Annual Achievement Day Activities were held February 23 and 24 with Mr. Hugh Scott as the keynote speaker.

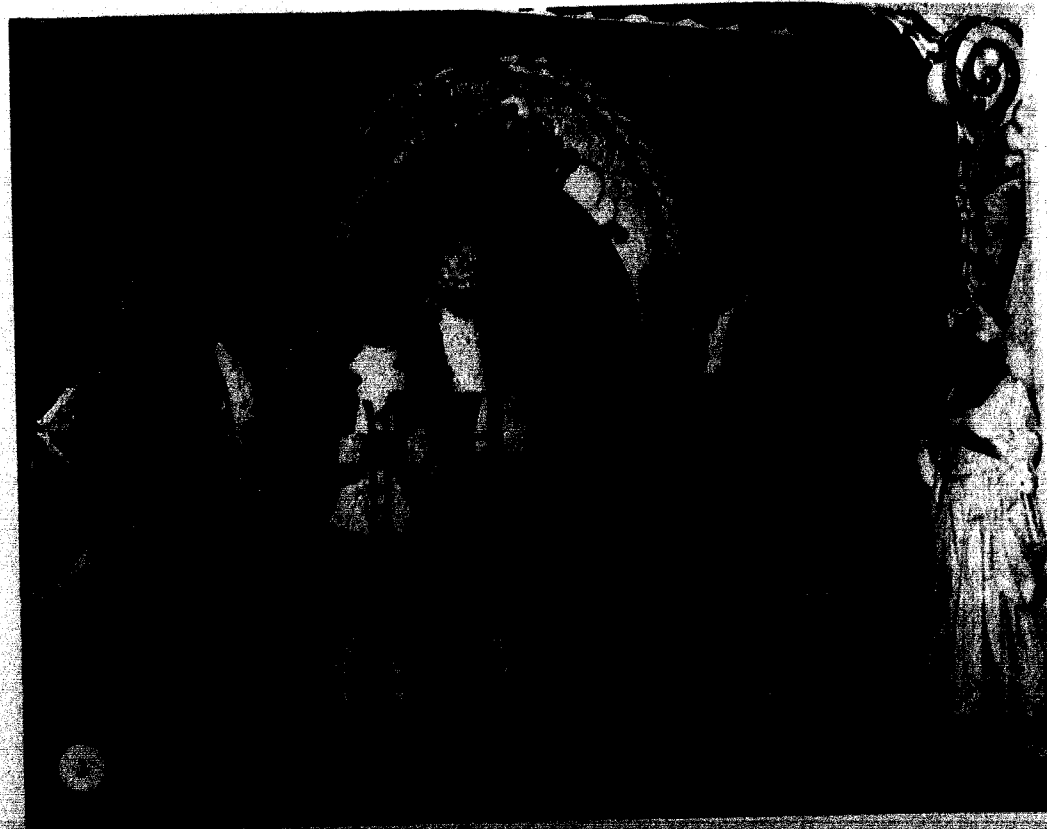
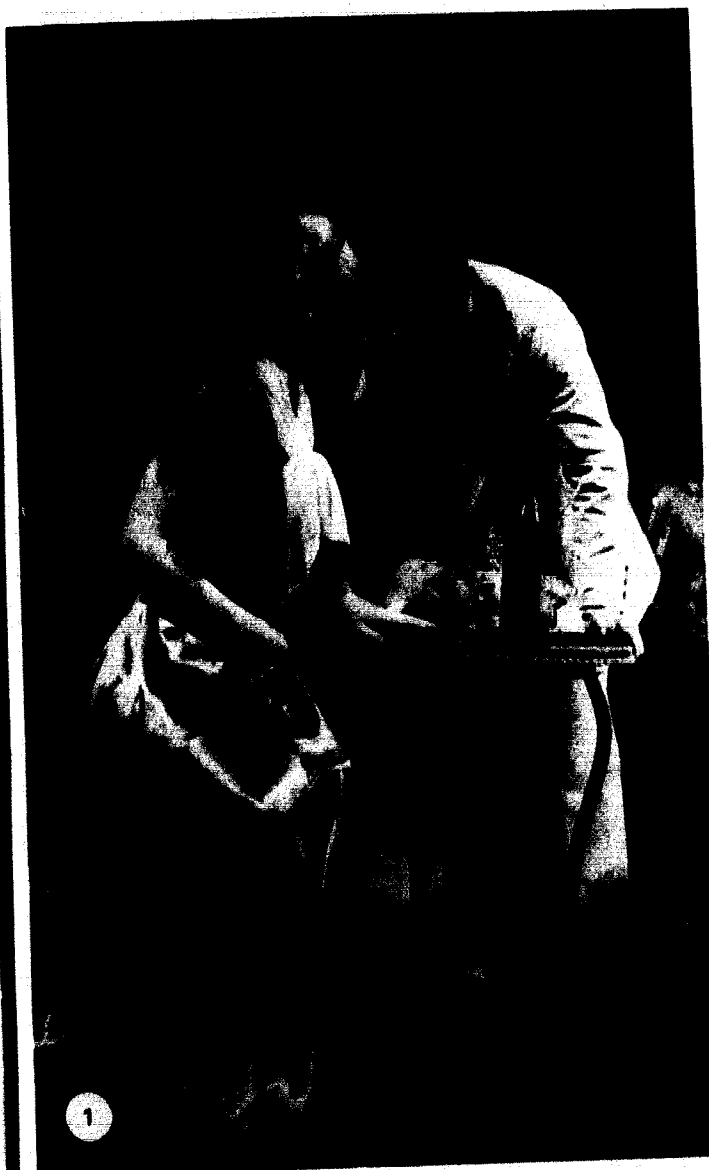
The alumni were hosted by students through meetings and luncheons on Wednesday. That evening there were forums with the individual alumni and students

