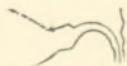

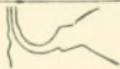
THE LIVING AND THE DEAD.

But lay up for yourselves treasures in heaven, where neither moth nor rust doth corrupt, and where thieves do not break through nor steal.

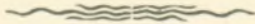

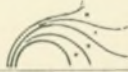
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Charge them that are rich in this world, that they be not highminded, nor trust in uncertain riches, but in the living God, who giveth us richly all things to enjoy;

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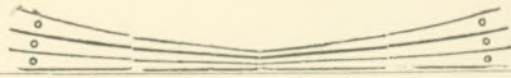
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But I would not have you to be ignorant, brethren, concerning them which are asleep, that ye sorrow not, even as others which have no hope.

INTRODUCTION.

Let Your Dead Live in a Good Work.

This may be done by making a contribution to the MEMORIAL FUND OF WILLIAM JEWELL COLLEGE.

It seems so appropriate to invest in this sacred fund the means or money our loved ones may have left with us when they died, or a part of what would be theirs if alive, so that though dead they might live and work for the GLORY OF GOD AND FOR THE GOOD OF OUR RACE.

I feel confident that this thought has come to us from God. I am sure He is pleased with this work, and if our departed loved ones can see and know what we are doing here on earth, (and I firmly believe they can) I am sure they will rejoice that God has put it in our hearts to keep alive their memory and influence in this way.

Such monuments as these are

IMPERISHABLE.

and will not only perpetuate the name and memory of our departed loved ones, but will be living and working for God and our race, long after all the memorial buildings, tablets and tomb-stones have gone back to the dust of which they were made.

Each separate contribution, from the least to the largest, is entered on my roll book and on the College Ledger to the credit of the deceased one and will stand as a sacred monument to their memory, more beautiful and enduring than anything that can be placed on their graves. They are

EVER GREEN AND FRUIT BEARING,

and will never die; even if the College books and buildings should be destroyed, these monuments will still live. The good already done by the

earnings of this fund can never be destroyed, and for aught we know, our loved ones in Heaven will enjoy the good fruit, from this planting as much as the contributors and beneficiaries here on earth.

Every memorial is recorded on the College book and on my roll book in the exact form and language in which it appears in my reports and in this book.

At my death or at some other suitable time in the future, my roll book which will contain an account of every memorial I have ever received, will be deposited in the vaults of the Missouri Baptist Education Society, and will be interesting to many of the coming generations as they read the record of the good deeds of their ancestors and deceased friends and kindred.

IN FIFTY OR A HUNDRED

years from now these memorials and obituary notices may be the only trace left on earth of the living and dead who joined hands in this good work.

No part of the principal of this fund will ever be used for any purpose. It is loaned out on real estate security, the interest only can be used in support of the College.

This will always be the *most sacred fund* belonging to the College, and we hope soon to have enough to endow the "Memorial Chair." Let the living and the dead join hands in this sacred work. Both may enjoy it, and I believe God will approve it.

SCHOLARSHIPS.

The Board of Trustees has authorized me to issue Scholarship Certificates to any one who may hereafter contribute the sum of five hundred dollars at one time to the Endowment Fund. These scholarships entitle the donors to free tuition for one student at every session of the College so long as the donor shall live, or until his youngest son shall reach the age of 21 years. In this way you may provide for the education of a worthy young man, every year for all time to come, or you may endow a

PERPETUAL MEMORIAL SCHOLARSHIP

in the name of a deceased loved one, so that the dead may educate a living man every year for all time to come. What a blessed thought that we can, in this way, promote a good cause, and at the same time erect an *IMPERISHABLE MONUMENT* to the memory of our sacred dead.

These scholarships will be recorded on the College Ledger and will forever bear the name of the donor or the deceased one in whose name they have been endowed.

BEQUESTS.

All donations to the Endowment Fund of the College, by *will or bequest*, will be entered in the Memorial Fund, and invested in the name and kept to the memory of the testator, unless otherwise instructed by the will or executor

A number of such bequests have been made. Others will follow. No safer investment can be made, and none with greater promise of present and future good. Is it not wise to place part of what God has given us where it will live and do good when we are dead?

OTHER FUNDS.

