Almost as familiar as the water tower itself is the scene of three or four freshmen collected around its base looking up with the question, "What is it?" either on their lips or unmistakably stamped on their puzzled faces.

The silo-like structure is the original water tower on our campus. Water was pumped by windmills up the hill from the spring just below the football field. Because of the marshy area presently surrounding it, the spring is still visible.

No longer in use as a water tower, it yielded in 1906 to a shiny metal tower; it now serves the campus crew as a storehouse for equipment. If you ever get the chance, step inside and look around and around and around and around.



Jewell Hall has witnessed changes in government, politics, tradition, industry, standard of living, modes of dress, and social customs. Through all this it has remained outwardly almost unchanged, but the creaking stairs and ancient benches of Jewell Hall, the original building on campus, have

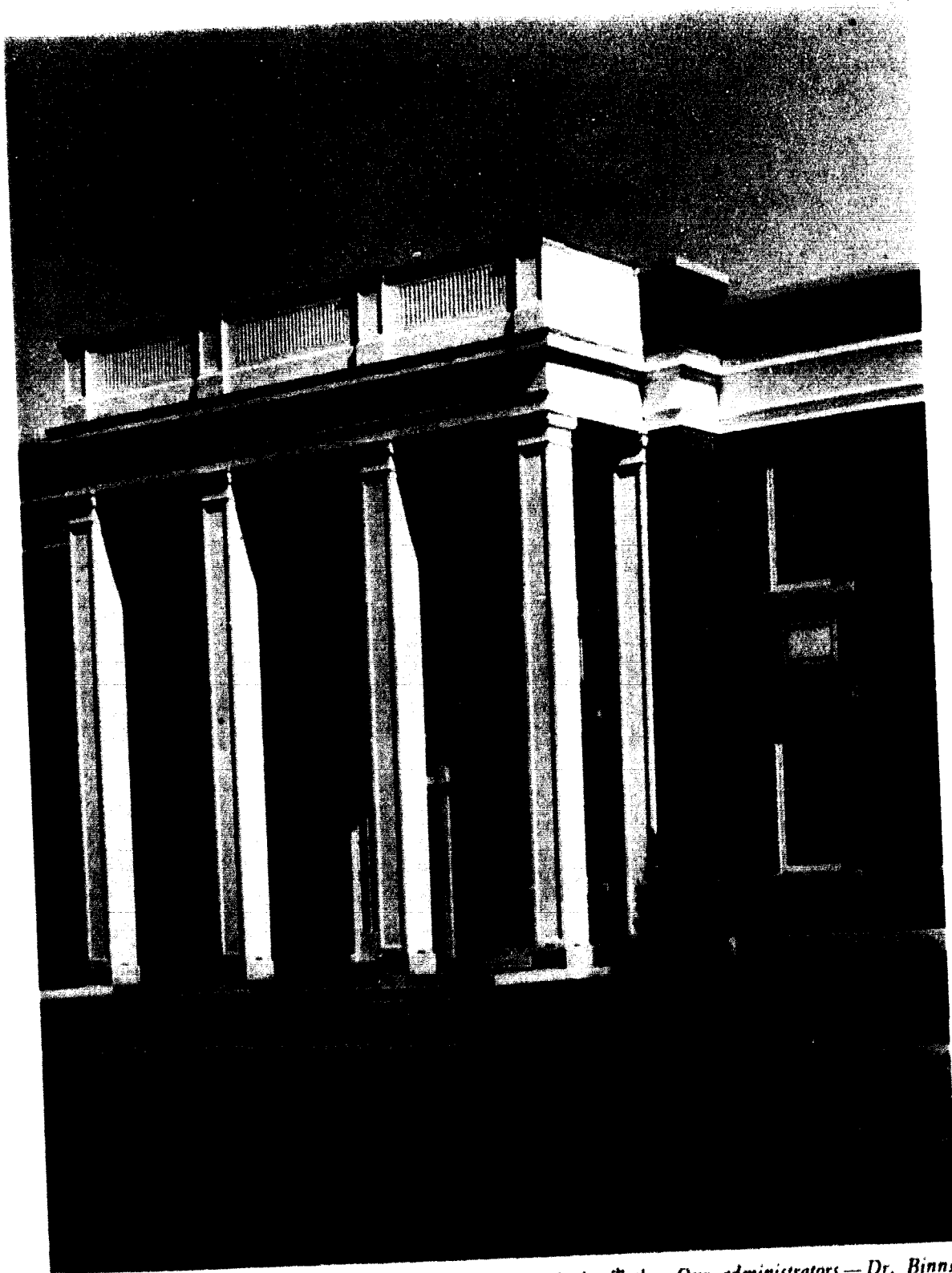
been banished since 1946. In their places are the modern lecture rooms of philosophy, literature, religion, history, language, economics, sociology, psychology, and education. The classic Greek Revival architecture of the exterior has remained basically the same.



Diligent students were at one time displaced by horses and their Yankee riders, when, during the Civil War, Union soldiers from Iowa used Jewell Hall for a hospital and a stable.

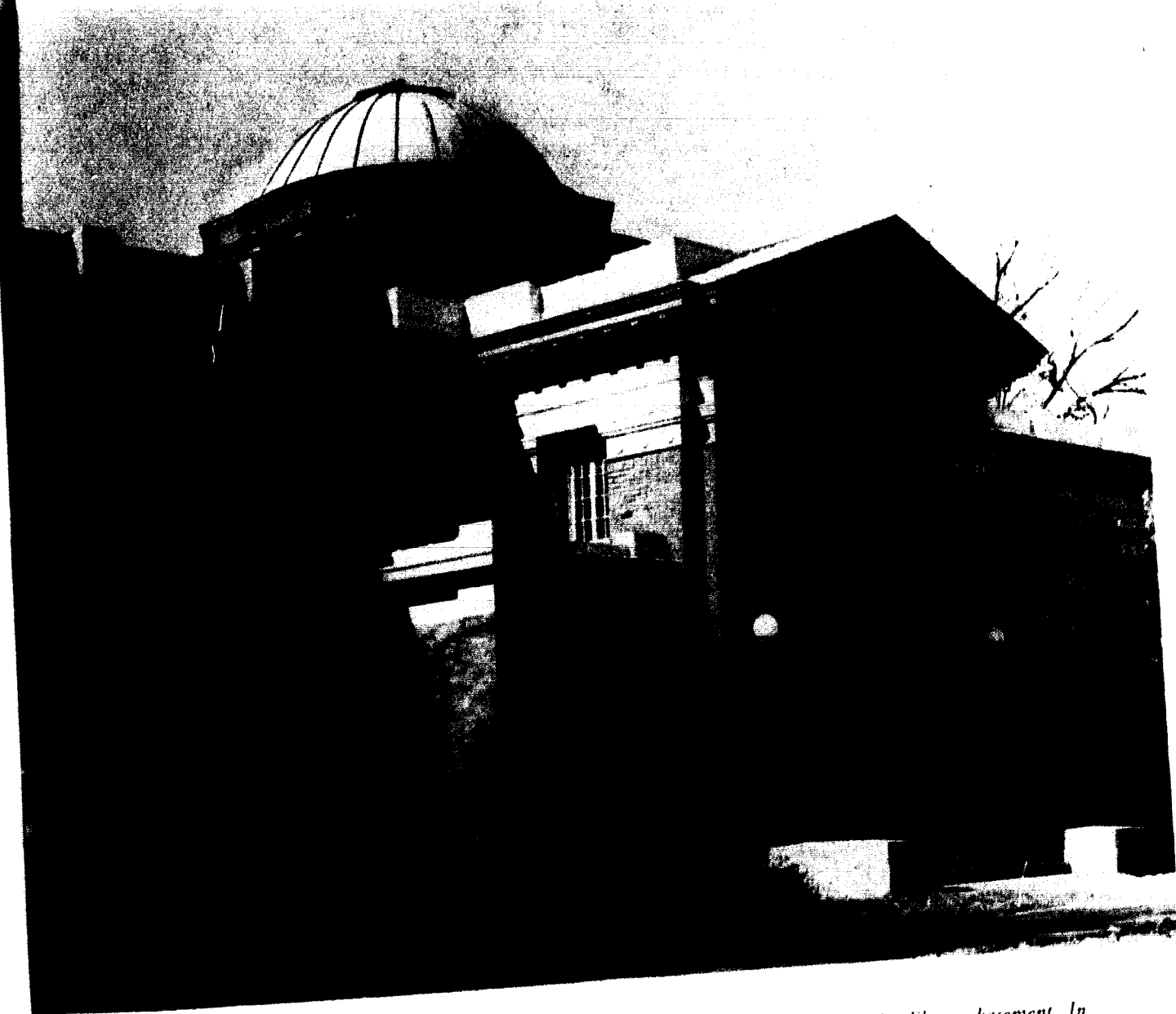
Since its construction, students from William Jewell have participated in four wars and have

been participating in a "cold war." Yet, today the stately columns of this dignified structure makes us aware of its aged wisdom and the significance of that wisdom in our educational life on the "hill."

Spanking new, directly behind Old Ely and quite in contrast to it, is Greene Hall, the administration building. Here are all the administrative offices of the school, the office of the director of student activities, the registrar's, P. Caspar Harvey's (if you can see him), and those of the Student

and the Tatler. Our administrators — Dr. Binns, Dean Edson, Dr. Hester, etc. — assure us that the foreboding, heavy, "safe vault" front door is no indication of our degree of welcome. We are invited to seek their help at any time. We are also informed that the treasurer's office is right behind the door.