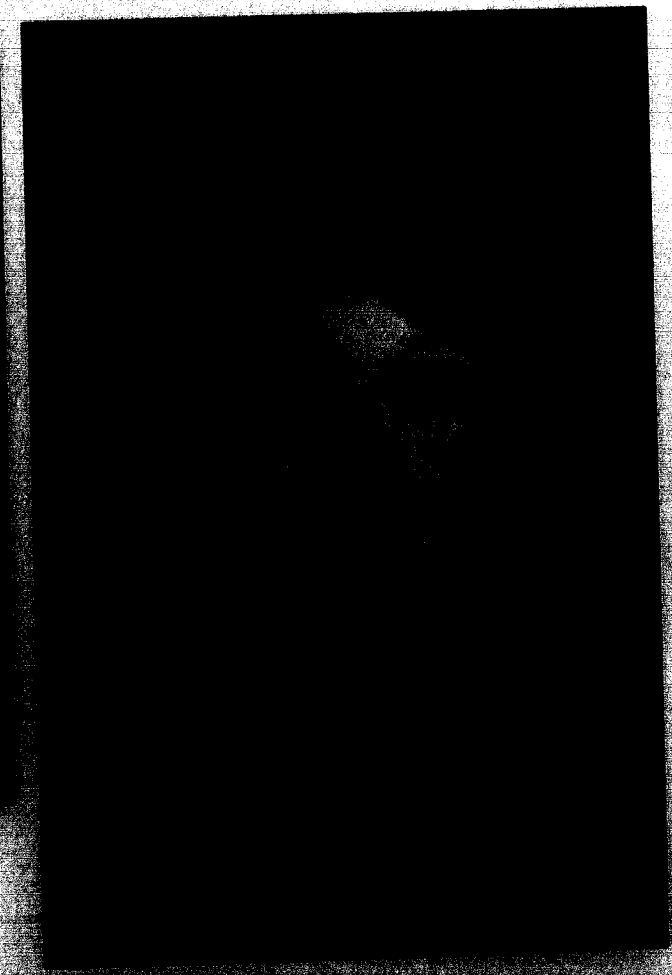




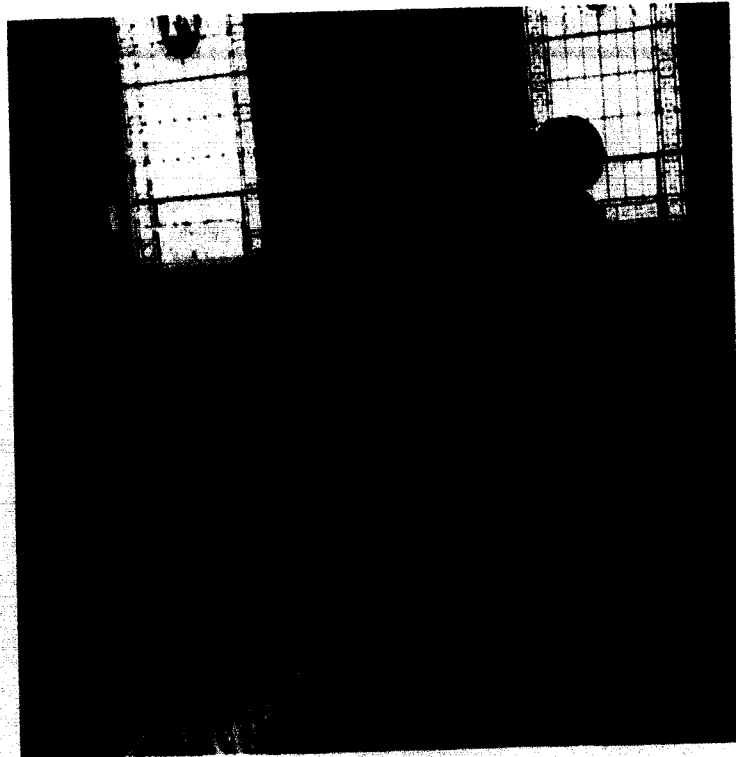
FINE ARTS

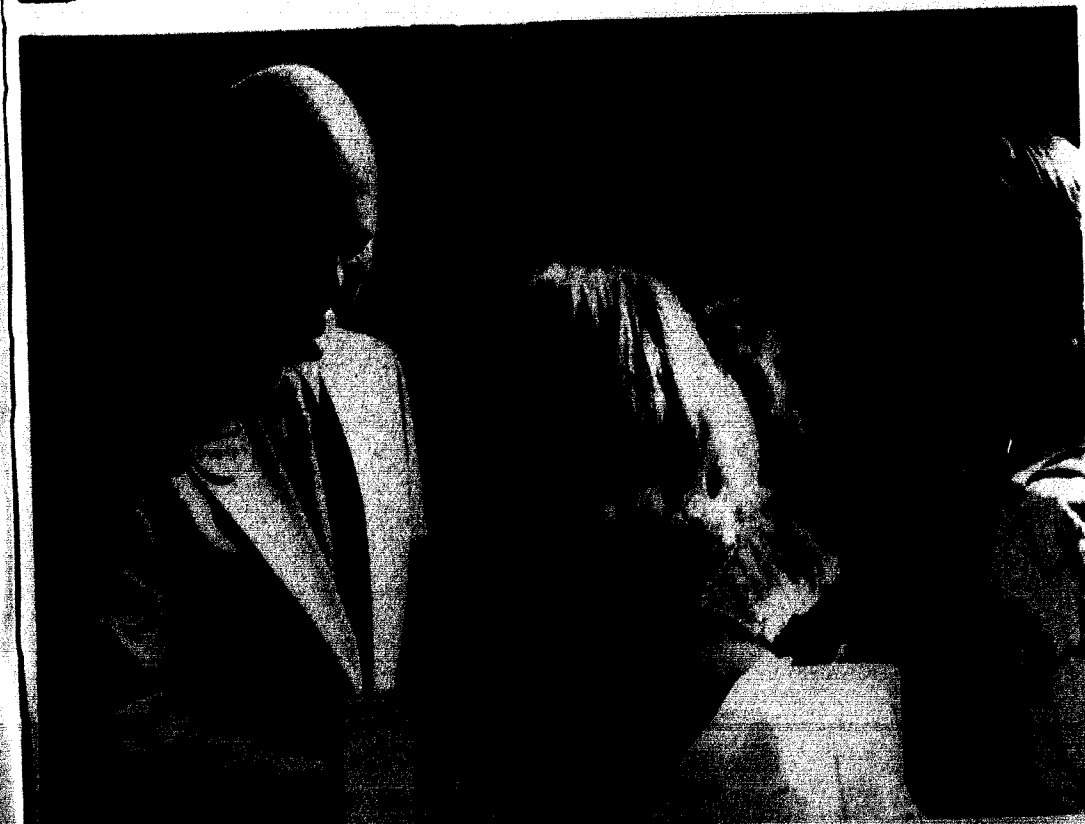
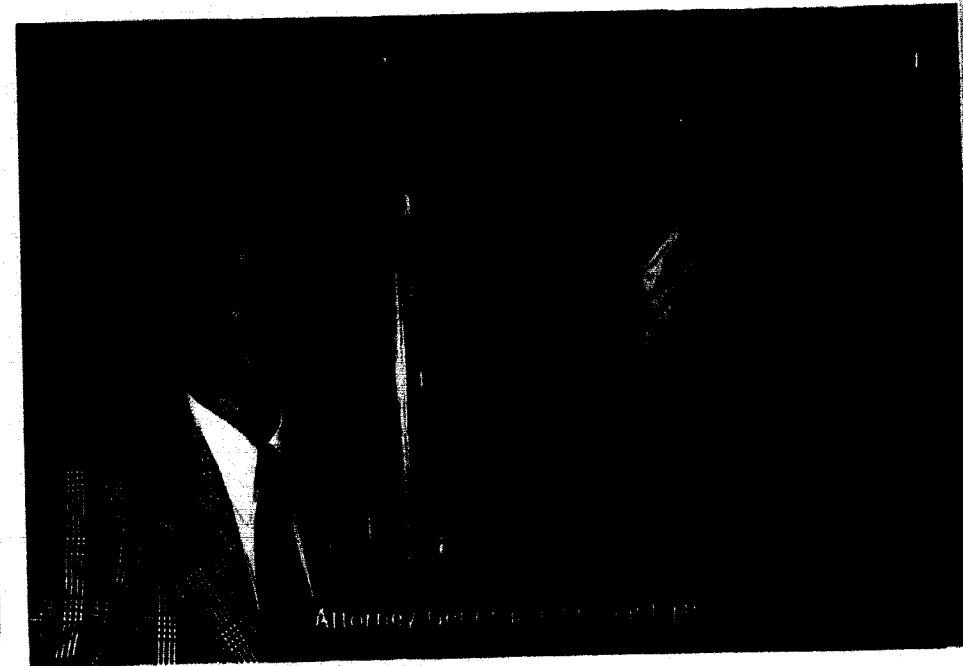
LECTURESHIP

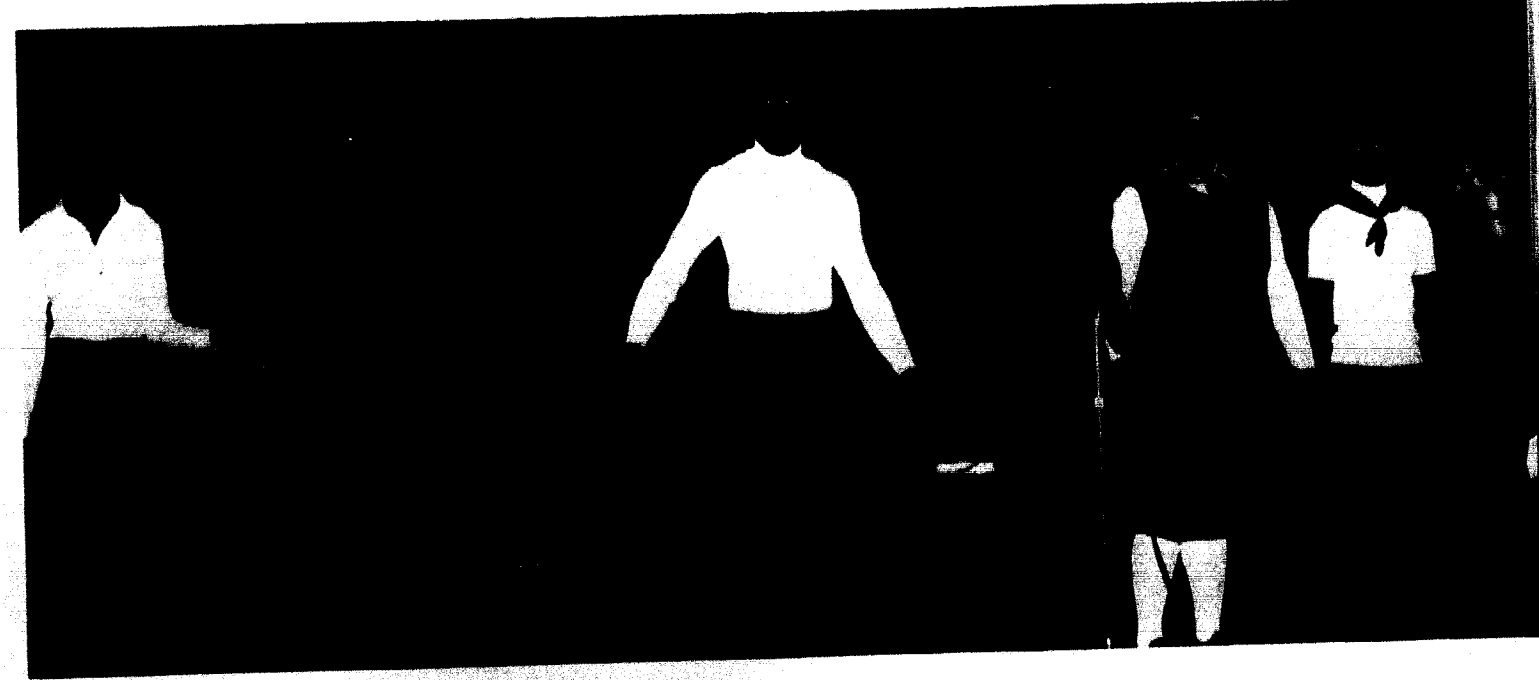

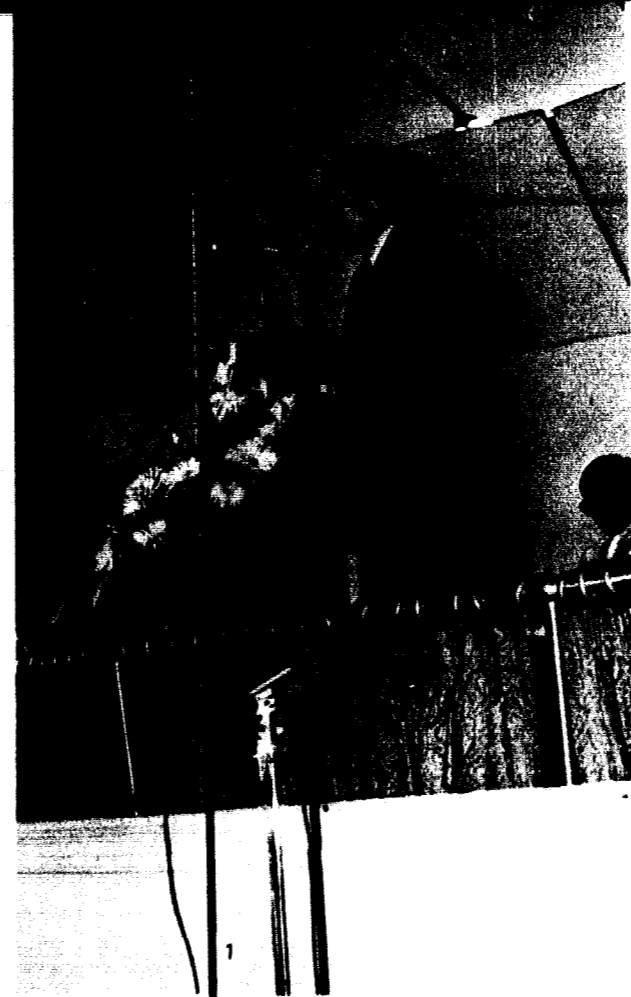
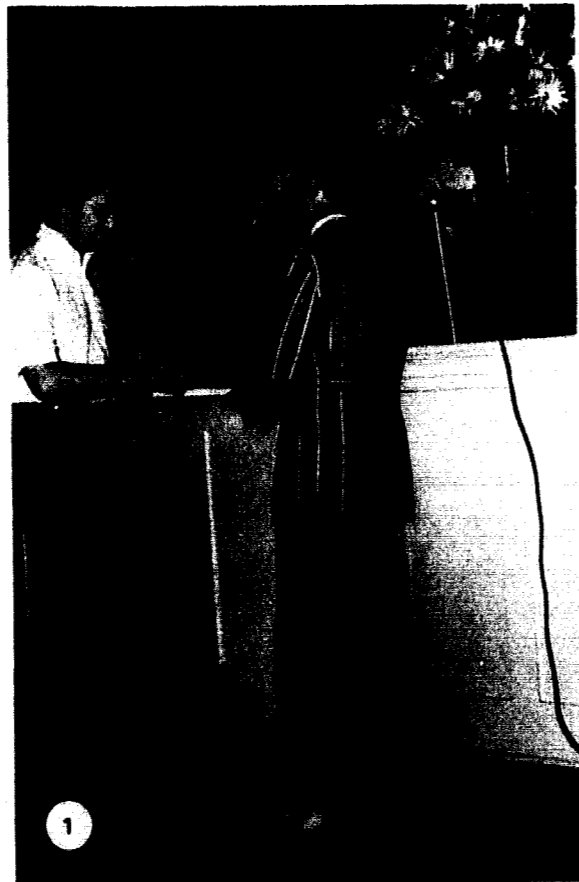
Lectureship provided a wide variety of speakers, wide enough that every Jewell student could enjoy the program in one way or another.

