The William Jewell Memorial Library, dedicated September 22, 1965.

Increased efficiency was the goal for the staff of the new Memorial Library this year. Under the direction of Dr. Herman Wilson, the library was permanently installed in its new building and several innovations were added, including a Xerox copying machine, a microfilm edition of *The New York Times*, and a *New York Times Index*.

The library employs eight full-time adults and about twenty-five students. Eventually, four professionally trained librarians will be employed. The most notable of the three collections kept in the library, the Spurgeon Collection, has brought to the campus visitors and letters from all over the world. This year the collection was recatalogued and made available to the students themselves. By means of its increased book budget, the library was able to provide new books and services throughout the year.

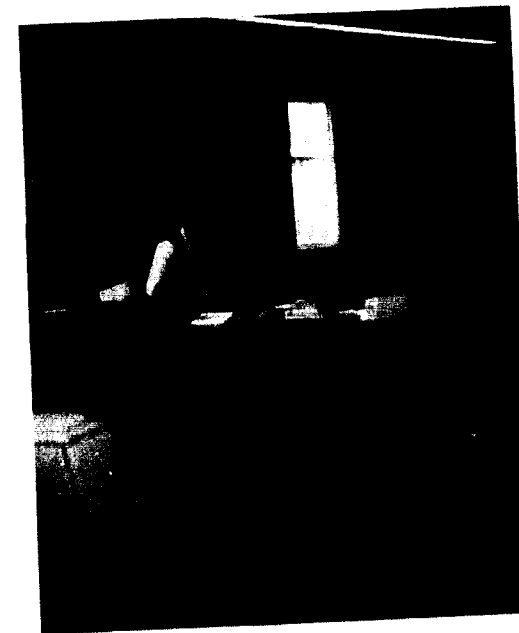

PRESIDENT'S HOME

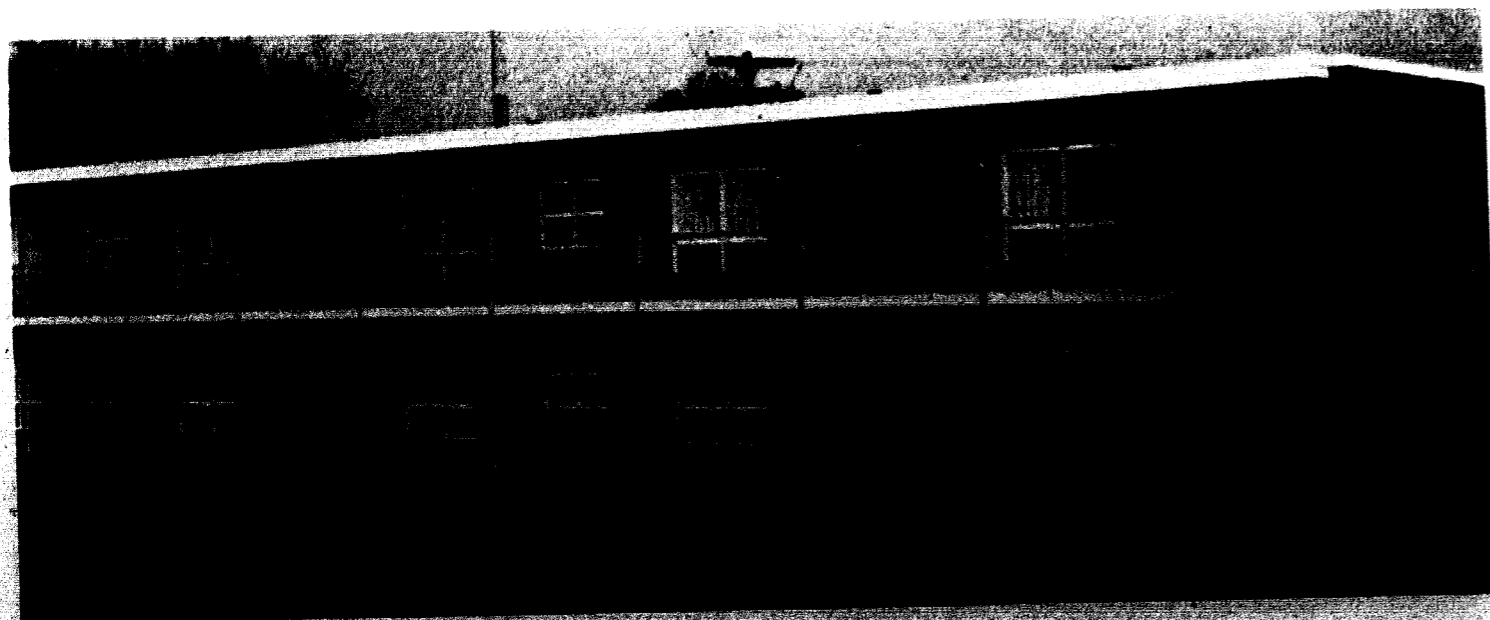

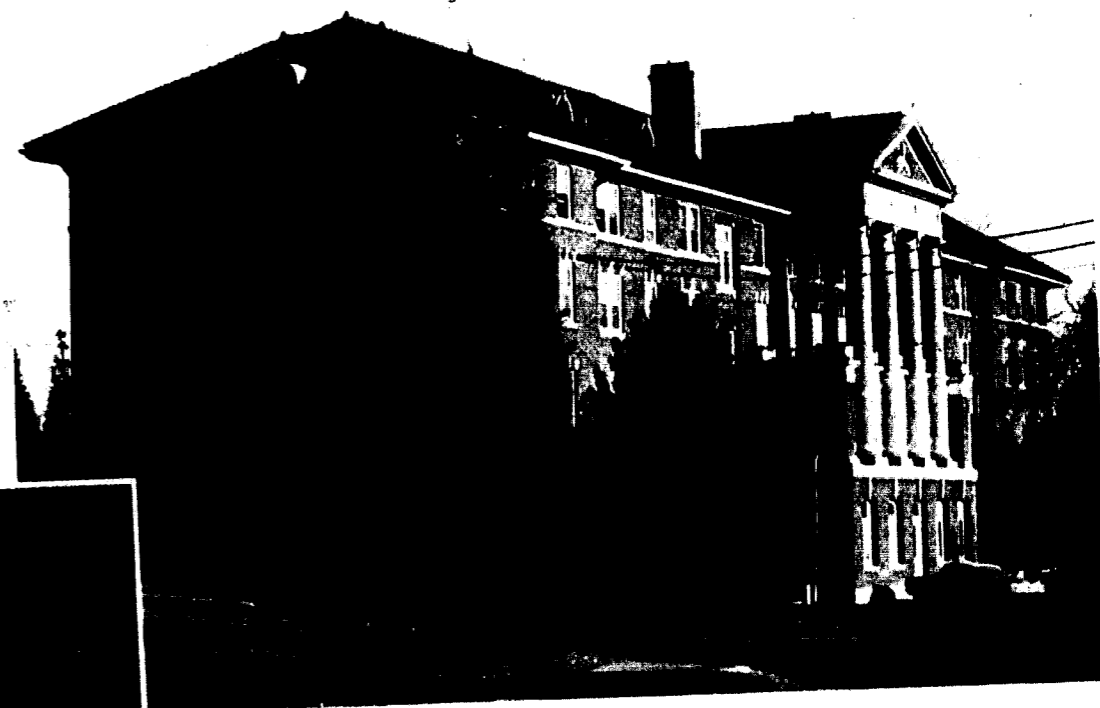

The students in red get things done. Guided by President Jim Simmons and Secretary-Treasurer Betsy Weeks, this year proved to be one of innovation and change for the Student Senate. After their fall encampment at the Lake of the Ozarks in which they discussed school problems with representatives of the faculty and administration, the Senate came back to school with many new ideas made into reality. Their most notable achievement was the new chapel attendance-checking system. Relatively small as well as big projects received their attention: Mississippi Street was made one way; two student representatives were placed on the College Disciplinary Board; and a Student Conduct Board was made functionary in order to handle problems not serious enough for the Disciplinary Board. The Senate also purchased new uniforms for the Cheerleaders, distributed the Student Directory before Thanksgiving, sponsored an intramural College Bowl this spring, and sent delegates to a student government conference in Quincy, Illinois.