Distracting as it may be, coeds now study with their male companions in the Andrew Carnegie Library. Time was when they weren't allowed to read together the some 70,000 volumes available — magazines, reference books, encyclopedias, and government documents. These numerous government documents are safely deposited in the

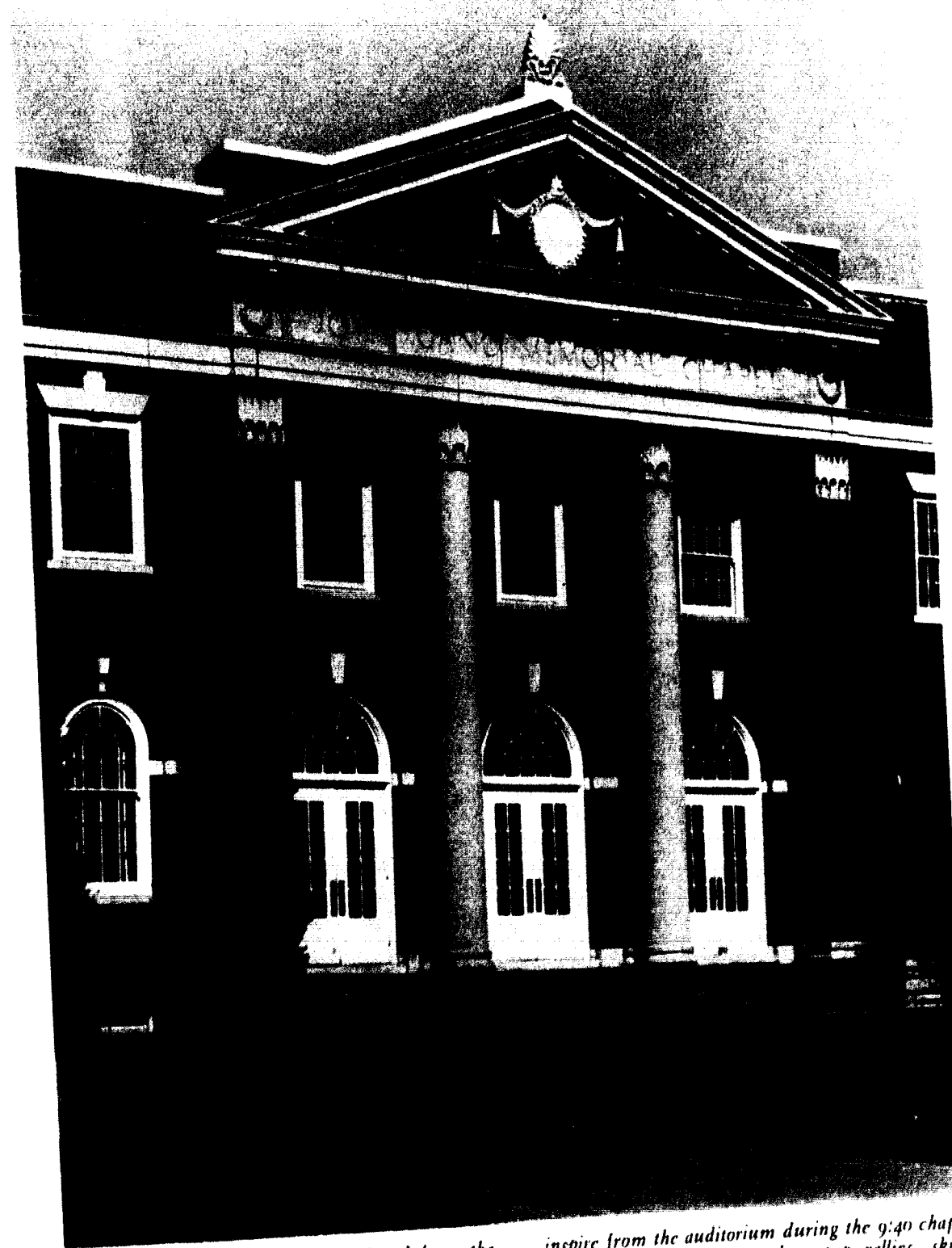
catacomb-like vaults of the library basement. In the reading room students may be seen Monday through Saturday struggling over all their studies, from Plato's theory of form and matter to "Jumbo, the Circus Elephant" for second graders. The library is truly the center of intellectual activity.

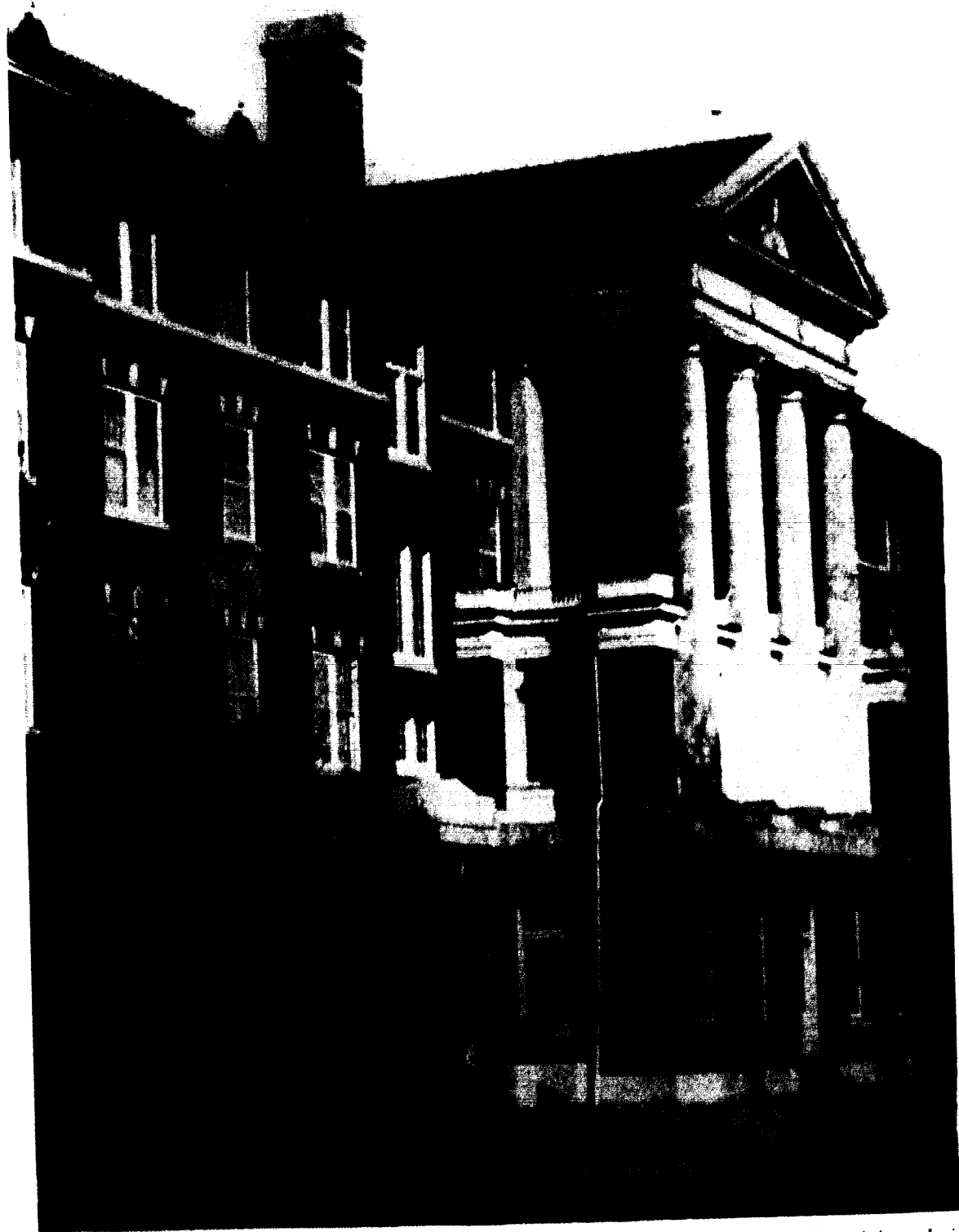
Science majors have "headquarters" in the classrooms and labs of biology, chemistry, physics, and math at Marston Hall. Art students also find refuge here. Resting defiantly in the fourth floor hall is a dilapidated old taxi cab. This is the first evidence of the college museum which contains everything from the shoelace of an 8' 4" woman

to one of Robert E. Lee's letters (1868). This letter has remained intact in the museum for some time in spite of the presence for many years of the Kappa Alphas within the building. There will be many pleasant (and otherwise) memories associated with the long hours spent in the gloomy halls and odorous labs of Marston.



Musical entertainment is daily heard from the John Gano Chapel as the familiar strains of "Malaguena" or the rich tones of Ed Nolte seep from the practice rooms of that building. Tuba rumblings and flute renditions can be "noted" from the band room. Speakers also entertain and

inspire from the auditorium during the 9:40 chapel periods. Besides the speeches, pep rallies, skits, awards, and general announcements presented, students are entertained by plays and musical productions. Below the auditorium the clatter of the William Jewell Press can be heard.