There are four other departments or classifications of the Endowment Fund. In the

GENERAL ENDOWMENT

all undesignated contributions will be entered. In the

SISTER'S ENDOWMENT

all contributions made by sisters will be entered unless otherwise instructed. Nearly \$7,000 now stands to the credit of this fund on the College books. It is to be hoped that the time is not far distant when this fund will be sufficient to endow a chair in the name of the Baptist Sisters of Missouri. In the

ALUMNI ENDOWMENT

we place all contributions made by any one who has ever been a student of the College, whether they have taken a full course or not. About \$3,000, now stands to the credit of this fund. We trust the day is not distant when the Alumni Chair will be endowed.

All contributions made by the children, are placed to the credit of the

CHILDREN'S ENDOWMENT.

Nearly five thousand children are enrolled on the Children's Roll Book with contributions ranging from 5 cents to \$5. Nearly one thousand dollars stands to the credit of this fund. I send a pretty card certificate to every child who contributes to the fund.

No part of the principal of either of these funds will ever be used for any purpose. It will be kept securely invested. The interest or earnings only can be used in support of the College.

Will you not invest something in this work of the Lord, where it will live and work for God and our race after you have ceased from your labors, and gone to your reward?

We shall soon die and leave all we have accumulated in this world—but money invested in the Lord's work is

THIS BOOK

contains an account of all the memorials I have received up to this date, also a few blank leaves where memorials may be entered in the future, and a few album leaves where cabinet photos may be placed of the deceased ones, whose memorials are found in the book.

One of these books will be sent to every one who has made a contribution to this fund, *and one will be sent hereafter to every one who may make a contribution to this fund.* The memorial will be written on one of the blank pages of the book before sending it to the contributor.

I trust as you read the following memorials, you may be reminded of your own dear ones, whose bodies sleep in the grave, and that you will send a contribution to this sacred fund in their memory.

Contributions of Parents In Memory of their Children.

Robert Lewis Tull Memorial Fund, \$10.

This fund was contributed by Mrs. Sallie W. Tull in memory of her deceased son, who died in Carrollton, Mo., June 30th, 1874, in the twelfth year of his age. The principal is to be kept sacred, and will stand forever in memory of the deceased, the interest to be used in the support of the College as the Trustees may direct. The deceased had accumulated this money during his life and had put it away in his little purse. His mother considering it too sacred to be used for any ordinary purpose wisely decided to consecrate it to the cause of Christ by putting it into the Memorial Endowment Fund.

This was the first contribution I received to the Memorial Fund. Coming as it did unsolicited and in answer to the mother's prayer to God for direction as to what she should do with her child's money, it suggested to my mind the thought of our "Memorial Fund." So I decided at once to make it the foundation of this sacred fund—the growth and history of which may be read on the following pages of this book.

This incident, or rather this providence, will make the memory of this mother and child immortal. "Who live in deeds do never die."

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The little boy's money has been loaned out and the interest collected annually and used in support of the College. So that, while he lives with God in heaven, his money works for God on earth.

Eddie Kirtley Memorial Fund, \$20.

This fund was contributed by Mrs. Margaret F. Kirtley in memory of her deceased son who died in LaFayette County, Mo., June 5th, 1877, in the 17th year of his age. The deceased had this amount of money of his own when he died, and his mother preferred to put it into the Endowment Fund where it might work forever for Christ, rather than to use it for herself. The principal must be kept sacred forever in the name and to the memory of the deceased, the interest only to be used in support of the College as the Trustees may direct.

Wm. B. Glover, Jr., Memorial Fund, \$525.

This fund was contributed by Dr. Wm. B. Glover in memory of his deceased son, Wm. B. Glover, Jr., (son of Wm. B. and Virginia B. Glover) born August 12th, 1872, died October 12th, 1878. The principal must be kept sacred forever to the memory of the deceased and well secured, the interest only to be used in support of the College as the Trustees may direct.

Charlie Crouch Memorial Fund, \$6.25.

This fund was contributed by W. S. Crouch, in memory of his deceased son, who died in Carrollton, Mo., June 28th, 1873, in the sixth year of his age. The principal must be kept sacred forever in memory of the deceased, the interest only to be used in support of the College, as the Trustees may direct. This was little Charlie's own money when he died. His father decided to invest it in this way so that Charlie, though dead, might still live in a good work.

Charles Lee Boston Memorial Fund, 70 cents.

Son of D. L. W. and Maria Boston, died August 16th, 1886, in the nineteenth year of his age. He was an afflicted invalid all his life, but a devoted Christian. He made this small sum with his own hands, in order that he might have something of *his own* to give to the cause of his dear Savior. It must be kept sacred forever in his name and to his memory.