BIOLOGY



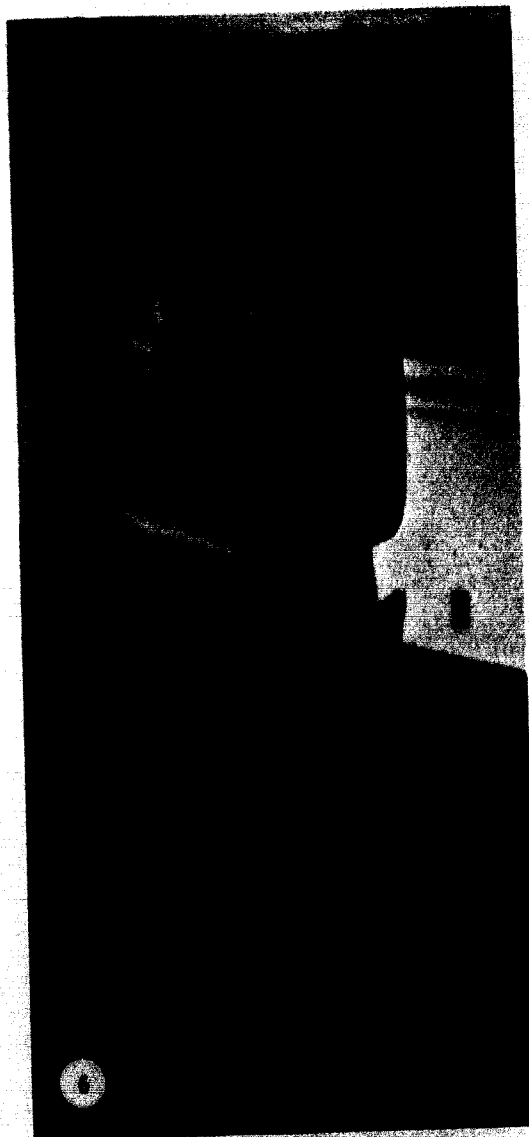

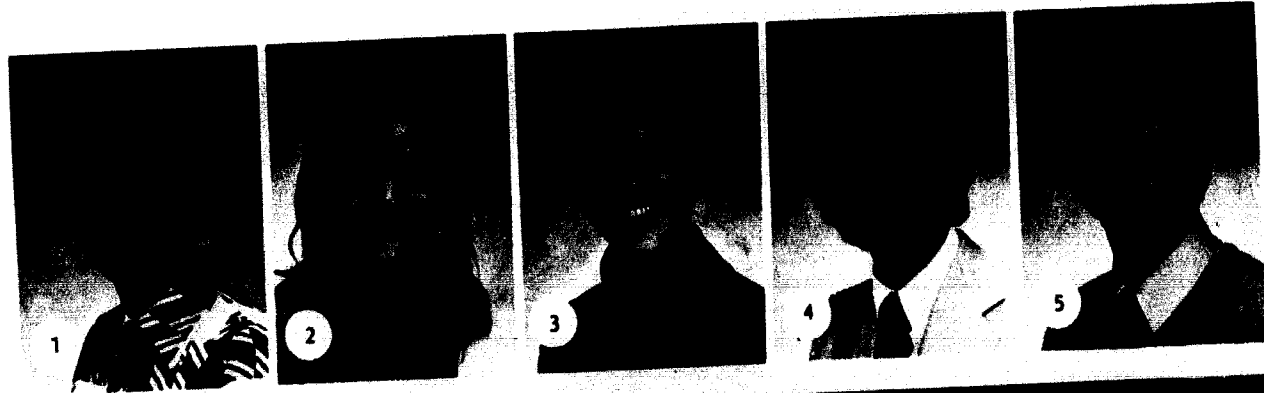


CHEMISTRY

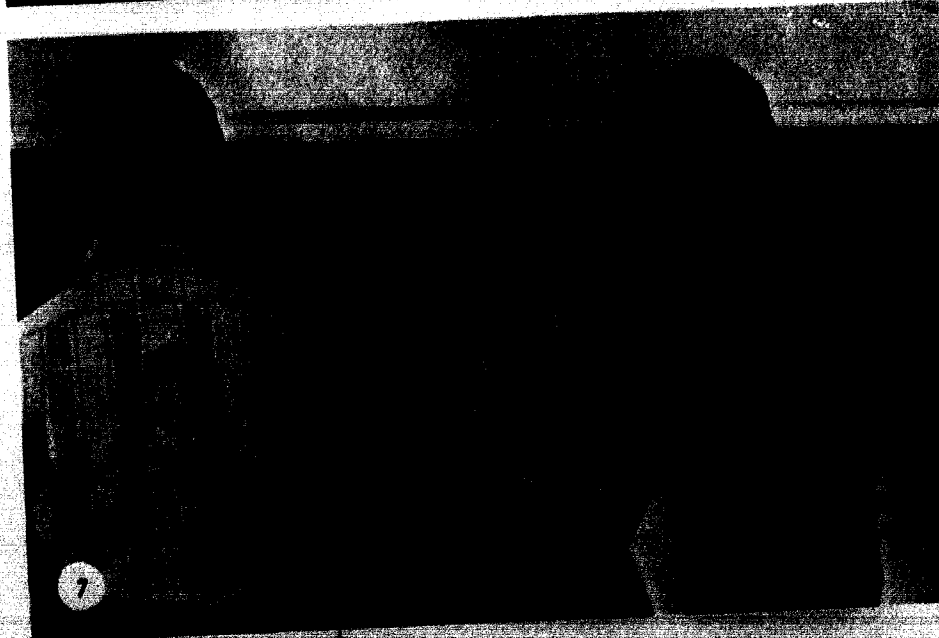
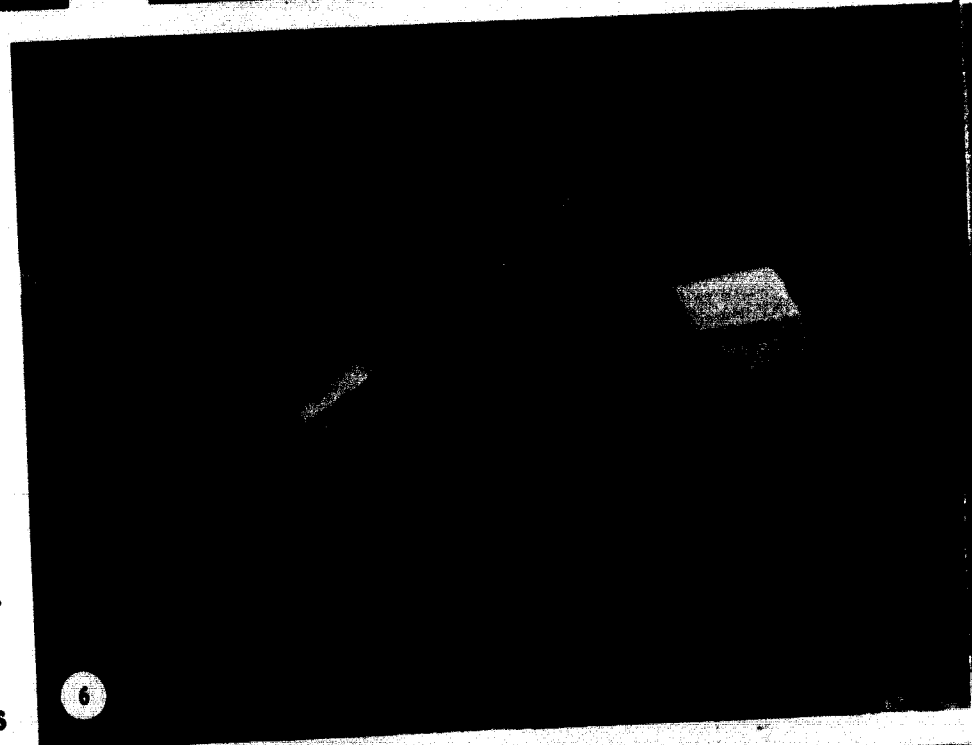
COMMUNICATION