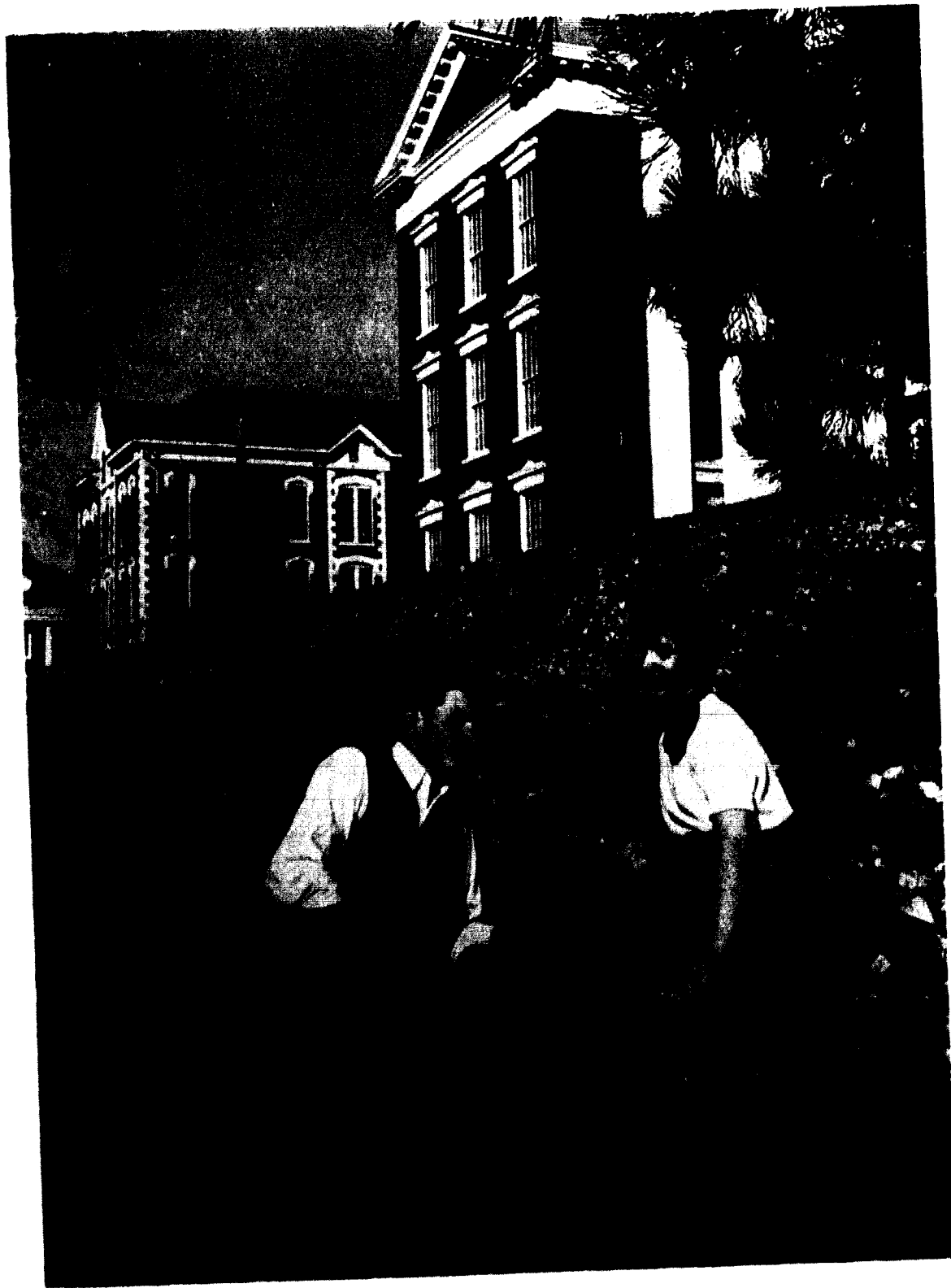
New Ely, home of fine foods and fine boys (140 of them), is palatial in comparison to its counterpart, Old Ely. The austere white columns lend an air of dignity to it. Inside, however, the hollering, buzzing of "fire alarms" (intercommunication system), and swift passing of boys from one

partitioned section to another, add an informal air to the boys' dorm. Hymns and songs can be heard from the piano in the lobby and the bathers in the showers almost any time of the day or night. Keeney's kitchen, on the ground floor serves nourishment to the students who eat in the dorm.



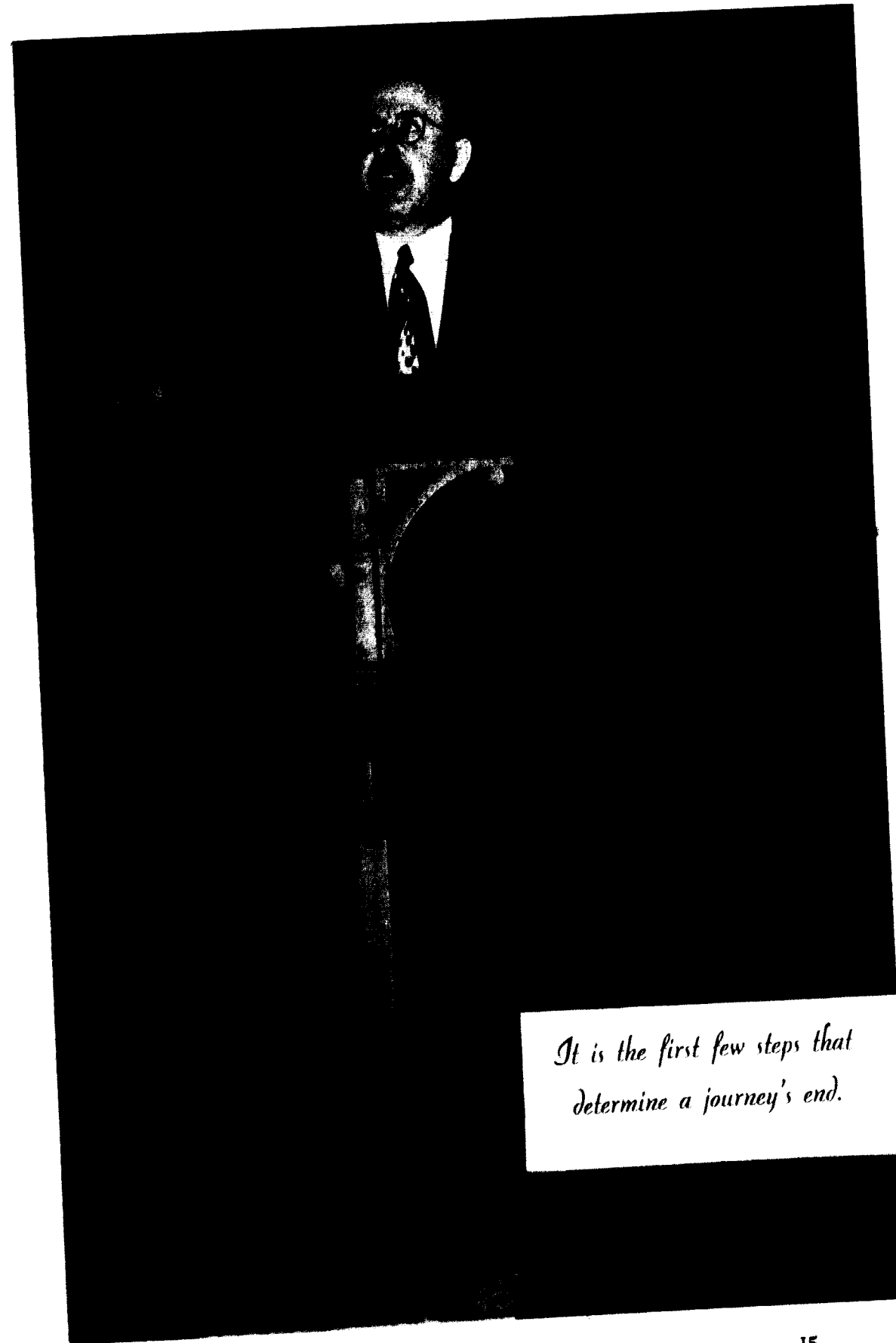

He serves as a trustee for the Seminary at Louisville, Ky., and is recognized as a prominent leader in the Southern Baptist Convention.

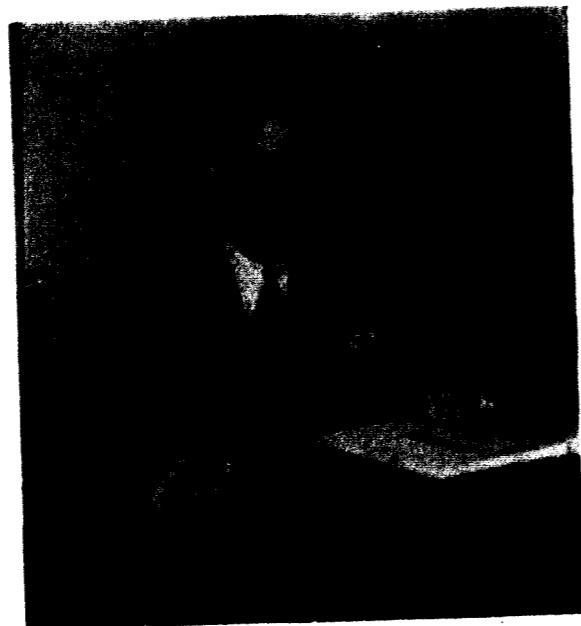
Vice Presidents

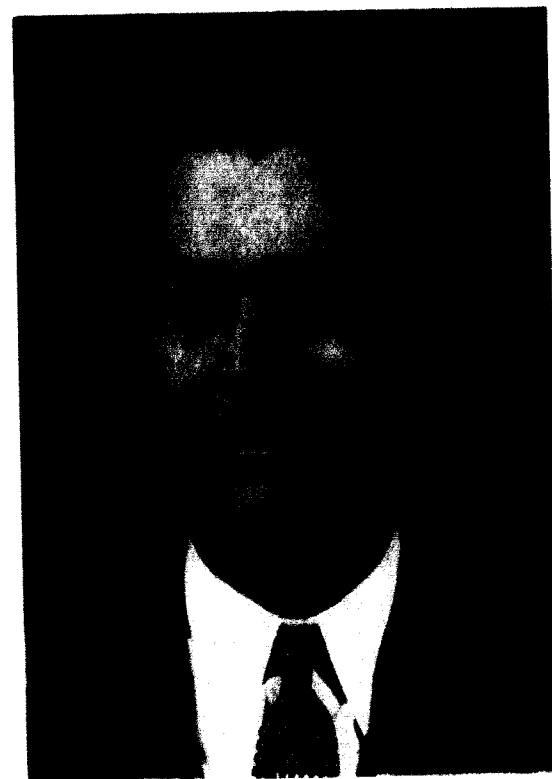
MISS CATHERINE BATES

Football

Norris A. Patterson and Jim Nelson can certainly be proud of the pigskin contingent which ripped up the turf at a terrific pace this year. The coaches spent many hours teaching fundamentals and timing to their squad. Their work paid off, and the 1952 Cardinals won more than just games.