Alpheus G. Lyne Memorial Fund. \$100.

This fund was contributed by Thomas and Eliza G. Lyne, in memory of their deceased son, who was once a student at William Jewell College. He died in Washington, D. C., October 19th, 1884. Born September 26th, 1849. The principal must be kept sacred forever, and well secured, to the memory of the deceased, the interest only to be used in support of the College as directed by the Board of Trustees.

Nicholas G. Sappington Memorial Fund, \$5.

Contributed by his mother, Octavia I. Sappington, in memory of her deceased son, who was born June 5th, 1864, and died October 4th, 1865. The principal must be kept sacred to the memory of the deceased, the interest only to be used in support of the College.

Wester C. Campbell Memorial Fund, \$5.

Contributed by Octavia I. Sappington in memory of her deceased grandson, who was born November 1st, 1880, and died August 28th, 1886. The principal must be kept sacred to the memory of the deceased, the interest only to be used in support of the College.

Jessie E. Sappington Memorial Fund, \$5.

Contributed by Mrs. Octavia I. Sappington in memory of her deceased grandson, who was born February 11th, 1881,

and died February 3rd, 1886. The principal must be kept sacred forever to the memory of the deceased, the interest only to be used in support of the College.

Martin Collins, Jr., Memorial Fund, \$40.

Contributed by Martin and Mary Alice Collins in memory of their deceased son, who was born December 2nd, 1855, and died January 3rd, 1863. The principal must be kept sacred forever in the name and to the memory of the deceased, the interest only to be used in support of the College as the Trustees may direct.

Myrtle Annie Nichelson Memorial Fund, \$25.

Contributed by Manly and Mary B. Nichelson in memory of their deceased daughter, who was born in Lawson, Mo., August 10th, 1882, and was burned to death October 12th, 1886. This fund represents the value of a colt which the parents had given little Myrtle before her death. They now desire that her property shall be consecrated to the service of Him with whom their dear child has gone to live forever. The principal must be kept sacred to the memory of the deceased, the interest only to be used in support of the College as the Trustees may direct.

Paul Ely Major Memorial Fund, \$100.

This fund was contributed by John S. and Jennie Major in memory of their little baby boy, "whom God gathered home, October 25th, 1886, when not quite three months old." They give this with the wish that the principal be kept intact, the interest to be used as the Trustees may direct. In making this contribution the parents wish to "glorify God, benefit the living, and honor the dead."

Oaty Elder Memorial Fund, \$1.

This fund was contributed by James T. Elder and wife in memory of their little son, who was born September 22nd,

1875, and died September 3rd, 1879. This was little Oaty's own money. His parents desire that it be kept sacred to his memory. The interest only to be used in support of the College, so that the dear little one may be represented forever in a good work.

Mary Jane Warford Memorial Fund, \$1.

This was contributed by Matilda R. Warford, in memory of her deceased daughter, who died September 1st, 1876, aged 16 years and 4 months. The principal must be kept sacred forever, in memory of the deceased, the interest only to be used in support of the College as the Trustees may direct.

Charley Auburn Jane Memorial Fund, \$1.

Contributed by his mother, Mary Swift, in memory of her deceased son, who was accidentally killed, February 15th, 1886, in the seventh year of his age. This was little Charlie's own money. His mother desires that it be kept sacred to his memory. The interest only to be used in support of the College, as the Trustees may direct.

Annie Messick Memorial Fund, \$2.50.

Contributed by Emanuel and Emily Messick, in memory of their deceased daughter, who after a short life of affliction went home to Jesus, on the second day of February, 1886, in the thirteenth year of her age, rejoicing in the hope of eternal life. This was Annie's own money. Her parents desire that it be kept sacred to her memory. The interest only to be used in support of the College, as the Trustees may direct.

Charles Gildersleeve Lanneau Memorial Fund, \$7.25.

Contributed by Professor John F. and Louise S. Lanneau, in memory of their little boy, who died in Lexington, Mo., August 9th, 1887, lacking just a month and a day of

being five years of age. This contribution represents the proceeds of the increase of a pet hen, which the little fellow owned and tenderly cared for while he lived. As the beautiful, glorified spirit of the dear little boy now rests in the arms of Jesus, the parents desire that his entire earthly estate shall be consecrated to the glory of God, and that it be kept sacred to the memory of the deceased, the interest only to be used in support of the College.

Devinna Memorial Fund, \$10.

