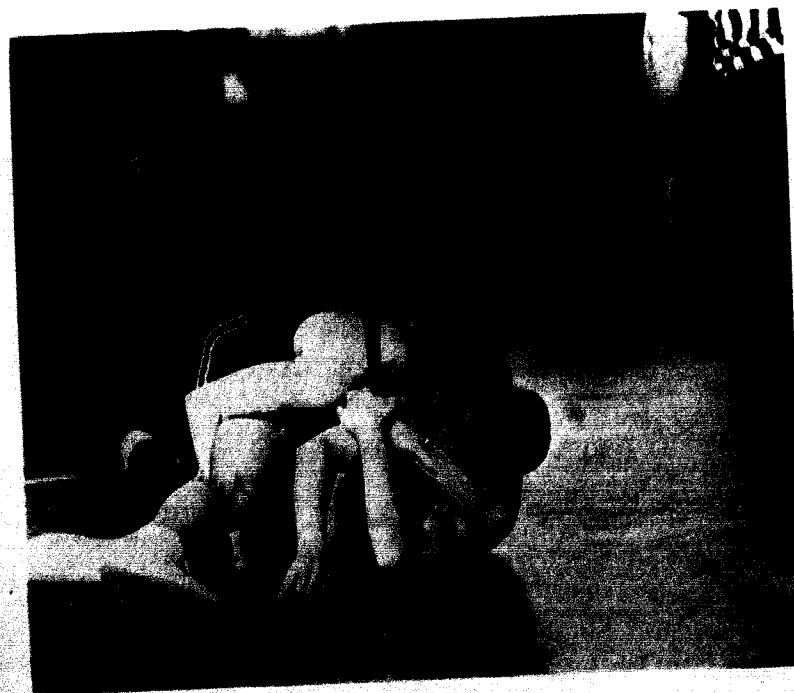

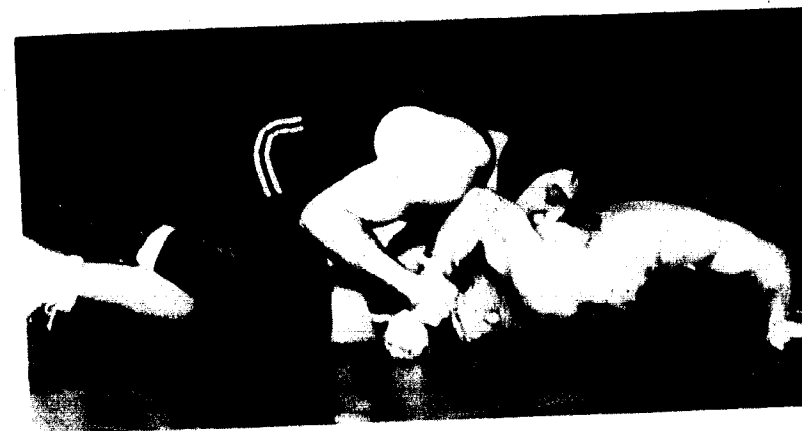

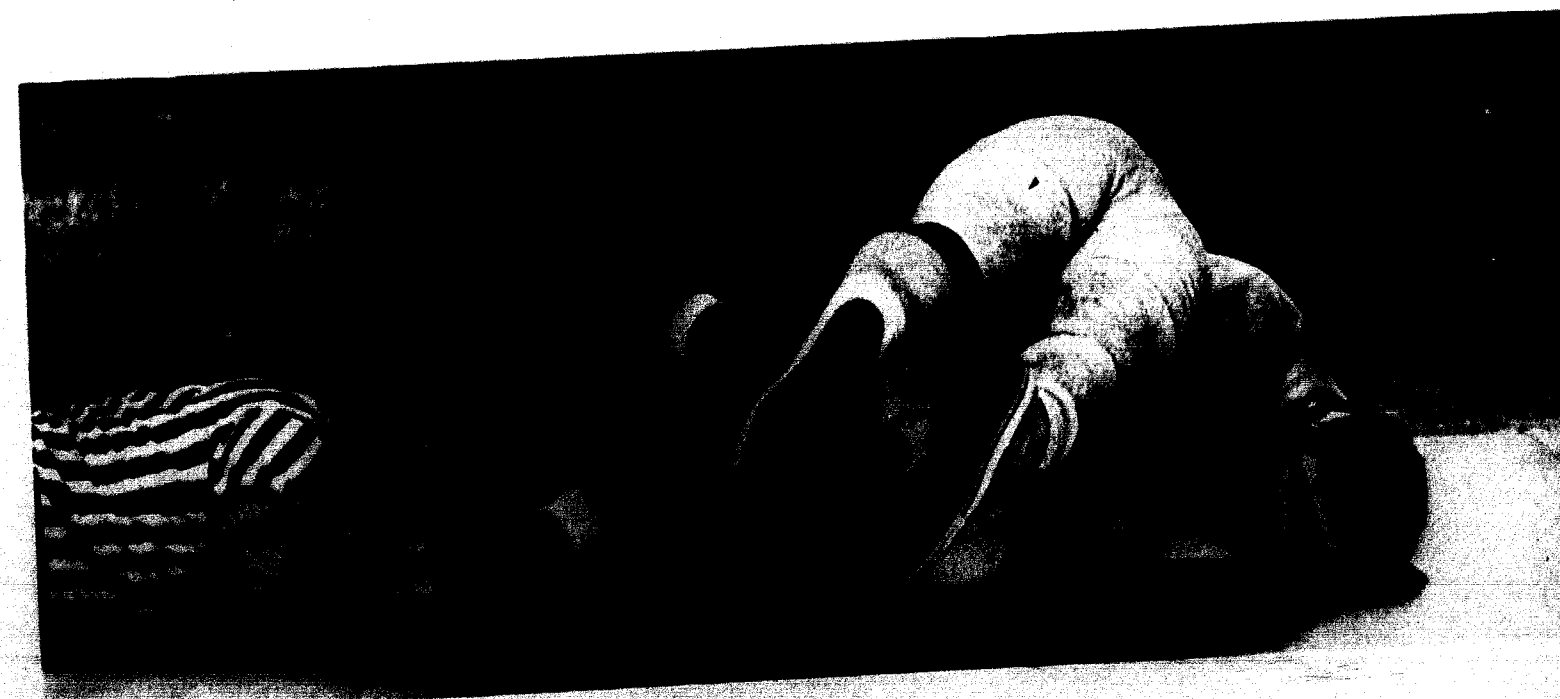

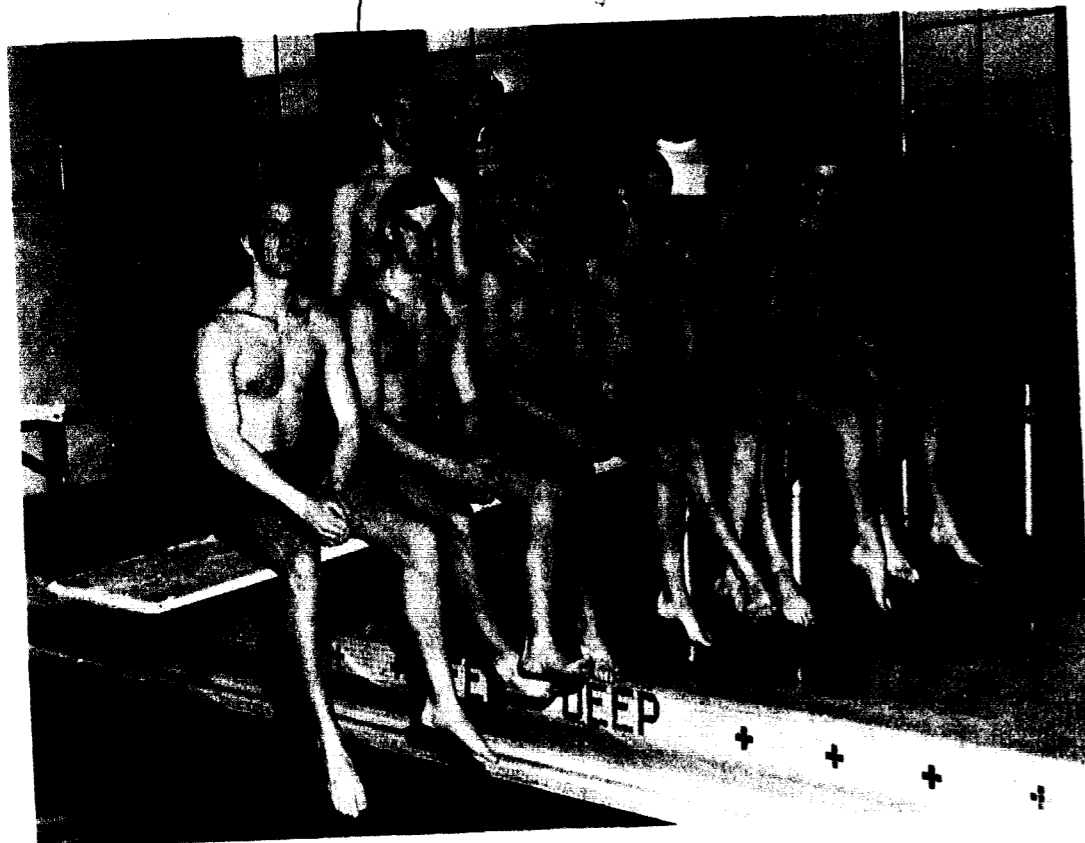

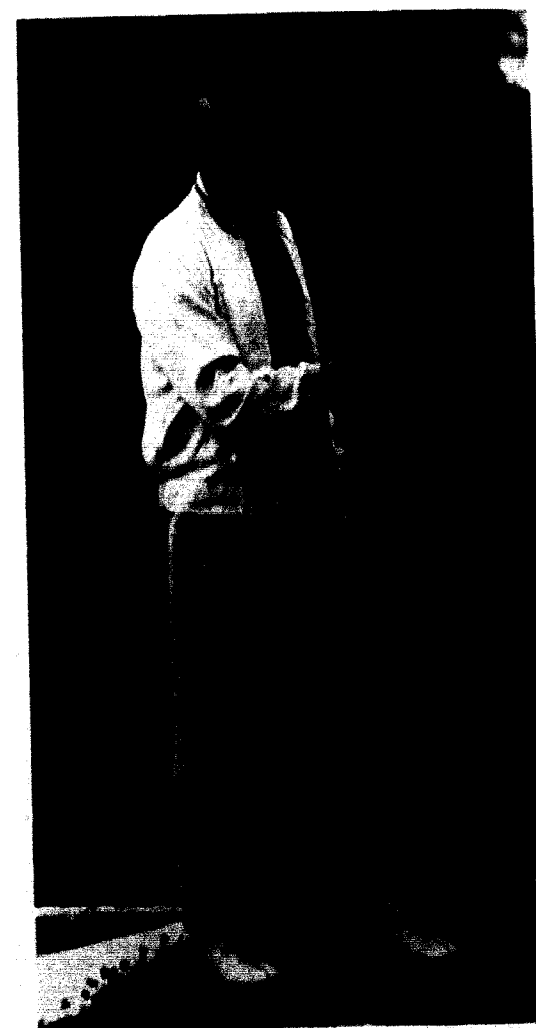

"Orator, jurist, statesman, soldier, and a Christian" describe Colonel Alexander Doniphan who was instrumental in the locating of William Jewell College in Liberty. In 1846 the men of the First Regiment of Missouri Volunteers chose Doniphan as their commanding colonel. Each year the William Jewell student body confers its supreme honor on the senior man and woman who exemplify the qualities of leadership, integrity, and potential success epitomized by Liberty's most famous citizen. This year the title of "First Lady of the Campus" was bestowed upon Linda Kay Harger of Kansas City and that of "Colonel Alexander Doniphan" upon Lawrence Russell Holley II of Jameson