They won the respect of sport fans across the nation by their fast, hard hitting offense and a do or die defensive squad.

A brief summary of this year's statistics shows: Al Conway carried the ball 134 times and gained a total of 1325 yards, with his 133 points averaging almost a point a carry. He completed 16 passes for 379 yards, making his total yardage 1704. He caught 9 passes for 270 yards, 7 being for touchdowns, of his total 22 TD's.

James Happy, Hardin, Mo., scored 91 points from 8 touchdowns and 43 conversions out of 50 attempted.

Fred Merrell made good on a 43 yard drop kick in the Ouachita game in Arkadelphia, Ark. This was perhaps the best drop kick in the nation this year.

The complete statistics for the season show the power of the 1952 Cardinals. A total of 669 plays made a net yardage of 4778, of which 547 rushes netted 3795, and 53 completed passes out of 132 gained 893. The average total offense per game

was 434.3 yards with an average rushing only gain of 345 yards per game, which was tops for the nation among small colleges.

Al Conway, Redbird left halfback, led all collegiate scorers with his 133 point total. Al was honored on Dec. 3, 1952 by being placed on the "little All-American Team." This is the highest honor ever bestowed on a William Jewell athlete.

The football queen for 1952 was Miss Martha Johnson of Kansas City. The princesses were Donna Coons Hobick and Phyllis Rogers, also of Kansas City.

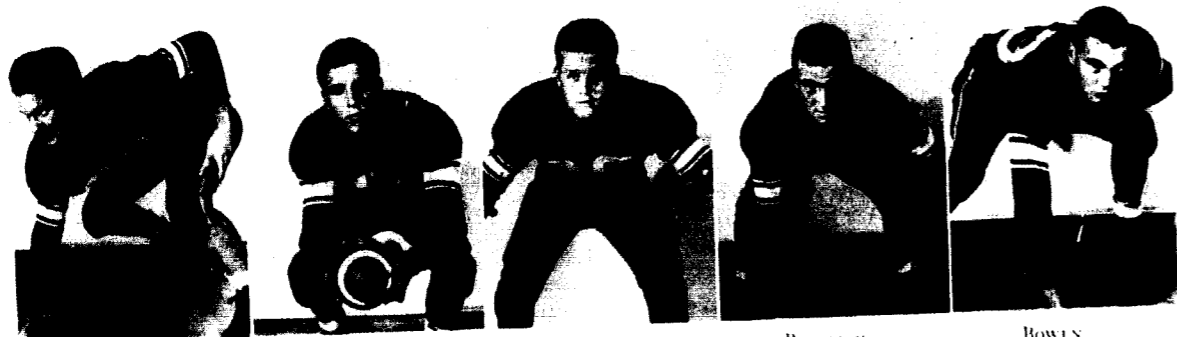

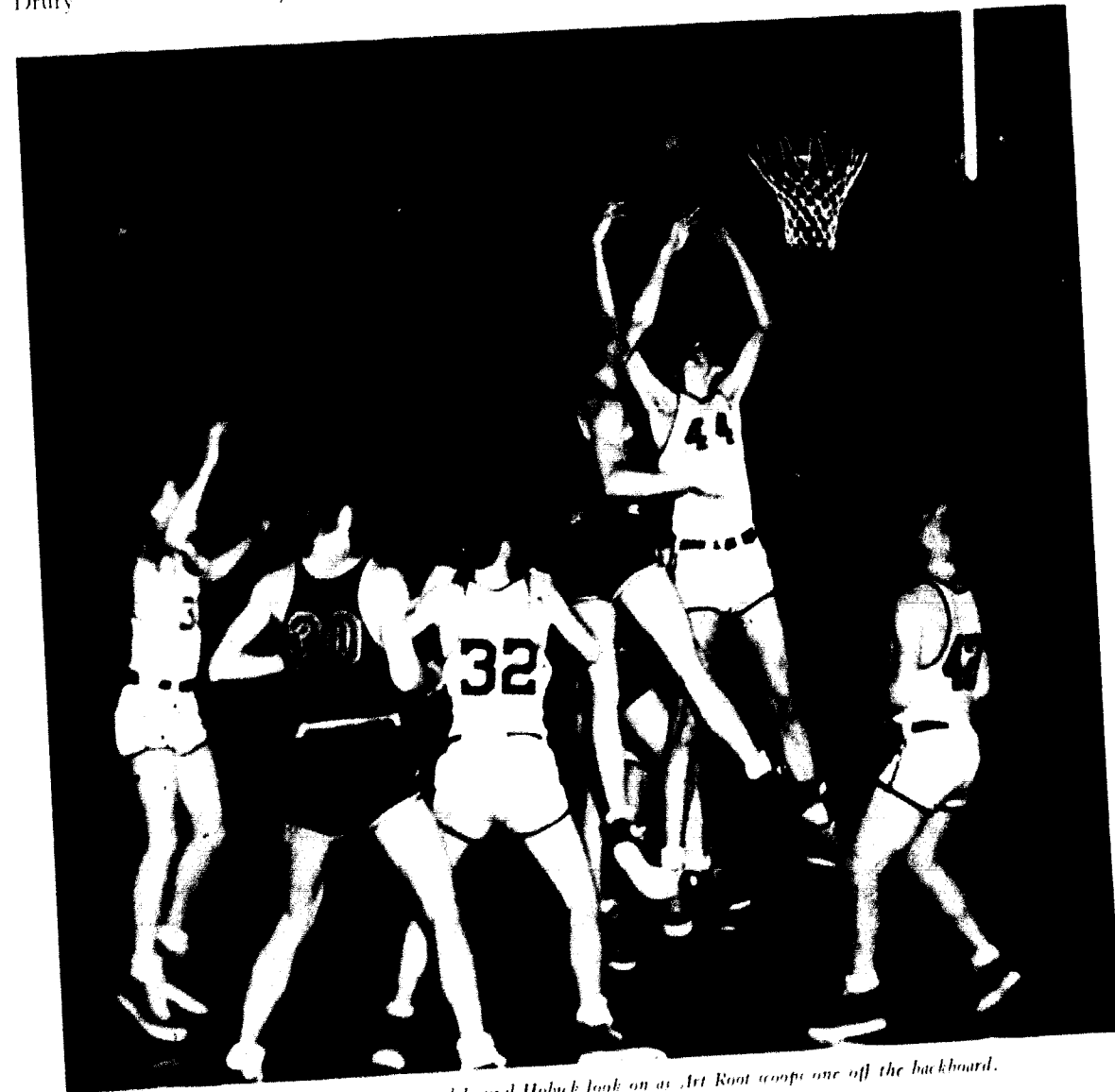

Along with thoughts of love come thoughts of baseball each spring and the sounds of hickory against leather put a skip in the heartbeat of fans across the nation.

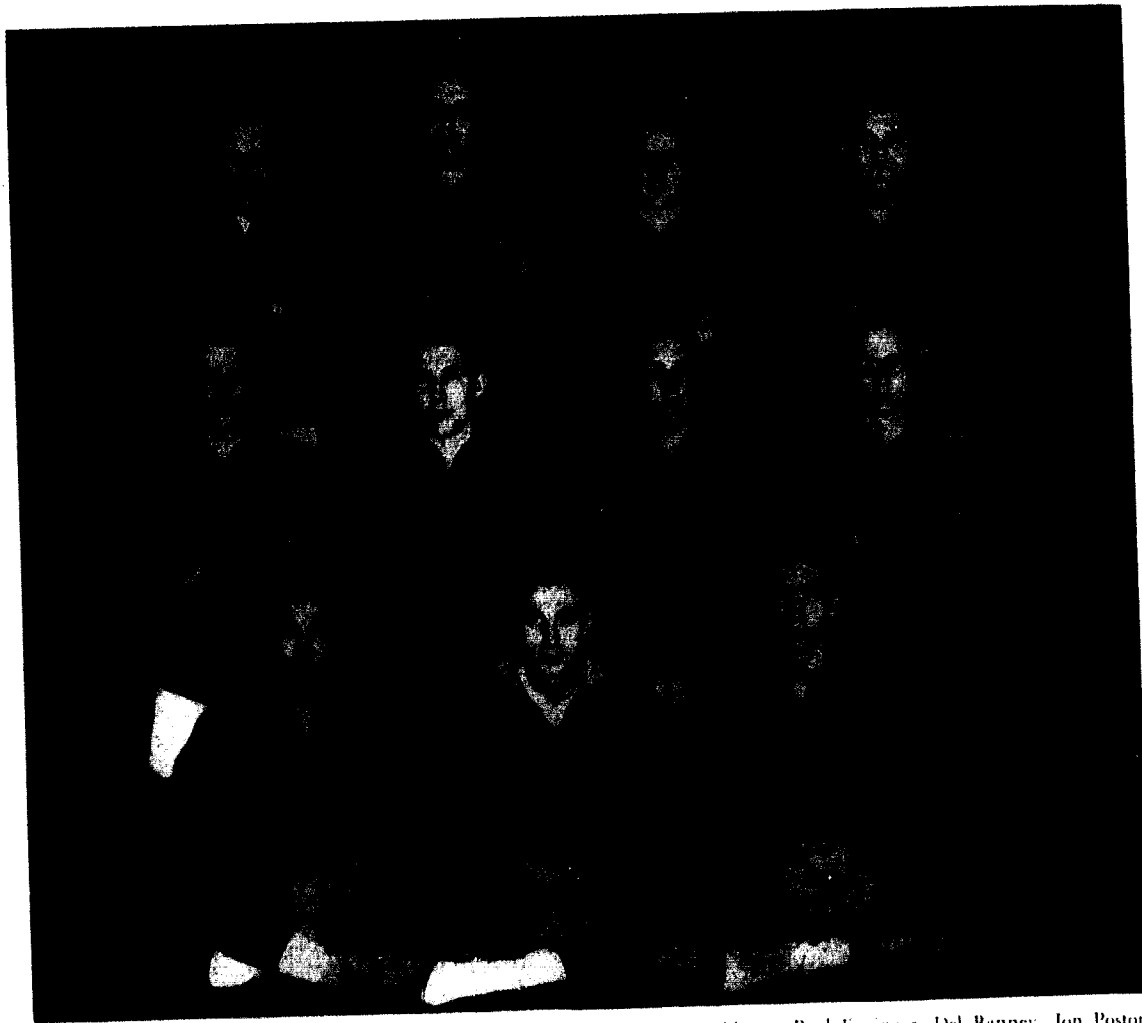
Last year, after a thirty year absence from our campus, the nation's number one sport was again