Contributed by P. H. and Ada V. Devinna in memory of departed loved ones, as follows:

1. Mary F. Devinna, wife of P. H. Devinna, who was born in Morgan county, Mo., February 4th, 1850, and died in Sherman, Texas, December 16th, 1878, in hope of eternal life through Jesus Christ our Lord.

2. Lura Katie, daughter of P. H. and Mary F. Devinna, born in Morgan county, Mo., September 10th, 1874, died, June 4th, 1884.

3. John Walter, son of P. H. and Mary F. Devinna, born, August 18th, 1877, died, April 8th, 1879.

4. Forest Ray, son of P. H. and Ada V. Devinna, born, January 19th, 1883, died, August 25th, 1883.

5. Philip H., son of P. H. and Ada V. Devinna, born, October 29th, 1885, died, November 5th, 1885. It is the desire of the contributors that this fund shall be kept sacred to the memory of their deceased loved ones. The interest only to be used in support of the College, as the Trustees may direct.

Orren Clyde Bowman Memorial Fund, \$1.

This dollar was a present to the dear little babe from a friend, and represents his entire earthly possessions. His parents desire that the dollar shall be kept sacred to the

glory of God and the memory of their dear little one, the interest only to be used in support of the College, as the Trustees may direct. Deceased was the son of Rev. T. A. and Emma Bowman, was born December 6th, 1887, and died February 12th, 1888.

Annie Tate Memorial Fund, \$2.

Contributed by Mrs. T. W. Tate, in memory of her darling little Annie, who has gone home to live with God. She was born July 2nd, 1883, and died October 11th, 1884. The principal must be kept sacred to the memory of the deceased, the interest only to be used in support of the College.

Gilpin Lincoln Martin Memorial Fund, \$5.

This was a Christmas gift to the mother of the deceased Mrs. Dr. A. Martin, of Ashland, Mo. She sends it as a contribution to the Memorial Fund, and desires that it be kept sacred to the memory of her angel baby boy, whom God took to Himself on the 5th of June, 1885, when only four months and twelve days old.

Lewright Boardman Eaton Memorial Fund, \$25.

To be kept securely invested and sacred to the memory of the deceased, who was born August 4th, 1876, and died March 10th, 1877. This represents a gift of \$5 made to the little one by his Uncle Wm. Eaton. It was invested and managed by the father and mother, J. R. and M. L. Eaton, of Liberty, Mo., till it now amounts to \$25, which has been paid into the Treasury of the College and will be kept in the name of the deceased, the interest only to be used in support of the College.

Harold William Eaton Memorial Fund, \$6.35.

Son of J. R. and M. L. Eaton, of Liberty, Mo. Born April 13th, 1878; died August 31st, 1882. This money was

taken from the savings bank of the little one, just as he left it when he went away to live with God in heaven. His parents desire that it shall be kept sacred to his memory, the interest only to be used in support of the College.

Lillian Blakey Boyer Memorial Fund, \$5.

Darling Lillian died near Marshall, Mo., April 2nd, 1881, aged eight years and two days. This fund was contributed by W. L. and Rosa H. Boyer, in memory of their jewel who was ever a ray of sunshine wherever she went. This contribution is a part of her own money, and her parents make it because of their great love for her and because she had already learned to love and contribute to the William Jewell College. They trust that this little mite may be as the pebble cast into the lake, whose wavelets reach out unto the farther shore. May its influence reach the shores of eternity. The principal must be kept sacred forever in the name of the deceased. The interest only to be used in support of the College, as the Trustees may direct.

Edwin George Boulsher Memorial Fund, \$5.

Contributed by Rev. George Boulsher in memory of his deceased son, who was born in Gillingham, England, July 8th, 1868, and died in Columbia, Mo., in the fall of 1887. He gave his heart to Jesus a few years before his death. From his earliest childhood he was in the habit of "taking everything to God in prayer." One of his last audible prayers was—"O God, bless my dear father in his future work for Thee." He has gone to join his sainted mother in the Celestial City. The principal must be kept sacred to his memory, the interest only to be used in support of the College.

Henry Jones Memorial, \$5.

Contributed by James Jones, of Buckner, Jackson Co., Mo., in memory of his son, who was born August 6th, 1875,

and died August 24th, 1876. The principal must be kept sacred to the memory of the deceased, interest only to be used in support of the College. In addition to this, Brother Jones has dedicated a hive of bees to this memorial and will, from time to time, send the proceeds of same to be added to this sacred fund in memory of his dear little boy.

