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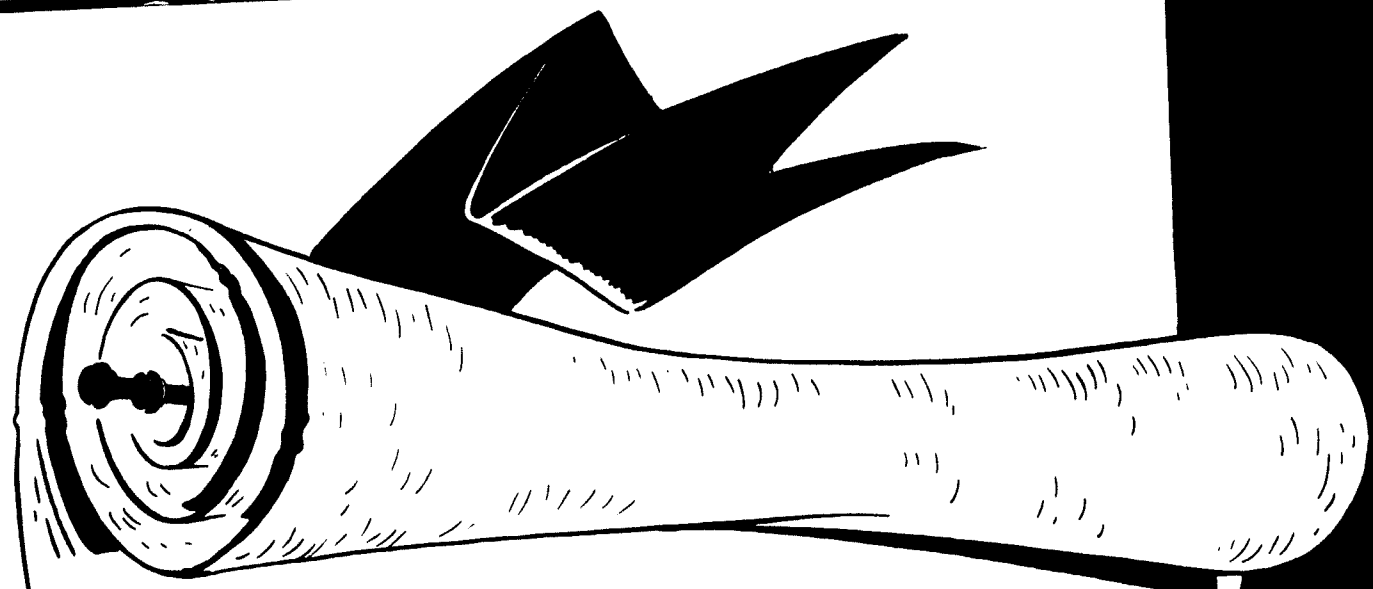
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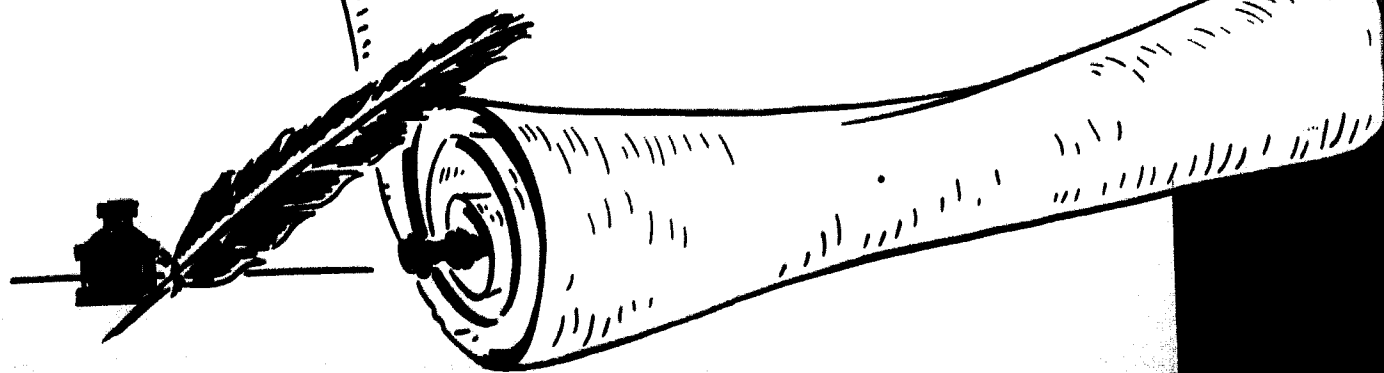




Dedication

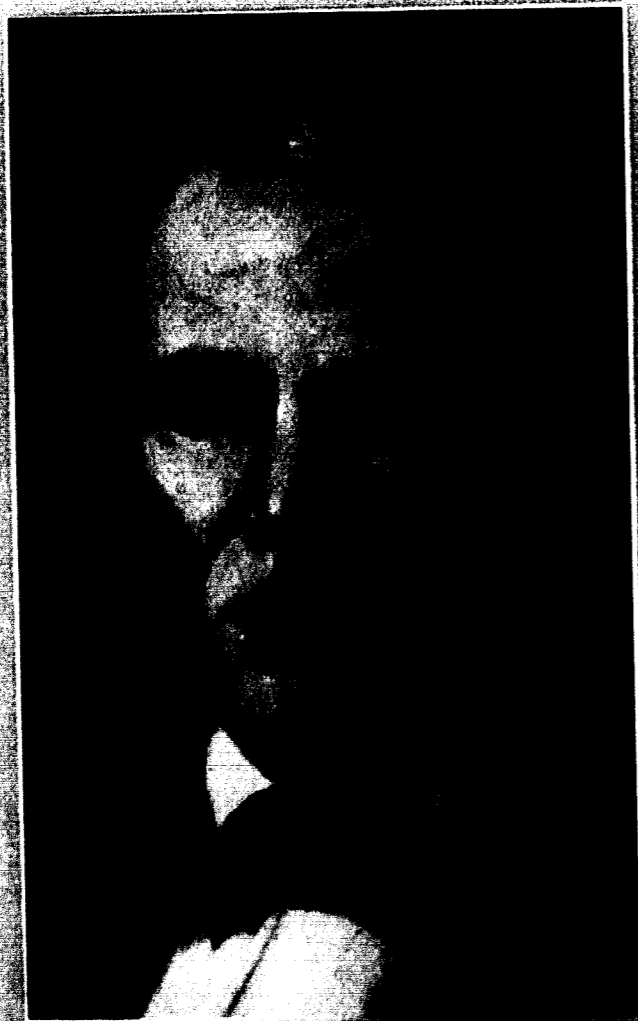

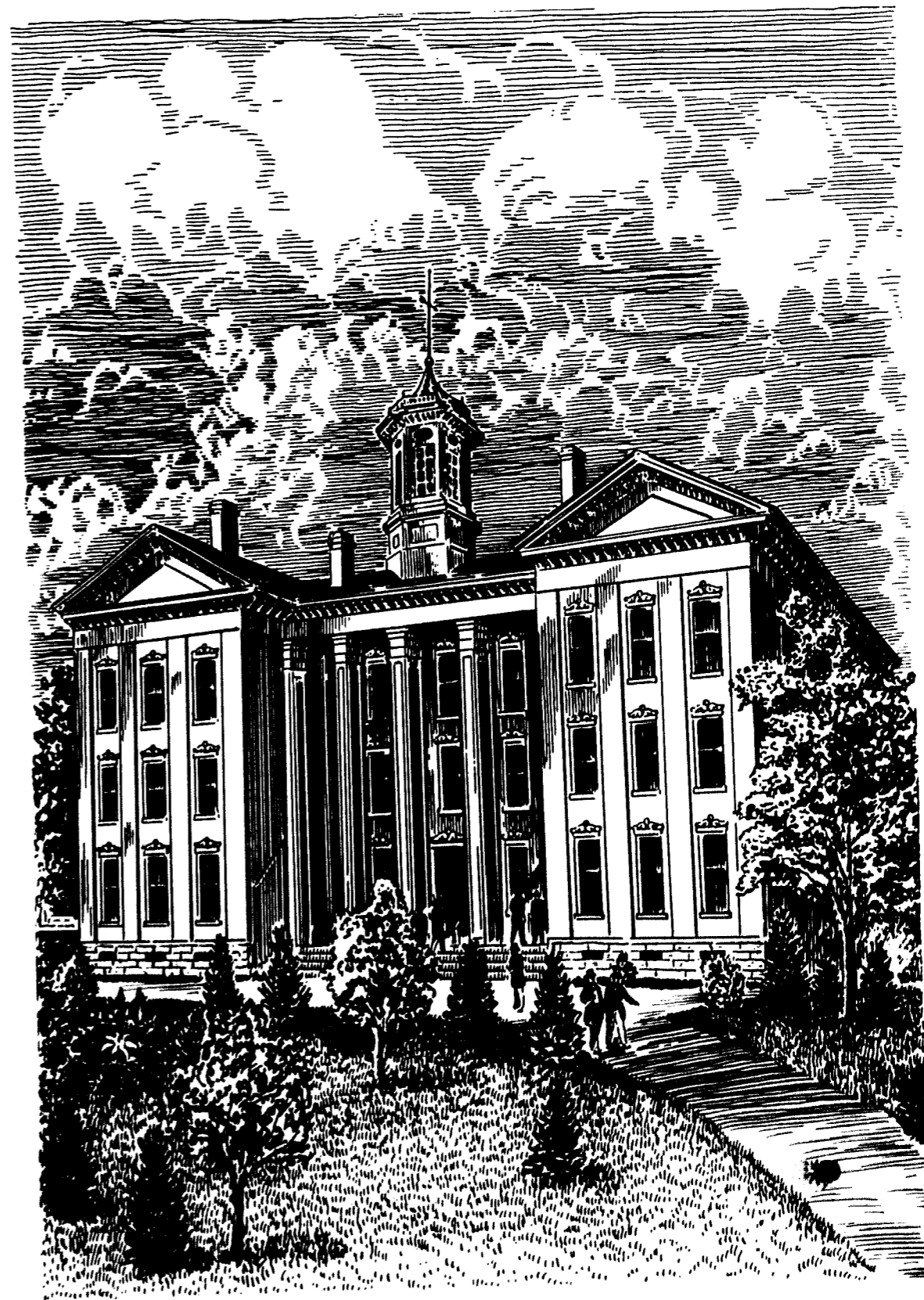
JEWELL'S CENTURY



JEWELL'S CENTURY

More than a hundred years ago, in the days of wild Indians and Conestoga wagon trains heading west, began the dream and

idea of men in the Missouri Baptist General Association to found a school "where candidates for the Ministry, and young men

in general, could acquire an education in advance of that afforded by the common schools and academies of the state."

Interest in this idea increased greatly from 1835 to 1843, the year Dr. William Jewell, a prominent physician in Columbia, Mo., made a conditional offer of \$10,000 as a nucleus for the building and endowment of a college. The offer, however, was rejected in 1844 when the committee, after a year's effort, reported that the additional sum necessary could not be raised. In 1848 the offer was accepted, and on Feb. 27, 1849, a charter was granted by the legislature and approved by the governor of the state.

The subscribers to the school met in Boonville soon after the charter was granted

to select a site for the college. After heated discussion — in which Judge James T. V. Thompson and Col. Alexander Doniphan ably represented Clay County — Liberty, county seat of Clay County, was chosen as the town in which the college was to be located. Moreover, at this same meeting it was unanimously agreed that the name of the institution should be William Jewell College.

Classes were begun in the old Liberty Academy on Jan. 1, 1850, and in September the basement rooms of the Second Baptist Church were used until the final transfer to the college building. During the first year the faculty of three taught a student body of 137.

Early in 1850 Dr. Jewell was commissioned by the board to superintend the erection of a building for the school. His devotion to this task cost him his life, for his death in 1852 was attributed to exposure to extreme summer heat while supervising the building.

The story is well-known how he planned the building to be strong and to stand on solid rock. One time when he was called away from the site for several weeks, he was

heartened when he saw how much progress had been made. However, when he inquired of the workers how far down they had gone to lay the foundation and found that they had not hit bedrock, he ordered the walls torn down and started again for a firm foundation.

The first president of the college was E. S. Dulin. Because of financial embarrassment in 1852-53, the school survived as a private enterprise, but in 1853 the trustees resumed full control again and called the Rev. R. S. Thomas, D.D., professor at the state university in Columbia, to be president. The building was near enough completion that in the fall when college re-opened, classes were held in it. Jewell Hall, as it was named, was finally finished in 1858 at a total cost of \$44,000.

Dr. Clark describes it in his history of the college: "The building is of brick, on

a permanent foundation of stone, one hundred and twenty feet front, sixty-seven feet deep, and three lofty stories high, surmounted by a belfry and observatory rising from the center of the roof. It is beautifully situated on a hill at the foot of which lies the city of Liberty."

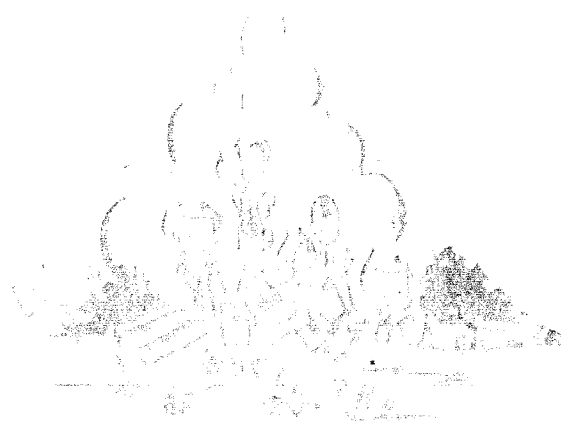
This stately building which still crowns our hill was totally renovated during 1947-48, made fireproof and modern inside, while still retaining its same outward appearance. This project, which was a gift of W. D. Johnson, president of the Board of Trustees, in honor of Dr. John F. Herget, was dedicated in a special ceremony last spring.

Until June of 1855, the administration under the Rev. Mr. Thomas continued, and then because of new financial trouble the college was suspended for two years.

Under the presidency of the Rev. William Thompson, and a faculty of six, the college was re-opened in the fall of 1857. The library had been increased to 2000 volumes and additions to the physical and chemical apparatus had been made.

The literary societies — Philomathic and Excelsior — and the Baptist Evangelical

Society for ministerial students claimed first place in the students' special activities lists. Debate and oratory, and for the ministerial students, sermon delivery were the principal objects of the groups, which maintained great rivalry among themselves.

The year 1861 found William Jewell closed again — this time because of the Civil War which ravaged the Liberty area and called young men to fight. However, Jewell Hall was put to use by Federal troops. After the battle of Blue Mills Landing in 1861, the second and third floors became a hospital and the first floor a stable. Again a year later Jewell Hall quartered Federal troops. A line of rifle pits was thrown up across the campus and is marked today by a stone monument erected to the Union soldiers by the Class of 1931. Thirty years after the war, Congress granted the college \$22,000 rent for the use of the building and grounds during that time.