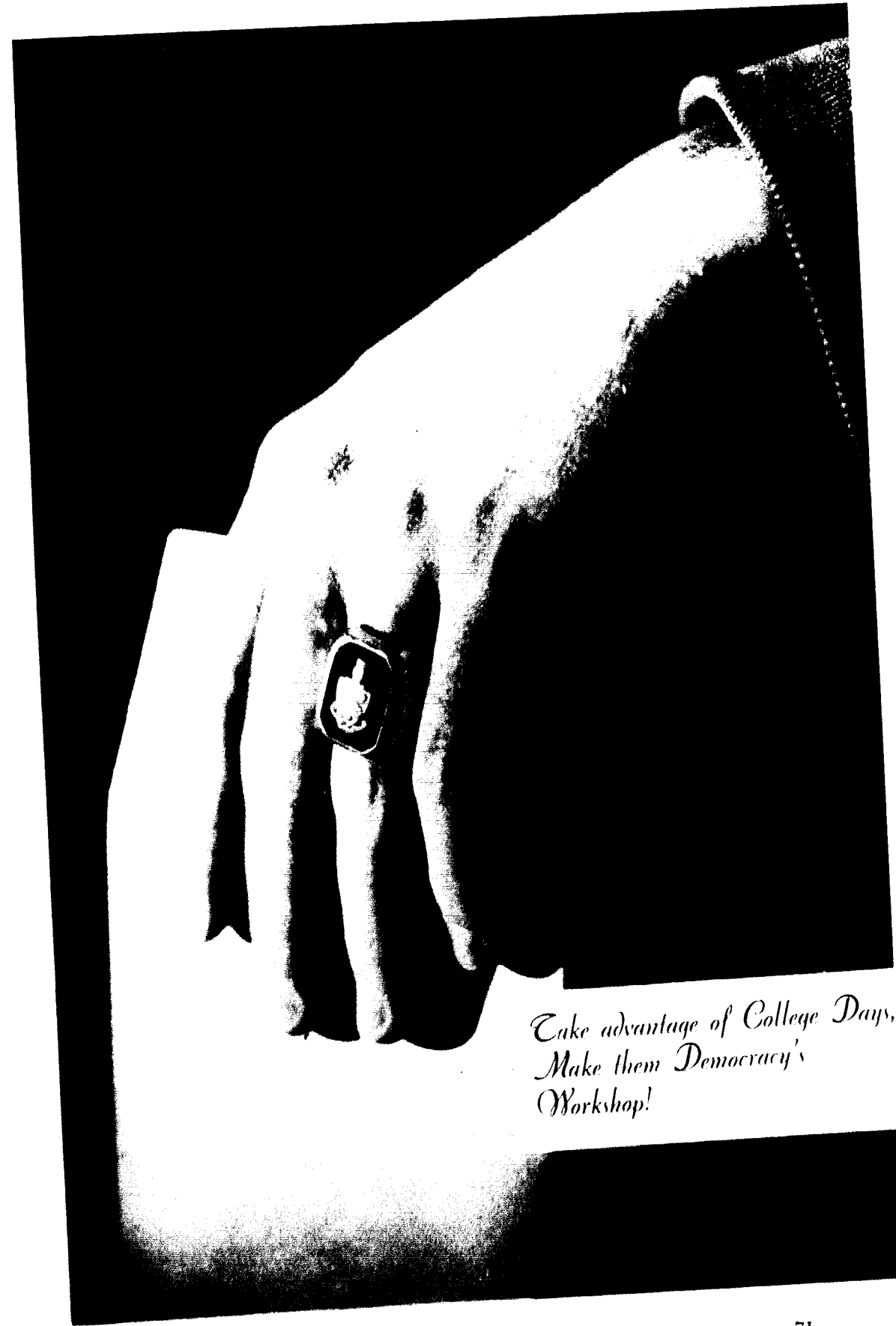

— If by chance you could have peeked in on a Student Senate meeting in the Faculty Room of the Administration Building on a Tuesday night, you would have witnessed the procedure as the members attempted to solve problems relating to student life on the campus. Membership in the Senate consists of a representative from each sorority and fraternity, the Independent Society, the Commuters, Ministerial Association, the presidents of the four classes, and the Student Body president. These brought various constructive suggestions dealing with improvement of school spirit and student life to the Senate for discussion. In the meetings, each member had the privilege of stating his or her opinion on the topic in question. Definite decisions came from the meetings and proved beneficial to the whole student body.

The Senate as an organization is concerned with all problems which influence school spirit, and the activity of 1952-53 centered on the revision of the constitution of the student association. At the beginning of the school year several errors were discovered in the old constitution. The constitution revision committee spent many long hours of

thought and preparation on the revision. Hours of discussion took place. The new revision, presented to the student body in the spring, was the result of their work.

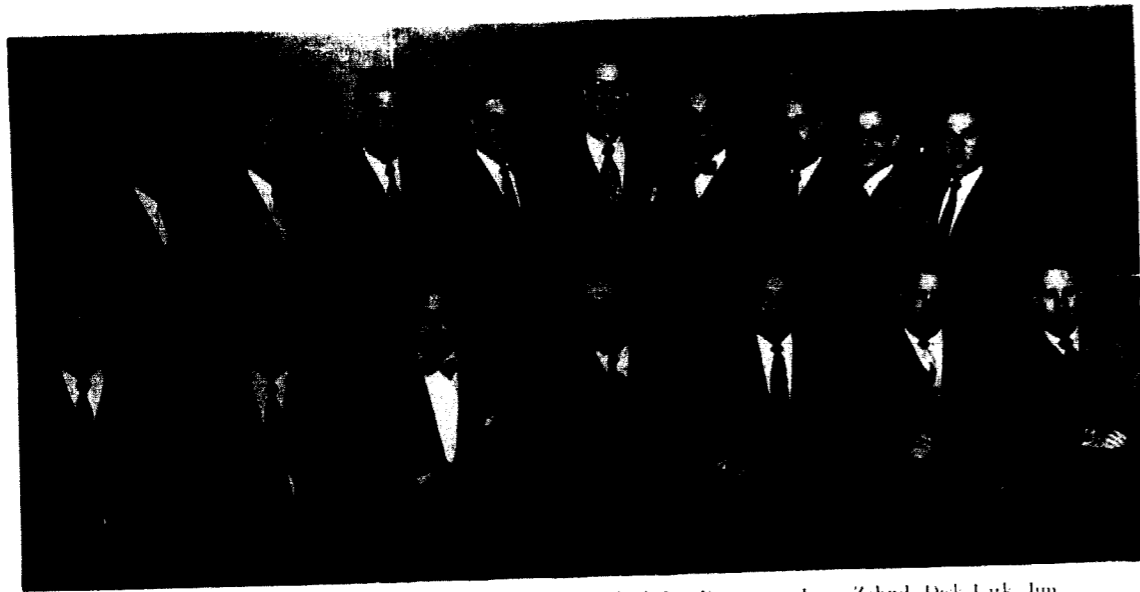
Other activities included planning several chapel programs, administration-student council meetings, a mock presidential election in November, promotion of all school activities, an Easter chapel program, student elections, Homecoming celebration, and regulation of student affairs.

One important branch of the Student Senate is the Board of Control, which is composed of the Senate plus three faculty members: Miss Bowman, Mr. Joyce, and Dr. Pugh.

The board is concerned with the management of student publications. It convenes each month with the editors and business managers of The Student and Tatler, and the student treasurer of the Board of Control, to note the progress and financial status of the publications. The board makes suggestions and constructive criticisms to the members of the staffs as well as to the Student Senate. Ted Harris, president of the student body and the Senate, also serves as chairman of the board of control. Nancy Dougherty is the treasurer.

Students are accepted into the national organization after submitting for consideration a lengthy report about themselves. The achievements are published in a volume which includes students from more than 700 colleges and universities.