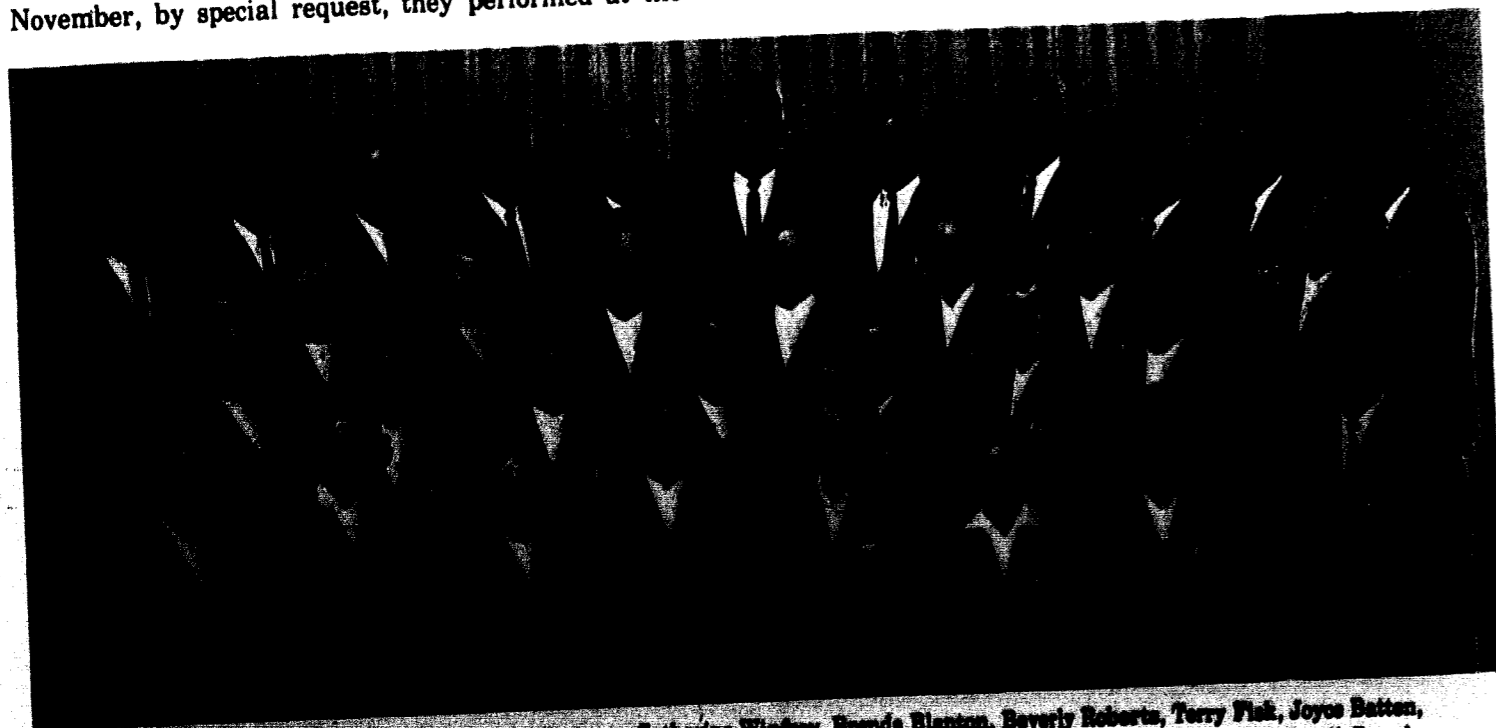

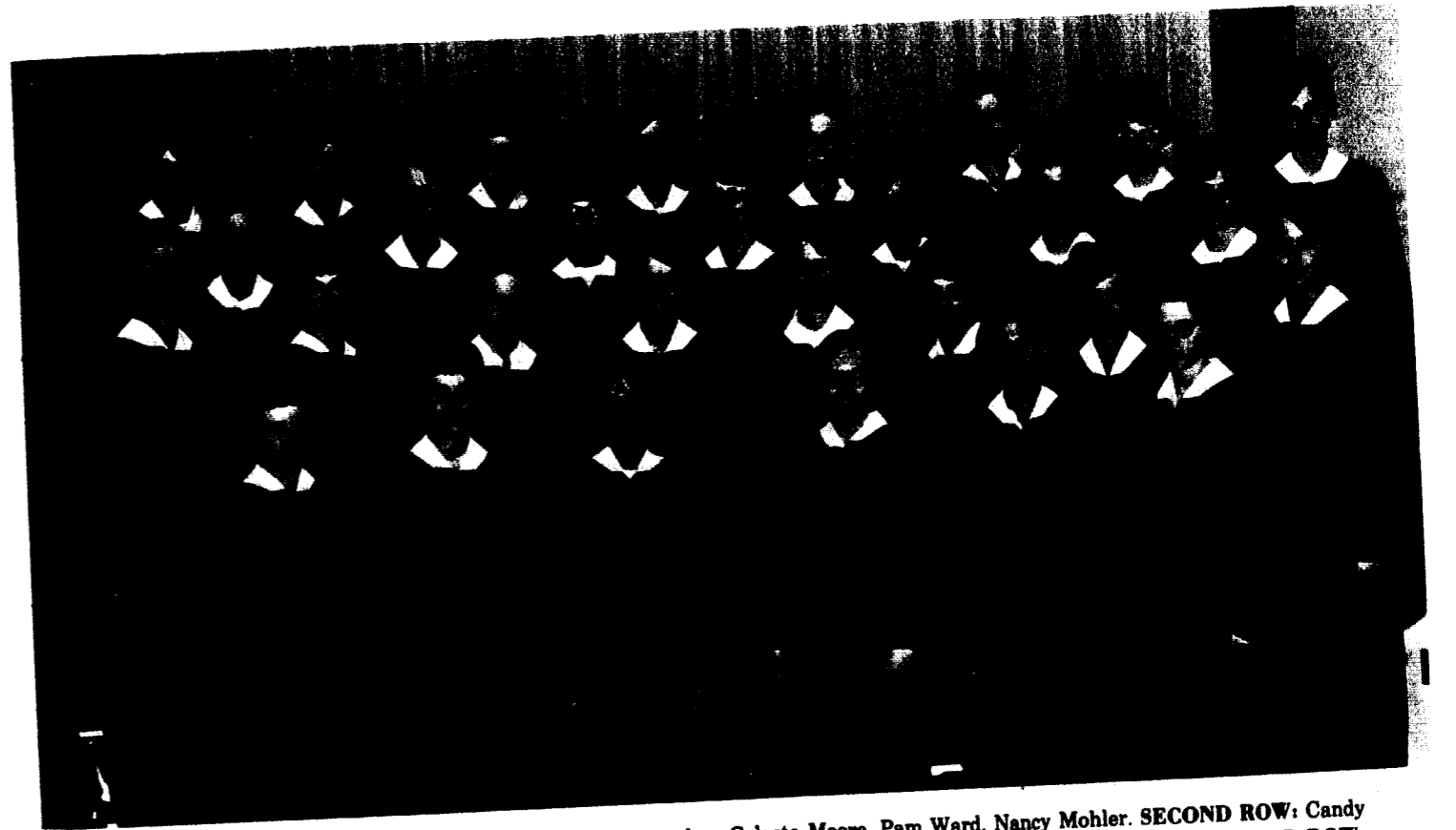

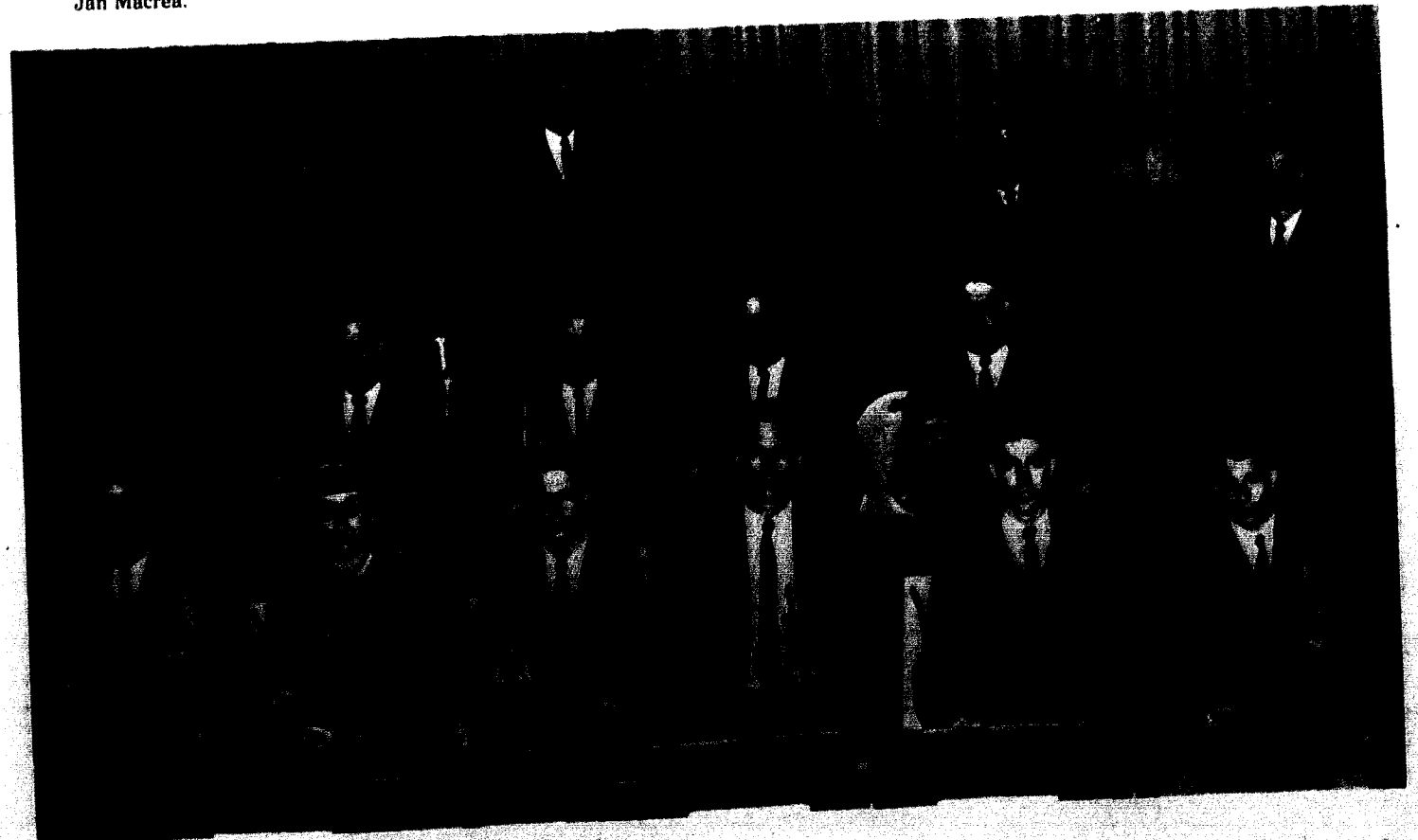

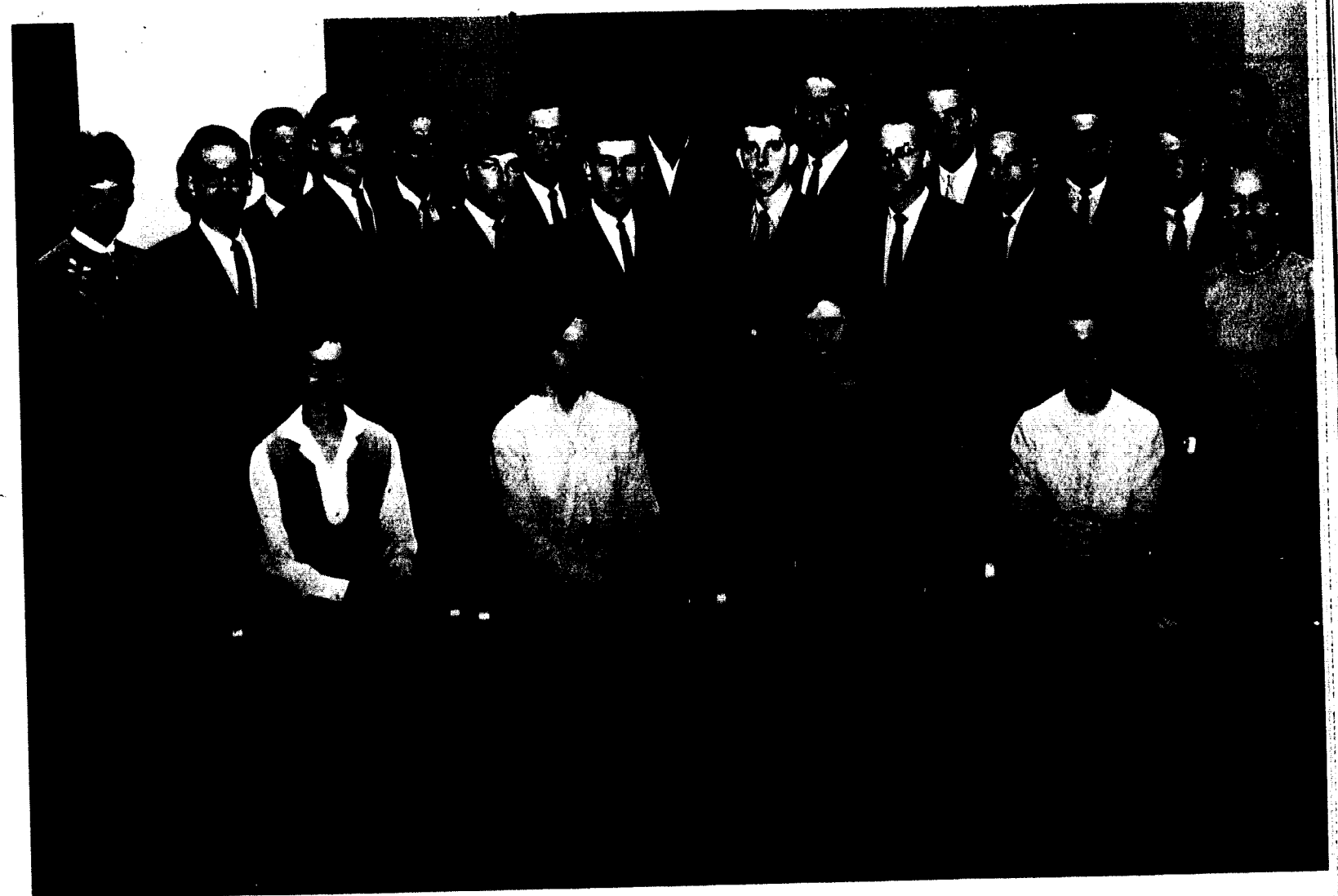
SIGMA TAU DELTA

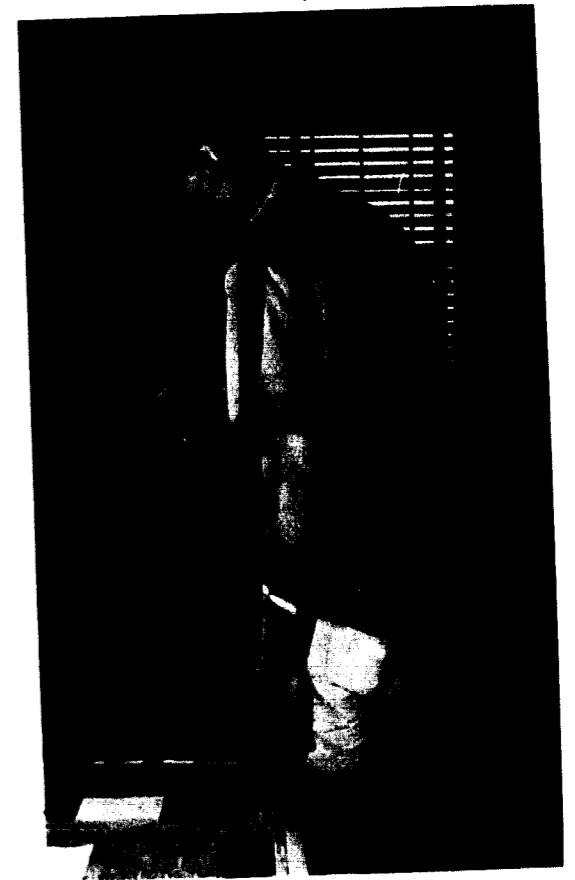

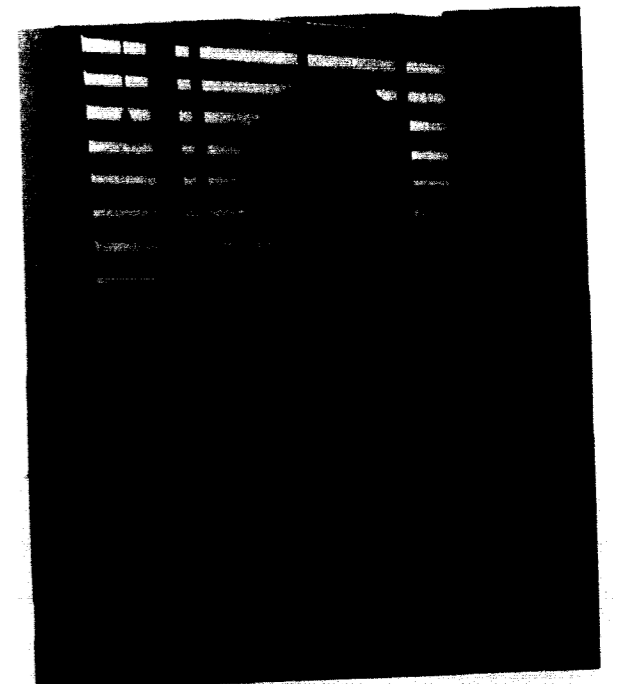

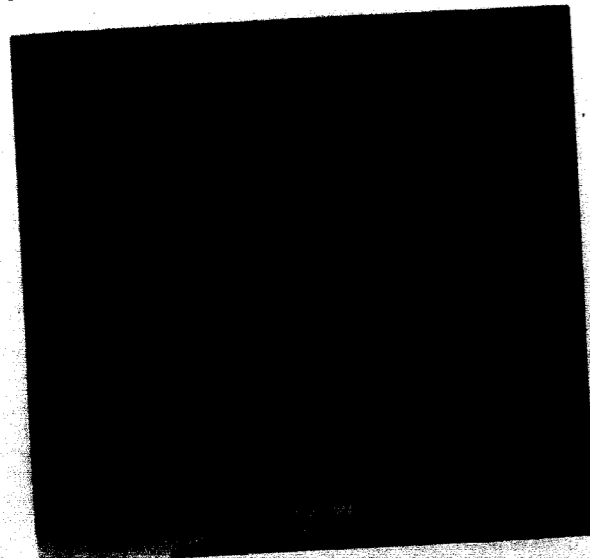

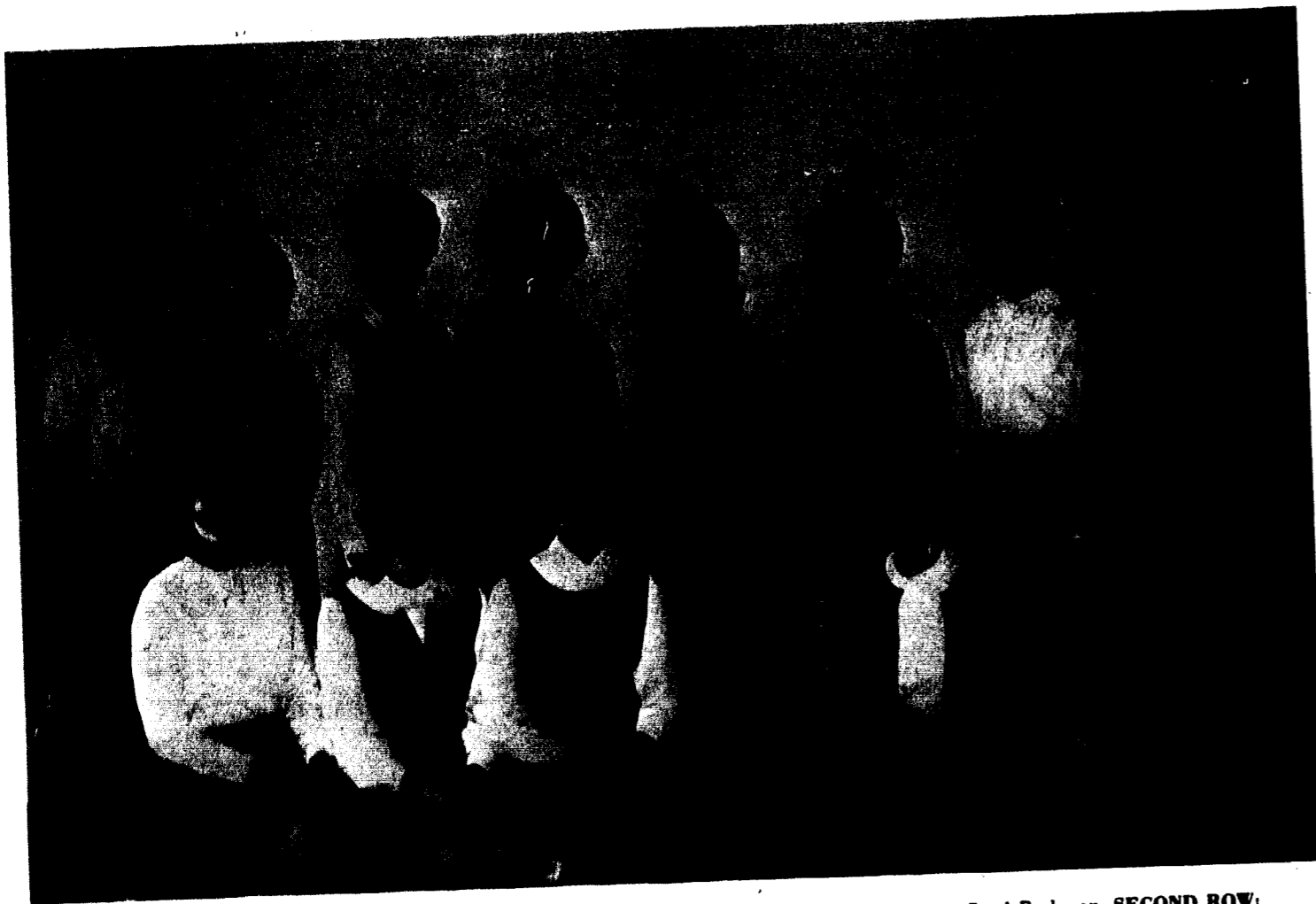

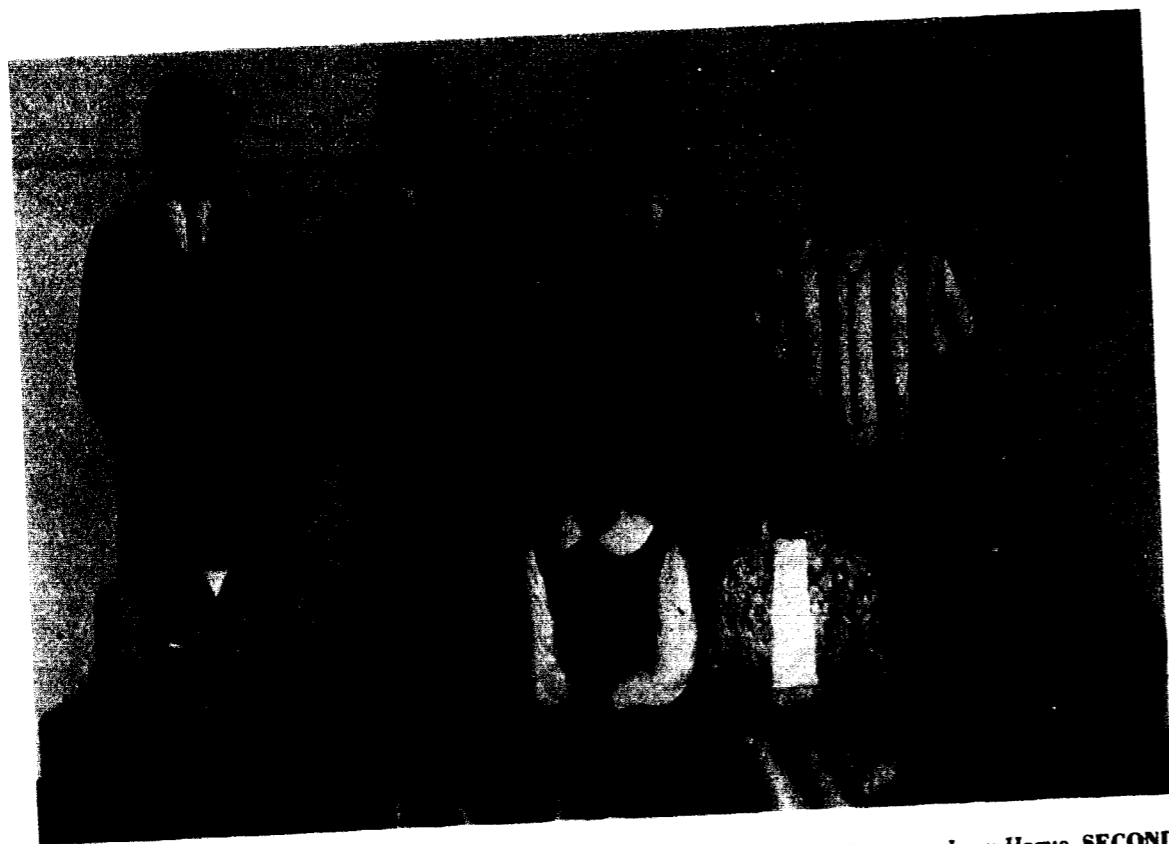

Colonel Alexander Doniphan