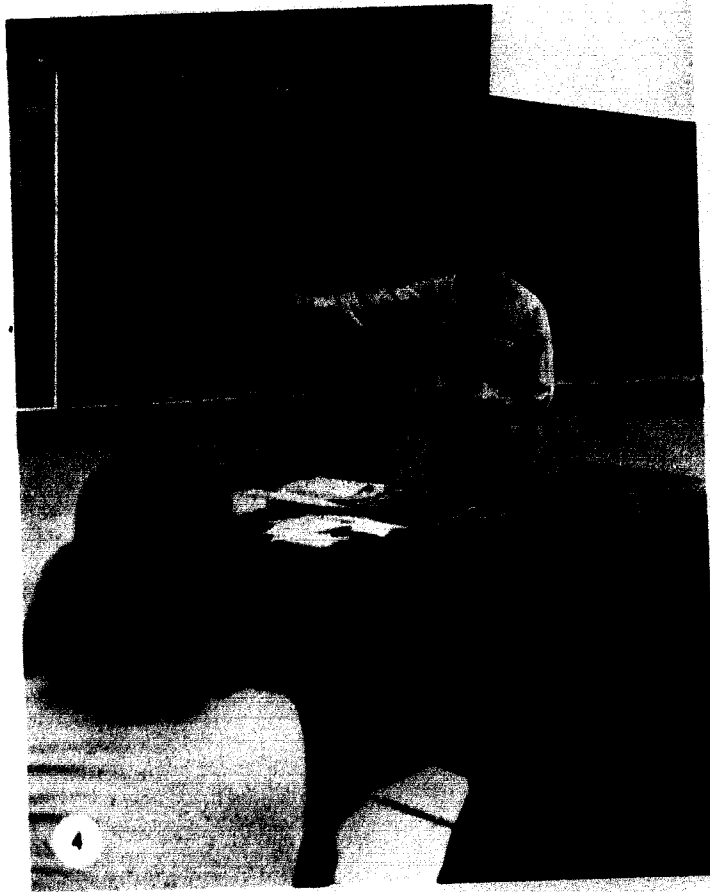
MATH

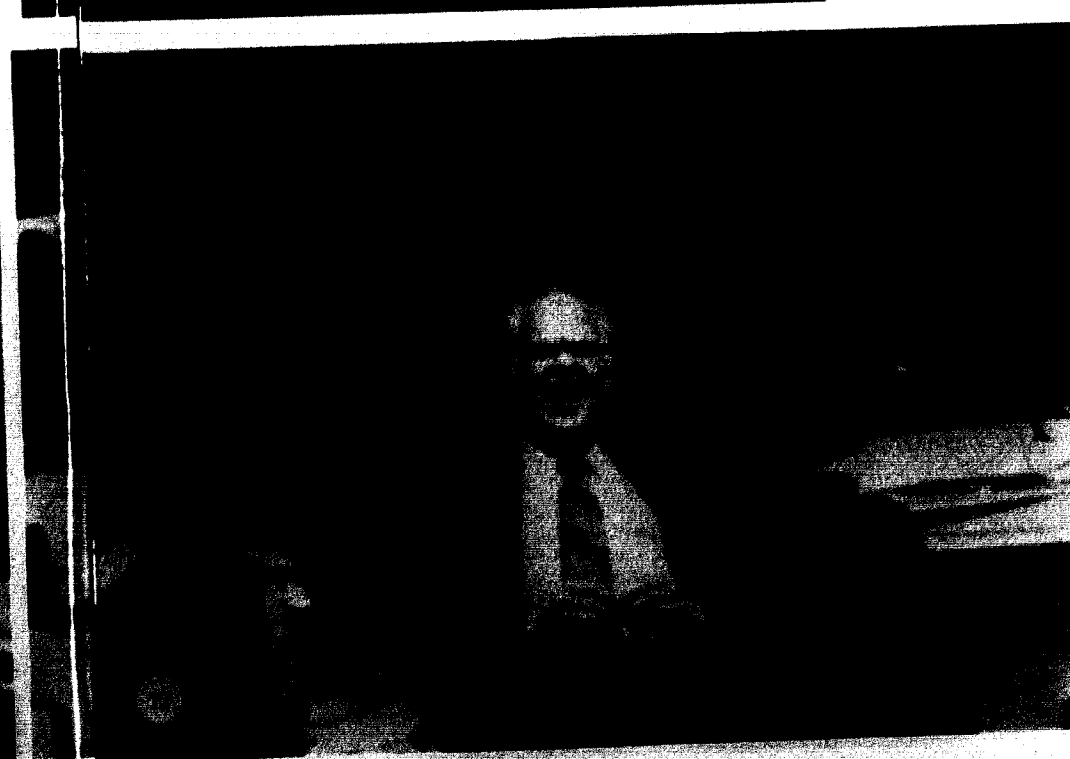
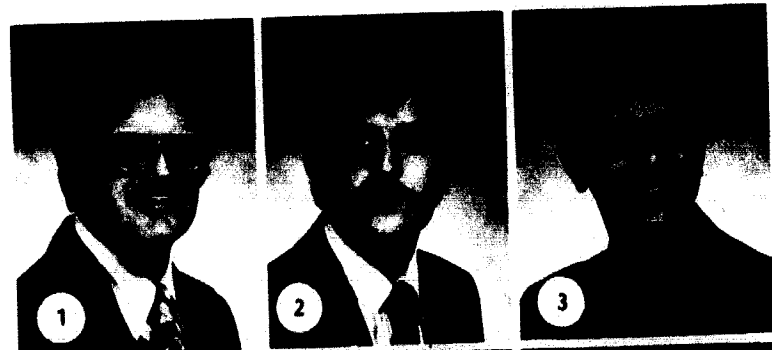
MODERN LANGUAGES

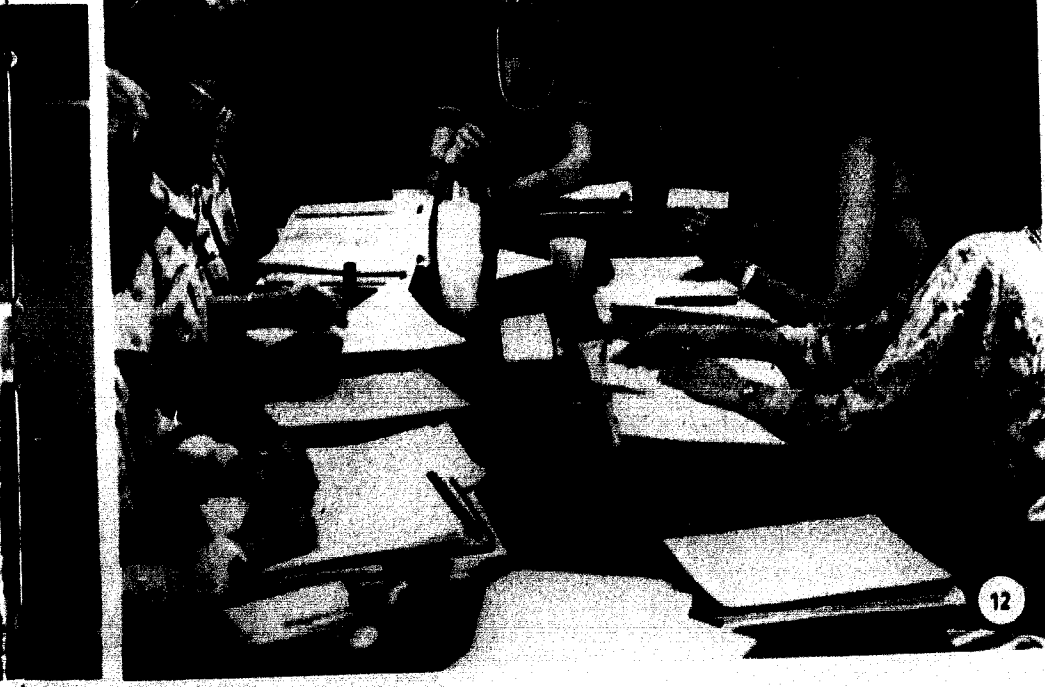
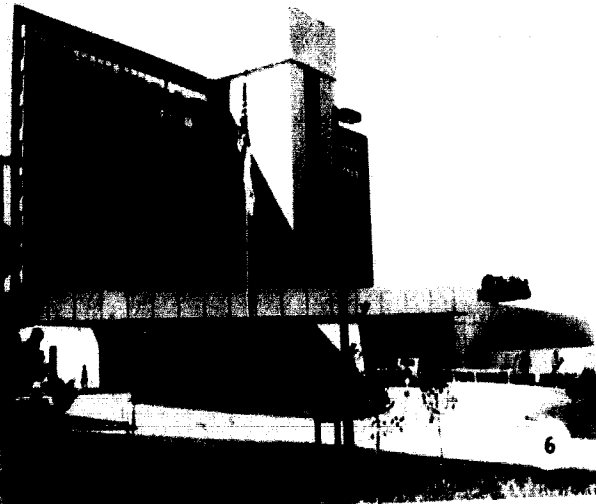
MUSIC

NURSING

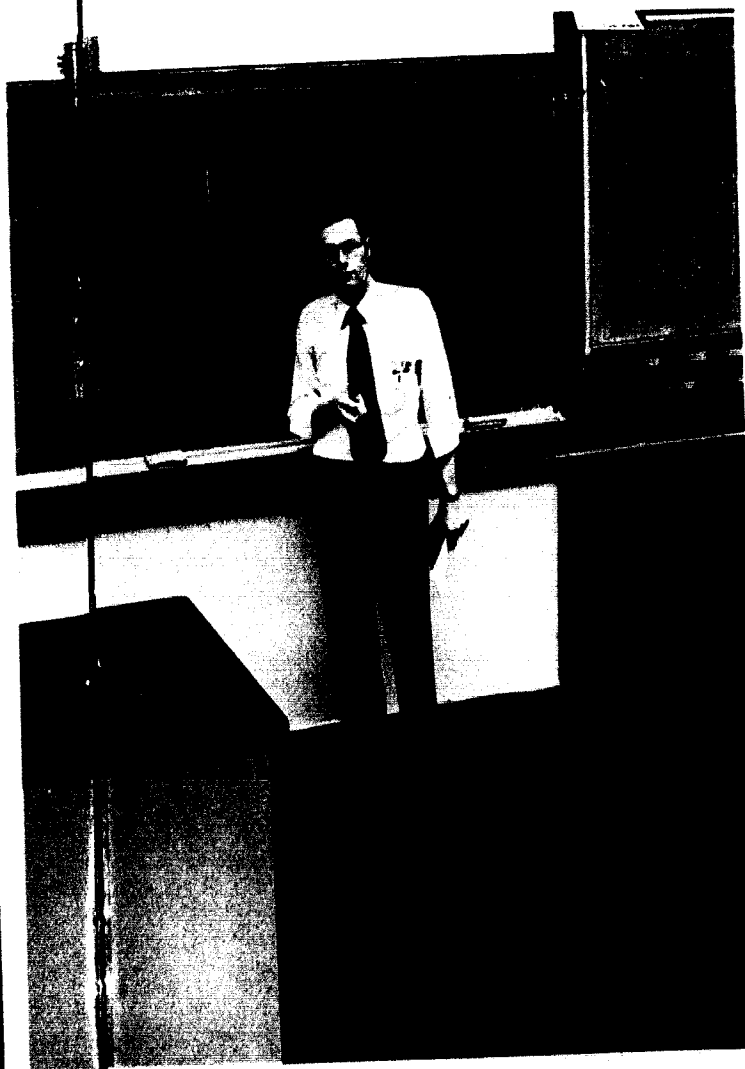
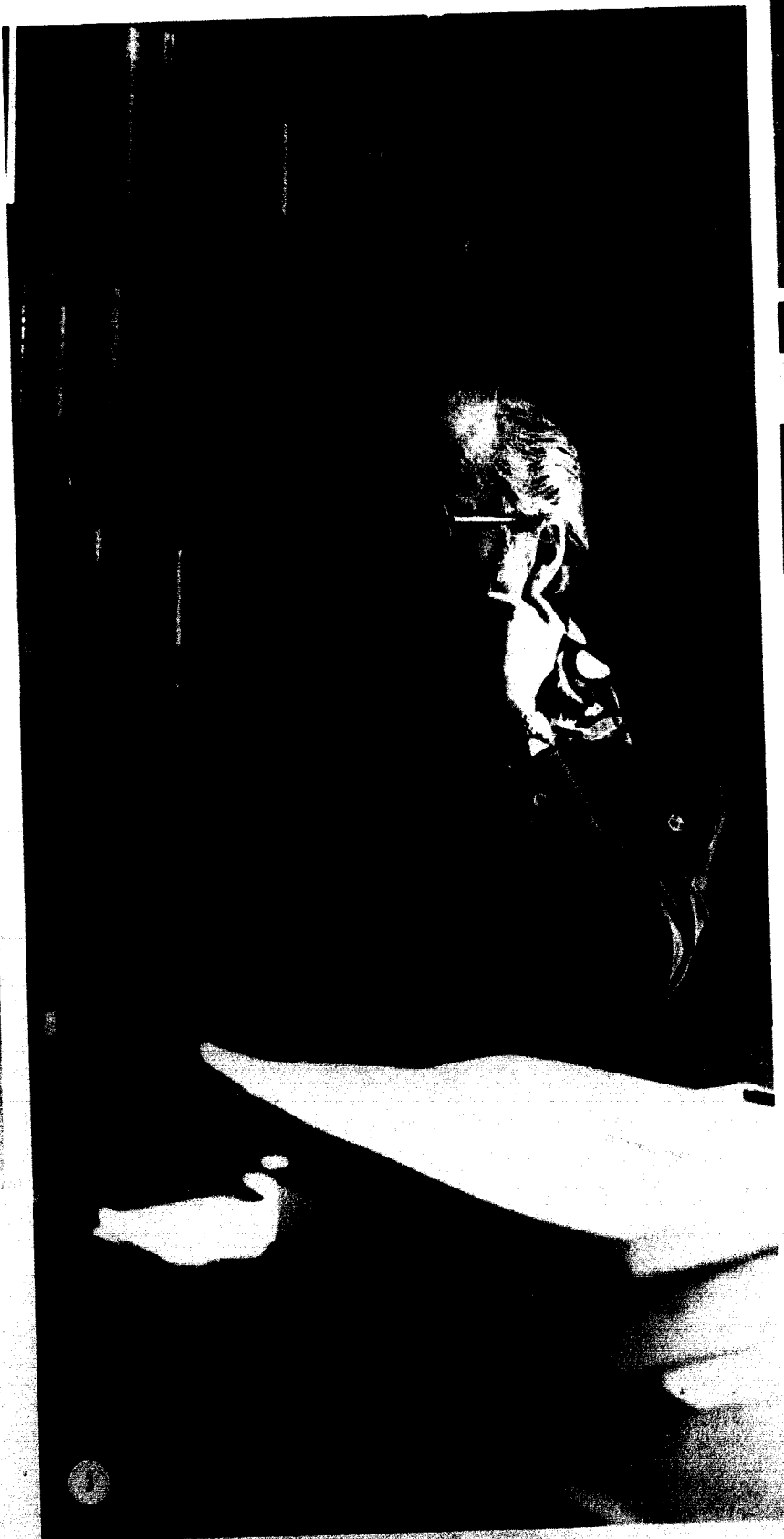

