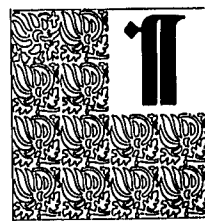

Though come what may tomorrow.

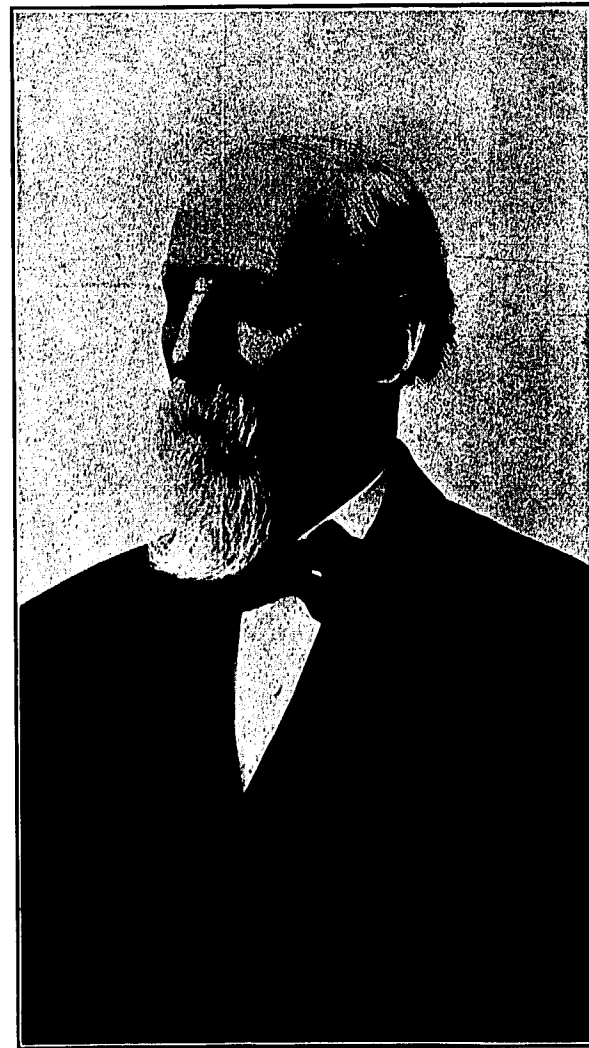
Full well we know the song is light,

And keep the music ringing!

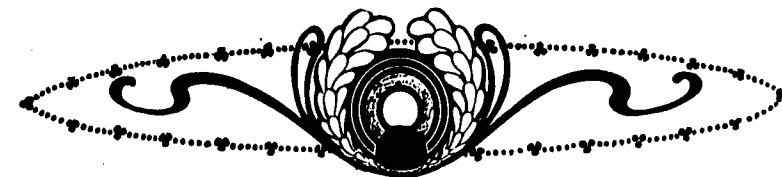
The sunlight tips the foamy wave,

SALUTATIONS

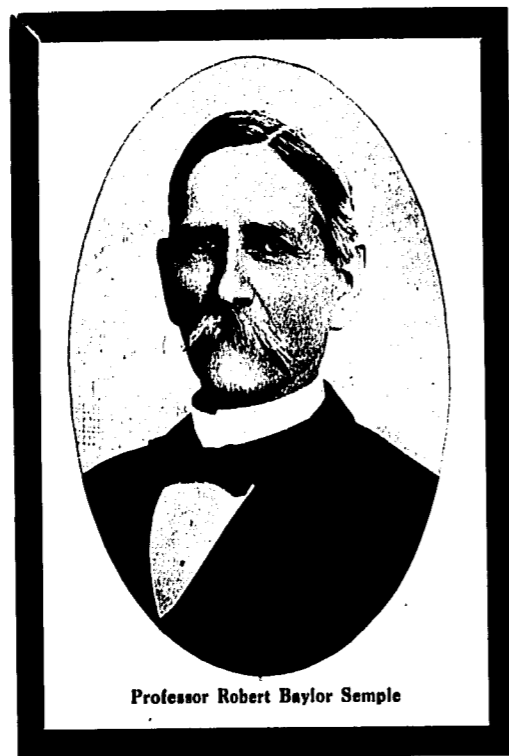

In Memoriam

On Feb. 8, 1909, Professor Robert Baylor Semple passed into the life beyond, dying as he had lived, at peace with God and man. He was born among the sunlit hills of old Virginia, in the days when those giant men were born whose spirits clashed in the fierceness of the Civil War. However, under the fostering care of that strong man of God, William F. Broaddus, his school-boy days passed quietly enough and he went on up to the classic walls of the University of Virginia.

