Two masters at the art of building men, the winning or losing of games was a matter of little consequence to "Dad" and "Bill". Their chief concern was the manner in which the games were played. The highest type of sportsmen, they took the athletes who came to them, gave them the best of equipment and training, and accepted the results of a very discouraging season with a smile.

Young and inexperienced teams represented the college during the year just past, and they did it remarkably well. Many times did a fighting Cardinal leave the scene of conflict drooping in defeat. Yet many times did its shrill cry of victory cause rejoicing among its admirers. The athletic year was successful in spite of defeats, and a review of it brings back scores of pleasant memories.

First honors in football, without a doubt, go to that most consistent fighter that ever donned a football suit, little "Polly" Grant. Cursed with that undesirable popularity among his opponents which always haunts an all-conference half-back, he bore the brunt of every attack and seemed to receive the special attention of all the opposing defense. Watched though he was, he was responsible for more gains in yardage than any other Jewell man. The work of "Tommy" Thompson, flashy Cardinal forward, has earned for him the year's individual laurels in basketball. His brilliant floor work and accurate tossing caused many opposing guards to be jerked from games. Track honors would be divided among a half dozen worthy athletes, while the accurate stroking and uncanny judgment of Henry Ward Wiley are two good and sufficient reasons for his being crowned our tennis king.

## Football

A clear crisp October evening saw the "Big Red Team" invade the camp of the Ottawa Braves; the same frosty evening saw them drop the season opener by a score of 38-14. In a much more interesting battle than the score indicates, the Cardinals drew first blood. Within the first five minutes of play, a twenty yard run straight through the center of the Ottawa line by "Polly" Grant brought the ball to Ottawa's forty yard line. On the next play the pigskin was snapped to Thompson who stepped to the side of the field and flipped a fifty yard pass to Cowherd across the goal line for a touchdown and then kicked the goal. The seven point lead lasted for a time, but the mighty Knapper of Ottawa soon hit his stride, scoring five touchdowns for the Braves while Jewell warriors were making one. The final score gave Ottawa 38 and Jewell 14.

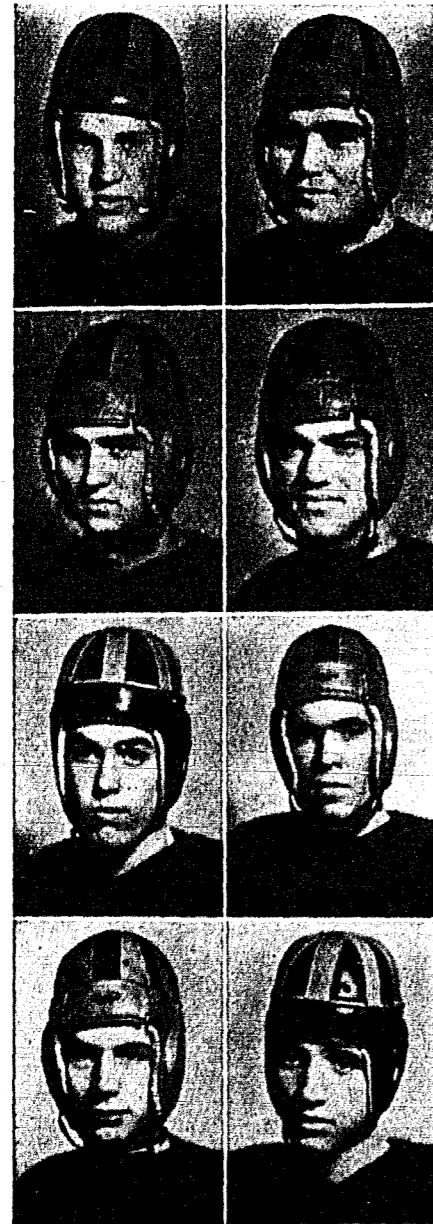
So was the season's first game lost; and the jinx seemed to last through the season.