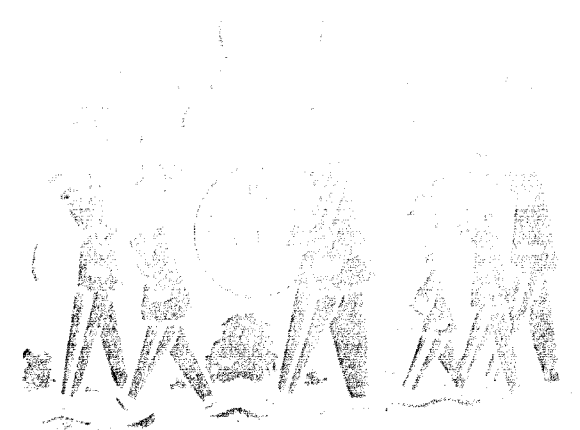
When the war was finally over in 1865, the college suffered the greatest depletion it had ever known, the building was dilapidated, equipment and library gone. Trust in God and belief in the worth of the school

caused the Board of Trustees to restore the building and equipment and to open the doors to students once more in 1868. Dr. Thomas Rambaut, a progressive educator from Louisville, Ky., accepted the presidency that year and began his plan of reconstruction. By 1874, however, ill health, brought on by his continued efforts to set the school aright, forced him to resign. In two years he had managed to increase the assets of the school to \$200,502.

In 1872 when national financial insecurity threatened to force students to leave school, the students took it upon themselves to form the "Ministerial Students Boarding Club" and by doing their own work, provided board at cost.

The office of president remained vacant until the summer of 1892. In the meantime





the affairs of the college were administered by the faculty, acting through a chairman.

June, 1892, brought Dr. John Priest Greene, D.D., pastor of the Third Baptist Church of St. Louis, as president of the college. The college prospered under his administration and three new buildings were added to the campus. The enrollment increased and the college gained in strength and prestige.

A formal garden and fountain were constructed east of New Ely as a monument to Dr. Greene by the Class of 1912 at their twenty-fifth reunion in 1937.


Through the years the number of books in the library had been increasing steadily until in 1905 there were more than 12,000 volumes and 700 pamphlets. These had been moved from room to room and at one time were housed in a large center room on the first floor of Jewell Hall.

Finally with the coming of the Rev. Charles Haddon Spurgeon's private library, plans for a library building were drawn up. Carnegie Library was opened in 1908 with not only space for these books and many more but also reading room for the students. At present 61,994 books are available.

During the forty years that the library has stood on our campus it has seen many generations of students come to study at its tables — to read and reread the books already studied by those gone out to live by the standards found within their pages. Others have come sometimes to the quiet of the library to dream of the world and all it may hold for them, as they gaze over the campus.

A new building rose on the campus of William Jewell in 1911 — New Ely. This dormitory for men had been needed for some time because of the increased enrollment. The three story building which houses 140 men students also contains the dining hall for both men and women students.

From the time it was built in 1881 until 1890, Old Ely was able to provide ample



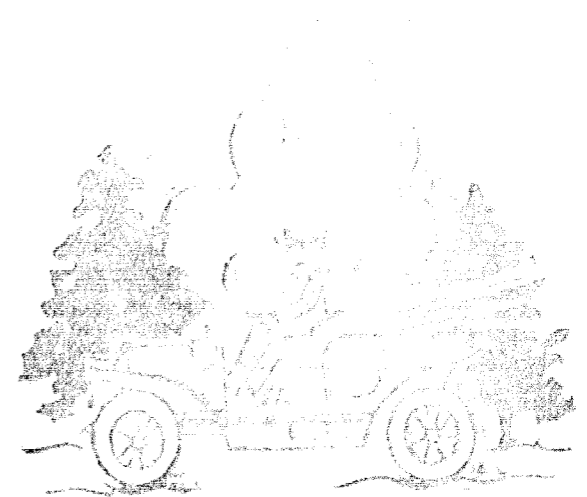
student housing, and then three frame cottages were erected on the east side of the campus. These along with Old Ely itself were neglected when New Ely was finished. When the Navy school came to Jewell in 1943, Old Ely was restored to living quarters and Jewell students returned to it after the Navy's exodus in 1946. Now its certain doom has been predicted by Hare and Hare, architects whose plan provides for it to be torn down when the new administration building is finished. But many a student following the walks of the new quadrangle will see shadows of Old Ely there. Young men will still find the fellowship, fun, laughter, and pranks in New Ely which exist there now and which have merely moved from Old Ely to the New.

Marston Hall rose on the southern slope of Jewell's hill in 1914. Marston — the home of sciences, theorems, equations, peculiar smells, unknowns, and bugs to be dissected — is a three story brick building which was constructed largely with financial help from E. W. Marston in memory of his father, Sylvester Marston, for whom the building is named. During 1943-46 the Navy also took

over Marston. When the Navy left, many classes were crowded into it while workmen rejuvenated Jewell Hall into the beautiful, fireproof building it now is.

Tragedy to the men of Jewell struck in February 1913 when Liberty Ladies College, which once adorned the western hill where the high school now stands, burned, and all the young ladies returned to their homes. But ten girls were welcomed to the Jewell campus as students in 1917 and soon a dormitory was necessary for the many girls who made application for admission. In 1925 the foundation for Melrose Hall was laid on the hill northwest of the main campus. Melrose was built with the aid of C. M. Treat, who has helped finance many buildings in other schools with the provision that they be named Melrose. For twenty years those walls



echoed girls' laughter and tears and then in 1943, along with the other dormitories on the hill, Melrose also was turned into a Navy "ship." After the Navy left, the college redecorated the interior, painting, laying linoleum, and buying new maple furniture so that in the fall of 1947, Melrose was opened to women students as a nearly new building.

The presidency changed four times from 1920 until 1928. Dr. David Jones Evans was elected following Dr. Greene's resignation in 1920. He served for a year and a half, leaving to accept the pastorate of the First Baptist Church in Kansas City, Mo. Dr. Greene was requested to serve again until a new president could be secured. Dr. Harry Clifford Wayman of Louisville, Ky., came in March, 1923, and served until June, 1928.

In 1928 Dr. John F. Herget returned to his Alma Mater to accept the presidency. Coming to the college from a pastorate of twenty-five years at Ninth Street Baptist Church, Cincinnati, O., he remained here for fourteen years.

In 1926 Gano Chapel was finished. The chapel was built to replace Wornall Hall, which burned in August, 1913. Built in 1891, Wornall Hall was named for the Hon. J. B. Wornall, then president of the Board of Trustees, and it had housed the academic

department, physical sciences, administrative offices, and on the third floor, the chapel. Gano Chapel was named for John Gano, a friend of George Washington and a chaplain in his army.

The chapel is the place of gathering for chapel service, where the morning sunlight makes patterns of color as it streams through the stained glass windows, when the break from endless classes comes, where one can be inspired by the school motto inscribed above the stage, "Trust in God and Work." As it stands looking south across the campus, the chapel symbolizes the Christian way of life which is the goal of students on the Hill.

Administrative offices are still located in the chapel but are soon to be moved to the new administration building.

Across the road from the center of spiritual growth — Gano Chapel — stands the center of physical growth — Brown Gymnasium. Built in 1928, it replaced the old Brown Gymnasium which burned. Both buildings were named for A. D. Brown, who contributed generously to the building of the first one. The old gym was believed to have been the first college gym west of the Mississippi and enabled William Jewell to have one of the first intercollegiate basketball teams in this section. A two story building,



it had been built in 1894 at a cost of \$35,000. The new gymnasium is spacious and houses a large basketball court, swimming pool, corrective gym, handball court, and other facilities as well as offices of the athletic and enrollment directors and vice president in charge of business administration.

And so the scene is nearly complete, but not quite — for one of the things held most

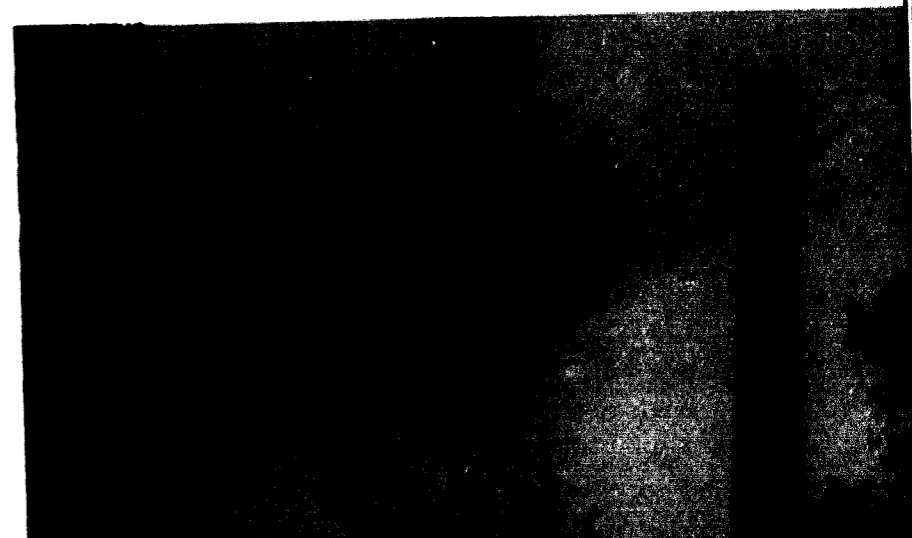
dear in the hearts of William Jewell students is the J-Bench — honor and pride of upper classmen. It was presented to the college in 1929 by the Class of 1895 with an especial gift from Dr. Herget. Perhaps there are more traditions and memories of this spot than of any other on the hill.

Following Dr. Herget's resignation, Dr. H. I. Hester served as interim president from

1942-43. On Nov. 11, 1943, the ninth president of the college, Dr. Walter Pope Binns, was "officially piped aboard." After the war was over and the men again returned to the campus, there were among the 1200 stars on the service flag, 30 gold ones. — But still our story is not finished, for in 1947 a new heating system was installed and a new heating plant built north of the gymnasium.

And now on the eastern slope of the "top of the Hill" rises the latest addition to the campus, the John Priest Greene Administration Building, which was a gift of W. D. Johnson, president of the Board of Trustees.

And this is the story of the hundred years, — years of progress — But that is not all, for ahead lies another century with dreams yet undreamed that will lift William Jewell to greater heights.

President's Greeting

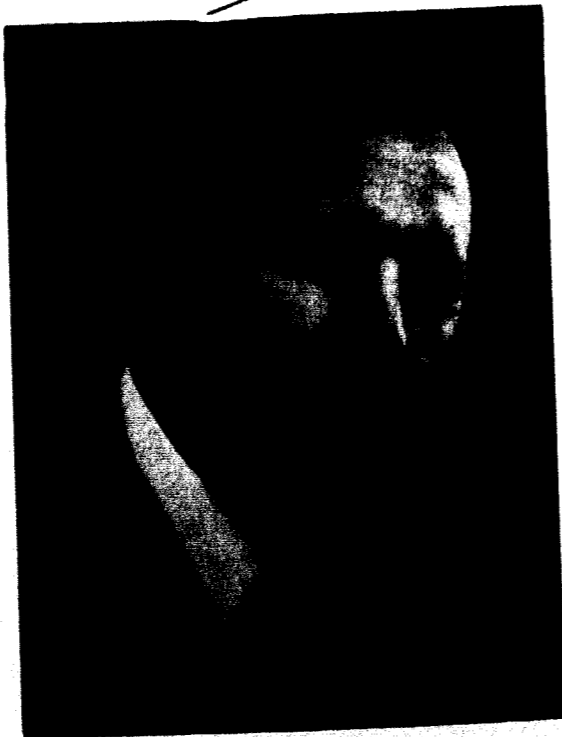

I heartily congratulate the members of the Class whose graduation comes at the point in William Jewell history where two significant centuries meet.

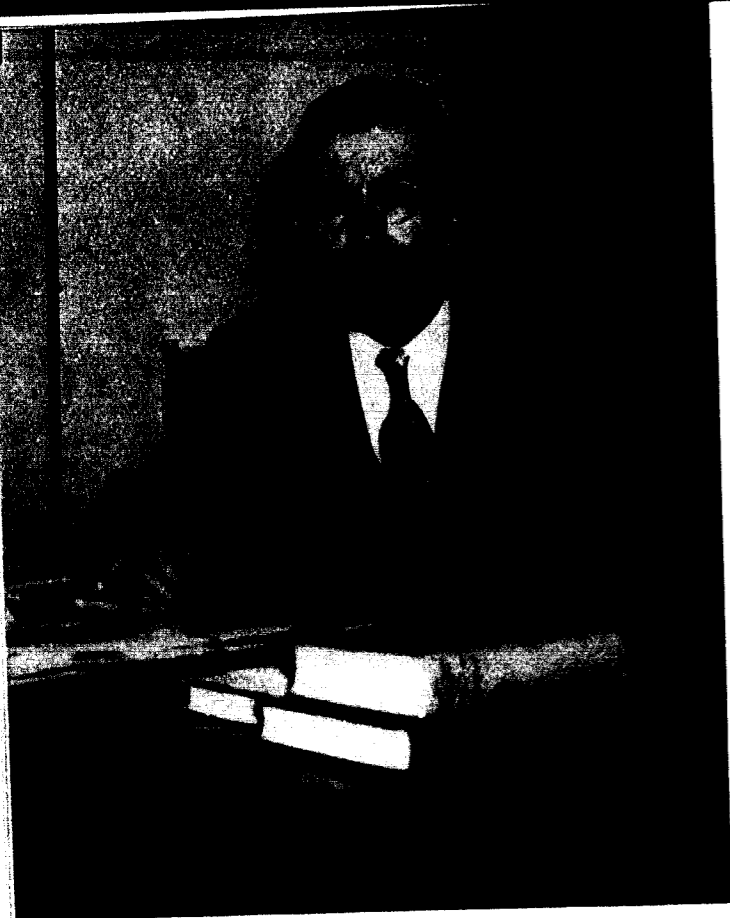

Mr. Jones who is the Vice-President in charge of Business Administration received his A.B. degree from William Jewell.

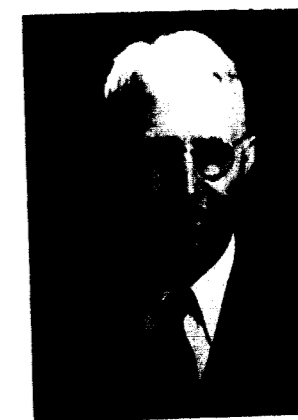

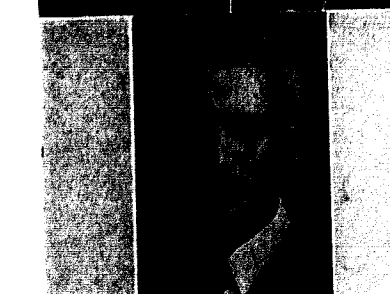

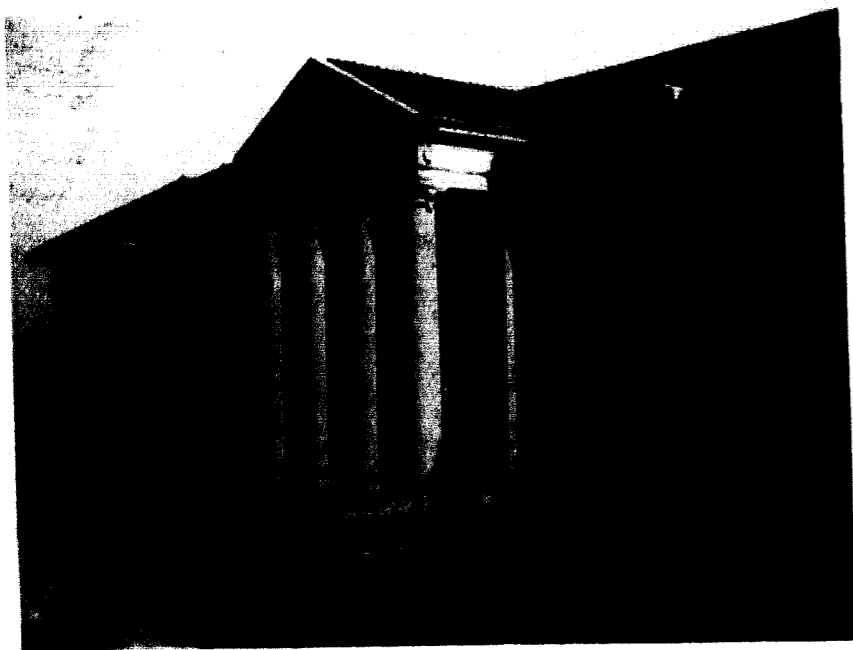

Old Ely served its last year as a dormitory for men this year. Maple Hall, a smaller dormitory for girls is located off the campus.