Besides being instrumental in the locating of William Jewell College in Liberty, Alexander W. Doniphan is most famous for his military achievements during the Mexican War. In 1846 the men of the First Regiment of Missouri Volunteers chose Doniphan as their commanding colonel. In what has become known as "Doniphan's Expedition," Colonel Doniphan led these men in a year-long, self-sustained march covering 3,000 land and 2,000 water miles, culminating in a victory at the Battle of Sacramento in 1847. On another side of the monument pictured above appears a phrase which sums up his versatility: "An orator, jurist, statesman, soldier, and a Christian."

Each year the William Jewell student body confers its supreme honor on the senior man and woman who exemplify the qualities of leadership, integrity, and potential success epitomized by Liberty's most famous citizen. Through an election in which the votes are weighted according to the four classes, the students not only recognize these persons for their accomplishments on the campus but express a confidence that they will achieve their respective goals after graduation. This year the title of "First Lady of the Campus" was bestowed upon Sue Ellen Williams of Dexter, and that of "Colonel Alexander Doniphan" upon Charles Michael Scrogin of Independence.

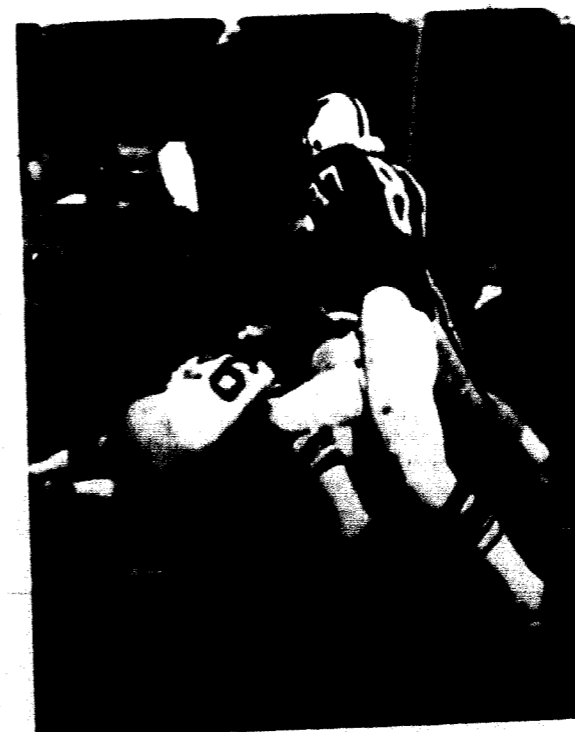

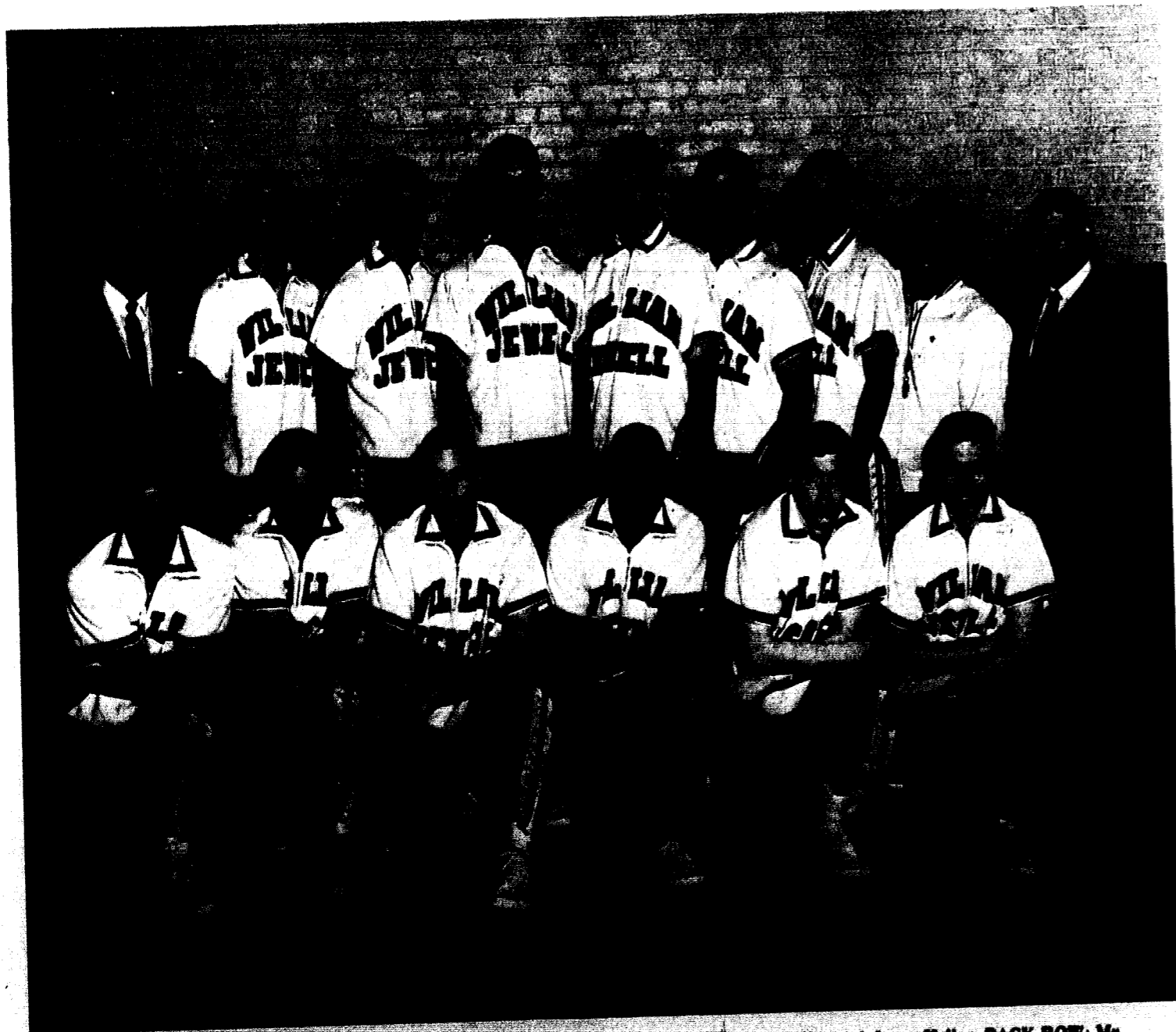
Second Place in M.C.A.U.