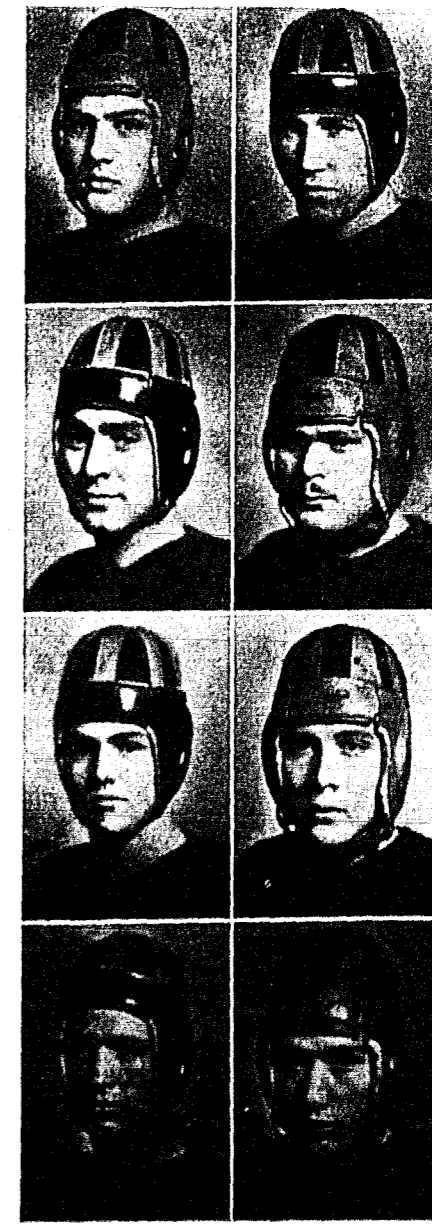

Three quarters of the game were played deep in "Wildcat" territory, and only the worst of luck prevented at least three touchdowns for Jewell.