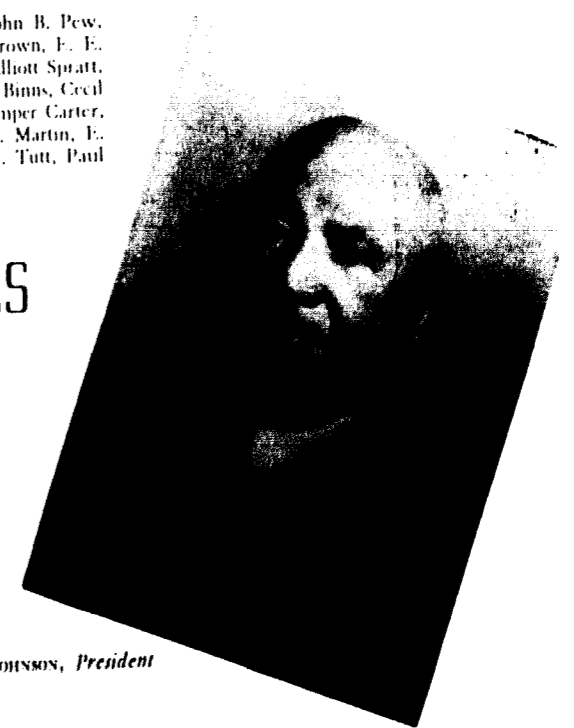

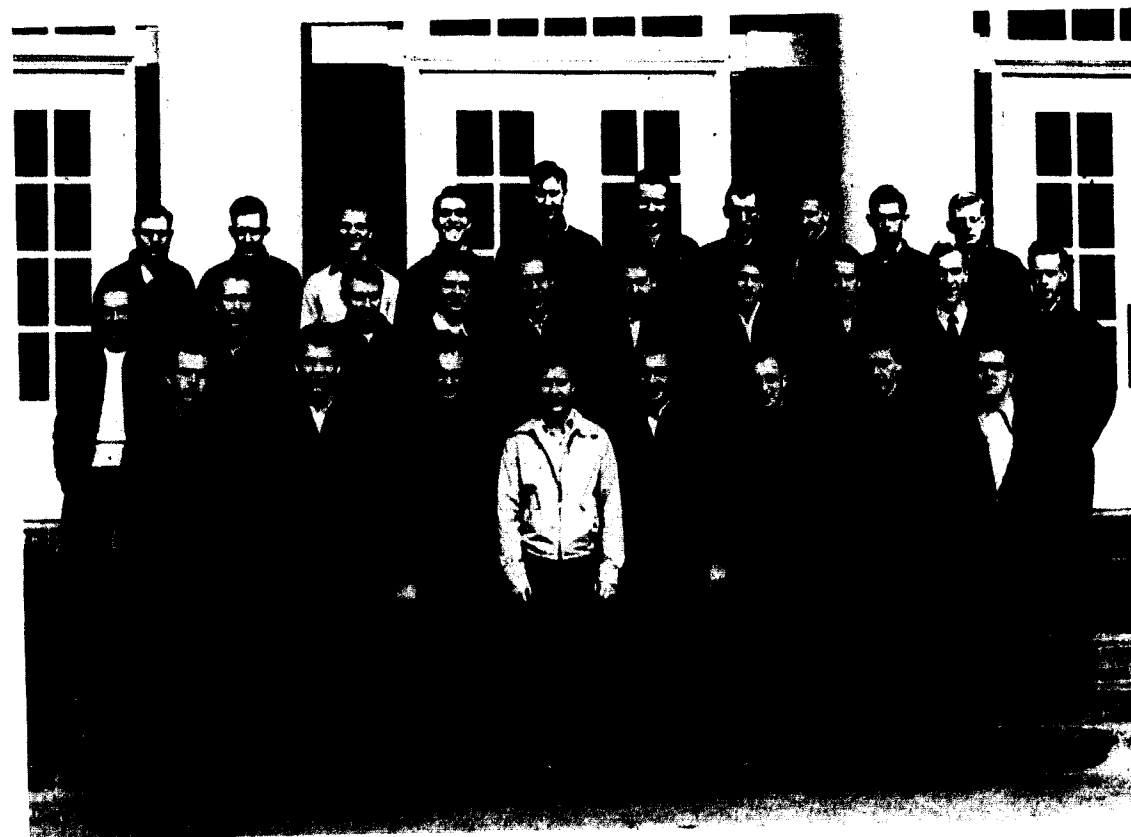




ATHLETICS —

J-CLUB

The William Jewell "J" Club, organized in 1912, is composed of athletes who have earned letters in intercollegiate competition as representatives of the "Big Red Team." Boasting of its present and alumni membership of over fourteen hundred, the preamble to the Constitution of the "J" Club characterizes its purpose:

"Whereas, in order to form a more perfect union of lettermen, we, the duly lettered athletes of William Jewell College, do hereby ordain and establish this club that the high ideals and traditions of William Jewell College athletics be preserved to the posterity of William Jewell College."

With a membership this year of fifty-one lettermen, the "J" Club is unexcelled in spirit as well as number. The first meeting in September provided this year's officers which are:

Dick Bowles, President; Joe Thompson, Vice-president; Clarence Whitworth, Secretary; Guy Boyer, Treasurer; Bunky Paschal, Historian.

Sponsored by our two coaches, the "J" Club, in addition to the maintaining of high ideals in athletics, functions in a materially beneficial way throughout the year.

This is manifested in the maintenance of refreshment stands at all sports functions, assistance at track meets, and the complete running off of the annual high school invitational track meet. Not to be omitted is the influence of the "J" Club in furthering work on the college field, in the gymnasium, and on the campus.

FOOTBALL

William Jewell's big red football team was tougher this year than for many seasons previous but so was their opposition. The well-bolstered Cardinal squad waltzed through their first three games with little apparent effort, defeating Wentworth 47-7, Simpson 20-0 and K.C. K.J.C. 72-0.

Although the Jewell squad took only four of their scheduled ten games, and wound up fifth in the Missouri College Athletic Union, two members were cited by the Associated Press for their outstanding play. Joe Thompson from Henryetta, Okla., tackle, and Bill Snyder, fullback, former Nigro Award winner from Kansas City, were given berths on the M.C.A.U. second all-star team. According to the official football statistics of the National Collegiate Athletic Bureau, covering small colleges of the nation, Jerry Mershon, Freshman Jewell halfback, ranked seventieth in the nation in total yards gained rushing. Playing in all ten games, Jerry packed the ball 72 times for 483 yards.

Following their brilliant triumph over Kansas City Kansas Junior College, the "Big Red Team" was 21st in total offense and 14th in rushing offense among the nation's schools covered by the N.C.A.B. statistics. Coming out of their tilt with the College of Emporia, the Cardinals found that they had lost several valuable players due to injuries. Other injuries followed, so that 17 of Coach Bradshaw's first 22 men were either benched or playing under handicap, in the game with Culver-Stockton College. The critically weakened "Redbird" squad ended the season with a 40 percent average. Despite this, they scored 198 points to their opponents 197 and placed 25th in the N.C.A.B. standings on yardage gained in offensive rushing.

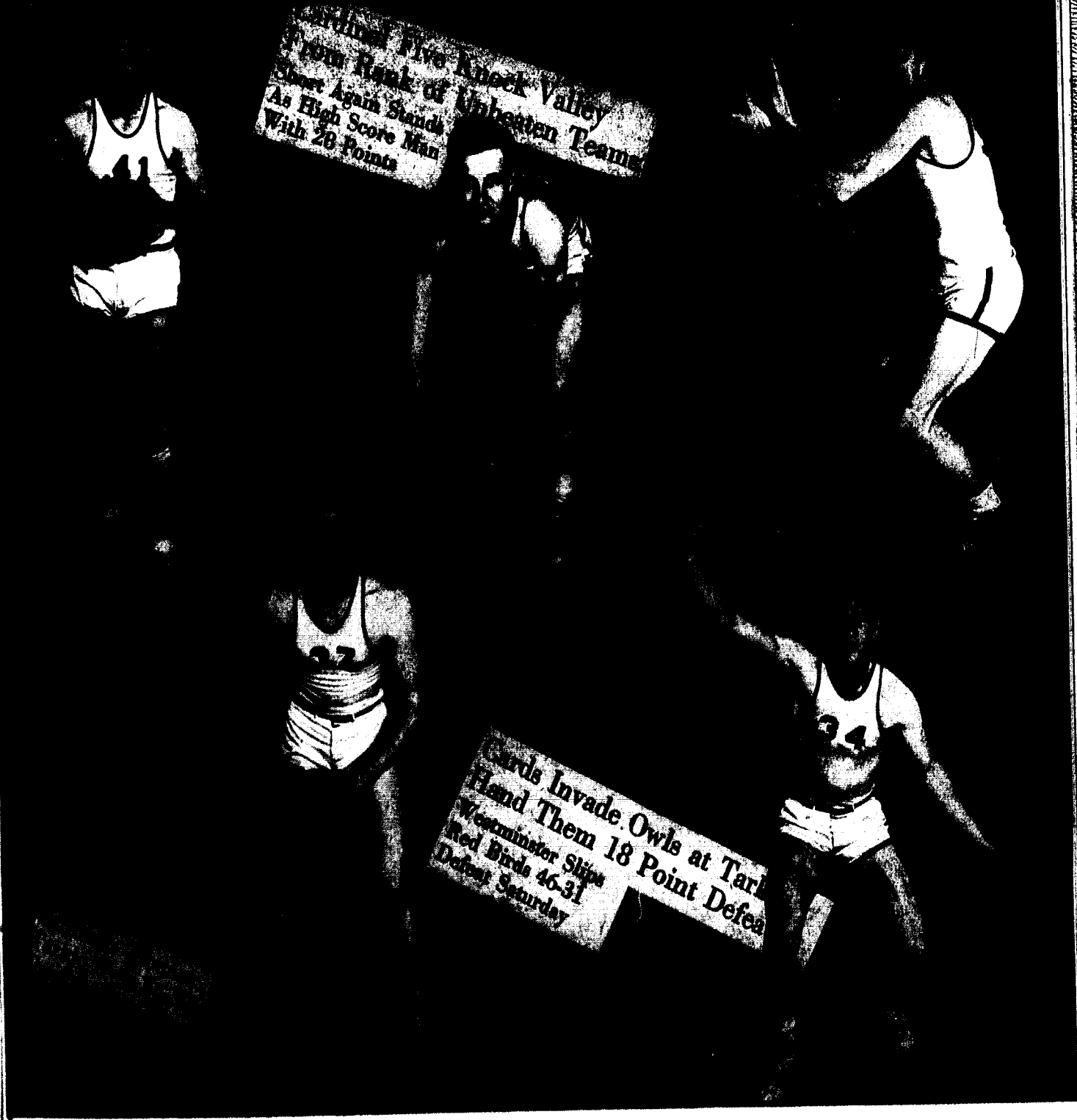

BASKETBALL

The Cardinal cagers came out on the short end of a rather inconsistent season, winning eight games in twenty-one starts. Coach Don Farris' boys started the season in good style, capturing fifth place in the annual Rockhurst tournament, defeating Baker University 34-28 and Missouri Valley's Vikings 45-40, after losing the initial game to Rockhurst, 26-37.

Norman Short, scoring 210 points in regular season play, was chosen all-conference first team forward. His teammates, Hahn, Bowles, Brandom, and Cale all received honorable mention.

The Jewell squad took four of its eleven conference games, tying for fifth place in the league. Probably the most outstanding game of the season was the second conference tilt with Missouri Valley, in which Jewell,

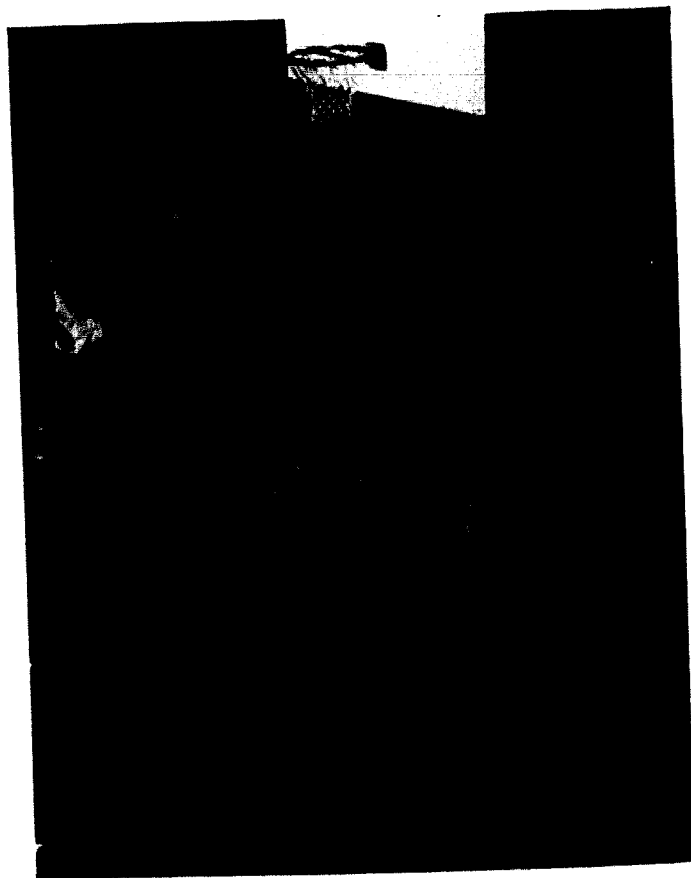
sparked by Short's 29 points, came from behind to win, 61-55, and hand the Vikings their only conference defeat of the season. The Card's play was inconsistent throughout the year, although they turned in some brilliant ball at times.

Returning at the first of the season were lettermen Norm Short and Vince Cale (honorary captains), Dick Bowles, Tom Brandom, Bill Hahn, and Ward Filley. Of this number all but Filley were playing their last season for William Jewell. Emerging from the season, six new letterwinners had been added to the squad; Dwight Crane, Bill Spencer, Carl Walker, Bob Titus, and Clifford French. Eighteen men finished the season, including both varsity and "B" team members. The latter won two out of five attempts, at the same time serving as patient guinea pigs for their more experienced teammates.