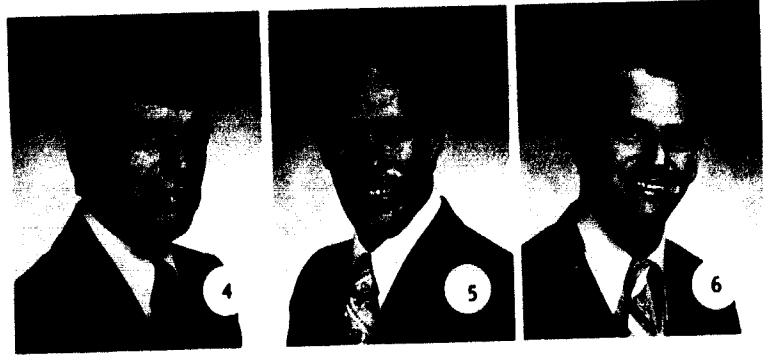
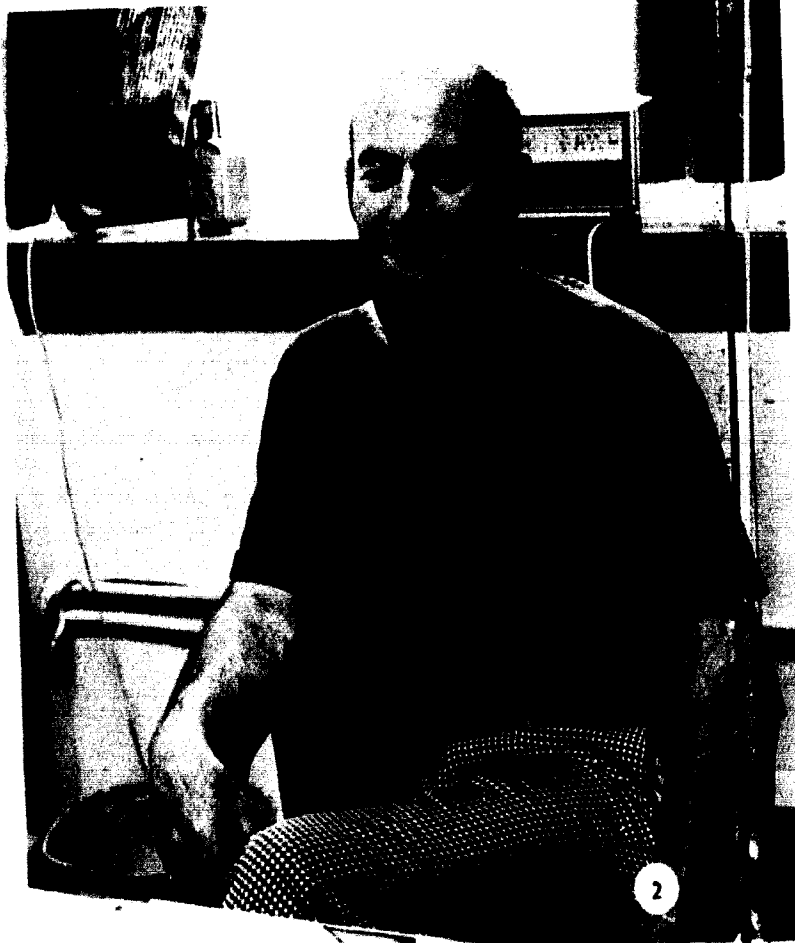


PHYSICS

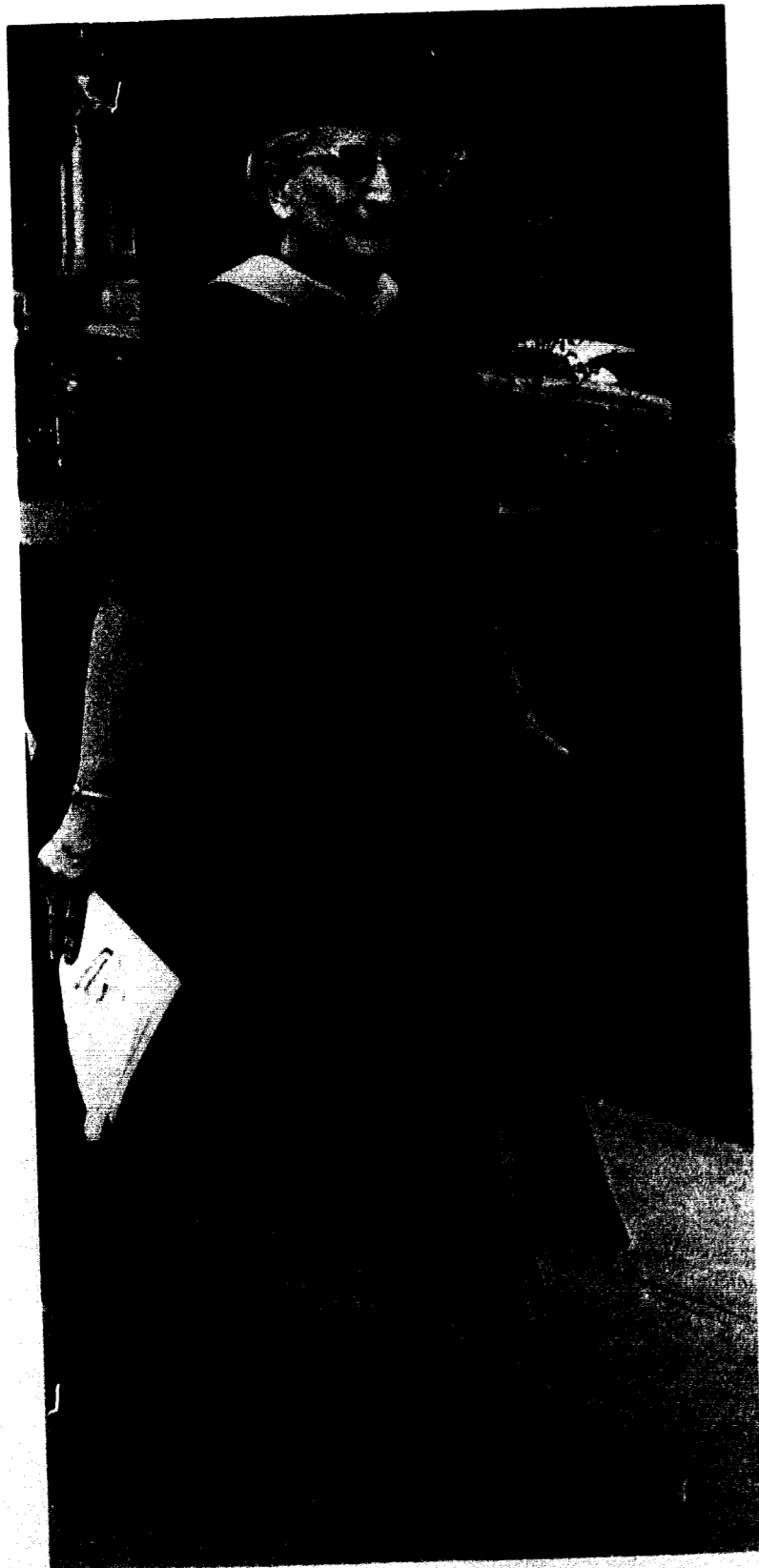


SOCIOLOGY

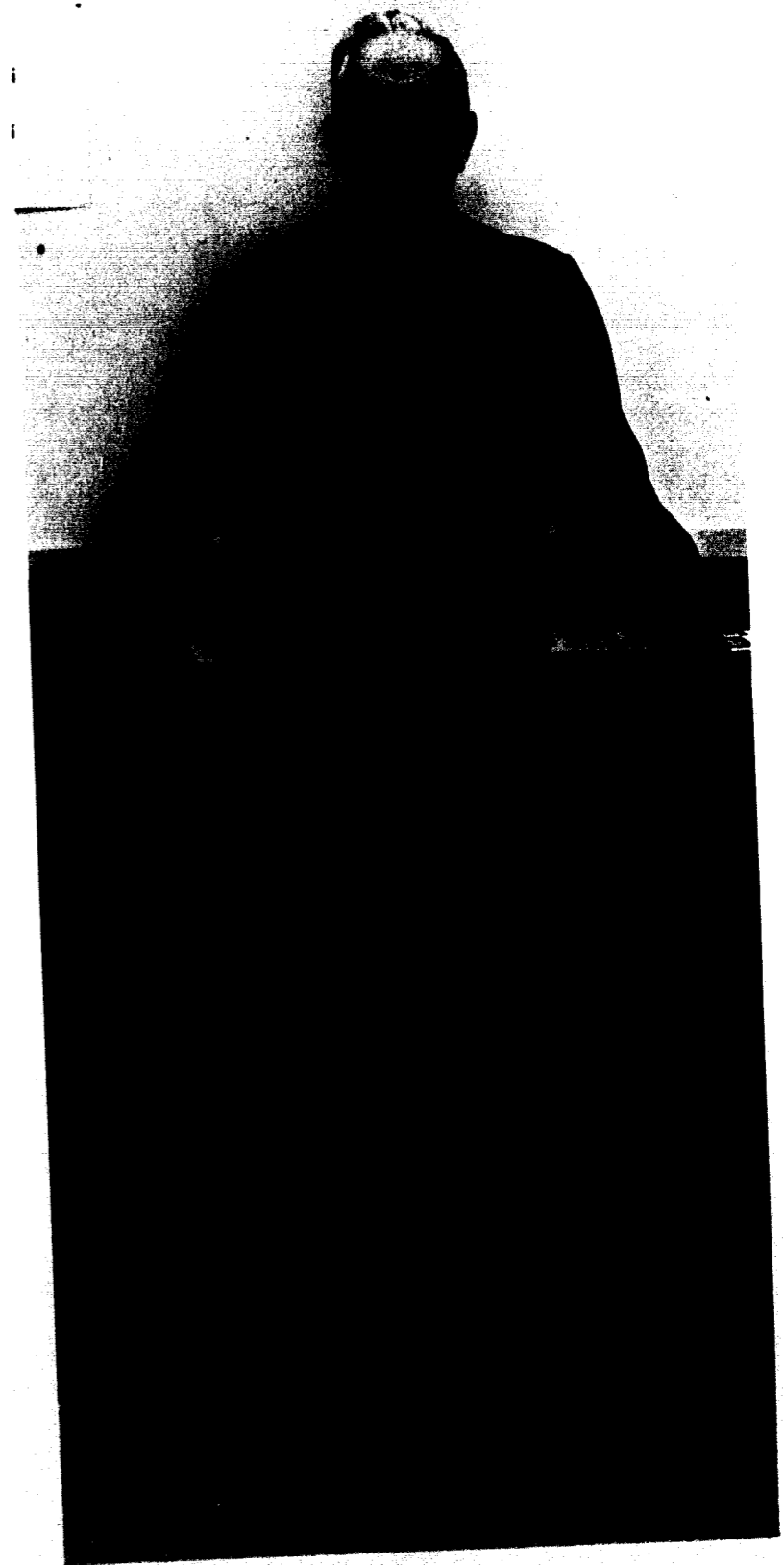
Professor Ed Lakin, instructor in Music, after spending 27 years teaching at Jewell retires this year. His devotion to the campus is heard at every football game,