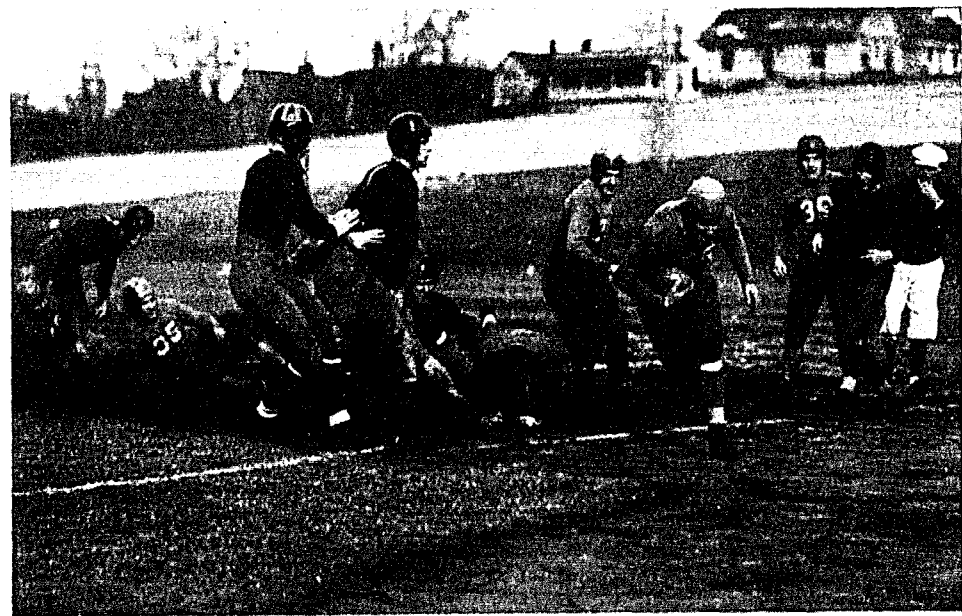

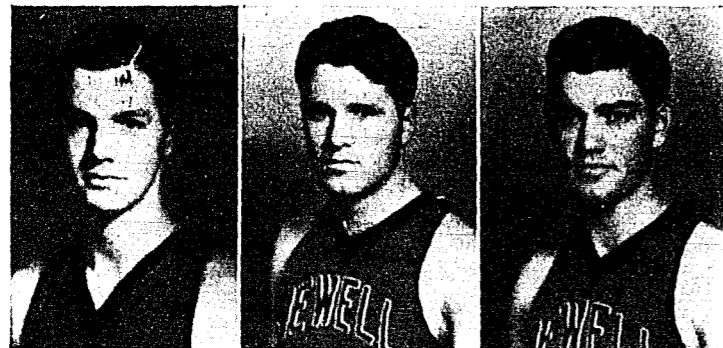
## Basketball

A wealth of new material reporting for early practice caused Jewell basketball hopes to rise high. Lack of experience, however, caused the team to start the season in a bad way. The three opening games were lost to Ottawa, Warrensburg Teachers, and Kansas City Life in the order named. In the fourth encounter of the season, however, the Cardinals were privileged to administer a sound trouncing to Pat Mason's Rockhurst Hawks who were forced to accept the short end of a 36-21 score thus obtaining revenge for recent defeats in other sports. Glory was short-lived, for the fast Central quintet was destined to win a listless game, 21-16, and Tarkio forced the boys in red to bow in defeat, 50-33. The most hectic encounter of the season came, however, when the fighting Cardinals met the Conference leading Culver-Stockton aggregation in an effort to unseat them. It was a thriller from start to finish with the winning field goal made by Russell, flashy Culver-Stockton forward, with only ten seconds to play. The playing of both teams was perfect, and it was a game that no team should be ashamed to lose. Rolla fell before the Cards in the next game, the speedy Thompson, Jewell forward, leading the attack. The next contest went to the Blue Jays of Westminster, 35-23. The game was featured by the brilliant playing of Porchey, Westminster star, and the sensational long shots of Captain Walker.

Immediately after their beating at the hands of Westminster, the Cards set forth on a three game road trip, winning one and losing two of the games played. The first stop of the Cardinal crew was at the camp of the Blue Jays at Fulton where an overtime period was required to decide upon the winner of a 26-25 tussle, the decision falling to the Jays. Missouri Valley furnished the opposition for the next contest, but not enough. Jewell won 44-32, and moved on to Fayette where the Eagle was met. The Cardinal lost the battle, 27-21. Drury was the next victim of a Cardinal onslaught and yielded to the Birds, 32-22. Even the fast Ottawa quintet was vanquished by the flying Cards, but there the winning streak ended and Jewell won only one of the remaining games of the season, defeating Missouri Valley, 44-32 and losing to Tarkio, 46-20.

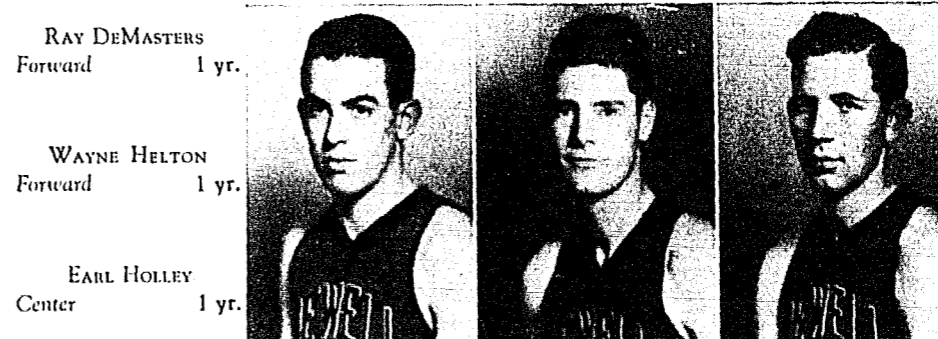
The squad suffers the loss of only one man through graduation this year, Captain Walker, and should become one of the best that has ever represented Jewell during the next season.

Nine Jewell players received the coveted "J" at the close of the 1933 season. Four of them, DeMasters, Helton, Holley, and Pratt were first year men. All of them save Helton were Freshmen.

Particularly outstanding among these men was Holley, a giant center from Warsaw with an uncanny eye for the basket. DeMasters, a fast forward from Liberty High School, playing his first year of college basketball, had a peculiar way of making guards look sick, while "Little Elmer" Pratt, diminutive freshman from Sedalia, was spoken of by an all-conference guard as being the most "annoying" player that he had ever opposed. Wayne Helton of Cainsville, a new find, also played outstanding basketball for Jewell.

The five veterans of last year's court battles played their usual stellar games. Thompson, a star forward since his freshman year, did probably the most outstanding work of the season. Crose, receiving a broken leg during the football season, returned to the squad after the first few games and did remarkable work at his guard position, and Cumpton, a second year man at guard, played a fine and consistent game throughout the season. Ralph Ballew, together with Captain Walker, the only graduating member of the squad, played an excellent brand of basketball in almost every game.

## Track

### The 1932 Season

Coach Collins opened the 1932 track season by inviting the Ottawa Braves to the Hill for a dual meet in which Jewell took first place by a scant margin. The next opportunity for the Cardinals to test their speed and strength came in the form of a dual meet with Tarkio which resulted in a victory for the "Tarks" and much grumbling on the part of the Cardinal performers at the conditions under which the meet was held. Central furnished the opposition to the Cardinal Track and Field men but very little, for the Cardinals triumphed 105-17.