John Clarence Moore Memorial, \$5.

Contributed by James Mc. Moore, of Morgan county, Mo., in memory of his beloved son, who was born August 23rd, 1879, and died July 2nd, 1880. This fund must be kept sacred to the memory of the dear little baby boy, the interest only to be used in support of the College.

Jessie Laura Perkins Memorial, \$25.

Contributed by Jesse and Lucy Perkins, the parents, and Ann Mary, the only sister of this dear little child, who died in Carrollton, Mo., February 16th, 1874, lacking only two days of three years old.

"So soon our transient comforts fly
And pleasure only blooms to die."

The precious little one has gone with the Good Shepherd to live forever with the lambs of the upper fold. A part of this contribution was little Jessie's own money, which her mother has kept in sacred remembrance of her dear little one ever since her death; she now puts it into this living monument, where it must be kept forever in the name and to the memory of their dear little Jessie, the interest only to be used in support of the College.

Annie G. Ellis Memorial, \$100.

Contributed by Mrs. Ann M. Ellis, of Prairie Home, Cooper Co., Mo., in memory of her deceased daughter who fell asleep in Jesus on the sixth day of January, 1889, in the 21st year of her age. Her daily life was a beautiful illustra-

tion of the graces of the Spirit, and by her devout and consecrated Christian life and sweet resignation to the will of God, she has left an influence in her home and neighborhood which can never be forgotten. On her death-bed she expressed a desire that a part of her estate should be placed in the Memorial Fund; this contribution must, therefore, be kept sacred to her memory and securely invested in her name, the interest only to be used in the support of the College, as the Trustees may direct.

Sidney Pulliam Memorial, \$5.

Part of this was Sidney's own money, the balance his mother, Mrs. R. L. Pulliam, of Deer Park, Mo., sends in memory of her only little boy, whom God took to Himself on the 24th of August, 1888, when only 1 year, 6 months and 24 days old. The principal must be kept sacred to the memory of the deceased, the interest only to be used in support of the College, as the Trustees may direct.

Mollie Halley Memorial, \$25.

Contributed by Dr. and Mrs. H. J. Halley, of Blackburn, Mo., in memory of their eldest daughter, Mollie, who, after a lingering illness, died of consumption, June 16th, 1889, aged 27 years, 8 months and 27 days. She was converted at the age of sixteen, and joined the Baptist church; from this time until her death she was a teacher in the Sunday-school, whenever she was able to attend. She was a lovely Christian character, devoted to the Word of God, and for a number of years never a day passed that she did not read a portion of it. In her last sickness she never forgot her daily portion, and when too weak to read it herself, some friend, at her own request, read it to her, even up to the last day. She passed away in the sunlight of the Savior's presence, saying to her mother, with her last breath, "Oh, mamma,

we ought to love our Heavenly Father, who has prepared such a lovely home for us up there." A part of this was her own money, which on her death-bed she requested should be placed in the Memorial Fund of William Jewell College. The Fund must be kept sacred to the memory of the deceased, the interest only to be used in support of the College, as the Trustees may direct.

Ellen Long Memorial Fund, \$3.50.

Ellen Long, daughter of John W. and Fannie Long, of Warrensburg, Mo., who died September 24th, 1883, aged 21 months and 10 days. The above sum consists of a gold dollar keepsake of Ellen's and a two and a half dollar gold piece, added by her little brother Heber. It is desired by her parents that these pure gold keepsakes be used to perpetuate the memory of their dear little girl in the very best way, by aiding in preaching the Gospel through all time.

This fund must be kept sacred to the memory of the dear little girl, the interest only to be used in support of the College as the Trustees may direct.

H. Azola Price Memorial Fund, \$20.

Contributed by her aunt, Mrs. S. C. Eddins. This money saved by the contributions from premiums taken on embroidery she now gives in memory of her dear niece, Miss H. Azola Price, who died August 16th, 1882, at her home, near Arrow Rock, Saline Co., Mo. She was the daughter of Dr. William and Mary E. Price, and grand-daughter of Dr. John Sappington, of Saline county, Mo. Whilst it is sad to know we can never see her sweet, bright face again on earth, the comforting thought comes that she has only exchanged her beautiful home on earth for one far more beautiful, where she will enjoy the presence of her Savior and the sainted ones who have preceded her to that happy clime

where there is no sickness or death. She was a great sufferer, and although deprived of the privilege of going to church, she enjoyed reading the Word of God. She had a bright experience of her Savior's love and was baptized, July, 1880, in Howard county, by Rev. W. R. Painter, then pastor of Chariton church, which church she joined.