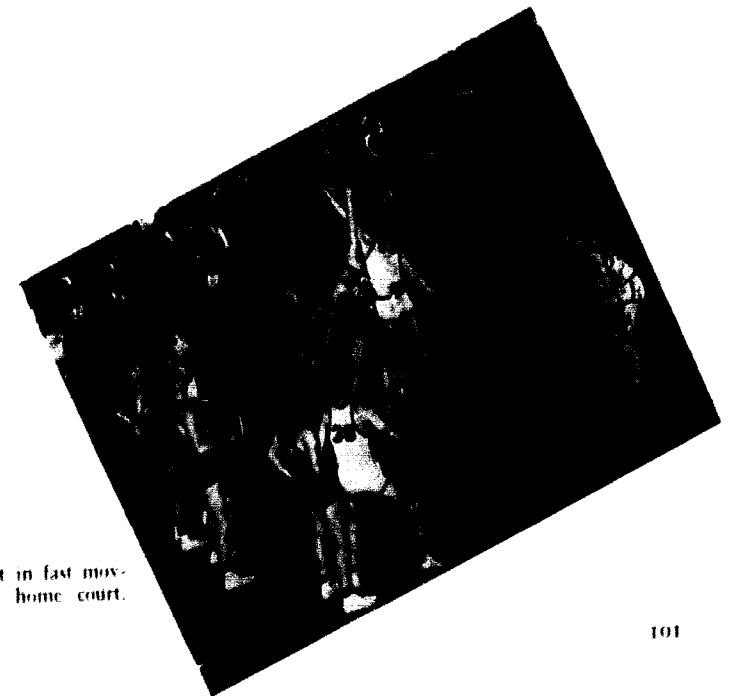

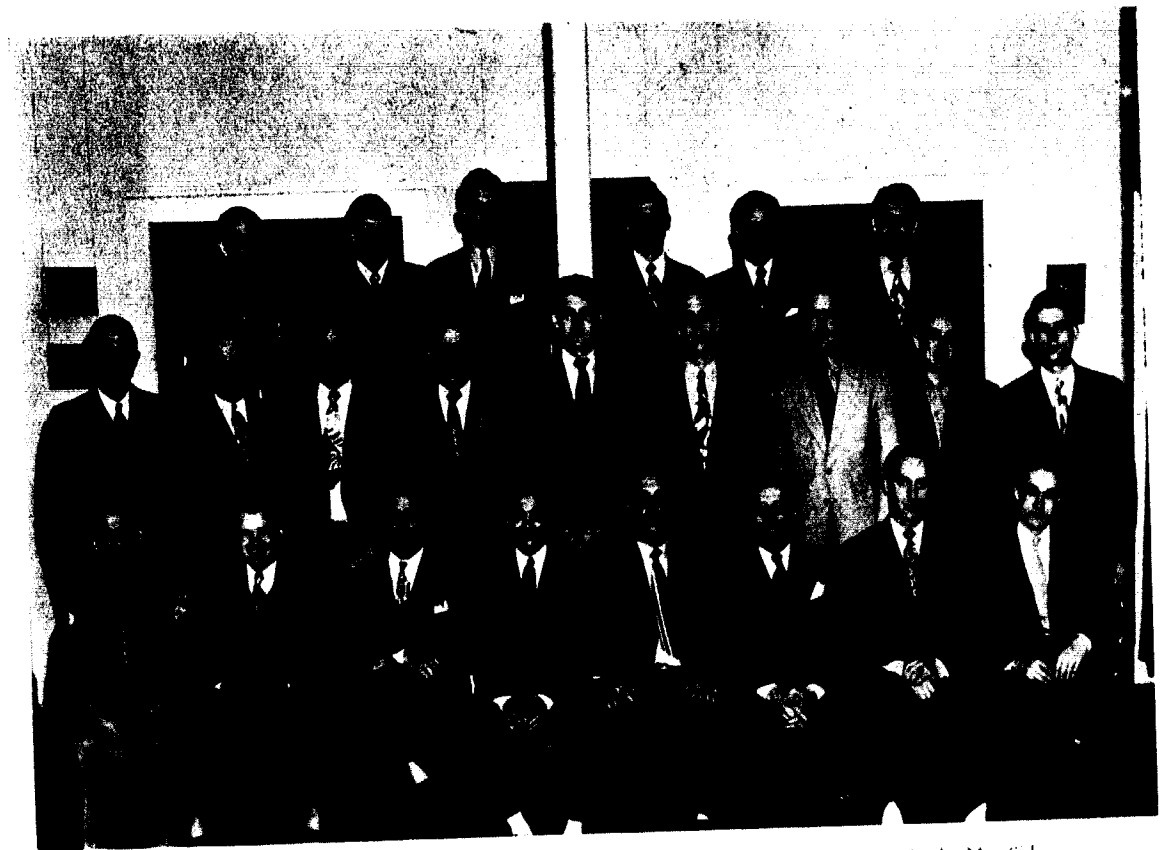

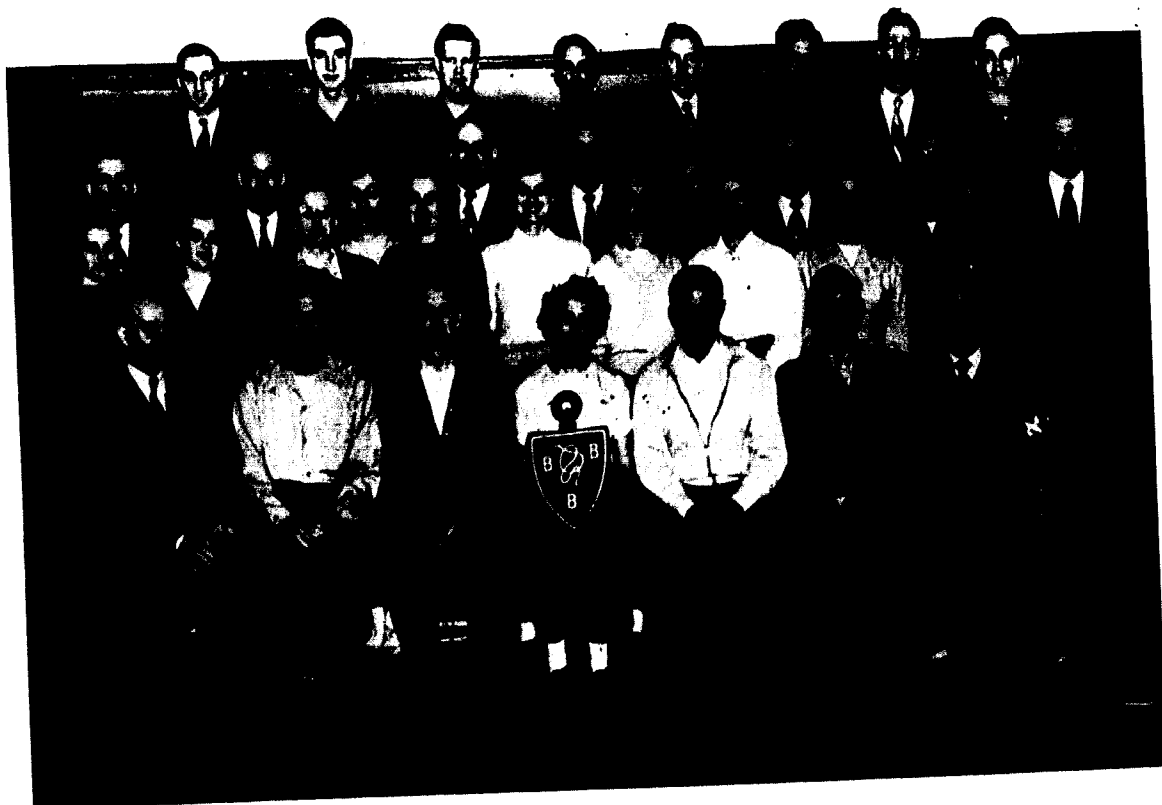
SIGMA PI SIGMA

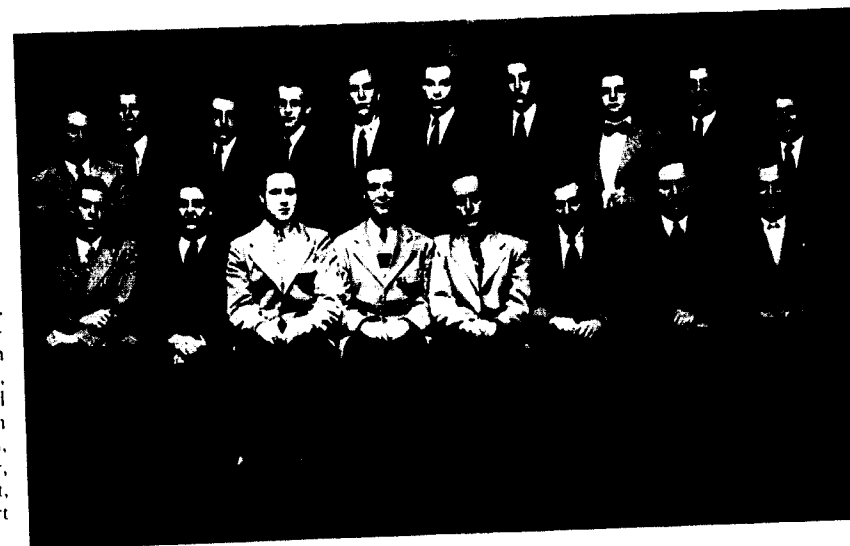
BETA BETA BETA

THETA CHI DELTA

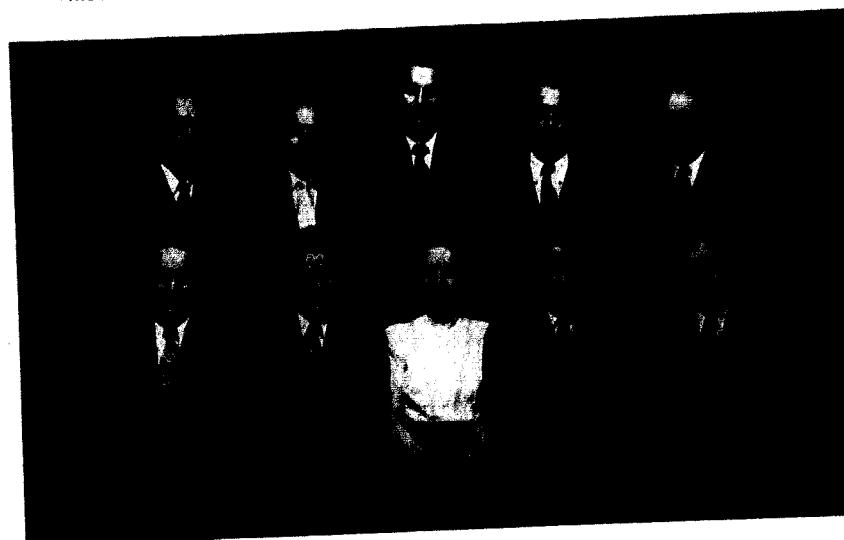

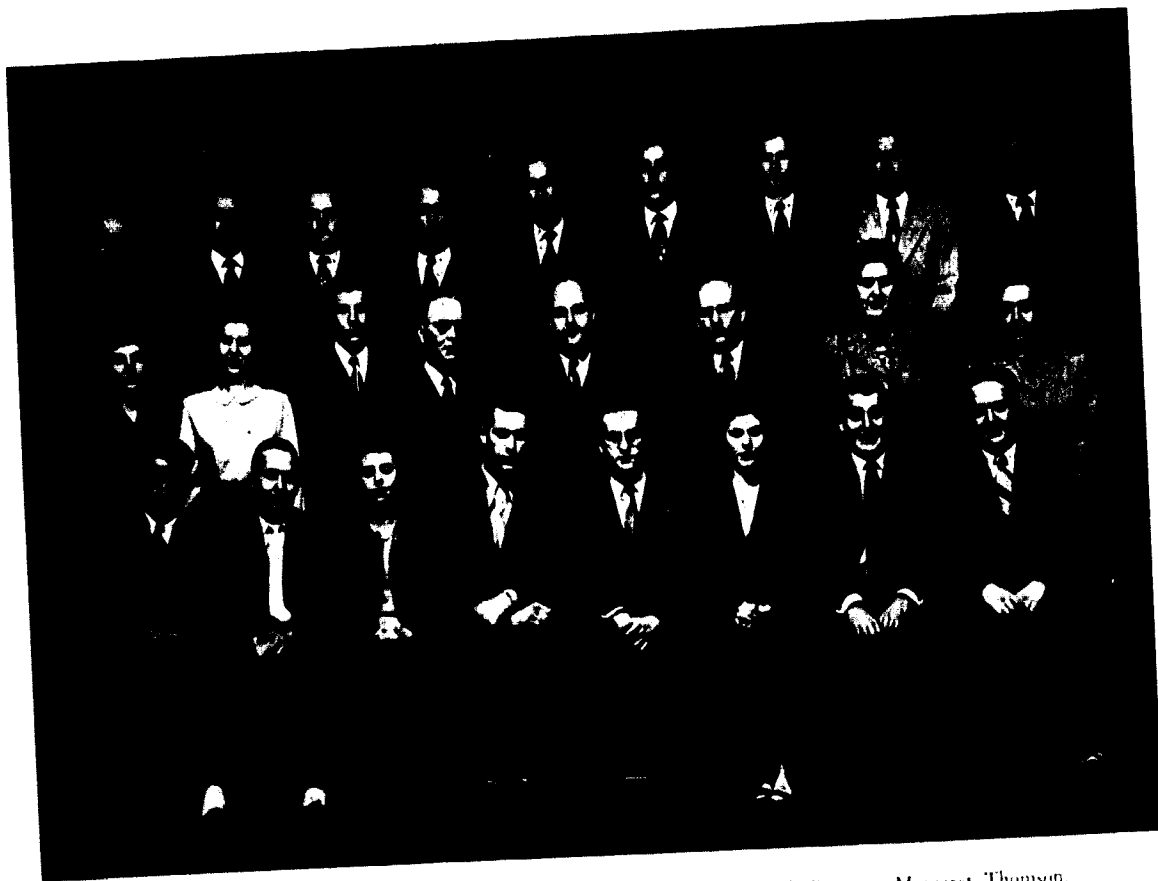
PHI ALPHA THETA

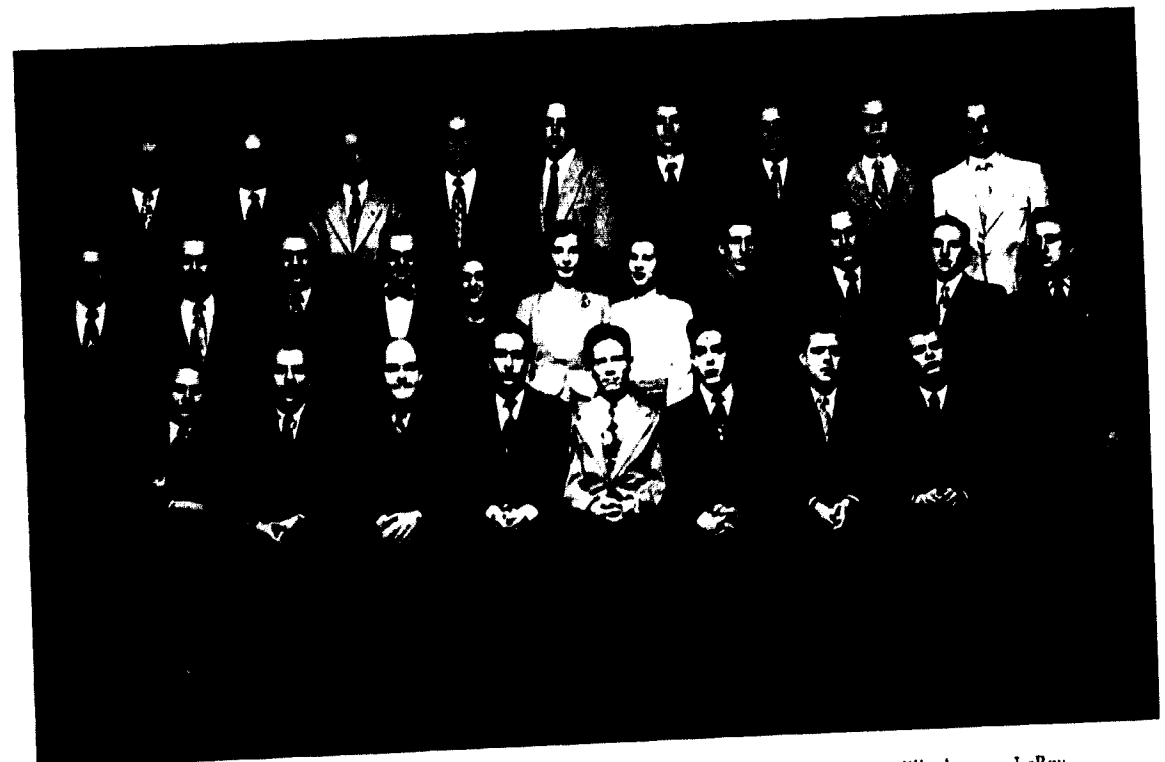
The organization each year sponsors the presentation of the Pi Gamma Mu medal. This award is presented to a senior who has achieved an exceptional scholastic record in the study of social science.