The Missouri College Union meet, held at Columbia, brought to a close a successful season for the Jewell squad, Coach Collin's crew placing seven times in the meet to tie for second place. Point winners for Jewell during the season were Tracy, Maul, Freeman, Grant, Cumpston, Demmel, Crose, Page, Peebles, Baber, Billings, and Mertz. Mertz was elected captain for 1933. His sensational distance running won him a place in every event that he entered, made him the leading scorer for Jewell during the season, and set a new school record in both the one and two-mile events.

## Tennis

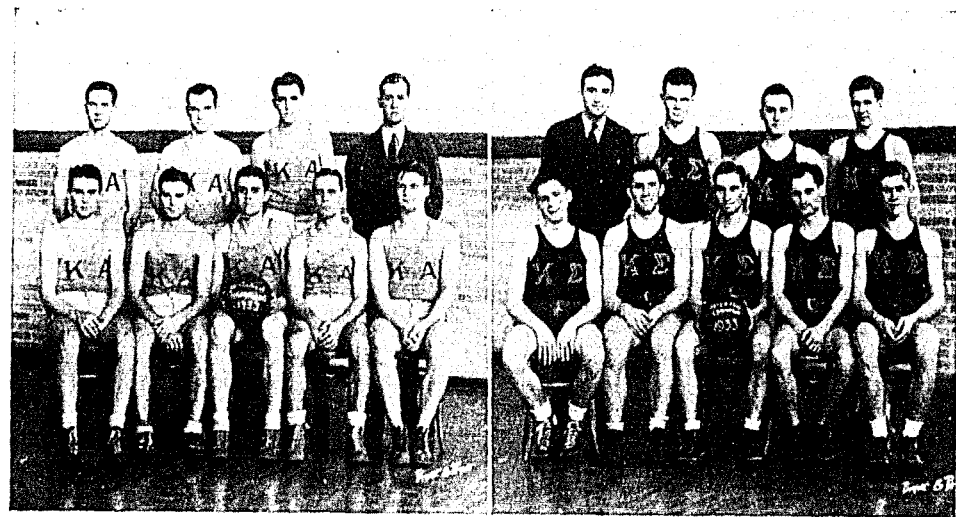

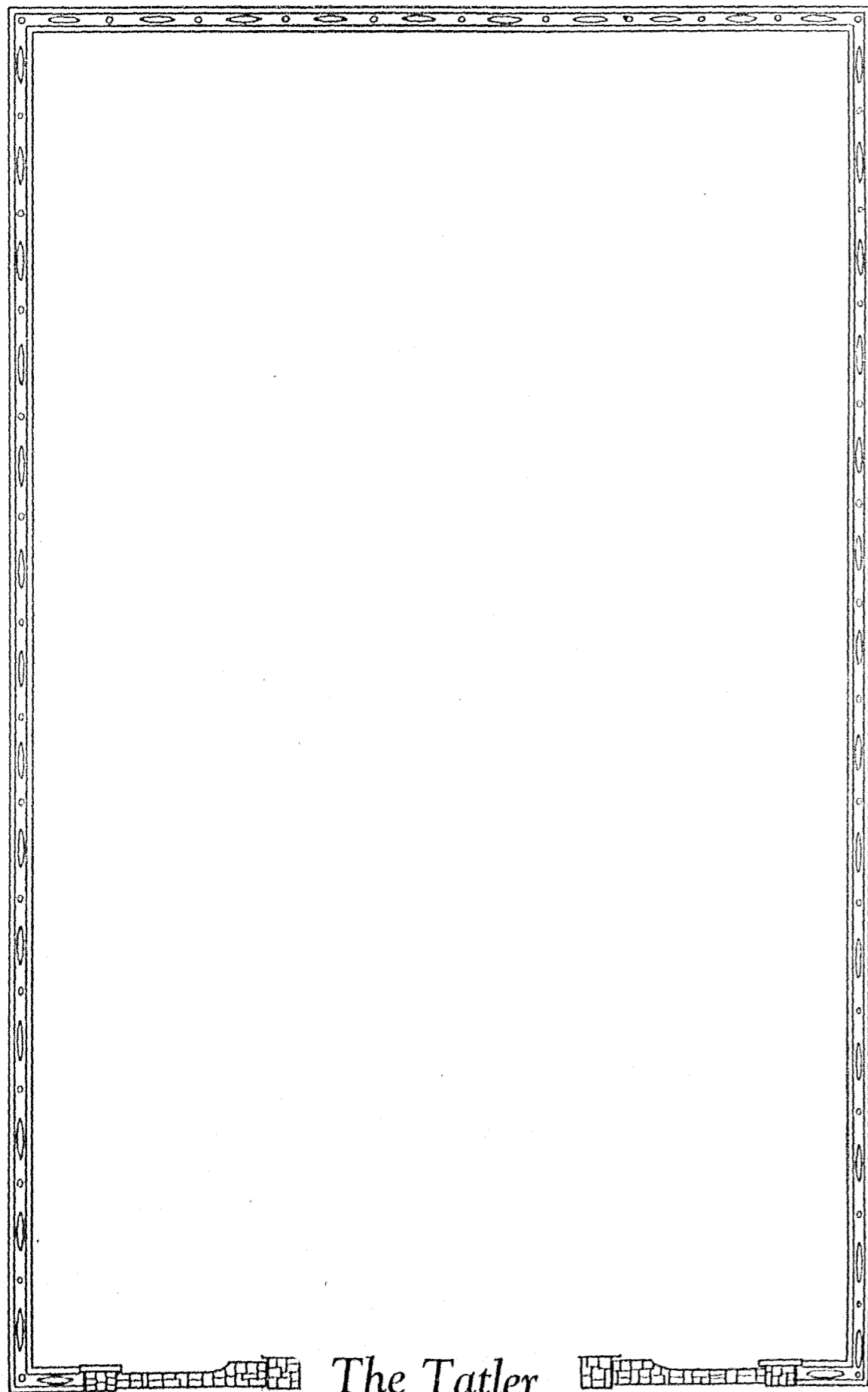
## *Women's Athletics*

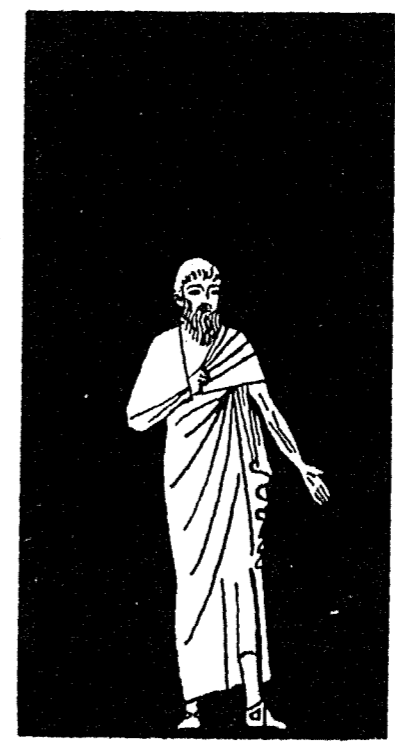

That evening he was faced by his angry relatives whose commandeering attitude spurred him to action. An open fight with Frank Owens, played by Francis Alexander, ensued.