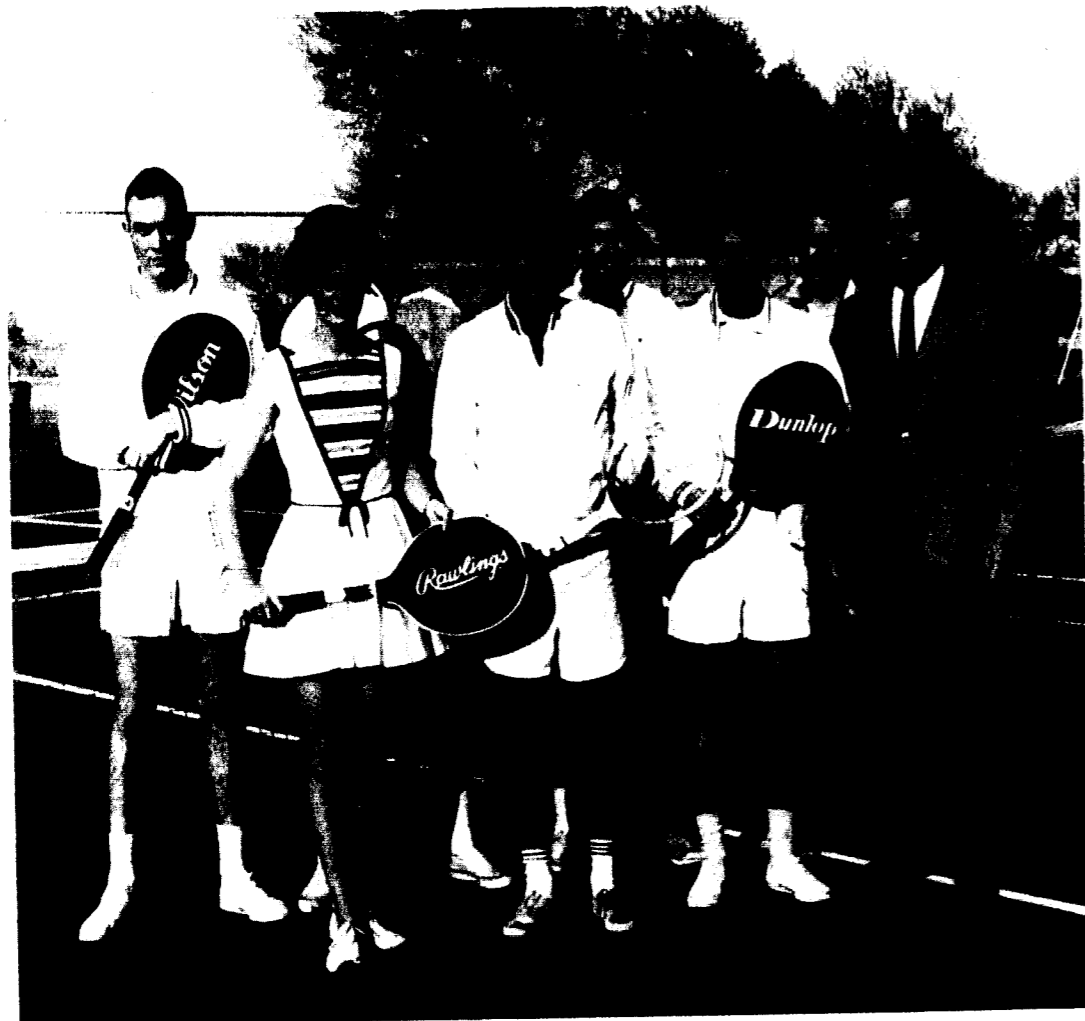

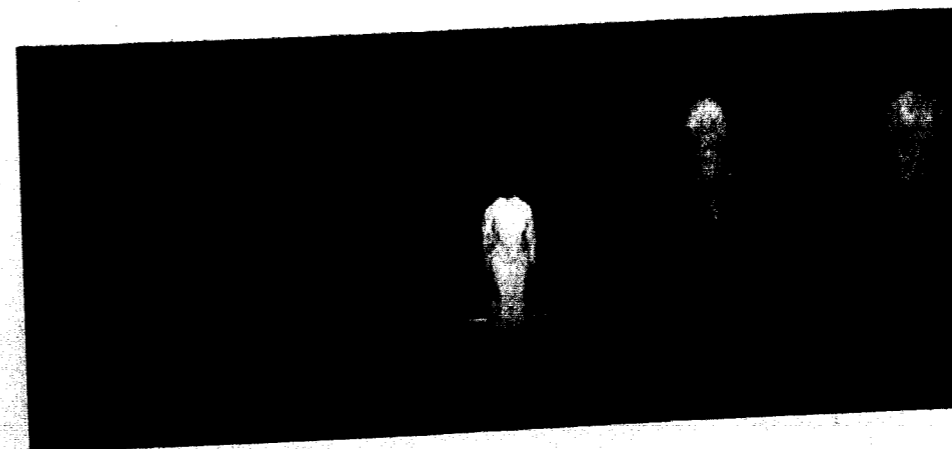

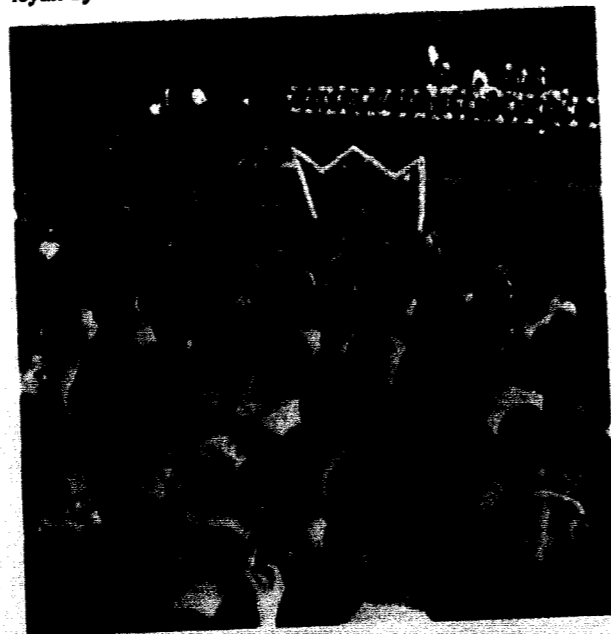

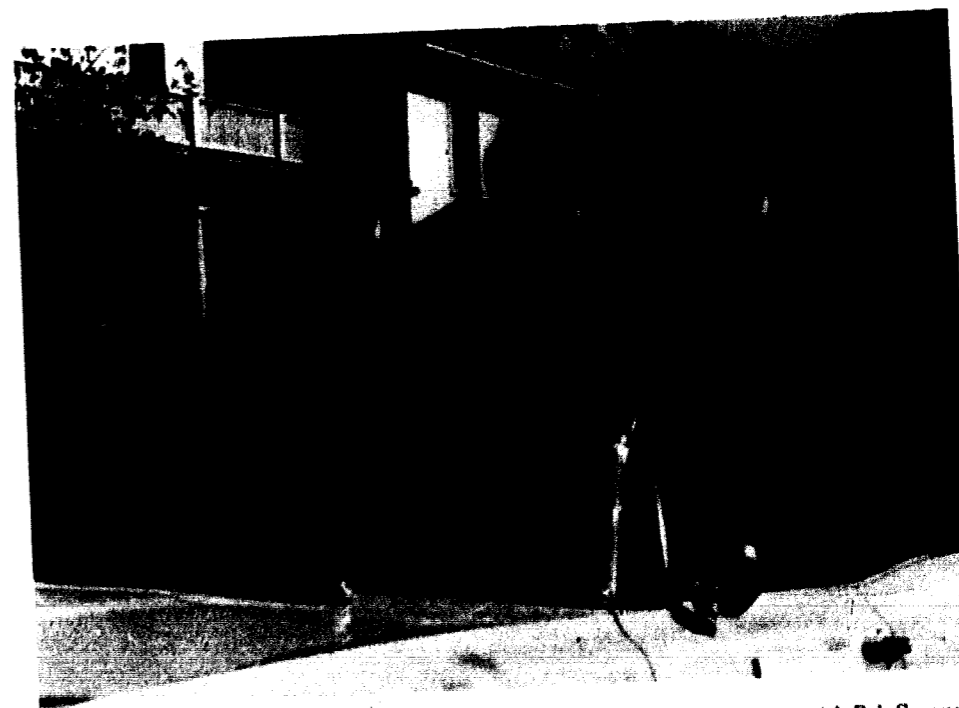

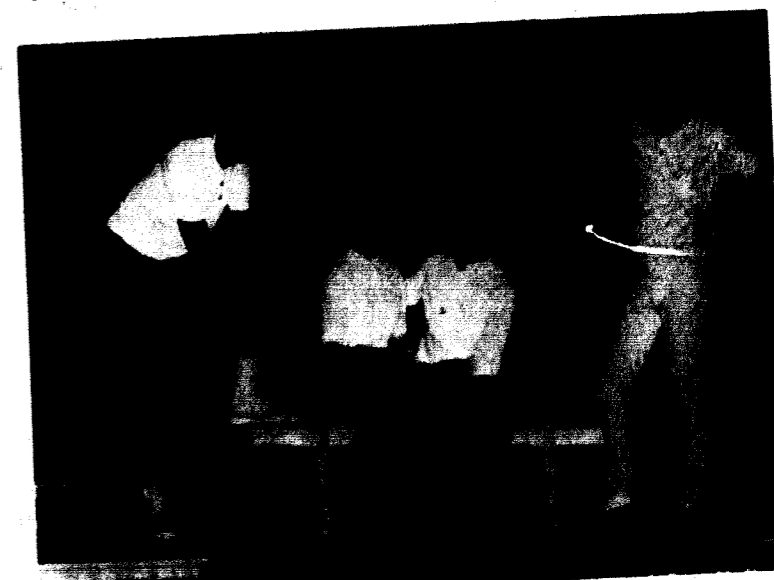

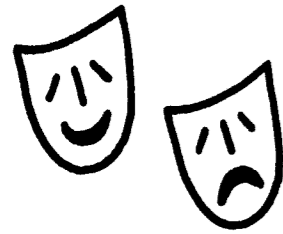

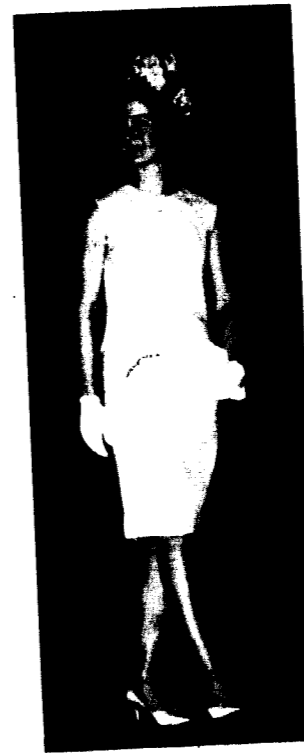

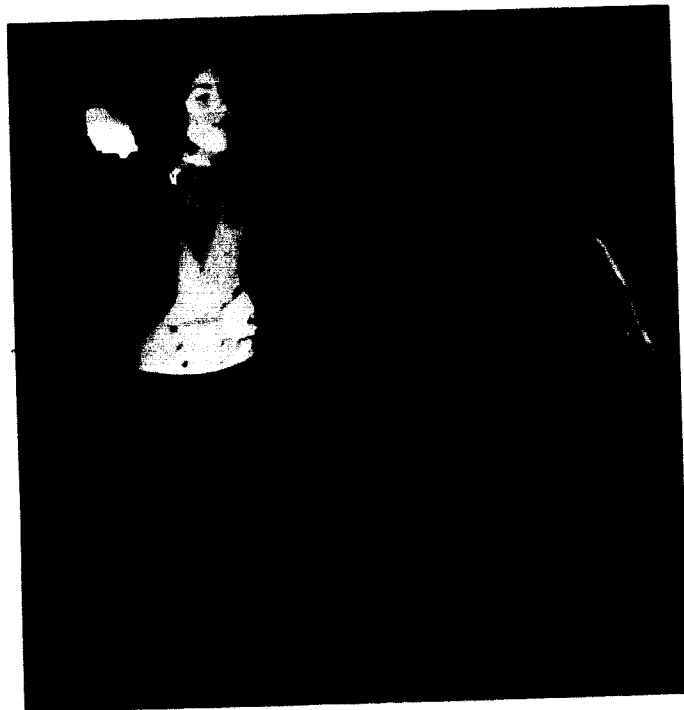

Features Dedication of New Memorial Library

A significant milestone was reached on September 22, 1965, when the traditional formal convocation was combined with the dedication ceremonies for the new library. Principal speaker for the occasion was Dr. Vernon R. Alden, President of Ohio University, who received the honorary degree of Doctor of Laws. A special guest at the event was the past president of the college, Dr. Walter Pope Binns, who delivered the dedicatory prayer.