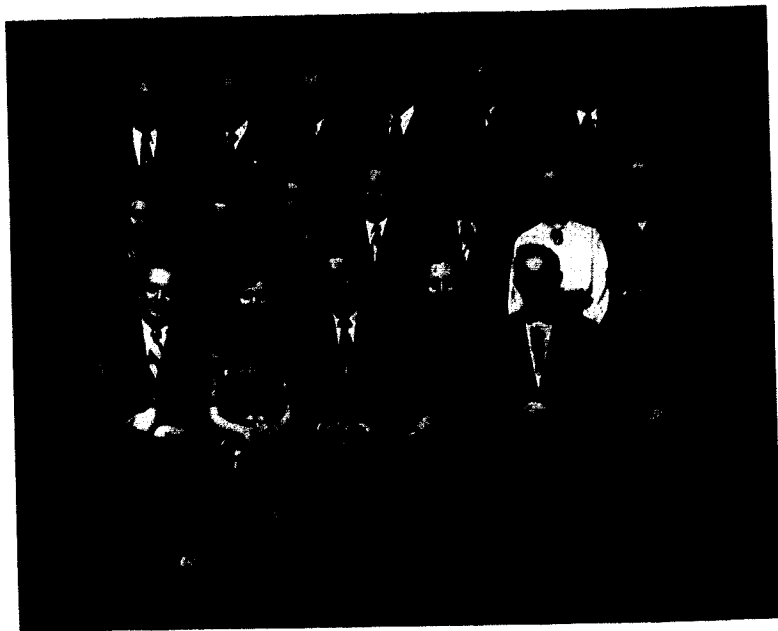

WILLIAM JEWELL PLAYERS

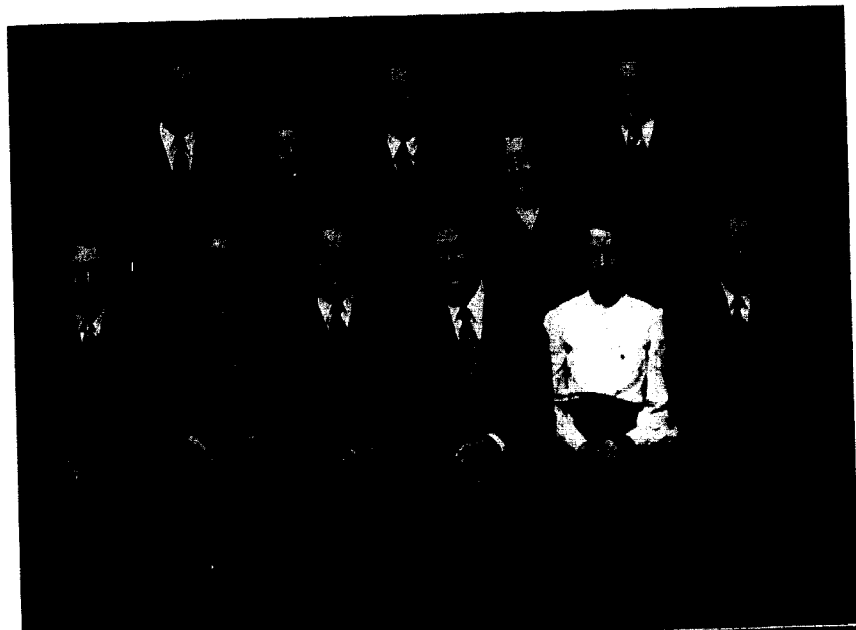

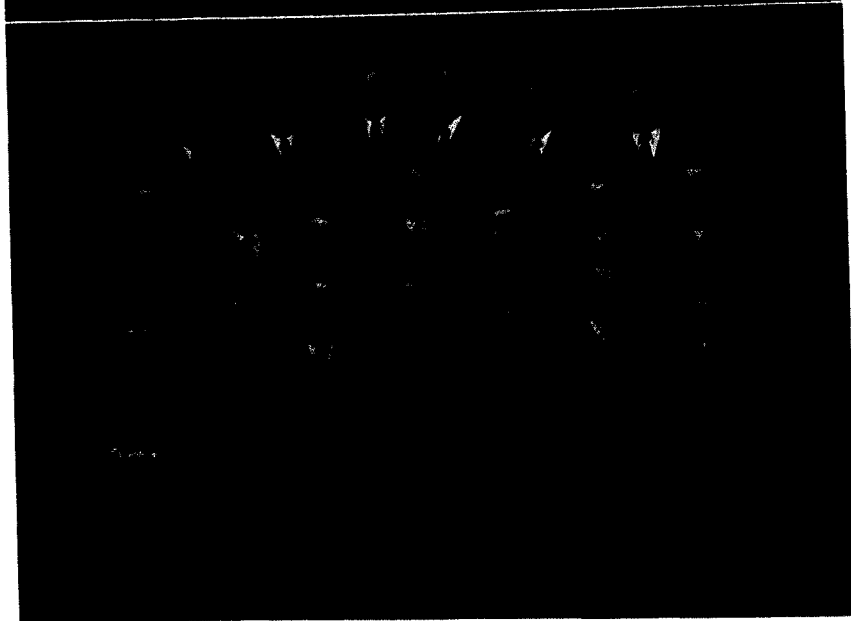

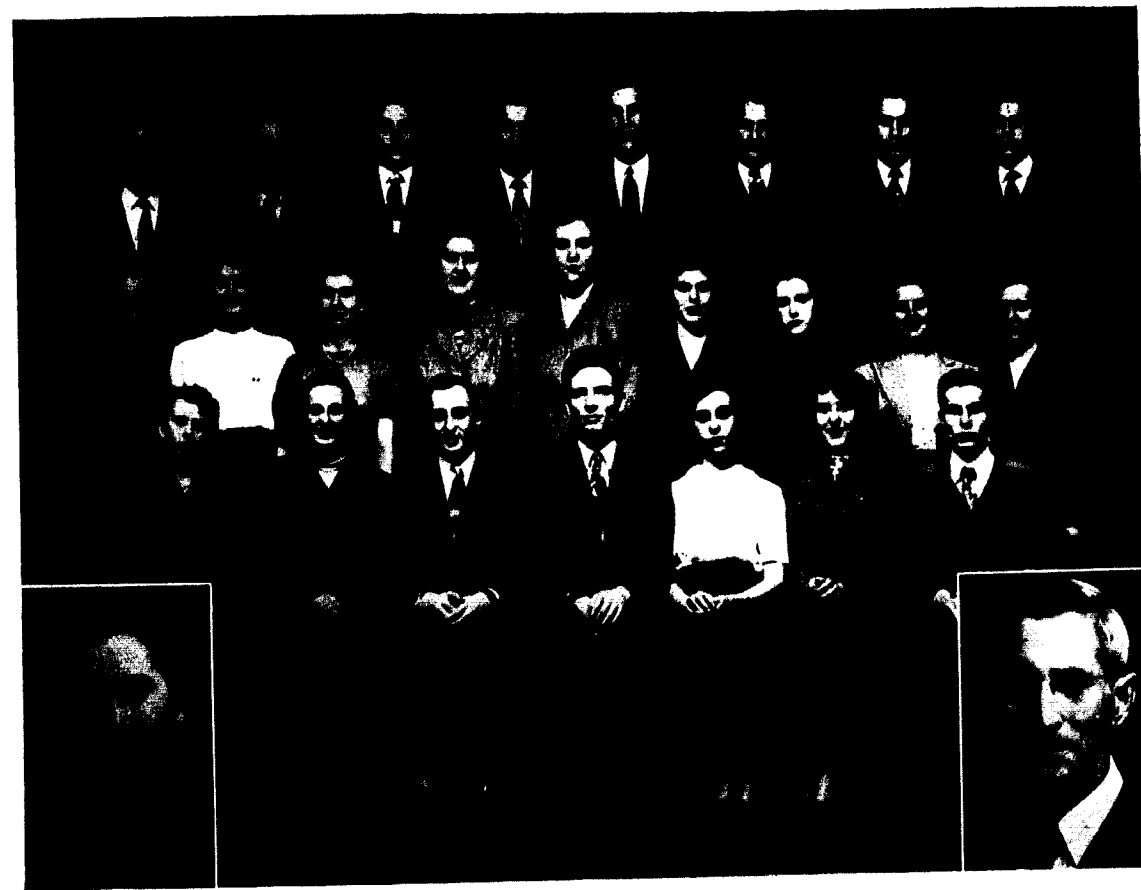

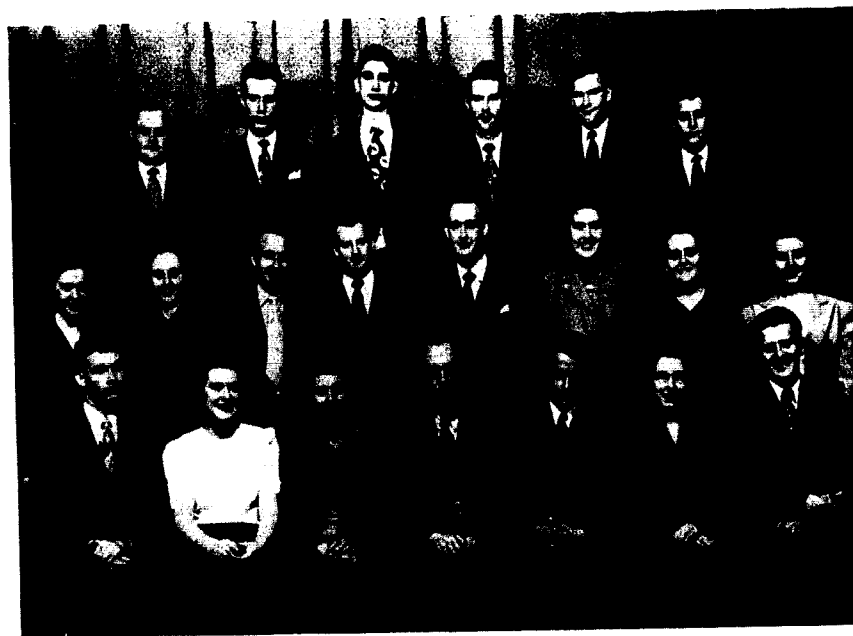
PSYCHOLOGY CLUB

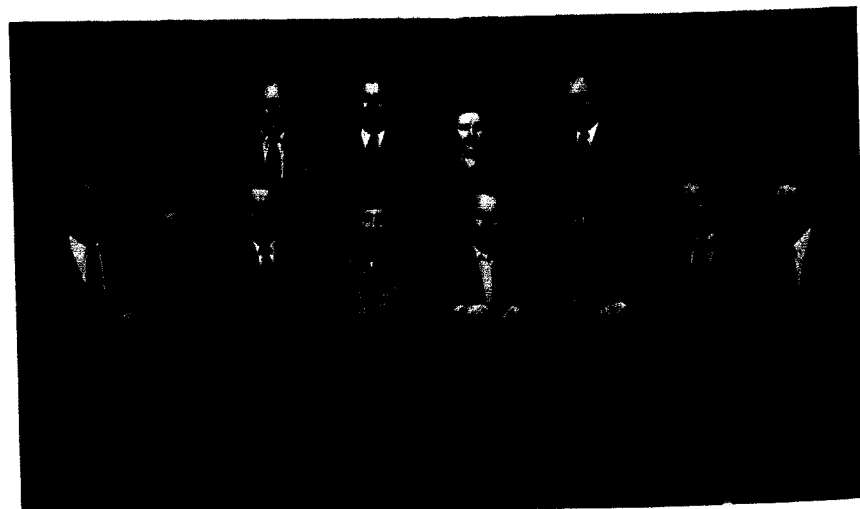
PHILOSOPHY CLUB

BOARD OF CONTROL

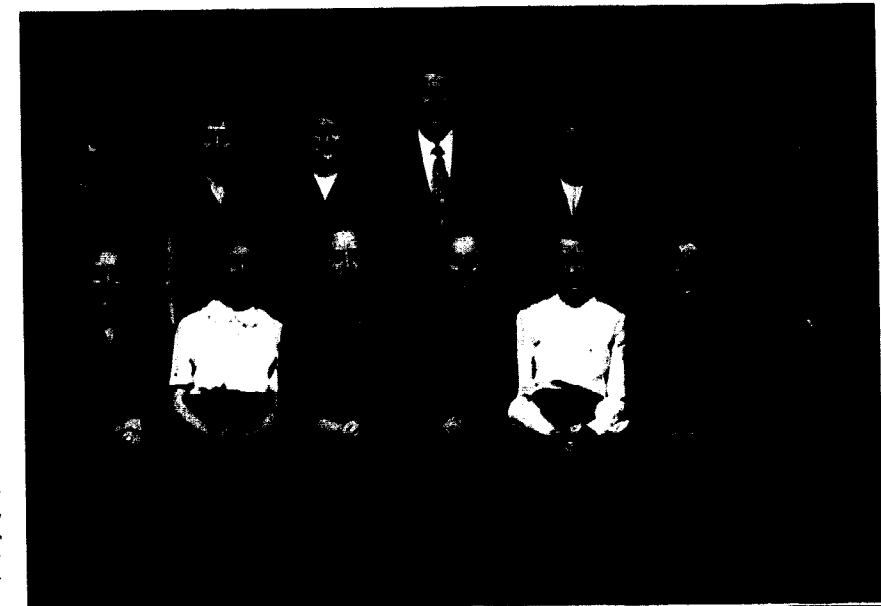

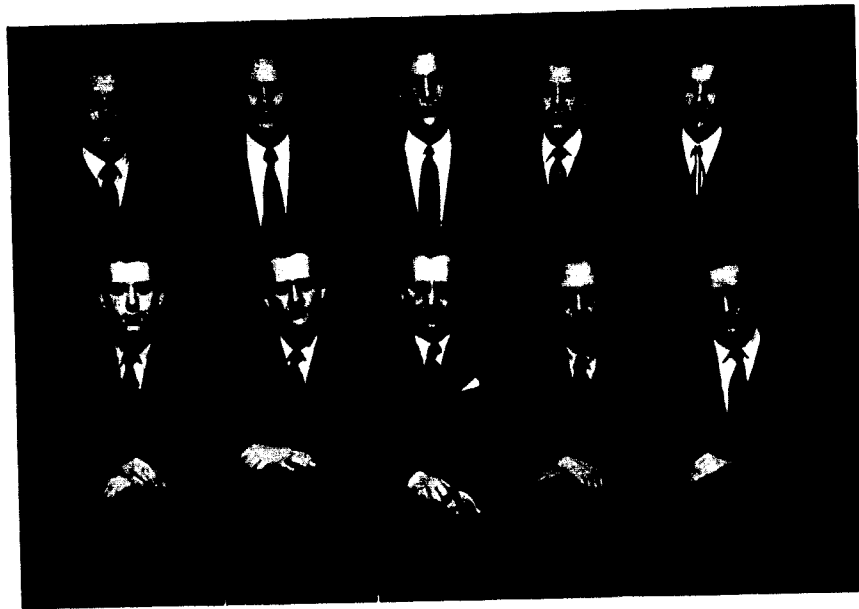

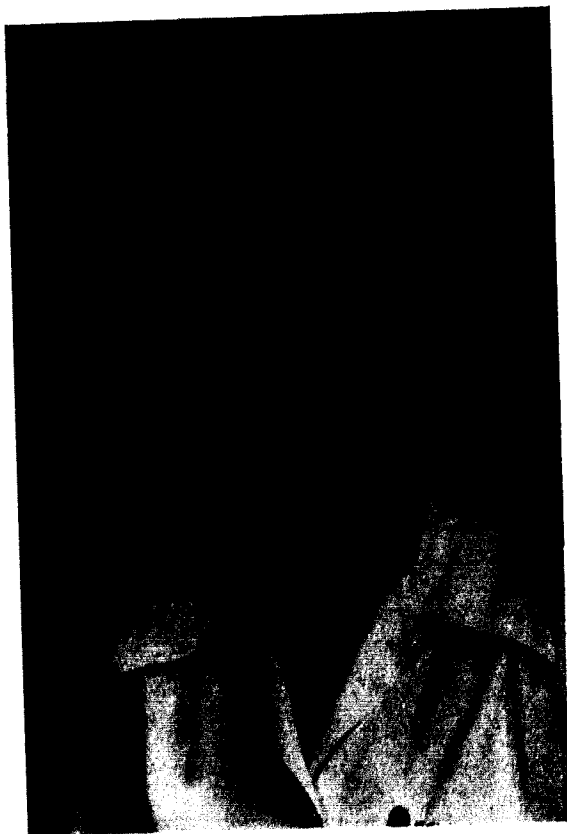
My state was desperation — I was scared without a doubt!

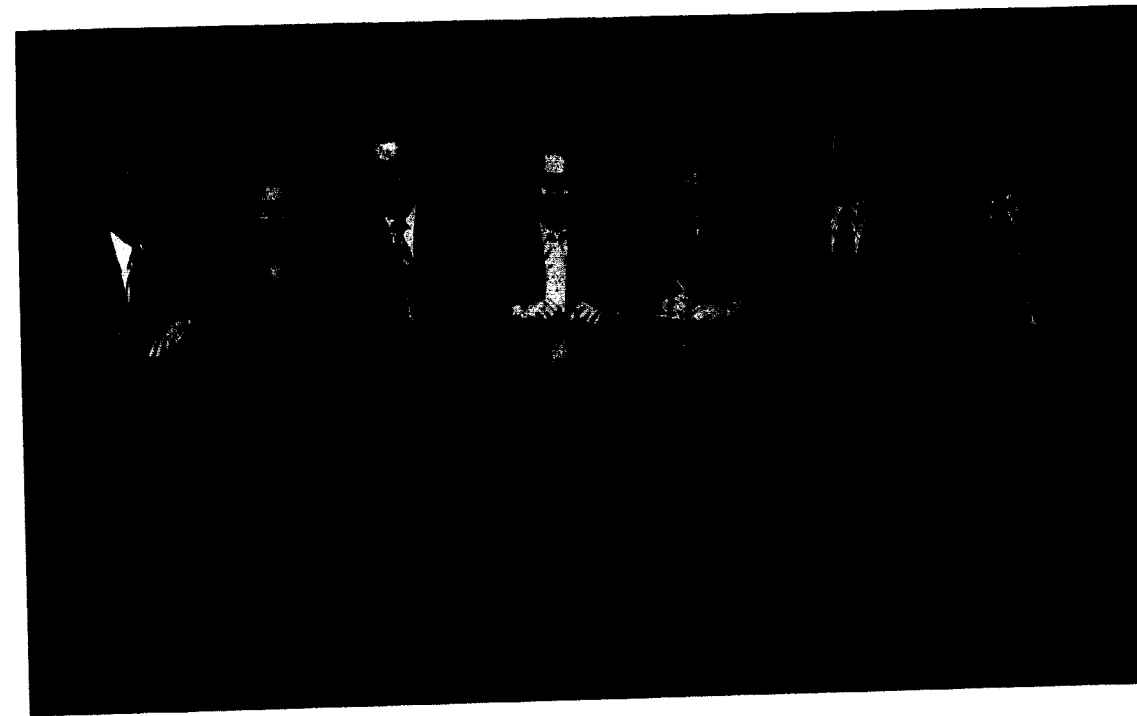
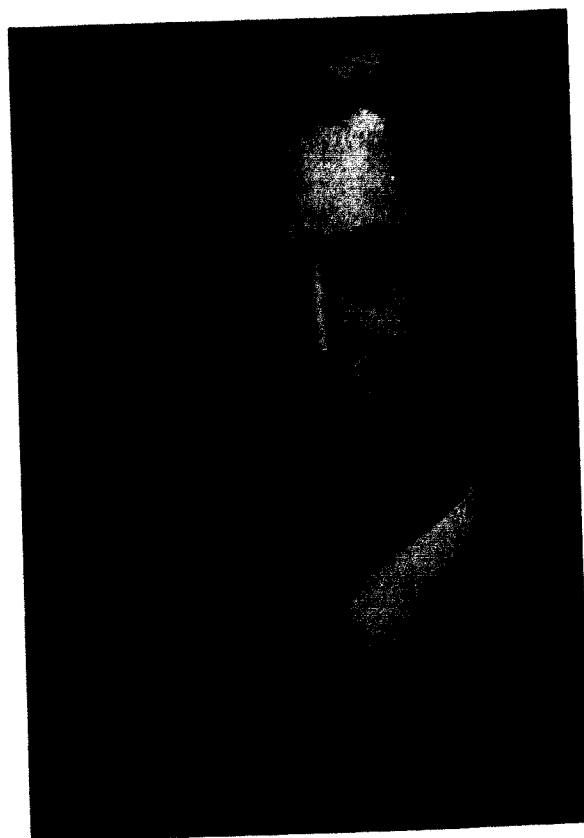


First Lady of the Campus

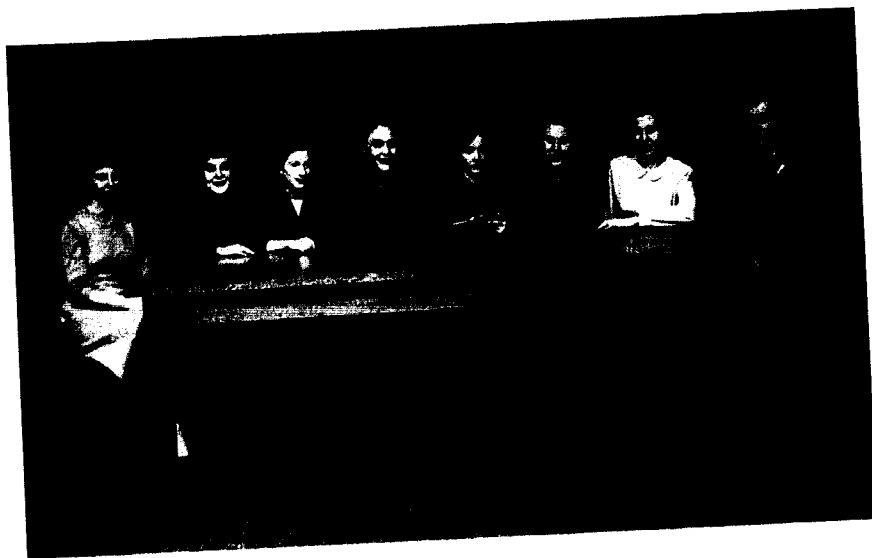

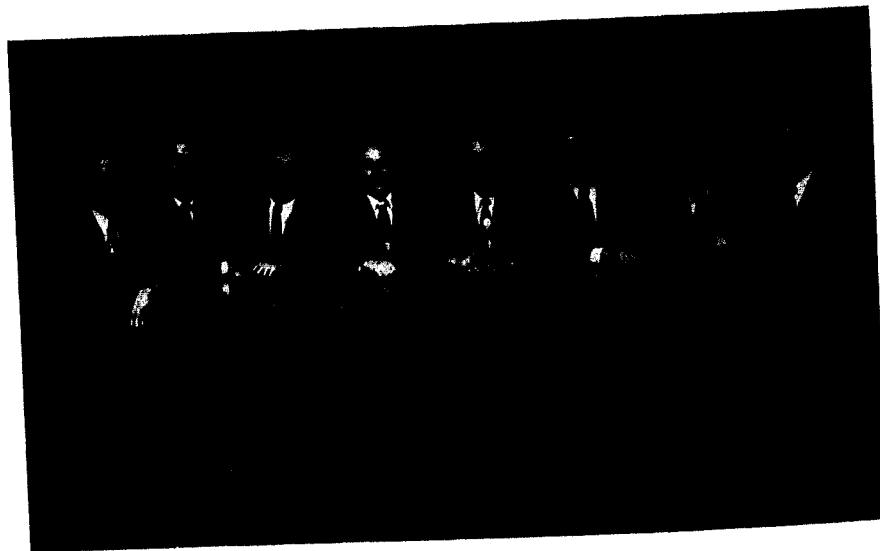

PAN HELLENIC COUNCIL

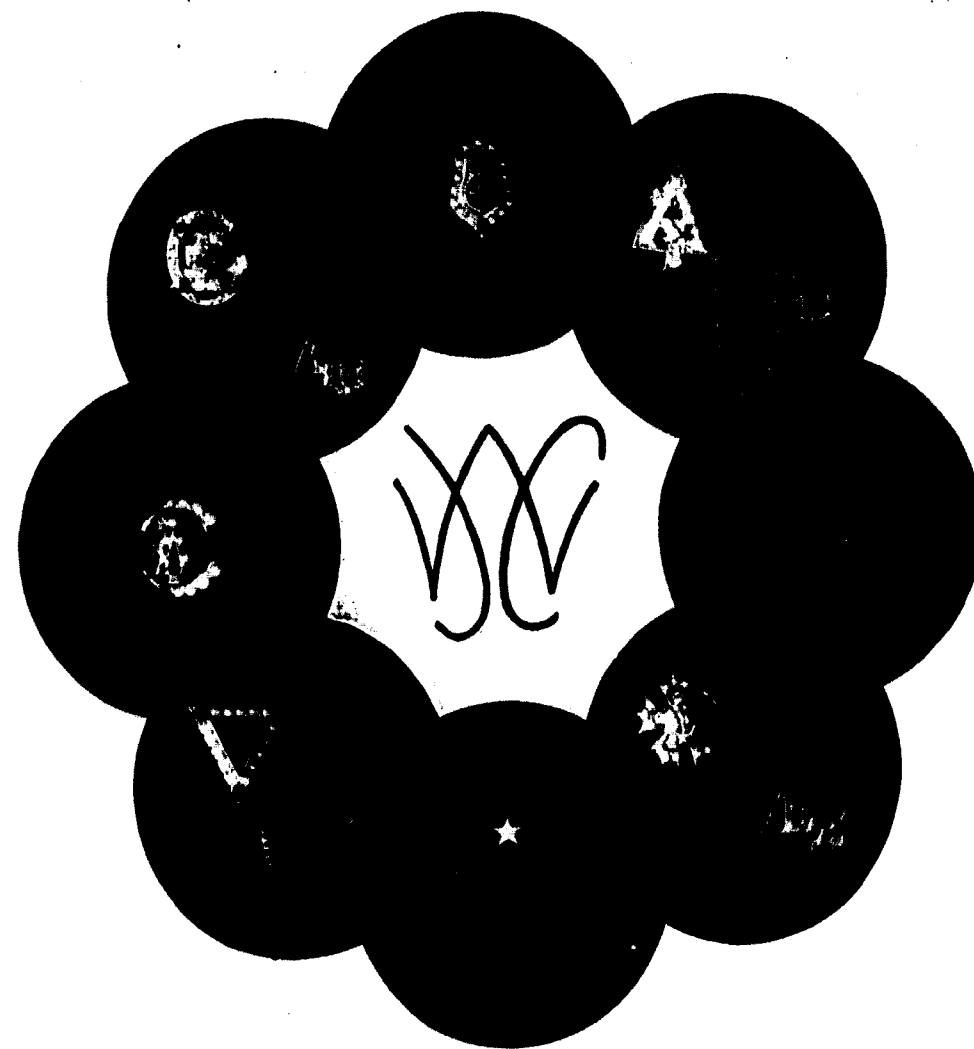

Social organizations have played a dominant part at William Jewell since their first appearance in 1871. The first fraternity was Zeta Phi, formed in 1871, one of the three chapters of this Missouri fraternity. Jewell Sigma chapter chose to withdraw in 1886 and joined Phi Gamma Delta. Following that, nine other men banded together and petitioned Kappa Alpha. In January, 1887, Alpha Delta of Kappa Alpha Order made its appearance. Beta Xi of Sigma Nu was instituted in 1894, replacing a group known as Phe Yodks, which had been organized since 1892. In 1897 Kappa Sigma fraternity came on the campus with seven charter members of the Alpha Omega chapter. It became inactive in 1933. Epsilon Nu Zeta of Lambda Chi Alpha is the newest member to join the Jewell fraternity family, being instituted in May, 1942. Formerly it was Zeta Chi which was formed in 1917. After girls were admitted to Jewell in 1917, Iota Pi was formed as a local sorority in 1919. In 1931 it joined Beta Sigma Omicron as Alpha Psi chapter. TNT was organized in 1922 and after celebrating its silver Anniversary last year, this year accepted a bid from Alpha Delta Pi and became the 74th chapter known as Gamma Nu. The Independent Society became sufficiently organized in 1943 to be recognized by the college. In 1946 Alpha Gamma Delta sorority came on the campus with ten charter members, forming the Epsilon Epsilon chapter.