Ditzen, a young minister, is branded a fool by his associates because of his unselfish desire to practice his religion in his labors for the benefit of the suppressed poor. Clinging to his views and always placing the welfare of the needy above that of himself, he is forced from his pulpit and ostracized by his friends. The theme of the play was beautiful, but only superb acting and careful planning along with the most capable direction could have merited the reception which the production deserved and was given.

Twenty-five years of teaching experience in American and Canadian universities have given him a broad understanding of educational methods and problems which eminently qualify him for the position that he holds.

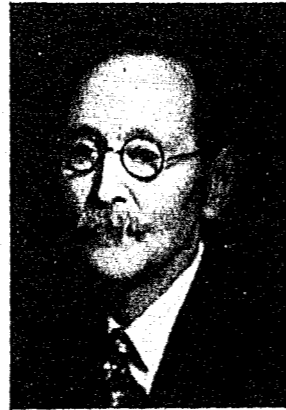

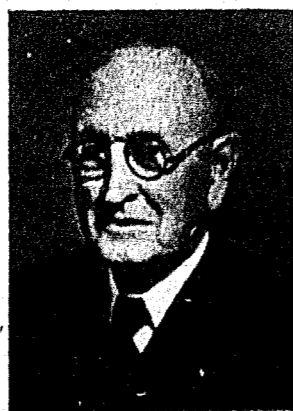
Eight men and two women comprised the administrative staff which assisted Dr. Herget and Dr. Moon in managing the affairs of the school.