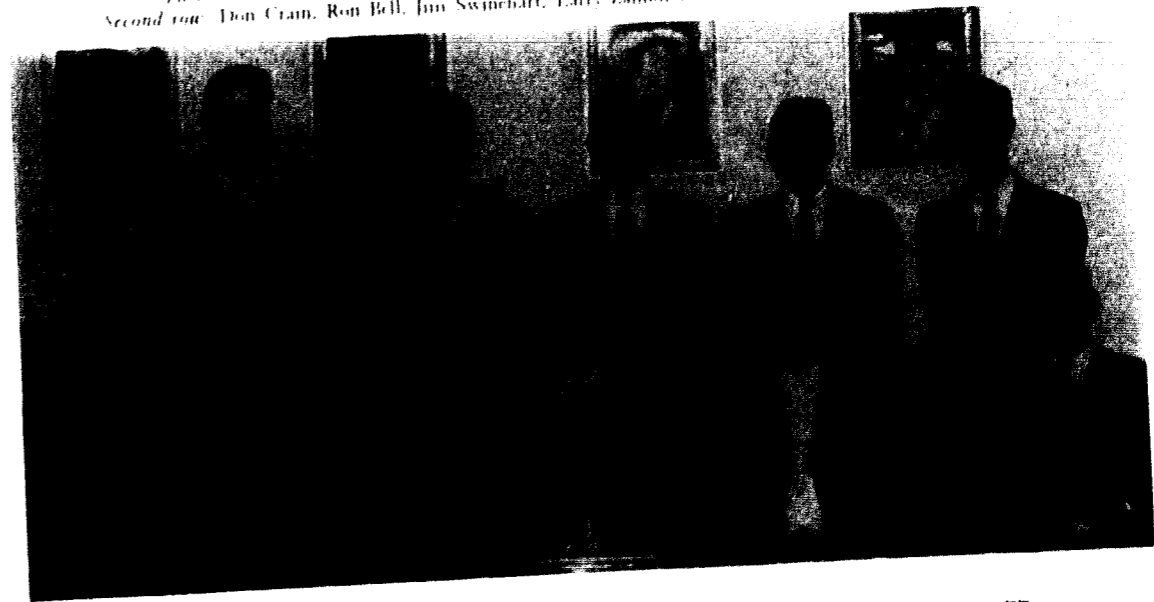

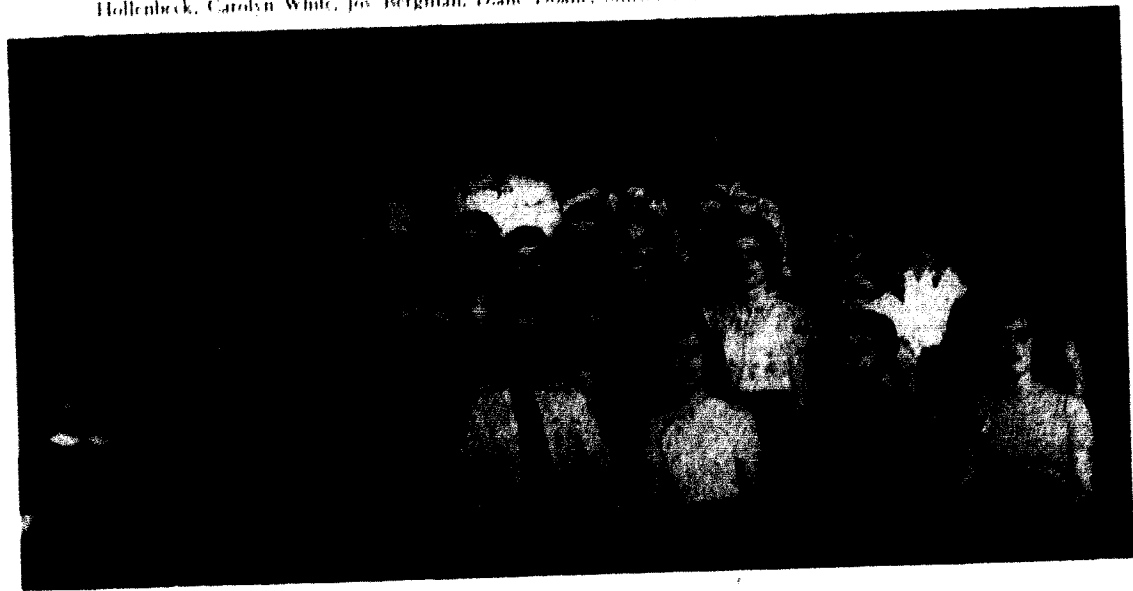

Day luncheon—but above all the friendships strengthened have meant a year full of activity and many happy memories for Alpha Delta Pi.

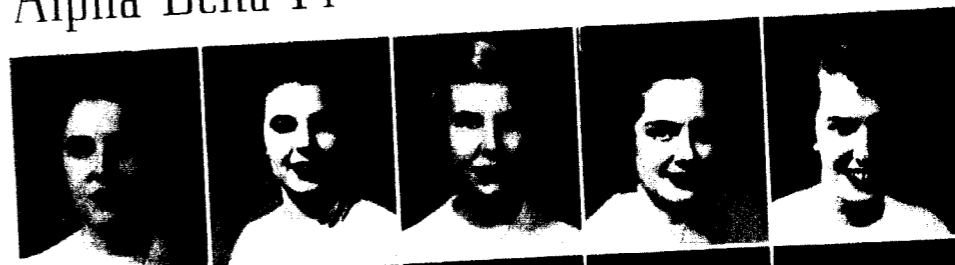

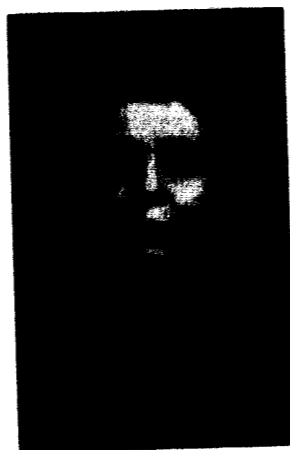
The Artists' Ball, the Sultan's Court, and our annual Rose Formal rounded out a year filled with activities.