This year Ann Cunelo and Greg Lebold were elected as First Lady and A. Doniphan respectively. Ann has been

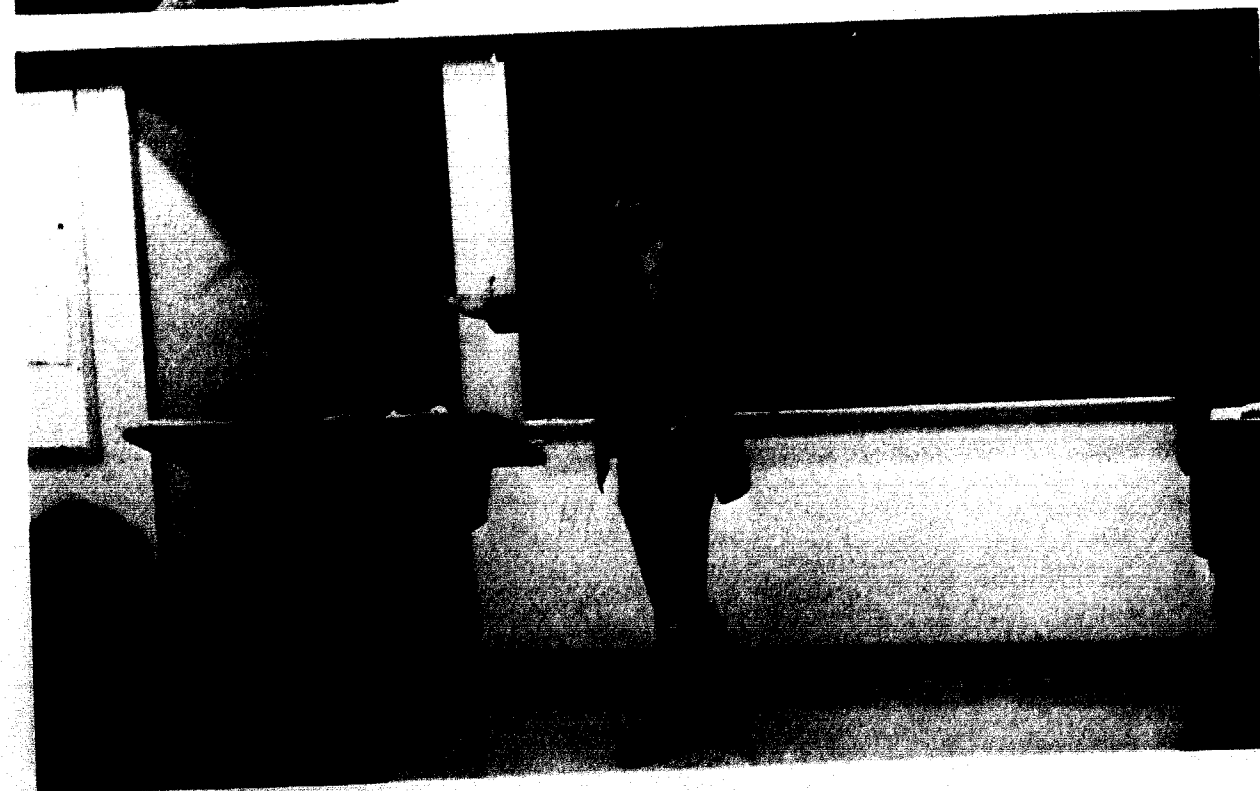

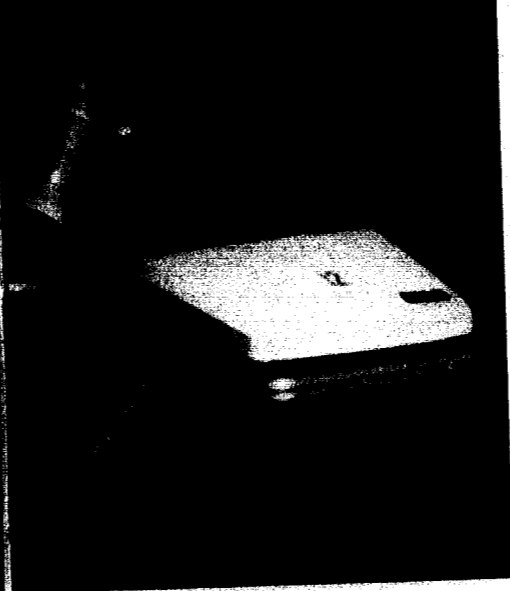

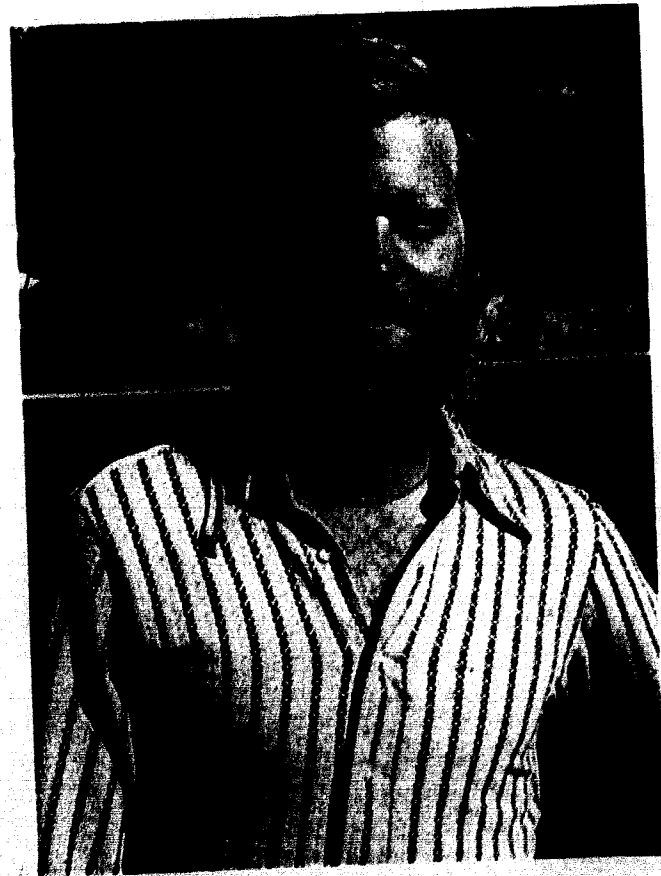

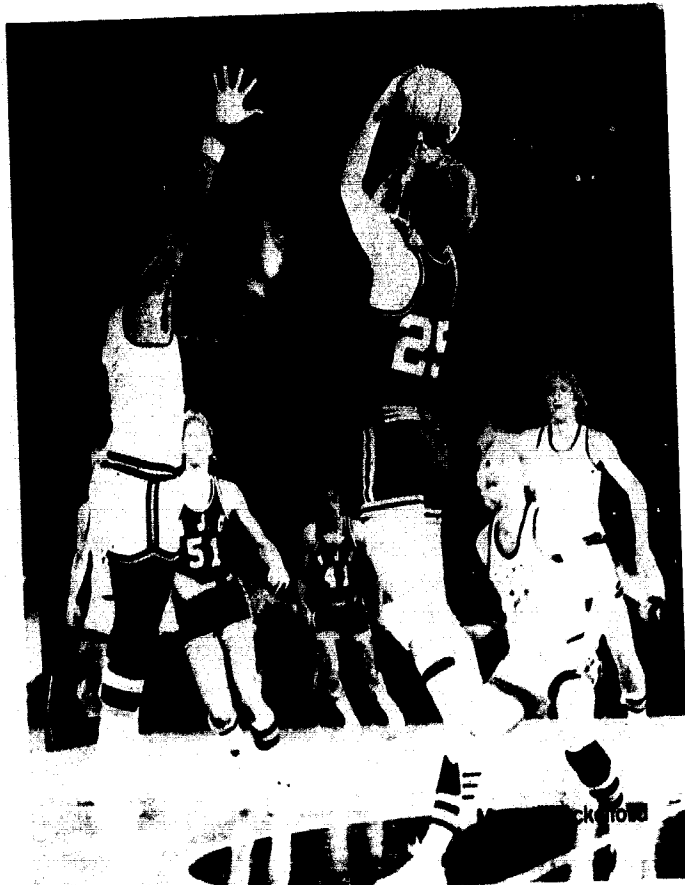
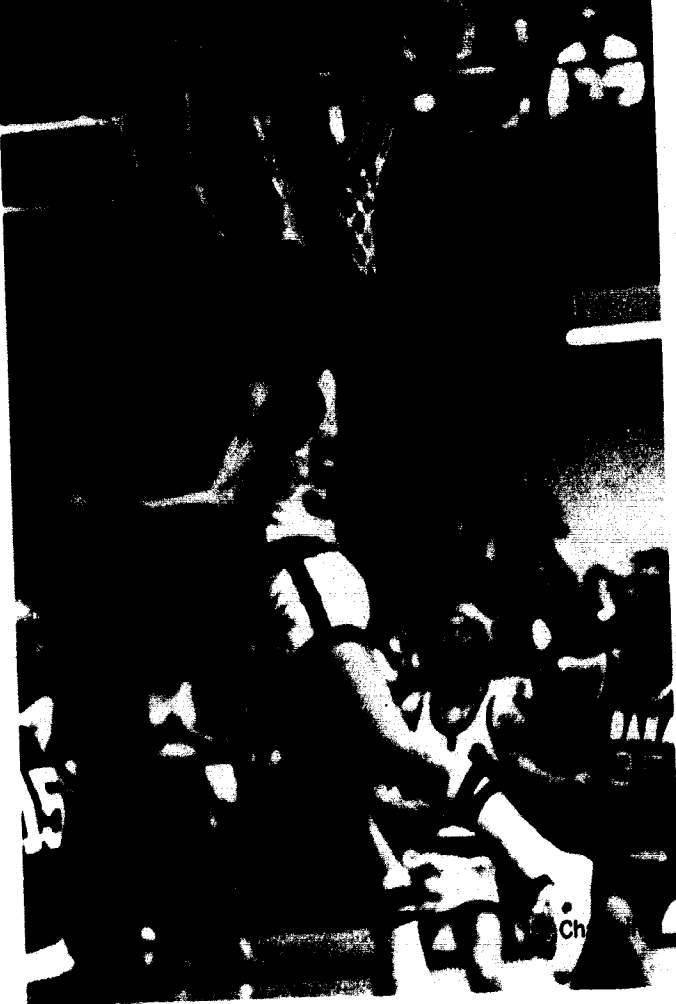
The 1976-1977 Basketball season could be summed up in one word — disappointing. The Cardinals, under Coach John Hickman, battled through a tough non-conference schedule versus such Midwestern powers as Marymount (31-5) and Southern Illinois University at Carbondale, a NCAA Tournament entry, and seemed to be making progress in remolding a team similar to the previous two seasons. But then disaster struck as the Cardinals lost their first three conference games to Baker, Tarkio, and Graceland. The remainder of the season saw the Cardinals post a 4-10 mark with their finest hours coming in the 56-55 victory over Tarkio, the league champion's only loss, and a last second 64-66 loss to UMKC, the eventual District 16 champion. With a full contingent of talented freshmen and sophomores returning the cage picture looks promising at William Jewell College as the junior varsity team, under the guidance of Mike Griffin, finished with a 9-7 record with a win over the Kansas State freshmen. 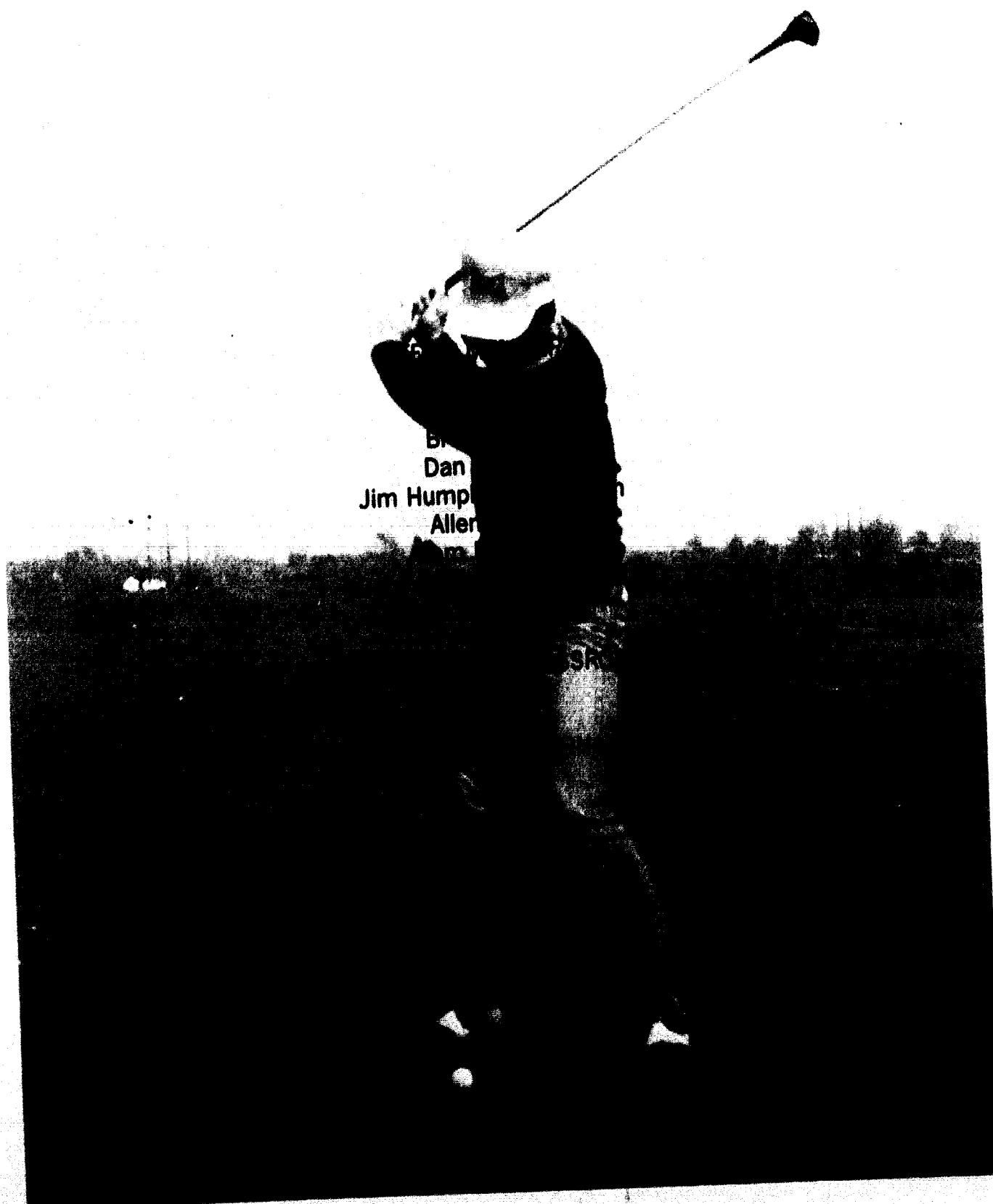