This fund is to be kept sacred to her memory, the interest only to be used in support of the College, as the Trustees may direct.

Benjamin J. Cook Memorial Fund, \$3.

Contributed by H. J. and M. J. Cook, of Odessa, Mo., in memory of their little boy who was born February 24th, 1881, and died August 20th, 1881. Principal must be kept sacred to the memory of the little one, interest only to be used in support of the College.

Thos. M. Cook Memorial Fund, \$3.20.

Twenty cents of this was little Tommie's own money, one dollar was contributed by his uncle, T. S. Cook, and two dollars by his parents, H. J. and M. J. Cook, of Odessa, Mo., in memory of this little one, who was born April 6th, 1885, and died August 24th, 1887. Principal must be kept sacred to the memory of the dear little boy, interest only to be used in support of the College, as the Trustees may direct.

Ella V. B. Merrell Memorial Fund, \$5.

This is contributed by Mrs. Jennie Merrell, in memory of her precious daughter, who fell asleep in Jesus, September 25th, 1888. She had given her heart to Jesus when a child, and was just in the beauty and grace of womanhood a rare and precious flower in her home and circle of many friends, when Jesus said, "Child, come home." This is given by a fond mother to the "Memorial Fund" with a re-

quest that it be kept sacred to the memory of the deceased, the interest only to be used in support of the College, as may be directed by the Trustees.

Martin Collins, Jr., Memorial Fund, \$40.

Second contribution of Martin Collins, of St. Louis, in memory of his deceased son. (See page 14.)

Cary Judson Mayfield Memorial Fund, \$5.

Contributed by Dr. W. H. and Ellen Mayfield, of St. Louis, Mo., in memory of their infant son, who was born March 11th, 1885, and died December 29th of the same year. In his death, his parents' hearts were espoused to the work of the Baptist Sanitarium for the alleviation of suffering humanity. Hearts of sympathy set vibrating by the Holy Spirit find joy in remembering their loved ones who are called home.

Gereldine L. Covington was born in Culpepper county, Va., Oct. 24th, 1824, was married to Abram H. Lewis, Jan. 15th, 1850; joined the New Salem Baptist church, Culpepper county, Va., and was baptized by Elder Barnet Grimsly,

in March, 1850. In October, 1857, she moved with her husband to Saline county, Mo., and joined the Baptist church at Miami. She was a constituent member of the Union Baptist church in Saline county. In 1864, they moved to Ray county, and joined the Baptist church at Richmond. In March, 1872, she moved with her husband to Bates county and joined the Baptist church at West Point.

She died in Bates county, Mo., April 11th, 1883, in the happy triumph of her Christian faith. William Carson, Memorial, \$10.

Contributed by Rev. W. R. Painter, of Paris, Mo., in grateful remembrance of the friend of his youth.

William Carson who was born in Frederick county, Virginia, May 14th, 1790, died in Palmyra, Mo., November 3rd, 1873; aged 75 years, 5 month and 19 days. He joined the Baptist church at Winchester, Va., and was baptized by Rev. George C. Sedwich the first Sunday in August, 1819. The

same year he bade adieu to home and loved ones, and came to Missouri and settled in Pike County where he taught school for three years. He there united with the Peno church, Rev. David Biggs pastor, fifteen miles from his residence, being the nearest church. In a short time he and a few others organized a church in New London. In 1823 he aided in the organization of Salt River Association. On the 2nd day of October 1823, he was married in St. Louis, to Miss Alethea Seely. In 1824 he was appointed by President Monroe, Register of the United States Land Office, located at Palmyra, to which place he moved in 1825. He served fourteen years in the Missouri Legislature, four years in the Senate. For twenty-seven years he lived on his farm six miles from Palmyra, and his membership was then with the Bethel church near his home. In 1862 he moved back to Palmyra, and his membership was with that church at the time of his death. In 1825, he organized the first Sunday-school in Palmyra, and from that time until the day of his death, he was an active and efficient Sunday school worker. For years he stood up in defense of Bible and Missionary Societies and Sunday-schools, in open opposition to many of his brethren. His firmness, mingled with the spirit and meekness of Christ admirably fitted him for the great struggle of those times, when the Missionary and the Anti-Missionary elements in the churches were arrayed against each other. He was a constituent member of the General Association, when organized in 1834. He was also a member of the convention that met at Boonville in 1850, to locate William Jewel College and drew up its Charter and a petition to the Legislature for an act of incorporation. He was one of the original incorporators of the College and a member of its Board of Trustees until his death. From 1864 to the time of his death, he was retired from the more active