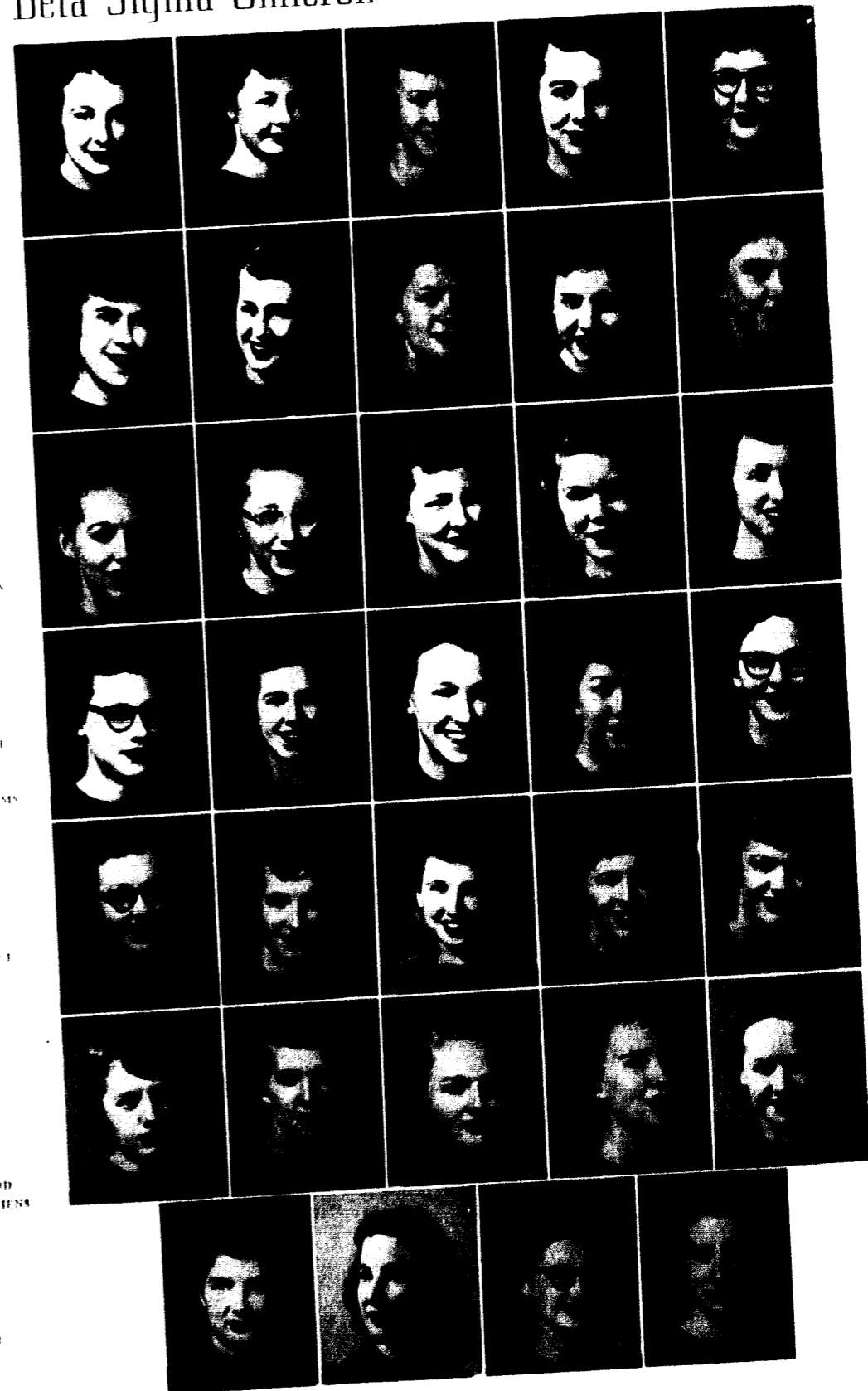

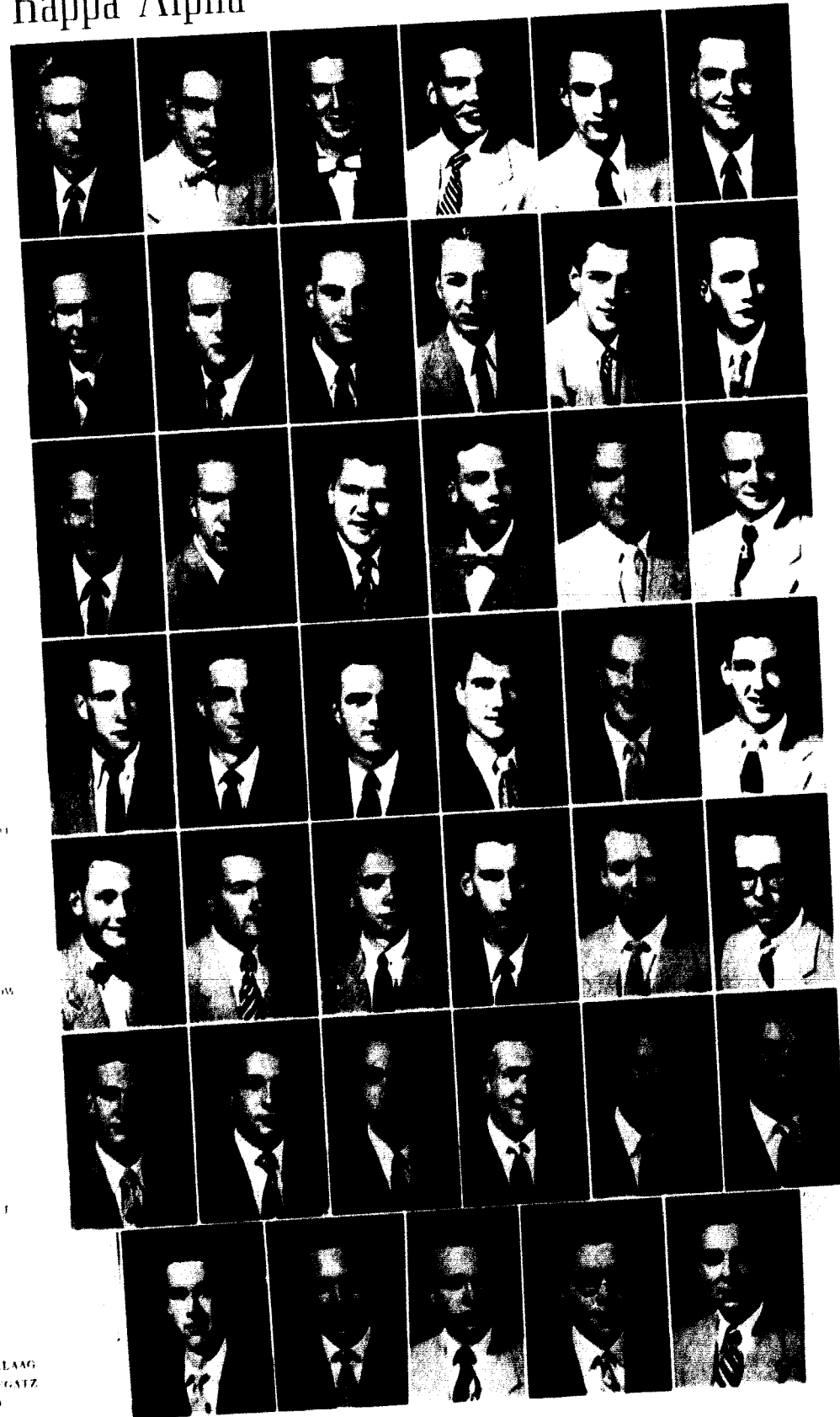

formals, Land of Black Magic, and the Sweetheart Ball in the spring both being quite successful.

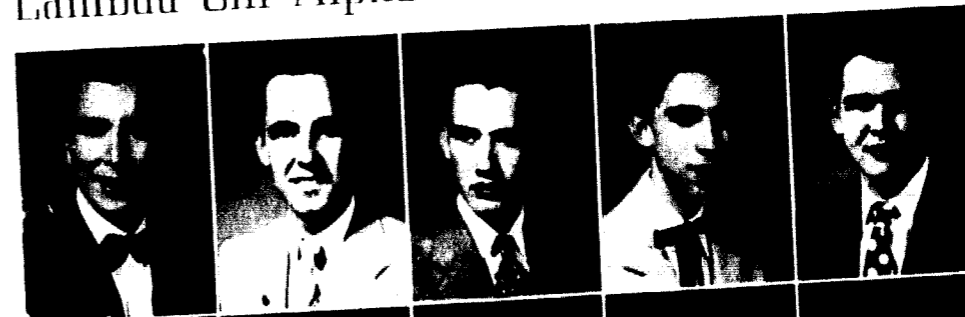

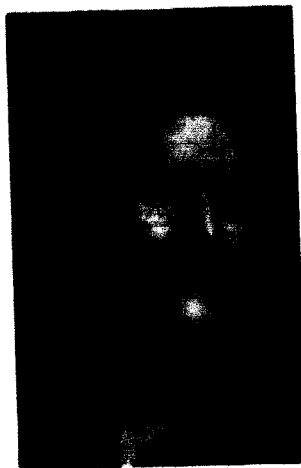
Brother Don Crain was selected as Missouri student representative to the National Association of Manufacturers convention in New York — the only Jewell student ever to receive this honor.

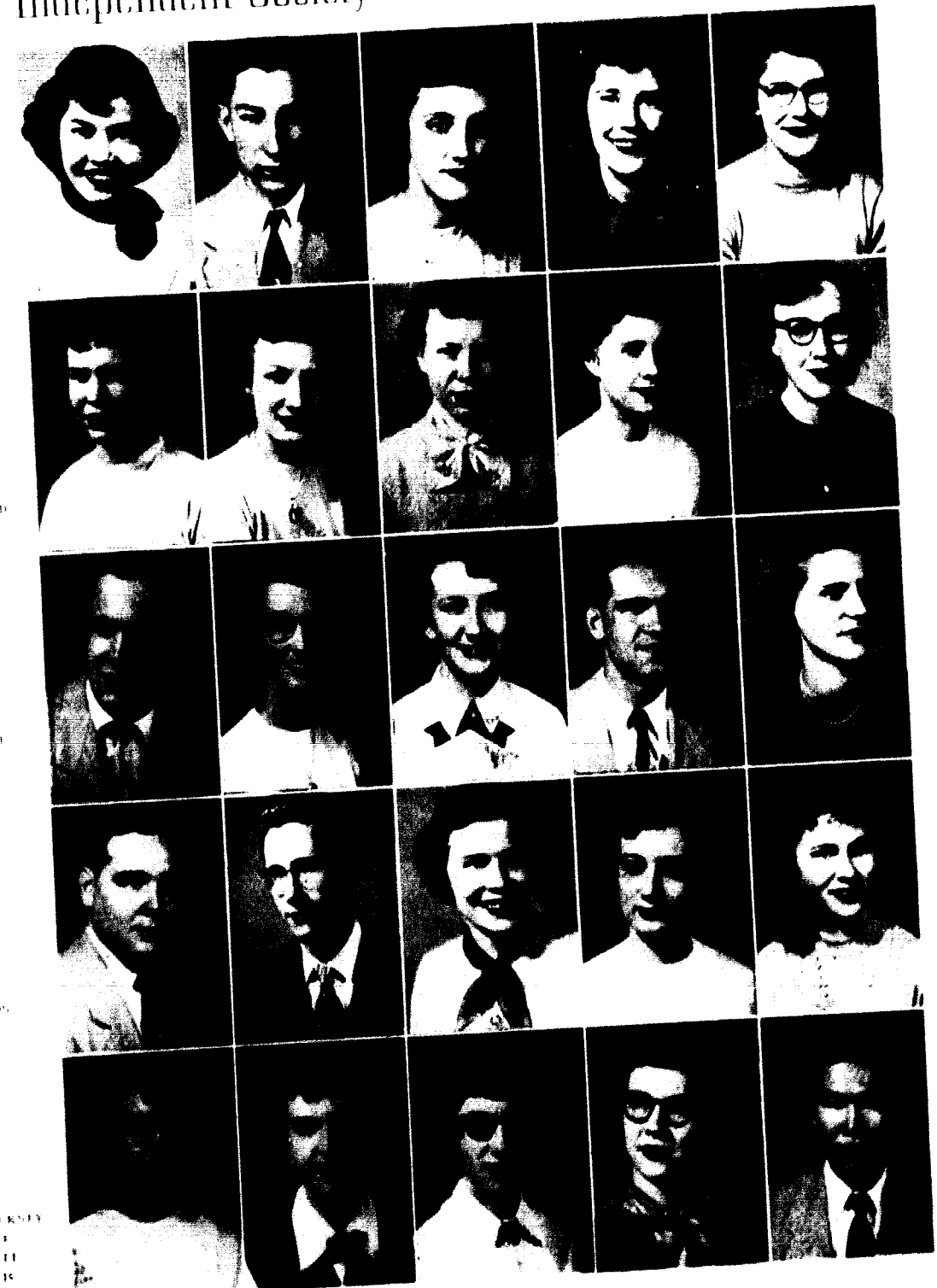

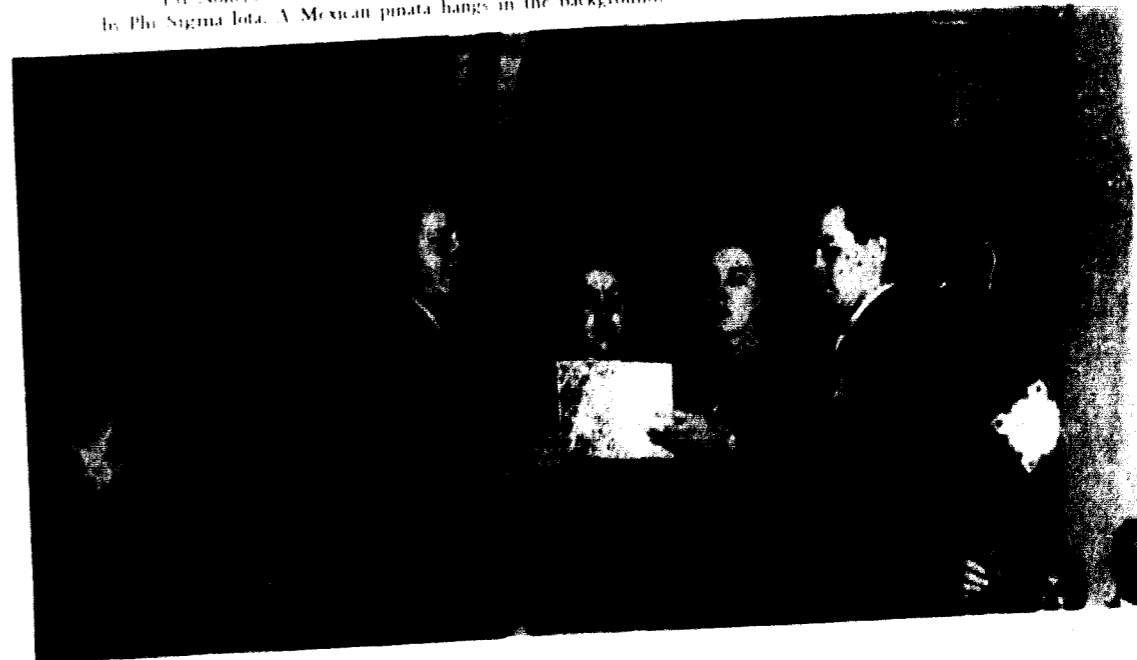

Pi Kappa Delta stands for three Greek words meaning "The art of persuasion, beautiful and just." In more practical everyday language, it stands for the debate and other intercollegiate speech activities of college students.