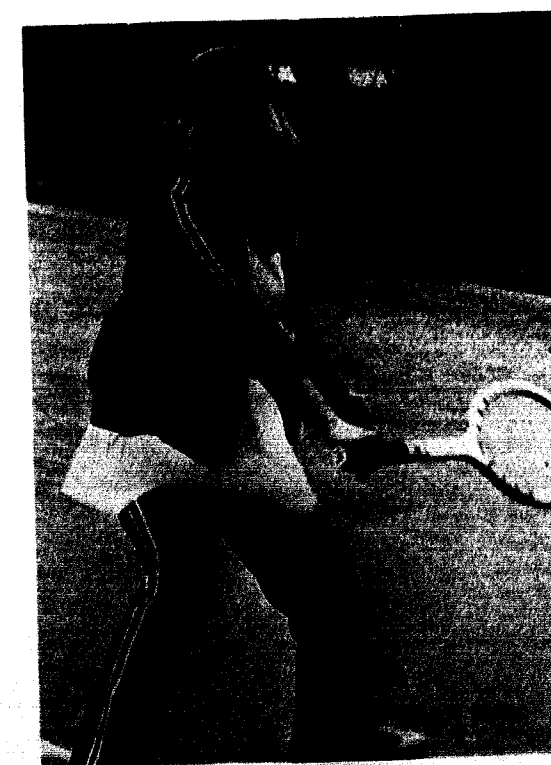

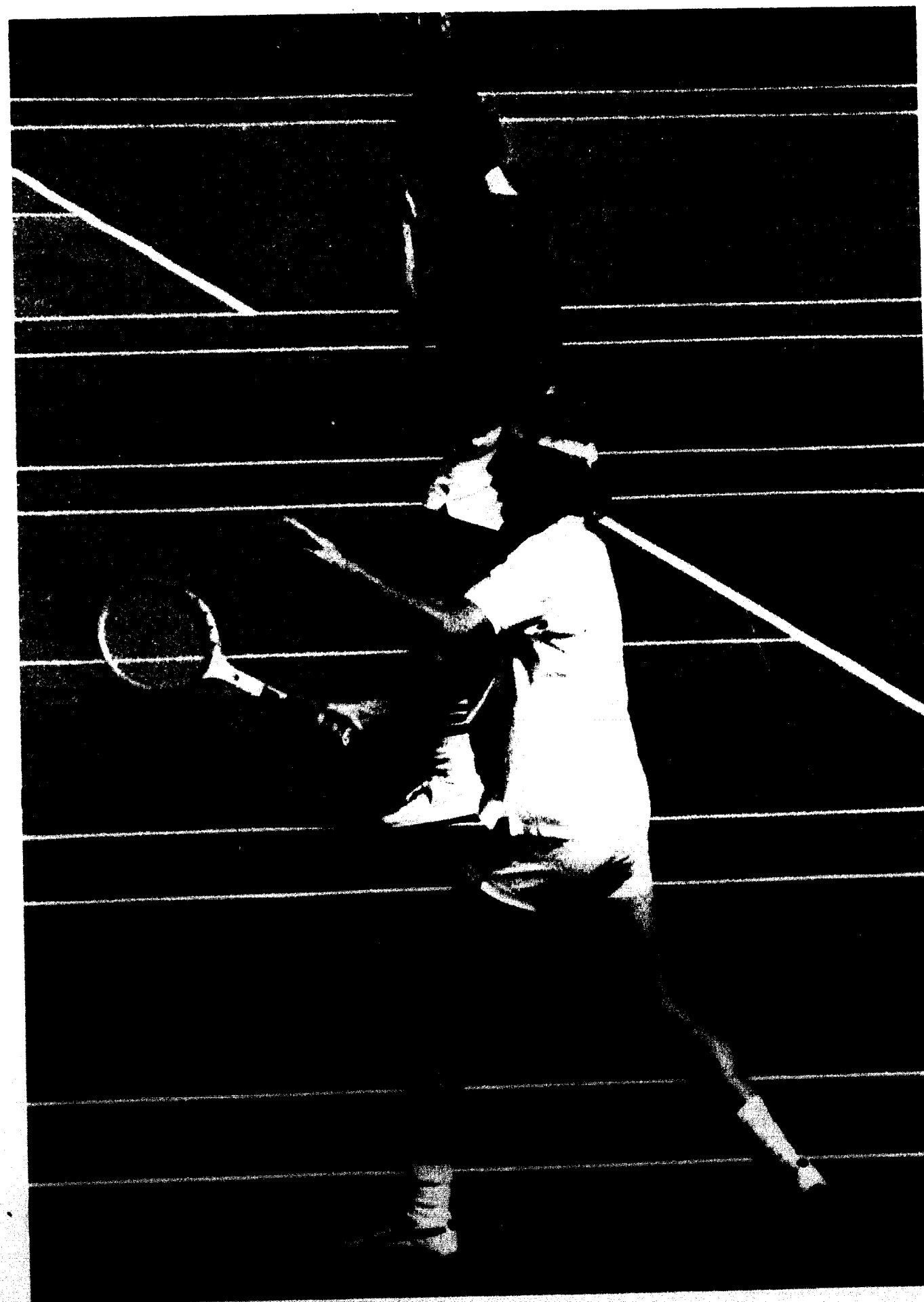

TRACK-HACC INDOOR/OUTDOOR CHAMPIONS

With an abundance of depth in the distance events and a versatile sophomore named Jerry Floyd, the Cardinal track team, coached by Darrell Gourley, captured both the indoor and outdoor conference championships.

In the indoor HACC championships at Graceland, the Cardinals edged past Tarkio and the host Yellowjackets by sweeping the mile and two mile runs plus firsts in the long jump and triple jump, and high jump. In the latter event, Stark Nelson recorded a most respectable indoor mark of 6'8".

Outdoor competition saw the William Jewell thinclads live up to expectations by winning the title with 153 points followed by Tarkio (135) and Graceland (109) Missouri Valley (70), Ottawa (50) and Central Methodist (4).