Here in 1861 he heard the call of fife and drum and marched away, a lad of nineteen, under the Confederate flag, which he followed for four years through cold and hunger, glory and defeat until the end at Appomatox Court House.

After the war, this veteran soldier at the age of twenty-three, turned again to his books and taught school until 1868, when he was called to the professorship of ancient languages in William Jewell College. Here "for forty years, following in the footsteps of the Great Teacher he went in and out before the students of this college, with the calm philosophy of a Socrates, the stern virtue of an old Roman and the gentle heart of a little child."

During these four decades he stood in his place, did his duty day in and day out, raised a family of five sons and one daughter in honor and the fear of God, and came to his bed in peace, wishing only, since his work was finished and he must go, to go quickly.

Since his death, tributes of loving appreciation have come from his students scattered in all parts of the earth, and though he has gone from us in the lives of these men his spirit still lives and works.

To the Great Ones.

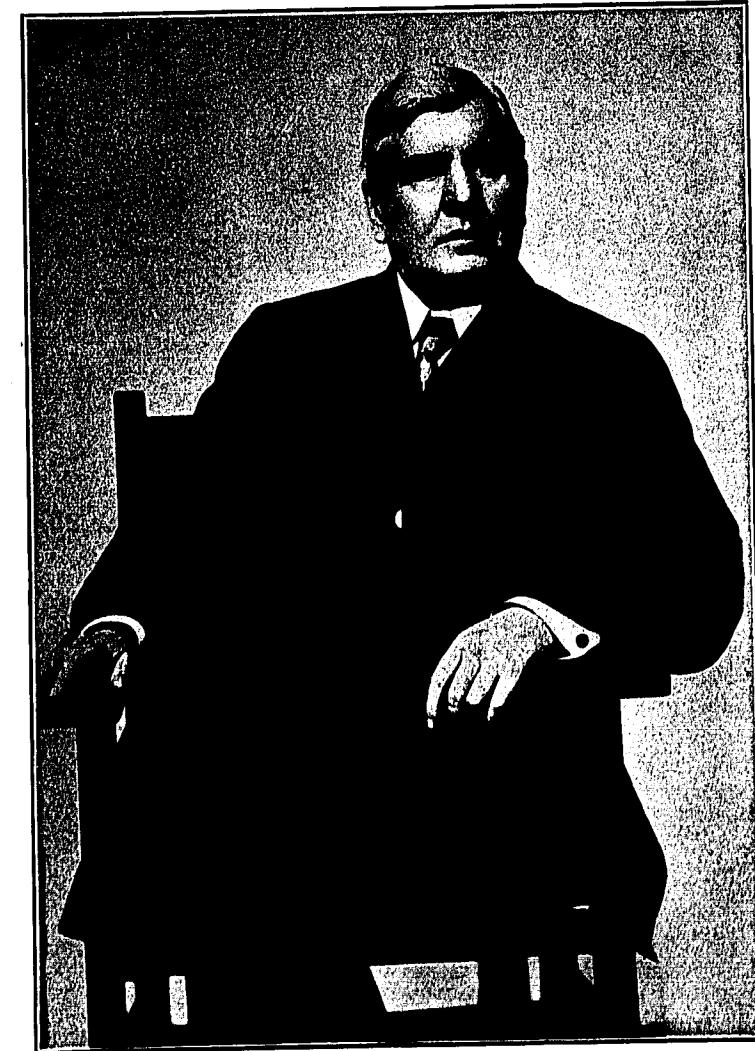
Oh Men evolved through years of painful climbing;

Didst Learning knock and find an open door.

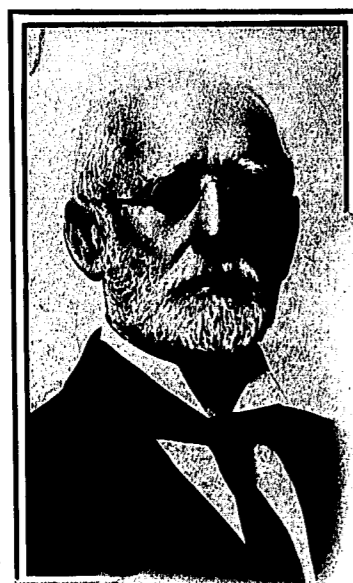
And so to they who builded for the Ages,