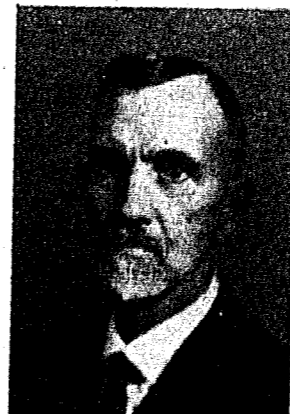

## Student Government

The past year brought important changes in Jewell's system of student government. The old Board of Control for student publications was abolished and its duties delegated to a Student Senate composed of class officers with the president of the student body, Lowell R. Ditzen, at its head. This change has proved to be a wise one, eliminating useless officers and increasing the responsibility of class officers.

The control of the policies of student publications has not been the only work of the new Student Senate, however. It has been given the authority to represent the Student Body in every instance, serving as a go-between in student and faculty relationships. All student elections, moreover, are overseen by the Senate, the members of which act as judges and clerks.

The Student Government of the past year has revealed the possibilities of the plan now in effect. For the first time since its institution the Student Body is conscious of real representation in administrative affairs, and it has voiced its approval of the new policies.

Those composing the Student Senate for 1932-33 were: Lowell R. Ditzen president of the Student Body, Chairman, J. T. Walker, president of the Senior Class, Russell Ash, president of the Junior Class, Judson Crouch, vice-president of the Junior Class, Joe B. Cockrill, president of the Sophomore Class, and David Smith, president of the Freshman Class. Normally the vice-president of the Senior Class is a member of the Senate. Charles Redman, elected president of the class for the year did not return, and vice-president Walker was elected to the presidency leaving his office unfilled.

Thus class offices have been made something more than an honor to bestow. They have become an opportunity to serve.