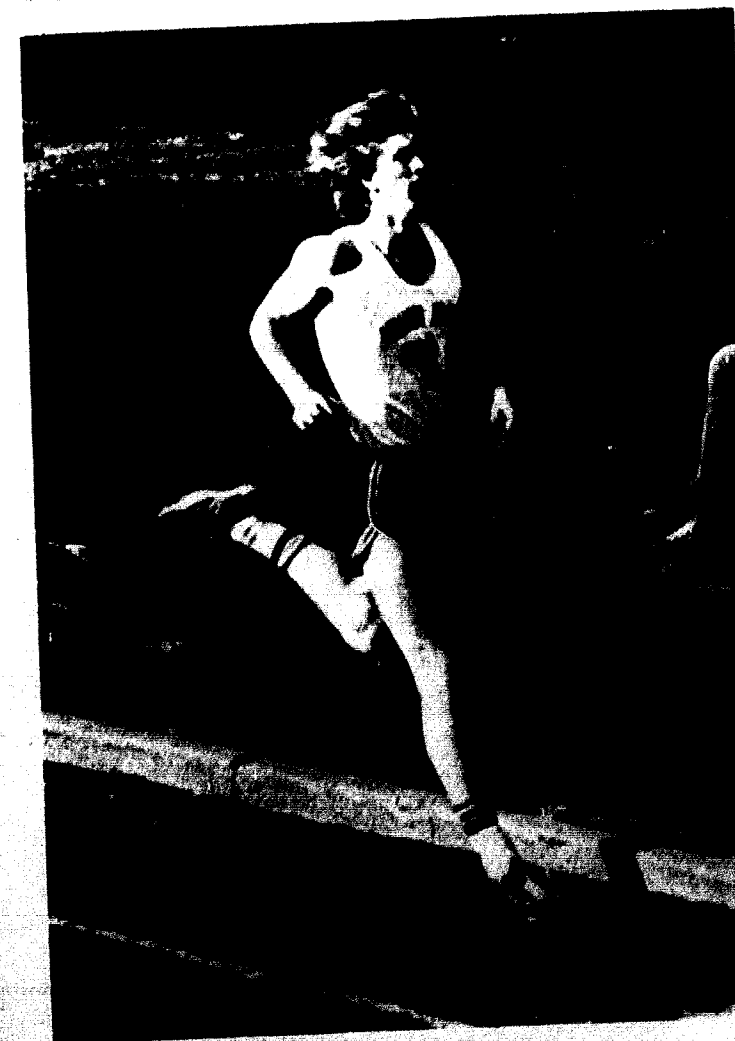
Sophomore Jerry Floyd, nicknamed Mr. Versatility, scored 31 points in five events-winning the triple jump and 120 high hurdles, third in the high jump, and fourth in the 440 hurdles and long jump.

In addition, the Cardinals swept 11 of the first 12 places in the 880 mile, and 3-mile the Cardinals, accumulating half of their point total. Particularly impressive in were the times of Schmid (4:16.6), Harrison (4:17.97) Mike Ausmus (4:18.22), and George Poland (4:19.14).

Highlights of the outdoor season included the weekly confortations in the distances between teammates, Tim Schmid and George Poland, and the record surge in the 880 by Bob "Mouse" McPhee.

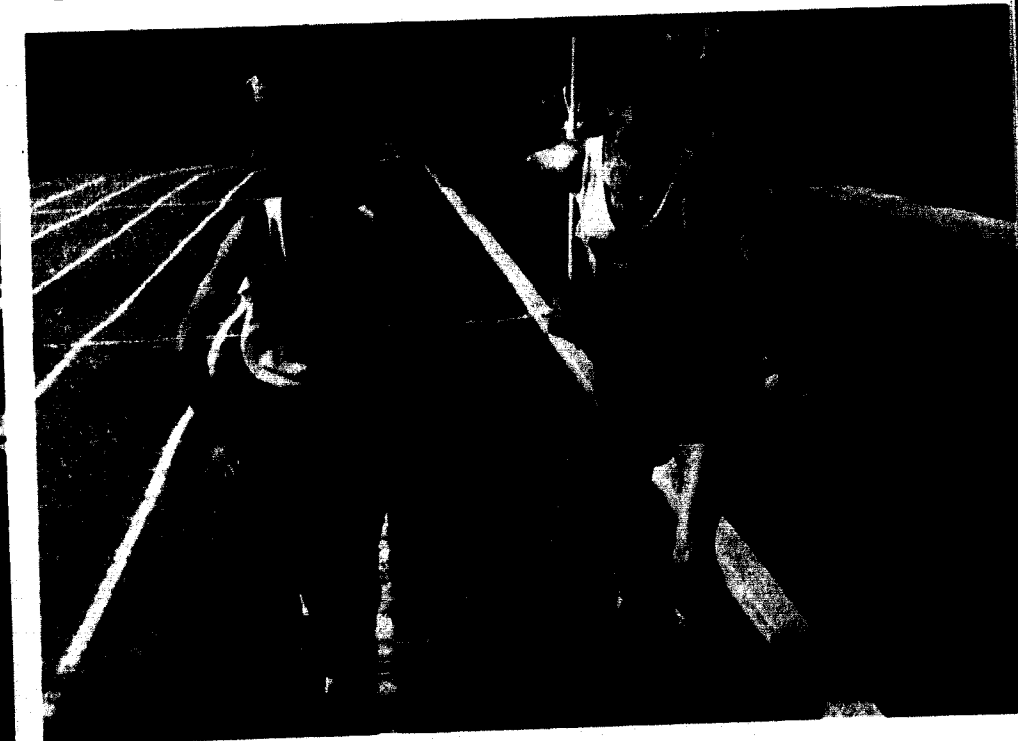
Freshman Tim Schmid shaved more than 24 seconds off the 3-mile record, running a 14:40.0 only to have it shattered at the next meet by Poland in 14:33.6. Poland also established in the 6-mile run. Schmid added his name to the record books in the mile with a 4:16.6. at the conference meet.

However, the oldest track record to fall this season was the 880 mark set in 1963. At the KU Relays, Bob "Mouse" McPhee served notice that the 14 year old record of 1:56.9 was in jeopardy. Running an 880 leg of 1:54.2 in the sprint medley relay, he joined with teammates Jim Noland, Bob Symons and John Seymour, in establishing a new WJC standard of 3:32.3. "Mouse" then "officially" broke the 880 mark by winning the HACC meet in 1:56.01. The next week at the NAIA District 16 meet in Point Lookout, Missouri he again lowered the record to 1:55.32 in gaining second place honors.

CARDINALS REACH NAIA PLAYOFFS

Using the proven success formula of Coach Flook of tough early season competition and a late season blitz, the William Jewell Cardinals successfully defended their Missouri state title (NAIA District 16) as well as the four-state championship (NAIA Area IV) enroute to their second consecutive appearance in the national playoffs. WJC began the season with a tough spring tour against such schools as the U. of Arkansas, SMU, North Texas State and Tulsa, finishing with a 10-10 mark.

The Cardinals then duplicated their late season surge of last year by winning 29 of their last 37 games. Entering the statewide competition in District 16 at Warrensburg ranked #2 behind their rivals, Missouri Western (St. Joseph), WJC ace pitcher Jay Wöhnlich hurled his third shutout of the season and the 10th victory against two losses in defeating Harris Teachers' College in the first round.

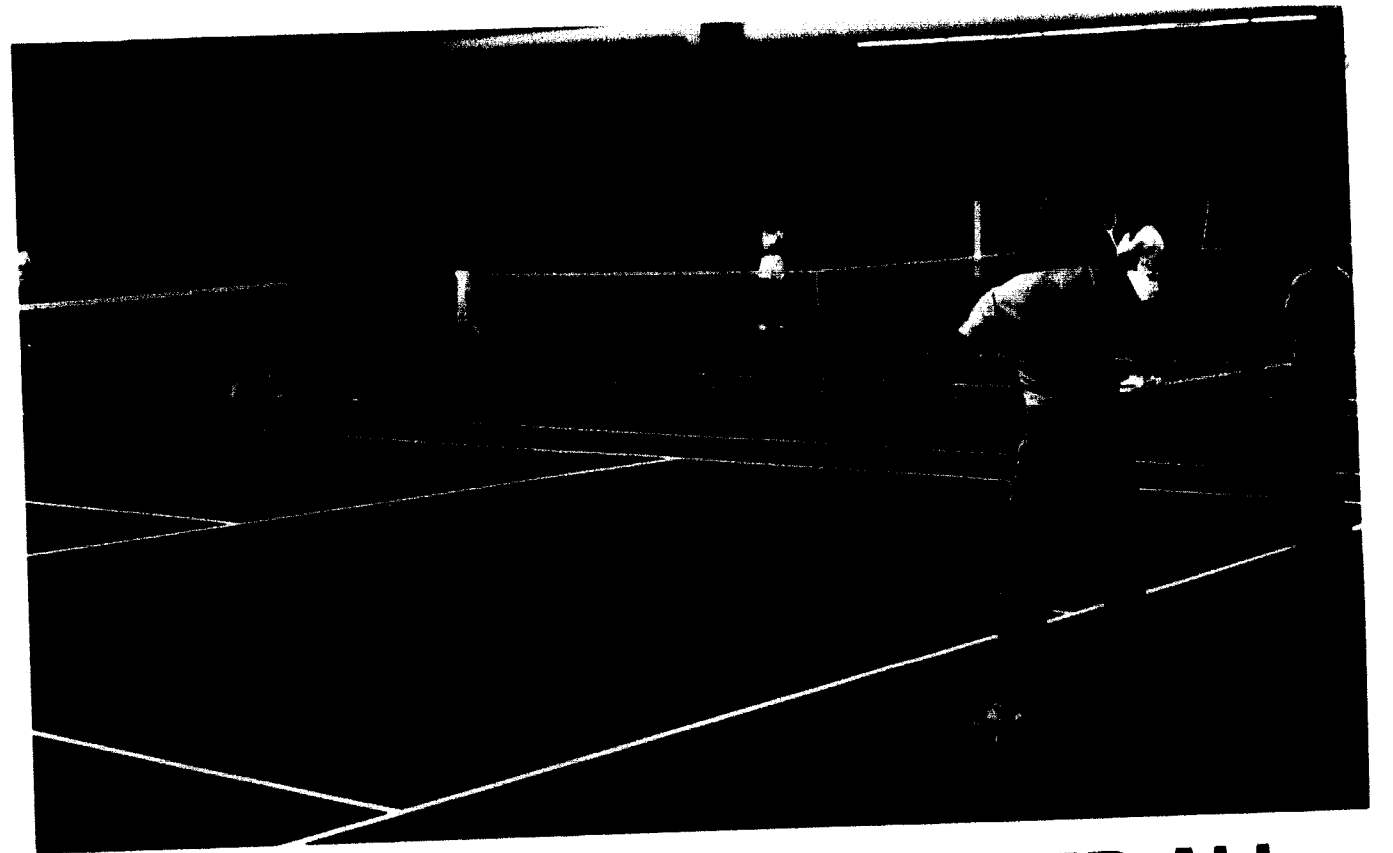
The Cardinals opened up in Area IV with a convincing 9-0 win over Morningside (Iowa) College. However, WJC had to revive themselves just as they had done in the District 16 competition the week before. After losing to the U. of Wisconsin-LaCrosse, WJC returned to defeat them twice on the final day to qualify as one of the eight teams in the nation to make the national tourney.

St. Joseph's Phil Welch Stadium hosted the national tourney. WJC drew Lewis (Ill.) in the first round of double elimination tournament play. Unfortunately for the Cardinals the script was the same as last year against Lewis, as they lost 13-2.

In the second round, WJC eliminated Monmouth (N.J.) College 6-2 and were pitted against Southeastern Oklahoma in round three. Trailing only 3-1 in the seventh, the Cardinals left the bases loaded twice and lost 10-3 as Southeastern struck for four runs in the seventh and three in the ninth to eliminate Jewell.

Coach Flook, in his second year back at William Jewell, led the Cardinals into the national tourney, finishing with a 43-22 record.