After the convocation portion of the program in Gano Chapel, the platform personnel marched to the portico of the library, followed by approximately one thousand students and visitors. Under sunny skies, the

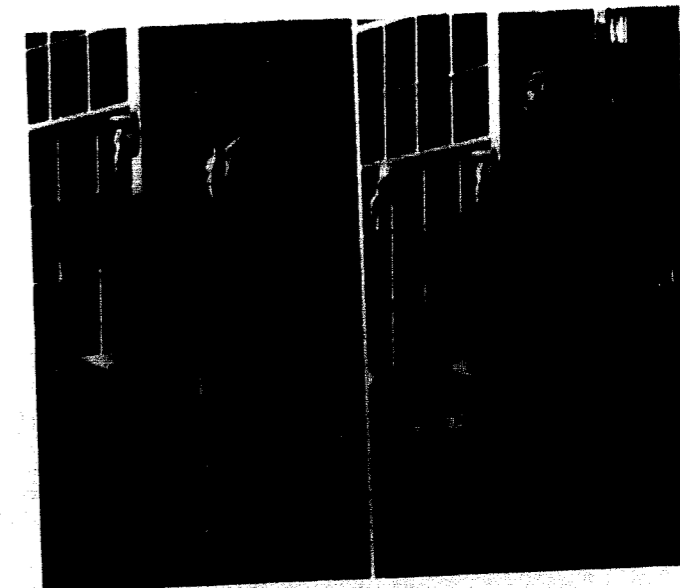
crowd witnessed the concluding ceremonies of the dedication, after which many responded to the invitation of a guided tour of the building conducted by members of the library staff.

Constructed over a period of eighteen months, the building stands on the spot formerly occupied by the Carnegie Library which was erected in 1908. The west portion of the new building was completed first and on January 5, 1965, students and faculty collaborated in moving more than 80,000 volumes from the old to the new structure. Shortly afterward came the demolition of the old building and the beginning of construction on the east portion of the new edifice.