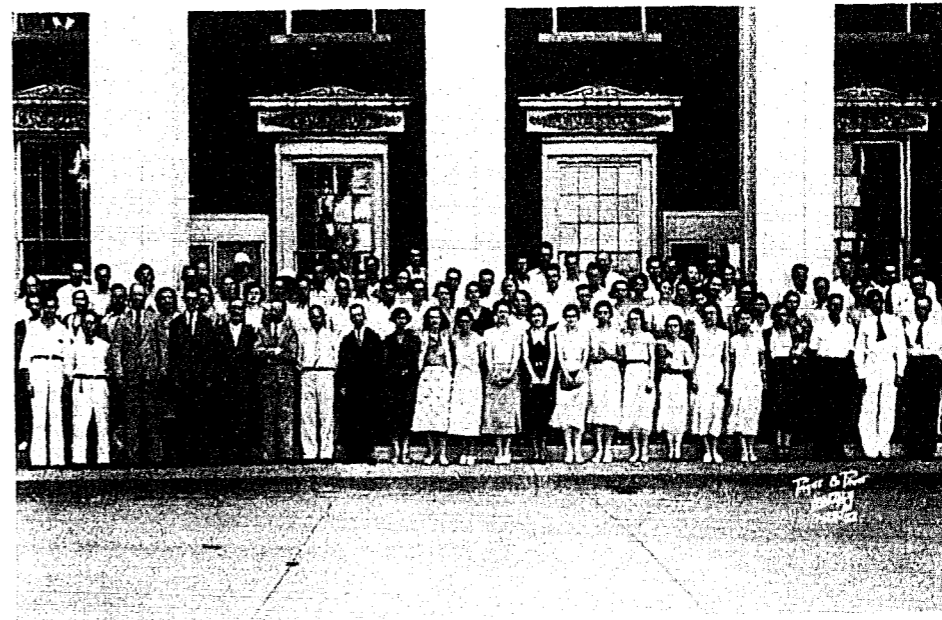
## *The Summer Session*

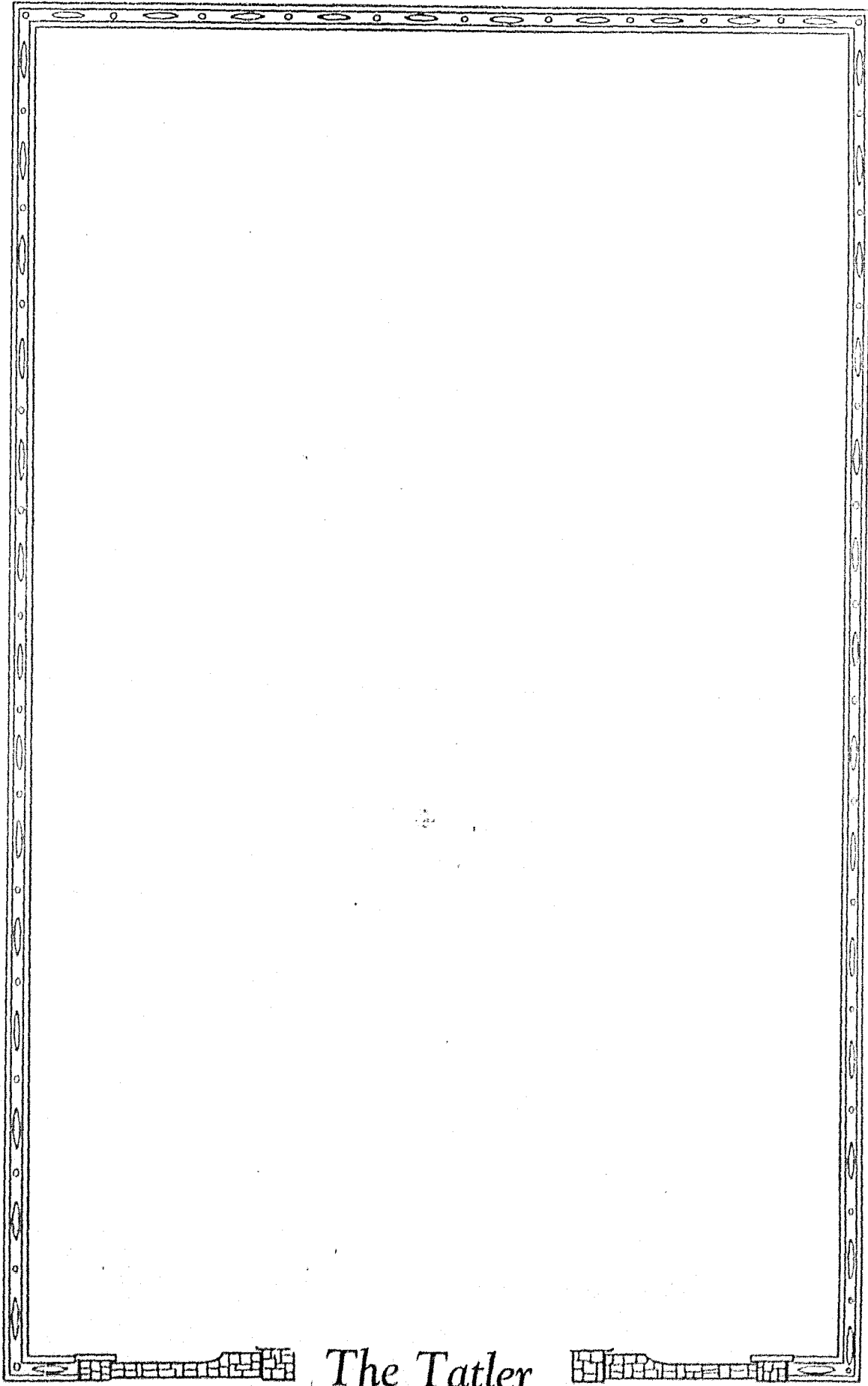

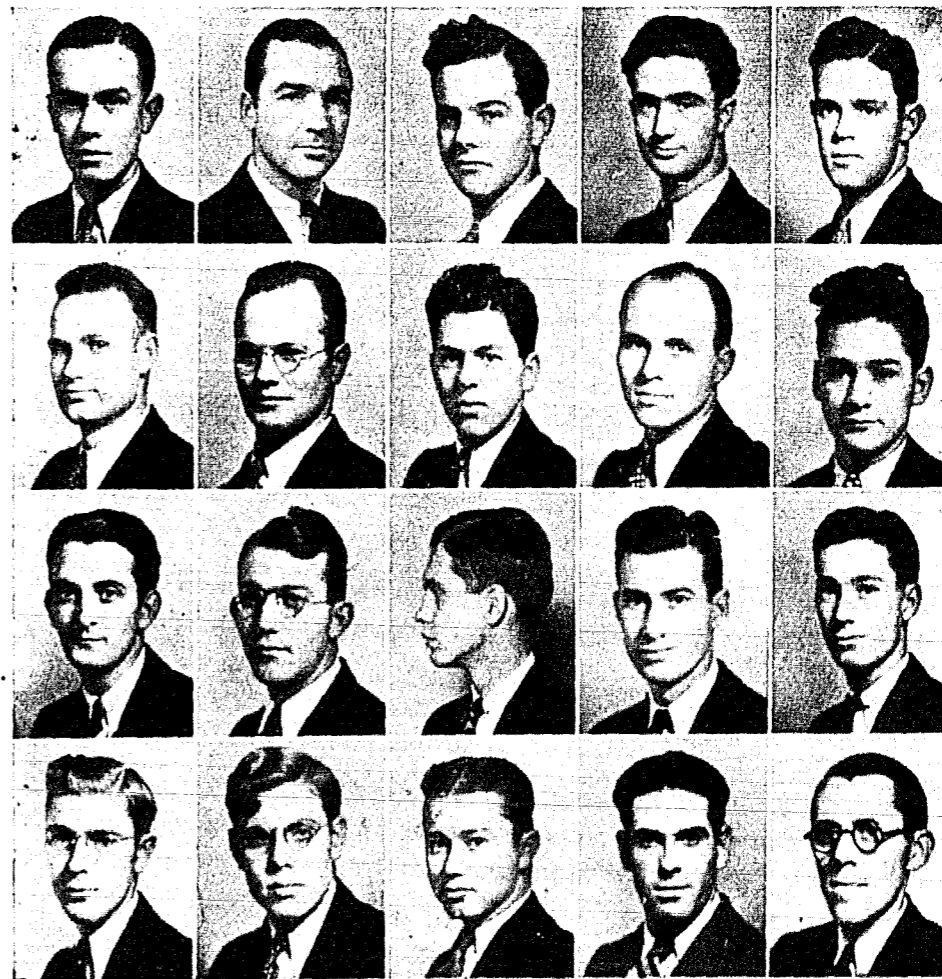
## The Ministerial Group

## *The