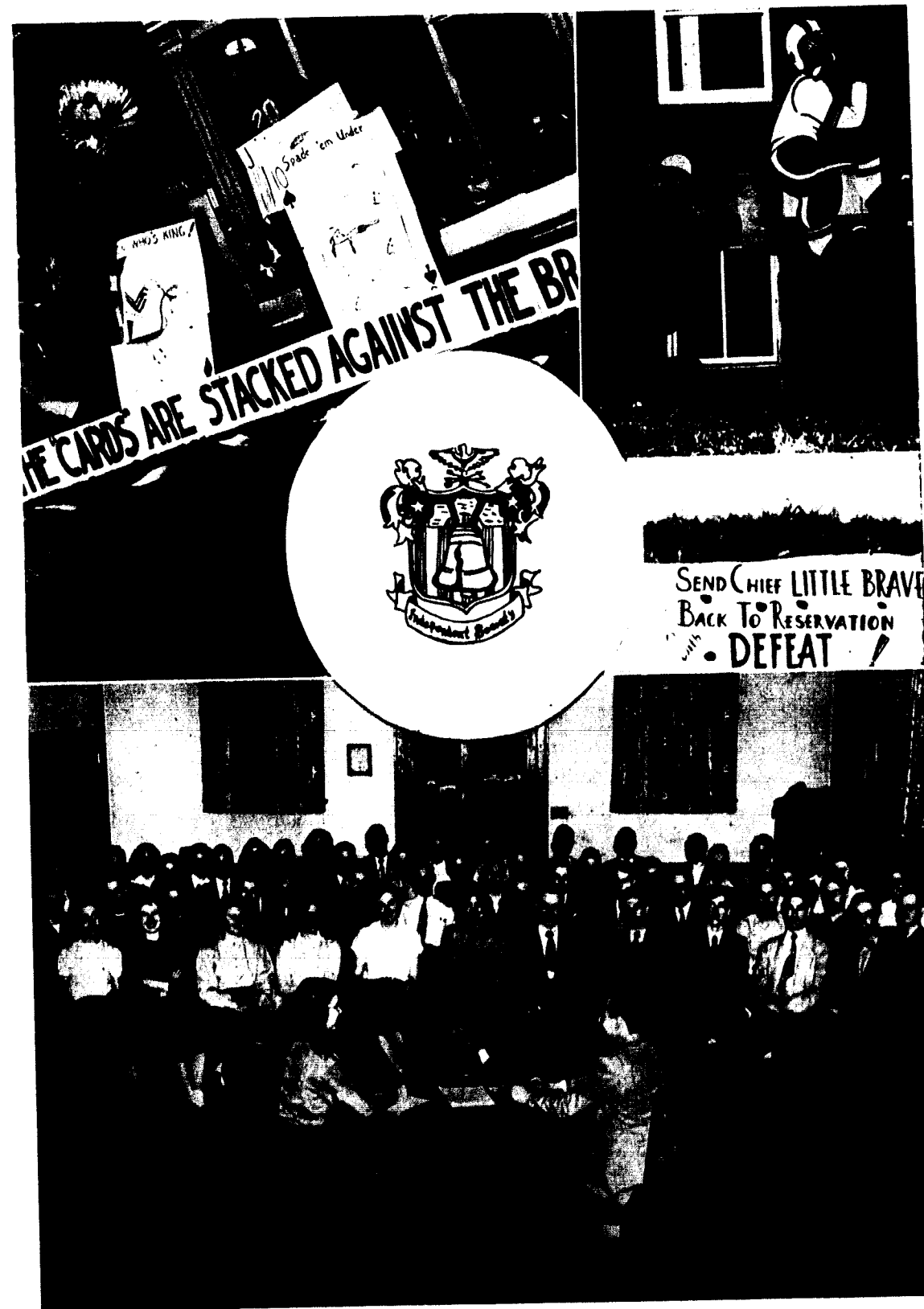

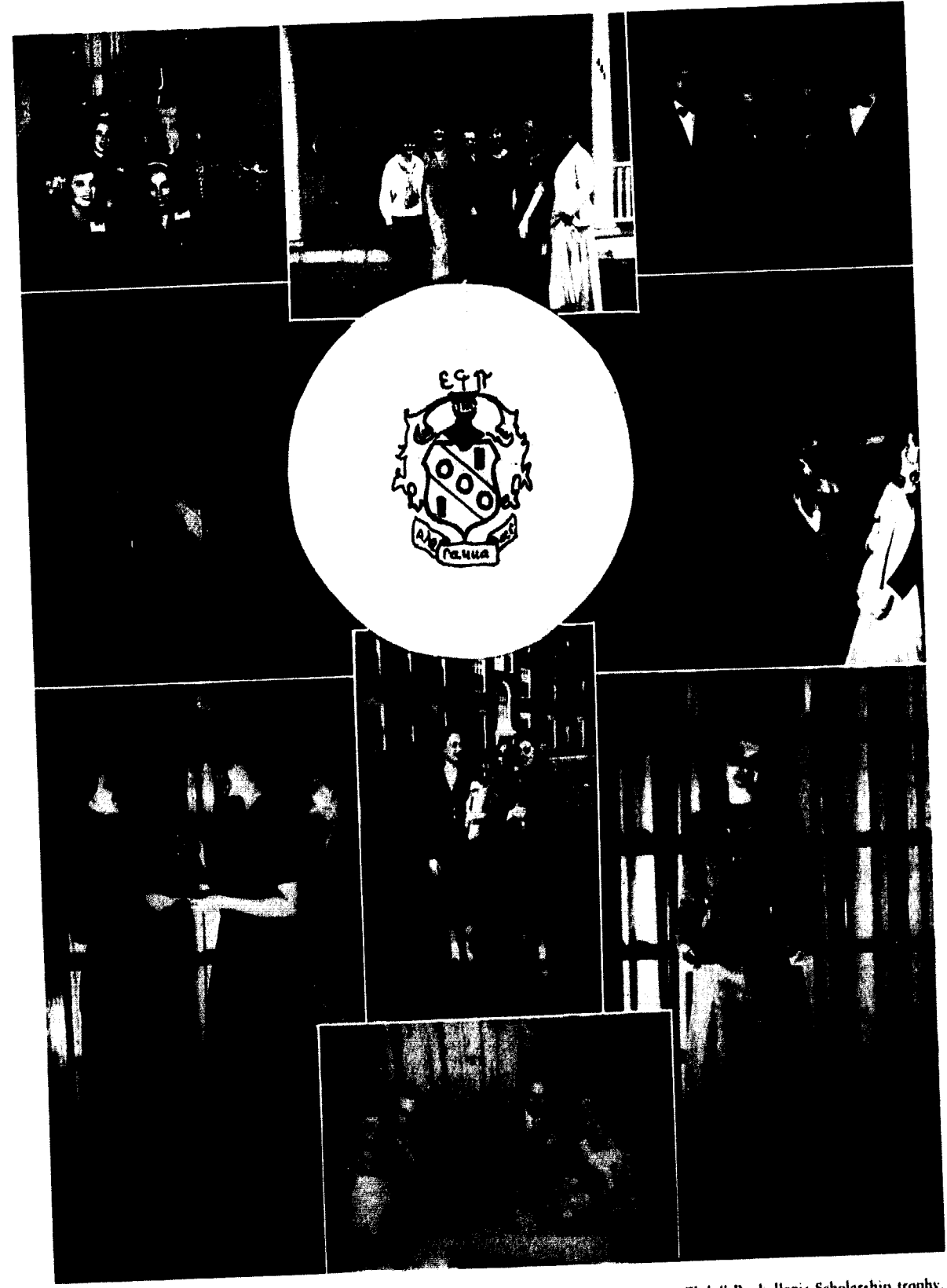
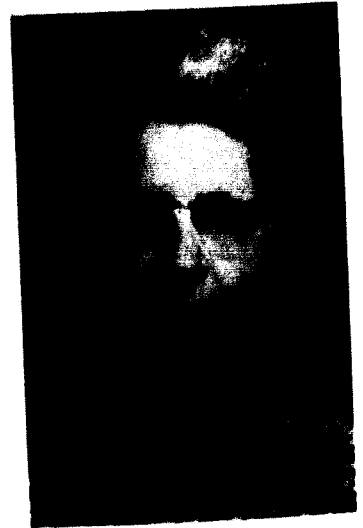


ALPHA GAMMA DELTA

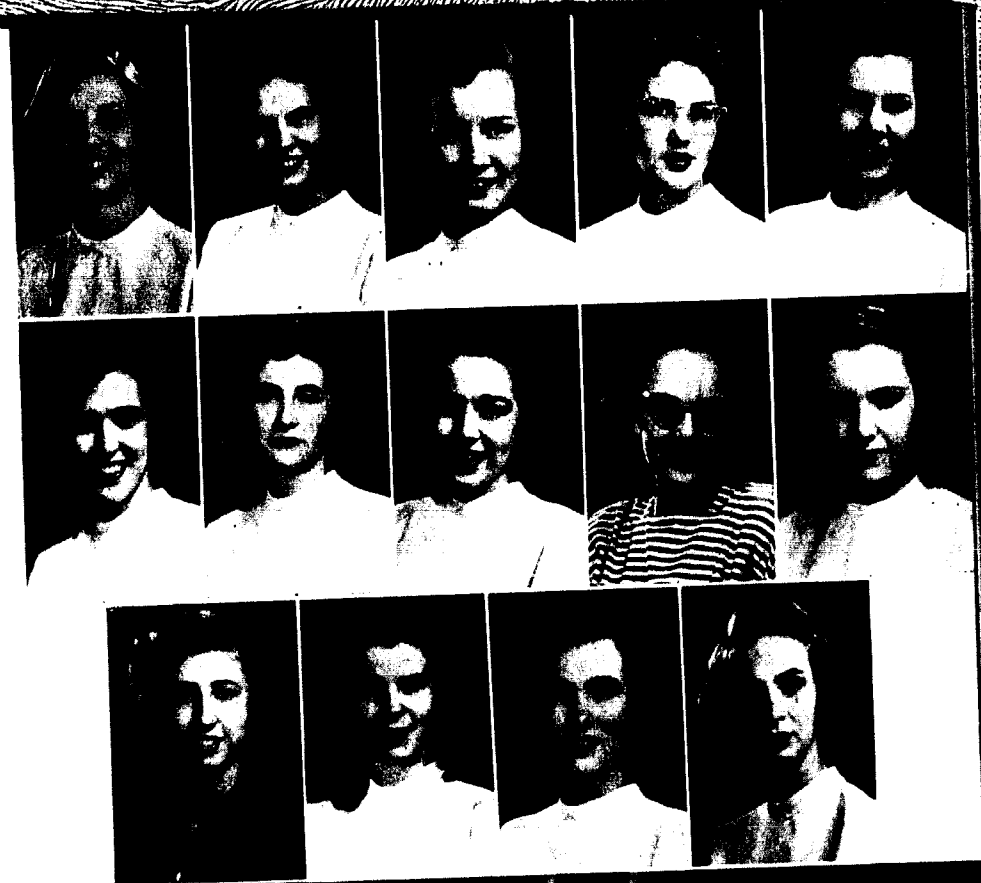

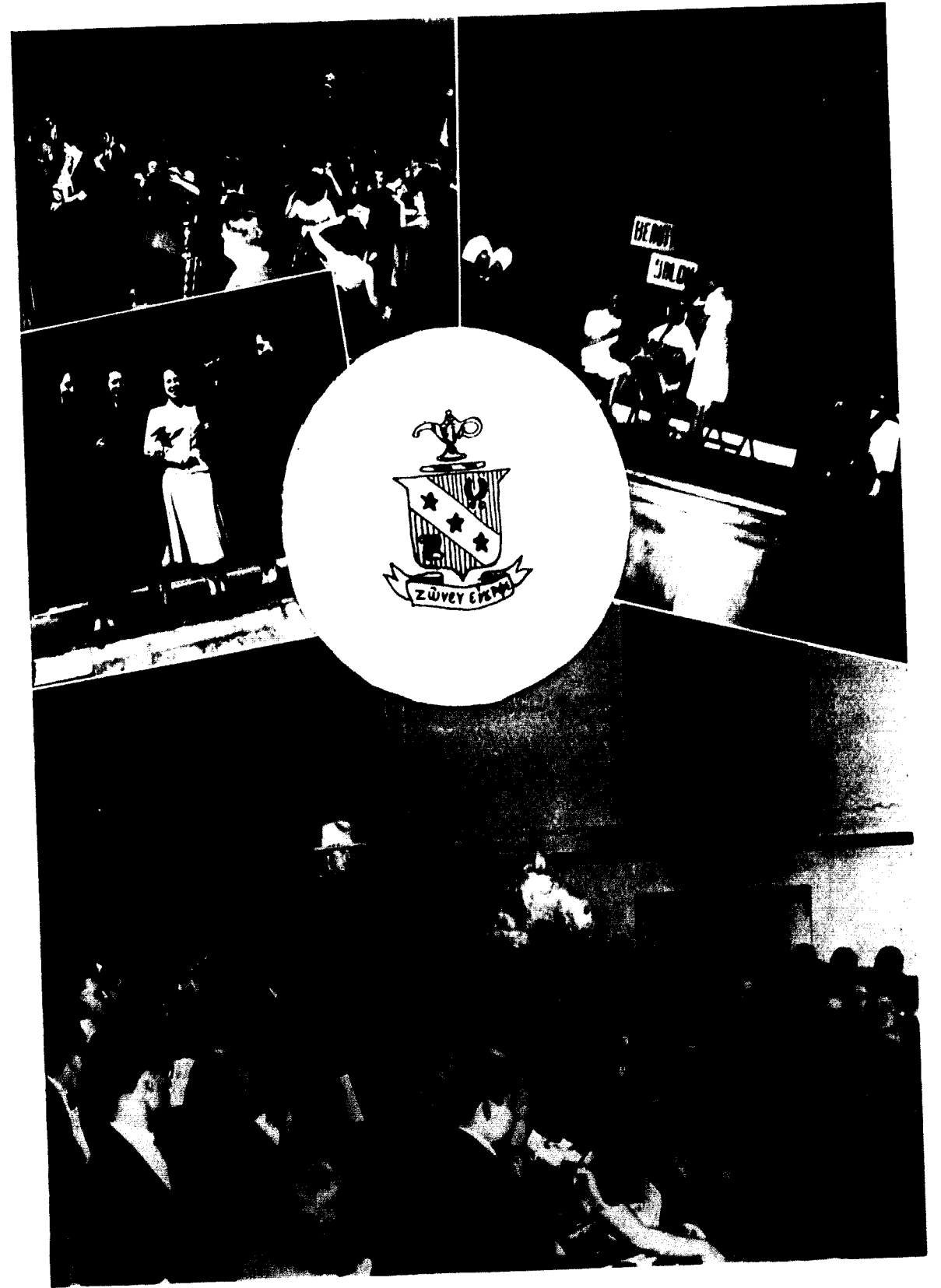
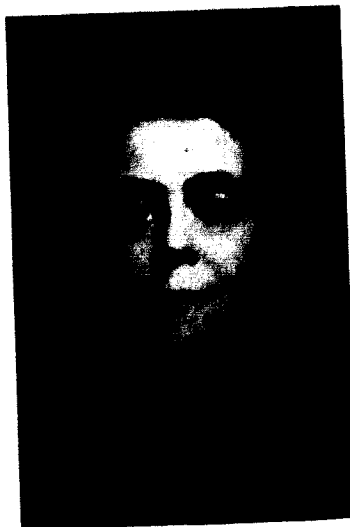
Alpha Psi of Beta Sigma Omicron celebrated its thirtieth anniversary at William Jewell on the sixtieth birthday of the national organization.