LA SERVA PADRONA (The Maid-Mistress)

Although performed over two hundred years ago, "The Maid-Mistress", a one-act opera by the Renaissance composer Pergolesi, found a receptive audience at Jewell this year. Presented by the Music Department and directed by Mr. Phillip Posey, the story is centered around Serpina, a maid who plots a clever scheme to marry her employer, Uberto. The story is not intended to be ab-

solute, especially when Serpina passes Vespone, the mute-servant, as a fierce captain who forces Uberto to consent to the marriage. Its essential truth, however, is still true today: when a clever woman designs to trap a man, she is usually successful - if the intended chooses not to run, which is the fate of Uberto, who alas is the symbol of all "captured" males.

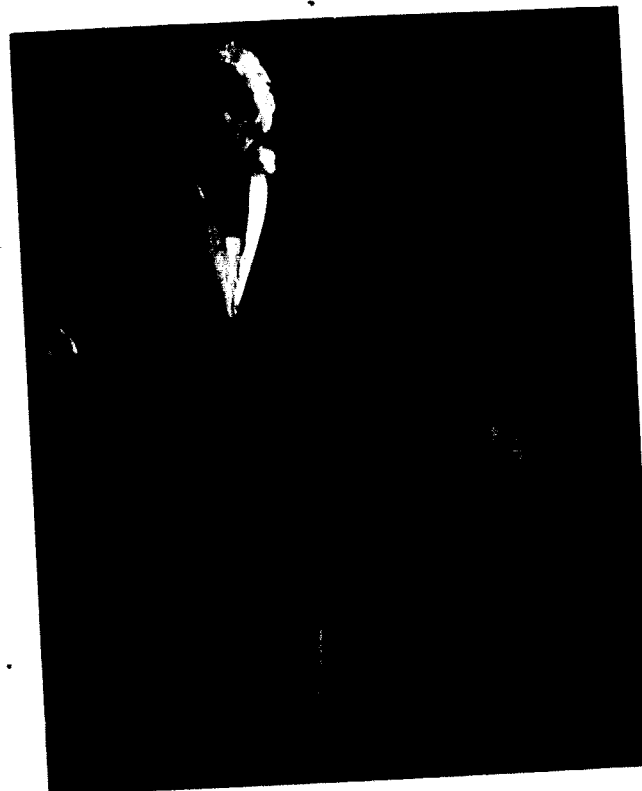

Trying to get her sick father (Jim Boardman) into the house, Helen Barton pleads, "Dr. Maguire's here to give you something for your pain, Papa."

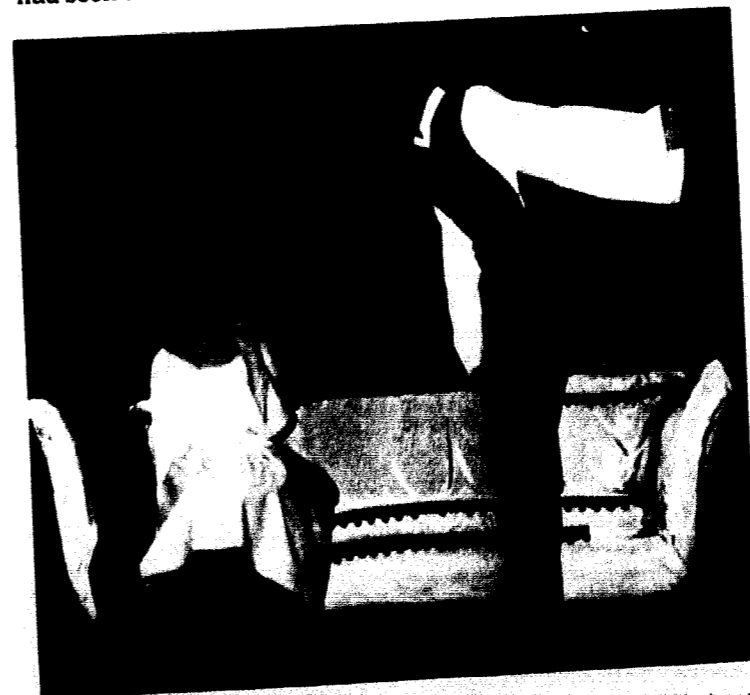

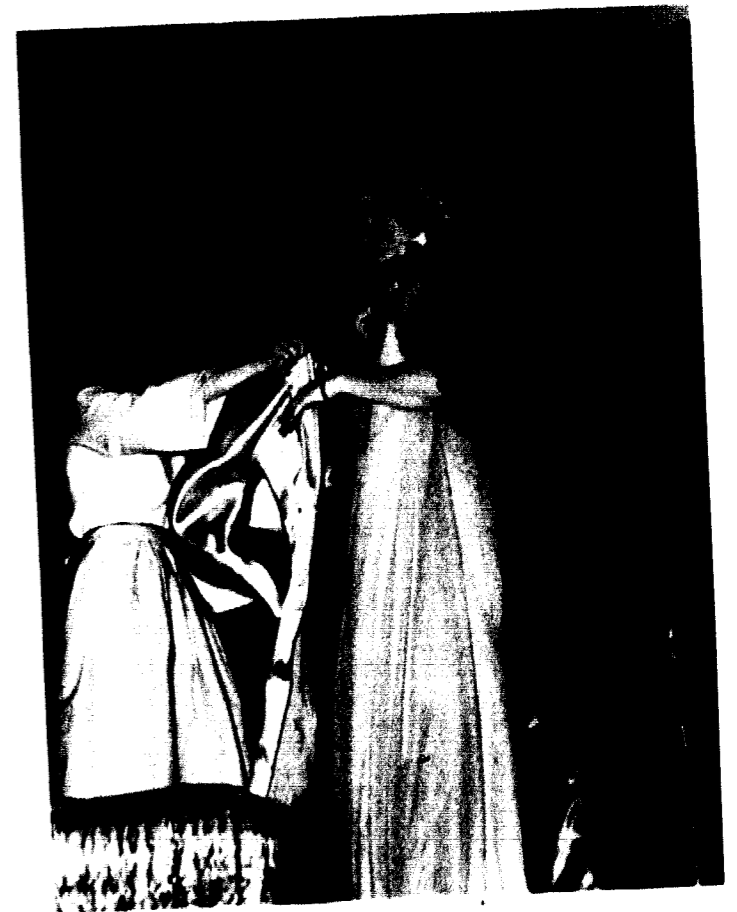

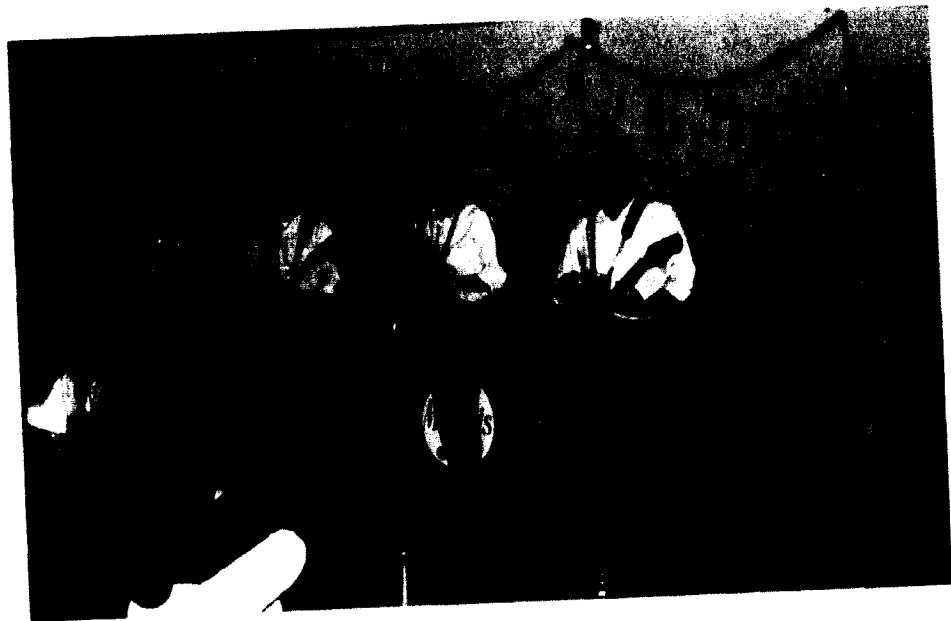