duties of business life, but was no less faithful to the Master's cause. The Sabbath found him in the house of God, and the prayer meeting was his delight, and he was never too weary to perform his part of the duties of the hour. He was the friend and counsellor of his pastor, and upheld him, not only with his prayers, but also by his means. The Bible was his daily delight, and he feasted on the fat things it contained. His house was the resting place of those who preached the Gospel; here they always found a welcome and untiring attention from him and his devoted wife. The Sabbath preceding his death he attended three meetings for the worship of God, the last on earth. On Monday following at 4 o'clock P. M., without a struggle, and seemingly without pain, he gave up this life to dwell with that Savior he had served so faithfully here.

"Servant of God, well done ;
Rest from thy loved employ ;
The battle fought, the victory won,
Enter thy Master's joy !"

This contribution must be sacredly invested by the Trustees as a permanent fund ; three-fourths of the interest to be used in support of the College, and the other fourth to be added each year to the principal.

Scholarships.

Benjamin Ely, Memorial Scholarship, \$1000.

Contributed by Ambrose K. Ely, of New York City, in memory of his "Uncle Benjamin," who was born in the city of New York, Dec. 3rd, 1792, and was reared near Livingston, N. J. Soon after reaching his majority the "young man went West," and settled in Frankfort, Ky., where he was married in the year 1822, to Miss Eliza Bell, who died June 10th, 1833, leaving him five children, Ann Maria, Lewis Bell, John Steel, Smith and Margaret Rebecca, all of whom except Lewis B. have gone to heaven.

In the year 1837, he moved to Missouri, and was married to Mrs. Martha W. Higgins, of Palmyra, Mo., who died in Carroll county, Mo., Sept. 10th, 1853, leaving him four children, Robert C., Frank, Mildred and Emma. Frank and Emma have gone to meet father in his home above. The other two, Robert C. and Mildred, are pressing on with hearts and hopes set heavenward.

He was converted when a young man, and joined the Baptist church at Buck Run, Franklin county, Ky., of which he was a consistent member till he moved to Missouri. In August, 1839, when only ten Baptists could be found in Carroll county, he joined that IMMORTAL TEN in organizing the First Baptist church of Carrollton, of which he was a pious, faithful and efficient member till his death, which occurred in Carrollton, Mo., Feb. 19th, 1860.

He was for several years one of the Judges of the Carroll County Court, and enjoyed the confidence and esteem of all who knew him.

He left to his children the priceless legacy of a good name and spotless character, which they esteem of greater value than any earthly treasure.

In consideration of this contribution it has been agreed with Ambrose K. Ely, the contributor, that any of the male descendants of the said Benjamin Ely, deceased, shall have the right to send one student every year (provided that only one student shall enjoy this privilege at any one session), to the William Jewell College, free of tuition, until the youngest of the great grandsons of said deceased shall have reached the age of twenty-one years; after that, this scholarship shall be controlled by the Trustees of William Jewell College, and shall be kept forever sacred to the memory of the deceased, and known and named as the "Benjamin Ely Memorial Scholarship."

Everingham, Memorial Scholarship, \$500.

Contributed by Dr. J. and Mary R. Everingham, of Butler, Mo., in memory of their two deceased children:

Thomas Willie, their only son, was born at West Point, Ia., August 12th, 1861, and died at St. Louis, Mo., August 20th, 1873. He suffered for several months with disease of the bone, of such a character that the best surgeons in Philadelphia, Cincinnati and St. Louis, advised amputation of his leg at the hip joint, as the only hope of his recovery. Although fully aware of the danger attending the operation he insisted that it be performed, which was done on the 19th of August, and he died from the shock the following day.

Brown, shall have the privilege, as long as they live, to send one student every year to the William Jewell College, free of tuition, as stated in the Scholarship. After the death of the these, this Scholarship shall be controlled by the Trustees of William Jewell College but will be kept forever in memory of the deceased children, and known as the Everingham Memorial Scholarship.

Nannie M. Ambrose, Memorial Scholarship, \$500.

Contributed by Joseph S. Ambrose, of Springfield, Mo., in memory of his beloved wife, who was Miss Nannie Conley, of Boon county, Ky., to whom he was married February 25th, 1866.