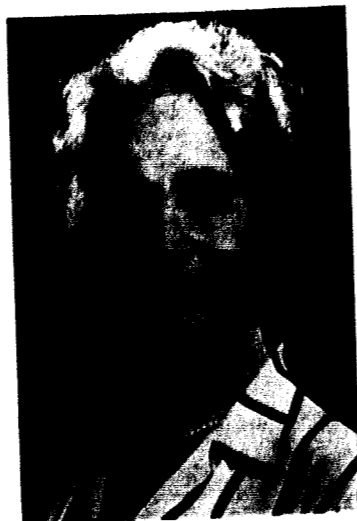

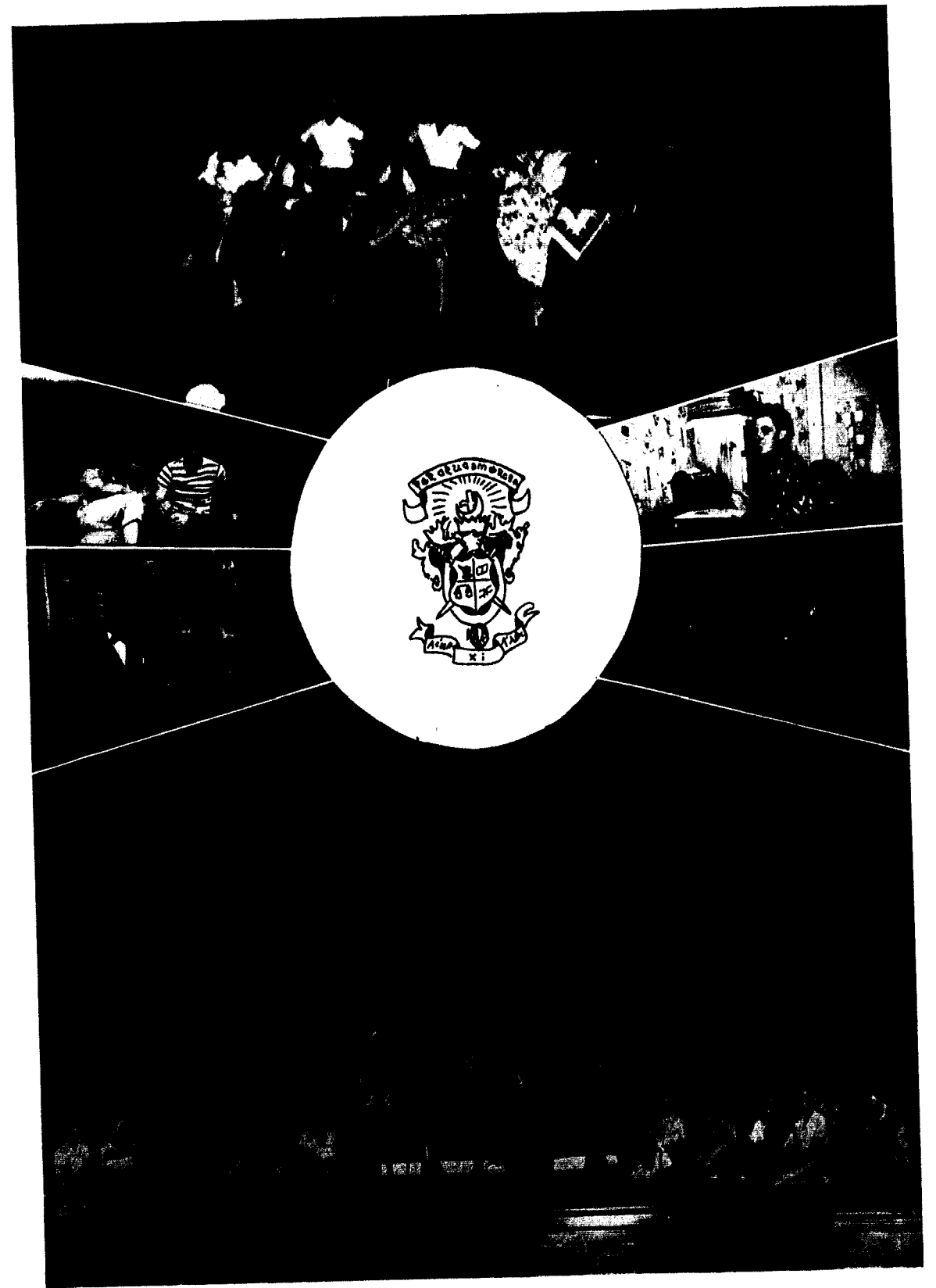

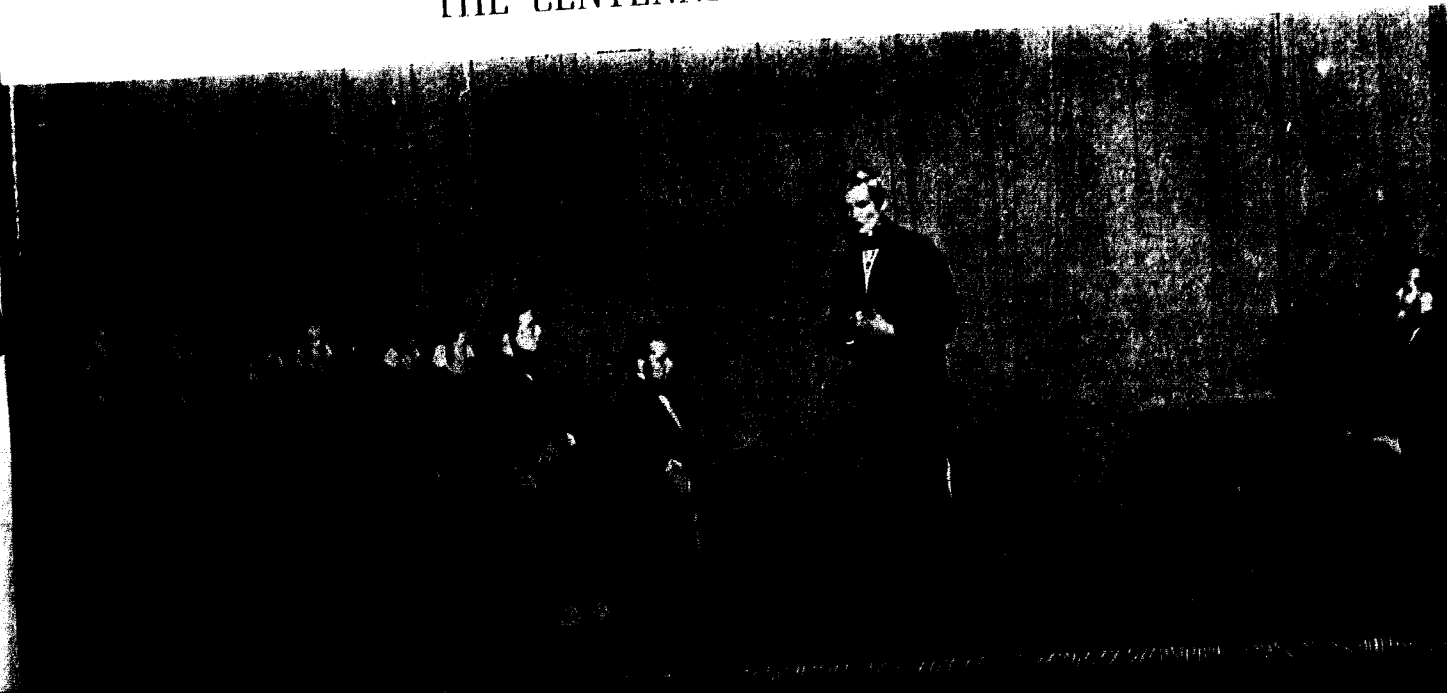
"THE BARRETT'S OF WIMPOLE STREET"

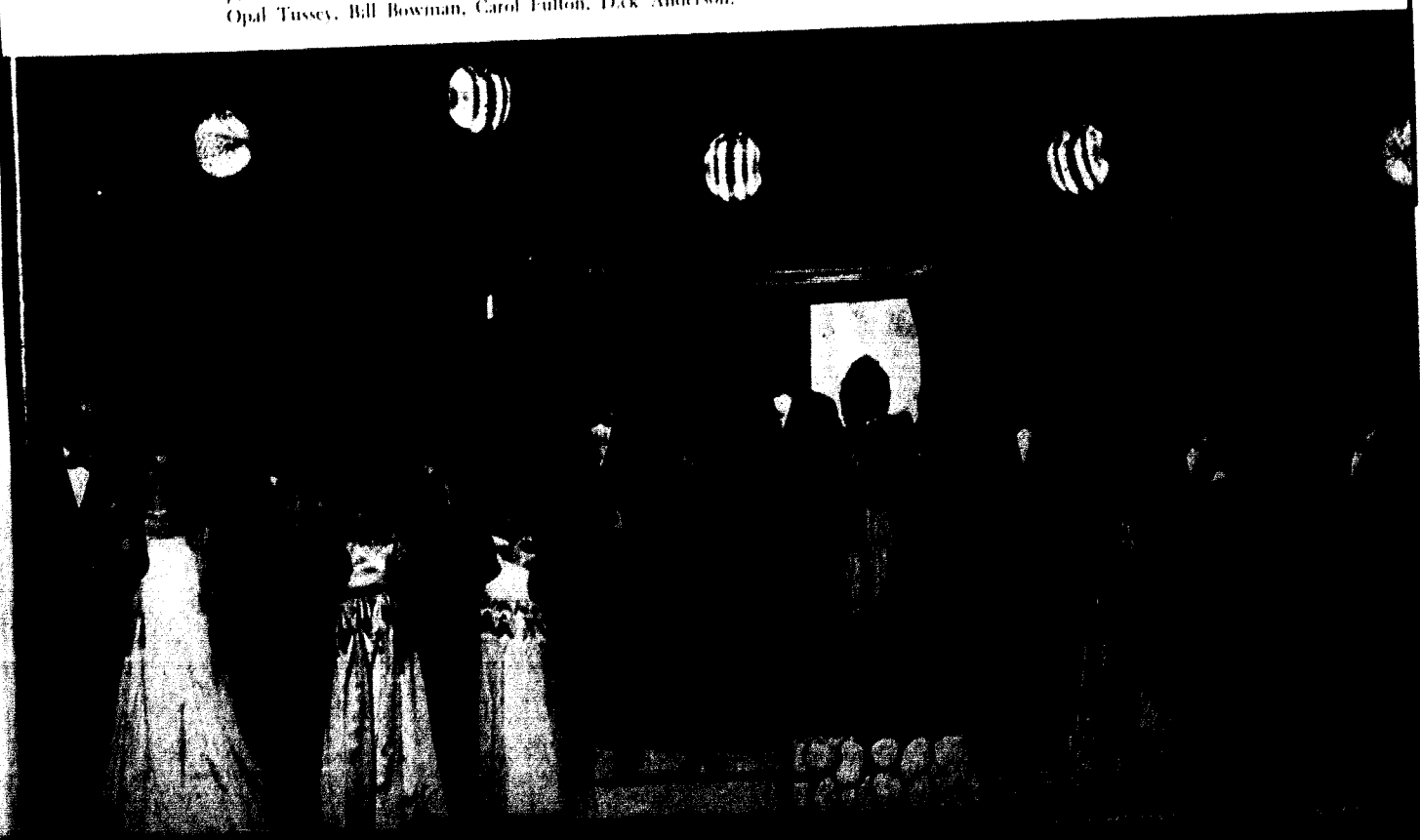
FORENSICS

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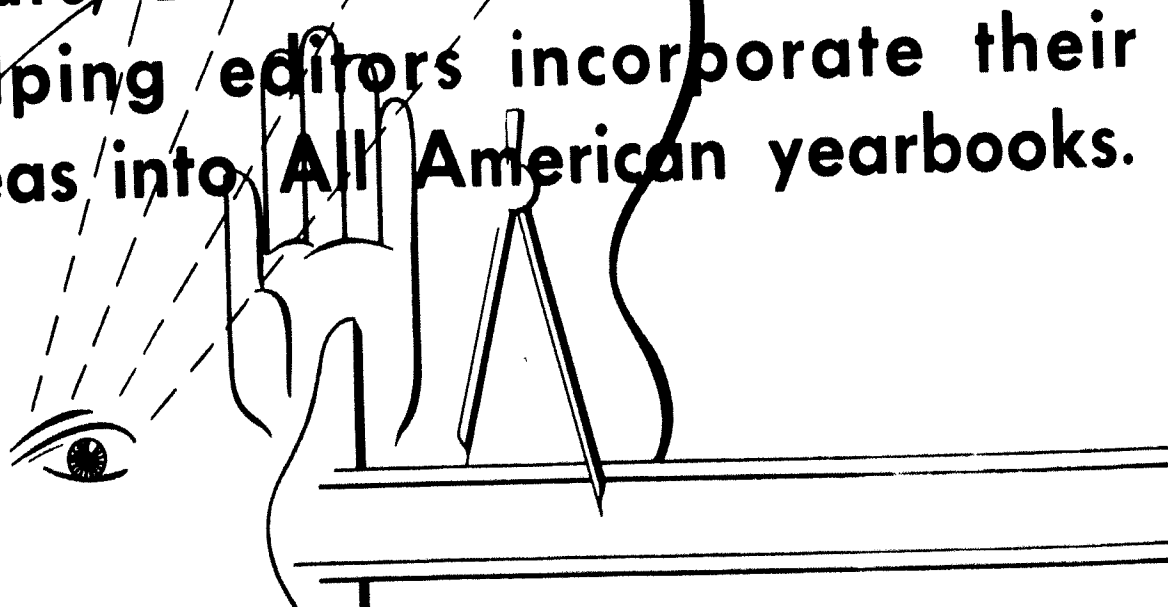
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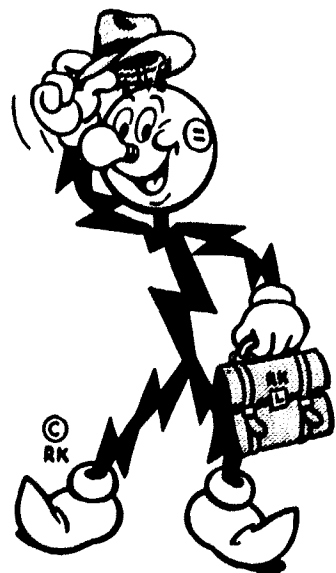
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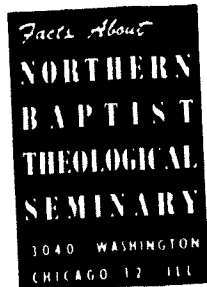
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