Missouri Delta Chapter came to the campus in 1922, but William Jewell had a forensic tradition before that, dating back to the first intercollegiate oratory contest in 1875.

Through its system of awards, with a diamond-studded key for highest achievement, Pi Kappa Delta spurs student speakers to high endeavor. Beginners move from the degree of fraternity through those of proficiency and honor to special distinction in one or more orders: oratory-extemp, or debate-discussion. The local chapter has four members eligible for special distinction and the diamond key.

This year's activities have included several audience debates, participation in seven tournaments, and sponsorship of our own annual invitational

debate meet, attended by fifty teams. Highest honors came at the state tournament held at Warrensburg, when three William Jewell debate teams won ratings of Superior (first), one an Excellent (second), and a fifth team won three out of five debates. Individual speakers received three Superiors in Extemporaneous speaking (George Dooley, Robert Drury, Ed Gaul); two Superiors in poetry reading (Dick Harriman, Mary Lou Riggs); a Superior in original poetry (Dick Harriman having won this state event two successive years); two Excellents in oratory (Dooley, Drury); and an Excellent in discussion (Clarence Finley).

Competing with 130 other colleges, William Jewell members attended the biennial PKD tournament at Kalamazoo, Mich., in the spring and came home with two Excellents and three Goods (third).

At the University of Iowa Student Intercollegiate Conference on World Affairs, William Jewell teams (Dooley, Finley; Gaul, Byrne) won six out of eight

debates with Excellents in public speaking, extemp, and discussion. This was one of the leading records among the seventeen colleges and universities participating.

A special PKD event is the sponsorship of the annual Intramural Speech Festival. This is designed to interest more students in speech activities, and provides cups for winning organizations, medals and certificates for individual winners. Judged by faculty members and friends from Liberty, this year's contest, which ended with a tea for all participants, saw BSO take first place, Lambda Chi

Alpha second, and Independent Society third. Individual winners were: Oratory, David Dye and Dick Byrne (tie); Extemp, Fred Kirby; After-dinner-speaking, Marjorie Foster; Selected poetry, Dick Harriman; Original poetry, Cora Lou Brown. Officers leading the group were: President, Clarence Finley; vice president, Glen Zahnd; secretary-treasurer, Bob Drury. PKD also claims several faculty members: Miss Bowman, the adviser; Mrs. Nelson, Mrs. Zillman, Prof. Harvey, who served as adviser and debate director for twenty-five years, and Prof. Harvey Thomas.

Hays and Pat Cooper as lighting and stage managers respectively, worked with Mr. Edwards. Members of the Shakespeare class and Players assisted with production details.

The student-directed one-act plays have been presented this year before several high schools and community groups. These plays were directed by Richard Byrne and Richard Harriman.

The Players' smorgasbord dinner and dessert

at Mother Short's Tea Room formally closed the season's activities. Miss Lucille Burton, a well-known teacher and director of Kansas City, spoke to the group on the Modern French Experimental Theater and read from a one act play.

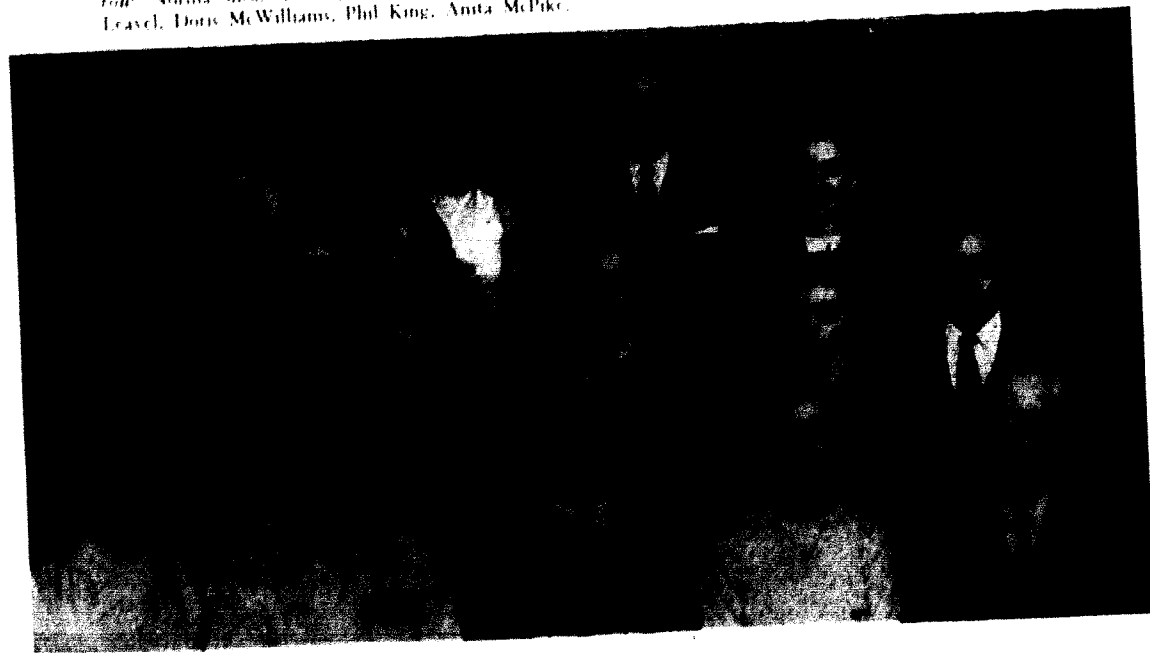

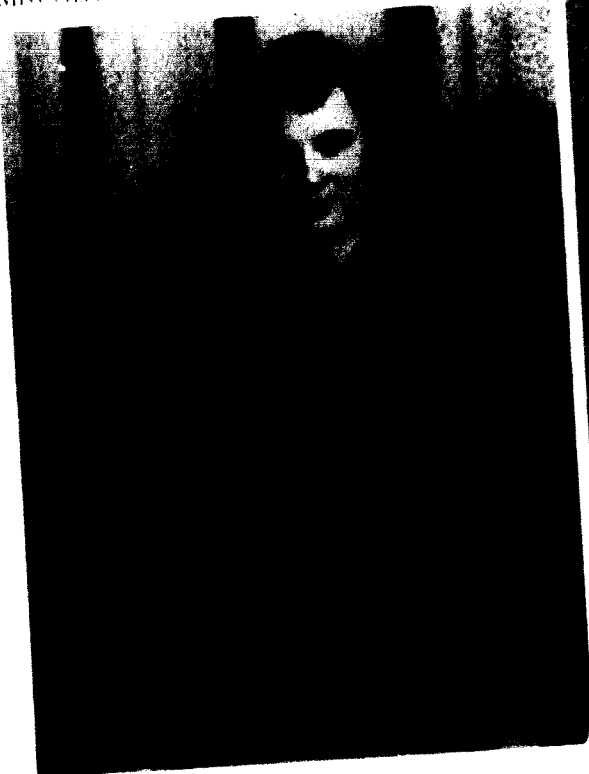

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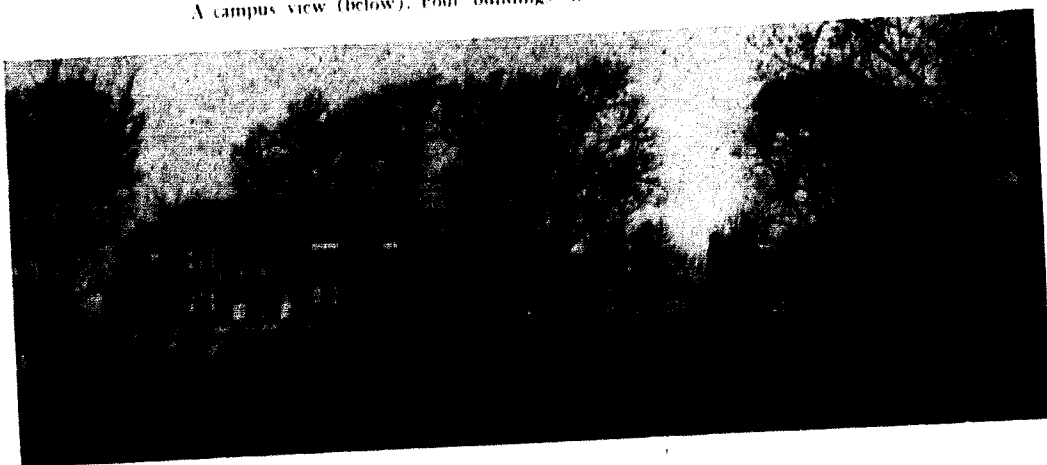
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