She was converted when about 19 years of age and joined the Big Bone Baptist church in Boon county, Ky., and was baptized by Rev. James S. Kirtley. She was a devoted wife and mother, an earnest and consistent Christian, faithful and true in all the relations of life, beloved by all

who knew her. James M. Browning, Memorial Scholarship. \$500.

Contributed by Mrs. Mary A. Browning, of Plattsburg, Mo., in memory of her deceased husband, who was born in Kentucky, July 29th, 1825, and died in Platte county, Mo., May 7th 1881. After the death of Sister Browning, this Scholarship shall be controlled by the Trustees of the College, but it shall be entered on the books and known forever as the James M. Browning Scholarship and shall be kept sacred to his memory.

Martha Herndon Ely, Memorial Scholarship. \$1000.

Contributed by Lewis B. Ely, of Carrollton, Mo., in memory of his beloved wife, who was born in Goochland county, Va., Oct. 14th, 1831. She moved with her parents, James and Ann R. Herndon, to Carroll county, Mo., in the year 1841. She was married to Lewis B. Ely, September 30th, 1849.

In October, 1852, she was converted under the preaching of Rev. Thomas S. Allen, of Chariton county, Mo., and joined the First Baptist church of Carrollton. She was devoted to her church and Sunday-school, in which she was a faithful and efficient teacher. She was a true friend to God's ministers and loved to entertain them at her home.

She was deeply interested in Christian education. In consideration of this contribution, any one of the children of the deceased shall have the right to send one student every year to the William Jewell College free of tuition, until the youngest of grand sons shall reach the age of 21 years, provided that not more than one student shall enjoy the benefit of this scholarship at any one session of the College.

After the youngest of the grandsons of the deceased shall reach the age of 21 years, the Scholarship shall be controlled by the trustees of William Jewell College, but it shall be named and known forever as the "Martha Herndon Ely Memorial Scholarship."

Ely, of St. Louis, Mo., in memory of her husband, who was born in Carroll county, Mo., August 8th, 1842, died in New York City, February 14th, and was interred at Carrollton, Mo., February 17th, 1890. He had been a member of the Third Baptist church for fifteen years, and was a deacon for four years before his death. He was a constant attendant at the weekly prayer-

meeting and was always ready to speak a word for his Master. God's cause was ever uppermost in his affections. He was one of the Trustees of William Jewell College and a warm friend and supporter of the work of Ministerial Education. He was also deeply interested in the efforts of the brethren to found our Baptist Sanitarium and Ministers' Aid Society.

His family life was most beautiful. A beam of joy always came when he entered his home where God was always magnified. He was an example of Christ-like manliness and tenderness combined. The text of his funeral discourse, preached by his pastor, Rev. J. P. Greene, D. D., expresses all that needs to be said about him: "He was a good man and full of the Holy Ghost and of faith."

In consideration of this contribution, Mrs. Clara D. Ely shall have the privilege, as long as she shall live, or until her youngest son shall reach the age of twenty-one years, to send any one she may choose every year to the William Jewell College, free of tuition, on the terms specified in the certificate of Scholarship. At the death of Mrs. Clara D. Ely, the scholarship shall be at the control of the Trustees of the College, but will stand forever on the books of the College in the name and to the memory of Frank Ely.

Bequests.

Mrs. Rebecca P. Yates' Bequest, \$2,208.05.

Sister Yates was born in Woodford county, Ky., May 10th, 1821, and died in Clay county, Mo., Nov. 25th, 1885. She was next to the youngest of a family of thirteen children, only two of whom survive her. Mrs. Jane Gill, of Liberty, and Mrs. A. D. Blythe, of Platte county. For nearly fifty years she had been an humble and devout Christian and a zealous Baptist. She was a noble, kind-hearted, generous woman, a friend to the poor and needy and a liberal contributor to the support of her church and pastor, always abounding in every good work.

For the last sixteen years of her life she was a widow, having been the wife of William Yates, of Clay county, Mo., who died in the year 1869. She left no children to mourn her loss, but a host of friends and neighbors will ever cherish a fond remembrance of her motherly kindness and benevolent deeds. This donation is entered with the memorial funds on the books of the College, and will be kept sacred to the memory of Rebecca Price Yates, and securely invested in her name, the interest only to be used according to the instructions in her will "for the educating of the young ministers of the Baptist denomination who may attend that institution."