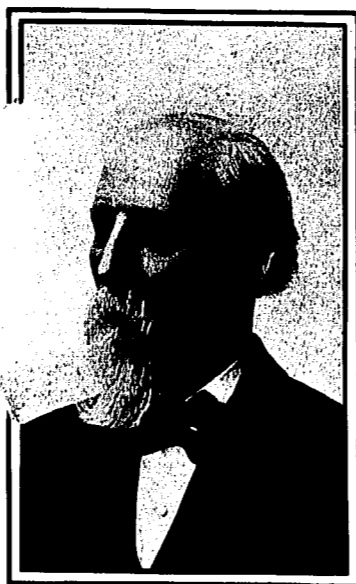

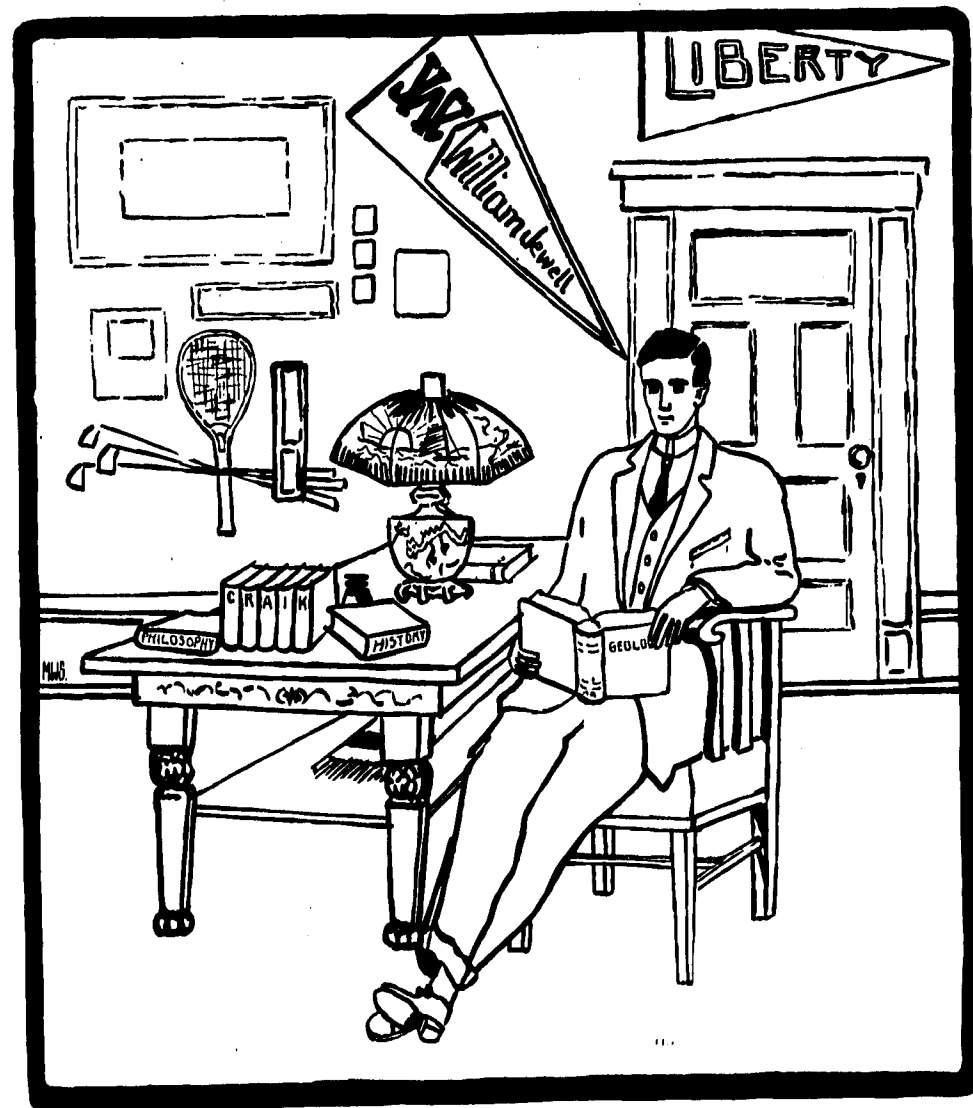
The Chapel Roll Call.

The officers of this organization composing an executive board consist of representatives elected by the various classes and a president elected by the student body.