Student Volunteer Band*

Membership is open to all students preparing for some definite Christian work whether it be upon foreign soil or at home.

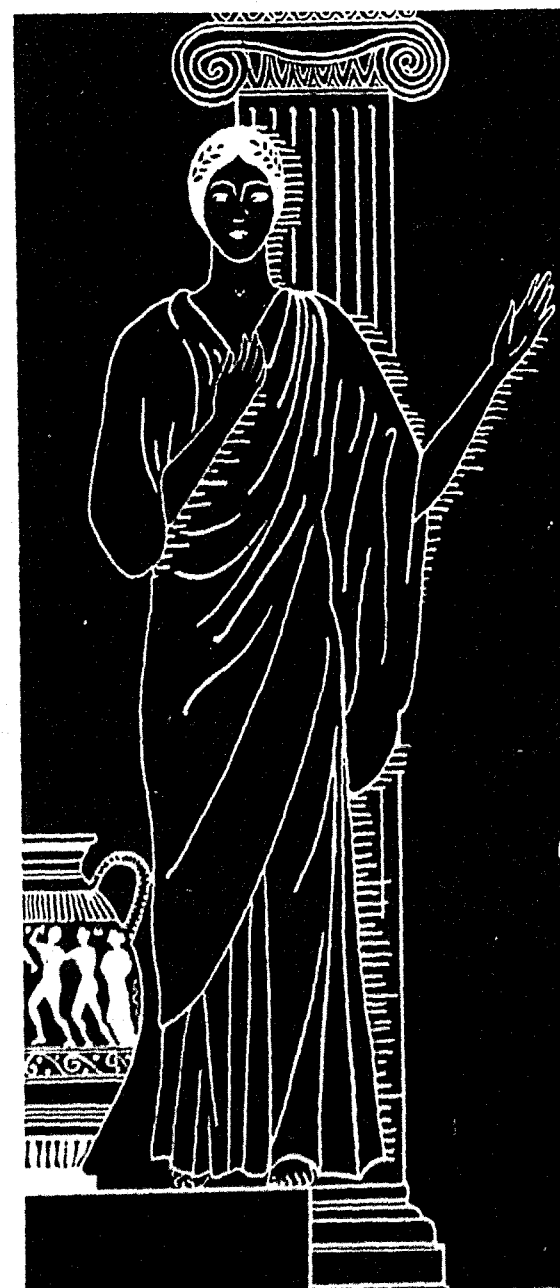