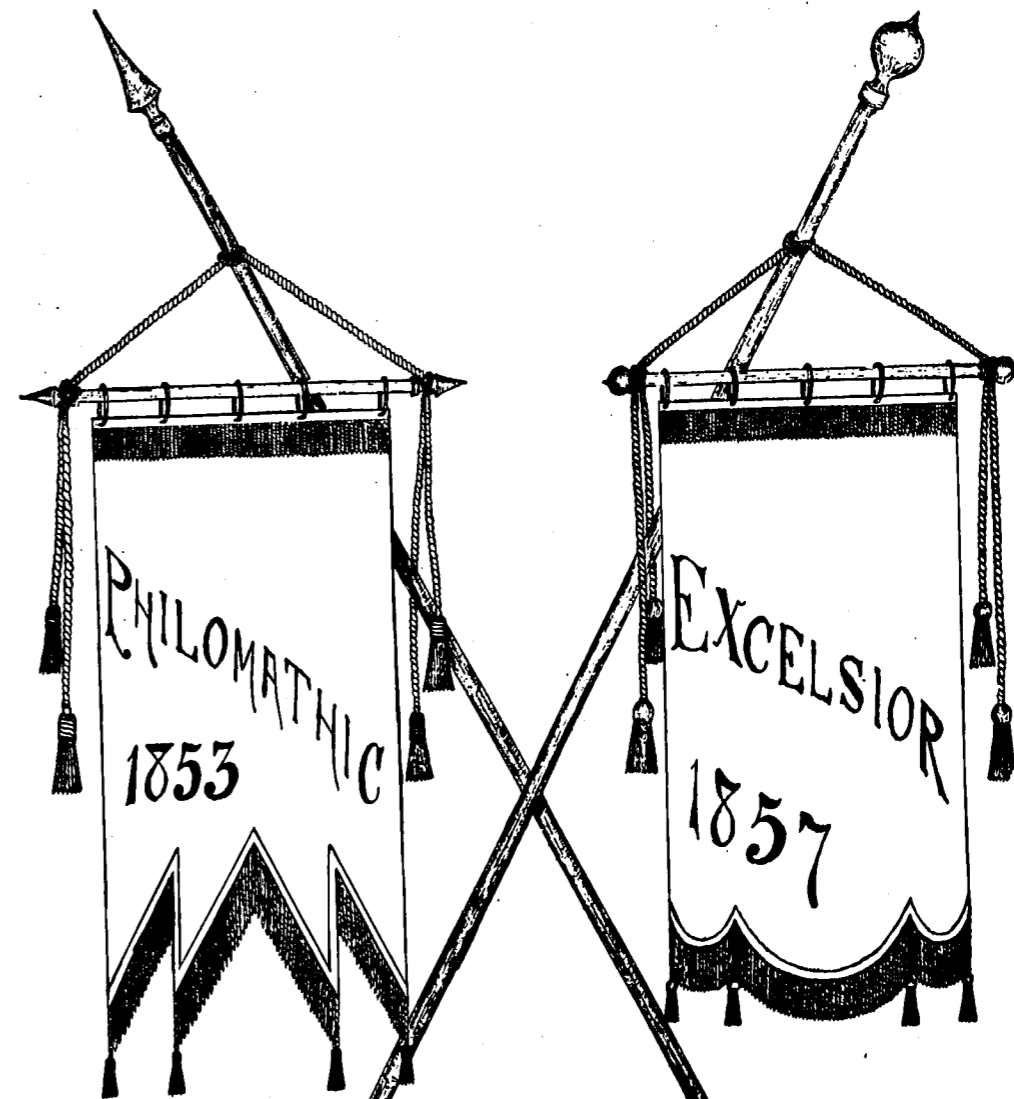

"Well, Lilly, you are a 'Daisy.' Don't you think you can sew on 'Batchelor's Buttons?'"

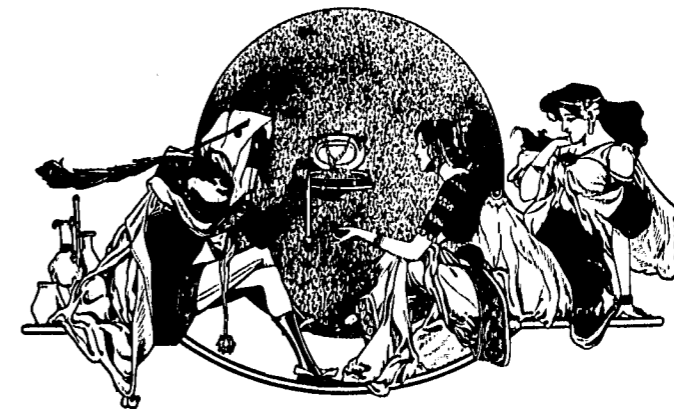
